N. Hobart St., was burglarized. Cash and various electronic items were stolen. Two days later, Hastings in Las Pampa Square was burglarized during the night and various electronic items were reported missing. On Monday, detectives from the Pampa Police

Department, with assistance from Hutchinson County Sheriff's Office, identified Rodger Dale Daniells Jr. as a suspect in both incidents. Daniells later admitted to being involved in both of the burglaries. On Thursday, Daniells was taken into custody by Hutchison County authorities for the burglary of a building warrant obtained

In addition to the burglaries here in Pampa, Daniells also has been linked to several burglaries in the Amarillo area. The status of those investigations is unknown to PPD at this time.

Daniells was awaiting arraignment Thursday and no bond had been set.

Downtown Christmas parade canceled

The Christmas parade scheduled for 2 p.m. Saturday has been canceled due to the cold temperatures and snow predicted for the weekend.

She said the horse-drawn carriage rides will only be canceled if there is ice on the road, which would make it dangerous for the horse owners to haul trailers.

Patrons at Yum Yum Thai Restaurant would probably guess that the owners, Eugene and Phonephilou Sengvixay, who make the rounds from table to table waiting on customers, are from Southeast

However, they are not from Thailand, the nation that is the origin of their cuisine. The Sengvixays and their cooks — who Eugene calls his "three super chefs" — are from Laos, a landlocked country that borders Thailand.

The couple have owned the restaurant in Las Pampas Square for about a year and three months,

said Eugene, who goes by the nickname "Mee." 'We took over from the previous owners, who also called it Yum Yum Thai," he said.

The restaurant is a popular lunch destination in Pampa with specials for only \$4.99. The portions are generous and the fried rice is always good.

Mee said he moved from Loas to Chicago in 1981 after living for a year in Thailand. He was 10 years old when he moved to the U.S. and his was with his family of seven. There was an American sponsor in

What voters will be looking for

Of course, that's not really news. The 22nd Amendment to the U.S. Constitution — passed in 1947 by a Republican Congress and ratified in 1951 by three-fourths of the states — declares, "no person shall be elected to the office of president more than twice." So twice-elected Obama would not be able to run in 2016 for a third term (saying nothing of his recently falling poll numbers).

That Amendment is vivid proof of the "law of unintended consequences." Unable to defeat Franklin Delano Roosevelt in any of his four winning White House campaigns, Republicans, after his death in 1945, set off to exact posthumous vengeance on him by limiting all future presidents to two terms. The irony is that in the last 62 years, probably only two U.S. presidents — if it had been legal and they had been willing — could have run successfully for a third term in the White House. And both popular chief executives - Dwight Eisenhower

and Ronald Reagan (who, after leaving office, urged repeal of the amendment) — were, as we recall, Republicans.

So if voters will be choosing a new commander in chief in 2016, what specific qualities will they be looking for? Be attentive, because I am about to share a dark secret of the "Secret Society of Political Pundits.'

When a president's performance or conduct in office disappoints us, we look for a candidate who possesses qualities we regrettably learned were missing in the flawed predecessor.

Think about recent presidential elections. In

1976, after the criminality and corruption of Watergate and the failed presidency of Richard Nixon — a man whose credentials included service as a congressman, senator and vice president — former one-term Georgia Gov. Jimmy Carter's total lack of Washington experience, along with his repeated pledge never to lie to the American people, were valued by the voters as real virtues.

Carter was honest, intelligent, hard-working and the least "imperial" of presidents. But he seemed to change his mind an awful lot. So, after just one term and difficult economic times, voters overwhelmingly chose the self-confident Reagan, who had not changed his mind since 1964. Again, voters were looking for what was missing in the president who had disappointed.

The same pattern was evident when Reagan's Republican successor, George H. W. Bush, was running for reelection in challenging economic times, and voters doubted the president fully understood the hardships they were undergoing. When Bush appeared confounded by the electronic scanner at the supermarket checkout. Democrat Bill Clinton persuaded voters: "I feel your pain." The electorate found the empathy they were seeking.

After eight years of George W. Bush, whose invasion and occupation of Iraq were viewed as unwise and unpopular like his response to Hurricane Katrina, and whose broken syntax had become a late-night punch line, voters embraced Obama's intellect, eloquence and early opposition to the Iraq

What about 2016? It's a good bet we'll be looking for a candidate who has successfully run something large like a state, has been able to work productively with political adversaries and projects optimism that can inspire confidence about the nation's future. Know anyone who qualifies?

No mercy from Obama this Thanksgiving

Another Thanksgiving has passed without a presidential commutation for Clarence Aaron, who, at age 24,

> was sentenced to life without parole for a first-time nonviolent drug conviction in 1993.

President Barack Obama has the unfettered power to pardon ex-cons and commute the sentences of federal inmates. Yet this term, he has used

that power to commute the sentences of turkeys only — no people, even though the American Civil Liberties Union figures that close to 2,000 nonviolent offenders are serving sentences of life without parole in federal prisons.

Aaron was not a buyer or a seller but a facilitator who hooked up two professional drug dealers. All but one of Aaron's confederates has been released from prison. His remaining co-defendant is due for release next year.

Why did Aaron get the longest time? He didn't testify against the higher-ups, who sold or bought 9 kilograms of cocaine and planned to traffic another 15 kilograms. They cooperated with authorities. Also, the buyer planned to convert the powder cocaine into crack (which carries a harsher federal mandatory

minimum sentence). The government was able to charge defendants for quantities not traded. Because Aaron didn't know how to game the system like a pro, he got life without

That's a misleading term, according to Julie Stewart, president of Families Against Mandatory Minimums. It's not a sentence of life as much as a sentence to live until you die in prison.

In 2007, President George W. Bush asked the Department of Justice pardon attorney to revisit its recommendation to deny Aaron a commutation. Pardon attorney Ronald Rodgers told the White House he still believed that Aaron's petition should be denied. Problem is, according to a 2012 inspector general's report, Rodgers withheld vital information on the case — that the sentencing judge and prosecutor's office had reversed their staunch opposition to a commutation.

Even though he misled the previous president, Rodgers remains on the job. Attorney General Eric Holder gives lip service to reforming the draconian sentencing system, yet after winning re-election, his boss has not shown mercy to a single nonviolent offender.

"Pardon Power" blogger P.S. Ruckman Jr. rates the Obama administration as "one of the most merciless in history." Bush had a better

I can hear apologists leap to the president's defense. Obama dare not use this power, they pant, because Republicans would slam him for it.

For those critics, I have two words: Eugenia Jennings. Never heard of her? That's

because there was no hue and cry when Obama commuted the Illinois woman's sentence in 2011 in time for her to make it home for Christmas. She is the only recipient of an Obama commutation.


Jennings was an 18-year-old mother when she was sentenced to 22 years for her third drug offense selling a small amount of crack cocaine to a federal informant. She clearly was no criminal mastermind, but in prison, she wised up and earned an electrician's diploma.

Jennings died from leukemia in October.

The Alton Telegraph reports that 200 people attended a standingroom-only service for a woman whom "many hold as a symbol of strength and redemption."

There is nothing stopping Obama from repeating this amazing success. I have to figure he just doesn't care.

Real charity in the spirit of Christmas

'Tis the season for giv-

someone? Social workers say, "Don't give to beggars." Those who do give are "enablers,"

you know

STOSSEL helping alcoholics and drug users to continue bad habits. It's better to give to charities that help the "homeless." I put "homeless" in quotes because my TV producers have quietly followed a dozen of the more convincing beggars after "work," and all had homes.

Once, I put on a fake beard and begged for an hour. At the rate money was coming in, I would have made ninety bucks in an eight-hour day -\$23,000 per year, tax-free! I see why people panhandle.

Their success, however, means that people who give them money, no matter how good their intentions, are not engaging in real charity. Giving may make you feel better, but it doesn't make the world

So where should we give? Charity-rating services try to separate good charities from scams, but they get conned, too. The definition of "charitable work" is rarely clear. How should the board of a nonprofit's first-class hotel expenses during a trip to Africa be classified?

That's why I give to charities I can watch. I donate to The Doe Fund, a nonprofit helping to rehabilitate ex-convicts. I saw their "Men in Blue" working near my apartment cheerfully and energetically. I thought, "Whoever's rehabbing these guys is doing something right!" So I give money to them — and to a couple other groups I can see.

Finally, I give more to charity because I'm not much of an entrepreneur. I don't have business-building skills. But for those who do, here's a novel

idea: Don't give to charity. Years ago, Ted Turner was praised for donating a billion dollars to the United Nations. He said he wanted to "guilt" other billionaires into giving more and told me Warren Buffet was "cheap" for giving too little.

At first, the idea makes

sense. Billionaires have more than they need; merely chasing more profit seems selfish.

But giving it a second thought, I found a fallacy in Turner's argument. The U.N. is a wasteful bureaucracy, leading me to assume it squandered Turner's gift. Buffet, meanwhile, continued to direct his investors' money to growing companies. Based on Buffet's stock-picking success, his investments were probably a more productive use of capital than Turner's. Money went to people making better products, inventing better things, creating more jobs and so on. Maybe Buffet's stock picks are now funding the next Bill Gates.

Today, the real Gates spends his time giving money away. He's unusually conscientious about it. He experiments, funding what works and dropping what doesn't.

His charity work saves lives. Good for him. But Gates was also unusually skilled at bringing people better software. Had he continued doing that at Microsoft, I bet the company would have been even more productive. And Gates would have

done more for the world. I tried that thought experiment on Turner, who, in turn, unclipped his microphone and walked

off the set.

OK, so people who give away a billion dollars don't want to hear skepticism about their gift. But there's little doubt capitalism helps people more. Even rock star Bono from U2 has come to understand that. He used to call for more government spending on foreign aid. Now he says: "Aid is just a stopgap. Commerce, entrepreneurial capitalism take more people out of poverty.'

Bingo. If Bono gets it, Turner should, too.

I applaud those who give to charity, but let's not forget that it's capitalists (honest ones, not those who feed off government) who do the most for the poor.

They do more good for the world than politicians — and more even than do-gooders working for charities.


