Distance runner coming through Pampa next week

New Zealand man on a 'Forrest Gump'-like run across U.S. expected in Pampa on Sept. 29.

When Forrest Gump ran across the United States in 1994's big hit "Forrest Gump," reporters asked him why to which he simply replied "I just felt like running."

Many people trek a cross the country for several reasons: raise awareness, raise money for charity and sometimes even as a competition.

In the case of Perry Newburn, a 59-year old New Zealander, it's for charity.

Newburn, who is part of running group called Moon

Joggers, is running across America raising funds for Koru Care and the Little Heroes foundations. Both are New Zealand-based organizations which help children.

The name of the run is "Perry's Run: America in 46 Days," and was inspired by a milestone Newburn will be celebrating this month.

Newburn will be turning 60 this month and has needed something to inspire him.

Newburn wants to break Frank Giannino Jr.'s record of running across the U.S. in 46 days, eight hours and 36 min.

He will be staying in Pampa with Pampa High School teacher Greg Easley, who discovered him on couchsurfing.com. The website is designed to connect people traveling the country with those willing to loan a room out for the night to the travelers.

Two Pampa High School graduates to be inducted into Hall of Fame today

This morning PHS graduates Zach Thomas and Drew Harvey will be inducted into the Hall of Fame at 9:30 a.m. in the McNeely Fieldhouse. Each of these gentlemen have a number of great achievements since graduation.

Zach Thomas
Pampa High School Class of 1992
 Zachary Michael Thomas was born Sept. 1, 1973 to Steve and Barbara Ann Thomas. Zach has one older brother, Bart and one younger sister, Katina.

He attended White Deer Public Schools from Kindergarten through his freshman year of high school. He participated in numerous U.I.L. competitions where he excelled. He played summer baseball, basketball, gymnastics, track and was even in the band. He enjoyed weight lifting and football, where he began his

journey playing "Mean Machine" football 3rd through 6th Grade.

He started as a freshman on the White Deer 1988 State Champion undefeated team, with his brother Bart leading as the quarterback. He was named Amarillo Globe News Newcomer of the Year.

Zach transferred to Pampa where he played Harvester baseball and football. His Senior season the Harvesters won district, bi-district, area and regional which was a record setting year. It was the first time in PHS history for the Football team to advance to the quarter-finals. Zach was named the District MVP and the Globe News Super Team Defensive Player of the Year. He was named First Team All-State his senior year. He is in the Texas High School Sports Hall of Fame and The Panhandle Sports Hall of Fame.

Upon graduation, Zach accepted the scholarship invitation to Texas Tech University where his brother Bart was playing. They became the only brothers in the history of the Southwest Conference to both receive All-Southwest Conference in the same year. Zach was awarded the

Southwest Conference Defensive Player of the Year his junior and senior years. He recently was inducted into the 2014 Southwest Conference Hall of Fame.

Zach was the only three-year captain chosen by his teammates in Texas Tech Football History. He received the E.J. Holub "Double Tough" Award presented to the player who shows leadership and dedication.

Selected by the Texas Tech players he was awarded the Pete Cawthorn Memorial Award for Most Valuable Player (MVP) exemplifying valuable leadership and skills in both 1995 and 1996.

He was a two-time unanimous First-Team All-American in 1994 and 1995. Also, he was selected as a 1995 finalist for the "Butkus Award." In 2006, Zach was inducted into the Texas Tech Athletics Hall of Honor. Receiving many awards and honors, he set a school record of 20 tackles in a single game against Missouri. All the while, remaining humble and giving praise to those around him: his teammates, coaches and all those that made it possible for him to become the player he was.

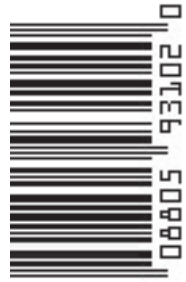

His heart, humility and work ethic paid off as he became a member of the National Football League as a Miami Dolphin.

New Head Coach Jimmy Johnson selected a 5'11" linebacker from Pampa in the fifth round of the 1996 NFL Draft with the 154th overall pick. He would wear the number 54 jersey throughout his spectacular Miami career. Zach had only seen NFL games on television and had never attended an NFL game until his first official pro game, which he played on his birthday, Sept. 1, 1996. As a rookie, Thomas led Miami with 154 total tackles (same number as his draft pick!). Teammates reported that he was first in the locker room and the last to leave. Thomas was a student of the game, a football junkie, and that gave him an edge. As a rookie he was recognized as the team's MVP and Newcomer of the Year by South Florida Media. He became the first rookie to earn MVP since Dan Marino in 1983 and first defensive player since 1976. Also, Zach received the 1996 Unsung Hero Award selected by NFL Players Association and Became the first Dolphin in team history to receive NFL Defensive Rookie of the Month.

Zach was selected to the Pro Bowl seven times during his career. He also earned first-team All-NFL honors five times. Selected to the 1998 "All-Madden Team". He was a three time Dolphin Leadership Award Recipient. He was chosen to the "All-Iron Team" as selected by CBS analyst Phil Simms and PFWA Dolphins Chapter "Good Guy" Award.

Linebacker Thomas was voted by the Associated Press to the All-Pro Team seven times being the second most selected in franchise history. Zach played 12 years with the Miami Dolphins receiving numerous awards. He is Miami's all-time tackle leader with

1,639 tackles. He also holds the Dolphin record for career touchdown interceptions with four. He was selected as third on the Miami Dolphins All-Time Top 100 Players.

He played one year with the Dallas Cowboys wearing number 55. His 1,733 total tackles are more than any linebacker currently in the Hall of Fame.

He was inducted into the "Miami Dolphin Ring of Honor" with his name and number on the stadium wall in 2012. Zach has also been nominated for the NFL Hall of Fame.

Opportunities are endless for NFL players to participate in various benefit, charity and community service projects. Zach has enjoyed sharing his time, finances and talent in helping others. Children's hospitals, Make-A-Wish Foundation, Hometown Huddle, fishing tournaments, celebrity golf tournaments, John Offerdahl-Gridiron Grill Off (for foster children), speaking to youth appearances, Camp Katina, etc. Military and veterans are favorites of Zach. He visits veteran's hospitals and also visited the troops sponsored by USO and NFL in Germany - 469th Air Base Group - Kaiserslautern visiting troops in Landstuhl Regional Medical Center - Heidelberg and Frankfurt, Germany.

He also traveled to Iraq for the Tostitos, 2011 "Salute the Troops" and "Connect to Home Bowl" held in Joint Base Balad, Iraq, placing the spotlight on and celebrating U.S. military men and women heroes stationed in Iraq. The game was actually played during the Holiday season December 2010 and broadcasted during the Fiesta Bowl halftime.

Zach and Dr. Maritzabel Lozano were married in 2006. They are the proud parents of two children, Christian Zachary, four, and Valentina Bella, three. They reside in South Florida.

Drew Harvey Pampa High School Class of 1964

Drew was born in Pampa Texas and raised on a wheat

farm, 16 miles east of town. The bus driver began driving the same year Drew began first grade at Woodrow Wilson Elementary, so they spent a lot of time together on bus No. 14 over the next 12 years! Harry Nelson, Drew's grandfather, broke out the land in 1910 and four generations later, a nephew continues to farm the property. Drew is the youngest of Lloyd and Virginia Harvey's four children, and his youth was filled with hours of tractor driving, wheat harvesting and working cattle. The wonderful family, friendships, inspiring teachers, the excellent environment of Pampa High School and the "Panhandle work ethic" laid a strong foundation for engineering studies at Texas Tech University. Drew graduated with a degree in mechanical engineering and went to work for the Aluminum Company of America (Alcoa) down on the Gulf Coast of Texas. But, after only five months, he was drafted into the army and spent the next two years, not in Vietnam, but at White Sands Missile Range in New Mexico. He returned to Alcoa for a 36-year career living in Texas, Tennessee, Brazil, and finally Pittsburgh, Pa. in 1982. As a registered professional engineer, most of his early work was in the smelting and casting businesses working on operations support and plant expansions. After moving to Pittsburgh, he was part of a team starting a new business unit, Alcoa Automotive Structures, which hoped to convince the auto industry that car bodies should be aluminum, not steel. As the engineering director, Drew traveled extensively to Europe and Japan and eventually led construction of a plant in Germany that supplied aluminum "space frame" bodies to Audi for the A8, the world's first production volume aluminum car. Additional manufacturing plants followed in Hungary, Italy, England, Spain, Norway, and the U.S., but the conversion pace to aluminum remains promising, but slow. As the director of Alcoa business systems, Drew led implementation of advanced manufacturing technologies throughout the business unit before retiring in 2004 at the age of 58.

His wife Paula retired the same year after many years of teaching at the elementary and pre-school levels. They have a son, Tyson, who works in medical sales and lives in New York City, and a daughter Allyson, a veterinarian technician living in Pittsburgh. Tyson has a 2-year-old son, Spencer Lloyd. An avid bicyclist, Drew enjoys multi-day, long distance bike tours through various states. He also remains very connected with the Texas Panhandle and tries to return whenever possible to help on the family farm. Drew got involved in many things immediately after retirement, one of which was a Habitat for Humanity Global Village trip with his daughter to the village of Mpongi Puti-Puti in Uganda, Africa. As a Habitat GV team leader, he lived in and built houses with the people, worked with the family receiving the house and came back with a lot of questions around social justice, work ethic, African development and values. More Habitat trips followed to Zambia, Ethiopia, and New Zealand. A second African initiative began with a trip sponsored by Drew's local church. In 2005, Drew led a team of 18 to the Nyadire United Methodist Mission Complex in Zimbabwe. Nyadire includes a large hospital, orphanage, 1200 student school system, teaching college, school of nursing, and a farm. With the ongoing collapse of Zimbabwe, it was clear this facility would not survive without outside support. Upon returning, the team created "The Nyadire Connection" (TNC) dedicated to enabling Nyadire to continue serving the people of Northeastern Zimbabwe. The guideline of "connecting people to people" has led to 13 ongoing programs which sponsor orphans, keeps a doctor & medicines in the hospital, operates a micro-loan program, etc. TNC (www.nyadire.org) strives for a true partnership, acknowledging that all involved benefit equally. Drew has been chairman of TNC since it's beginning and continues to take teams to Nyadire each year. A May 2013 trip initiated a program to rebuild six rural health clinics that desperately need upgrades to provide the most basic of care. Initial funds were raised (\$300,000+ needed for each clinic) and the first clinic, Chikwizo, was completed in August 2014. Drew will return to Africa for the 11th time in October 2014. He is now working to rejuvenate the large Nyadire farm and hopes to use annual profits to rebuild the remaining five health clinics. If successful, a revitalized farm could enable a self-sustaining facility no longer dependent on donor support — the "golden objective" of any humanitarian effort.

Drew loves a good adventure, and as part of a January 2012 trip, he and a group of friends ascended Africa's tallest mountain, Mt. Kilimanjaro in Tanzania. Kilimanjaro is located in the Serengeti, home to many of Africa's most dramatic landscapes and animals. After working with HOF cent. on page 3

Brother's Brother Foundation (BBF) to send containers of scavenged medical items to Zimbabwe, Drew joined the BBF board of directors in 2009. As Chairman of the Strategic Planning Committee, he worked closely with BBF's staff to greatly increase ocean container shipments to Africa. In addition to continued shipments throughout the world, BBF's new "Africa Initiative" is now supporting over 100 African hospitals with the supply of medical consumables, limited drugs, medical hardware, and refurbished medical equipment. BBF has consistently been one of America's top charities as ranked by Forbes magazine and Charity Navigator. Drew continues to be fascinated with Africa — the cultures, the history, the music, the religious mix, the high value of relationships and the belief that tomorrow will be better. And yet, the poverty, the disease, the injustice, the wars, the hunger, and harsh

realities of life call out for change. In addition to Africa, Drew also works in numerous local and national programs. He has been on many humanitarian trips to areas of disaster relief in places like New Orleans, Mississippi, North Carolina and Pennsylvania. As part of the national program "Everybody Wins", Drew reads weekly to individual children who attend one of Pittsburgh's inner city primary schools. Drew occasionally teaches classes summarizing the history and current situation of Native Americans, and worked with a team to build a Native American church in Illinois. Drew's Christian faith has guided his life. He routinely has leadership roles at his local church, which is now working to increase the role of the global church in effectively responding to the inequities and problems of our world. In August 2013, Drew was one of the Pittsburgh recipients of a "Jefferson Award," which honors volunteers performing significant community and public service in America.

Support Obama's new ISIS plan

I know he's made a million mistakes. And I have opposed nearly all his domestic and international policies. But after watching Obama's intense ISIS speech Wednesday night, and reading the text several times, I think the president basically — finally — got it right.

I support him. My best advice to Republicans and Democrats is to support the president's new ISIS campaign. Noteworthy, as of this writing, House Speaker John Boehner has announced his backing of Obama on this matter. Democratic Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid and Republican Sen. leader Mitch McConnell have also announced their support of the president's ISIS plan. Only Nancy Pelosi is absent.

But I want to underscore the need for Republicans to get on board

with this Obama plan. If not, they risk blowing what appears to be a landslide election. Opposing the president on this would look way too political, ignoring national security. It would be a huge mistake.

Here are the opening words from the president on Wednesday night. They rally support: "My fellow Americans, tonight I want to speak to you about what the United States will do with our friends and allies to degrade and ultimately destroy the terrorist group known as ISIL."

Importantly, Obama now seems to be following the sound advice of experts such as former ambassador Ryan Crocker (who terms ISIS, "al-Qaida Version 6.0"), General Jack Keane, the retired four-star general and former vice chief of staff of the U.S. Army, and U.S. Army general Martin Dempsey, chairman of the Joint Chiefs.

Perhaps the most important point in the president's speech was his apparent decision to bomb ISIS in

Syria as well as Iraq. The presumption is that this will be done simultaneously, which is the exact advice given to him by Crocker, Keane and Dempsey.

That's another signal to members of the GOP. Before you go home for the congressional election break, fund Obama's new military request and pass a resolution endorsing the simultaneous bombing of ISIS in Syria and Iraq.

Additionally, while Obama said he doesn't want GI combat troops on the ground, he specifically endorsed the use of special-ops forces to guide enhanced bombing missions and support Iraqi and Kurdish troops with training, intelligence and equipment.

In his speech, the president announced the deployment of an additional 475 "service members," which can be added to the several hundred already in Iraq. In all likelihood, thousands of Special Forces will be

In Scotland, 'aye' means no to England

"Should Scotland be an independent country?" reads the referendum

on which Scotland will vote Thursday. Voters have two choices — yes or no. Queen Elizabeth II went so far as to tell Scots on Sunday, "I hope people will think very carefully about the future." The queen was savvy to urge Scots to look ahead, not behind. The Scottish Parliament building opened in 2004 after the Scotland Act 1978 allowed for local control. It is a marvel of modern architecture located off Edinburgh's Royal Mile. Its open architecture and use of glass, oak and sycamore display a determination to root political power not in the moldy grandeur of nearby Holyrood Palace but in iconoclasm and steel. Sadly, from that futuristic perch, Scottish First Minister Alex Salmond has dredged up ancient grievances to push his country back in time — before the 1707 Act of Union with England.

"Harry Potter" author J.K. Rowling has likened Scottish independence to an acrimonious divorce. Expect bitter battles over who gets custody over the pound, the banks, the royals. "I doubt that an independent Scotland will be able to bank on its ex-partners' fond memories of the old relationship once we've left," Rowling warned in June. She has donated more than \$1.6 million to the Better Together "no" campaign.

Nonsense to that, the "yes" lobby counters. On Sky News recently, Justice Minister Kenny MacAskill argued that if the referendum passes, the usual social union, the currency and the monarchy will remain intact. If anything, he added, the 300-year peace, friendship and "cordial relationship" will emerge stronger.

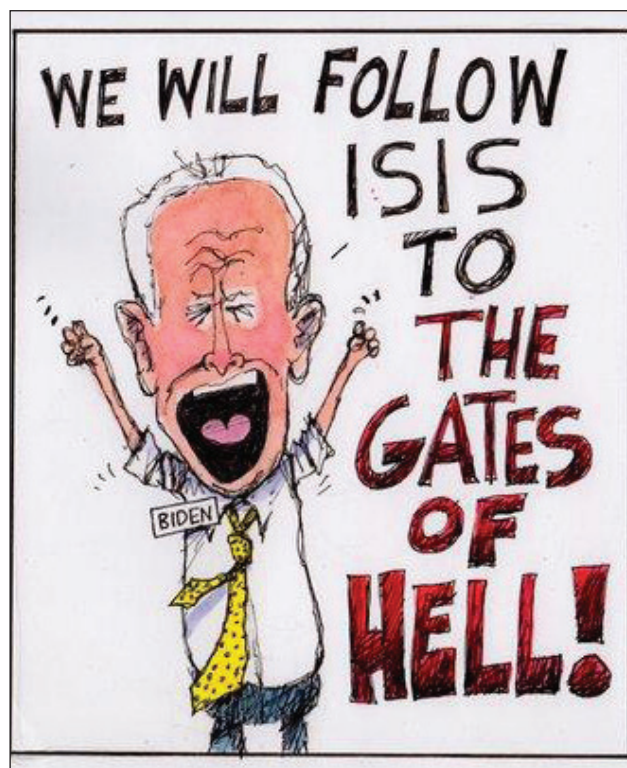
Scotsman Jim Murphy, a member of the British Parliament, laughed at the idea there could be no hard feelings if Scotland votes "to make England a foreign country."

In June, President Barack Obama spoke against an "aye" vote when he spoke of America's "deep interest in making sure that one of the closest allies that we will ever have, the United Kingdom, remains strong, robust, united and an effective partner." Obama should have used stronger language, as he will need a strong United Kingdom in the war (yes, war) against the Islamic State.

It can be no accident that a masked Islamic State henchman engaged in the brutal beheading of aid worker David Haines, a Briton and a Scotsman, as the big vote looms. MacAskill has told Sky News that a "yes" vote would bring the very liberal Scotland freedom from decisions made under the coalition government of conservative Prime Minister David Cameron — that is, freedom from British defense spending and any wars into which the United Kingdom is drawn.

But it's not that easy to opt out of war when terrorists are willing to export it — as MacAskill well should know. In 1988, Pan Am Flight 103 exploded over Lockerbie, Scotland, killing 270, including 11 Scots on the ground. A Scottish court found Libyan intelligence agent Abdel Baset al-Megrahi guilty. Al-Megrahi received a life sentence and was to be eligible for parole after 20 years, but he served a mere eight years in a Scottish prison. On the dubious ground that prostate cancer left al-Megrahi with less than three months to live, MacAskill granted him "compassionate" release in 2009. The son of the late Moammar Gadhafi flew the terrorist home to a hero's welcome on a tarmac in Tripoli, where Scotland's worst mass murderer lived until 2012. Salmond explained, "Sometimes someone has to break the cycle of retribution with an act of compassion." It's a shame his Scottish National Party doesn't feel the same way about Great Britain.

this as best we can given that this has broken out in ways we have not seen before.

The president was in Atlanta announcing an expanded military effort to aid African countries fighting Ebola, but he also might have been talking about the necessity of stopping the oil-fueled terrorism and hate of ISIL.

Obama did not set about to be a foreign policy president. He was going to be the health care president, the guy who focused on jobs and equality and the environment and education.

But with two years left in his term, the president can't do much of anything about any of those things, other than issue executive

orders and (if Democrats hold onto the Senate) appoint people. If Democrats lose the Senate, so much for the appointments piece. For better or worse, like it or not, the domestic agenda — whether right or left — is caught in gridlock. For better or worse, like it or not, Obama must face the challenges of a world in crisis.

Amidst the horror being wreaked by these extremists is an opportunity for this president to rise above the pettiness of American politics and act as the commander in chief. The extremists have created a coalition that would not otherwise exist, and, equally improbably, they have silenced the partisan attacks from Speaker Boehner and his crowd. Now the president must take the next step — away from politics.

Leave it to the Senate Democrats to fight their fights in the battleground states where the president's presence doesn't help anyway. Enough with the endless fundraising for negative ads and back-and-forth blame games. Enlist Bill Clinton to do the domestic rallies.

Send Joe Biden to collect checks from the big donors. The best thing Obama can do is to confront the world, speaking for a united country, facing danger with determination and boldness.

This is not our president's natural inclination. His critics, and even his friends, have complained that "not doing something stupid" is not a strategy or a worldview. Even now, with the country, and especially his opponents, ready to give him more authority than he is asking for, the concern — and it is a real one — is that the president is asking for too little and not too much, that it may take special forces "advisers" to stop ISIL and not just air strikes, that no boots on the ground might more accurately mean no boots on the ground in frontline combat.

We have had too many presidents who have found it too easy to send young men and women into harm's way. Not making mistakes is not a strategy, but it remains a good idea. The president should not be reckless, but neither should he be timid. I usually start to laugh

when politicians start invoking "the American people," as if we are a monolith who speaks in one voice directly into the ear that is not hooked up to a television camera. But this is one of those occasions where it seems almost true that the country wants to be united, wants to be strong, wants to fight back and, most importantly, wants a president we can trust and rely on in the battle.

Easy? Of course not. But the president is not the newbie he was six years ago. The best thing he can do for his party, his country and his legacy, let alone the people who are in harm's way, is to focus not only on the belated battle against Ebola, but also on the belated and necessary world effort to deal with the threat of extremism that knows no limits. He might just be the national security president yet. And by the way, the Democrats might even hold the Senate.

necessary to destroy the Islamic State. Along with the bombings, there will have to be a ground war to eventually eliminate ISIS. And that will require all manner of U.S. advisors, such as ground-to-air controllers for every allied battalion. This will be tough stuff. The president also will increase military assistance to the free Syrian opposi-

tion to Assad, which is tricky business. But former ambassador Crocker argues that this can be done with moderate Sunni forces. And Obama stated that “we will redouble our efforts to cut off (ISIS) funding; improve our intelligence; strengthen our defenses; counter its warped ideology; and stem the flow of foreign fighters into and out of the Middle East.” And he reiterated the need to provide more humanitarian assistance.

Coalition building will not be easy, but it’s an important part of the strategy. That’s probably why President Obama said, “ISIL is not Islamic.” What he undoubtedly meant is that these are a bunch of crazy, bloodthirsty, power-hungry people who are hiding behind religious beliefs that are not shared by moderate Arab states, such as Saudi Arabia, Jordan, hopefully Turkey, certainly Kuwait and maybe Qatar. Significantly, Obama stated a “core principle”

of his presidency: “If you threaten America, you will find no safe haven.” Well, that’s basically what President George W. Bush said when he proclaimed right after 9/11 that “You’re either with us, or against us.” Obama never gives Bush any credit. He didn’t when his predecessor handed over a stable Iraq following the surge. And he hasn’t mentioned that Bush recommended 20,000 U.S. forces be left behind in Iraq. But at least Obama

has gotten some religion in this new phase of the War on Terror. Why his change? Well, yes, he’s getting clobbered in the polls. But I think the political narrative completely changed when America saw the horrific beheadings of American journalists Jim Foley and Steven Sotloff. Suddenly, Americans got on their hind legs and shouted, “We must not let this go unpunished.” And then came the realization that ISIS will come at us at home in a

short period of time. It took President Obama a while to figure all this out. He was leading from behind, but maybe now he’s moving toward the front. Looking ahead, the key issues will be commitment and execution. As President Reagan used to say, “Trust, but verify.”

Harvesters prepare for Homecoming game versus Bushland

Tonight the Pampa Harvesters (1-2) look to take on the Bushland Falcons (1-2) in a game that is also the Homecoming game for the Harvesters.

Bushland, who is coming off of a loss at Borger, will be facing the Harvesters under first-year head coach Jimmy Thomas.

"They're a good football team," Pampa head football coach Greg Poynor said. "They have a new head coach, too. It's his first year at Bushland and they are doing a great job. They're pretty explosive offensively. He didn't start the season running for them but they have a sophomore running back (Jonathan Reyna) who is playing well for them.

"Then they got a quarterback, who is very dynamic in the pocket, very hard to tackle, then they got some good receivers and a

big o-line." Poynor said he feels like the defensive unit they have it probably even better than the one the Harvesters faced last year.

"I think that's where they have made the biggest change from last year," Poynor said. "I feel like they are a little better than they were last year. They have two really big defensive linemen and one really athletic defensive lineman. They have two linebackers and just athletic everywhere else.

"So they are good football team, we are going to have to play our best football to beat them."

Poynor said the athleticism of the offense is one reason why he doesn't expect a repeat of last year's loss at Bushland.

"We've got four or five receivers who can run and are big play guys," Poynor said. "We've got several guys that can make explosive plays of 30 yards

or more."

Even though the Harvesters have lost two in a row, Poynor said last week's loss was a humbling experience.

"Honestly last week I felt like we played well defensively," Poynor said. "I felt like we tackled better than we had all season long. They had some great athletes, too. That quarterback of theirs is every bit as good as the quarterback we played the week before and we did a terrible job tackling him (Elk City's QB) and a much better tackling their's (Hereford)."

The immediate tackling will help the Harvesters prevent the Bushland's spread offense from being effective.

"(It's ok) Sometimes to give them that six or seven-yard completion, just don't let it turn into a 16-yard completion or a 60-yard completion," Poynor said. "That's a little bit our philosophy even for us a little

bit. We want to get you one-on-one with our little quick guys. One way of doing that is being the best tackler you can be, then another way is getting a lot of guys getting to the ball."

Considering this week is Homecoming Week, Poynor said this is a good time for the festivities to get the players excited and forget about the Hereford loss.

"I have been very proud of our kids," Poynor said. "I feel like they have been able to leave that loss behind and focus on the game that's coming up. I think they realize how good of a team Hereford was and we can focus on a team that I feel like we match up very well with. Two very evenly matched teams.

"It's been an awesome week, especially with Zach Thomas. That's a big deal for our football team; getting him inducted into the Pampa Harvester Hall of Fame. That's been a neat

Texas A&M-SMU preview capsule

What's at stake
(AP) — The Aggies try for their first 4-0 start since 2006, and need only 37 points to reach 200 points in the first four games of a season for the first time since 1917. SMU's home opener is its first game since coach June Jones' sudden resignation Sept. 8, after the Mustangs were outscored 88-6 in their first two games.

Key matchup
Texas A&M defensive front against SMU offensive line, which has two

sophomores and a freshman starting. The Aggies have three sacks in each of its games, while the Mustangs have given up 13 sacks their first two games. Myles Garrett has already matched Texas A&M's freshman record with 5 1/2 sacks through the first three games.

Cowboys' Romo misses practice, calls it routine

IRVING (AP) — Tony Romo missed practice Wednesday with tightness in his surgically repaired back, although the Dallas quarterback called it a routine day of rest.

It was the first practice Romo has missed since the start of the regular season. He took several days off during training camp and the preseason.

The 34-year-old Romo had surgery to repair a herniated disk in December, eight months after a procedure to remove a cyst from his back that kept him out of the offseason last year.

Romo says his back is fine after taking every snap in the first two games. He does extensive daily conditioning work on the back.

The Cowboys (1-1) visit St. Louis on Sunday.

Scandrick says his ready post-suspension

IRVING (AP) — Orlando Scandrick had to watch the Cowboys on

pay-per-view from California in their second game without him, hoping a revised drug policy would cut his four-game suspension in half.

The long-awaited word finally came Wednesday morning, and the Dallas cornerback was back on the practice field with every intention of playing Sunday in St. Louis.

Scandrick just smiled when asked if he would be ready to face the Rams.

"Yeah, without a question," the seventh-year player said. "Without a doubt."

Scandrick didn't leave his home in the Los Angeles area over the weekend because he figured the players and the league still had some details to work out on a revised policy for performance-enhancing drugs.

He was back in the Dallas area this week, waiting a couple of days longer than he thought.

Texas QB David Ash ends playing career

AUSTIN (AP) — Texas quarterback David Ash has given up playing football after suffering at least one concussion and lingering symptoms over the last year.

Longhorns coach Charlie Strong said on Wednesday that he told Ash "there was no way we were going to let you back on the field."

Added Strong, "His health is our major concern."

Strong said that Ash would remain a part of the program

working with the team's younger quarterbacks.

Ash, a junior, suffered a concussion during the second week of the 2013 season in a game at BYU. That is the only concussion that Ash and the team have acknowledged. He returned two weeks later, against Kansas State, but left that game with what Texas officials called a head injury. He missed the rest of the season.

Ash was determined to return this season, but he ac-

knowledged that there was some concern among family members.

He played in the opener, a victory against North Texas, but experienced headaches and dizziness after the game, Strong said.

Ash missed the next two games. The Longhorns have off this week.

Strong said Ash approached him to discuss the future.

Ash played in 29 games at Texas, starting 22. He ranks

seventh in school history in career touchdown passes (31) and eighth in passing yards (4,728).

Sophomore Tyrone Swoopes started the last two games for the Longhorns, losses to BYU and UCLA. Swoopes has completed 44 of 65 passes (67.7 percent) with three touchdowns against one interception. Swoopes completed 24 of 34 against UCLA, including two touchdowns.

PepsiCo latest sponsor to voice NFL concern

NEW YORK (AP) — Another major sponsor is speaking out on the NFL's handling of domestic violence cases, with PepsiCo Inc.'s CEO Indra Nooyi saying she is "deeply dis-

turbed." Nooyi decried the "repugnant behavior of a few players and the NFL's acknowledged mishandling of these issues," in a statement late Wednesday.

Pepsi is one of the biggest NFL sponsors through its namesake soda brand, Gatorade sports drink and Frito-Lay snack division. The league and its teams have come under fire over the past two weeks over how it is dealing with several players with domestic violence allegations against them. An investigation has been launched into whether Commissioner Roger Goodell knew about or saw a video of Baltimore Ravens player Ray Rice hitting his then-fiancee earlier than he said.

Most major sponsors have voiced disapproval, with Anheuser-Busch, another one of the biggest, saying it was "increasingly concerned" about the situation.

But despite the lip service, it would be difficult for a sponsor to actually give up on the NFL. An average of 17.4 million people tune in during a regular season NFL game, about 65 percent men and 35 percent women, according to Nielsen. During the Super Bowl, that ratchets up to 111.5 million watchers.

Nooyi said she supports Goodell, calling him a "man of integrity," and praised the decision to hire three women executives to help shape its domestic violence policies.

"The reality for Commissioner Goodell and the NFL is that they now have an opportunity to effect positive change with the situation presented to them," she said in a statement.
