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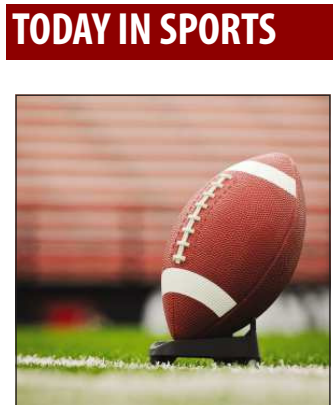

Littlefield hired to direct county's Veterans Office

U.S. Navy veteran Carrol Littlefield has been hired by Gray County to serve as veterans affairs director.

The position was full-time until Richard Dixon, who served in the Veterans Office for 14 years, recently retired.

Littlefield will work approximately 15 hours a week in the veterans' office while continuing to work full-time at the Rufe Jordan Unit as a corrections officer.

"I'm very excited," Littlefield said. "I applied for the job because I want to help out my fellow veterans and give back to the community."

Littlefield served in the Navy from 1994-98. He remembers that when he got out of the service, there was no one to inform him about the benefits that he was entitled to, and that is another reason why he applied for the job.

About 2,400 Gray County residents receive veterans' benefits.

Littlefield is originally from Tulia and has lived in Pampa for 4 1/2 years. His wife works at Pampa Regional Medical Center. He will begin his job at the Veterans Of-

Friday was move-in day for the Pampa United School District's new administration building. Wintry weather keeps troopers busy

■ Pampa gets 2.6 inches of snow, NWS reports.

In a 24-hour period beginning midday Saturday, the Department of Public Safety responded to 119 accidents in the Panhandle including several in Gray County.

Many of these wrecks included multiple vehicles within a collision and/or additional wrecks due to the first accident.

The only death reported was north of Tulia, where a pedestrian was knocked off an overpass by a passing vehicle.

These numbers do not include motorist assist in which vehicles were stuck and DPS troopers ran traffic control until a tow truck or third party could pull the vehicle out.

Also, several vehicles pulling loads were safety escorted at slow speeds by DPS

Commercial Enforcement Troopers to secure parking locations due to unsafe driving conditions. Troopers became so busy during the snowfall that they had to prioritize their calls.

The snow started falling around 11 a.m. in Pampa and continued into the night. Sunday morning, the weather was clear and cold.

Compared to other cities in the Panhandle, Pampa got a relatively light snowfall with 2.6 inches. Dalhart got 6 inches and Dumas was buried with 11.5. Some areas northwest of Pampa got around 4 inches.

Amarillo only received 2 inches. However, snowfall west of the city was heavy

enough to close down Interstate 40 for several hours.

Meteorologist Lance Goehring from the National Weather Service in Amarillo said we are close to the average for this time of year.

The December average for Amarillo is 2.8 inches and from the beginning of October until now Amarillo typically gets 5.5 inches.

The yearly average for Amarillo is 17 inches, he said.

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Obituaries

Jim Ray Jenkins

High-plains cowboy, Jim Ray Jenkins, 70, rode off into the sunset here on earth for the final time on Dec. 7, 2013 to be with his Lord, Jesus and other loved ones who have preceded him in death.

Jim Jenkins grew up in Pampa as a youth and was a 1961 graduate of Pampa High School. As a youngster in Pampa, Jim Jenkins enjoyed sports, varied school activities, and was especially involved in the school FFA program, rodeos and all western lifestyle. Throughout grade school, junior high and high school in Pampa, Jim Jenkins always held down some type of after school and summer job, ranging from his first job, delivering the Pampa Daily News to the tough oil field work in parts of the Texas Panhandle.

Jim Jenkins attended and graduated at Texas Tech with

a bachelors and masters degrees and in 1968 began his long duration at South Plains College in Levelland as an assistant professor of agriculture teaching animal science courses as well as coaching their livestock judging team. After a few years, Jim was elevated to full professor status at South Plains College, while continuing to coach the Livestock Judging team, in addition to overseeing the operations of the college farm.

Jim leaves a powerful legacy at South Plains College, as being the longest lasting employee in the history of the college (45 years of service). He affected and heavily impacted a thousand and more students, friends, family and strangers over the years in a most dynamic, positive way with his tremendous attitude and outlook on life, his splendid personality, his sense of humor and his intellect on varied related school subject content.

As the coach of the livestock judging team at South Plains College, under his direction, Jim Jenkins helped guide his team to a number of national titles and became the top judging team in the state of Texas in total wins. He retired from this coaching position in 1994, after 25 years. Due to his record at South Plains College in coaching, as well as his ongoing teaching and guidance he received many honors and acknowledgments. Among those were the Excellence InTeaching Award in 1978. In 1988 he was named the Outstanding Animal Science Alumni at Texas Tech U. In 2003 he was honored at Texas Tech, from their College of Education, at the eighth annual tribute to Teachers. These and many other accolades from his livestock judging teams are on continual display at the college.

Jim Jenkins was born on Jan. 7, 1943 in Dallas Texas to Jim Les Jenkins and Iva Estella Jenkins. He was preceded in death by his father, Jim Sr., a Marine Corps veteran who fought in World War II in Japan. His father was later transferred to Pampa where he worked for the Mobil Oil Company. Jim's mom, Iva Jenkins, also preceded him in death. While in Pampa she was a long time employee of the Pampa Daily News for more than 10 years working as a teletype operator.

Jim Jenkins's family survivors include his wife of more than 40 years, Rosemary. She is an avid horse lover, a private music teacher, as well as a once employee of South Plains College. His daughter, Jodi Beth Jenkins, who works for Sabre Technologies of Dallas, while his son, Jimmy Jr., is a rancher in Abilene. Additionally, Jim Jenkins is survived by a brother, John Jenkins, also a PHS graduate, who has spent many years as a pro football coach, college football coach, as well as financial investor, operating out of Houston, Toronto and Naples, Fla.

Jim enjoyed the true Western life on his cattle and horse ranch in Levelland as well as following Texas Rangers baseball, Dallas Cowboys football, as well as his brothers' varied football teams over the years. Jim and his wife also enjoyed going to horse shows throughout the southwest.

Celebration of life services have included a campus

memorial tribute at South Plains College on Tuesday, Dec. 10, 2013, his church service memorial on Dec. 12, 2013 at St. Michaels church in Levelland and a private family cremation service on his ranch in Levelland.

In lieu of flowers the family recommends memorials be sent to the Jim Jenkins Scholarship Fund at South Plains College, 1401 College Ave., Levelland, Texas 79336.

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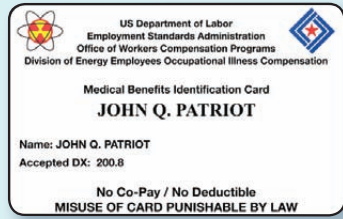

The men then begin gyrating their torsos — grinning devilishly — to play bells that are jingling inside their shorts. The bells don’t create any bulges in their shorts, but it’s not too much of a stretch of the imagination to think “Jingle Balls” instead of “Jingle Bells.” Megan Kelley Nasty said, “The jingle bells commercial with the guys in boxers is GROSS!”

Several others agreed. Cheryl Twigg Lopez said, “It has to be the Kmart commercial.... That’s disgusting.” Nancy Bell — “Stupid, vulgar Kmart commercial.” Cindy Malone Beck — “Kmart! Most annoying!” Dan L Romines — “Idiotic Kmart commercial!” Christy Hall Reeves —

“Hands down the Kmart one is awful!”

Mindy Eubank Carroll provided this insight. “What’s especially disgusting about that Kmart commercial is seeing it the first time with your daughters in the room. How’s that for a conversation piece?”

Joyce was born July 13, 1930, in McLean to Ruel and Gladys Smith. She graduated from McLean High School in 1947, received a degree from Colorado Women’s College in Denver and attended West Texas State College. She married John Morse Haynes on Jan. 22, 1950, at First Baptist Church in McLean, and they started a family of four boys and a girl.

She was a homemaker during Johnny and Joyce’s 63 years of marriage and also did anything that was needed on the ranch, including keeping the books, paying bills and cooking for the cowboys at brandings each year. Joyce was the organist at the McLean Methodist Church for many years and also played the piano for children’s Sunday School classes, among other acts of service. Joyce and Johnny were leaders of the Methodist Youth Fellowship, and in later years, Joyce was a member of the Wesley class, of which Johnny is the teacher. Her music ability included playing the accordion for local events as a young woman.

In addition to church work, Joyce served in many community activities such as heading the McLean Ex-Students Association and playing the piano at Lions Club meetings.

Her ability to tend to the business side of the ranch was a natural extension of her childhood, when she rode with her father, who was in the oil business, to drilling sites.

She was known for her chocolate pie and apricot fried pies, and neighboring cowboys especially liked her hot rolls. For several years, she and her family delivered choco-

late and pecan pies to friends at Christmas time. She also made plum jelly and chow-chow.

Joyce attended and hosted bridge club regularly until her hospitalization. She and Johnny had many friends with whom they played bridge, and later they spent many leisure hours playing cards and games with their family.

She played basketball at McLean High School and later joined the family in playing tennis, basketball, ping-pong and golf. She and Johnny traveled many miles to watch their children and grandchildren in multiple sports, and she often was busy at those games videotaping and keeping basketball and softball statistics. She also watched her husband play baseball and golf and run in long-distance races. They had adventures together traveling to their daughter’s college basketball games from Los Angeles to Madison Square Garden and following Nancy Lopez on the professional golf tour.

Joyce and Johnny’s home was known as a gathering place for friends and family to talk on the kitchen table benches and as a place for fun.

She was preceded in death by her parents and by her grandson, David Johnson.

Chicago who helped make their exodus from Laos become a reality.

At that time, the Loatian government was very oppressive, Mee said. Though conditions have improved over the years, his homeland is still dominated by a communist politburo.

Laos' population was estimated to be around 6.5 million in 2012. A third of

the country's population lives below the international poverty line which means living on less than U.S. \$1.25 per day.

The country was formerly closed to visitors, but tourism is now the nation's fastest-growing industry.

"It used to be they didn't allow anybody in but now they have opened up," he said.

After a year in Chicago, the Sengvixays moved to Amarillo, where Mee graduated from Palo Duro High School and got his first job as a bus boy at

Amarillo Country Club. He moved up from the bus boy to cook when he was hired by Mandarin Express in the Westgate Mall.

His next job was at the Levis Strauss factory in Amarillo, where he worked until the plant closed in 1998.

After that he moved to Dallas and worked for two years for a computer that upgraded computers.

Then he returned to Amarillo to work at the Clements Unit of the state prison system, a job he held for five years.

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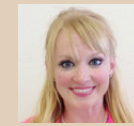


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Romo-to-Murray as Cowboys beat Redskins 24-23

LANDOVER, Md. (AP) — On fourth down, feeling the season was on the line, Tony Romo dropped back, scrambled forward and found the correct color uniform. DeMarco Murray made the catch, his momentum taking him into the end zone for the winning score.

For much of the second half, Romo and Dallas Cowboys had flirted with their usual December swoon.

A recently signed fullback lost a fumble. The quarterback threw a bad interception. An eight-point lead became a nine-point deficit. Murray lost 9 yards on a

third-and-goal at the 10 with 1:08 remaining Sunday, giving the Cowboys a 24-23 victory over the Washington Redskins.

"We just had to make a play," Dallas receiver Dez Bryant said. "Tony did a Houdini."

It's a magic moment that

matters only if the Cowboys can win one more.

The victory ended a two-game skid — as well as a four-game December losing streak — and sets up a winner-take-all, regular-season finale for the NFC East title next week, when the Cowboys (8-7) host the Philadelphia Eagles.

"Today we felt like we were playing for everything," Romo said. "Next

week will be the same thing."

The Cowboys, who beat Philadelphia 17-3 on Oct. 20, set themselves up to quash two years of 8-8, collapse-around-Christmas misery.

"I know in some ways we've gotten hit with just the fact of losing the last couple of years in the final game," Romo said.

"I think we're the only team that keeps getting themselves in position to win the NFC East every year — that's a credit. It's also a negative in the fact that we didn't do it the last couple of years."

Manning's big day leads Broncos over Texans 37-13

HOUSTON (AP) — Houston's franchise-record skid extended to 13 games with a 37-13 loss to the Denver Broncos on Sunday.

Now the Texans need a win in the season finale at Tennessee to avoid matching their franchise-record worst record of 2-14 from 2005.

It's a stunning downfall for a team that won the

AFC South the last two seasons and went 12-4 last year before injuries and poor play led to coach Gary Kubiak's firing and dropped Houston to the NFL's worst mark in 2013.

"Nobody's throwing in the towel," receiver Andre Johnson said. "(We're) just going to keep playing ... we're going to keep fighting, and hopefully it will work out for us on

Sunday."

Peyton Manning led Denver to the win with a big fourth quarter.

He regained his NFL record for most touchdown passes with 51 when he threw for 400 yards and four touchdowns, including three in the fourth quarter.

He surpassed the 50 TD passes Tom Brady threw in 2007 and led the Broncos (12-3) over the Texans (2-13), who haven't won since Sept. 15.

Manning set the record on a 25-yard pass to Julius Thomas with 4:28 remaining. Just 2 1/2 minutes earlier, he tied the mark with a 20-yard pass to Eric Decker.

He entered the game with 47 and his first touchdown came on a 36-yard pass to Demaryius Thomas in the second quarter. The second was a 10-yard throw to Decker earlier in the fourth period.

Manning had previously established the record by

throwing 49 touchdown passes in 2004.

Matt Schaub started for the first time since Oct. 13 in place of an injured Case Keenum. He finished with 176 yards and one touchdown with two interceptions for the Texans.

Schaub, benched for Keenum after a terrible six games, admitted that he has thought about the possibility Sunday was his last time to play in Houston.

"It has definitely crossed my mind," he said. "I didn't want to think too far ahead, but I've played this game long enough to know how things work."

The Broncos already had a spot in the playoffs, but their victory, combined with Kansas City's loss to Indianapolis, gave them the division crown. They could secure home-field advantage throughout the playoffs if New England doesn't win its late game at Baltimore.

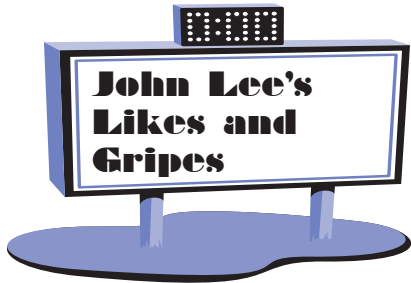
Gripes:

HOUSTON (AP) — Texas cities are ramping up efforts to get people enrolled in President Barack Obama's health care exchange as they face a deadline for insurance coverage to begin Jan. 1.

People who want their plans to begin Jan. 1 have to enroll by Monday. Open enrollment continues through March 31.

Texas has the highest rate of uninsured in the country. Dallas County Judge Clay Jenkins says most of the 425

workers trained to assist people with enrollment are working, and if necessary some will be called in from a day off to further assist.

Jenkins says dozens of enrollment events have been held in recent days. U.S. Secretary of Health and Human Services Kathleen Sebelius visited Houston and Dallas on Friday.

About 14,000 Texans enrolled for coverage in October and November.

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Second opinion planned for teen declared brain dead

OAKLAND, Calif. (AP) — The family of a Northern California girl on life support after being declared brain dead was expected to appear with hospital officials in court Monday to announce the name of the independent physician it has chosen to provide a second opinion on the girl's condition. Jahi McMath's family obtained an order Friday from Superior Court Judge Evelio Grillo to keep doctors at Children's Hospital Oakland from removing Jahi from a ventilator. Grillo ordered the family to meet with doctors to select a neurologist to evaluate the 13-year-old.

In its court memorandum, the hospital said it has no duty to maintain life support because Jahi's condition is irreversible. "Ms. McMath is dead," the hospital said in the memo. "Children's is under no legal obligation to provide medical or other intervention for a deceased person." The family says the girl bled profusely after a routine tonsillectomy. She then went into cardiac arrest before being declared brain dead Dec. 12. The teen's mother, Nailah Winkfield, over the weekend pleaded for

prayers for her daughter. "Despite what they say, she is alive. I can touch her, she is warm. She responds to my touch," Winkfield said in an open letter Saturday. "Given time I know (God) will spark her brain awake." Children's Hospital responded in a statement that while it sympathizes with Winkfield's wishes, it would be unfair to give false hope. Winkfield said her daughter bled profusely and went into cardiac arrest after undergoing a "simple procedure" to remove her tonsil to help with her sleep apnea. The hospital's statement

contends the surgery was complicated, and that the facility is committed to fully investigating what caused "this catastrophic outcome." The family's attorney, Christopher Dolan, told Grillo the family wanted independent tests because it does not believe the hospital's physicians are sufficiently independent. The hospital said in documents presented to the court Friday that a staff neurologist and Jahi's attending physician conducted separate exams, both of which determined that Jahi's entire brain, including her brain stem, stopped functioning.

DPS graduates 102 state troopers in Austin

AUSTIN — The Texas Department of Public Safety Director Steven McCraw and Texas Public Safety Commission Chair Cynthia Leon were joined by Texas Attorney General Greg Abbott last week as the department commissioned 102 men and women as Highway Patrol troopers during the recruit graduation ceremony. Abbott was the keynote speaker during the ceremony, which was held at Great Hills Baptist Church. "After persevering through months of intensive training, these recruits have demonstrated the

character to meet — and master — the daily challenges that face a Texas Highway Patrol Trooper," said Attorney General Abbott. "My thanks go out to all of these brave men and women for taking the oath to serve and protect their fellow Texans." The new troopers will report to duty stations across Texas in the coming weeks and spend the first six months in on-the-job training. "Thank you to all the recruits here today for the hard work and dedication you've shown during the past six months — what you have accomplished is no small feat," said Chair Leon. "I encourage you to

take a moment and realize how far you've come, be proud of yourself and who you've become. You are among the select few who have what it takes to carry on the esteemed tradition of this department." The troopers began the 23-week training academy in July. Instruction covered more than 100 subjects, including counterterrorism, traffic and criminal law, arrest and control procedures, accident reconstruction, first aid and Spanish. They also received training in use of force, communication skills, firearms, driving, criminal interdiction, cultural diversity and physical fitness. "Today you will take

your place on the front lines, protecting Texas from a multitude of threats," McCraw said. "As a Texas state trooper, the dangers you now face are more varied than what many of your predecessors encountered, and the intense and specialized training you possess will be indispensable as you join the fight against the organized, transnational and covert criminal enterprises that threaten this state on a daily basis." osity as one who showers him with love and affection? I have two grown grandkids who treat me differently and, son of a gun, I respond in kind. — CONNECTICUT GRANDMA

DEAR GRANDMA: Your explanation is one I received from other readers as well. That letter resonated with a large number of people, and what follows is a sampling of their responses:

DEAR ABBY: Financially speaking, I'll bet there's a good reason for the disparity in the amounts "Lacking" and her sisters receive. If Grandpa intends that each granddaughter receive the same sum of money by age 18, and he started giving the money to each of them at the same time, he would HAVE to give them different amounts. This concept would
