The Panhandle winds do more than just blow a lot of dust. They bring jobs and revenue to the area.

In recent months, an infusion of new construction has come into the Panhandle as hundreds of workers are being brought in to erect wind towers.

More than 200 contract workers are currently constructing the Miami Wind Energy Center, a 288.6-megawatt power generation project sited on private land in Roberts, Hemphill, Gray and Wheeler counties. A megawatt is enough electricity to supply about 350 average houses.

Turbine erection is underway at the Miami site, with full commercial operations scheduled to begin in the third quarter of 2014.

The Miami wind farm is Chicago-based Invenergy's largest wind project to date and its first power generation project in the Texas Panhandle.

Wind turbines began sprouting up like giant daisies on the Panhandle landscape not long after a federal tax credit program for renewable energy expired Dec. 31.

Company spokeswoman Alissa Krinsky declined to

County to improve road near energy center

Through a cooperative effort between the county, the Texas Department of Transportation and the Pampa Energy Center (PEC), three quarters of a mile of unimproved road adjacent to the Pampa Energy Center will get paved.

The county has agreed to provide the labor and equipment while the TxDOT is providing 600 cubic yards of a road material called "rap" from its maintenance facility in Groom.

The Pampa EDC is providing \$5,000 to cover the cost of hauling the materials and is providing the water.

The agreement to pave the portion of County Road J off Farm to Market 2300 was finalized Friday morning during a regular meeting of the Gray County Commissioners Court.

The road is in Gary Willoughby's Precinct 2 and is seeing more truck traffic as business activity at the PEC increases.

The PEC is owned by the Pampa Economic Development Corp. Enbridge operates a facility at the site and G2X is building a plant to convert natural gas to methanol that is anticipated to be operational by October. Over time, more businesses are expected to locate in the industrial park, which is remembered

Arming U.S. agents in Mexico stalling trade agreement

LAREDO — Call it one of the most heralded binational agreements between the United States and Mexico you have probably never heard of.

For more than a year, a Mexican customs inspection station has been open at the Laredo International Airport, the only airport in the U.S. where Mexican agents preclear cargo headed south of the border.

Though officials in Laredo have praised the station as a signal of cooperation between the two countries the celebration since the initial opening at the airport has been muted, mostly because of delays in setting up a similar station across the border in Mexico. Mexican officials would like to have the same type of customs operation, but the issue of American agents carrying weapons is stalling progress.

The issue of American law enforcement officers carrying weapons in Mexico has long been a sensitive one between the two countries. It came to a fever pitch after the 2011 slaying of

Jaime J. Zapata, a Brownsville native who worked in Mexico as a special agent with U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement. Zapata was fatally wounded in a streetcar ambush on a Central Mexican highway. His colleague, Victor Avila, of El Paso, was wounded in the attack. They were unarmed, in compliance with Mexican law.

For Mexico, the question is one of sovereignty. Despite the years of bloodshed because of drug-related violence, Mexico is one of the countries in which it is most difficult to legally obtain a gun.

Carlos R. Villarreal, the city manager of Laredo, said there were reasons to hope for a breakthrough. When the issue of armed agents in Mexico arose during a recent meeting with trade officials in Washington, Villarreal said he was told Mexican officials were working to amend the law to pave the way for U.S. customs agents to carry guns. "That's the only issue that's pending," he said.

Officials at the Mexican Embassy in Washington did not return phone calls or emails seeking comment.

With the system in place at the Laredo airport, products are inspected there and then flown directly to their destinations in Mexico. Previously, cargo heading into Mexico had to be flown to an international airport in that country with inspection capabilities before

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say whether Invenergy received those tax credits for the Miami project. Instead, she referred the newspaper to a "clean energy" website that explains the program in detail.

Companies that generate electricity from wind, geothermal and "closed-loop" bioenergy (using dedicated energy crops) were eligible for the credits.

The program was enacted by Congress as part of the Energy Policy Act of 1992 and has been extended and allowed to expire several times over 21 years.

"We're excited about Miami Wind, our newest wind-power project in the state," she said. "Texas is a national leader in wind energy and a great place to do business. Construction is progressing well thanks to the hard work of our dedicated crew members."

Once the project is operational, a staff of approximately 16 employees will operate and maintain the facility.

According to Invenergy, the total economic infusion from the project, including annual payments to landowners, annual tax payments and staff salaries, will exceed \$4 million per year.

In Grey County, transmission lines from the north will connect into the Electric Reliability Council of Texas (ERCOT) grid at a substation south of Lefors.

Krinsky said the local economy is further benefiting by supply purchases at various area hardware stores and other suppliers.

Lori Byrne, executive director of the Pampa Chamber of Commerce, said that local businesses have seen a spike from Invenergy's wind tower construction. "The restaurants and gas

stations are seeing it the most," she said. "We have given out a lot of restaurant guides."

Though the contract workers putting up towers in Carson County are much closer to Amarillo than the ones working in Miami, Byrne said workers from Carson County are coming into Pampa to spend from their paychecks.

The Schneider House apartments, which rents about 50 one- and two-bedroom units, is renting four apartments to contractors erecting towers for the Miami project, said building manager Joy Combs.

Combs said all but two or three of the apartments are empty currently, but she has prospective tenants who said they intend to move in. Tenants at the Schneider House can rent from month-to-month, which is appealing to energy workers who are only staying in Pampa for a few months.

The AmericInn, one of the city's newest and nicest hotels, said it, too, is full.

A desk clerk said there are a lot of wind energy contractors staying at the hotel, but couldn't say how many were working on the Miami project.

Invenergy has operational wind projects in Texas located in Dickens, Martin, Mills, Nolan, and Scurry counties.

Invenergy is North America's largest independent wind power generation company and has developed 53 wind farms in the United States, Canada and Europe, as well as a total of 10 solar and natural gas-fueled power generation projects.

According to Invenergy, wind is playing an increasingly important part in the diversification of the world's power supply. It is cost-competitive, creates jobs and technological innovation and is emissions-free, the company said.

heading to its final destination, Villarreal said.

"This is changing how we do business with Mexico," he said, adding that some companies were interested in using

the Laredo station because it allowed them to fly their cargo into Mexico rather than transport it by road.

Most of the merchandise being processed at the airport are electronics, he said, but with Mexico's proposed energy reform, the airport could become a major

shipping point for drilling and other extraction equipment.

That would only add to the region's reputation as an international trade hub.

The South Texas city houses America's busiest inland port. In January alone, the Laredo customs district saw about

\$20 billion in two-way trade with Mexico, according to WorldCity, a Florida-based company that uses census data to track trade patterns. That figure represented about half of the \$41 billion that the United States saw in overall trading with its southern neighbor for the month.

by Pampans as the site of the Celanese Chemical Plant.

Willoughby said the county will start hauling the materials next Tuesday or Wednesday.

He said he plans to wait

until June to determine whether the road should be coated with a sealant or will need further improvements, such as poured concrete to reinforce entrance ways to businesses.

The commissioners also approved a \$5,749 bid from Malcohm Hinkle Refrigeration Co. in Pampa to install a new gas heater for the archive room at the

White Deer Museum.

Museum director Courtney Oxley attended the meeting and said the heater will need to be replaced before the next cold season or archives in the room could be damaged from the cold. A leak in the roof that lets water drip from the present heater will need to be fixed after the new one is installed, she said.

The commissioners had received two other bids, one for \$5,759 and another for \$5,000, but chose the Hinkle bid because the company provided the most details not only on the work it agreed to do, but also on the company's 30-day warranty on its installation work along with the warranty provided by the unit's manufacturer.

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Bouncin' Around I love the sound of trains

I love the sound of trains. To me, the sounds of the wheels on the tracks and the train horn are good sounds. I suppose if we lived closer to the freight line through Pampa I might not be so cavalier in my feelings, but as it is I enjoy hearing the trains at night when the rest of the world is quiet.

It's a shame that there are no passenger trains anywhere nearby, as today's children are growing up without the experience of riding on a train. The only trains most kids think of today would be Thomas the Tank Engine or the Hogwarts Express from the Harry Potter movies.

My first train ride was when I was about six, when we took the Super Chief from Los Angeles to El Paso and back again. I nearly drove my mom crazy singing, "Little Red Caboose" and asking to go to the dining car. My grandparents lived near downtown Los Angeles when I was very young, and I remember riding what was known then as the Red Car, an electric train that was very good at moving people all over the L.A. area, to the beach cities and as far as San Bernardino.

If you've seen the movie, "Who Framed Roger Rabbit" there is a loose reference to the Red Car. In the mid to late 1950s, the streetcars and electric trains were largely replaced

by gas-guzzling buses, which were the greatest cause of the arrival of smog in the L.A. basin. My husband was born and raised in Waukegan, Illinois, and was a frequent passenger on the North Shore Railroad, which ran between Milwaukee, Wisconsin, and Chicago. One of the rail lines was only a couple of blocks from the house where he grew up. That railroad, along with the Electroliners which were a pair of streamlined four-coach electric multiple unit interurban express trains, stopped operating in 1963.

A railroading experience that I will always remember is the time I rode a real British train from Victoria Station in London to Folkestone in Kent. I felt like I was in an Agatha Christie movie, sitting in the richly-paneled car. It gave me the chance to see some of the English countryside at a more leisurely pace. For the nearly 40 years I lived in Illinois, we often rode the Northwestern train from Waukegan into Chicago.

When our daughter was small, she loved to sit on the upper level of the train car, and we had a great time looking into back yards during the one-hour trip. The last bit of excitement before coming to the Northwestern Station was the train's passage between some tall buildings, and it always seemed that we were going to run right into one of the buildings. An unforgettable moment happened when an old steam train chugged into the Waukegan station, and we could hear the whistle long

before we saw the big headlamp on the engine. Waukegan was also a stop on the route of the Circus Train, the Ringling Brothers train that traveled from Baraboo, Wisconsin to Milwaukee.

The colorful train, named "The Old Milwaukee Special" pulled cars loaded with 68 historical parade wagons which would be offloaded for a grand parade through downtown Milwaukee. One of the things on our "Bucket List" would be to ride the Orient Express railroad. It wouldn't necessarily have to be the European train, though that would be an amazing experience.

There is also an American Orient Express route that travels through the Northwest, and parts of Canada. It would be beyond amazing to ride in the luxuriously-appointed cars, sleep in a comfortable bunk, and enjoy gourmet meals, while watching beautiful landscapes that you don't see from a car. There are railway museums in Texas and New Mexico that might make a great weekend getaway for families.

The Cumbres and Toltec Railroad features steam train tours for all ages. The Lovett Memorial Library here in Pampa has started a program for children about trains. I understand kids who attend the program will receive special train-related items, so please check with the library for dates and times. All aboard!

The peril of ignoring change

According to the Census Bureau, for the first time in more than a century, the annual number of deaths among white Americans exceeded the number of births. Add to that the facts that Asians are now the fastest-growing minority in the U.S., and a majority of American children younger than 5 now belong to a racial or ethnic minority, and we can begin to appreciate Heraclitus' wisdom that "change is the only constant in life."

Consider the velocity of change in our presidential politics. In the 1988 presidential election, Republican nominee George H. W. Bush won 59 percent of the white vote, and in 2012, Republican nominee Mitt Romney also won 59 percent of the white vote. The differences in the

final results between those two elections, not even a quarter century apart, are beyond staggering. Bush's 59 percent of the white vote was the key to his winning 426 electoral votes and running more than 7 million votes ahead of Democrat Michael Dukakis. In 2012, Romney's 59 percent of the white vote did not prevent his losing the popular vote to the Democratic incumbent President Barack Obama by 5 million and being able to win only 206 electoral votes to Obama's 332. When Bush defeated Dukakis, the U.S. electorate was 85 percent white; when Romney lost to Obama in 2012, the nation's electorate was just 72 percent white.

I was surprised to learn that Asians are the fastest-growing minority group in the country. Asian immigrants from South Korea, India, Japan, Pakistan and China are disproportionately found in the scientific,

engineering and medical professions while also demonstrating a remarkable aptitude for launching their own businesses. But the anti-immigrant rhetoric, led by Romney, which dominated the GOP presidential primaries, and which may have been intended as hostile only to those coming in from Mexico, had the effect of alienating so many Pacific newcomers that Obama beat Romney by 3-1 in this voter group.

Remember the first election of the 21st century, when Republican George W. Bush, despite losing the popular vote to Democrat Al Gore, prevailed in the Electoral College by way of the Supreme Court? Gore's gracious concession was an exceptionally unselfish act of political leadership that enabled most of his supporters to accept the decision. But if Romney had gotten the same percentage of the votes in 2000 that he in fact won in 2012, the

Massachusetts Republican would have won a clear majority of the national popular vote that year. My friend, Mark Russell, the wittiest man in or out of Washington, likes to remind us that his census figures indicate that by 2020, there will be 123,000 Americans over the age of 100 ... and that all of them will have valid Florida driver's licenses. But for the Republicans who ignore change and insist on campaigning in a country that no longer exists, its party platform castigating immigrants could turn into the political world's longest suicide note. Let's hope not, because this nation must educate, train and welcome the immigrant children among us, and because we need two healthy, relevant, competitive political parties.

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Lent Devotionals

Day 10 — Saturday — goats

Scripture: Matthew 25:31-46; Luke 21:37-38

“When the Son of Man comes in his glory, and all the angels with him, he will sit on his throne in heavenly glory. All the nations will be gathered before him, and he will separate the people one from another as a shepherd separates the sheep from the goats. He will put the sheep on his right and the goats on his left.”

“Then the King will say to those on his right, ‘Come, you who are blessed by my Father; take your inheritance, the kingdom prepared for you since the creation of the world. For I was hungry and you gave me something to eat, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you invited me in, I needed clothes and you clothed me, I was sick and you looked after me, I was in prison and you came to visit me.’

“Then the righteous will answer him, ‘Lord, when did we see you hungry and feed you, or thirsty and give you something to drink? When did we see

you a stranger and invite you in, or needing clothes and clothe you?

When did we see you sick or in prison and go to visit you?”

“The King will reply, ‘I tell you the truth, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers of mine, you did for me.’

“Then he will say to those on his left, ‘Depart from me, you who are cursed, into the eternal fire prepared for the devil and his angels. For I was hungry and you gave me nothing to eat, I was thirsty and you gave me nothing to drink, I was a stranger and you did not invite me in, I needed clothes and you did not clothe me, I was sick and in prison and you did not look after me.’

“They also will answer, ‘Lord, when did we see you hungry or thirsty or a stranger or needing clothes or sick or in prison, and did not help you?’

“He will reply, ‘I tell you the truth, whatever you did not do for one of the least of these, you did not do for me.’ “Then they will go away to eternal punishment, but the righteous to eternal life.” (The Gospels Interwoven, Zarley)

Devotional: Nothing was more common on the Ju-

dean landscape than herds of sheep and goats. Jesus took advantage of this common sight to remind everyone of the reality of judgment.

No one liked to hear about that truth then, and the same is true today. No human wants to think about judgment for long. Why? You know why. Because most humans are not faithful worshipers and servants of the Lord God and that means that the vast majority of humanity is goats (on the left) and headed for “eternal punishment.”

I remember when I was a goat, waking up each day in my own little world with no consideration for God’s will for my life. I also remember when the Holy Spirit came to convict me of the wicked way I was living. Thank You, Holy Spirit. Thank You, thank You, thank You. Praise God, I am no longer a goat, but not by my own might but by his.

A sheep awakes each day to simply listen for the Shepherd’s voice. As long as I live, I want to do that too. Father, I pledge to arise each day, report for duty and then live each day in Your strength.

Prayer: Jehovah Rohi, You have always yearned to be my Shepherd God. Each day You speak to me, hoping I will listen. Too often I do not. I am so sorry for my deafness. Please, lead me in the path where

the lowly sheep walk. Protect me from the dangers of the stubborn goat. Be my Shepherd; not just today, but every day until I am with You face to face. Amen.

Day 11 — Monday — an alabaster jar

Scripture: Matthew 26:6-13; Mark 14:3-9; Jn. 12:2-8

While he was in Bethany in the home of a man known as Simon the Leper, a dinner was given in Jesus’ honor. Martha served, while Lazarus was among those reclining at the table with him. Then Mary took an alabaster jar of very expensive perfume, about a pint of pure nard. She broke the jar and poured the perfume on Jesus’ head as he was reclining at the table. She poured it on Jesus’ feet and wiped his feet with her hair. And the house was filled with the fragrance of the perfume.

When some of those disciples present saw this, they were indignant. “Why this waste?” they asked one another. They rebuked her harshly. One of his disciples, Judas Iscariot, who was later to betray him, objected, “Why wasn’t this perfume sold and the money given to the poor? It could have been sold for more than a year’s

wages.” He did not say this because he cared about the poor but because he was a thief; as keeper of the money bag, he used to help himself to what was put into it.

Aware of this, Jesus said to them, “Why are you bothering this woman? Leave her alone. She has done a beautiful thing to me. It was intended that she should save this perfume for the day of my burial. You will always have the poor among you, and you can help them any time you want. But you will not always have me. She did what she could. When she poured this perfume on my body, she did it to prepare me for burial. I tell you the truth, wherever this gospel is preached throughout the world, what she has done will also be told, in memory of her.” (The Gospels Interwoven, Zarley)

Devotional: So far every object for these Lenten devotionals has been very “commonplace.” Well, not this jar. It was a tiny inexpensive alabaster jar. Therefore the value of it wasn’t based on the outside material, but rather on the contents inside. This particular jar was full of a rare perfume that was valued at one-year’s wages for the average person.

The jar showed up at a dinner in the Bethany home of Simon the leper. Jesus’ close friends, Lazarus, Martha, and Mary had been invited as well. At some point during the meal

Mary did the unthinkable. She took the entire jar of perfume and anointed Jesus from head to toe. Who ever heard of such a thing? What was she thinking? What a waste? Now there were those who immediately responded with those objections—the disciples.

Did Jesus? NO! He basically told everyone three things: 1) leave her alone, 2) you can’t be too extravagant with Jesus and 3) Mary will be famous forever for what she did.

How extravagant in my life for Jesus have I been? Are there people who accuse me of giving too much to Him? Of doing too much for Him? Of worshipping Him too intensely? Of praising Him too vigorously? Of loving Him too much?

I haven’t been accused of that one single time in the past year that I can remember. Mary was. Why not me? Why not me? Why not me? I want to be more extravagant in my relationship with Jesus. I want to be more like Mary.

Prayer: Oh, Lamb of God, You are worthy of so much more than I ever give You. Fill me with more of what filled Mary that night at Simon’s house.

Holy Spirit, lead me down the path that she walked. Help me see more clearly the significance of what Mary did that night. Amen.

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St. Patrick's Day SYMBOLS

St. Patrick's Day is one of the more lively days of the year. Revelers may prefer to indulge in a few adult beverages, but even those who don't imbibe can enjoy the festive atmosphere of St. Patrick's Day, which in many communities involves a parade and maybe even a festival featuring Irish music.

While parades and a pint or two of Guinness might be the first thing many people associate with St. Patrick's Day, there are a host of other symbols that have become synonymous with the holiday as well.

SNAKES are associated with St. Patrick's Day, but that association is rooted more in myth than reality. Legend long had it that St. Patrick once stood atop a hilltop that is now called Croagh Patrick and banished all the snakes from Ireland. In fact, however, the Emerald Isle has never been home to any snakes, and this banishment of the "snakes" is actually just a metaphor for St. Patrick's role in bringing Christianity to Ireland. The "snakes" are believed to be a pagan ideology that the Irish subscribed to prior to St. Patrick's arrival. Within a couple of centuries of St. Patrick's arrival in Ireland, the island had been completely Christianized.

LEPRECHAUNS can trace their roots to Celtic folklore, where they were referred to as "lobaircin," which meant "small-bodied fellow." The leprechaun did not play a prominent role in Celtic folklore, but they were known for trickery they used to protect their treasures. Though leprechauns have today become a symbol many associate with St. Patrick's Day, they actually have no legitimate connection to the holiday. Their association with St. Patrick's Day can likely be traced to the 1959 Disney film "Darby O'Gill & the Little People," which popularized the image many people now have of leprechauns.

SHAMROCKS. In ancient Ireland, the shamrock was considered a sacred plant that symbolized the rebirth of spring. Over time, the shamrock would become even more meaningful to the Irish people, eventually becoming a symbol of the pride they felt with regard to their Irish heritage and a symbol of their displeasure with English rule.

THE COLOR GREEN is another symbol of St. Patrick's Day, though many historians note the color St. Patrick wore was blue and not green. But wearing green on St. Patrick's Day is a way those of Irish descent show pride in their heritage. Green was likely adopted because of the lush green landscape of Ireland, which thanks to ample yearly rainfall, is green year-round.

CORNERD BEEF is a symbol of St. Patrick's Day that does not trace its roots to Ireland but most likely to New York City. Corned beef and cabbage is a dish enjoyed by millions on St. Patrick's Day, but while cabbage can be traced to Ireland, corned beef was likely substituted for Irish bacon by Irish immigrants living in New York City. Irish bacon was too expensive for many of these Irish immigrants, who found corned beef a much more affordable alternative.

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Association: Increase in marketplace enrollment good for Texas

AUSTIN — Texas has the second highest health insurance enrollment among the 36 states relying on the federal government to administer the health insurance marketplace, according to the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services. As of March 1, 2014, enrollment in Texas was 758,334, up more than 250 percent from the end of January.

While still just a fraction of the state's population of uninsured that exceeds six million, it is encouraging that more Texans are purchasing private coverage through the federally facilitated marketplace.

Texas hospitals, however, will continue to sustain a heavy uncompensated care burden. Because the state has rejected new federal funds to expand Medicaid and has not developed its own solution to reduce the number of uninsured working poor residents, more than one million Texans will lack access to affordable coverage. These residents will continue to rely on hospital emergency departments and clinics for health care ranging from primary care to critical care.

Hospitals' financial burden of providing uncompensated care for the uninsured is compounded by ongoing and new state

and federal funding cuts that leave Texas hospitals with significantly fewer resources with which to provide care:

- Reductions in federal Medicare Disproportionate Share Hospital payments costing the state's hospitals between \$16 million and \$19 million in FY 2014.

- Cuts to the federal Medicaid Disproportionate Share Hospital program totaling \$1.2 billion in FY 2016.

- Continuation of sequester's two percent reduction in reimbursement rates for Medicare providers (including hospitals) costing hospitals an estimated \$2.5 billion.

- \$1 billion in state Medicaid cost-containment initiatives from the 82nd Legislative session and nearly \$500 million in cuts from the 83rd Legislative session that reimburse hospitals less while asking them to do more.

"Patients depend on Texas hospitals to be there when they need them: 365 days a year, seven days a week, 24 hours a day," said Ted Shaw, THA president/CEO. "But without adequate coverage and financing, hospitals cannot do their job. Other states have proposed innovative private-market solutions to expand coverage using available federal funding, and Texas should follow their lead."

■ Let's go short-track racin'!

Sunday the drivers of NASCAR take their speed to the half-mile short-track that is Bristol Motor Speedway in Bristol, Tenn.

Short-track racing is very different than racing at a traditional track as you will sometimes see new faces leading the pack.

Kyle Busch is an early favorite to win the race as he has an average finish of 10th (9.9) place at the track. He has five wins since the spring race in 2007. He has also never posted a DNF at the track.

Better watch out for his brother, Kurt, also. Kurt hasn't won their since 2006, but also has five wins at Bristol. Kurt finished fourth in the race one year ago.

Jeff Gordon historically has done well at Bristol. But, like Kurt Busch, he hasn't won there recently. Kyle Busch is an immediate figure to finish well at Bristol. But another young gun, Brad Keselowski, has finished well at Bristol recently. Keselowski won the fall race of 2011, and the spring race of 2012. He finished third in the spring race of 2013. Not to mention he is taking the NASCAR season by storm as he and teammate Joey Logano have finished in the Top-10 in each of the last two races, and Keselowski in the Top-5 in every race since the Daytona 500.

It would be easy to peg Dale Earnhardt Jr. for the win also. He has, after all, finished 1-2 in all three races this season.

But in 28 races, he has only finished in the Top-10 in half of those races.

So the picks for the race on Sunday? Kyle Busch, Brad Keselowski and Jeff Gordon.

Fast-track Facts

The technical track size of Bristol Motor Speedway is .533-miles. All of the turns bank at 24-28 degrees and on the stretches it banks at 4-8 degrees.

The front and back stretches run parallel to each other and are 650 feet long (and I use the word "long" loosely). It's a 500-lap race totaling a distance of 266.5 miles.

Kyle Busch set the track-qualifying record with his pole-setting speed of 14.813 secs. He set the record with his super-fast speed of 129.535. Busch was also the youngest driver to win the race when he won in the spring of 2007, the oldest is the late Dale Earnhardt, when he won in the summer of 1999.

80 percent of the 106 races have been won from the Top-10 starting position, including 53 from the first four spots.

The car number that has the most wins (19) at the track is the 11 car, which is currently driven by Denny Hamlin.

'Rain, Rain Go Away'

The forecast for Bristol, Tenn. on Sunday calls for a high of 49 degrees and a 70 percent chance of rain. Hopefully the 12 p.m. start time is early enough to avoid afternoon showers.

The coverage begins at 11:30 p.m. on FOX.

USDA enhances Farm Storage Facility Loan Program

The U.S. Department of Agriculture is expanding the Farm Storage and Facility Loan program, which provides low-interest financing to producers. The enhanced program includes 22 new categories of eligible equipment for fruit and vegetable producers, and makes it easier for farmers and ranchers around the country to finance the equipment they need to grow and expand.

This is part of a broader effort to help small and mid-sized farmers and ranchers, as announced today by Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack.

Producers with small and mid-sized operations, and specialty crop fruit and vegetable growers, now have access to needed capital for a variety of supplies including sorting bins, wash stations and other food safety-related equipment. A new more flexible alternative is also provided for determining storage needs for fruit and vegetable producers, and waivers are available on a case-by-case basis for disaster assistance or insurance coverage if available products are not relevant or feasible for a particular producer.

Additionally, Farm Storage and Facility Loans

requirements have been eased for loans between \$50,000 and \$100,000. Previously, all loans in excess of \$50,000 required a promissory note and additional security, such as a lien on real estate. Now loans up to \$100,000 can be secured by only a promissory note.

“The Farm Storage and Facility Loan program has helped American farmers and ranchers to finance on-farm storage for almost 13 years,” said Farm Service Agency Administrator (FSA), Juan M. Garcia. “We anticipate these changes will increase the number of individuals who

qualify for these loans and help them access new market opportunities.”

The low-interest funds can be used to build or upgrade permanent facilities to store commodities. Eligible commodities include grains, oilseeds, peanuts, pulse crops, hay, honey, renewable biomass commodities, fruits and vegetables. Qualified facilities include grain bins, hay barns and cold storage facilities for fruits and vegetables.

Other new changes to the Farm Storage and Facility Loan program will allow FSA State Committees to subordinate Commodity Credit Corporation’s lien position.

These changes to the program were issued via an official notice to state and county Farm Service Agency offices and are effective immediately.

More than 33,000 loans have been issued for on-farm storage, increasing grain storage capacity by 900 million bushels since May 2000.

More information about tools and resources available to small and mid-sized

farmers will be rolled out in the coming months, including information about access to capital, risk management, food safety, and locating market opportunities on USDA’s Small and Mid-Sized Farmer Resources web page.
