## City of Pampa warns residents of water-test phone call

The City of Pampa would like to warn residents of Pampa about a company calling offering water tests as a result of fracking.

Fracking is the process of drilling and injecting fluid into the ground at a high pressure in order to fracture shale rocks to release natural gas inside. It is somewhat of a controversial issues.

A company called FracTest has been calling Pampa residents offering to come test their city well water. Some calls have even been asking for a \$50 fee. Another series of these calls have been telling residents to call The City of Pampa's city manager, Richard Morris.

FracTest submitted an article that ran in The Pampa News on Aug. 21. The article suggested to those concerned about their water sanitation to call a listed number. This is

## West Texas solar plant comes online

Less than eight months after breaking ground, the company constructing one of the state's largest solar plants says it has begun harnessing West Texas' intense rays.

First Solar, based in Arizona, announced Thursday that it had completed the first phase of its Barilla Solar Project, adding about 18 megawatts of solar capacity to Texas' electric grid. The company expects to have a total of 30 megawatts installed by the end of the year, said Colin Meehan, its director of regulatory affairs.

On average, one megawatt-hour of solar energy can heat and cool as many as 100 Texas homes for an hour during the hottest summer days. During average temperatures, it can power many times more.

The 200-acre project sits in Pecos County, part of the Permian Basin, a region better known for its prolific oil production.

"Projects like this bring good jobs to the local economy, while diversifying our energy sources," state Rep. Carlos Uresti, D-San Antonio, said in a statement.

Joe Shuster, the Pecos County judge, said he hopes folks will one day call his slice of the region the "Texas solar patch."

Barilla is not the largest solar project in Texas. CPS Energy's Alamo project in San Antonio (41 megawatts, with plans for additional plants that would total 400 megawatts) and Austin Energy's 30-megawatt Webberville facility have it beat. And last May, Austin Energy signed a deal with a California company to build a 150-megawatt solar farm somewhere in West Texas.

But the Barilla project is unique in Texas because its developers – confident that their electricity can compete on the open market – have forged ahead without signing a power purchase agreement, which would guarantee a buyer for their energy.

Texas, because of its size and intense radiation, leads the nation in solar energy potential. Much of that resource is in the state's western half, according to the State Energy Conservation Office. The industry has long struggled to get a foothold in the state, as policymakers have provided fewer incentives than other states, and solar energy currently makes up a tiny fraction of Texas' energy portfolio.

But improving technology has driven down the price of solar power, making it more competitive with

what has prompted not just calls from residents to the City of Pampa, but also calls from FracTest to Pampa residents.

Both Morris and Donny Hooper, director of public works, want to assure residents that the city's well water passes both federal and state standards.

"Our water has to meet

state standards and federal standards," Hooper said. "Which are very stringent. As part of the accountability associated with that, we have to post a water quality report every year. It has anything and everything to do with our water quality and is posted for the public to review."

Hooper said that if anyone wants to question the water quality, they can contact the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality.

Morris said anyone who wants to conduct any form

of drilling within a mile of one of the municipal wells, has to report it to the local groundwater district and the City of Pampa.

Hooper also said he can only vouch for the municipal wells water quality.

"However, if people outside of the city that have private wells, that are not under our strict guidelines, and would like to have them tested, they are welcome to do so if they are curious about the quality of their water," Hooper said.

The phone calls from

FracTest may seem like a scam, but it is simply unnecessary for residents of Pampa who use city well water to pay a third-party company to come out and test their water. The testing that meets state and federal guidelines is already paid for through residents' taxes.

Hooper, Morris and the City of Pampa don't want residents paying more money for testing when the municipal water already meets State and Federal standards.

other resources — even without incentives, developers say. And West Texas is a particularly attractive location for solar plants because of its wide-open spaces and proximity to power lines. The region's transmission structure has been bolstered by the \$7 billion Competitive Renewable Energy Zone project, built to send wind power from the west to Texas' growing cities in the east.

"It's just like any other resource rush," Meehan said. "We're going to see something like we saw with wind."

# Texas pilot, 89, makes final flight, donates plane

AMARILLO (AP) — Cecil Ingram was 10 days past his 16th birthday when he flew an airplane solo for the first time.

"I walked home, and everybody I saw on the street, I told everybody I'd flown an airplane," Ingram recalled. "I was so proud of myself."

The Amarillo Globe-News reports the now-89-year-old Ingram piloted his final flight Wednesday from Dalhart to Amarillo in a 1946 ERCO Ercoupe he donated on arrival to Texas Air & Space Museum at Rick Husband Amarillo International Airport.

The Ercoupe is an easy plane to fly and many people, including seniors, trained on it, Ingram said. It was billed as the safest plane built at the time, Ingram said.

"And I believe it still is," he said. "It was way ahead of its time."

Safe is a relative term when it comes to flying, In-

gram said.

"Flying is, let me put it this way: In some ways it's pure boredom interrupted by moments of stark terror," he said.

Ingram's fascination with aviation began when he was young and outlasted his childhood.

"When I was 4 years old, (Charles) Lindbergh had done his thing, and everybody was talking about Lindbergh, and that was my hero," Ingram said.

In May 1927, Lindbergh, nicknamed "Lucky Lindy," became famous after making the first nonstop flight from New York to Paris, a distance of nearly 3,600 miles, in his plane "The Spirit of St. Louis."

After a stint in the Navy, Ingram attended Spartan School of Aeronautics in Tulsa, Oklahoma, on the GI Bill. He received mechanic rating and flight instructor credentials and was working on learning airport management when he saw a card on the bulletin board in 1948 that would change his life.

"Most of the job opportunities were through the school," he said. "Swift Ingram, who is no relation, and Hubert Koehler were starting a flying school with three Piper Cubs in Dalhart, Texas, and needed someone who could work as a mechanic, a flight instructor and a ground instructor. I did them all."

Through the years, Ingram remained close to aviation. He opened Airport Cafe in Dalhart, ran a flight school and owned a crop dusting service he started with money loaned to him by a former boss.

"Cecil had started the spraying business, and he wanted to buy a sprayer from a fellow who said 'You don't have enough experience, I'm afraid something's going to happen to you,'" said Ron Ferniuk, president of Texas Air & Space Museum, "(but) Cecil was innovative; he went and got a life insurance policy, brought it to the guy, handed him the policy, said, 'If anything happens to me, it'll be taken care of.'"

"He told him to take the plane."

Flying was a way for Ingram to get away from worries on the ground.

"I've always enjoyed flying. In a way it's kind of an escape from reality," he said, "like stepping into a different dimension. And it's really hard to explain, but it's totally a different world."

Age and health problems have started to take a toll on Ingram. He had a heart attack in 1994 and lost vision in his left eye after suffering a detached retina in 1997.

"All pilots are supposed to have a medical certificate to make their pilot license valid. If you fail it, you're through. So, I didn't take the last one," Ingram said Wednesday. "I'm on my third pacemaker and I don't think they would approve pacemakers, so I didn't go back. Since this is my last (flight), I can tell you that."

"I'm not trying to break any records. I love airplanes and I'd just like to see that one (the ERCO Ercoupe) have a good home."

The Ercoupe is below the weight threshold for a pilot to be medically cleared to fly, Ingram said.

"The more important part of this airplane is Cecil Ingram's history," Ferniuk said. "The airplane is a catalyst to talk to people about that history."

The plane will be used in an educational and inspirational context, Ferniuk said.

"For younger kids, we can put them in the airplane and let them touch the controls, imagine themselves flying the plane," he said. "We can also tell people, you know, any airplane you see in the museum, people started in something small like that to learn to fly."

# Fox attempting to break new ground with 'Utopia'

SANTA CLARITA, Calif. (AP) — It appears as if almost anything might be possible in "Utopia."

Whether its ensuring participants can legally hunt, readying for wildfires or accounting for an impending pregnancy, the masterminds behind the new Fox unscripted society-building series have prepared for every possible situation at the rural compound where they're filming "Utopia." Except for one: What if nobody watches?

That's not a scenario the creators of this human ant farm even want to consider.

"Realistically, I don't know," conceded executive producer Conrad Green in his trailer office across from the "Utopia" set a few days before the participants — or "pioneers," as they're called — moved onto a made-over Santa Clarita, California, ranch that's often used as a location in films and TV shows. "The hope, of course, is that it will be a huge success and go on for much more than a year."

Based on a Dutch format, the U.S. version of "Utopia" is billed as a 365-day-long social experiment where 15 folks have been selected to live and work together on a bare-bones plot of land while being filmed by 130 cameras. Unlike similar reality TV trials like "Survivor" and "Big Brother," there's no host, competition or prize. There aren't even humans carrying around cameras.

The action is captured entirely by remote-controlled gizmos positioned in trees, on rocks and throughout the only pair of buildings on the "Utopia" site: a small stable stocked with a chicken coop and two dairy cows, and a large open-air barn where the cast can find shade and sleep. The footage will be overseen, edited and streamed from a complex of trailers steps away from the set.

Green said the producers cast Utopians with contrasting personalities in hopes that the ambitious show wouldn't simply result in a televised "hippy commune." The pioneers include a belly dancer, Southern pastor and a pregnant woman due in December. The series will feature a monthly elimination that will keep the cast changing throughout the life of "Utopia."

"My biggest fear is that it's boring," said Green. "The reason unscripted shows are heavily formatted is because that provides reliable, relentless moments of drama... We have to use the intimacy and purity of the observation we've established to make it interesting in and of itself."

"Utopia," which debuts Sunday before airing each Tuesday and Friday, marks an audacious gambit for Fox. The network

has seen ratings for aging talent contests like "American Idol" and "So You Think You Can Dance" slide in recent years. Simon Andreae, the new head of alternative entertainment at the network, isn't afraid of taking a chance on the "Truman Show"-like series.

"I think we live in a go-big-or-go-home world now, where if you don't take risks, if you go for safe shows, you don't get many big wins, as we've seen in the last year or so of unscripted TV," said Andreae. "That said, I don't think it's just any old big risk. It's a measured risk."

Despite lofty aspirations, "Utopia" won't be boundless. The cast must abide by laws, and they've agreed not to leave the compound unless there's an emergency or they want off the show. While fences surround the "Utopia" camp, producers are planning for future visits from pioneers' friends and families, as well as appointments if they choose to do business with the outside world.

The unique series marks not just a creative risk for Fox but also a financial gamble. The network reportedly spent \$50 million to construct the "Utopia" site, which also includes a small man-made lake stocked with 400 fish, a phony water tower that actually holds a light used to illuminate the compound at night and access for the cast to electricity and plumbing.

"It has been an expensive undertaking, but it's the reverse of most shows," noted Andreae. "Usually, shows become more expensive the more episodes and seasons are produced. This show was expensive to build out in the first place, but the longer it goes on, the less expensive it becomes."

"Utopia" has already been home to plenty of drama, judging from the show's live streams, which went online last week: one cast member was removed before filming began for violating the show's confidentiality agreement, another was treated at a hospital for dehydration before returning; and several have threatened to leave over clashes involving food, alcohol and religion.

Welcome to "Utopia."

# Ex-Virginia gov., wife guilty of public corruption

RICHMOND, Va. (AP) — Former Virginia Gov. Bob McDonnell and his wife were convicted Thursday of using his office to promote a dietary supplement in exchange for gifts in a public corruption case that derailed the career of a onetime rising Republican star.

A federal jury in Richmond convicted Bob McDonnell of 11 of the 13 counts he faced; Maureen McDonnell was convicted of nine of the 13 counts she had faced. Sentencing was scheduled for Jan. 6. Both bowed their heads and wept as a chorus of "guilty" kept coming from the court clerk.

The couple left the courtroom separately and remained apart. Bob McDonnell left first and walked into a witness waiting room; Maureen McDonnell came out later, hugging one of her daughters while weeping loudly. She went into a separate waiting room.

The couple was charged with doing favors for a wealthy vitamin executive in exchange for more than \$165,000 in gifts and loans. They also were charged with submitting fraudulent bank loan applications, and Maureen McDonnell was charged with one count of obstruction.

The former governor testified in his own defense, insisting that he provided nothing more than routine political courtesies to former Star Scientific CEO Jonnie Williams. Maureen McDonnell did not testify. His testimony and that of others exposed embarrassing details about Maureen McDonnell's erratic behavior and the couple's marital woes as the defense suggested they could not have conspired because they were barely speaking.

Williams testified under immunity that he spent freely on the McDonnells in order to secure their help promoting his supposed cure-all, the tobacco-derived anti-inflammatory Anatabloc. Among the gifts were nearly \$20,000 in designer clothing and

accessories for Maureen McDonnell, a \$6,500 Rolex watch for her husband, \$15,000 in catering for one of their daughter's wedding, free vacations and golf outings. Williams also provided three loans totaling \$120,000.

As the gifts were being given, the McDonnells attended various Anatabloc promotional events and hosted a luncheon at the governor's mansion that the company billed as a product launch. Williams also was allowed to invite several of his associates to a reception for Virginia health care leaders at the mansion, and McDonnell arranged meetings for him with two state health officials as he was taking preliminary steps to seek state-backed research on Anatabloc. No applications for research grants were ever submitted.

Prosecutors claimed that the McDonnells turned to Williams because they were grappling with credit card debt that once topped \$90,000 and annual operating shortfalls of \$40,000 to \$60,000 on family-owned vacation rental properties.

Two of the loans totaling \$70,000 were intended for the two Virginia Beach rent houses. Williams said he wrote the first \$50,000 check to Maureen McDonnell after she complained about their money troubles and said she could help his company because of her background selling nutritional supplements.

A number of witnesses, including the former governor, said Maureen McDonnell despised being first lady and was prone to angry outbursts that prompted mansion staff to threaten a mass resignation.

Bob McDonnell said he began working unnecessarily late to avoid Maureen's wrath and revealed that the two were living apart during the trial. The defense also introduced a September 2011 email from McDonnell to his wife lamenting the deterioration of their marriage, complaining about her "fiery anger" and begging her to work with him to repair the relationship.

Defense attorneys said Maureen McDonnell had a "crush" on Williams,

who preyed on her vulnerability. Several witnesses described their relationship as inappropriate and flirtatious. None suggested it was physical, and Williams testified that it was not. He said his relationship with both McDonnells was all about boosting his business.

# Contractors must be registered with the City of Pampa

On the night of June 22, 2014 my wife and I were in the living room discussing how thankful we were for yet another round of rain that was soaking our thirsty Texas Panhandle. Just moments after that the house started shaking, the chimney was howling and our dog, Oliver, started barking and growling like someone was trying to steal his food bowl.

Straight line winds were pounding our home, and it was obvious to me that there wasn't anything normal about it. As we looked outside the rain was blowing horizontal and our trees were taking a beating. Three huge limbs were scattered across the lawn. I knew right away that it was going to be a long night. Around 11:30 p.m. I went out with our Public Works crews and emergency responders and began surveying the damage from the massive storm and started setting up a game plan for the clean-up effort. It looked pretty bad, but daylight would reveal the next morning just how bad it really was. In the end we removed and took in over a million pounds of broken limbs and trees from the storm. It was the most damage that I had witnessed in Pampa other than the destruction with the 1995 tornado. I would like

to extend thanks to Gray County Commissioner Neil Fulton's crews who helped us with damage clean-up in the parks. They did a tremendous job.

The wind storm had not only destroyed trees but was catastrophic to many roofs in Pampa. Shortly after the clean-up was underway the permits for roofing jobs skyrocketed to close to an all-time high. Our Code Enforcement Department and Insurance companies were very busy to say the least.

Unfortunately many contractors travel from far away when they hear of a storm somewhere and begin knocking on doors and doing work that is not in the best interest of the homeowner. This is the main reason for the City Ordinance requiring that all roofing contractors be registered and permitted to do work in Pampa. The purpose of the ordinance is to protect our citizens from fraudulent contractors who are out to make a buck and leave our town only to search for some other victims in another location.

If you have a contractor working for you, whether it is a roofer, plumber, electrician, carpenter, general contractor, concrete contractor, hot tub installer, irrigation technician or heating and air conditioning specialist, you have the right to ask them if they are registered as a contractor with the City of Pampa. Even if they claim to have a State of

Texas license they still must register with the City of Pampa before working on a person's property. It's the law and we are serious about it.

We are very fortunate to have some top notch contractors that call Pampa home. I use them all the time and am always glad to see a friendly face show up at my doorstep when I need something repaired. Unfortunately, there will always be those who try to circumvent the system and not seek the proper permits or registrations required to work in our City. This not only hurts our citizens but takes business away from the local professionals who have acquired the proper credentials to do the work. How can you help? Simply ask to see their permit and refuse to let them work for you until they produce one. You can also call our code enforcement office at 806-669-5740 before hiring someone to make sure that they are registered.

In the end we just want Pampa to be as safe as it can be for those who have chosen to live, work and play here. Would you help us with that?

# Is Obama too cautious, or does he not care about Islamic state?

President Barack Obama slipped up last week when he told reporters, "We don't have a strategy yet" to dispatch the Islamic State. These things happen. On "Meet the

Press" on Sunday, Sen. Dianne Feinstein, D-Calif., dished out a mild but fitting response to the president's remarks. "He's very cautious," she said. "Maybe in this instance too cautious."

On Wednesday in Estonia, the president tried to present a more muscular foreign policy as he stated that the administration has been "putting forward a strategy" for the Islamic State. Thing is, it's a long-term proposition.

"Our objective is clear, and that is to degrade and destroy (the Islamic State) so that it's no longer a threat not just to Iraq but also the region and to the United States," quoth Obama.

The good news: You won't hear the president dismissing the Islamic State as a "JV" team as he did in January.

As Feinstein observed on Sunday, two days before American journalist Steven Sotloff's grisly beheading, "I think it's a major varsity team. ... I see nothing that compares with its viciousness."

To me, the president's real problem is not caution; it's concentration. While the Islamic State has been at war with Syria, Iraq and the United States, Obama has been at war with an actual JV team, Republicans in Congress.

That's the enemy who wakes up Obama at 4 a.m. Obama may have been slow to act in the

Middle East, but when it comes to beating Republicans in November, you can bet Obama has had a strategy all along.

War isn't really in this administration's vocabulary. Foreign policy aide Ben Rhodes famously referred to the NATO campaign against the late Libyan leader Moammar Gadhafi as "kinetic military action."

I don't envy the president. He won the White House with the promise to end U.S. military involvement in Iraq. Now the beheading of two American journalists has inflamed the public against radical Islam, even if voters do not want to see U.S. boots on the ground. The provocations, however, will not subside. An Islamic State spokesman boasted, "We will raise the flag of Allah in the White House."

If only the Islamic State were all talk. Alas, its swift military sweep into Iraq reveals the handiwork not of seasoned martial tacticians.

In July, Defense Secretary Chuck Hagel warned that the Islamic State presents a "clear and imminent threat" to the United States.

It doesn't matter what Obama wants; he has no choice but to go after this looming threat.

So he might as well — and I never thought I'd say this — start talking like Vice President Joe Biden, who did not mince words when he promised an ugly end for the Islamic State. Quoth the veep: "We will follow them to the gates of hell until they are brought to justice."

# Funding an unfunded funeral

Unfortunately as a funeral director, I often see families who have lost a loved one without the necessary funds to provide for his or her final expenses. The problem is that there is a dead body and something must be done within a short period of time to properly accomplish final disposition with kindness, dignity and respect.

What are survivors finding themselves in this very undesirable situation supposed to do for funds? If the funeral home accepts credit cards, the survivor can utilize his or her pre-established credit and then make the necessary

payments to the credit card carrier. For some reason, I find that survivors do not like this option. It is possible that most of them think the interest is too high, or they do not carry enough space on their credit cards to be able to afford such a substantial expense.

The funeral funds, however, must be provided before services can be rendered. If the next of kin is unable to raise the necessary funds through his or her own credit, they may choose to ask additional family members and friends to contribute. This can be embarrassing and many survivors do not care for this option either.

Some families are under the misconception that if they refuse or cannot provide the necessary funds, the government will cover their loved one's

funeral expenses. While it may be true that some counties have funds for paupers, these funds are reserved for indigents. If a decedent has family members or relatives, he or she does not qualify for the funds. Loved ones are not considered paupers, they are considered family members and as such, they have family that will be called upon to carry their financial burdens.

Unfortunately, funds that must be quickly obtained usually end up carrying extremely high fees. Whoever loves the decedent enough to step up to his or her deserted plate, usually ends up paying a far greater price and burden than the decedent would have if he or she had just taken care of this issue before his or her inevitable death.

The easiest and most cost effective way to provide funds for one's funeral expenses is called pre-need insurance, and it is purchased prior to one's death. Paying for a decedent's funeral after his or her death is called an expensive burden. If you are setting your loved ones up for this very unfair situation, they will be suffering the burden of your debt for a very long and laborious time.

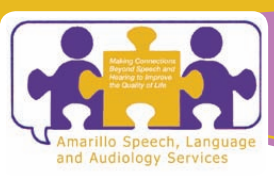
# LOCAL PASTORS ACCEPT ALS ICE BUCKET CHALLENGE

## Pampa prepares for Elk City

After defeating River Road 63-13 in their opening game, the Pampa football team will face the Elk City Elks tonight.

Due to their location in Oklahoma, Coach Greg Poyner says they know very little about Elk City. "They're somebody I'm not familiar with at all," he said. "A few of our coaches have been around and know a little bit about them. The bad thing about it is the only thing we got on them is a scrimmage and not many plays because it got lightening out. I do know one thing, looking at their roster. They're big and they've got some athletes."

Poyner said the Harvesters won't be doing anything new on offense.

"We kind of just do what we do," he said. "We don't change a lot of blocking schemes. We don't change our routes. We feel like in our offense, every play has a built in man-beater, has a built in blitz-beater and has zone concepts in it as well."

Poyner said Elk City runs a different defensive scheme than they have seen before.

"They got some really wide very athletic ends," he said. "They're bringing them off the edge as hard as they can. I think our pass pro is going to be really really big this week."

Poyner said he wants his defense to be fundamentally sound.

"We have very few plays on their offense," he said. "It's really important for our kids to go back to the fundamentals. We're a read-and-react team. So we want to do a good job of being disciplined and of course like always just running to the football. Our kids need to play with a lot of energy and we need to do

a good job adjusting as the game goes on."

While the Harvesters will go into the game with plenty of confidence, Poyner wants his team to avoid being over-confident.

"I think we have an advantage with this being our second game of the year," he said. "It's Elk City's first game of the year. You have some of those nerves that come out. I really want our kids to be confident, cause I feel like we're a really good team. I want us to be confident. At the same time, you don't want to get over-confident. I don't want to go 'oh we scored 63 points, we're the greatest team in the world.'"

Kickoff is tonight at 7:30 p.m. at Harvester Field.

## Cumplimiento de la Ley en el campo

Como las temporadas de caza se apodera de los calendarios en plena vigencia, la agenda diaria del Condado Gray guardabosques Logan Hudson está a punto de llenarse más día a día.

"Ante todo somos una agencia policial orientada a la comunidad," dijo Hudson. "La forma en que definimos eso nos asociamos con el público en ayudarles a resolver sus problemas. Su departamento de policía estándar, la mayoría de las veces, está ahí para controlar la delincuencia y la violencia, como la oficina del sheriff y la policía local.

"Somos agentes de orden público del estado, caemos en la misma categoría como ayudar a la gente con sus problemas, incluyendo el crimen y la violencia, pero nuestro mandato es caza, pesca, seguridad en el agua y la recreación al aire libre. Tratamos de ayudar al público a resolver sus problemas en esa zona mientras intentamos cumplir con el estado."

Hudson dijo que los guardabosques mantienen la misma autoridad que cualquier agente del estado, pero que trabajan bajo Departamento de Tejas de parques y vida silvestre, mientras que policías del estado trabajan para el Departamento de transporte. Dijo juego guardabosques operan bajo el lema, "Aplicación de la ley de la acera."

Un día en el trabajo de un guardabosques a veces depende de la época del año es.

"Generalmente podemos dividir el año en dos temporadas," dijo Hudson. "Tenemos temporada de pesca y caza, la pesca puede ser durante todo el año. Temporadas de caza generalmente trabajan los desde el 1 de septiembre hasta el final de enero. Generalmente cuando la mayoría de esas temporadas ha terminado".

Hudson dijo que trabajan todos los fines de semana y días festivos, así como por las noches.

"Regulamos un sector de recreación," dijo Hudson. "Trabajamos cuando todos no tienen que trabajar."

Hudson dijo que tratan de patrullar con un propósito, pero tenemos que ir donde está el trabajo así que tomamos lugar donde ay buena observación. Esto les permite escuchar disparos y a veces Asegúrese de que los cazadores están en conformidad.

"Mucho de lo que hacemos es la prevención," dijo Hudson. "La aprehensión no es nuestra primera prioridad. Tratamos de educar a la gente, evitar que las cosas sucedan y luego, cuando es necesario, detenemos a los infractores. Estamos en las carreteras del condado para ser observados en diferent areas."

Hudson dijo lo mejor que los guardabosques pueden hacer es hacer contacto con la gente disfrutar al aire libre y hacerles saber quiénes son y están ahí para ayudar.

Hudson dijo que la próxima temporada grande es temporada de venado, que es más bien una actividad de noche y temprano en la mañana. La ubicación de su trabajo depende principalmente de la especie en la temporada.

Guardabosques tienen varios desafíos que enfrentan.

"Tienes que ser muy bueno dirigiendo sus esfuerzos," dijo Hudson. "Nuestra oficina de distrito y mi supervisor está en Amarillo. No está por aquí cada día. Pero todavía tengo que levantarme e ir a

"Fue muy divertido", dijo. "Me encantó estar en ese



trabajar. Creamos nuestros propios horarios conside-

rando que muchas oficinas de policia tienen turno de trabajo. Tenemos que estar disponible todo el tiempo porque somos los únicos aquí. No hay nadie que venga si necesito asistencia."

El número de guarabosques

en condado depende del tamaño del condado. En el Texas Panhandle hay generalmente un guardabosque para cada dos condados, mientras abajo en la park costal de Tejas puede haber más. El Condado de Galveston, por ejemplo, tiene cinco debido a la industria pesquera comercial.

Recientemente, a partir del 1 de junio, guardabosques han sido llamados al trabajo de la patrulla fronteriza.

"Parte de ser un oficial de policia de tiempo completo y estar encargados de la seguridad pública en el estado de Tejas, así como la aplicación de ley de conservación también estamos equipados para hacer mas cosas que los oficiales de la ley," dijo Hudson. "Todos los guardabosques tiene acceso a los vehículos de cuatro ruedas motrices, y barcos. Una de las cosas que hemos estado haciendo últimamente es trabajando la frontera, zona N° 9 alrededor de McAllen, como parte de la Directiva del gobernador para luchar contra la inmigración ilegal. Que vas a hacer una de dos cosas allí, ya sea un turno de 12 horas en un barco en el río Grande con el objetivo de disuadir a la gente de cruzar el río."


Hudson también dijo que el objetivo principal es detener a la gente de contrabando por la frontera. Pero Hudson dijo que la experiencia ha sido una experiencia reveladora.
