- Adopting on second reading an ordinance that will amend revenues and appropriations providing for an additional \$177,480.67 for the 2014 Seal Coat Project.
- Approving a request from CP45 (TX), LLC d/b/a CP Homes to replat lots three and four of the Benpar Subdivision.
- Awarding a bid for a new LED Electronic Message Center for the M.K. Brown Auditorium.
- Approving the List of Disbursements dated May 2014.

County Commissioners will hold special meeting today

The Gray County Commissioners will hold a special meeting at 3 p.m. this afternoon in the second floor court room of the Gray County Courthouse.

The Commissioners will be further discussing emergency repairs to the Gray County Annex building.

During the June 22 wind storm, the Annex was severely damaged. Though the roof has recently been repaired with patches, it could not withstand the 93 mph winds that the storm brought along with it. The high winds destroyed the roof, and there is a portion of it lying in the annex parking lot.

After discussing the necessary repairs in detail, the Commissioners will consider appointment of a general contractor for the repair.

The next regular meeting for the Gray County Commissioners is scheduled for 9 a.m. Tuesday, July 15.

General crime rate in the area slows in early July

July is Watch Your Car Month, and The Pampa News contacted Crime Prevention Officer Brian Massey at the Pampa Police Department for some input on vehicle vandalism.

Massey said that he has not seen a recent spike in vehicle

vandalism, such as slashed tires, but it is always a good idea to practice safe habits when parking it for the night.

The fact that there has not been a recent spike in this type of

The fact that there has not been a recent spike in this type of crime does not go to say that the occasional act of vandalism does not occur. Massey also said that if it is not possible to keep vehicles in garages, which is the best way to prevent vandalism to them, the next best thing would be parking in well-lit areas.

This lessens the chances of becoming a victim of car vandalism.

Aside from car-related crimes, Massey said that the general crime rate for Pampa has not spiked at all lately, which was surprising even to him with the recent Fourth of July holiday weekend.

He did say that bike theft has been a persistent problem for some time now. Pampa averages about one or two bike thefts a week right now. This type of crime usually tends to increase in the summer months, so be sure to use bike locks to decrease the likeliness of becoming a victim of this crime.

The importance of water conservation

much rainfall we've received? Having to mow

your lawn a lot more, aren't you? One friend lamented he has mowed his lawn more this past week than he did all of last

year... I have felt his pain, however, since ensconced in high rise living, I'm no longer required to include lawn mowing part and parcel my OCD, thank God, but I find it easy to judge how much rainfall we've received by the size of weeds that have beanstalked their way into the atmosphere! Thanks to some good moisture, there are some impressive weeds about our fair little burg, and already, I've some impressive sneezes...

After eight years of living in a wind blown dusty desert environment, all this wonderful green sure is nice! The last year Panhandle flora was this green was the summer of 2006, oddly so because preceding that wet summer were those horrific now historic prairie fires. Drive a motorway out of Pampa any direction the

compass offers, everything is a thriving verdant green. Cow tanks and ponds are full, even area lakes water levels have significantly risen, which brings me to the juxt of this week's

Lake Meredith's water level has risen enough for CRMWA to consider once again, pumping water to area cities. You remember Lake Meredith, don't you? Lake Meredith, from a press release back in the 1960's, was to furnish the Panhandle's water needs for centuries to come, yet today due to the drought, and pumping, is nothing but a glorified cow tank. By CRMWA's decision, one would think our drought is over, right? Well, no, the drought isn't over, for I just checked the Drought Intensity Scale. True to my thought, our area is still in the dark brown color section of the scale denoting 'exceptional drought'.

The article in the Amarillo Globe-News read 'Water Authority ready to tap rain-swelled Lake Meredith.' The water level in the lake went up at least 4.5 feet in June, according to U.S. Geological Survey measurements. Okay. From a 1.5-foot jump in May, the lake's level July 4 was just under 40 feet.

Um, methinks 40 feet, up from a pre-rains 30-foot level, hardly qualifies for 'rain-swelled, particularly so for the fact the lake's highest depth was at 102 feet. My gifted and talented math tells me a level back to that 102 feet would better qualify as, 'rain-swelled.

"We were pumping at this level in 2010 without using the low-level pumps, and we continued with low-level pumps in 2011, said Kent Satterwhite, general manager of CRMWA. Indeed, Mr. Satterwhite is correct, however, the water authority continued to pump the lake of water till they had to cease due to the fact that you cannot pump mud! Continuing, Mr. Satterwhite said "There may be some water

quality issues, but we're going to look at it right away. We're going to poll (Pampa is one) the cities." Water quality issues!?! Wonder why Mr. Satterwhite chose not to name these particular issues? Runoff from rains

upstream in New Mexico continue to flow into Lake Meredith. Another factor not mentioned in any press release is our main source of water, the Ogallala Aquifer. Heavy rains the past two months up and down the New Mexico and

Colorado eastern slopes of the Rocky Mountains, the aquifer's recharge zone, have increased the depth of Ogallala Aquifer. But is all this God-sent moisture the end of this eight years of drought? No.

CRMWA, let Lake Meredith rebound a tad more before resuming pumping. Hell, repumping lake water to Lubbock alone will greatly lessen in a matter of a few days that new 40-foot level! What about evaporation you counter? Why sure, but evaporation will not lessen the lakes level faster than pumping. CRMWA, let the lake replenish more. Let the runoff settle, meaning silt and those other "quality issues." Let Lake Meredith come back!

An Associated Press reporter recently spent several days observing the human drama that unfolds daily across this arid landscape that bristles with cameras, lookout towers and heavily armed patrols.

Most of the impoverished immigrants hail from Central America, and many come with children. They often turn themselves over to authorities immediately after crossing the river, following the advice of smugglers, friends and relatives, who tell them they will eventually be released and allowed to continue to their destination.



Recent studies by Har-"You get the acceptance vard University's Center school districts in places such as greater Boston, suburban Atlanta, Dallas and Fort Worth, Texas, abandon their plans to attend college over the summer.

Among prospective community college students, the summer melt rate increases to about 40 percent, said former Harvard researcher Ben Castleman, now an assistant professor of education and public policy at the University of Virginia. A lack of financial aid

is to blame in about half of those cases, Castleman said. But students also wind up getting derailed by much less significant hurdles, from failing to meet course enrollment deadlines to registering for summer orientation programs.

"The idea was that if you could get a kid to graduate from high school, they'd been accepted and chosen where to go, that student was going to show up," he said. "What our work shows is that in fact, students encounter a pretty complicated array of financial and procedural tasks to complete over the summer."

Daisha Tankins, 19, had planned to attend Spelman College in Atlanta after graduating from a St. Louis high school last summer. But unable to afford the private college and unwilling to go into more than \$100,000 in debt after four years, she enrolled at Harris-Stowe State University in her hometown. Like Spelman, it is a historically black school, but with far more modest costs.

Tankins now works as a peer mentor at the St. Louis counseling center, offering guidance to students who find themselves at a similar crossroads.

"A lot of students are bewildered and can't understand the magnitude of what's going on," she said.

School districts and colleges are beginning to find that reducing summer melt doesn't require dramatic in-

tervention.

First-day jitters come with any new job but when the work involves pushing needles into strangers' bellies, stitching up gaping wounds or even delivering babies, that debut can be especially nerve-wracking for everyone involved.

Brand-new doctors often launch right into patient care within weeks of graduating from medical school. To make sure their skills are up to snuff, many medical schools and hospitals run crash courses in the basics for these new interns

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

Djokovic built a 5-2 lead in the fourth set and served for the championship at 5-3. But Federer broke there for the first time all afternoon, smacking a forehand winner as Djokovic slipped and fell on a patch of brown dirt.

Djokovic took a nastier tumble in the second set, hurting his left leg and prompting the first of two medical timeouts; he got his right calf massaged by a trainer in the fifth. With Federer serving at

5-4 in the fourth, he double-faulted to 30-all, then netted a backhand for 30-40 — handing Djokovic a match point.

Federer hit a 118 mph (190 kph) serve that was called out, but he challenged the ruling, and the replay showed the ball touched a line for an ace. That was part of Federer's five-game run to force a fifth set. It would be another 42 minutes until Djokovic again stood so close to triumph.

"Can't believe I made it to five," Federer said. "Wasn't looking good there for a while."

In truth, after so much drama, the ending was anticlimactic. Trailing 5-4 but serving, Federer missed four groundstrokes, pushing a backhand into the net on Djokovic's second match point.

Victory his, Djokovic knelt on the most hallowed tennis court in the world, plucked a blade of grass and shoved it in his mouth, just as he did after his 2011 Wimbledon title. He dedicated this victory to his pregnant fiancee "and our future baby," and to Jelena Gencic, his first tennis coach, who died last year.

"This is the best tournament in the world, the most valuable one," Djokovic said. "The first tennis match that I ever (saw) in my life, when I was 5 years old, was Wimbledon, and that image stuck (in) my mind."



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
