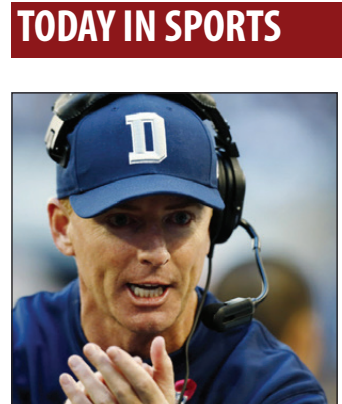

Bennigan's CEO: Pampa restaurant delayed

On May 14, groundbreaking was held for the much anticipated Bennigan's restaurant. Though there were small splatterings of negative comments here and there, dozens upon dozens of posts on the newspaper's Facebook page were overwhelming in favor of a casual dining restaurant like Bennigan's. The ceremony was attended by Bennigan's CEO Paul Mangiamiele, local franchisee Nimit Patel and his family and a cadre of city officials and business leaders. The target date for opening the restaurant was either in late December or early January 2014. More than five months have passed, and not a shovelful of dirt has been turned on the commercial lot on the grounds of the former Pampa Middle School. In an email sent to The Pampa News, Mangiamiele said the project has been delayed. "But the project, at least for now, is still moving forward," he wrote. He did not state when construction will start. Mangiamiele did confirm that the Pampa Bennigan's will still be among the first built with a new design that has an airy, open seating area and a "shot gun" bar that goes along one wall instead of a raised island that is the norm in other casual dining chains. A press release from Bennigan's public relation's firm called the May 14 groundbreaking the "latest chapter in an epic comeback story." The Bennigan's chain fell on hard times in the late 2000s when its parent company filed for bankruptcy protection and all of the company's 150 corporate locations in the U.S. closed. When the Bennigan's in Orlando, Fla. was shuttered, it made headlines throughout Florida because it was always crowded. While the company's 138 franchise stores remained after the reorganization, many of them closed in the months and years that followed. But like the mythical phoenix rising from the ashes, the Dallas-based corporation has reinvented itself as primarily a franchise operation. With new franchise stores like the one in Borger springing up all over the country, it is steadily regaining its place in the casual dining market. Mangiamiele, who took the reigns as CEO in 2011, is known as a "rock star" in the restaurant industry. He previously served as president & CEO of Salsarita's Fresh Cantina, a fast casual Mexican chain. At Salsarita's he led operations, sales and unit economic improvements that positioned the chain for accelerated multi-state expansion. Mangiamiele's enthusiasm for the Irish-themed casual

Sandy Hook teacher Kaitlin Roig continues to touch lives

AMARILLO — "We cannot control what happens, only how we react," Kaitlin Roig said during a speaking event in Amarillo Thursday night. On Dec. 14, 2012, Roig was one of the teachers at Sandy Hook Elementary School in Newtown, Conn., when 20-year-old Adam Lanza walked into the school and opened fired, m killing 26 people, 20 students and six adults. Roig has been praised as a hero as she hurried her 15 students into a small 3-foot by 4-foot bathroom and barricaded the door, instructing students to keep quiet until the "good guys" got there. "There is no making sense of what happened that day," Roig said. "My kids were worried and I told them I loved them all very much. I knew that might be the last thing they heard in their lives." The event, "An Evening with Kaitlin Roig," was sponsored by AGN Media, Region 16 and News Channel 10 in the Grand Plaza of the Am-

dining chain's future is so upbeat that he's named it "Bleeding Green 25/8."

When it opens, the Pampa Bennigan's is expected to employ between 60 to 80 full- and part-time workers.

The restaurant will be located within Edwin Park, a retail and commercial development with five businesses fronting Perryton Parkway and a planned housing community behind a privacy wall with single-story duplexes, a playground and an events center.

Edwin Park is being developed by a Pampa-based company called Open Range on the site of the former Pampa Middle School.

PMS closed in the spring of 2010 and classes began at the new Pampa Junior High School in the fall of that year.

The middle school was built in 1958 and several additions were added over the years, with the last in 1998. The property in-

cludes 18.3 acres of property.

The Pampa Independent School District sold the old school and property to Open Range for \$75,000 on the condition that the developer must abate, or remove, all of the asbestos and then demolish the old building within three years of the closing date, which was Aug. 28.

A groundbreaking ceremony for Edwin Park was held on a frigid Saturday in late March, while a "garage sale" was held throughout the hallways to sell off school furniture, lockers, books and even vinyl records.

At that time, company officials said construction would start by the end of the year, but anybody driving by the old middle school can see that the demolition is far from completed.

Several attempts were made to contact Dan Miller, the project manager for Edwin Park, to inquire on the status of the project.

An Open Range employee said Miller was on vacation this week.

All items, along with the Angel who is picked, should be returned to either IntegraCare office or Pampa Meals on Wheels no later than Dec. 13. It is very important to bring the Angel with the gifts all together so the staff knows who to deliver the gifts to.

You may wrap the gifts yourselves or IntegraCare or Meals on Wheels can wrap them for you. The gifts are delivered to the senior residents on Dec. 19 and 20 just in time for Christmas. When you do pick up an Angel, please leave your name and phone number with either

Ginny Elliff or Sarah Deaver at the IntegraCare office or Jean Autrey or Becky at Pampa Meals on Wheels. They need to track the Angels and make sure we get all gifts and Angels back by the deadline date so we may deliver them. Duke lacrosse accuser found guilty of murder

DURHAM, N.C. (AP) — The woman who falsely accused three Duke University lacrosse players of

rape has been found guilty of second-degree murder in the stabbing death of her boyfriend.

The jury deliberated for about six hours over two days before reaching their verdict in the trial of 34-year-old Crystal Mangum, who was sentenced to

between 14 years and 18 years in prison.

Mangum was on trial in the death of 46-year-old Reginald Daye. He was stabbed on April 3, 2011 and he died of complications 10 days later.

In 2006, Mangum claimed Duke lacrosse

players gang raped her at a team party where she was hired as a stripper.

The three arrested were eventually declared innocent by North Carolina's attorney general after Mangum's story crumbled and her mental stability was questioned.

North Korea confirms it's holding American

WASHINGTON (AP) — The State Department said Friday that North Korea acknowledges it is holding an American citizen but hasn't granted diplomats consular access so the person's identity is not yet confirmed.

Expectation is that it will be Merrill Newman of California. The 85-year old Korean War veteran's

family says he was detained at the end of a tourist trip to North Korea last month.

Department spokeswoman Jen Psaki told reporters that Sweden has been informed by Pyongyang that it is detaining an American citizen. Because the U.S. has no diplomatic relations with North Korea, Sweden oversees consular issues

for the United States there.

Psaki says the Swedish Embassy is requesting access daily to the American.

"We are working in close coordination with representatives of the embassy of Sweden to resolve this issue. They have requested, actually on a daily basis, consular access," Psaki said. "They haven't been granted that access."

Instructions were put up next to the poster to "please share what you are thankful for here." A few days before Thanksgiving, we went to Lilac Ledge to check the poster. By far the most touching comment, though, came from an individual who wrote, "I was feeling pretty discouraged, not looking forward to Thanksgiving. I read what the girls wrote, and what some of the other people wrote. I thought to myself, "I must have

War on the little guy

Marty the Magician performed magic tricks for kids, including the traditional rabbit-out-of-a-hat. Then one day: "I was signing autographs and taking pictures with children and their parents," he told me. "Suddenly, a badge was thrown into the mix, and an inspector said, 'Let me see your license.'"

In "Harry Potter" books, a creepy Ministry of Magic controls young wizards. Now in the USA, government regulates stage magicians — one of the countless ways it makes life harder for the little guy.

Marty's torment didn't end with a demand for his license. "She said, from now on, you cannot use your rabbit until you fill out paperwork, pay the \$40 license fee. We'll have to inspect your home."

Ten times since, regulators showed up unannounced at Marty's house. At one point, an inspector he hadn't seen before appeared. He hoped things had changed for the better.

"I got a new inspector and I said, oh, did my first one retire? She said, 'No, good news! We've increased our budget and we have more inspectors now. So we'll be able to visit you more often.'"

Here are your tax dollars at work.

The inspectors told Marty that the Animal Welfare Act required him to file paperwork demonstrating that he had "a comprehensive written disaster plan detailing everything I would do with my rabbit in the event of a fire, a flood, a tornado, an ice storm."

The federal forms list "common emergencies likely to happen to your facility ... not necessarily limited to: structural fire, electrical outage, disruption in clean water or feed supply, disruption in access to facility (e.g., road closures), intentional attack on the facilities ... earthquake, landslide/mudslide/avalanche ..."

Sadly, this Kafkaesque enforcement of petty rules is not a bizarre exception. Some regulation is useful. But when we passively accept government regulation of everything, thinking we're protecting people from evil corporations run amok, we're really making life harder for ordinary people. Every profession, from cab driv-

ing to floral arrangement, is now burdened with complex rules.

You can't even give tours of Washington, D.C., the city that produces most of these insane rules, without getting a special license. Tour guides must pay about \$200 for criminal background checks, provide four personal references, show passport photos and pass a written test — a difficult one.

People who reflexively defend government may feel no pity for businesses that face extra costs: Let businesses pay fees and take tests — we don't want unlicensed tour guides describing famous statues incorrectly! But these costs add up. Often, they make a small, barely profitable business impossible to operate. These rules also violate Americans' right to free speech. They are unnecessary. If tour guides are no good, people can patronize others. The government doesn't need to be gatekeeper.

These rules generally prevail because existing businesses are politically connected. They capture licensing boards and use license rules to crush competition from businesses just getting started.

In some places, you can't open a business like a limo service or moving van company unless you can prove that your business is needed and won't undermine existing businesses in the same field.

But undermining competition is the whole idea. If Starbucks or Home Depot had to prove new coffee shops and hardware stores were "needed," we wouldn't have those companies. Apparently they were needed, since these companies thrived, but no one could have "proven" that beforehand.

Jeff Rowes, an attorney at the Institute for Justice, a civil liberties group that defends many people caught up in regulatory cases, says, "America was conceived as a sea of liberty with islands of government power. We're now a sea of government power with ever-shrinking islands of liberty."

The little guys don't have an army of lawyers to defend those islands of liberty one regulatory battle at a time. We should get rid of most of these regulations — and sail back, together, to a free country.

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Nixon and Kennedy: The myths and reality

Had there been no Dallas, there would have been no Camelot.

There would have been no John F. Kennedy as brilliant statesman cut off in his prime, had it not been for those riveting days from Dealey Plaza to Arlington and the lighting of the Eternal Flame.

Along with the unsleeping labors of an idolatrous press and the propagandists who control America's popular culture, those four days created and sustained the Kennedy Myth.

But, over 50 years, the effect has begun to wear off.

The New York Times reports that in the ranking of presidents, Kennedy has fallen further and faster than any. Ronald Reagan has replaced him as No. 1, and JFK is a fading fourth.

Kennedy is increasingly perceived today as he was 50 years ago, before word came that shots had been fired in Dallas.

That he was popular, inspirational, charismatic, no one denied. But no one would then have called him great or near great. His report card had too many C's, F's and Incompletes.

His great legislative victory had been the passage of the Trade Expansion Act of 1962. His tax cut bill was buried on the Hill.

His triumph had been forcing a withdrawal of Soviet missiles from Cuba. But we would learn

this was done by a secret deal for the withdrawal of U.S. missiles from Turkey and a secret pledge not to invade Cuba.

And after the missile crisis, Bobby Kennedy pushed the CIA to eliminate Castro, eliciting a warning from Fidel that two could play this game. Lyndon Johnson said that under the Kennedys, the CIA had been running "a damned Murder Inc. in the Caribbean."

What caused Nikita Khrushchev to think he could get away with putting rockets in Cuba? His perception that JFK was a weak president.

Kennedy had denied air cover for the Cuban patriots at the Bay of Pigs, resulting in the worst debacle of the Cold War. He was then berated and humiliated by Khrushchev at the Vienna Summit in June 1961.

In August, Khrushchev built the Berlin Wall. Kennedy sat paralyzed.

In September, Khrushchev smashed the three-year-old nuclear test-ban moratorium with a series of explosions featuring, at Novaya Zemlya, a 57-megaton "Tsar Bomba," the largest man-made blast ever.

"Less profile, more courage," the placards read.

In Southeast Asia, JFK had Averell Harriman negotiate a treaty for neutralizing Laos, resulting in Hanoi's virtual annexation of the Ho Chi Minh trail through Laos into South Vietnam.

Where Eisenhower had 600 advisers in Vietnam, JFK increased it to 16,000 and gave his blessing to a generals' coup in which our ally, President Ngo Dinh Diem, was assassinated.

Then and there, Vietnam became America's war.

Kennedy had made a famous phone call to Mrs. Martin Luther King during the 1960 campaign when her husband had been arrested. Yet, he kept his administration away from the March on Washington and directed J. Edgar Hoover to wiretap Dr. King to learn of his associations with Communists.

Since his death, Kennedy's reputation has been ravaged by revelations of assignments and mistresses from Marilyn Monroe to Mafia molls to White House interns from Miss Porter's School.

All of this was covered up by his courtier journalists who would collaborate in perpetuating the Kennedy myth and colude in destroying their great hate object, Richard Nixon.

Yet, contrast what Nixon did, with what JFK failed to do.

Where Kennedy managed to get Gov. George Wallace to admit two black students to the University of Alabama, Nixon desegregated 70 percent of all Southern public schools.

Where the JFK-LBJ administration spent eight years putting 535,000 U.S. troops into a war they could neither end nor win, Nixon withdrew all U.S. troops in four years, brought home the POWs, and left every provincial capital in South Vietnamese hands.

Where Kennedy had the Peace Corps, Nixon ended the draft, gave 18-year-olds the right to vote, created an Environmental Protection Agency

and a Cancer Institute and an Occupational Health and Safety Administration.

Where Kennedy gave speeches about detente, Nixon negotiated the greatest arms treaties since the Washington Naval Agreement — SALT I and the ABM treaty — ended decades of hostility between the U.S. and the People's Republic of China, rescued Israel in the Yom Kippur War, and pulled Egypt out of the Soviet bloc into the U.S. camp.

Creating a new majority that would dominate presidential politics until 1992, Nixon was rewarded with a 49-state landslide in 1972.

Whereupon a press elite that had maintained a conspiracy of silence on Kennedy's misconduct, seized on Nixon's failure to deal decisively with misconduct in his campaign to bring him down in the first successful coup d'etat in U.S. political history.

The mythologizing of JFK and demonization of Nixon tell us less about respective accomplishments than the moral character of an establishment, which, though it had lost America by '72, still controlled the culture, media, bureaucracy and Congress.

And as they brought down Nixon with Watergate, they would seek to bring down Reagan with Iran-Contra. But that coup failed.

Evolution debate again engulfs Texas board

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — The long-simmering battle over teaching evolution in Texas boiled over at a late-night meeting, as the Board of Education extended preliminary approval of new science books for use in classrooms across the state but held up one biology text because of alleged factual errors.

With midnight looming, some of the state education board members singled out a textbook by Pearson Education, one of America's largest publishers, on Thursday. Many of the 20 concerns pertained to the theory of evolution. After a lengthy debate that got testy at times, the board voted to have three of its members pick a trio of outside experts to further scrutinize the book.

If the issues can be resolved, it will win approval. But if not, it will be returned to the board for consideration at its January meeting.

Textbook and classroom curriculum battles have long raged in Texas pitting creationists — those who see God's hand in the creation of the universe — against academics who worry about religious and political ideology trumping scientific fact. At issue this time are proposed high school textbooks that could be used statewide starting next school year and through 2022 at least.

The board is scheduled to vote again on all the proposed books at a meeting

later Friday, then take final votes in January.

State law approved two years ago means school districts can now choose their own books and don't have to adhere to a list recommended by the Board of Education — but most have continued to use approved books.

What Texas decides is important nationally since it is so large that many books prepared for publication in the state also are marketed elsewhere around the country.

Publishers submitted proposed textbooks this summer, but committees of Texas volunteer reviewers — some nominated by creationists who are current and former Board of Education members — raised objections. One argued that creationism based on biblical texts should be taught in science classes, while others objected that climate change wasn't as settled a scientific matter as some of the proposed books said.

Pearson and many other major publishers weren't

willing to make suggested major edits and changes, however. Indeed, Pearson has challenged the 20 alleged errors that the citizen review panel claims are in the biology book.

The concerns raised included how long it took Earth to cool and objection to lessons about natural selection because "selection operates as a selective but not a creative force," according to reviewers.

Delaying the book's approval pending outside review was a proposal

championed by some of the most conservative members among the board's 10 Republicans. But its five Democrats joined with more-moderate Republicans in questioning whether reviewers' objections were factually correct.

"I believe this process is being hijacked, this book is being held hostage to make political changes," said Thomas Ratliff, a Republican from Mount Pleasant who is vice chairman of the Board of Education.

He said he believed the

same biology book was already being used in "over half of the classrooms in the United States."

"To ask me — a business degree major from Texas Tech University — to distinguish whether the Earth cooled 4 billion years ago or 4.2 billion years ago for purposes of approving a textbook at 10:15 on a Thursday night is laughable," Ratliff said.

Colleagues on the other side of the debate shot back that they "weren't laughing."

OKC bomb squad says suspicious item was a burrito

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) — A burrito caused a minor scare at an Oklahoma City police briefing station after a man brought the foil-wrapped object in for analysis.

Oklahoma City Police Capt. Dexter Nelson says a man discovered a Thermostype container in his lawn Thursday afternoon and brought it to a police briefing station. Nelson says the container was heavy and had tinfoil protruding from the lid, so the man considered it suspicious.

The Oklahoman reports that officers told the man to leave the container outside and the police bomb squad X-rayed the item. The analysis determined that it was only a burrito.

Although it was harmless, police aren't laughing at the incident. Nelson says anyone who finds a suspicious object should call authorities — not bring it to a police station themselves.

dining chain's future is so upbeat that he's named it "Bleeding Green 25/8."

When it opens, the Pampa Bennigan's is expected to employ between 60 to 80 full- and part-time workers.

The restaurant will be located within Edwin Park, a retail and commercial development with five businesses fronting Perryton Parkway and a planned housing community behind a privacy wall with single-story duplexes, a playground and an events center.

Edwin Park is being developed by a Pampa-based company called Open Range on the site of the former Pampa Middle School.

PMS closed in the spring of 2010 and classes began at the new Pampa Junior High School in the fall of that year.

The middle school was built in 1958 and several additions were added over the years, with the last in 1998. The property in-

cludes 18.3 acres of property.

The Pampa Independent School District sold the old school and property to Open Range for \$75,000 on the condition that the developer must abate, or remove, all of the asbestos and then demolish the old building within three years of the closing date, which was Aug. 28.

A groundbreaking ceremony for Edwin Park was held on a frigid Saturday in late March, while a "garage sale" was held throughout the hallways to sell off school furniture, lockers, books and even vinyl records.

At that time, company officials said construction would start by the end of the year, but anybody driving by the old middle school can see that the demolition is far from completed.

Several attempts were made to contact Dan Miller, the project manager for Edwin Park, to inquire on the status of the project.

An Open Range employee said Miller was on vacation this week.

YouTube video of one equipment manufacturer's CEO doing a product release up on a stage, wearing a polo shirt and jeans and a wraparound microphone, his image magnified a hundred times on the screen behind him.

Jerry Jones: Garrett will be Cowboys coach in 2014

IRVING, Texas (AP) — Jason Garrett will start the stretch run in pursuit of his first trip to the playoffs on the same field where he debuted as coach of the Dallas Cowboys three years ago.

His job doesn't depend on whether he gets that postseason berth. At least that's what owner Jerry Jones said Thursday.

While saying he was "disappointed" in a 5-5 record that has dropped the Cowboys out of the top spot in the NFC East for the first time this season, Jones said Garrett will return in 2014 regardless of whether the Cowboys end their three-year playoff drought.

"I'm disappointed we don't have a better record, but he has got us in position to win the division and got a team here I firmly believe has the ability to be one of the better playing teams at the end," said Jones, addressing about a dozen reporters on the team's practice field. "A lot of this story is to be played out. It does not have a bearing on

whether or not he will be our coach next year. It has no bearing on that."

Asked if Garrett would be his coach next year, Jones twice said yes.

The Cowboys are a half-game behind idle Philadelphia (6-5) going into an important division game at the New York Giants (4-6), who can tie Dallas for second after starting the season 0-6.

Garrett wasn't sentimental about returning to the site of his first game — a 33-20 win after Wade Phillips was fired with the Cowboys at 1-7 in 2010 — and he wasn't particularly moved when told of Jones' comments.

"We're talking about practicing well today," said Garrett, who was a backup to Troy Aikman in the 1990s and was hired by Jones as offensive coordinator in 2007 before Phillips was named head coach. "That's what we're going to focus on, and that's something we emphasize to our team. That's something we have to live as a coaching staff."

The Cowboys finish the regular season at home against the Eagles. They have lost a playoffs-or-bust finale to a division rival each of Garrett's two full seasons.

All big league ballparks to screen fans in 2014

CAMBRIDGE, Mass. (AP) — Baseball fans should expect to go through a metal detector to see their favorite team play in 2014.

Major League Baseball security director John Skinner said on Friday that all 30 teams are expected to screen all fans entering their ballparks next season. Some aspects of the

screening will be left to individual teams, but the commissioner's office is planning to recommend walk-through metal detectors, he said.

"It's the reality, unfortunately, of this world," Skinner said at the Ivy Sports Symposium at the Harvard Law School. "Ultimately, it will happen."

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A-Rod, MLB await decision, expected in January

NEW YORK (AP) — Now the waiting begins for Alex Rodriguez and Major League Baseball.

A-Rod's grievance hearing to overturn his 211-game suspension ended Thursday when both sides rested their cases, a day after the New York Yankees third baseman angrily walked out and decided not to testify in his own defense.

The sides set a schedule to file briefs by Dec. 11 and reply

briefs by Dec. 21, which will close the record and submit the matter to arbitrator Fredric Horowitz.

His decision on whether to uphold or alter the discipline for the three-time AL MVP likely will be made in January, a person familiar with the proceedings told The Associated Press. The person spoke on condition of anonymity because no statements were authorized.

852 Thai children set human Christmas tree record

BANGKOK (AP) — Christmas is not a holiday in predominantly Buddhist Thailand, and its palm trees outnumber pines, but the country still set a world record with its holiday spirit.

One of the country's largest shopping malls arranged a publicity stunt involving 852 schoolchildren dressed in green and red hoodies to break the Guinness World Record for the largest human Christmas tree. They outdid a German record of 672 participants in 2011.

To the relief of parents, and the chagrin of a few teenagers, the children were not hoisted onto a human pyramid shaped like a conifer.

It was more an exercise in crowd control, grouping the assembled 6- to 15-year-olds into a tree-like formation on the ground.

"I kind of thought we'd get to stand on each other's shoulders," said 13-year-old Nat-takit Liewkulnattana. Like most participants at the event, he doesn't celebrate Christmas. He wasn't sure whose birthday the holiday marks ("Santa Claus?") but was

excited to take part in a world record, and maybe get something in return.

"I want presents!" the teen said. All participants got to keep their hoodies.

The record was set in 15 minutes, 29 seconds.

Guinness representative Fortuna Burke certified the feat, counting on a clicker as children filed onto an outdoor verandah at Siam Paragon mall, the event's organizer.

Once in place, the children waved as a drone flew overhead to capture aerial images.

Although Christmas does not appear on Thai calendars and is a regular workday, hotels and shopping malls decorate starting in mid-November for what is a big shopping season during Thailand's peak tourism months.

This also set other off-beat records this year. On Valentine's Day, a couple set a record for longest kiss (58 hours, 35 minutes and 58 seconds). Also in February, nearly 4,483 people swung hula hoops for seven minutes, a record for the most people dancing with hula hoops simultaneously in one place.

More than dozen hurt in Amarillo bus accident

AMARILLO (AP) — More than a dozen students have been hurt in a Texas Panhandle traffic accident involving a school bus and a car.

Amarillo police say no students were seriously injured in Thursday afternoon's accident involving a bus hauling Amarillo Independent School District students on a field trip. Police say the bus carried 41 children from de Zavala Middle School and the driver.

Police say 13 students were transported to hospitals, as a precaution. The bus driver declined to be taken to a hospital.

The driver of the car that clipped the left front of the bus was also taken to a hospital with injuries not believed to be life threatening.

Police are trying to determine the cause of the crash.

Another school bus picked up students who weren't hurt.

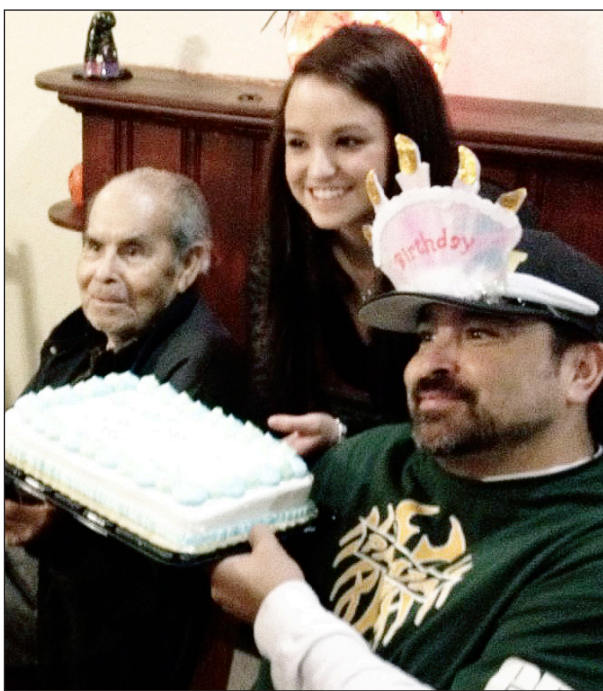

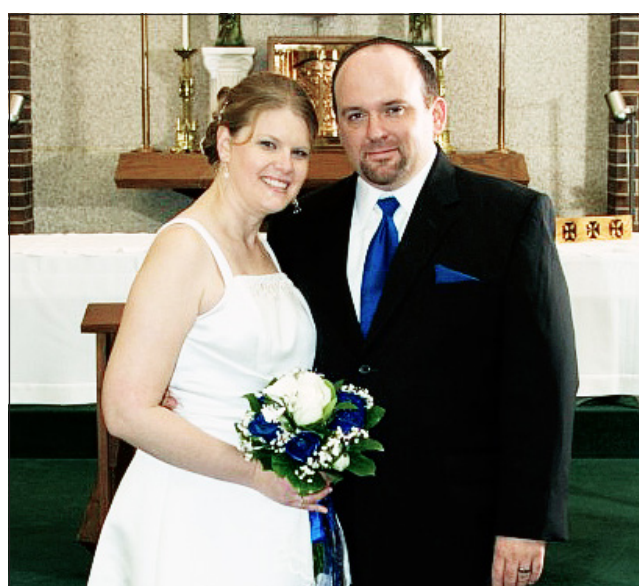

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Navy Yard gunman had access pulled

WASHINGTON (AP) — The company that employed the Washington Navy Yard shooter pulled his access to classified material for two days in August when mental health problems became evident, but restored it quickly and never told Navy officials about the withdrawal, The Associated Press has learned.

An initial Navy review revealed that the Fort Lauderdale, Fla.-based company, The Experts, ordered computer contractor Aaron Alexis back to Washington, D.C., after a police incident in Rhode Island in August, according to senior U.S. officials. The company then withdrew its ability to access secret-level data for two days, said the officials, who spoke on condition of anonymity because they were not authorized to publicly discuss the investigation. It did not disclose why this access was reinstated. Less than six weeks later, the former Navy reservist gunned down 12 civilian workers in a Navy Yard building, and police fatally shot him.

The Experts did not immediately return messages seeking comment. The classified access revelation has raised questions about whether the company's disclosure of the discipline could have brought Alexis to Navy officials' attention earlier and perhaps prevented the massacre. The Navy did an initial review into the matter, but it has not yet been released. Officials also have done a full investigation, including what prompted the company's decision and why the government was never told. Naval leaders now

are reviewing that report. The shooting spree triggered several Navy and Defense Department reviews into base security and contractor requirements, including questions about how thorough the background checks are for security clearances and whether more vigilant monitoring and reassessments should be done.

While the Navy reviews have not been released, Navy Secretary Ray Mabus has sent out a notice to the fleet directing all commanders and civilian leaders in the Navy to scrutinize the records of any personnel who are allowed to access classified information.

In the message, Mabus said that this new records review should look at credit card delinquencies, discipline, police or legal reports and urinalysis reports.

Mabus said that if information is discovered that had not been disclosed already, it must be reported, and commanders must determine whether the employee's access to classified data should be cut off. He ordered commanders to submit full reports to Navy and Marine leaders on what they found and any actions taken by mid-January.

According to officials familiar with the Navy investigation, The Experts removed Alexis' access to secret information on August 7 and restored access on August 9, but there is nothing in the record explaining the decisions. The timing, however, aligns with the day Alexis called Newport, R.I., police, complaining that voices were harassing him through a wall at his hotel

and he worried they might harm him.

Police said they were called to the Marriott around 6 a.m. on Aug. 7, and Alexis told them he was in town as a naval contractor and that he believed people were following him and using a microwave machine to send vibrations into his body so he could not fall asleep. Police alerted the local Navy base that day that Aaron Alexis was hearing voices, but the information went no further.

Under U.S. rules, The Experts was required to report any behavior that could be considered detrimental to security, and that information was supposed to be passed along to the commander at the Washington Navy Yard.

Alexis began working at the Navy Yard this summer refreshing computer systems.

The Experts said it ran two background checks on Alexis that turned up only a traffic violation. It also said the Pentagon confirmed twice that Alexis had a valid security clearance.

Alexis was granted a secret-level security clearance while in the Navy, and it carried over when he went to work as a computer contractor. He was granted access to the Washington Navy Yard and to Building 197 as an employee of The Experts, a Hewlett-Packard sub-contractor.

Hewlett-Packard Co. has said it was severing ties with The Experts, saying the company failed to respond appropriately to Alexis' mental health issues. HP has told U.S. officials that it did not receive any adverse information

reports on Alexis before the September 16 shooting.

In a note he left behind and found by investigators after the shooting, Alexis claimed that he was driven to the shooting rampage because he was being bombarded by extremely low-frequency radio waves. The FBI has said that the note, along with peculiar carved notations on his gun, suggested he was in the throes of profound paranoia and delusions.

His shotgun, which he purchased two days before the shooting from

a gun shop in Virginia, was etched with messages including "My ELF Weapon!" — an apparent reference to extremely low-frequency waves — and "End to The Torment!"

In response to the shooting, Mabus ordered a series of reviews, including four quick studies on Alexis' Navy career, contractor obligations, the security clearance process and physical base security. He also ordered two longer reviews — one on physical security and one encompassing a full investigation into exactly how

the events of the shooting unfolded. All six reviews have been completed, but they have not yet been released.

Mabus said that investigation into the shooting must determine whether HP and The Experts complied with background investigation requirements; find out who knew about the August police incident and clearance action; figure out what happened and whether it was reported as required; and if government or military officials were notified, find out whether proper procedures were followed.

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Son of Mexican cartel leader arrested at US border

SAN DIEGO (AP) — The son of one of the world's most wanted drug lords was arrested at an Arizona border crossing to face drug trafficking charges in the United States, authorities said Friday.

Serafin Zambada, 23, was arrested Wednesday afternoon while crossing the border from Mexico in Nogales, Ariz., with his wife, said Kelly Thornton, a spokeswoman for the U.S. attorney's office in San Diego. The wife was eventually released, Thornton said.

Zambada's father is Ismael "El Mayo" Zambada, who survived decades of turf wars and rose to the top of Mexico's underworld through savvy deal-brokering. Ismael Zambada is considered the strategist of Mexico's Sinaloa cartel, more involved in daily operations than his better-known boss, Joaquin "El Chapo" Guzman.

Serafin Zambada, a U.S. citizen, was scheduled to appear before a federal judge in Tucson, Ariz., on Monday to determine if he is eligible for bail. Prosecutors plan to ask that he be sent to San Diego to face federal charges of conspiracy to import methamphetamine and cocaine, and

criminal forfeiture. The younger Zambada's attorney, Saji Vettiyl, said his client would fight the charges.

"My client is looking forward to the day when he can clear his name in a court of law. He has absolute faith in the legal system," Vettiyl said.

Serafin Zambada, also called "Sera," is not known in Mexico for involvement in the drug trade. His indictment filed under seal in San Diego on Sept. 27 offers little detail, saying only that he conspired to bring at least 500 grams of methamphetamine and 5 kilograms of cocaine to the U.S.

He was born in San Diego, said Thornton, who confirmed that he is Ismael Zambada's son. Amy Roderick, a spokeswoman for the U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration, also confirmed the identity.

Ismael Zambada is an old-fashioned capo in an era of younger kingpins known for their flamboyant lifestyles of club-hopping and brutal tactics of beheading, dismembering and even skinning their rivals. While the elder Zambada fights challengers, he is known for concentrating on the business side of drug trafficking and avoiding

the gruesome violence that draws attention.

Ismael Zambada faces several indictments in the United States, including one that accuses the kingpin and another son of using planes, boats, trucks and cars to move nearly \$50 million worth of cocaine from Colombia to New York, New Jersey, Chicago and California between August 2001 and June 2002.

The other son, Vicente Zambada, was arrested in 2009 in Mexico City and extradited to the United States. He awaits trial in Chicago.

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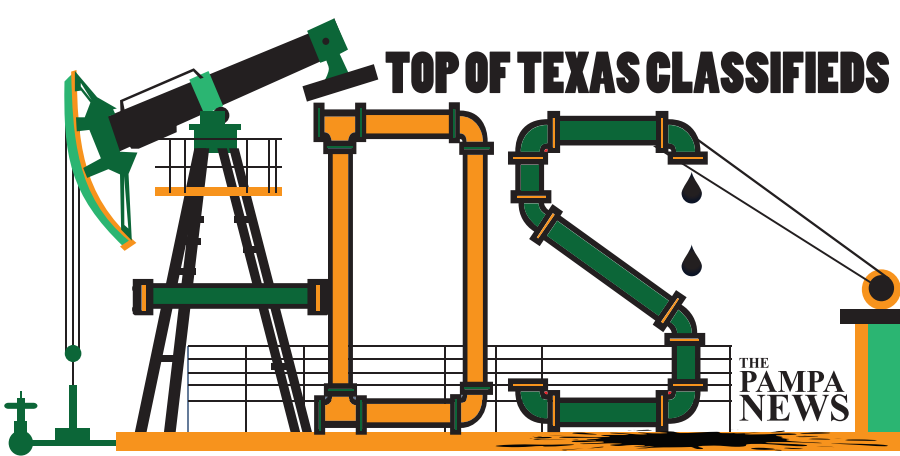
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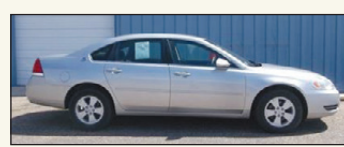


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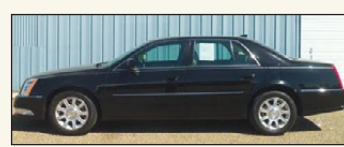
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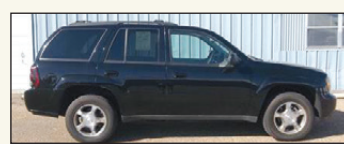
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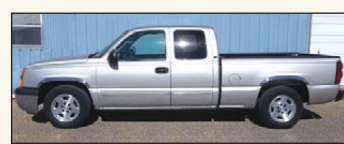
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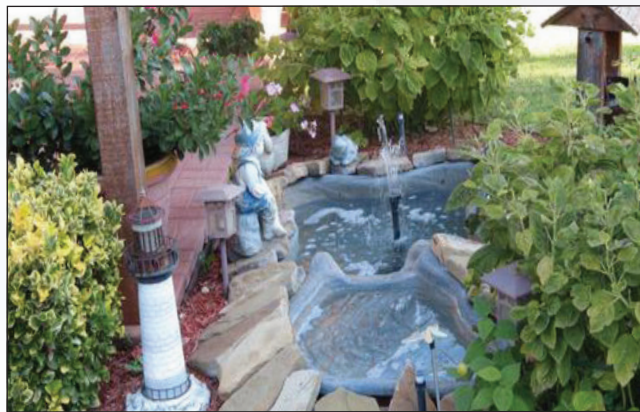

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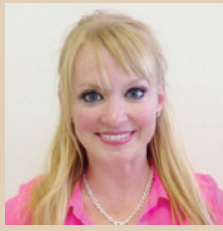
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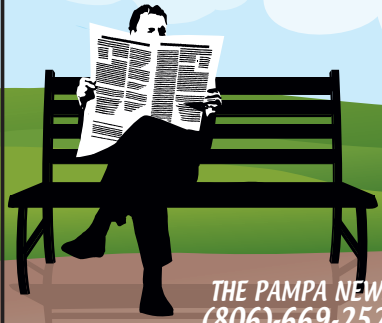
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Dear Abby...

DEAR ABBY: I am a 15-year-old girl. Recently I made a new friend, "Mandy," and confided to her about my dark past of depression. When I explained how I used to cut myself, she burst into tears and told me she had cut herself the day before. I didn't expect that response.

I know from experience that what Mandy is doing is not a good way to handle things. What stopped me from cutting was getting a permanent scar from it. Although plenty of people told me that cutting was no way to deal with my pain, the only one I listened to in the end was myself.

I really want Mandy to stop. I told her not to do it, but I'm afraid she will anyway. She's an amazing person, and she doesn't deserve the pain she is causing herself. How can I help her? — **BEEN THERE IN SAN FRANCISCO**

DEAR BEEN THERE: Continue encouraging your friend to stop cutting, but if she's not able to, she may need professional help to quit. It is nothing to be ashamed of.

A counselor at school might be able to help if Mandy is willing to talk to one. But if she isn't, then tell your mother about this so she can let Mandy's mother know what's going on. Cutting can be a sign of serious depression, and secrets of this kind are destructive.

DEAR ABBY: I'm 19 and in college on a scholarship. I have decided to declare an art major. I have found a part-time job that will give me a little extra income — figure modeling for some of the art classes. This would include both clothed and nude modeling.

It isn't the only job I plan on taking, but it will help me out for the time being. Studying the human figure is essential for any art student, and it is something that has been done for centuries. When I told my parents, it was

not well-received.

My mother strongly disagreed with my choice and handed the phone to my sister, who told me if I want to take my clothes off I should be a stripper. Abby, this hurt me deeply. My dad is worried that it will ruin my reputation. I find it hypocritical because my mom was an art major and her portfolio contains nude figures she drew.

My school is diligent about the safety and respect of its models, and I trust them. I'd like to take this job for the experience, and it will allow me to make more connections within the department I'll be studying in for the next two years.

I'm not looking for my parents' approval, but I wish they would attempt to understand. What would you suggest? — **SERIOUS STUDENT IN VIRGINIA**

DEAR SERIOUS STUDENT: Having studied figure drawing myself years ago, I can attest to the fact that models of all ages were used — both nude and clothed. There was nothing lurid or sexual about it, and the models were not posed in a suggestive manner or being ogled.

If you wish to display your body in the context of an art class, you shouldn't have to justify it to your parents or your sister. Your mother appears to have a short memory, and your sister's comment was out of line.

DEAR ABBY: My 12-year-old son still calls me Mommy. My daughter, who is two years older, calls me Mom. I don't want to hurt my son's feelings, but I think at his age he should transition to calling me Mom. What do you think? Should I just give it time, or is there an age limit for calling one's mother Mommy? — **JUST MOM IN FLORIDA**

DEAR JUST MOM: I think you should keep your mouth shut. There is nothing shameful or wrong about a son calling his mother Mommy

if that is what he has done all his life. Frankly, it's rather sweet, and it's far more loving than some of the names people have written to me when referring to their mothers.

DEAR ABBY: My husband and I have the same argument every year around Thanksgiving. He says there is a difference between stuffing and dressing. I say they're the same thing, except that stuffing is baked in the turkey, while dressing is baked separately in a casserole dish.

My husband insists I'm wrong -- that the difference has nothing to do with how it's cooked. He thinks stuffing is made with regular bread, while dressing is made with cornbread.

The debate is driving me crazy. Will you please tell me who is right? -- **STUFFING VS. DRESSING IN OHIO**

DEAR STUFFING VS. DRESSING: The terms "dressing" and "stuffing" are interchangeable. They refer to a seasoned mixture used to stuff meat or poultry. It makes no difference what kind of bread is used.

Some tips: If you plan to stuff your turkey, be sure all the ingredients are pre-cooked (i.e. vegetables, fruit, meat, seafood). Using pasteurized liquid eggs is safer than using raw eggs. The bird should be loosely stuffed, not packed because stuffing expands while cooking, and the turkey should be stuffed right before it is put into the oven, never ahead of time.

The stuffing takes the longest of the bird's components to reach the desired safe temperature (165 degrees). Once the stuffing is in the turkey, it should not be removed until the turkey is ready to be carved.

DEAR ABBY: My husband and I have lived here for 20 years, and so have our lovely, gracious and caring neighbors. We haven't had any new

neighbors for years -- until now.

My husband has met the couple in passing, but I haven't yet. There has been a lot of activity over there, what with moving in, etc. As a neighbor, when and how should I approach them and offer my welcome to the neighborhood? Should I bring them something? If so, what's the best thing? -- **KATE IN QUINCY, MASS.**

DEAR KATE: I can tell by your question that the folks in your neighborhood are indeed "lovely, gracious and caring." The first thing you should bring the new neighbors is a warm smile. And it wouldn't hurt if along with it you brought a plate of edible treats and an offer to refer them to the nearest market, dry cleaner, your shoe repair shop and a reliable plumber.

DEAR ABBY: My dad came into my room and told me he and my mom were having problems -- that they were thinking about getting divorced. I can't imagine living without them or having to choose who I want to live with. Every child needs her mother, but Dad is the one who has always been there for me. Should I just live with my grandparents and see how that works out? What should I

do? -- **BAFFLED IN THE SOUTH**

DEAR BAFFLED: It was wrong of your father to talk to you about this before anything had been decided between him and your mother. I realize that my telling you that my worry about this would do no good because being upset is perfectly natural in these circumstances.

Your father may have spoken prematurely, so

KEEP THAT IN MIND. You should talk to both of your parents about this. If you are close to your grandparents, discuss it with them, too, since you feel you might like to live with them to avoid hurting either parent.

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Massachusetts teacher's throat cut, note left

SALEM, Mass. (AP) — The body of a popular Massachusetts teacher who police say was killed by one of her students was found in the woods, naked from the waist down and with her throat slit and a note that read, "I hate you all," according to court documents released Friday.

The search warrant application was released after requests by The Associated Press, The Boston Globe and other media organizations.

Philip Chism, a 14-year-old soccer player who moved from Clarksville, Tenn., at the beginning of the school year, is charged with murder, aggravated rape and armed robbery in the Oct. 22 death of 24-year-old Danvers High School math teacher Colleen Ritzer. His attorney, Denise Regan, said Friday she had no comment. He is being held without bail.

Police have not released a motive. Autopsy results have not been made public.

A student whose name was concealed in the documents told police that the day of the killing, she had stayed after class for help and heard Ritzer and Chism talking.

Ritzer mentioned Tennessee, and Chism appeared

upset, but the teacher didn't appear to notice and kept talking about it. When Ritzer did notice, she changed the subject, but the student noticed Chism talking to himself.

According to the documents, surveillance video showed Chism putting on gloves and wearing a hood as he followed Ritzer into a bathroom. The documents say he brought a box cutter, mask, gloves and multiple changes of clothing to school that day.

Ritzer was reported missing when she never returned home. Her body was found on the ground in woods near the school, partly covered in leaves, and police said it appeared to be sexually positioned. Authorities say she had been sexually assaulted with a stick. A recycling barrel was nearby.

A timeline in the documents that's based on surveillance video indicates a student may have seen part of the crime. As Chism and Ritzer are apparently in the bathroom together, a female student walks in, then quickly walks out. The student later said a person with dark skin appeared to be changing

clothes. Chism is biracial; Ritzer was white.

One minute later, Chism walks out of the bathroom wearing a hood over his head. Nine minutes after that, he pulls a recycling barrel into the bathroom, then through the school and outside.

Chism, who had been spotted at a movie theater after the killing, was found walking along a highway in a neighboring town around 12:30 a.m. A police officer looked in his backpack and found a bloodstained box cutter, according to the documents.

Asked where it came from, Chism replied, "The girl."

He also had Ritzer's credit cards and driver's license. He said he found them at a supermarket, then said he got them out of Ritzer's car.

Police questioned his mother, who told them that the family had recently moved from Tennessee and that it had been a stressful divorce. No one answered the door Friday at the Danvers home where Chism lived with his mother, two siblings and an aunt.

The search warrant documents list items taken from

the house by police, including a Dell computer, papers, two memory cards and two USB drives.

Court records indicate Chism's parents had difficulties early in their marriage. In a parenting plan included in 2001 divorce papers, his mother, Diana, insisted on

supervising any time her husband, Stacy, had with their son and a younger daughter. She cited "prior physical and emotional abuse as well as alcohol abuse" by her husband. Both adults signed the papers.

The divorce was apparently never finalized after both

parents signed an order stating they wanted to attempt to reconcile.

Shortly after the killing, Diana Chism released a statement through her son's public defender saying she was heartbroken for Ritzer's family.

Driver in pond crash lacked valid license

MINNEAPOLIS (AP) — The woman who was driving a car filled with children when it veered off a suburban Minneapolis highway ramp and plunged into 9 feet of water did not have a valid driver's license, authorities said.

Two of the five children died, authorities confirmed Friday, while three remained hospitalized a day after the crash. The five children, ages 1 to 7, were removed from the car after it was towed into shallower water.

The driver, Marion Guerrero, was the mother of three of the children; the other two children were her boyfriend's. She had a Minnesota driver's permit but not a license, said State Patrol Lt.

Eric Roeske. Guerrero's permit was considered invalid because she was not driving with a licensed driver, as required, at the time of the crash, he said.

The crash happened Thursday morning in St. Louis Park. Guerrero was driving northwest on Highway 7 toward Highway 100 on the damp roadway when the 1998 Pontiac Grand Am went into a storm water pond, the State Patrol said.

Guerrero escaped and screamed for help, but the children were trapped inside as the car sank in water that was 8 to 9 feet deep, said State Patrol Lt. Eric Roeske. Passers-by unsuccessfully tried to rescue the children before police arrived.

"Obviously it was a very chaotic situation, a very unusual situation because of a number of factors: the temperature of the water, the depth, no information about initially what had happened," Roeske said. "All we knew were there were kids in a vehicle at the bottom of a pond."

Roeske said rescuers pulled the children out one by one. The first child was pulled from the water about 25 minutes after the crash was reported, and the last one was in the water for about 45 minutes.

Authorities confirmed Friday that two of them — 5-year-old Zenavia Rennie and 7-year-old Alarious Coleman-Guerrido — had died. The other three children — Aliyana Rennie, 1, Amani Coleman-Guerrido, 5, and Zarihana Rennie, 6 — remained hospitalized in critical condition, according to family attorney Rick Petry.

Alarious Coleman-Guerrido, Amani Coleman-Guerrido and Aliyana Rennie are the driver's children.

It was not immediately clear whether the children were in seat belts or child seats, and Roeske said authorities were still investigating where they were headed. The investigation is likely to take several weeks.

"We have not identified anything or ruled out anything at this time, other than alcohol," Roeske said, adding that there was no evidence Guerrero had been drinking. "We have received no information nor have encountered any evidence that would indicate it was an intentional act, but the investigation continues."

He said once the investigation is complete, the case would be forwarded to the Hennepin County Attorney's Office to determine if charges will be filed.

The intersection near this ramp has seen 18 crashes from 2010-2012, including one last year in which another vehicle went into the same storm water pond, said Minnesota Department of Transportation spokeswoman-an Bobbie Dahlke.

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
