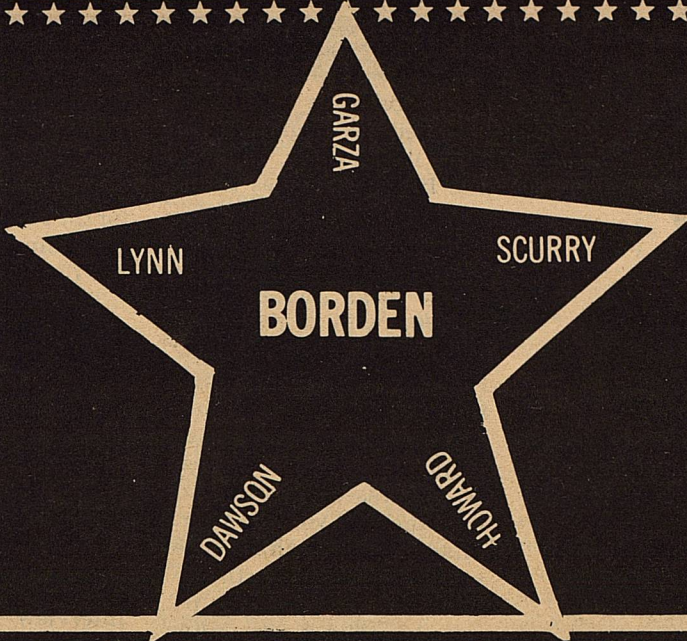

Anderson Joins N.D.P.C.

Rich Anderson has recently joined the National Advisory Board of the Democratic Policy Committee (NDPC). The NDPC is the fastest-growing grass roots political action movement in America, with chapters in over 600 cities and over 15,000 members. This committee is in no way connected with the Democratic or Republican political parties, nor is it a third party organization.

The NDPC is a bi-partisan alliance of American producers committed to stopping the current high interest rate policy of Federal Reserve chairman Paul Volcker that is destroying American agriculture and the entire productive economy. The NDPC has a bi-partisan program for immediately turning the economy around. It starts with lowering interest rates and putting the dollar back on the gold reserve standard, so that, through issuance of gold-backed notes, long-term credit can be

made available for sustained agricultural and industrial recovery. It includes a safe development of our nation's nuclear energy and water resources, and a revival of the 1960s plan to bring 80 million acre feet of new water a year into this area from Alaska and Canada. It promotes parity for agriculture through stable world markets and a massive expansion of exports.

The NDPC is the movement that must grow to save America. It is the vehicle for the 1980 patriotic American groundswell that started the job when it rose to kick Jimmy Carter, the worst president of the century. Carter was revoved, but the Federal Reserve's Volcker, appointed by Carter, remained, and now Volcker plus Tip O'Neill, is acting to give President Reagan the "Herbert Hoover" treatment unless the American groundswell rises again.

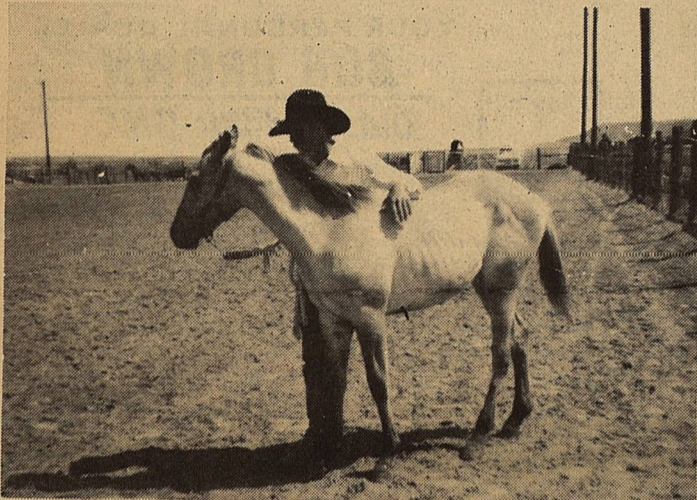

CALORIES VS. EXERCISE

Do calories count? You bet they do.

Consume more calories than your body needs, and you will gain weight. Expend more energy (calories) than is provided by the foods you eat, and your body will draw on reserve calories stored in the form of body fat.

A calorie is simply a measure of the energy producing value of a food. After a meal, the energy produced by the calories you have consumed is used by the body to fuel its many activities. Unused calories are stashed away in the form of fatty deposit.

One pound of excess weight represents about 3500. To lose that pound, you must consume 3500 fewer calories than your body uses, or burn it off through physical activity.

Some people think-mistakenly-that exercise consumes so few calories that it is of little value in losing

weight. Not so, say the experts. Riding a bicycle for 12 minutes or walking briskly for 19 minutes can burn up over 100 calories.

The basal metabolic rate (BMR) is a measure of the number of calories your body needs to maintain vital functions such as breathing, pumping blood and digesting food. For example, a 160 lb., 30 year old man uses about 1882 calories a day just to stay alive. That is without counting energy utilizing activities such as walking, running, swimming or playing football which consume additional calories.

According to recent studies, physical exercise not only burns up calories, it also increased your BMR. That means you will continue to burn off additional calories hours after you have stopped exercising. Good news for people who are trying to lose weight.

ACCURATE CERTIFICATION

August 2nd is the final date to certify your spring seed crops (cotton & grain sorghum) and conservation use acreage. An accurate certification is very important. If your farm is spot checked the acreage can not differ more than the larger of 1.0 acre or 5 percent from the reported crop acreage, to remain eligible for all program benefits. On your conservation use acreage the tolerance is the larger of 1.0 or 10 percent of the required acreage. Measurement service is available for a nominal fee.

CONSERVATION USE ACREAGE (CUA)

Make sure you understand what is eligible land for conserving use acreage. For instance, turnrows are not eligible CUA unless they have been planted to a row crop or small grain in 1 of the 2 previous years. Land designated as CUA must be devoted to a conservation practice that will protect the land from weeds and from wind and water erosion. Eligible cover crops includes small grain, sweet sorghums, or

annual, bi-annual, or perennial grasses, or legumes, (including blackeye peas).

Conservation Use Acreage covers may not be harvested but may be grazed except during the 6 month non grazing period between April 1 and September 30. Blackeye peas planted may be picked for home consumption. Small home garden's may also be planted and harvested on CUA.

Areas designated as conserving use acreage must be a minimum of 1 chain 66 ft in width and amount to at least

1.0 acre. There is no limit on the number of plots designated, however only one plot amounting to less than 5.0 acres will be accepted. Strips of 4 or more normal rows will be accepted if designated in a consistent skip row planting pattern.

Wind and water erosion may be controlled by the use of sweep type plows or other similar equipment that will effectively control the growth of noxious weeds or grasses leaving the stubble as cover to protect the conserving use acreage.

DISASTER PAYMENTS FOR 1982

The Agricultural and Food Act of 1981 provides that ASCS shall authorize disaster payments only if All Risk Crop Insurance is not available to producers with respect to their crop acreage. Due to the extent of the availability of Federal Crop Insurance, very little, if any acreage, will be covered by disaster or prevented planting payments.

To be eligible for low yield or prevented planting payments, (cases where insurance is not offered) a farm must meet all the requirements of the acreage reduction program for the crop. Detail information is available in the ASCS office.

PREVENTED PLANTING & FAILED ACREAGE

Even though the disaster program is not in effect, producers still need to report their prevented planting and failed acreage in or to maintain history for future years program participation. Prevented planting acreage should be reported within 15 days of the final planting date for the crop. The final planting date's are: cotton-June 20; grain sorghum-June 30.

Any failed acreage of wheat, oats, barley, grain sorghum or corn should be reported prior to making any other use of the acreage, while evidence of the disaster and the affected crop is still apparent. This will also protect your eligibility for deficiency payment if participating in the program.

Participation in programs administered by ASCS is open to an eligible persons with out regard to race, color, age, sex, religion, national origin, or handicap.

EARLY MATURING COTTON VARIETIES

Several of you are going to have to replant cotton following heavy rains and hail that washed out and beat down your cotton. It will be very late in the season to be planting cotton by the time it is dry enough to get back in to replant.

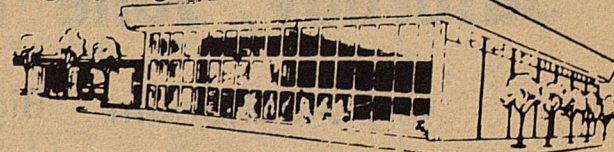
