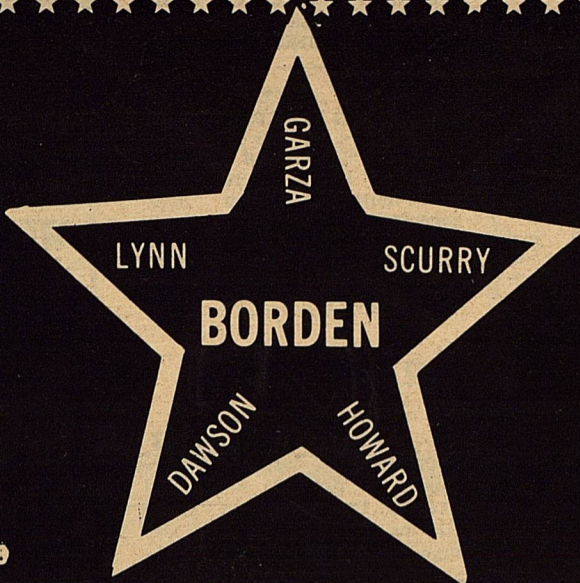


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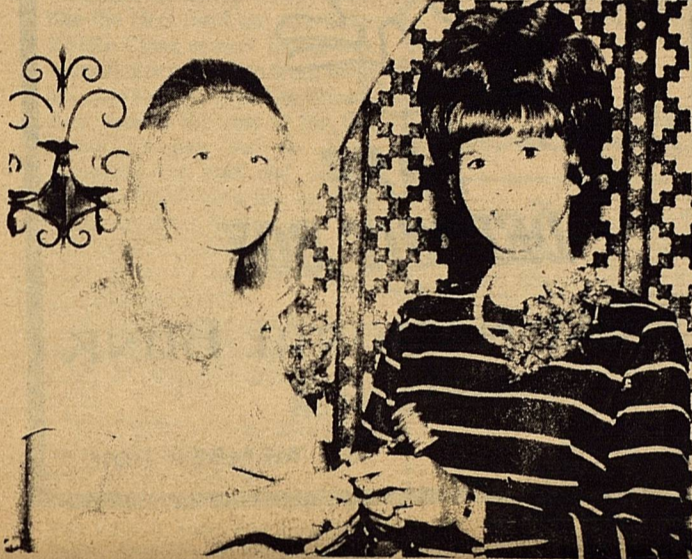

Needed

The Churches of Christ in West Texas are busy collecting stamps for the Children's Home of Lubbock. The trading stamps, 3,100 books of them, will be used to purchase two vehicles for the Children's Home.

Any brand of stamps can be used but purchase contract has been made with the Gold Bond Company and the S & H Green Stamp Company. The Children's Home is able to trade stamps to have the brands needed for the purchase.

The vehicles needed are a pickup for use on the Home's fifteen acre Lubbock campus and a fourteen passenger van. The two vehicles will replace older models which have high mileage on the speedometer.

The Children's Home was started in 1953 to serve boys and girls in the Southwest who needed a Home. Since it started, 1,000 boys and girls have been served according to Home Superintendent Floyd I. Stumbo. "Today, 150 boys and girls are given care by the Home," Stumbo stated.

Be Gentle With Ticks

Austin--What do you do when you meet a tick?

It's not a matter of etiquette. You don't have to be polite. But it doesn't pay to be too abrupt, either.

Ticks should be handled with care. Should one settle down for a feast on a tender part of your anatomy, it would be improper just to yank it off. The tick will probably retaliate by leaving its head under your skin, causing you much misery for days.

The theory behind removing a tick is to deprive it of air, causing it to remove its head from your skin more or less voluntarily.

Since the tick breathes through its body when it is feeding, it is recommended that you cover its body with something which will inhibit its breathing.

This could be nail polish remover, alcohol or a heavy oil.

It is important that the tick be given time to become distressed enough to remove its head from your skin.

Of course, the best defense against ticks is prevention. Many times ticks will wander around one's anatomy for hours before a particularly succulent spot appeals to them. This gives the potential victim time after an outing to take off his clothes and examine himself thoroughly. Of course, the clothes used for the outing should not be put back on since they could be harboring ticks.

Ticks are not to be taken lightly. Their bites can become infected easily, especially if you scratch them.

At least one serious disease, Rocky Mountain spotted fever, is transmitted by ticks. Fifteen cases of this disease were reported in 1972, all of them in East Texas

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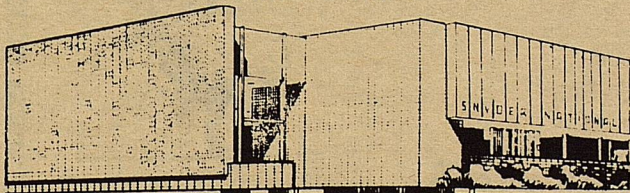
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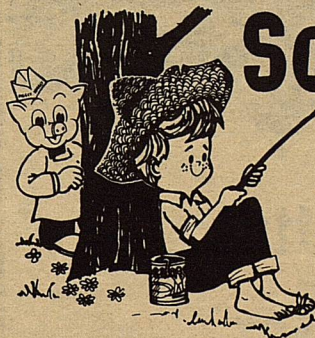
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Mr. B; Twenty five dollars! That's a big slice Smedley. What have you done to merit that?

HCJC Camp

This marks the first camp for the Big Spring area although Coach Wilder has been serving as an instructor on the staff of Basketball Camps in Oklahoma and New Mexico. With the experience of working in two different camps, Wilder plans on incorporating the best of each of providing a first rate camp for the West Texas Area.

Serving as instructors on the staff in addition to Wilder are Ron Plumlee, Big Spring High coach; David Middleton, Head Coach of AAAA Brazoswood High; and Eddie Trice, New Mexico Junior College, along with several outstanding college players.

The camp agenda includes individual instruction and techniques, fundamental drills, basketball Tips, video tape replay of all campers, league games, supervised extra curricular events, along with other activities.

Site of the week-long camp will be Jayhawk Gym, located on the campus of HCJC. Sleeping quarters will be modern, air conditioned Men's Dormitory, and all meals will be taken in the college cafeteria.

"There will be a limit on the number of boys enrolled for the July 23 session to enable the staff to give each camper more individual attention", Wilder said.

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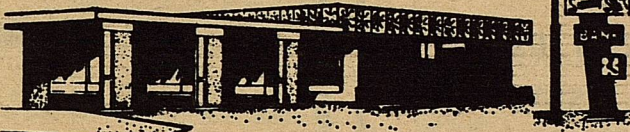
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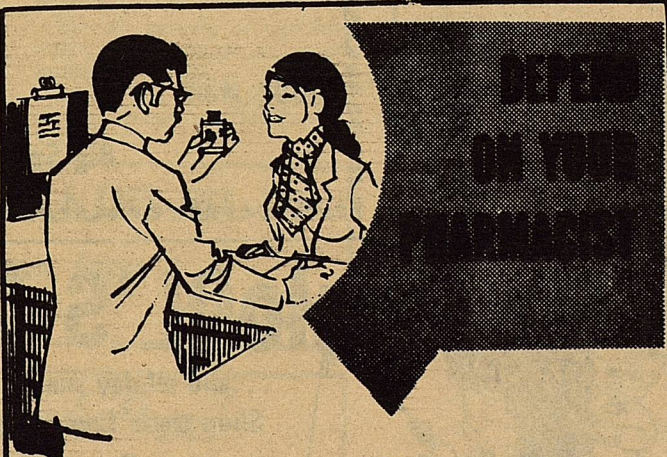
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
