Texas Electric files proposal

Texas Electric filed a proposal with the Texas Public Utility Commission and cities it serves which will amend procedures for obtaining regulatory approval of certain fuel charges.

If accepted, the new procedure would involve TESCO seeking approval of the cost of fuel and fuel

related services provided by any affiliated company before those costs are billed to customers as part of the monthly fuel charge.

The proposal was filed with the PUC in conjunction with Texas Power & Light (TP&L) and Dallas Power & Light (DP&L), which are subsidiaries along with

TESCO of the Texas Utilities Company.

Two other TU Company subsidiaries Texas Utilities Fuel Company (TUFCO) and Texas Utilities Generating Company (TUGCO) provide fuel and fuel related services at cost to TESCO, DP&L and TP&L.

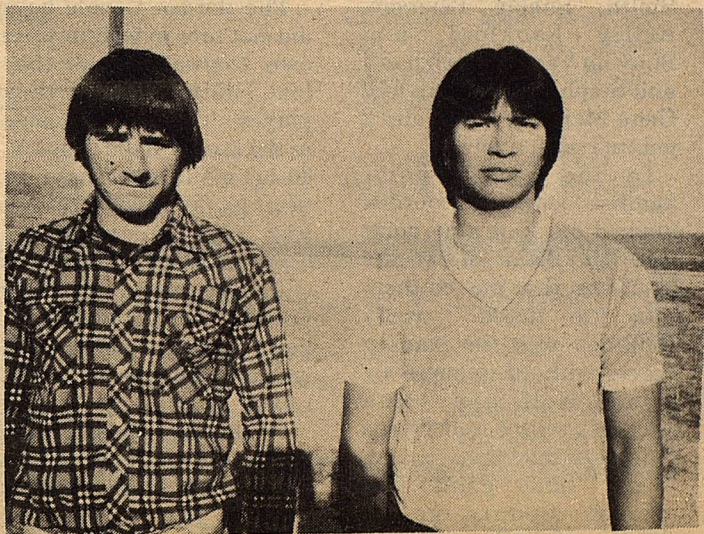
Under current procedure, although the PUC has approved the items to be included in fuel cost, the actual level of those fuel costs and other fuel related costs incurred in the production of electricity for customers have been subject to review by regulators after they have been charged to customers on monthly bills.

Under the proposed procedure, the companies would file an estimate, for approval by regulators, for the cost of fuel provided by TUFCO and TUGCO at least 70 days before the month those costs would be charged to customers.

TESCO President Bill Marquardt said, this change could not be expected to either raise or lower the customers' monthly fuel charges.

Marquardt noted that TUFCO and TUGCO are non-profit service companies formed after it became evident that, because of increasing fuel prices, it would be most economical for TESCO, DP&L and TP&L to combine resources to obtain fuel.

The proposal was filed after a ruling on December 1 by District Court Judge Herman Jones decreed that the PUC must grant TESCO, Texas Power & Light Company, and Dallas Power and Light Company prior approval before charges by affiliates can be charged to customers.

Girls Win Second In Borden County Tournament

Borden County finished second in the Borden County Tournament which saw the Lady Coyotes lose a thriller in 3 overtimes in the finals. In the first game against Post J.V., the Coyotes completely dominated their opponents as every member of the 10 man squad scored in the 54-20 win. Roxie Wolf was the only person in double figures with 12 followed by Becky Massingill with 9, Kelly Williams had 7, Teresa Wimberly hit 5, Lisa Smith, Shellie Peterson, Kelley Lankford, and Shawna Vaughn each had 4 and Stephanie Herring and Gena McLeroy had 3 and 2 points respectively.

In the second game against Dawson, Borden jumped out to a nine point lead and held on for the 32-27 win that moved them into the finals. Kelly Williams was the leading scorer with 10 followed by Roxie Wolf and Gena McLeroy with 8 and Teresa Wimberly had 6.

The final game saw Borden County go up against New Home for the third time this season. New Home had earlier in the tournament beaten Sands and Forsan to reach the finals. In undoubtedly the most exciting game of the tournament, Borden and New Home battled each other to a 26 all tie at the end of the 4th quarter, forcing it into the first of three overtimes. In each of the

three overtimes, both teams had chances to clinch the victory but finally it was New Home that pulled out the close win. Roxie Wolf was the leading scorer with 17 followed by Kelly Williams with 7, Stephanie Herring hit 4, Gena McLeroy with 3 and Lisa Smith and Teresa Wimberly had 2.

Gena McLeroy was also the free-throw contest winner hitting 9 of 10 free shots beating her closest opponent by 2 shots

The Borden Coyote boys did not fare to well in their own tournament as they lost both games they played. The first loss came at the hands of the Post J.V. 49-44 on Thursday night. In that game Kevin Telchik was high point for the Coyotes with 11 points. Others scoring were: Doug Love 9, Jym Rinehart 7, Scott Jones 6, Jeff Martin 5, Keith Martin 5, and Charles LaRue 2.

In the second game the Dawson Dragons demolished the Coyotes 69-39. Scott Jones led Borden with 13 points. Jym Rinehart added 12 and Kevin Telchik 7. Doug Love had 3, and Sam Williams and Keith Martin 2 each.

Lady Coyotes Began District

The Borden County Lady Coyotes opened District play December 15 with a 37-35 loss at Klondike. Cold shooting from the floor the second quarter proved to be the difference as Borden could only manage 2 points to the Cougars 12. The second half although, was Borden's as they outscored Klondike 16-5 the third quarter to pull within 2 and went ahead midway through the 4th quarter but then foul trouble hit Borden as Roxie Wolf fouled out and Teresa Wimberly got her fourth

JRoxie Wolf finished the game with 19 points followed by Gena McLeroy with 10, Kelly Williams hit 4 and Teresa Wimberly had 2.

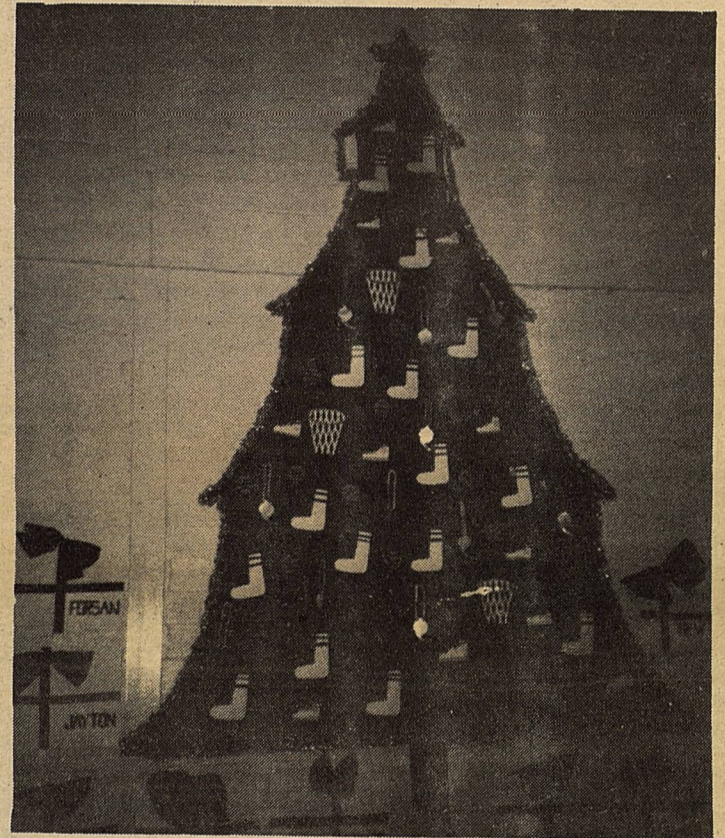

Well, I thought I was going to have to begin 1982 at odds with my president. But just before Christmas he began to catch on that an economic boycott against Poland would not effect the Russians in any adverse way. And after all, it is the Russians who are causing the persecution and deprivation in Poland.

It grieved me no end when President Reagan announced a tough stance against Poland, of all things. Granted, the poor Polish people weren't benefitting by our aid anyway. Granted that the Russians who are manipulating the Polish military junta are gaining by any aid sent to Poland. And granted that a boycott of Poland would indirectly affect the Russians. Well-why be indirect-why not proclaim to the world that we KNOW who the bad guys are--and the situation won't be tolerated by US any longer.

Reagan has been very accurate and astute in his previous assessment of Russian encroachment and involvement in subversive movements. For example, I applauded when he rightly acknowledged that the peace marches and anti-nuclear demonstrations are all orchestrated out of Russia just a replay of the 60s. And of course, I was beside myself with hope and approval one year ago as Ronald Reagan prepared to be President. His talk about any future threats, overt action or whatever by Russia was tough and same

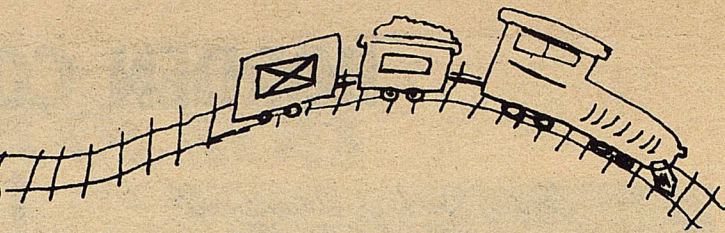
at a time when all of US needed a man of strength and determination. The talk was just you wait until RR is in the Oval Office. Those damn Russians, Iranians, Libyans-- won't dare cross him cause he'll ace-he'll stand up to them."

Well, he did look good when the hostages were released. He still talked firm and he had all of US behind him. But it wasn't long before he stumbled slightly. He restored the grain shipments to Russia. You may have forgotten, (the press seems to have) that the reason for the grain embargo in the first place was our displeasure with Russia having invaded Afghanistan. You do realize don't you that Russia is still fighting the Alghamis?

Why, the idea! We should have slapped an embargo on Russia with teeth in it the very moment the bear growled in Poland. The fact that we faltered or hesitated is shameful. Poland has shed more blood for less recognition of her plight than any of our allies. There were more Polish lives lost in WWII than any other single nation. And then, the US was responsible for sending the patriots into Russia to be murdered or enslaved in labor camps. Shame on US. No, it is time for US to rise tall and defend the Poles. President Reagan's boycott isn't the strongest but at least he's standing in a stooped posture-not lying down. Maybe soon he will be erect and firm as he was in January 1981.

NATURAL FIBERS FASHION REVIEW PLANNED FOR SOUTHWEST FARM SHOW

The 11th annual Natural Fibers Fashion Review is being planned for the 1982 Southwest Farm Show. The fashion contest and show will be held on March 6 in Fort Worth.

The contest is open to any homemaker from the Southwest Farm Show states of Texas, Oklahoma, and New Mexico who is involved in agricultural production or an agriculture-related business.

The Fashion Review is designed to promote the use of natural fibers produced in the Southwest and to emphasize excellence in garment construction and fashion in home sewing.

Garments entered in the show must be made of a minimum blend of 50 percent cotton or 50 percent wool and or mohair.

The competition will have four divisions: day wear, evening wear, mother and child, and former grand award winners. The contest provides a showcase for exhibiting designs made from natural fibers.

Prizes will be awarded to first, second, and third place winners in each division. The Grand Award winner will be selected from the winners of the mother and child, day wear, and evening wear divisions.

Sponsors of the event include the Southwest

Hardware & Implement Association and Progressive Farmer. The Texas Agricultural Extension Service is coordinating and managing the contest and review.

Entries must be submitted by February 19, 1982. Contest rules and entry blanks may be

obtained from county Extension offices, young homemaker organizations, and local tractor pulling associations.

The Natural Fibers Fashion Review will be presented at 4 p.m. on Saturday, March 6, at the Southwest Farm Show in Fort Worth.

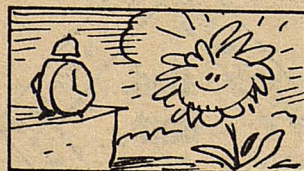

DEADLINE FOR WOOL AND MOHAIR PAYMENT PROGRAMS

Current market prices indicate that incentive payments will be required for wool and may be required for mohair in 1981. Payments will be made on bona fied sales of wool and mohair for 1981, if the National average price received by growers is below the support level.

The support level price for 1981 wool is \$1.35 per pound and is set at \$3.718 for 1981 mohair. Information is needed on all sales for use in determining the average price received by growers for shorn wool and mohair sold during the 1981 marketing year (January through December).

All applications for incentive payments, covering actual marketings of wool unshorn lambs and mohair during 1981, must be filed by January 31, 1982.

CHANGE IN CCC INTEREST RATE

Beginning January 1, the interest rate on CCC loans will be set at the rate charged CCC by the U.S. Treasury during the month the loan is disbursed. Previously, CCC interest rates were set semi-annually on April 1 and October 1. (14.5 percent) Interest rate effective January 1, 1982 has been announced at 12.25 per cent.

COTTON LOANS AVAILABLE

Form A cotton loans will be available at the county office. Custody of warehouse receipts and class cards will be maintained in the county office during the duration of the loan. Loans will be made for a period of ten months. Interest rate is 14.5 percent computed on a daily basis. The base rate is 52.70 cents per pound for Strict Low Middling 1 1-16 inch cotton.

If you are interested in placing your cotton in the loan, please bring your warehouse receipts and class cards to our office and we will process the loan for you.

COTTON PRODUCTION

Cotton producers have been mailed their cotton production cards. When you have completed harvest on a farm, have the ginner complete the card as to the number of bales and the net lint produced and return the card to the county office as soon as possible.

RECORD CHANGES

If you have any changes in address, sale or lease of land, or change of operator, please notify this office so that farm records can be updated.

DEFICIENCY PAYMENTS WHEAT AND BARLEY

Deficiency payments are being made to wheat and barley producers as a result of the low average market prices received by producers. Eligible producers will be paid 15 cents per bushel for their 1981 crop wheat, and 11 cents per bushel for the barley.

The antional weighted average market price for wheat was \$3.66 per bushel and for barley was \$2.49 per bushel.

PRODUCER PAYMENTS

Producers who received payments through this

office during 1981 will receive Form CCC 1/8-1/4. The form is furnished to assist you in preparing your 1981 income tax return.

The reports will be mailed directly to you from Kansas City, Missouri, during the last two weeks of January. It is suggested you check the amount shown on the report against your records to see that the amounts are correct. If you find the amounts are not correct, or if you have any questions regarding the report, you should contact the county ASCS Office which made the payments.

ELIGIBILITY FOR PARTICIPATION

Eligibility for participation in all programs administered by ASCS is established under law without regard to race, color, religion, sex, or national origin.

Borden County offices to be filled are County Judge, District and County Clerk, County Treasurer, Justice of the Peace, and County Commissioner Precinct 2 and 4.

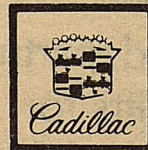

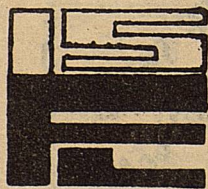

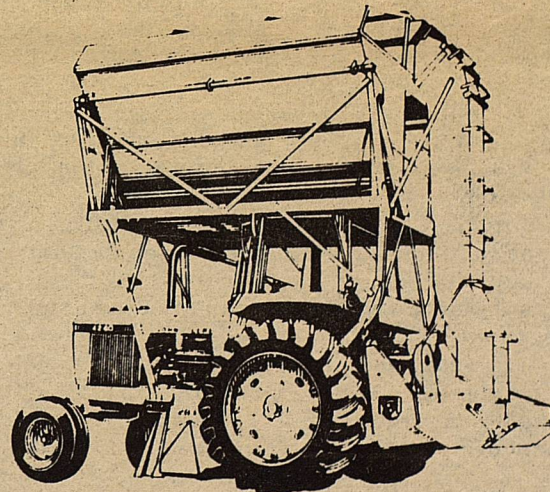
