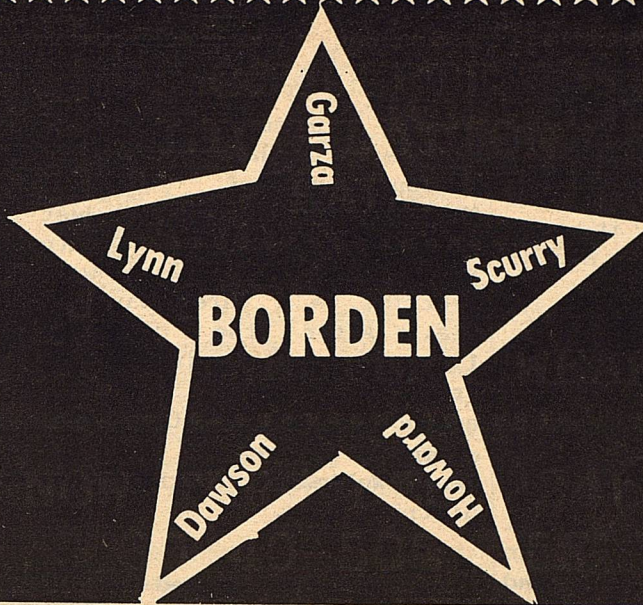

## HUNTING AND SNAKE SAFETY

Texas hunters have more to worry about than what game to hunt. There are four kinds of poisonous snakes living in the United States, and unfortunately for Texas hunters, they all can be found in the Lone Star State.

The Texas Medical Association recommends that hunters and others who hike through the countryside learn to recognize snakes by their appearances:

- Rattlesnakes, cottonmouths (also called water moccasins) and copperheads all fall into the category of pit vipers. They all have vertical pupils in their eyes, similar to the eyes of cats. Pit vipers have a deep pit on each side of the head between the eye and the nostril.

- Any snake with a rattle at the end of its tail is poisonous.

- Coral snakes must be identified by their color patterns--black and red rings separated by narrower rings of yellow.

The Texas Medical Association also urges hunters to take precautions against snakebites:

- Most snakebites occur on the legs below the knees. Wear heavy knee-high leather boots or other thick covering to prevent the fangs from penetrating.

- Do not reach

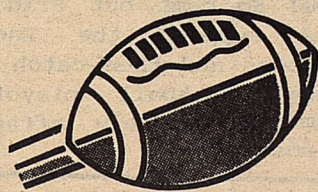
under logs, rocks, or bushes without first investigating with a stick.

- Do not dip your hands over the side of a boat in waters that may shelter water moccasins.

If you are bitten by a snake, the best first aid is a quick trip to a hospital or other source of medical care. Stay as calm and still as possible, being careful to keep the wound at or below the level of the heart. Identify the snake type if possible without taking risks or delaying medical care.

Wearing proper clothing and being alert for poisonous snakes can prevent accidents and

make a fall hike or hunting a more enjoyable, healthy experience.

## APPLICATIONS AVAILABLE FOR SUMMER INTERNSHIP

WASHINGTON, D.C. - Congressman Charles W. Stenholm has announced that applications for the 1988 summer internships in his Washington, D.C. office are now available.

College students from the 17th Congressional District, teachers at any level, or residents of the district between the age of 19 or 25 who have demonstrated an interest in government, are eligible for the internship program. The interns, who are selected after a thorough screening process by a selection committee, are paid a one-month stipend, which helps cover basic living expenses.

Four interns work in Congressman Stenholm's office during June and July. While in the nation's capital, they

attend committee meetings floor debates and a speakers' series. They also research constituent inquiries and assist in the day-to-day operations of the office.

Deadline for completed applications is January 19, 1988. Ten finalists will be announced in February, 1988. The winners will be named in March at a Selection Luncheon after personal interviews of the finalists are conducted.

## LADY COYOTES NEWS

Borden has its first girls' scrimmage last Tuesday as they traveled to Wilson. The varsity played three 16 three minute halves and the J.V. played two 8 minute quarters.

The Varsity had six players in the scoring column led by Elana with 19. She was followed in double figures by Lisha Sternadel with 16 and Kristi Adcock with 12. Also scoring for the Lady Coyotes was Ralynn Key, Kate Phinizy and Elvira Balaque with 2 each. Kristi led in field goal percentage hitting 6 of 10 for 60%. Lisha was next with 53%. Kate, Ralynn, and Lisha all had 4 assists. Elana led in rebounds with 17 followed by Lisha with 7 and Kristi with 8. Elana and Ralynn each had 5 steals and Kristi had 4. Borden attempted only 2 free throws for the night with Elana hitting 1 of 2. Wilson was 13 of 28. Also playing on varsity were Shelly Lewis and Felicia Romero.

The J.V. only got to play two quarters,

but that's all it took for Wilson to decide they wanted no more. The offense managed 23 points in the half but it was the defense that stood out as they held Wilson scoreless both quarter. Randi Woodward led in scoring with 7 Amy Lewis had 6. Rachel Romero and Mary Ann Garcia each had 4 and Elizabeth Garcia had 2. Julie Harris led in assists with 8 and Amy had 6. Amy also led in field goal percentage with 50% hitting 3 of 6. Mary Ann hit 2 of 4 free throws to lead from the stripe.

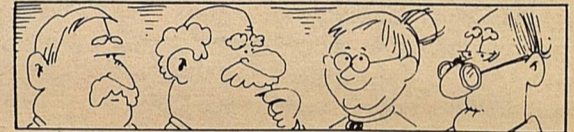
Next Lady Coyote scrimmage will be against Tahoka, there, Tuesday, November 10th. at 4:30. The first game for Borden will be at home on November 13th. against Wellman starting at 4:15 with a J.V. game, and the Varsity game will follow.

The Borden County Coyotes finished their season against the Wellman Wildcats. The Coyotes lost 46-14 to the Wildcats who finished district in a three way tie. After the coin flip, Loop was eliminated from the logjam. Sands advances as district champion because they beat Wellman in their district game.

The Wildcats showed a balanced offense as they ran and passed their way to an easy victory. The Coyotes played very hard, but they were no match for the Wildcat speed. The Coyotes finish the season with a 3-7 win-loss record. In district, the Coyotes finished 2-4. A lot of young players were forced into action this year, so we expect them to play better next year.

The Coyotes moved the ball on their first two possessions, but they just couldn't get it into the end zone. The Wildcats held the Coyotes scoreless until the 3rd. quarter when Kerry Fryar intercepted a pass on the 3 yard line and ran it into the end zone. Shannon Bond kicked the PAT. All of the reserves played most of the fourth quarter, and they showed great hustle and desire. Shane Kemper made several nice runs. Shane scored on a 1 yard run. Senior defense lineman Harold Barnes filled in at the fullback position and also made several nice runs. Eric Lusk quarterbacked the reserves and did a good job. Ends Paul Sturdivant and Cole Vestal blocked James Smith 1, and well for the backs. It was a very long season, but the Coyotes showed a lot of courage by not giving up and also did a good job.

On defense, the reserves looked good allowing only one score and intercepting one pass. Shane Kemper came up with the interception and also tipped away a pass that Eric Luck had lined up for his second interception of the year. Will Phinizy led all tacklers with 10 followed by Randell Hollis with 8, Harold Barnes, Paul Sturdivant, Patrick Herridge and Chris Kilmer, who had 6 tackles a piece. Shane Kemper also had 6 tackles and an interception. Others with tackles were Brian Bond 5, Kerry Fryar 4 and an interception, Eric Lusk 2, Cole Vestal 2 and a fumble recovery, James Smith 1, and Shannon Bond 1. It was a very long season, but the Coyotes showed a lot of courage by not giving up when times looked bad.

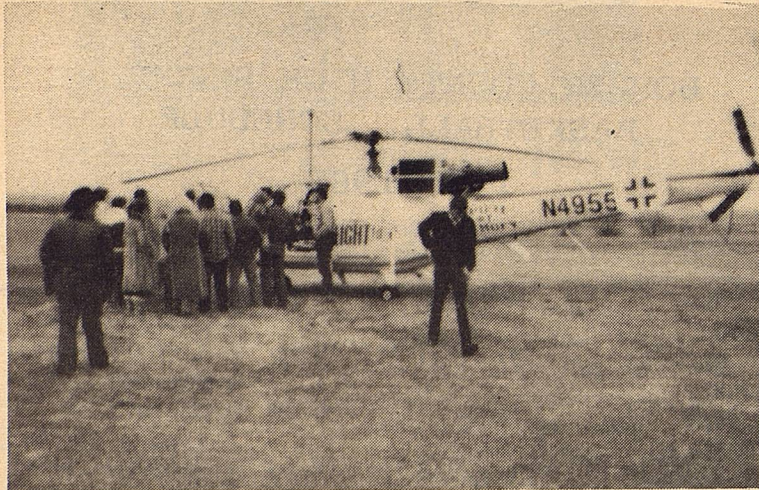

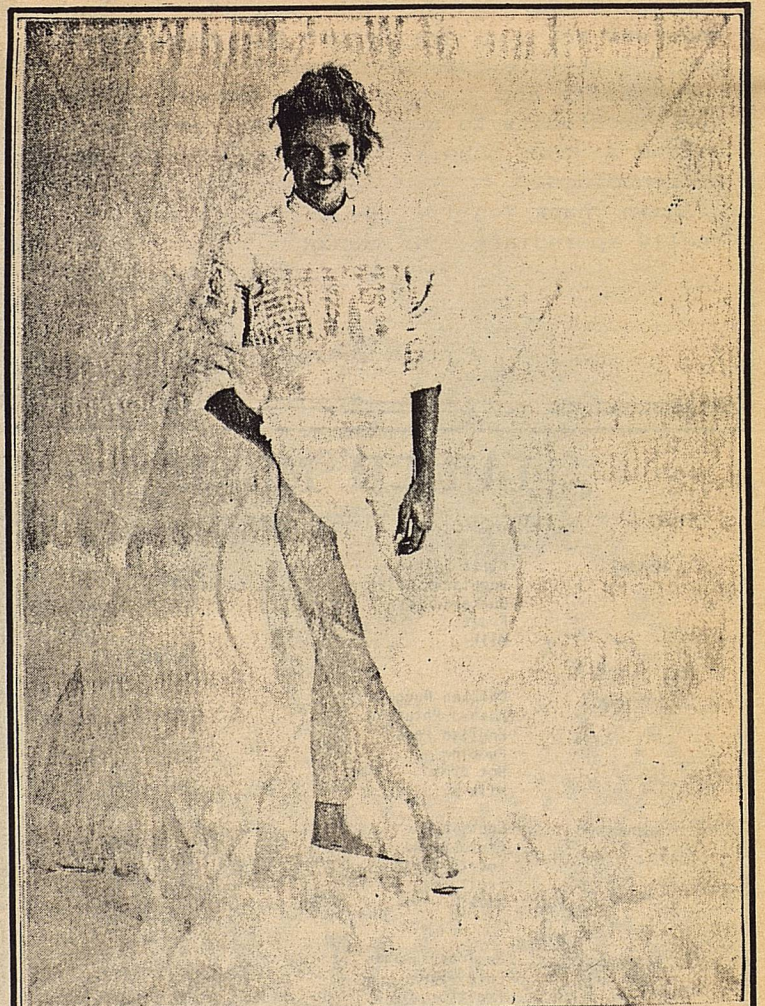

LET ME GET MY HAT

**GET LAWN IN SHAPE FOR SPRING**

Homeowners can take steps now to get their lawns in shape for next spring.

Weed, disease and insect control along with fall fertilization can help get lawns off to a fast start next year.

Chinch bugs, white grubs and armyworms must be controlled during late summer and fall. Insect damage weakens turf and allows weeds to invade the lawn. Timely applications of insecticides such as diazinon or chlorpyrifos (Dursban) will control most lawn insect problems.

Fall fertilization maintains the lawn's green color and promotes early spring green-up. A dense, vigorous turf produced by proper fertilization also keeps winter weeds from invading lawns.

We recommend applying a complete fertilizer with a 3-1-2, 4-1-2 or similar ratio of nitrogen, phosphorus and potash at a rate of 1 to 2 pounds of nitrogen per 1,000 square feet.

If winter weeds have been a problem in past years, apply a premergence herbicide (chemical weed killer) for additional protection against weeds. Products containing atrazine, benefin, bensulide, dacthal or similar materials provide preemergence control of many winter annual weeds. Some premergence herbicides are available in formulations with fertilizers, which simplifies application.

Homeowners are caut-

ioned to follow label instructions in regard to grass species and rates of application when using herbicides. Materials containing atrazine should not be used around trees and shrubs.

As far as disease control is concerned, a suggested application of a fungicide on St. Augustine lawns to prevent damage from brown patch. Not only is brown patch unsightly, but weeds will invade the lawn in disease-weakened areas. Also, spring recovery is delayed in areas damaged by brown patch.

Fungicides containing PCNB (Terraclor, Ortho Lawn Fungicide), benomyl (Benlate, Tersan 1991) or chlorothalonil (Daconil) control brown patch when applied according to label instructions.

Homeowners should also raise the mowing height in October to 2-½ or 3 inches for St. Augustine and 1-½ or 2 inches for bermuda lawns. The taller grass provides more cover and insulation for the growing points of the grass and reduces the chance for winterkill.

Another fall task for homeowners is to remove excess accumulations of grass clippings or tree leaves from the lawn.

## ASCS NEWS

### 1987 FINAL COTTON DEFICIENCY PAYMENT

The 1987 final cotton deficiency payment rate will not be determined until February 1, 1988. We have no information as to what that rate may be but will advise you as soon as we do know.

### ACR

If you certified that you would plant a small grain crop on your ACR land and you have not planted one at this time, you could have problems, because the ACR is not eligible at this time. If you have planted the cover crop, you must report that it has been planted to make your ACR land eligible.

### 1988 FARM PROGRAM

The October 19th signup period for the wheat program has been delayed until further notice. As soon as the information is received in the office you will be notified.

Oats are no longer subject to cross compliance regulations.

Wheat continues to be subject to cross compliance regulations. If you plan to participate in the wheat program the maximum permitted acres are 72.5% of base.

Grain Sorghum continues to be subject to cross compliance regulations. The maximum permitted acres of sorghum is 80% of your base if you plan to participate.

No provisions related to the 1988 Cotton program have been received as of yet.

### 1988 CORN-GRAIN SORGHUM

You can expect to be receiving your 1986 final deficiency grain sorghum payments in the near future for those farms that participated in the program.

All producers who have sold wool and/or unshorn lambs need to turn in their originals sales receipts by January 31, 1988.

### FAILED ACRES

Before you plow up any program crops that are not harvested, you must file an ASCS-574 for failed acres. The failed acreage must be

due to a disaster such as hail, excess rain, and drought. The excess weeds due to unworkman-like manner is not considered a disaster. If you filed an ASCS-574 and the reason for the 574 is due to weeds, then chances are very thin that the crop will be eligible for any deficiency payments.

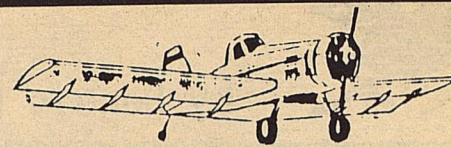
### EXPIRED COTTON CERTIFICATES

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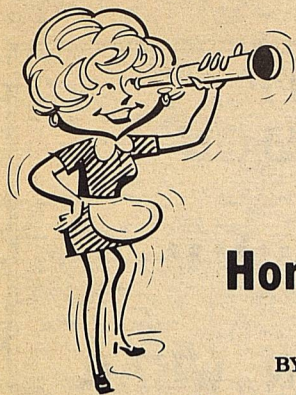

## CAUSES OF AND SOLUTIONS TO FABRIC SOFTENER STAINS

Fabric softeners have great benefits when properly used. They give fabrics a smoother, softer, fluffier feeling, and a pleasant smell. They decrease static cling, wrinkling, drying time, and make ironing easier. When used improperly however, fabric softeners can leave stains.

The Soap and Detergent Association says stains can occur in the washer or dryer. Washer added softeners may leave greasy looking blue or gray stains. Dryer added softeners may leave colorless oily spots.

Fortunately, both types of stains can be removed by wetting the stained area and rubbing it with a bar of soap. After that, rinse the fabric and wash it. Before putting it in the dryer, make sure the stain is gone. The dryer's heat may set the stain.

To avoid problems with fabric softeners, use them as directed. Never add a rinse softener to the wash cycle with any other laundry additive. The products react together and cause stains. Rinse softeners are only to be added during the rinse cycle.

Stains can also be caused by pouring undiluted softener on to fabric. It's best to dilute it with a cup of water, and still not pour it directly on a fabric. If the washer has an automatic fabric softener dispenser, do not lift the lid after the wash cycle. If the washer stops after the first spin, staining could occur from improper dispensing of the softener.

Stains can be caused in the dryer if it is overloaded and the softener isn't allowed to tumble freely. Stains can also occur if the dryer is underloaded, but that can be easily solved by adding a few towels to the load. It's also important to remember that too high a heat setting for synthetic or permanent press fabric, and adding softener after the dryer has already started can cause stains.

### HOW TO REMOVE MUD STAINS

The Soap and Detergent Association maintains that mud stains should be allowed to dry before pretreating. After the mud dries, brush off as much of it as possible. Apply a liquid laundry detergent booster, or make a paste of a granular detergent and water and rub on the stained area. For heavy stains, pretreat or presoak the stain with laundry detergent or a product containing enzymes. After this, laundry the fabric and the stain should be gone.

## COTTON EXPANDS FOR SWEATER FASHIONS

Cotton sweaters are enjoying year round popularity, and challenging wool as a major sweater fiber. Unlike past seasons of vibrant hues, cotton sweaters now match the muted and earthy wool tones. Variety has been added to cotton sweaters' past textures of flat stitched and shaker knits. Today's cotton sweaters include cardigans, Irish fisherman's knits and turtle-necks, as well as traditional crew and boat neck designs. Cotton has another reason for gaining popularity. Unlike wool, cotton sweaters can be machine washed and dried.

Q. Today I heard about a new drug that will lower cholesterol; I think it is called Lovastatin. If I have a high blood cholesterol level, should I ask my doctor about using the new drug?

A. The level of blood cholesterol in the blood, which may be considered high, varies with age. For a young person, a cholesterol level over 200 may be high. For an elderly individual, over 260 is considered high. If your blood cholesterol level is high, and you have not been able to reduce the level satisfactorily by reducing the fat and cholesterol in your diet, then you should ask your doctor about using drugs to control blood cholesterol. Lovastatin, a new drug approved by the Federal Drug Administration in Sept. 1987, should offer some significant advantages to

lower cholesterol levels, including an increased effectiveness when compared to older drugs.

Q. I'm a 31-year-old woman, and although I feel I am attractive, I've always felt my breasts were too large. What are my options for breast reduction?

A. The only medically effective way to reduce the size of your breasts is thorough breast reduction mammoplasty. This procedure involves surgical removal of breast tissue, fatty tissue and overlying skin. If a woman is overweight and has very large breasts, she should first try to lose weight to reduce breast size without surgery. If weight loss is ineffective, then surgery may be indicated. Reduction mammoplasty is usually performed by a plastic surgeon.

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# Unique livestock export finance plan developed by Texas-Mexico

The state of Texas and the Republic of Mexico are formally delving into a historic new area of international trade.

"We are initiating a unique, new Texas-Mexico Livestock Export Finance Program that has the potential—in the next year alone—to sell 40,000 head of quality Texas livestock, valued at approximately \$40 million, to Mexican ranchers," Commissioner Hightower said at a State Capitol news conference.

Mexico's state livestock associations and its Secretariat of Agriculture have recognized the potential to bring stronger genetics into Mexican livestock by buying more registered breeding stock from Texas ranchers. But a sagging Mexican currency has made financing these purchases almost impossible, with the result that Texas livestock exports to Mexico have sagged drastically along with the peso.

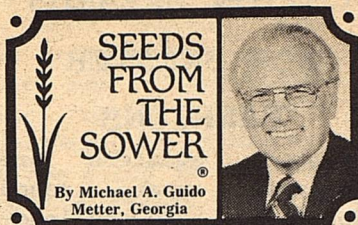
This mutual problem was raised as a priority issue within the Mexico-Texas Exchange Commission (M-TEC), a bilateral group of agricultural leaders established in 1985 through a Memorandum of Understanding signed in Mexico City by Mexican

Agriculture Secretary Eduardo Pesqueira and Hightower. A committee of M-TEC was appointed to address

the problem, and its deliberations and negotiations have produced the new program.

"By providing a simple financing bridge, the Texas-Mexico Livestock Export Finance Program now will allow ranchers from Texas and Mexico to help each other and boost the economies on both sides of the border," Hightower said. "With the outreach of TDA's international marketing staff, with the financial strength and assurances of state livestock associations in Mexico, and with the full cooperation of the Mexican Secretariat of Agriculture, we've devised a direct, rancher-to-rancher program that will work for all of us."

Prior to official announcement of the Livestock Export Finance Program, several participating Texas and Mexico ranchers have given the new system a test run and are presently executing deals worth more than a quarter-of-a-million dollars in breeding stock sales.
