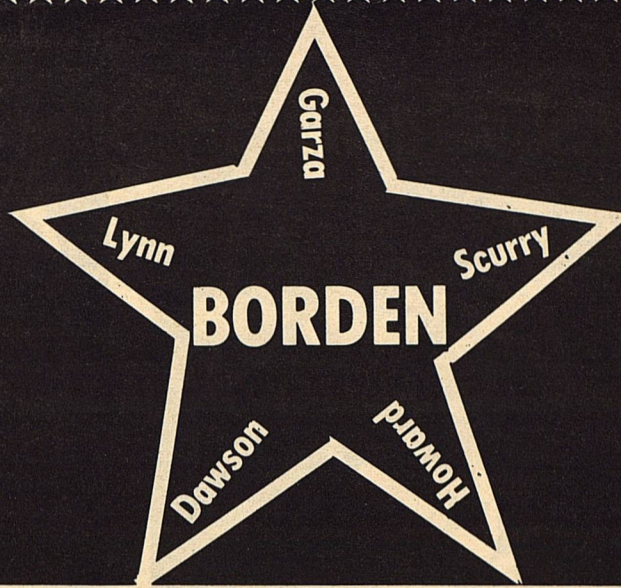

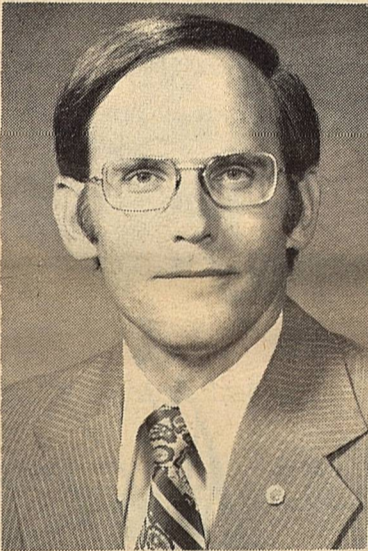

## VOLUNTEER OF THE YEAR



STEVE A. DENNIS

Steve A. Dennis was chosen "Volunteer of the Year" Tuesday for his service as a pilot in transporting severely ill people to medical aid across the Southwest.

Dennis received his award during the Fifth Annual Volunteer Awards Luncheon at the Holiday Inn Centre.

Dennis, 44, was nominated by the West Texas Chapter/Air LifeLine of Texas, a voluntary non-profit organization used to transport medical supplies personal and patients. He is one of the founding volunteers of the chapter of which he is Vice President.

Since the first of March, Dennis has donated more than 260 hours. Last July, he donated seven hours of his flight time and expense to transport a

child from El Paso to Tucson for tumor surgery.

Dennis has lived in the Odessa area since 1978 and has been a licensed pilot since 1970. He is President of the firm West Texas Consultants, Inc., Engineers, Planners and Surveyors, Odessa.

In accepting the award, Dennis said, "My company has been very supportive of me. Without them and my wife, I could never have flown as much for Air LifeLine."

About 350 people tributes to more than 100 individuals and organizations who serve the Odessa area.

Other top contenders for this award were: Denise Stallcup, Art Institute of the Permian Basin; Debbie Holdridge, Hospice of Odessa; Van Hammond, Odessa Council on Alcoholism and Drug Abuse and Janice Thompson, Permian Basin Rehabilitation Center.

Mayor Don Carter proclaimed this week as Volunteer Week in Odessa and praised the efforts of Odessa's volunteers.

Nationally there are an estimated 92 million volunteers in various organizations. These volunteers shape public opinions. Human problems will yield only to human solutions, Leach, President of the University of Texas of the

Permian Basin. Dennis lives with his wife, Nancy, and son, Bert Patrick, 3½, on Valleybrook Lane, Odessa.

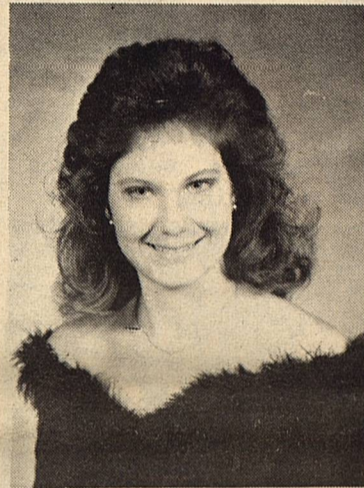
## WILLIAMS TAKES STATE SHORTHAND TITLE

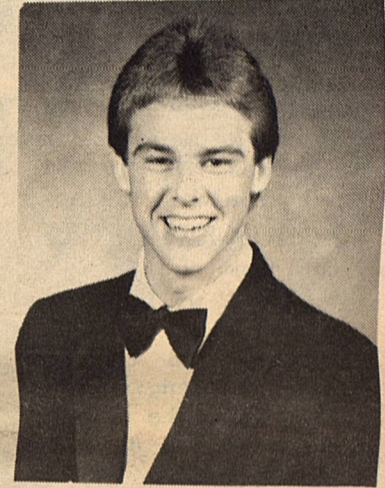

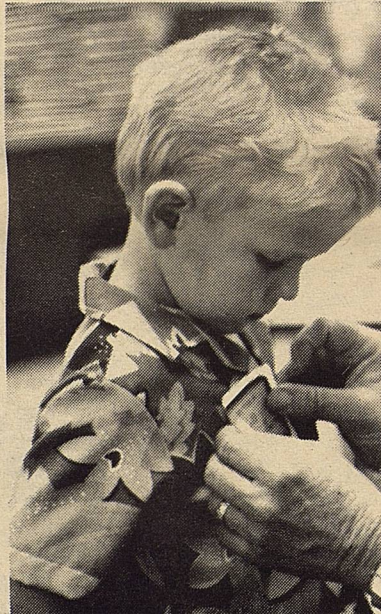
Mickey will attend Texas A & M University and plans to major in electrical engineering.

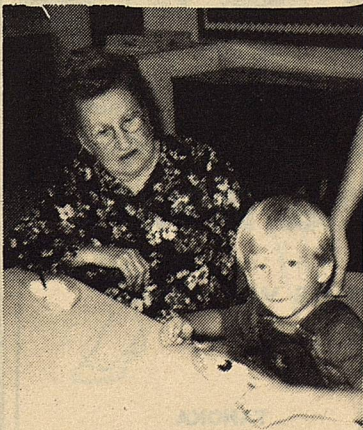

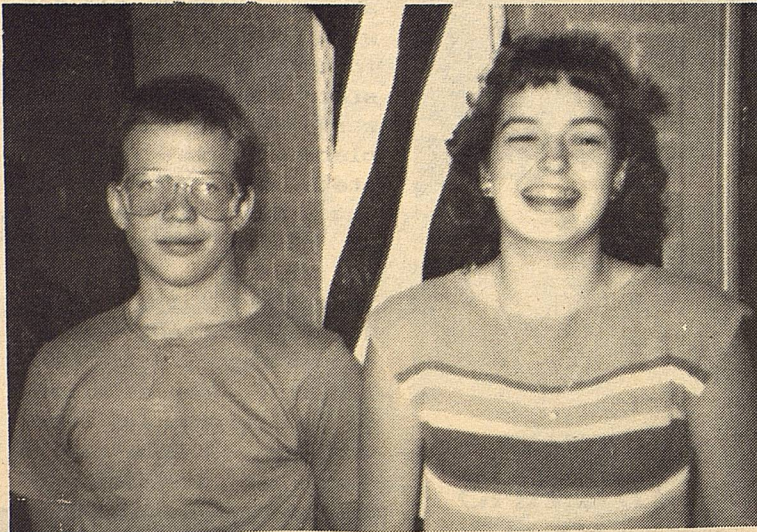

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# COUNTY AG-AGENT REPORT

## CONDITIONS GOOD FOR SPRAYING MESQUITE

Bountiful rainfall received throughout Texas last fall and winter has resulted in conditions that are excellent for foliar application of herbicides for mesquite control this year.

However, a negative factor is the late season freeze received during the last weekend in March and early April, when freeze damage occurred on plants that broke bud prior to the cold temperatures.

"Application of herbicide on these freeze-damaged plants will probably need to be delayed to allow proper development of leaves.

Present soil moisture conditions should result in good canopy development on mesquite. Data collected by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station several years ago indicate that higher plant kills occur when rainfall exceeds the average six months before spraying. High available rainfall during the fall and winter months usually results in mesquite plants that develop a large quantity of leaves, and excellent control can be expected if factors other than soil moisture also are favorable.

Herbicide application requires proper timing if good control is expected. Leaves of the mesquite should be fully extended and should have turned from light to dark green before the herbicide is applied.

Soil temperature is another important factor that affects the degree of control. Research done by the Experiment Station and Texas Tech University has shown that soil temperatures at 12-18 inches of depth at the time of spraying should be 75 degrees Fahrenheit or above to obtain best control.

Damage to mesquite foliage caused by insects, disease, hail

or late frost also result in poor control if new foliage is not allowed sufficient time to mature, the agent adds.

### HAYING

### AND GRAZING

### ASIDE LAND (ACR)

Recent decisions by USDA and the Texas State ASCS committee permit a producer to hay and graze land devoted to acreage conservation reserve (ACR) provided the county has been declared eligible. Before turning in the cows or cranking up the mower, however, farmers should confirm with their local county ASCS office that their county has been approved for that use. Even if the county has received approval for this haying and grazing alternative, farmers must be aware that certain restrictions apply.

The basic restriction is that farmers cannot sell any hay from ACR acreage nor charge for grazing of that land. With some exception, this implies that the farmer must use any hay or grazing for his own Livestock. If, however, he does permit someone else to hay or graze the land, he is only allowed to recover from that person normal and reasonable charges for incidental expenses such as fencing, watering or harvesting costs.

Once any existing forage is removed from the ACR acreage, farmers are permitted to plant a second crop, provided that crop meets standard requirements for what can be planted to ACR. This second crop, too, can be grazed or otherwise mechanically harvested, but again only if it is not sold.

Prior to taking any action regarding the use of ACR acreage, farmers must notify their respective ASCS offices of the intended use and who will be using that forage. If someone else

is to use the forage, the farmer must certify that he will not receive any payment for it.

As with any decisions which might potentially impact on farm program eligibility, farmers are strongly urged to check with their local ASCS offices.



"Texas Grown" is a program designed by the Texas Department of Agriculture and members of the nursery industry to identify and promote nursery products grown in Texas.

As a matter of pride and loyalty, Texas consumers should look for the "Texas Grown" label when buying plants from a nursery. By supporting this program, the consumer can help increase overall sales of nursery plants in Texas and help Texas growers capture a greater share of the Texas market.

When Texas consumers look for the "Texas Grown" label they can be sure the plants they buy are of good quality, and that they are supporting the state's economy.

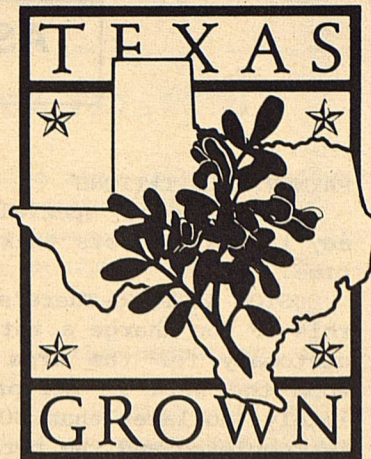
Qualifications for a "Texas Grown" plant are that it has been either propagated and grown in Texas, or purchased as a liner and transplanted and grown in Texas. And that it has spent at least 50 percent of its crop

time growing in Texas before sale.

Nurseries and nursery plant sellers can help develop new markets for Texas nursery products in other states by exhibiting under TDA's "Texas Grown" banner at trade shows in targeted out-of-state markets. Nurseries and nursery plant sellers located in Texas can apply for a membership at no charge except for the cost of labels, tags and point-of-purchase materials.

The Texas nursery industry has enormous potential for growth and, through the "Texas Grown" program, the TDA is working with nursery growers to bring about that growth.



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## ASCS NEWS BY Jerry Stone

### PAYMENT LIMITATIONS

We have sent special letters concerning any limits but lets talk about it "one" more time.

**CUSTOM FARMING**—There's nothing wrong with this IF you charge a rate that is normal and customary for the area and the person for whom the work is performed pays you immediately (no later than 30 days) after the job is completed and the person that is doing the custom farm work has no interest in the farm as landowner, mortgage holder, trustee, lienholder, agent, guarantor, manager, tenant or any other similar capacity. CRP land is different such as the owner receives 100 percent of the payment and he hires the previous operator to do custom work on the CRP land then they will be considered "one" person for payment limitations. Reason for this is that there has not been a substantial change from the previous year's operation. If a new person does the custom farm work, then you would be considered "two" persons.

**FINANCING**—Co-signing notes, leasing sub-leasing or permitting the use of land or equipment. If you do any of the above and have an interest in the land or crops, this will cause you and the person to be "one" person for payment limit purposes.

**LEASING**—leasing tractors, implements, irrigation systems from an individual or entity is OK provided you have no other interest in their operation. Payment for lease and custom farming later in the year, is considered financing.

**SEPERATE PERSON**—A person must have a bank account and funds separate from any other individual or entity. All new entities will be required at the end of the year to furnish documentation to the Committee to verify that they have farmed as stated on the ASCS-561 that was filed earlier in the year.

**IF YOU HAVE ANY QUESTIONS CONCERNING YOUR FARMING OPERATIONS, PLEASE CHECK WITH US TO MAKE SURE THAT WE ARE ALL COMMUNICATING.**

### ASP SIGNUP

Sign up is currently under way and will continue through May 15th, 1987. If you have a needed Conservation Practice, please come by and make your request during this signup period.

### FINAL PLANTING DATES

Listed below is the final planting dates for Borden County; however, don't get confused we're not saying that you can't plant after this date that's your option, BUT if a crop is planted at a later date the County Committee must determine if or how much the deficiency payment yield to what they believe the crop would produce.

COTTON --- June 20th

GRAIN SORGHUM -- June 30th

### CCC LOANS ON COTTON AND GRAIN SORGHUM

May 31st is the final date to request CCC loan on cotton or grain sorghum.

### FREEZE DAMAGED WHEAT

Due to the freeze, small grain has received some damage. Producers with freeze damaged wheat and other small grain need to file an ASCS-574 if you decide not to harvest the grain and make another use of the crop such as baling or grazing. For subsequent crops

behind failed small grains to be considered as INVISIBLE crops, the application for disaster must be filed before May 1st and the subsequent crop be planted before June 15th. If filed after that date, subsequent crops will count against the farm's permitted acreage for the crop. Remember we do have limited cross compliance in effect for this year.

### LIMITED CROSS COMPLIANCE

Limited cross compliance requirements is in effect for the 1987 crops of wheat, feed grains and upland cotton. To be eligible for benefits for participating program crops the acreage of a non-participating program crop and the acreage approved as prevented planted may not exceed the farm's CAB for the crop. THIS IS A CHANGE SO DON'T FORGET.

### MEASUREMENT SERVICE

We are again offering measurement service for all crops and acr. The cost of this is \$20.00 for the first 25 acres and 2 cents for each additional acres.

### TOLERANCE RULE ON MEASUREMENT SERVICE

If you have your entire crop measured, you will receive the benefit of the tolerance except for ACR (setaside). ACR ACREAGE MUST BE THE REQUIRED AMOUNT. You will be required to give ACR (setaside) equal to the required amount if you have measurement service and the acreage measured is short of the required amount. THIS IS A CHANGE FROM THE PAST.

### REDUCED ACR

If your projected 1987 payments exceed the \$50,000 payment limitation, you are eligible for reduced ACR acres. If you are interested, you must make a request before June 1st.

### APPROVED COVER OR PRACTICES ON ACR

It is recommended that adequate cover be established and maintained to keep wind and water erosion at or below soil loss levels. Adequate cover should be established on ACR acreage no later than June 10th. Approved covers and practices are:

1. Grasses and legumes such as guar and peas. (Does not include Johnson Grass)
2. Annual crops such as sweet sorghums and sudan.
3. Existing residue from 1986 crops if there is enough to prevent erosion (cotton stocks are not considered as residue.)
4. Barley, oats, rye, and wheat if:

-Substantially destroyed before reaching the hard dough stage, or  
-you make a request to leave small grain standing and pay a fee to leave it standing by May 1st.

5. If you do not have a small grain planted now, and do not want to plant a haygrazer crop during the summer, you may keep the land clean and then plant the ACR to a small grain before November 15th.

### ACR REQUIREMENTS

ACR (setaside) plots must contain at least 5.0 acres and be 1 chain wide (66ft) to be eligible. It can be a skip row, if skip is at least 4 normal rows wide or 160 inches. ACR must have been planted to a crop 2 out of the last 3 years or used as ACR.

ACR acreage must be kept free and clear of weeds and maintained in a workmanlike manner, throughout the year until December 31st.

## PETUNIAS FOR SPRING COLOR

Petunias are among the most popular bedding plants for Texas gardens. These flowering annuals grow in a variety of colors, shapes and forms and are well adapted to most areas of the state

The "Madness" series of petunias has been named by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service as the outstanding selection for 1987. These plants are heat tolerant and bear quantities of long-lasting, colorful flowers. Varieties in this floribunda class include White Madness, Summer Madness, Sheer Madness, Pink Madness, Coral Madness, Red Madness, Rose Madness, Plum Madness and Burgundy Madness.

Petunia transplants can be purchased from local garden centers or grown from seed.

When seedlings emerge, they should be transplanted to individual containers as they reach the 2-3 leaf stage. Plant outdoors 8-12 inches apart, when danger of frost has passed. Petunias like full sun but will tolerate partial shade. For best results, be sure to select a garden site with good drainage and adequate moisture.

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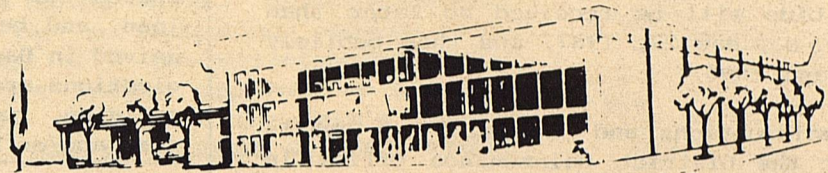

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of ten women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each year as the result of breast cancer.

Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. Women who are diagnosed with a lump large enough to feel have a 50 percent five year survival rate. A woman who is diagnosed as having breast cancer by mammography, before a lump can be felt, has a 97% five year survival rate and a 90% 10 year survival rate.

A mammogram can detect a cancer this small, ● even before it can be felt.

The Mobile Breast Cancer Detection Unit will be in Gail, Texas on May 21, 1987.

The American Cancer Society has established guidelines for mammography in asymptomatic women. (Women who have no symptoms of disease). Those guidelines have been adopted by the American Academy of Family Physicians, American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists, and The American College of Radiology. Those guidelines are:

I. 35-40 years of age - One baseline mammogram.

II. 40-50 years of age - A mammogram every 1-2 years depending on breast type and risk factor.

III. 50 years of age and over - An annual physical examination and annual mammogram.

IV. Asymptomatic women under 50 years of age with

significant high risk factors should be examined at appropriate intervals. These risk factors include previous breast cancer and family history of cancer.

V. A symptomatic woman should have a mammogram at any age when she experiences a mass, nipple discharge, skin changes or unexplained breast pain.

A screening mammogram is an x-ray of the breast using extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental x-rays) and is designed to find very early cancers.

A female technologist who is highly trained in mammography will perform the examination.

The charge for the screening mammogram is \$50.00. The Unit accepts cash, check, Visa, Mastercard and American Express.
