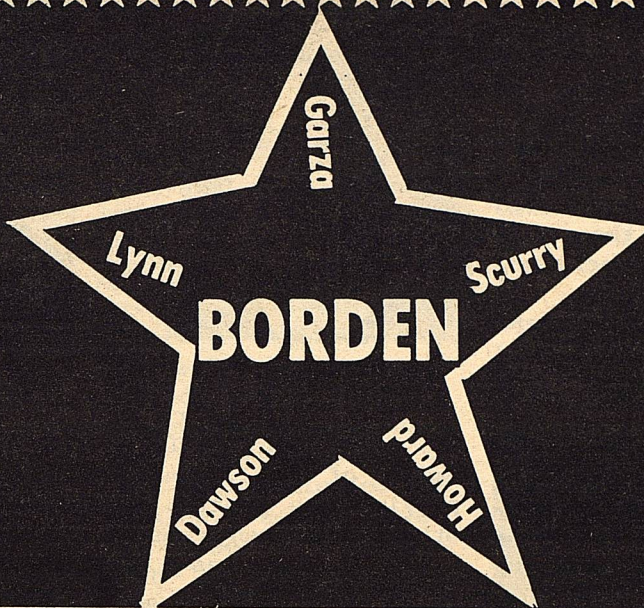

TRICIA JACKSON

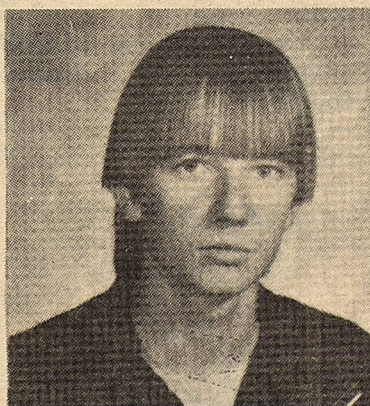

Elizabeth plans to attend WTSU in Canyon and study accounting.

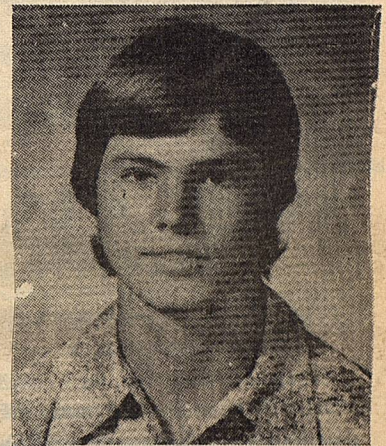


JACKIE LOCKHART

BOB MCLEROY

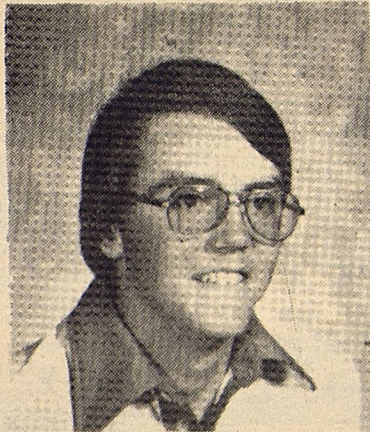

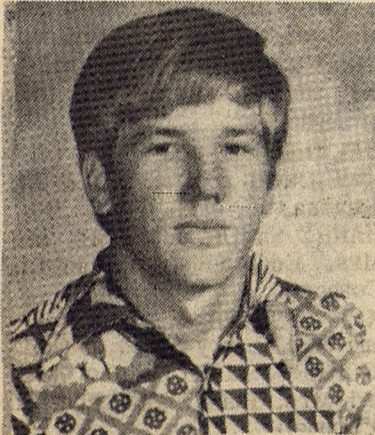
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EDDIE PARKS

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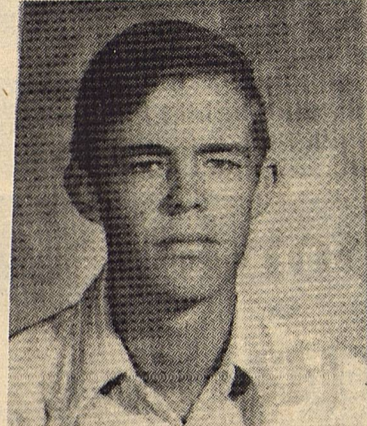

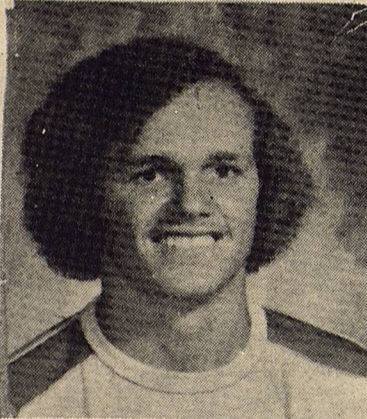

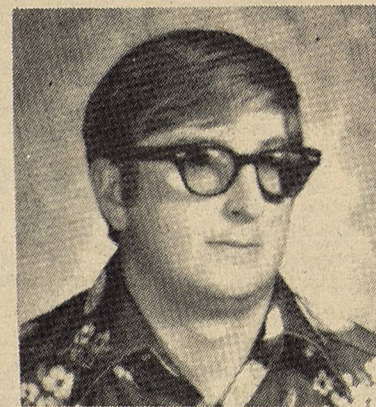
Larry plans to attend college at Howard County.

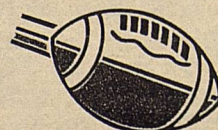

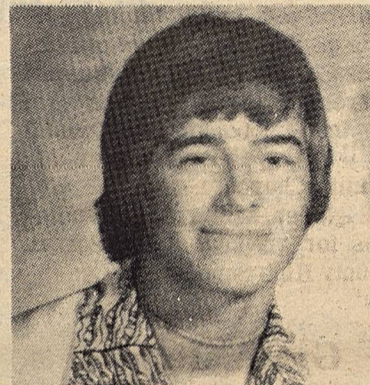
Richard plans to get a job and work his way through Western Texas College.

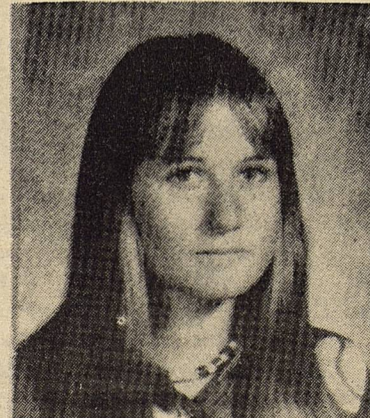

BEN THOMPSON

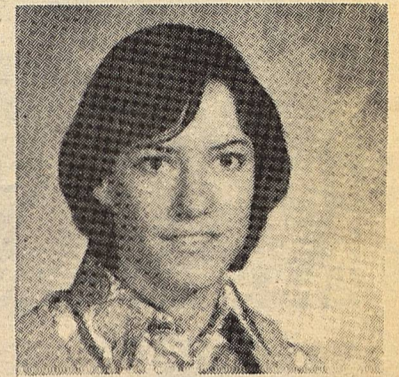

KATHY UNDERWOOD

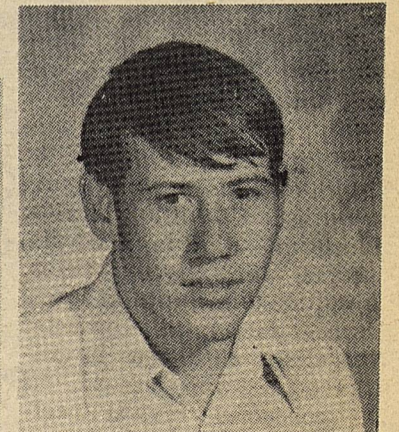

LOOP DEFEATS THE COYOTES

Well it looks like the only kind of luck that the Coyotes are going to have is bad luck. First of all senior end-quarterback Will Phinizy had an eye infection and was unable to keep his contacts on his eyes when the game began. He sat out the entire first half, but he was able to play the second half after resting his eyes. In just the second half, Will made 9 tackles and recovered one fumble.

The next dose of bad luck came on the second play as Brian Bond dropped back to pass and was hit from the back side just as he started to pass. The pass missed its mark and was intercepted and returned about 30 yards for a touchdown.

On the next series, the Coyotes were forced to punt, but a low snap led to an illegal procedure call when the punter ran for what looked like an apparent first down, but since the first man to receive the ball can't run with the ball under six-man rules, the run was nullified and the Longhorns took over the ball on the Coyotes 7 yard line. Things sure looked bad, and sure enough things got worse when an anxious Coyote jumped across the line and made contact. The penalty moved the ball to the 3 yard line from which the Longhorns quickly scored.

The Coyotes defense played a tough game and only gave up 96 yards rushing and 107 passing. The offense

just could not get untracked.

Several players played well on defense. Patrick Herridge led the defense with 14 tackles. Brian Bond had 12 tackles, a fumble recovery, and caused a fumble. Freshman Paul Strudivant played about a half and collected 12 tackles. Kerry Fryar was also very active with 9 tackles, 2 fumble recoveries, and caused 2 fumbles. One of his recoveries came on a punt when the ball was snapped over the punter into the end zone. Kerry chased down the punter, hit him hard, and then fell on the ball for a touchdown--awesome!

The other Coyotes with tackles were Chris Kilmer 6, Marc Latimer 5, also a fumble recovery, Randell

Hollis 4, Harold Barnes 2, Ray Martinez 1.

Patrick Herridge was the leading rusher with 51 yards on 16 carries. He scored on a 4 yard run and had some very tough yardage. Chris Kilmer had 24 yards on 8 carries. Marc Latimer rushed for 15 yards on 6 carries. Brian Bond completed 10 out of 6 passes for 78 yards. Patrick Herridge caught 3 passes for 24 yards. James Smith caught 2 passes for 15 yards. Kerry Fryar caught 2 passes for 17 yards.

Freshman Eric Lusk was forced into action in the first half when quarterback Brian Bond had to come out of the

game for a few plays. The fearless freshman preformed well and in the quarter led the Coyotes on their drive into the end zone.

The Coyotes will host the Grady Wildcats in the Homecoming Game on Friday, Oct. 16, at 7:30 p.m.

EX-CON TALKS TO TEENS

"Twice Pardoned," a new "must-see" film presentation created especially for teenagers examines the destructive ways in which many young people try to cope with the pains and pressures of growing up. It will be shown Saturday, Oct. 24, 1987, at 7:00 p.m. in the Conference Room at the Borden County School.

In this recent release from Focus on the Family Films, ex-con Harold Morris tells his incredible life story and urges teenagers to avoid the snares-alcohol drugs, illicit sex and wrong associations-that led to his imprisonment.

In this two-part series, taped before 10,000 teens in San Antonio, Texas, and on location at Georgia State Penitentiary, Morris encourages young people to realize how much they are loved. Speaking from personal experience, he explains how feelings of inferiority can make them vulnerable to peer pressure. He also shares, in a down-to-earth manner, some of tragic consequences of his wrong choices.

"Twice Pardoned" has been enthusiastically endorsed by noted family psychologist and best-selling author Dr. James Dobson. "I have never seen a more powerful message for teens," Dodson said. "Every young person in America needs to see these films."

In 1969, as a result of false testimony from two "friends," Morris was convicted of armed robbery and murder, and was sentenced to a double life term at Georgia State Penitentiary. After eight years in prison (including "hard time" on Death Row), Morris made a commitment to Jesus Christ and began an outreach to young people to help them avoid the traps that got him into trouble.

Morris was miraculously released on parole

on March 14, 1978, after nearly a decade behind bars. He later was graduated from Southeastern Bible College in Birmingham, Alabama, and was granted a full pardon by Georgia

**CULL OPEN,
LATE-CALVING COWS**

Farmers and ranchers who haven't already culled open, late-calving and poor performing cows should do so soon.

There's no need to put expensive winter feed into cows that are unproductive and inefficient. Culling the herd now will also help you more effectively plan on feed supplies for the winter months.

The culling process should also "weed-out" unsound cows with bad eyes, udders or feet and legs.

Also, pregnancy testing cows this fall may be a more profitable management tool than ever before.

Since it's difficult for a cow to produce a calf large enough to pay her annual maintenance bill and leave some profit for the producer, an open cow is surely losing money.

In addition, cows calving late and during the summer months wean calves 30 to 90 pounds lighter than their herd mates which calve at earlier times. For this reason it's advisable to cull cows which will calve late next year and purchase pregnant replacements which will calve early.

Whoever does the pregnancy diagnosis (usually your veterinarian) will be able to estimate the calving date on each animal and make it easy to identify next year's late-calving cows. Work toward a 60-day calving season or one that's certainly no longer than 90 days.

Removing barren and late-calving cows from the herd will increase both the herd's reproductive potential and pounds of calf weaned.

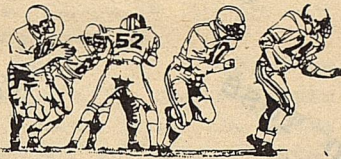

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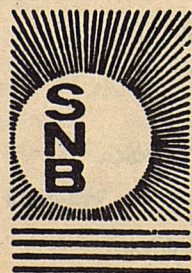

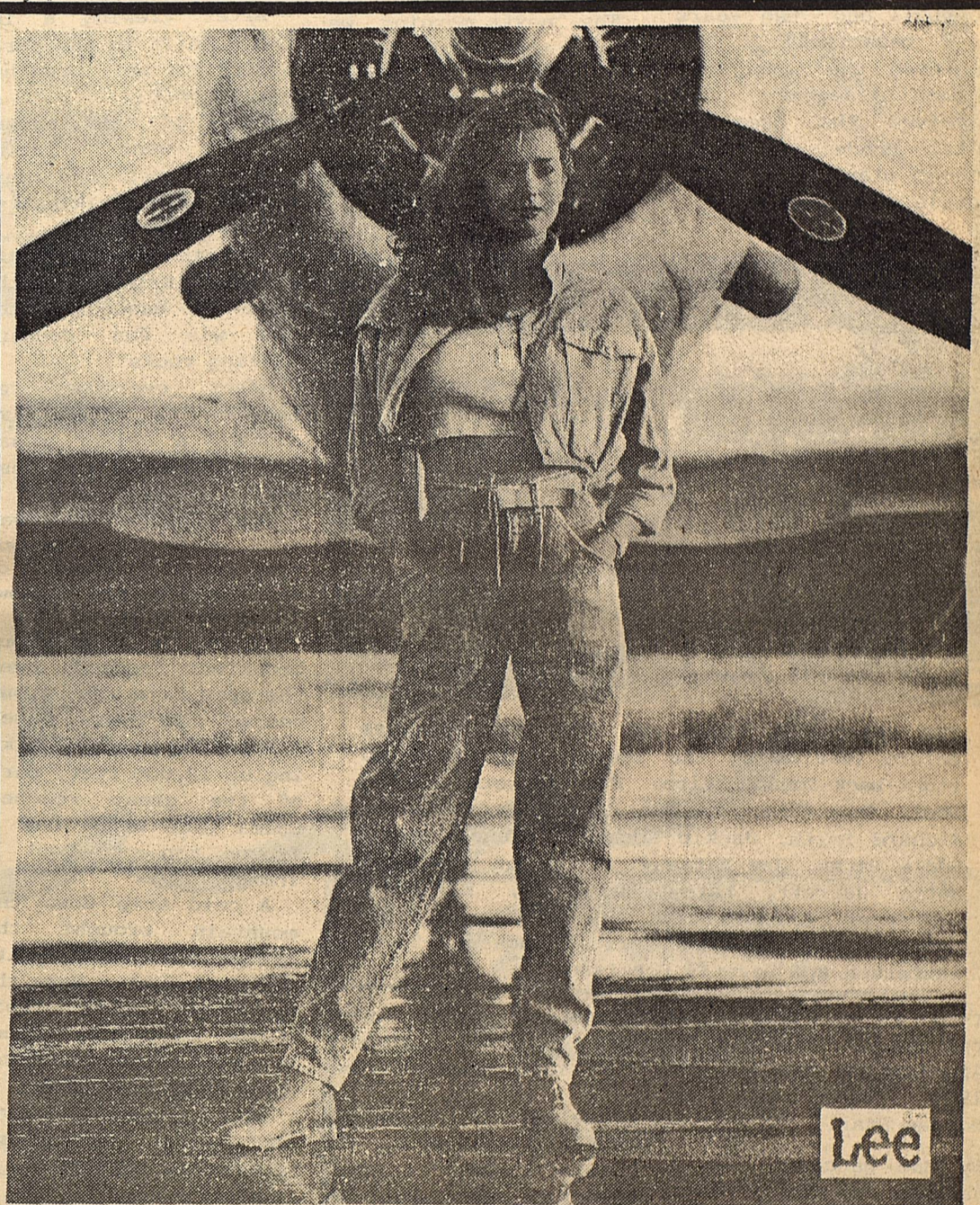
