## Chamber Honors Outstanding 1984 Citizens

Muleshoe and its immediate surrounding rural area honored their own on Thursday, March 29 in the Muleshoe High School Cafeteria, as the evening unfolded on the 1984 Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture's annual banquet. The theme of the banquet this year was "Moving Eighty-Forward" and the decorations, by the Jennyslippers, depicted scenes of the past to the present showing the progress of the area.

Leon "Tuffy" Dent served as Master of Ceremonies in his final capacity as 1983 Vice President of the Chamber, and gave a welcome to all members and guests present, recognizing especially out-of-town guests. The invocation was given by Brock Sanders, the pledge by Dianne Nieman. Dent then introduced the speaker of the evening, Harry Birdwell, General Manager of the Oklahoma Association of Electric Cooperatives. Birdwell picked up the pace of things and included a lot of the local citizens in practical jokes. He related various humorous stories immediately capturing his audiences' attention.

Birdwell really got down to business however, when it came to talking about "How good we, as Americans" really have it." With joking laid aside, the young speaker encouraged Muleshoe citizens to support their Chamber, "For without you, it is nothing." Birdwell stated that the Chamber of Commerce in each city does more good, promotes free enterprise and acts as a catalyst for many events in a community. "You really have an except-

## School's Select Committee Proposal Would Cost Billions

State Comptroller Bob Bullock estimated this week that reforms recommended by the Select Committee on Public Education would cost Texans more than \$19 billion over the next five years.

Late last week, Muleshoe School Superintendent H. John Fuller said he would like to see some of the recommendations implemented, but "only if they would not cost taxpayers more than they are paying now." Superintendent Fuller said the Muleshoe School has already implemented some of the proposed changes, and have had them for several years now. Included are the all-day kindergarten for pre-schoolers, current plans to extend the school day, a proposal to lengthen the school year, the annual testing with the nationally-normed test, the six year textbook cycle and several other proposals.

With these proposals already being practiced by the Muleshoe Schools or ready for implementation, there will be little to no additional cost to local taxpayers.

He also said that although the Muleshoe Schools have decreased the average class size to around 20 - 22 students, he would like to see the classroom decreased more to the recommended 15 students through the fourth grade. "This would allow the teacher to have even more time for one-on-one if we could further reduce the classroom

size," he commented. Although the superintendent strongly believed teachers need and deserve a raise, he again advocated the raises should be given "ONLY" if there would be no tax increases.

# Checks, Criminal Mischief Keep Local Police Busy

Along with the processing of about 20 warrants on bad check cases in Muleshoe, City Police have been quite busy with other offenses as well during the past two weeks time.

On March 19, police arrested Juan Enrique Toscano, Jr. on a failure to appear warrant. Toscano cleared the warrant on the FTA, but was held by the police on other charges. Also, on March 21, Danny Javajar Mendoza was arrested on a criminal mischief charge warrant involving the hitting of a parked car at the Pizza Hut. Mendoza came to the PD where the warrant was served, he was booked into jail pending \$500 bond.

On March 21, Jesse Navajar was arrested on a criminal mischief county capias warrant. He was also booked into jail, pending bond. On March 21, Anthony Slattery was arrested on a warrant for criminal mischief. He was served, then booked into county jail, pending bond.

Albert Ontiveros was arrested on March 22 on a charge of alleged DWI after officers observed him cutting across a drive. He was booked into the county jail, pending bond and his vehicle released to a friend.

On March 16 Alice Lira was arrested on a capias warrant for bad checks. She was taken before Judge Linda Huckaby and paid a fine on March 19 for the

offense. Terry Field reported to police on March 20, a criminal mischief occurrence wherein the roof of a camper on his property had been scratched up with an unknown object. Field became aware of the mischief after he had gone out to check for slashed tires due to the rash of slashings the past week or so.

On March 15, police investigated an accident involving a 72 Ford driven by Annie Sain Provence and a 76 Ford owned by C.R. Reyna. The Provence vehicle failed to see the Reyna car which was improperly parked and unattended, and hit it. No serious damages occurred.

Jessee Lee Davis was arrested on March 16 on charges of alleged public intoxication. He was taken to the sheriff's office and booked pending bond. On that same date, officers arrested Donald R. Wide-man on charges of alleged public intoxication. He was taken to the county jail and booked, pending bond.

On March 16 officers arrested Raymond Serrano on a disorderly conduct warrant. He paid the fine required at the city hall and was released. Rudy Toscano was arrested on March 12 on charges of alleged public intoxication. He was taken to the SO and booked, pending bond. Also taken in the same incident and charged

with alleged public intoxication were Martin Gloria and Mariano Perez. Both were booked pending bond and the vehicle they were occupying was impounded.

Florentina Garcia Vasquez reported an assault on March 16, and signed a formal complaint against the suspect. On March 16 police arrested Rudy Vasquez on a warrant for alleged assault. He was placed in county jail, pending bond.

Also, there were reports on March 18 from 11 citizens who had tires slashed by suspects. A total of over \$2,000 in damages were reported. The suspects, however were apprehended.

# Court Officials Maintain Steady Pace

From March 13 to March 26, both Municipal and Justice Courts in Bailey County had their share of the action. A total of 86 cases were filed and a total of 49 cases disposed of within the two courts over the two week period.

In Municipal Court, Judge Linda Huckaby reported a total of 52 filings for the two week period, with the lions' share being for "bad check" cases. Fourteen filings were made on the issuance of bad checks. Seven filings were made for no drivers license, four for disorderly conduct, four for invalid MVI and three each for the following: expired plates, speeding, failure to stop at stop sign, running red light, public intoxication. Two were filed for disregarding railroad barricade and two for expired drivers license. One case each was filed for failure to leave address at scene of accident, expired drivers license and no operator's license.

Cases paid and disposed of in Municipal Court totaled 28, with eight of them being for bad checks. Six were disposed of for speeding and three each for public intoxication and running stop sign, as well as expired MVI. One case was disposed of for no drivers license, as well as one for failure to appear, violation of city ordinance, running red light, disregarding railroad barricade sign and expired

plates. In Justice Court, Justice of the Peace Jack Bates recorded a total of 34 filings for the two week period, with speeding violations being the largest, totaling 20 counts. Three cases were filed for failure to stop at stop sign and two were filed for failure to drive in single lane. One case each was filed on the following: no operators license, operating unregistered vehicle, no lia-

**Property, Death Totals Given Due To Fires**

The State Fire Marshal, Ernest Emerson, has indicated that approximately \$500 million in property was lost and 350-400 deaths occurred in Texas in 1983 due to fires.

Because the fire problems in Texas has reached serious proportions, the 68th Legislature created a special joint interim committee, the Texas Fire Protection Standards Committee, to study the issue of enacting a statewide fire code. At the request of Representative Bob Simpson of Amarillo, the Texas Fire Protection Standards Committee, chaired by Representative Gene Green of Houston, has scheduled a public hearing in Amarillo, April 2, 1984, at 2:00 p.m., at the Amarillo Chamber of Commerce Building, 1000 South Polk. This is the third of four public hearings to be held across the state to gather testimony concerning the advisability of enacting statewide fire standards. Testimony presented at hearings in Houston and Dallas has indicated particularly serious problems in many rural and unincorporated areas which are not covered by any standard building codes.

**'83 IRA Contributions Still Acceptable**

Last year nationwide, some 11.4 million, or 12 percent of the total, federal income tax returns were filed by taxpayers who reduced their federal tax bills by making contributions to an Individual Retirement Arrangement (IRA). Eligible workers have until April 16, 1984, to make contributions to the IRA's and still claim them as deductions on their 1983 federal income tax return, unless an extension is requested.

If you request an extension to file your return, you have until August 15, 1984, to make your IRA contributions, the Internal Revenue Service says.

Employees claiming IRA's on 1983 returns are allowed up to \$2,000 contributions to an IRA. Since penalties are assessed for excessive contributions, you should calculate the amount of your contribution carefully.

Banks, insurance companies, credit unions, and other financial institutions can provide assistance in establishing and maintaining new IRA's and in calculating maximum contributions allowable on 1983 tax returns.

Detailed information on IRA's is contained in IRS Publication 590, "Tax Information on Individual Retirement Arrangements," available by using the order form in the tax package.

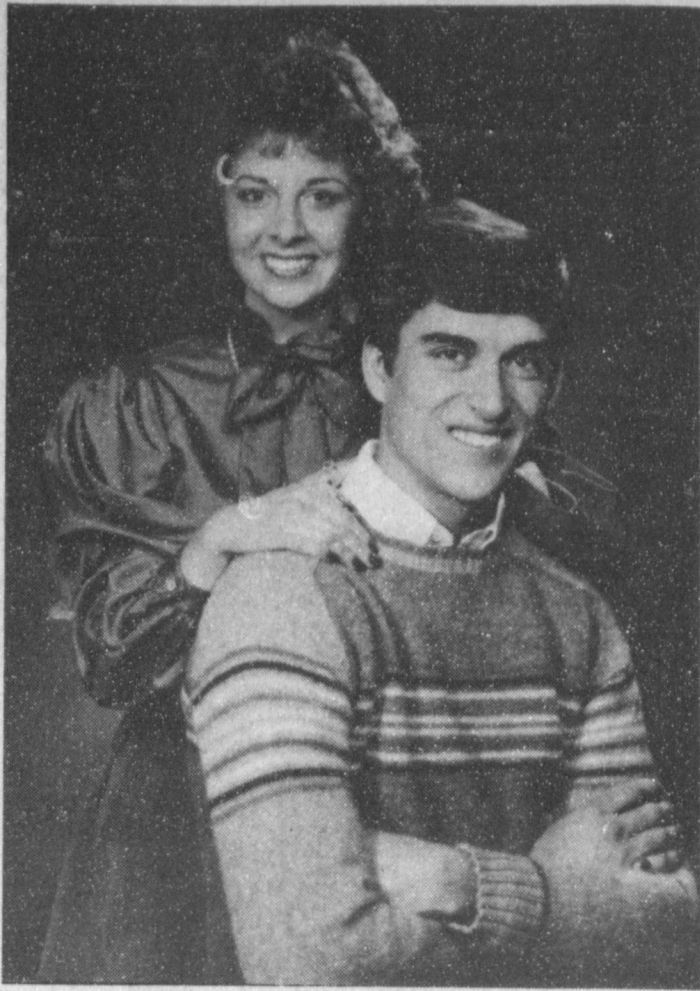

What the heck, there

was always tomorrow and besides, the sun was almost down and supper was on the stove. I met my uncle as I was leaving the field and proud I was of the man's day's work nearly done. Guess how much, Uncle Tom. I told him 197 before he could answer. He looked up at the sky and said, "there's a little daylight left son! I went back and got three more pounds.

I didn't think much about it then, but I was really learning an important lesson. Don't settle for anything less than the best you can do and when you've done your best, apologize to no one. I think this is the typical thinking of most people who experienced those early days managing a small cotton farm, share cropping, or working in some one else's field. They were hard times, but the feeling that come with that last weigh at dusk of 200 plus was a feeling of accomplishment that was seldom since experienced."

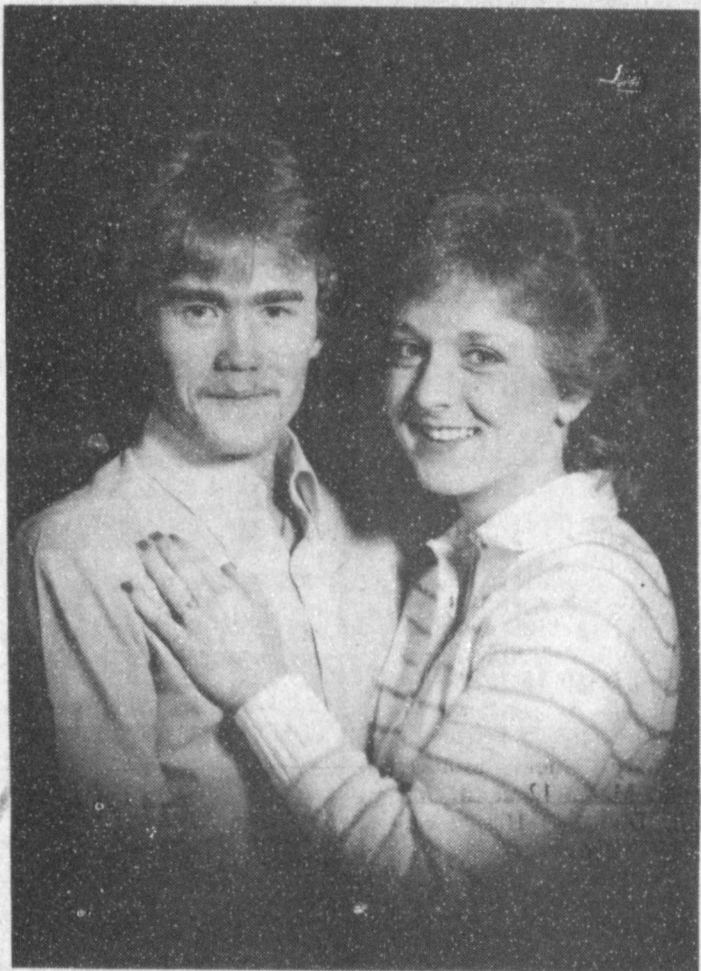

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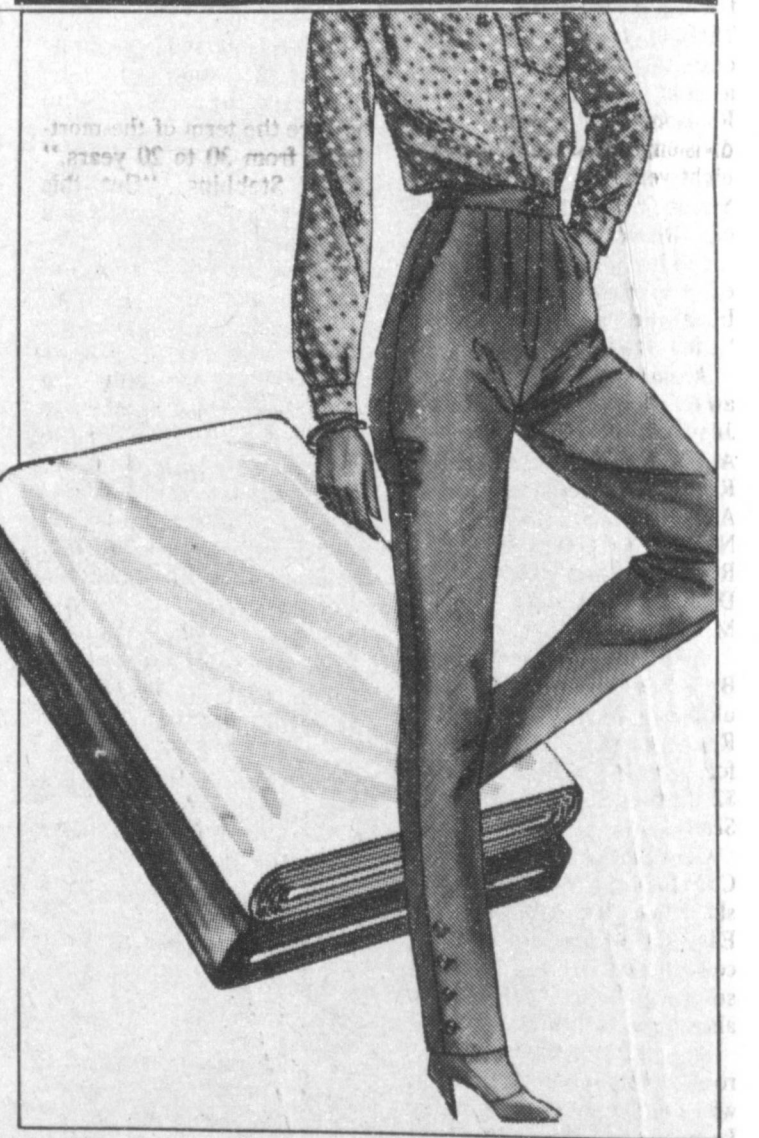

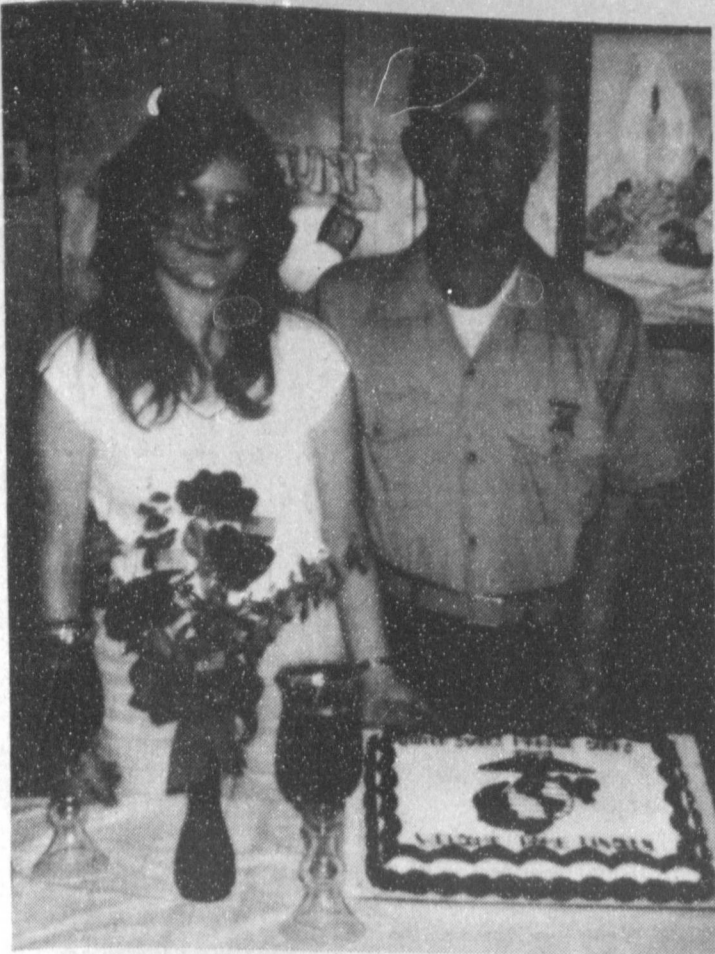

now, says Dr. Alice Hunt, a Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service food and nutrition specialist. Also, more people are eating turkey because it's a nutrient dense, low-calorie food, she adds.

If you're planning a traditional roasted turkey dinner for Easter, or just an everyday meal, a recent poultry research study can help you achieve the perfectly cooked bird.

Findings of this study indicated that temperatures recorded in a turkey's thigh during cooking ranged from 10 to 15 degrees higher than in the thickest portion of the breast, says Dr. James Denton, an Extension poultry specialist. This shows the importance of placing the meat thermometer in the deep breast muscle to determine whether or not the turkey is cooked throughout, he says.

The study also showed how initial meat temperature affects cooking time.

A 15-pound turkey with a breast meat temperature of 28°, which is the normal temperature found in a supermarket refrigerated meat case, required 40 to 60 minutes more roasting time than a 15-pound turkey with a breast meat temperature of 37°, or normal home refrigerator temperature, Denton says.

A frozen turkey, has a temperature of 25° or less and is, of course, usually partially or completely thawed before cooking.

Total roasting time for stuffed turkeys was about one hour more than for unstuffed ones because of the additional weight of the stuffing, notes the specialist.

Cooking losses ranged from 25 percent to 28 percent for the turkey meat while the stuffing cooked inside the turkey showed a weight gain of about 20 percent during cooking, Denton points out.

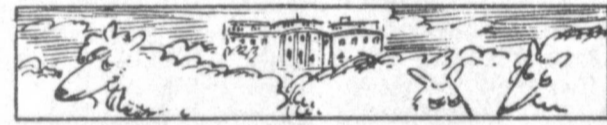

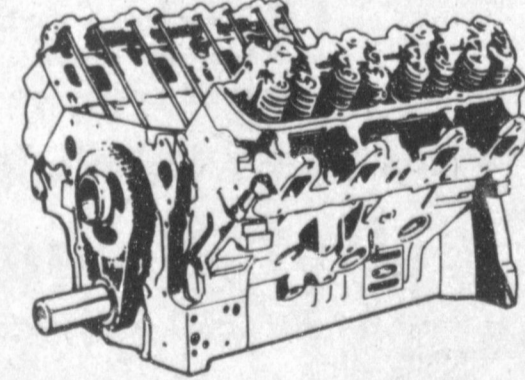

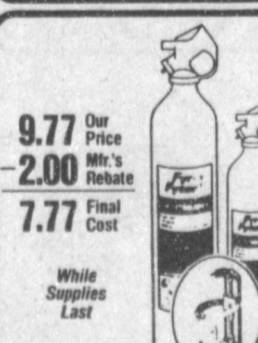
