Ag roundup slated July 10

The Texas CowBelles and the National Cattlemen's Association are having an Agriculture Roundup and Symposium Saturday, July 10 at the Dorothy Garrett Coliseum in Big Spring.

The purpose of this event is to inform men and women interested in the beef industry about current changes and innovations in the industry and about legislation, past and pending, that will effect them. It will also familiarize them with the functions of the organizations working for cattlemen.

The Round-Up will begin at 12 noon with registration at 1:30 Jim Collins, Texas congressman from District III and a candidate for the United States Senate, will hold a question and answer session.

The symposium, from 2:30-6 p.m. will feature speakers on many topics relevant to the beef industry. These will be Anne Anderson, director of nutrition services, Texas Cattle Feeders Assn. of Austin, on consumer demands; Jim Powell, chairman of NCA and TSCRA tax committee, of Fort McKavitt on tax reform; Becky Terry, president of Texas CowBelles, of Alpine, "How CowBelles Help;" Dub Waldrip, NCA president elect, of Lubbock, "Working Within Your Industry;" Hilmar G. Moore, chairman of the Beef Industry Council, National Livestock and Meat Board, of Richmond, "Somehow, Nothing Satisfies Like Beef;" and Dr. Dennis Stiffler, meat extension specialist at Texas A&M, "Innovations in Beef."

The Fandangle from 6 p.m.-12 midnight will

include a barbecue and dance. Charles Stenholm, Texas congressman from the 17th district, will speak at this event.

Early registration will be \$25 per person. Registration after July 3 will be \$30 per person.

WHAT ARE COWBELLES?

CowBelles are women involved in the beef industry who represent every segment of the industry and many related fields. CowBelles strive to provide accurate facts and reliable information to housewives and

consumers concerning the nutrition of beef.

Texas CowBelles projects include sponsoring the 4-H Meat Identification contest at the state level, Beef for Father's Day, Ag Day, beef education booths at fairs and conventions, in store beef promotions in large city supermarkets and sell all beef cook books.

On Sept. 22 they will host the 1982 National Beef Cook-Off in San Antonio. This event is rotated among the 30 states that have active CowBelles.

Prominent people in food related fields such as famous chefs, butchers and food editors will be among the judges.

Each year they award two \$500 scholarships to students planning to pursue a career in an agriculture related field.

Mail theft prevention

Theft of mail is a violation of Title 18, United States Code, Section 1708, which carries a maximum penalty of five years imprisonment and or a \$2000 fine. Unfortunately, criminals pay little attention to the consequences of their immediate actions.

The Postal Inspection Service is attempting to prevent theft of mail from all sources by informing and educating as many elements of society as possible. The United States Postal Service is a principle victim but the ultimate victim is a business or individual who depends on mail for their livelihood and existence. The loss of a social security or retirement check addressed to an elderly or retired person can

have devastating emotional and financial significance.

Mail is most vulnerable at the point of delivery. An extra effort should be made by mail recipients to know their carrier's schedule and make every effort to be at home to personally accept delivery of valuable mail. Retirement and social security checks are delivered on a fixed schedule which is known by the addressee and criminals as well. Have a neighbor retrieve your mail if you cannot be available and do the same for your neighbor. Also, deposit your mail for collection at a post office or collection box. If this is inconvenient, place letters on your house letterbox for collection shortly before your carrier arrives. Your personal mail

He married Bonnie Evans in Loraine June 15, 1927. He was Baptist for 65 years.

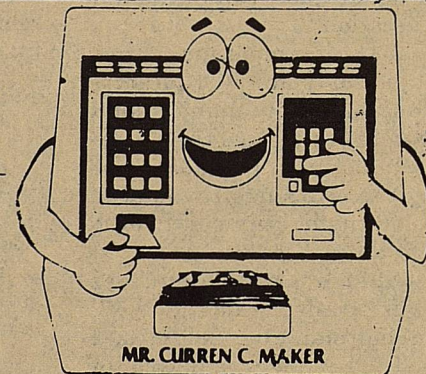

PUBLIC NOTICE OF INTENT TO CHANGE RATES

Notice is hereby given that Lyntegar Electric Cooperative, Inc. (the "Utility") intends to change rates for electric utility service effective July 30, 1982 or as soon thereafter as permitted by law. The changes are applicable to all areas to which the Utility provides electric utility service. All classes of customers are affected by the proposed changes. The Utility expects that the proposed schedule of rates will furnish the Utility 11.53 percent more in revenues than are furnished by the existing schedule of rates.

Implementation of the proposed changes is subject to approval by the appropriate regulatory authority. A statement of intent including the proposed revisions of tariff and schedules and a statement specifying in detail each proposed change, the effect the proposed change is expected to have on the revenues of the Utility and the classes and numbers of Utility consumers affected is on file with the Public Utility Commission of Texas, and the municipalities of Lamesa, Wilson, New Home, Meadow, Brownfield, Plains, Levelland and Sundown.

Public Notice

Southwestern Bell, in accordance with the rules of the Public Utility Commission of Texas, hereby gives notice of the company's intent to implement a new schedule of telephone rates in Texas, effective July 27, 1982, unless otherwise determined by the Commission.

It is expected that the requested rate schedule will furnish a 13.4 percent increase in the company's intrastate revenues.

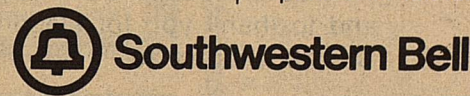
A complete copy of the new rate schedule is on file with the Public Utility Commission at Austin, Texas, and with each affected municipality served by Southwestern Bell, and is available for inspection in each of the company's public business offices in Texas. The Commission staff has contended in the past that all rates are subject to change as a result of Southwestern Bell's rate application.

Notice to El Paso Area Customers

Effective January 1, 1982, Southwestern Bell adopted the Mountain States tariffs in effect for El Paso County. Southwestern Bell proposes to merge the separate El Paso tariffs with its tariffs applicable to the rest of Texas. The resulting new rate schedule is on file with the PUC and the El Paso area municipalities served by Southwestern Bell, and is available for inspection at our El Paso business office.

Notice to Customers of Other Telephone Companies

The filing includes, but is not limited to, proposals to increase rates for interexchange private line and foreign exchange (FX) service. Changes in such rates would also affect customers of other telephone companies because such companies provide interexchange private line and foreign exchange service in accordance with rates specified in Southwestern Bell's tariffs. While Southwestern Bell has proposed no increase in long distance rates, any change in those rates would also affect customers of other telephone companies.
