Burn Ban has been rescinded at Lake Meredith and Alibates

SUBMITTED BY LAKE MEREDITH NATIONAL RECREATION AREA AND ALIBATES FLINT QUARRIES NATIONAL MONUMENT

Fritch — As a result of recent rains and green up in the Texas Panhandle, Lake Meredith National Recreation Area and Alibates Flint Quarries National Monument have removed the burn ban. Fires may be built in designated fire grills, fire rings, portable stoves or grills, or small ground fires three feet in diameter or less and encircled by a barrier are permitted.

Fires are prohibited:

- Backcountry areas – Any and all types of open fires are prohibited. The use of portable stoves only is permitted.

- Ground fires are prohibited on the designated swimming beach at Spring Canyon.

This Land is Our Land Scientists recreate a living replica of a dead man's ear, I see hope for the future of America

An artist has created a living replica of Vincent van Gogh's famously severed ear.

Feel free to take a moment to read that sentence again. The ear is currently in an exhibit titled "Sugababe" at the Centre for Art and Media in the German city of Karlsruhe. Diemut Strebe, A U.S.-based German artist who "creates art using biological material" (yeah, I'm not sure myself that I wanna know exactly what that means) collaborated with scientists to reconstruct the ear of the famous painter using DNA from a relative and a 3D printer. "The ear is grown from tissue-engineered cartilage using computer imaging technology, and is identical in shape to van Gogh's ear," said Dominika Szope, spokeswoman for the museum in an interview with Associated Press. Strebe and her team used cartilage cells donated by Lieuwe van Gogh, the great-great-grandson of van Gogh's brother Theo. The cells were then shaped using a 3D printer to resemble the ear that Van Gogh cut off in 1888 during one of his psychotic episodes. It is being kept alive inside a case containing a nutrient solution which

could, in theory, last for years. "I use science basically like a type of brush, like Vincent used paint," Strebe said to AP.

My first thought when hearing about van Gogh's living ear was, well, WHY? I mean... an EAR? I had to visit the museum's own website for an answer.

On a separate link to the artist and the details of the exhibit one can find the "scientific explanation" which end with the sentence: "The art-project works with the concept of genetic replacement in various ways."

This brings me to Theseus' ship and a discussion of the future of the American nation, stay with me for a moment.

Theseus is remembered in Greek mythology as the slayer of the Minotaur and a story goes that, in honor of his deeds, the city of Athens preserved the ship he used in his travels. Over the years, the Athenians replaced each plank in the original ship of Theseus as it decayed, thereby keeping it in good repair. Eventually, there was not a single plank left of the original ship. The question then became, did the Athenians still have Theseus' ship?

A strong case can be made for saying that it would be. When the first plank was replaced, the ship would still have been Theseus' ship. When the second was replaced, the ship

would still have been Theseus' ship. Changing a single plank can never turn one ship into another. After every plank was replaced and no part of the original ship remained, it would still have been Theseus' ship.

Let's get back to the ear. Modern-day doctors tell us that foreign DNA has the ability to replicate in living cells. So the "big picture" of the "Sugababe" exhibit is to generate discussion not about an ear but about our composition as humans. In other words, what makes you YOU?

This is a column about American politics so, let's see if we can use Theseus's ship and Vincent's re-fabricated ear to discuss politics in America.

I have mentioned many times before in this column that, according to U.S. Census projections, by 2050 the demographics in America will be drastically different than they are today.

- Among some key population projections:
- Nearly one in five Americans will be an immigrant in 2050, compared with one in eight today.
 - The Latino population, already the nation's largest minority group, will triple in size and will account for most of the nation's population growth through 2050. Latinos will make up 29 percent of the U.S.

Popular nonsense

"Young people are exploited!" "Income mobility is down!" "Poor people are locked into poverty!" Those are samples of popular nonsense peddled today.

Leftist economist Thomas Piketty's book "Capital in the Twenty-First Century" has been No. 1 on best-seller lists for weeks (with 400 pages of statistics, I assume "Capital" is bought more often than it is read). Piketty argues that investments grow faster than wages and so the rich get richer far faster than everyone else. He says we should impose a wealth tax and 80 percent taxes on rich people's incomes. But Piketty's numbers mislead. It's true that today the rich are richer than ever. And the wealth gap between rich and poor has grown. Now the top 1 percent own more assets than the bottom 90 percent! But focusing on this disparity ignores the fact that over time, the rich and poor are not the same people. Oprah Winfrey once was on welfare. Wal-Mart founder Sam Walton was a farmhand. When markets are free, poor people can move out of their income group. In America, income mobility, which matters more than income inequality, has not really diminished. Economists at Harvard and Berkeley crunched the numbers on 40 million tax returns from 1971-2012 and discovered that mobility is pretty much what The Pew Charitable Trusts reported it was 30 years ago. Today, 64 percent of the people born to the poorest fifth of society rise out of that quintile — 11 percent rise all the way into the top quintile. Meanwhile, 8 percent born to the richest fifth fall all the way to the bottom fifth. Sometimes great wealth makes kids lazy and self-indulgent, and wrecks their lives. Also, the rich don't get rich at the expense of the poor (unless they steal or collude with government). The poor got richer, too. Yes, over the last 30 years, incomes of rich people grew by more than 200 percent, but according to the Congressional Budget Office, poor people gained 50 percent. That growth should matter more than the disparity. Piketty's data reveal times in our history

when income inequality decreased: during world wars and depression. Do we want more of that? It's right to worry about the plight of the poor, but not everything done in their name really helps them — minimum wage laws, for example. I've had hundreds of employees whom I paid nothing: student interns. Unpaid internships were allowed for years, because it was understood that interns learn by working. My interns learned a lot. Many went on to successful careers in journalism. One won a Pulitzer Prize. Many said they learned more working for me than at college (despite \$50,000 tuition). They benefited and I benefited. Win-win.

So for years government ignored Labor Department rules that decreed unpaid internships legal only if an employer gets "no immediate advantage" from the intern. Geez, who wants that? Of course I got an advantage from my interns. That's why I employed them!

Recently, President Barack Obama's Labor Department announced it would enforce the internship rules, and some interns sued their former employers, claiming internships were "unfair." Charlie Rose forked over a quarter of a million dollars. Word spread, so now unpaid internships are vanishing.

Some people say it's good that unpaid internships are gone, because they are unfair to poor people, who can't afford volunteer work. But getting rid of opportunities does nothing to help anyone. Employers lose and students lose. Difficult as it can seem to make your own way in this world without a phony government promise that you'll be taken care of, or that every job will pay at least \$15 an hour, success happens when markets are relatively free. Individual initiative creates new things, companies, job opportunities — whole new ways of life — that make the world better for all of us.

Government "help" ends up doing harm. Leave people free — both as workers and employers — to pursue opportunities they find worthwhile, and we will prosper in ways government planners could never imagine.

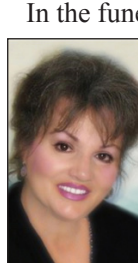

Reality is not candy; life is not always sweet.

In the funeral business, we see, as time progresses, generations are less able to deal with the reality of death than their predecessors. In my opinion, the practice of "Everybody gets a trophy," plays into the lack of preparation and inability to deal with life's issues. When we are children, our parents enroll us in activities to teach us life's lessons. One plays ball to learn good sportsmanship. In order to learn good sportsmanship, one must, at one time or another, lose the game. The disappointment of not winning helps us learn and appreciate the value of good solid preparation. We eventually grow to understand that the other team prepared better and played better than did we. Additionally, we grow to understand that these principles must be applied to ourselves if we ever wish

to win the coveted trophy. This experience creates new resolve and greater motivation to do better, to prepare better and to work harder. It develops character in our children and teaches them how to adjust to the pain of losing. They learn to overcome adversity and disappointment, and in turn, they become dedicated human beings. In short, they have learned good sportsmanship, and it's by product, good stewardship. Their human nature has been tempered by the experience, and they have become stronger and better participants in the human race.

These small disappointments in childhood prepare our children for larger disappointments as adults, and life in general. Losing games as a child helps one handle the stress and disappointment of losing a job as a teenager. In turn, this prepares one for the betrayal of a sweetheart in college, which may serve to prepare one for the responsibilities of adulthood. We hope these experiences will give us the wherewithal to cope with the many

We set them up for complications in coping with disappointments, stress and eventually our deaths. In trying to protect them from pain, we set them up to experience the ultimate pain without any experience upon which to draw. Without these essential pain experiences as they travel through life, our children are unable to process the anxiety, fear and despair, which accompany the quintessential pain of all, bereavement.

The death of a loved one changes our identity, our social standing, our

support structure, possibly our income, as well as a truckload of other issues. If our resolve is experienced and tempered through baby steps of loss and pain, we will be better prepared to face the worst times of our lives armed with the ability to overcome adversity and grief.

Reality is not candy; life will not always be sweet. Prepare your children for the knocks and bruises that life will through their way, by allowing them to experience small disappointments and failures without trophies. In so doing, you will have prepared them to withstand the most adverse experience known to man; the experience of losing a loved one, the experience of losing you.

■ Rangers can't put win streak together; fall behind .500 again.

Just when we thought the Texas Rangers had climbed back over .500 for a while, or for good, they find themselves below the mark once again.

Since the last article was written, Texas has gone 2-4. Two losses against the Washington Nationals gave them a series loss. And so far they already have two losses in the series against Baltimore and the series' finale was Thursday night, after deadline.

Shin Soo-Choo (2-4, three RBI) and Leonys Martin (2-3, three runs) led the way in Texas' 5-4 victory last Thursday against the Minnesota Twins. Nick Martinez was a little sluggish in his five and two-thirds innings pitched that he gave up four earned runs. But Alexi Ogando, Jason Frasier, Neal Cotts and Joakim Soria combined for three and one-thirds innings of shutout baseball.

Texas continued the long road trip with a three-game series over the weekend against the Nationals. Colby Lewis had another one of his bad starts in which he gave up six runs, five earned, over five and two-thirds innings pitched. Not that the damage wasn't already done, but Robbie Ross allowed three more runs in the final two and a third innings. Ironically, Lewis was 1-2 from the plate with an RBI. Rowned Odor had the other RBI in Texas' 9-2 loss. By the way in case you were wondering, National League teams don't have a designated hitter so the pitcher has to hit. The rule is determined by whatever league is the home team. Had this game been in Arlington, Lewis would not have batted due to the DH.

Many fans were rather disappointed in Nick Tepesch's start on Saturday. He allowed five runs in two innings. Scott Baker didn't limit the damage any as he allowed five more runs in five innings. Shawn Tolleson was the lone bright spot from Ranger pitching as he struck out one in his one inning pitched. Odor was 1-3 with an RBI and Mitch Moreland was 1-4 with an RBI. Those were unfortunately the only Texas runs in the 10-2 loss to the Nationals.

Thankfully for the Rangers, Yu Darvish hit the bump Sunday to stop the bleeding. He was stellar again as he went eight

innings, didn't allow a run and struck out 12 batters. Soria got the save by pitching a clean ninth. Two must be the magic number as the Rangers were held to two runs once again. Donnie Murphy was 3-4 with an RBI and Martin was 1-4 with an RBI in the 2-0 Texas win.

The Rangers received an nasty return back to Arlington on Tuesday as Baltimore scored 8 runs off 17 hits en route to an 8-3 win. Joe Saunders gave up 10 hits but held the O's to two runs in six innings. Ogando, Cotts and Tolleson combined to give up the other six runs in just one inning of work. The offense was stagnant once again, but there were a few bright spots. Robinson Chirinos went 2-3 with two RBI and a run scored. Adrian Beltre was 3-4 with a home run, RBI and a run scored.

Beltre hit two more home runs on Wednesday when he went 2-4 with five RBI and two runs scored. Luis Sardinas was 3-5 with a run scored. Beltre was responsible for all five Texas runs. However it wouldn't be enough in the 6-5 Orioles win. Martinez gave up six runs, four earned, in five an one-thirds innings pitched. Aaron Poreda, Tolleson, Cotts and Frasier kept the Orioles off the board for the final three and two-thirds innings, but the damage was already done by the Orioles.

Game three of the series was Thursday night and too late for press time of this article. Check Saturday's paper for the score.

Now the Rangers must get that offense back with a four game series against the Indians starting tonight.

Darvish (5-2, 2.08 ERA) hits the mound for Texas against Trevor Bauer (1-2, 3.63 ERA) in tonight's game. I won't spend too much time on this one. Darvish has been on fire lately. The most runs he has given up all season in a start was only four. In his last four starts he has pitched seven or more innings and only allowed four runs total. Bauer is a great pitcher but Darvish is on another level right now. I am going with a Ranger win and maybe some more offensive action as well. Prediction Rangers 7, Indians 2.

Tepesch (2-1, 4.43 ERA) hopes to bounce back from his bad start and faces Josh Tomlin (3-2, 3.06 ERA) on Saturday. Tomlin is a consistent pitcher

but he does not go deep into ball games. His longest start this season was six and two-thirds innings. Tepesch had his first bad start last Saturday but will look to rebound in this one. I am going to say the Rangers pull it out late in the ball game against the Cleveland bullpen. Prediction Rangers 5, Indians 3.

Joe Saunders (0-1, 3.68 ERA) goes up against Justin Masterson (3-4, 4.72 ERA) in the third game of the series on Sunday. Masterson is the Indian version of Colby Lewis, when he is on he is amazing, but when he is off its cover your eyes time if you are Indians fans. Saunders has been solid for the Rangers, his record doesn't reflect that but he gets guys out when it matters most before giving up the runs. I am going to give the slight edge to the Indians just because I don't think Texas opens up the series 3-0. I can't be too optimistic. Prediction: Indians 6, Rangers 2.

Monday's finale has Nick Martinez (1-2, 3.22 ERA) against T.J. House (0-1, 3.79 ERA). I haven't seen much of House, but his stats show that he has been decent thus far. Martinez has given up four or more runs in each of his last two starts. He will want to be rebounding in this one. I still give the edge here to the Indians. Prediction: Indians 8, Rangers 1.

Some more bad news came in this week for Ranger fans as Jurickson Profar is now expecting to miss the entire season in order to focus on being 100 percent healthy in 2015.

The AL West standings as of June 4 are as follows: Oakland in first at 37-22. Los Angeles Angels at second with a 31-27 record. Seattle is in third at 31-28. Texas sits at fourth with a 29-30 record and Houston rounds out the bottom at 25-35.

Let's hope those Texas bats wake up and next week we can be talking about a 4-0 sweep of the Indians and two wins against Miami that boosted the Rangers into second place again.

In the meantime, check out some great college baseball action this weekend. It is the Super Regionals. Teams are two games from the College World Series in Omaha. Last weekend was great with regional action. 13 games went into extra innings!

Kings beat Rangers

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Justin Williams usually saves his greatest postseason heroics for seventh games, not openers.

And for all of his series-saving feats over the years, the two-time NHL champion had never scored an overtime play-off goal.

When Williams got the puck on his stick with an uncontested chance to stake the Los Angeles Kings to an early lead in the Stanley Cup finals, Mr. Game 7 buried the shot and the New York Rangers.

Williams scored 4:36 into overtime after a turnover by Dan Girardi, and Los Angeles beat New York 3-2 Wednesday night in a thrilling series opener.

Kyle Clifford had a goal and an assist, and Drew Doughty made up for an early mistake by scoring the tying goal in the second period. Jonathan Quick made 25 saves as the Kings moved one victory closer to their second Stanley Cup title in three years — but only after another rally in a post-season full of comebacks.

"We certainly don't want to make a habit out of this," Williams said. "That is a world-class team up there with world-class offense. There could have been a lot of story lines tonight. They had a breakaway in the end of the third period that (Jonathan) Quick made a great save on. We wouldn't be sitting here right now. A lot of things (went) awry during the game."
