Every thinking man or woman is
oppressed at times by the apparent
social injustices that exist in this
great country of ours. We see old
people die in poverty after a life of
service to society, and reckless young
blobs enjoy practically everything
that life can offer in a material way
merely because they are fortunate
enough to have been born into
wealthy families. We see hard working,
honest, intelligent business men go
to the wall while crooks display their
wealth most gaudily at Atlantic City
or Palm Beach. All this seems wrong.
At first we think that laws will cor-
rect the wrongs we see. Next we turn
to our very system of government and
suggest radical changes. But sooner
or later we discover that laws, sys-
tems, and government can be no bet-
ter than the people who administer
them, and at last we conclude that so-
ciety can be improved only through
the improvement of the individuals of
which it is made. At last we come to
the conclusion that in education alone
lies the remedy for the ills of the
times. For this and many other rea-
sons, we find it a pleasure to extend
congratulations to the graduates of
the class of 1925 of the Pampa high
school. You are well started along
the way of self-improvement. You re-
ceive commendation for the success
you have already achieved in your
school work, but you must not let
this progress of self-improvement stop
now that you have received your di-
ploma. For after all, you have merely
made a good start. Whether you
continue in school work, graduate
from college, and follow certain stud-
ies in graduate courses, or whether
you find it necessary to go forth and
secure a job immediately, you must
continue to study, to work for the im-
provement of your own intellect and
your own character. We are glad to
see so large a graduating class from
the Pampa school. We feel that it ar-
gues well for the future of our com-
munity.

Every community should have a
definite rating—an appraisal if you
will—in the opinion of Dr. Wm. L.
Bailey, of Northwestern University.

sion that there is a way of rating ev-
ery city and every village. In an ar-
ticle that appeared in the last issue
of the National Real Estate Jour-
nal, he outlines the value in rating
the community from a business stand-
point. He shows that real estate men
and property owners are really dealing
in more than mere land and buildings.
They are dealing as well in commu-
nity assets—those intangible things
that make property in one town worth
more than it would be in another
community. And as a result of his
study, he has come to the conclusion
that small towns can be rated higher
than large cities, but that all commu-

Randall County News: The members of the Panhandle Hardware and Implement Association in session recently decided that newspaper advertising was the best and most reliable kind of advertising. At the same time they condemned the various kinds of stunts called advertising, which are nothing more than hold-up schemes devised by grafters to fleece the unsuspecting. The real business man who knows advertising and its power usually will not fall for stunts called advertising, but it is usually the class of fellows who claim they do not believe in newspaper advertising who will slough off a wad of money to have their names printed on a few bills which never reach the buying public, or will give a lot of merchandise to a so-called comedian to give away at a show. Such stuff lacks a whole lot of being advertising.

It can be given a definite, and exact rating. Here are some of the factors, according to him, that determine whether it is a good town or a poor town. Look this over, and then just see where you would rate Pampa according to his table:

- 1. Economic and business conditions—wage rates, kind of labor, cost of living.
2. Health conditions—death rates per 1,000, and infant mortality rates.
3. Social conditions—percentage of home ownership, church membership per 1,000 population, child labor.
4. Civic life—parks, pavements, value of public improvements, and fire losses.
5. Cultural life—library circulation, school attendance, school property value, percentage of literacy.
6. Americanization—proportion of foreign born over 10 years old unable to speak English.

As you go over this list, you will be impressed with the fact that these are many things of importance about a community besides its mere size—the number of industries, the volume of business done. We make a mistake in this country by appraising a community too much by the amount of business done and too little by the other factors that make it a desirable place in which to live.

NEW FUELS MAY MEAN THE END OF WASTE

One of the most remarkable facts of the past few years, according to political economists, is the stability in the final cost of manufactured goods in spite of continually rising costs of labor, construction and raw materials. Some of this has been owing to quantity production; but a great deal is due to more efficient utilization of fuel. It has been found that this item affects practically every part of the manufacturing process, says the Texas Public Service Information Bureau.

The comparatively recent introduction of gas fuel into the industrial heating field has already done much, enabling manufacturers either to turn out the same product at lower cost, or a better product at substantially the same cost as before.

The example is given of a large tin decorating plant in New York which recently scrapped an antiquated combustion system, substituting modern gas fired ovens. During the first year this resulted in an fuel saving of \$160 per month for four ovens. In addition, two men were shifted to other work, which meant a saving of \$55 per week. Production was increased 17 per cent.

In this way the new equipment actually paid for itself during the first 12 months of use. With the present trend in conservation of essential fuels, economists as well as engineers have expressed the prediction that the practice of using wasteful and inefficient combustion methods in industry will be abandoned generally within the next few years.

GRIZZLY BEAR KILLS 16 COWS IN NEW MEXICO

THE PUREBRED SIRE BRINGS HIGHER-PRODUCING OFFSPRING

"No other great improvement in our dairy herds can be obtained at so low a cost as the improvement by the use of better bulls." This comment is made by the Bureau of Dairying, U. S. Department of Agriculture, in the foreword of a new directory of co-operative bull associations in the United States.

The statement is based on the comparative milk and butterfat records of large numbers of cows and of their daughters sired by purebred bulls. In milk production the daughters excelled their dams by 14.5 per cent, on an average, and in butterfat production by 16 per cent. These figures represent an increased milk yield of 966 pounds and an increased butterfat yield of 40 pounds. That the increases are due to qualities inherited from the purebred sires is a fair conclusion based on the knowledge that in nearly every case the dams and daughters were in the same herd and received the same care.

The new directory shows that at the beginning of this year there were 220 co-operative bull associations in the United States. These associations owned 1,003 carefully selected purebred dairy sires. While the increase in production because of good breeding is very noticeable in the first generation, the benefits are accumulative, though the gains are usually rapid in subsequent generations.

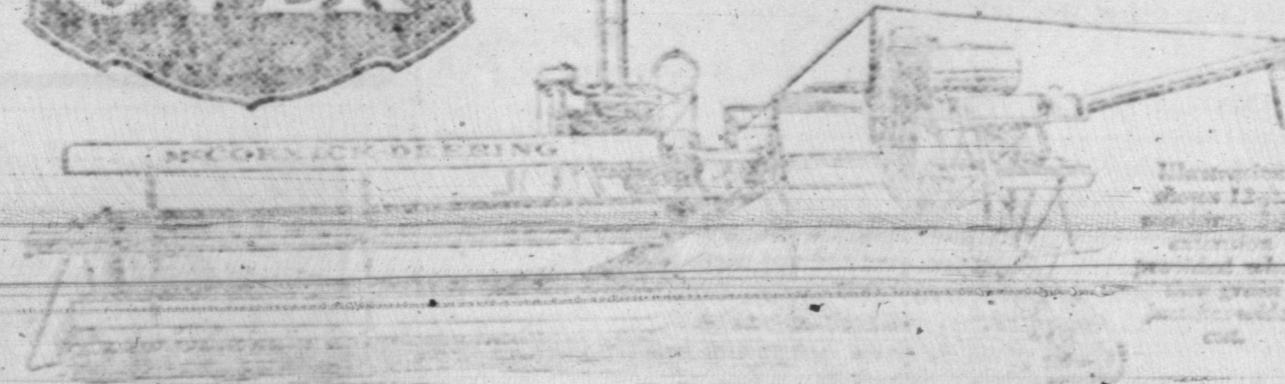

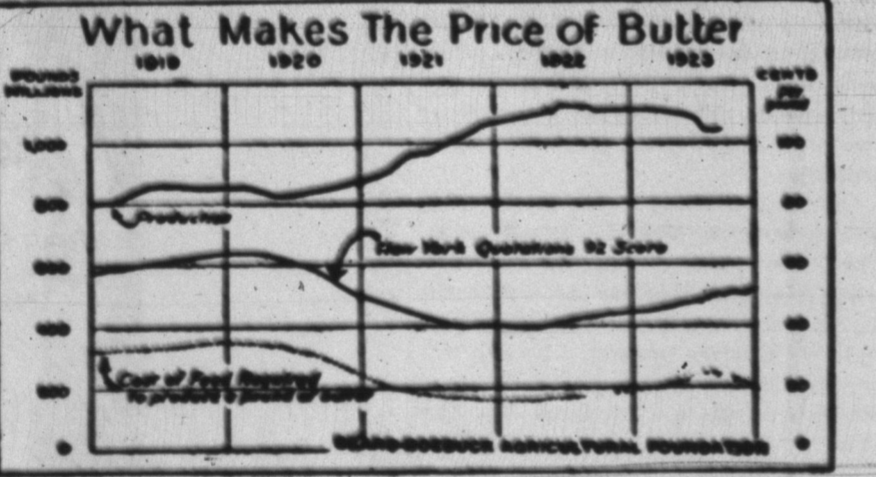

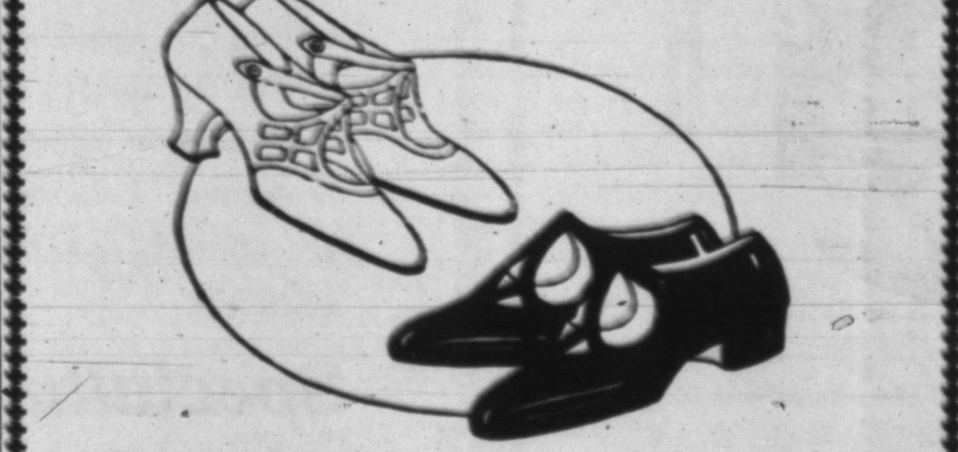
