## AgriLife Research: Triticale offers grazing benefits, options

CHILLICOTHE – There are many advantages to triticale as a forage over wheat or oats in the Rolling Plains, according to Jason Baker, Texas A&M AgriLife Research senior research associate in Amarillo, who has been conducting trials since 2002.

Baker has worked with forage trials in both the Lockett and Chillicothe areas, first while he was stationed at the Texas A&M AgriLife Research and Extension Center in Vernon and continuing now with the AgriLife Research wheat breeding program at Amarillo.

Triticale is a cross between wheat and rye, Baker explained. It was first developed in the late 1800s, but the first commercial releases were not available until the 1960s. Triticale grows taller and remains green longer than wheat.

"We've been working several years here to make better varieties for the Rolling Plains," he said during a recent field day near Chillicothe. "We don't see triticale competing for the wheat acres. It's really a complement to dual-purpose wheat. We are trying to use the triticale more for grazing and not put as much pressure on our wheat, allowing us to use the wheat more for grain and triticale for forage."

"Anyone who grazes wheat or uses wheat for hay might want to at least have some triticale in their program," he said.

"You can plant the triticale earlier and turn cattle in and save the wheat for grain later

on. If you have a lot of growth, you can graze the wheat some, but use the triticale as your main focus for grazing.”

Working with about 20 experimental lines and 100 commercially available triticale lines in

breeding trials at Vernon, Baker said he also has compiled eight years of forage yields data comparing triticale, wheat, oats and barley.

The most recent three-year total average resulted in the triticale varieties yielding 2.09-2.11 tons per acre dry matter, compared to 1.69-1.93 tons per acre for wheat, 1.61-1.79 tons per acre

for oats, and 1.54-2.01 tons per acre on barley. In 2014, the triticale — after three clippings — yielded considerably better under drought and late freeze conditions, he said. The triticale yields were 1.92-2 tons per acre compared to wheat at 1.26-1.58 tons per acre, oats at 0.88-1.17 tons per acre and barley at 1.13-1.44 tons per acre.

“Triticale tops that test here in the Rolling Plains,” he said at a recent field day near Chillocothe. “Our breeding plots have oats and wheat planted next to the triticale, and you can look at the difference — oats had a lot of freeze damage. The wheat is shorter and just produces less forage.”

Baker said the two Tex-

as A&M AgriLife varieties in the forage trial are TAMcale 6331 and TAMcale 5019, “but if you took any good commercial triticale variety, you will get the same results for grazing, hay or silage. They produce a much greater quantity.”

“Many triticale varieties have disease and insect resistance that wheat and oats don’t have, al-

lowing us to plant a little earlier in the year,” he said. “We can get cattle on sooner by taking advantage of some of the late summer rains that we might get and go ahead and get it in the ground and get a good stand.”

In addition to the earlier stand in the fall, Baker said triticale offers two to three weeks longer grazing time in the spring.

## Feds aren't inspecting 4 in 10 higher-risk wells

NEW CASTLE, Colo. (AP) — Four in 10 new oil and gas wells near national forests and fragile watersheds or otherwise identified as higher pollution risks escape federal inspection, unchecked by an agency struggling to keep pace with America's drilling boom, according to an Associated Press review that shows wide state-by-state disparities in safety checks.

Roughly half or more of wells on federal and Indian lands weren't checked in Colorado, Utah and Wyoming, despite potential harm that has led to efforts in some communities to ban new drilling.

In New Castle, a tiny Colorado River valley community, homeowners expressed chagrin at the large number of uninspected wells, many on federal land, that dot the

steep hillsides and rocky landscape. Like elsewhere in the West, water is a precious commodity in this Colorado town, and some residents worry about the potential health hazards of any leaks from wells and drilling.

"Nobody wants to live by an oil rig. We surely didn't want to," said Joann Jaramillo, 54.

About 250 yards up the hill from Jaramillo's home, on land that was a dormant gravel pit when she bought the house eight years ago, is an active drilling operation that operates every day from 7 a.m. until sometimes 10:30 p.m. Jaramillo said the drilling began about three years ago.

Even if the wells were inspected, she questioned whether that would ensure their safety. She said many view the oil and gas industry as self-policing and

nontransparent.

"Who are they going to report to?" she asked.

Government data obtained by the AP point to the Bureau of Land Management as so overwhelmed by a boom in a new drilling technique known as hydraulic fracturing, or fracking, that it has been unable to keep up with inspections of some of the highest priority wells. That's an agency designation based on a greater need to protect against possible water contamination and other environmental and safety issues.

Factors also include whether the well is near a high-pressure formation or whether the drill operator lacks a clear track record of service.

"No one would have predicted the incredible boom of drilling on federal lands, and the number of wells

we've been asked to process," said the BLM's deputy director, Linda Lance. Since fracking reached a height in 2009, about 90 percent of new wells on federal land are drilled by the process, which involves pumping huge volumes of water, sand and chemicals underground.

"The current rate of inspections is simply not acceptable to us," she said.

The agency oversees 100,000 oil and gas wells on public lands, 3,486 of which received the high priority designation.

According to BLM records for fiscal years 2009 to 2012, 1,400 of those high priority wells, spread across 13 states, were not federally inspected. Wyoming had the most, 632, or 45 percent. South Dakota had 1 out of 2 wells uninspected, and Pennsylvania had 1 out of 6.

## Wendy Davis going beyond Texas for campaign bucks

AUSTIN (AP) — Hollywood loves stars and loves an underdog, and Democrat Wendy Davis is both. At a recent rooftop fundraiser hosted by Steven Spielberg and Jeffrey Katzenberg at the Bad Robot film studios near Los Angeles, she socked away more money for what could be a financially record-shattering race for Texas governor.

Likewise, in Manhattan brownstones, Silicon Valley mansions and Washington hotels, Davis has told her compelling personal story of rising from a trailer park to Harvard Law and reeled in donors. She now has financial backers in every U.S. state and has collected nearly four times as much — at least \$3.6 million — from outside Texas as her opponent, Republican Greg Abbott.

The Fort Worth state lawmaker's feats as a fundraising dynamo since her nearly 13-hour filibuster over new Texas abortion restrictions a year ago have put her in a stronger financial position than any recent Democratic candidate for Texas governor, raising the likelihood she'll be able to afford the barrage of airtime needed to

compete in a state with two time zones and 20 media markets.

"Texas is a huge state," said Kristin Oblander, a national Democratic fundraiser who helped host a Davis luncheon in Atlanta. She added, "The budgets for these races are immense, and the pressure for fundraising is huge."

But Republicans are beginning to make an issue of her out-of-state money, and it's not clear whether the cash will be enough to help her close the gap in a state that hasn't elected a Democrat to statewide office in 20 years.

Davis has continued to trail significantly in polls following Texas primary elections, and just this week made a huge shakeup by switching campaign managers. Even the chairman of the Democratic Governors Association didn't include Texas while ticking off a list of top races that the group deems winnable.

Davis isn't eager to discuss her out-of-state support.

"The vast majority of the donations have come from within our state. This is a race about Texas," said Davis, deflecting questions recently about her national fundraising.

Courting out-of-state-dollars is not uncommon in governor's races — Virginia Democrat Terry McAuliffe and Wisconsin Republican Scott Walker raised most of

their funds last year from beyond their state borders. But it's rarer in Texas where both parties have deep rosters of big donors, and it's sensitive for Democratic candidates who must appeal to conservative voters.

Her campaign crowds about an impressive 133,600 individual donors she has enlisted in raising at least \$16 million, which approaches the \$17 million Abbott has raised since last summer. More than one in every four dollars to Davis has come from out of state. More than 90 percent of Abbott's haul is home-state money.

"Republicans have such a strong base here in Texas," said Roy Bailey, a top Republican fundraiser in Dallas. "If you're looking out of state, it just tells you there's something fundamentally wrong with where you're running."

Although Abbott has taken money from the conservative billionaire Koch brothers, who are in Kansas, his campaign says he's putting in the most face time across Texas' 254 counties.

"We're out there talking to Texans. She's out there talking to Californians and New Yorkers," Abbott spokesman Matt Hirsch said.

The pitch Davis makes to donors elsewhere is familiar: Republicans who've run the state have shortchanged basics like schools and tight-

ened access to abortion, and a new tea party wave is only pushing the state farther to the right. Her celebrity status is an added attraction.

"I shelled out a hundred bucks just to be able to meet her, shake her hand and talk to her for a second," said Vicki Roush, 60, a Florida wine shop manager who's never lived in Texas but attended a Davis fundraiser in Key West. She said she cried while watching Davis' filibuster online last summer. "All the girls I know that were there were beside themselves."

At the same time, some Democratic Party support may be holding back until the state's growing Hispanic population makes a Democratic victory more likely in the next five to 10 years.

"It's been frustrating for people here," said Scott Atlas, finance director for Bill White, the Democratic candidate in 2010, who got little help from the Democratic Governors Association and lost by double digits.

Many Texas Democrats say it's simply nice to see other states opening its checkbooks for one of their candidates for once.

"I think it's to her credit. I hope she raises a lot of money out of state," said Arthur Schechter, a prominent Democratic fundraiser. For other state's candidates, "We're the national ATM machine."

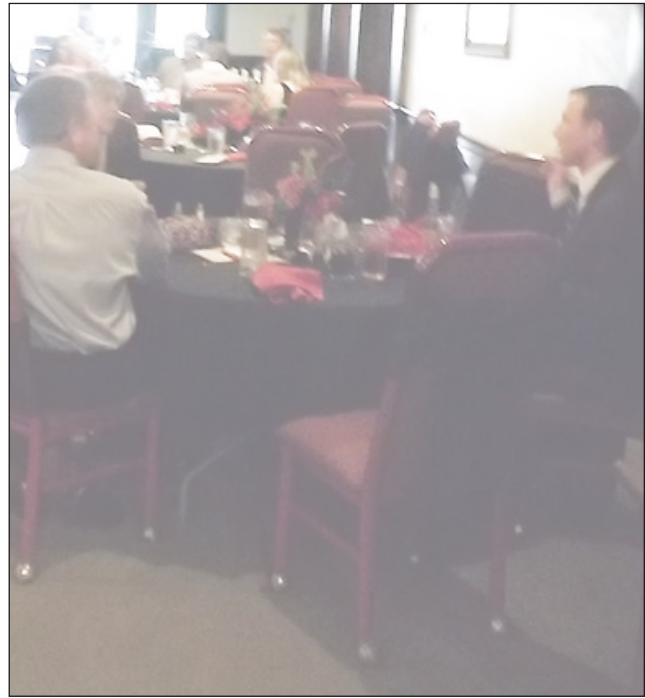

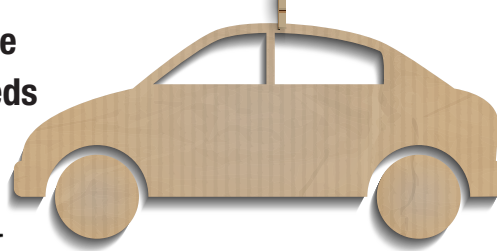

# Judge: JC Penney interfered with Macy's pact

NEW YORK (AP) — A New York State Supreme Court judge ruled in favor of Macy's claim that J.C. Penney interfered with a merchandising contract with Martha Stewart Living Omnimedia Inc. when it cut a deal in 2011 under its previous CEO to create a collection of home goods.

But the judge, Jeffrey Oing, said Macy's failed to prove that Penney was liable for punitive damages since he says the actions weren't "malicious" or "immoral."

Macy's is still entitled to attorney's fees and other monetary damages from Penney related to the selling of a line of bath towels, pots and other products that were designed by Martha Stewart but were sold under the JCP Everyday name last year.

Such products were covered by a long-standing exclusive contract between Macy's and Martha Stewart.

Oing ordered that the issue

of damages and attorney fees be addressed by a judicial hearing officer or a special referee.

The 63-page decision, issued Monday, came six months after Macy's and Martha Stewart resolved a legal battle to sell home furnishings at Penney. The terms of that deal were not disclosed.

The decision also followed a move last fall by Penney to scale back its merchandising partnership with Martha Stewart as pressure was looming. As part of that move, Penney said that it will no longer sell a broad range of home and bath products designed by Martha Stewart items, including window treatments, rugs and party supplies that is not covered in the exclusive contract.

"The preponderance of the evidence compels me to find

that (Penney's) 'inducement exceeded the minimum level of ethical behavior in the marketplace,' and, as such, was improper," Oing wrote in his ruling on Monday.

But Oing said that Macy's should not be awarded punitive damages since such damages are only proper if Penney's conduct in "perpetrating the tortious interference of contract was wanton, reckless, malicious and evinced a high degree of immorality."

Oing noted the preponderance of evidence demonstrates that Penney's top executives were "less than admirable." "At best, one can only describe such conduct as adolescent hijinks in the worst form," he added. But he said the actions were to gain "an edge in the ever-increasing competitive retail market and to revolutionize the way consumers shop for merchandise."

Penney said last fall that it

will be returning to the media and merchandising company the 11 million shares it bought as part of the 2011 licensing deal and giving up two seats on Martha Stewart's board.

The revised agreement was the latest way Penney's returning CEO Mike Ullman was unraveling the botched bid by former CEO Ron Johnson to transform the retailer, which led to disastrous results. Johnson, who became Penney's CEO in November 2011, was ousted in April 2013.

Johnson had signed the 10-year merchandising deal with Martha Stewart in December 2011 and touted it as a key part of his plan to reinvent the chain. He envisioned small Martha Stewart shops filled with branded products. Penney then invested \$38.5 million in Martha Stewart Living Omnimedia. But a month later, Macy's sued both companies.

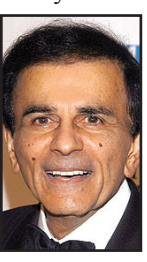

### Top 10 things you might not know about Casey Kasem

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Counting down the top 10 things you might not know about radio personality Casey Kasem, the founding voice of “American Top 40,” who died Sunday:

1. Beginning in 1969, Kasem voiced the character Shaggy for the animated series “Scooby-Doo: Where Are You!” He continued to voice the long-haired hippie in TV, film and video games until 2009. He

also gave voice to characters on “Sesame Street” and the 1986 “Transformers” movie, along with voicing Robin on “Super Friends.”

9. Kasem’s work on radio commercials was highly lucrative — and not nearly as easy as it might have seemed for someone so smooth on the air. “The greatest compliment that anyone can pay me is that after I say something, they remember it,” he once said. “I’ll go over a piece of copy until I’ve gotten the essence of what the writer had in mind, every nuance.”

8. In addition to his radio show and voice work, Kasem was the co-host of a teen

dance show on Los Angeles television during the 1960s called “Shebang.” He also had a minor hit single during that time, “Letter From Elaine,” and appeared in a few low-budget movies and some network TV series, including “Hawaii Five-O” and “Ironside.”

7. While Kasem seldom appeared onscreen, his second wife, Jean Kasem, was a semi-regular in the sitcom “Cheers” as Loretta Tortelli and a regular in a short-lived spinoff, “The Tortellis.”

6. Kasem gained attention in the 1990s when he blew up because of a staff error on his “American Top 40” show and his taped remarks,

swearing and all, made their way into cyberspace. He told The New York Times in 2004 that he didn’t know it had been made public until years later.

5. Kasem was a vegetarian and an activist against factory farming.

4. An Arab-American activist, Kasem called for a fairer balance between heroes and villains in the 1994 Disney Aladdin sequel, “The Return of Jafar.” But he added, “We’re not out there just to be so picky that we become a pain in the neck. We’re there to do what we can to call attention to the sensitivity of not only Arab-Americans, but

to any ethnic group.”

3. As host of “American Top 40,” Kasem introduced a romantic segment called Long Distance Dedication. Listeners would send in their dedications, and Kasem would pick a few heartfelt messages to read each week on the air, playing the love song that went with it. The first Long Distance Dedication Kasem played was Neil Diamond’s “Desiree” on Aug. 26, 1978.

2. When “American Top 40” premiered on July 4, 1970, the top five songs were: Three Dog Night’s “Mama Told Me (Not to Come),” The Jackson

Five’s “The Love You Save,” The Temptations’ “Ball of Confusion (That’s What the World is Today),” “Ride Captain Ride” by Blues Image and Freda Payne’s “Band of Gold.” When Kasem retired from “AT40” at the end of 2003, the top five tracks were: “Hey Ya” by Outkast, “Here Without You” by 3 Doors Down, “Suga Suga” by Baby Bash, “Perfect” by Simple Plan and Nickelback’s “Someday.”

1. “Keep your feet on the ground, and keep reaching for the stars.” — The radio signoff Kasem used throughout his five-decade career.

### ‘Field of Dreams’ hosts 25th anniversary in Iowa

DYERSVILLE, Iowa (AP) — Actor Colin Eggesfield wasn’t in the classic baseball film “Field of Dreams.”

But if they built a screen in center field, he would come.

When Eggesfield heard about plans to celebrate the 25th anniversary of the movie’s release during Father’s Day weekend in Iowa, he flew to Sioux Falls, South Dakota, picked up his dad and drove six hours to the farm where it was filmed.

The Los Angeles-based Eggesfield, most recently seen on TV shows such as “Rizzoli and Isles” and “The Client List,” and his father reached rural Dyersville in time for a viewing of the movie on the outfield grass with scores of others, including star Kevin Costner.

That’s when “Hey

dad, you want to have a catch?” got them all, all over again.

“My brother had one arm around my dad. I had my arm around him as well. It was just water works,” Eggesfield said of the film’s memorable final scene.

This weekend’s emotional reunion in Iowa showed why “Field of Dreams” still resonates with so many after so many years.

The site of the Oscar-nominated film about an Iowa farmer who hears a voice whisper “If you build it, he will come” and follows through on his vision by building a baseball diamond over a corn field has itself become a tourist destination since the movie’s release in 1989.

So it was only natural for the farm in northeast Iowa to host a three-day

celebration of the film that made it so famous.

Stars such as Costner and Timothy Busfield joined celebrities like Eggesfield, past American League Cy Young award winner Bret Saberhagen and thousands of fans from all over the Midwest at the remote locale.

Costner played the role of Ray Kinsella, the farmer whose diamond lured both the 1919 Chicago “Black Sox” and his own long-gone father out of the cornstalks beyond left field.

Twenty-five years later, Costner brought his wife and kids back to Iowa to reminisce about his role in one of the most beloved sports movies of all time.

“I’m glad to be here with friends and old acquaintances and making some new ones, and for

my children to be a part of this,” Costner said. “It’s certainly a high mark for me, this little movie, and it remains so.”

The weekend was jam-packed with activities like celebrity softball games and concerts from the Gin Blossoms, Joan Jett and the Blackhearts, and even Costner’s own country band, Modern West.

But perhaps the biggest item on the agenda was a game of “remember when” — for fans and actors alike.

Busfield, who played Ray Kinsella’s brother-in-law Mark, said the moment when “Shoelless” Joe Jackson, played by Ray Liotta, drilled a liner at Costner’s feet after he dared the White Sox star to hit his curveball is still his favorite.

Actor Dwier Brown, who played Kinsella’s

father, talked about how much Costner’s famous plea to Liotta — “What’s in it for me?” — still makes him chuckle.

Broadcaster Bob Costas, who hosted a Q&A with the cast on Friday, talked about how much he enjoyed Burt Lancaster in the role of “Moonlight Graham,” a ballplayer-turned-doctor who gave up his second shot at a baseball career to save Kinsella’s daughter from choking on a hot dog.

What all the actors have in common are warm memories of a movie that’s nearly as popular now as when it was released in 1989.

“I don’t know if anybody thought that, 25 years later, it would still be an iconic movie. You don’t aim for the fences. You try to do your best job 12 hours a day,” Busfield

said. “What it’s become, you don’t ever expect.”

Many believe the film’s enduring popularity is tied to how it tackled the timeless issues of fathers, sons and their often complicated relationships.

That wasn’t lost on organizers, who allowed dozens of dads to play catch with their kids — both boys and girls — in the outfield on Saturday morning.

“It just makes you think about people who aren’t in your lives anymore or people that you should reconnect with,” Michael Dunn, a native of Mount Vernon, Iowa, said following a catch with his son Samuel. “When we were here (Friday) night to watch the movie, I’ve watched it probably 400 times and tears still came to my eyes. It’s just an amazing movie.”

### Jane Lynch to cheer on Special Olympic athletes

NEW YORK (AP) — The Cheerios coach from “Glee” is leading the rally for Special Olympians.

Jane Lynch will attend the opening ceremony of the Special Olympics USA Games on Sunday — possibly with her signature tracksuit and bullhorn — whipping

up the expected crowd of 18,000 at the Prudential Center in Newark, New Jersey.

Her character Sue Sylvester on Fox’s “Glee” is a cheerleading coach who encourages a girl with Down syndrome to participate with the cheer squad. Sylvester’s sister and baby on the show also have Down syndrome.

“I’ve gotten to know people who have developmental disabilities and their wonderful families since being on Glee,”

Lynch said of actress Lauren Potter, who has Down syndrome, and plays her closest friend on the show. “The folks in the community of support for people with developmental disabilities are so awesome and heart-centered.”

“Lauren is a huge bright light. She’s very focused and professional and yet loves to have fun and goof around.”

Six Special Olympians started the torch run this week in Manhattan, and the “Flame of Hope” will arrive for the lighting of the cauldron at the opening ceremony on Father’s Day.

“All the fathers at the Prudential Center will have a tear in their eye,” said T.J. Nelligan, official chairman of the Special Olympics USA Games. “You really don’t see the disability. You see what they can do and can achieve.”

The opening ceremony, with a theme of inclusion, will be hosted by model and actress Brooklyn Decker and Philadelphia 76ers guard Michael Carter-Williams. New Jersey Gov. Chris Christie, the honorary chair of the event, is expected to attend.

Some 3,500 athletes from 50 states are arriving in New Jersey for the weeklong event, and Cessna donated the use of planes to fly in 800 athletes and deliver their luggage to campuses at Rider and The College of New Jersey.

They’ll participate in 16

sports, competing at Princeton and other college venues. Triathlon and baseball have been added to the program, and a youth summit will highlight acceptance and inclusion at schools.

Nelligan, whose 24-year-old son Sean has intellectual and developmental disabilities, helped convince corporations to pledge \$20 million and land the games in 2011.

The numerous sponsors increased the budget from \$8 million at past games. He compared the event with the recent Super Bowl held in nearby East Rutherford.

“In all the meetings, not a single person told us no, just what level they’d be involved,” said Nelligan, a sports marketing executive. “(It) shows it’s as meaningful and maybe more inspiring than the little game they had there in February.”

Sean seemed fine until he started having seizures at 6 months and didn’t talk. He’s been involved in the Special Olympics New Jersey Games for 13 years, playing basketball, soccer and bocce. He holds a job at his dad’s restaurant and is “the happiest person you’ve ever met.”

“He gets to go to the games in his home state with all his friends,” Nelligan said. “Twelve years ago, he didn’t have any friends and went to a special needs school. He’s built so much confidence.”

## Spurs beat Heat 104-87 in Game 5 to win NBA title

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — Tim Duncan and Tony Parker won titles in their second seasons. Manu Ginobili was a champion as an NBA rookie.

Success came so quickly and frequently for the Big Three, but San Antonio couldn't keep it up after winning its last title in 2007. And just when the Spurs were on the verge of being back on top again last year, the Miami Heat practically snatched the rings right off their fingers.

So when they finally celebrated again Sunday, players wrapping themselves in flags from around the world in a reminder that the Spurs look far beyond the border to build champions, Parker had no trouble deciding where to rank this title.

"That's why I say it's the sweetest one," Parker said, "because it's just unbeliev-

able to win seven years ago, and to be so close last year, it was very cruel. But that's the beauty of sport. Sometimes it's tough. And sometimes it can be beautiful like today."

The Spurs finished off a dominant run to their fifth NBA championship, ending the Heat's two-year title reign with a 104-87 victory that wrapped up the series in five games.

Painfully denied 12 months ago by the Heat, this victory party was worth the wait.

"We got to this spot and we didn't let it go," Ginobili said.

San Antonio erased an early 16-point deficit and routed Miami for the fourth time in the series, denying the Heat's quest for a third straight championship. A year after the Spurs suffered their only loss in six finals appear-

ances — a heartbreaking seven-game defeat — they turned the rematch into no match at all.

"We had a great first quarter, but from that point on they were the better team, and that's why they're the champions in 2014," said LeBron James, who led the Heat with 31 points and 10 rebounds.

Finals MVP Kawhi Leonard had 22 points and 10 rebounds for the Spurs, who added this title to the ones they won in 1999, 2003, '05 and '07 by shooting a finals-record 52.8 percent in the series.

"They played exquisite basketball this series and in particular these last three games and they are the better team. There's no other way to say it," Heat coach Erik Spoelstra said.

A decade and a half after winning their first title, the Spurs remain the NBA's

model organization, a small-market team that simply wins big and hardly ever does it with a high draft pick. Instead, they found players overseas or in other organizations who would fit the Spurs' way of doing things and mesh with Duncan, Parker and Ginobili, who have teamed for 117 postseason victories, the most by one trio.

Players such as Leonard, acquired in a draft-night trade with Indiana after playing at San Diego State, and Patty Mills, an Australian national who scored 17 points off the bench.

The Spurs won four titles in nine years, but had gone so long since the last one that Foreigner's "Feels Like the First Time" was an appropriate song choice after the final buzzer.

Duncan and Popovich have been here for all of

them, and it was the fourth for Parker and Ginobili, who with Duncan are once again the reigning the Big Three in the NBA.

Chris Bosh finished with 13 points and Dwyane Wade just 11 on 4-of-12 shooting for the Heat.

The painful conclusion to last year's NBA Finals served as the fuel for this one, powering the Spurs to a league-best 62-win season and a rematch with Miami — the first in the finals since Chicago beat Utah in 1997-98.

Round 2 went to the Spurs, but both teams have challenges to navigate if there is to be a rubber match.

San Antonio will face questions — as it has for years — about the age of its core, and whether Duncan, Ginobili and Popovich want to stick around. The Heat will brace for

the potential free agency of James, Wade and Bosh, and will need younger, fresher pieces around the three All-Stars if they all stay.

But this moment belongs to the Spurs.

Playing a methodical style for many years made San Antonio respected, but never beloved despite its winning ways. The Spurs were TV ratings killers, casual viewers finding them not much fun to watch.

But Popovich opened up the offense a few years ago, making the Spurs an easy-to-like, tough-to-beat group that thrives on ball movement and 3-point shooting.

"You showed the world how beautiful this game is," Commissioner Adam Silver told the Spurs during the postgame award ceremony.

## Jimmie Johnson finally wins at Michigan

BROOKLYN, Mich. (AP) — In the final seconds of his first victory at Michigan International Speedway, Jimmie Johnson could finally relax a bit.

"About 200 yards before the finish line, I knew if the car exploded, I'd still slide across the finish line," Johnson said. Johnson and his No. 48 Chevrolet made it through the last few laps with a comfortable lead, and the six-time series champion won Sunday for the first time in 25 NASCAR Sprint Cup starts at MIS. Johnson outlasted pole winner Kevin Harvick by 1.214 seconds for his third victory in four races. He also won at Charlotte and Dover.

It was the fifth victory in a row for Chevy and Hendrick Motorsports. Jeff Gordon and Dale Earn-

hardt Jr. also have won during the streak that doesn't count Jamie McMurray's win for Chevy and Chip Ganassi in the Sprint All-Star race last month.

Brad Keselowski finished third Sunday after two straight runner-up showings at Dover and Pocono. Paul Menard was fourth, followed by Kasey Kahne, Gordon and Earnhardt in the 400-mile, 200-lap race.

Johnson had finished in the top five four times previously at Michigan, including a second-place showing in August 2011. He lost in August 2012 when his engine faltered with six laps remaining.

"It was a long time coming," crew chief Chad Knaus said. "We've raced very well up here, and we haven't been able to close the deal on quite a few occasions."

There are now only four tracks on the current schedule where Johnson has never won — Kentucky, Watkins Glen, Chi-

cagoland and Homestead-Miami. Johnson had led in 15 previous Cup races at MIS.

"It's good to see Jimmie, after leading so many laps here, close the deal," owner Rick Hendrick said. "We've run out of gas, broke motors, blown tires."

Johnson led after 164 laps Sunday before stopping to pit and giving up the lead. He was back in front with about 10 laps to go following a cycle of pit stops by other drivers.

"We really were in a win-win situation," Johnson said. "Those guys still had to come to pit road to make it to the end. Once I got an idea of how the race was unfolding, I knew we were in the catbird seat, and were able to take advantage of it."

Hendrick had four drivers in the top seven.

Johnson is trying for his seventh Cup title, which would tie the mark shared by Richard Petty and the late Dale Earnhardt. This was his 69th career victo-

ry, and he's the first driver with three wins in 2014.

"Even at 69 wins, I still cherish them all," Johnson said. "It is not easy to win in this sport."

Hendrick's team, however, is making it look easy, having won five straight races for the third time. Hendrick accomplished the feat twice in 2007, including a six-race streak.

Gordon's sixth-place finish was enough to keep him atop the points race, with Hendrick teammates Johnson and Earnhardt in second and third.

Ford had won the last three Cup races at Michigan, with Joey Logano prevailing last August and Greg Biffle winning twice before that. Keselowski couldn't extend that streak, and Logano finished ninth.

"We kind of trudged through it and came away with another top-three effort, which is good but not great," said Keselowski, who was unable to come away with a victory in his home state. "We want

the wins, especially here at Michigan. That would mean a lot."

Keselowski, who has a couple Nationwide victories at Michigan, is 0 for 10 in Cup races at the track.

It was a rough day for Roush Fenway Racing, which has a record 13 Cup victories at Michigan. Biffle finished 20th and Carl Edwards was 23rd.

Kyle Busch was forced out of the race because of a problem with his left rear hub. He finished 41st and dropped from sixth to 10th in the standings.

Harvick qualified at over 204 mph Friday, the fastest

pole-winning speed since 1987. He led for a race-high 63 laps but had to settle for his third second-place finish this year, to go along with two wins and three poles.

"The car was fast, just wound up on the wrong side of all the strategy," he said.

Menard won the Nationwide race Saturday and managed a fourth-place finish Sunday.

"I actually got to go to Victory Lane yesterday with my daughter and my dad was here today, so it was a good Father's Day weekend for sure," he said.

## Schumacher out of coma

BERLIN (AP) — Nearly six months after sustaining serious head injuries in a skiing accident, seven-time Formula One champion Michael Schumacher left a French hospital Monday and was transferred to neighboring Switzerland to continue his recovery.

Schumacher "is not in a coma anymore," his manager, Sabine Kehm, said in a brief statement announcing that the German driver had left the Grenoble University Hospital, where he had been treated since his accident Dec. 29.

Kehm gave no further details of his condition or medical outlook, saying only that he would "continue his long phase of rehabilitation."

Schumacher left the Grenoble hospital Monday morning,

said hospital spokeswoman Brigitte Polikar,

who declined to give any details on his condition.
