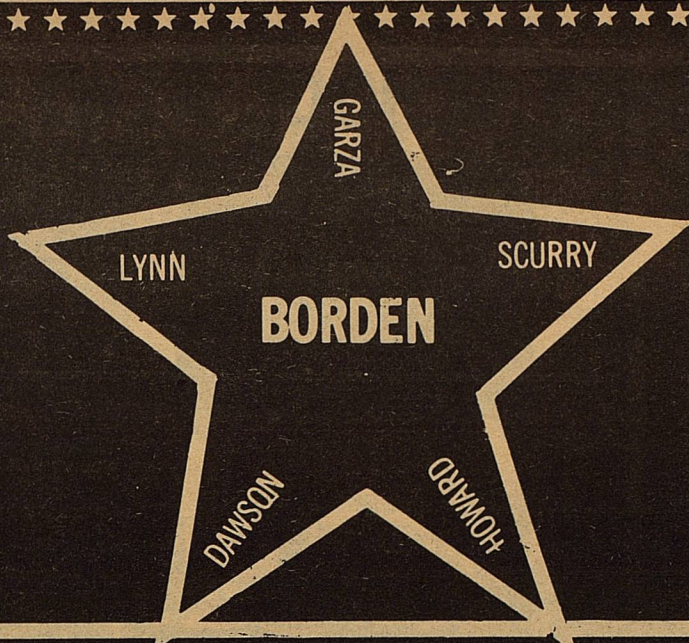

Class of 1972 honored at homecoming

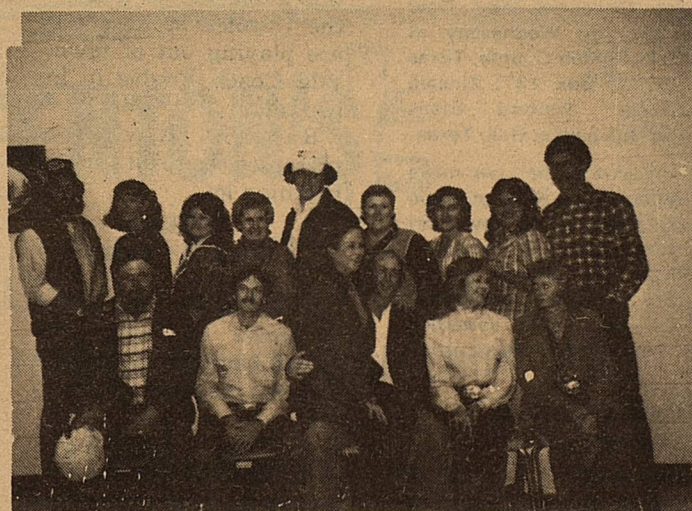
The Borden High School class of 1972 was honored at B.H.S. homecoming last Friday, October 22.

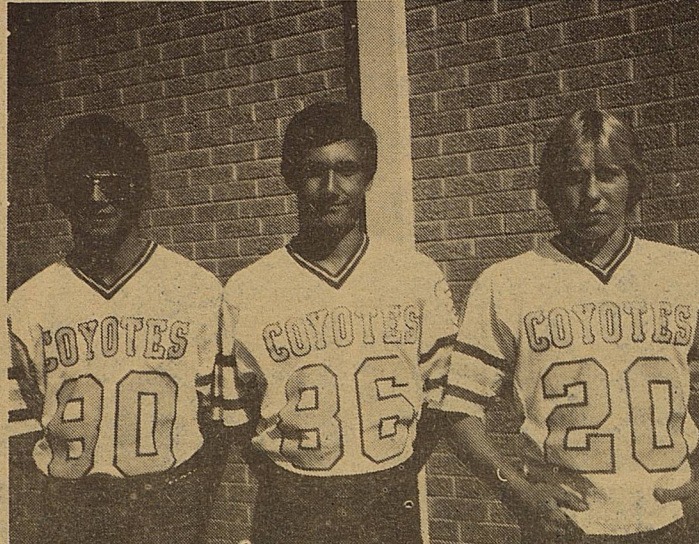
The money earned at the carnival will be used by the Parents Club for school projects.

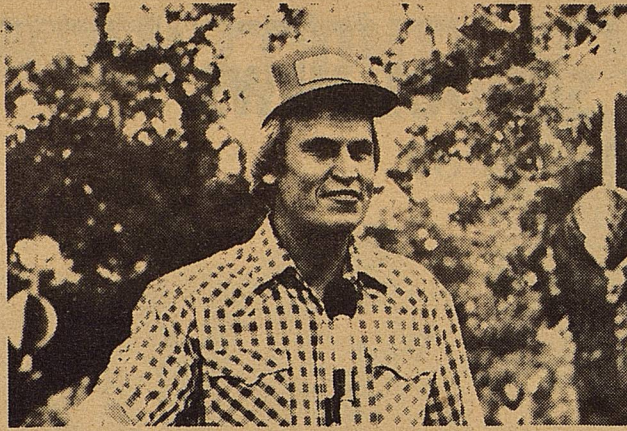

Those 4-Her's attending the show but not placing were Degane Eppers, Kristi Stone and LaDon Eppers. We are very proud of their showing for Borden County.

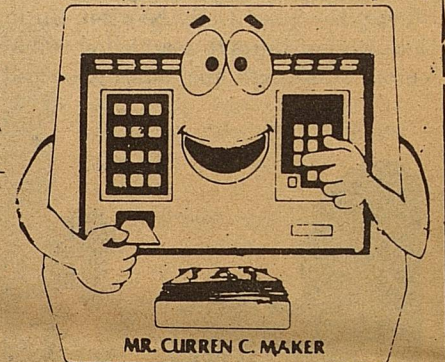

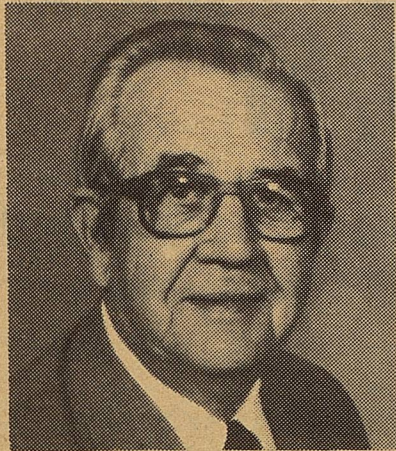

ASCS News

1983 COMMITTEE ELECTION

November 1, 1982 is the final date for submitting names by petition to be placed on the ballot as a candidate for County Committee. All known eligible voters have been mailed a notice of the election and the right to nominate a candidate by petition. If there is a producer you wish to nominate for the ASC County Committee, you may do so by completing the petition form and returning it to the ASCS Office by November 1.

1983 PROGRAM PROVISIONS

Farm Bases for Wheat and Feed Grains will be the

same as in 1982. Bases for Cotton will be the same for 1982 participating farms and the average of 1982 and 1981 planted acres for non-participating farms.

Sign up for the Wheat, Feed Grain and Cotton programs will be from October 1, 1982 through March 31, 1983. To be eligible for program benefits you must reduce from the 1983 crop base by at least 20 percent. There is no offsetting or cross compliance for 1983. Producers may request advance 1983 deficiency and diversion payments at sign up.

REQUIRED ACRES FOR CONSERVATION USE

Participating Wheat farms must devote 5 percent of base and an additional 18.85 percent of the planted acres. Grain Sorghum farms must devote 10 percent of the base and an additional 12.5 percent of the planted acres. Cotton farms must devote 25 percent of planted

acres plus (optional) an additional 6.67 percent of the planted acres.

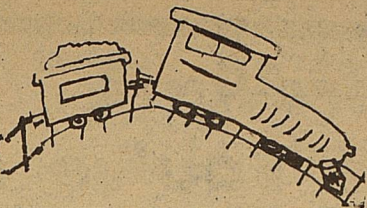

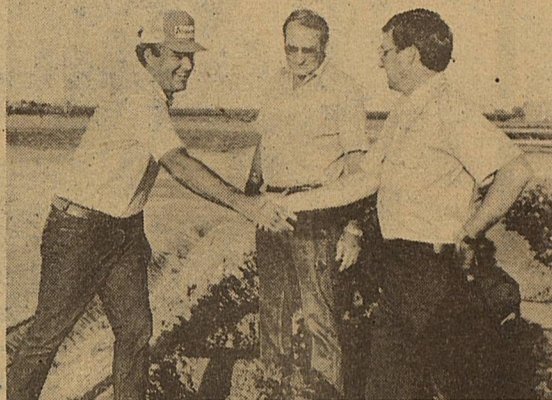
