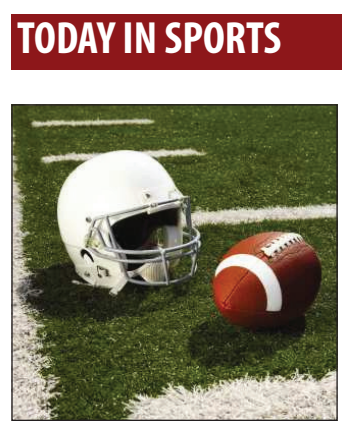

DPS Trooper seizes more than \$623,000 in Drugs

 AMARILLO – The Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) conducted a traffic stop Thursday on Interstate 40, yielding over 17 pounds of methamphetamine valued at more than \$623,000
 At approximately 2:05 p.m., a DPS trooper conducted a traffic stop on a 2010 Chevrolet Malibu traveling eastbound on I-40, for a traffic violation, near Conway in Carson County.
 The occupants of the Malibu were identified as Juan Pablo Luis-Serna, 22, of Phoenix, Abel Abgel Luis-Serna, 23, also of Phoenix, and Dulce Eva Leon-Ozuna, 21, of Douglas, Ariz. During the traffic stop, the trooper discovered 15 bags of methamphetamine in the rocker panels.
 Both of the Luis-Serna's were placed under arrest for possession of a controlled substance, a first-degree felony, and booked into the Carson County Jail. The illegal drugs were allegedly being transported from Phoenix, to Oklahoma City.

Drew Harvey inspires students to make the world 'a better place'
 Drew Harvey was the first to speak to the students after his impressive biography was read by senior Caragan Niccum.
 Harvey, having served in the military before a 36-year career at Aluminum Corporation of America, spoke about his work after retirement, which included working with Habitat with Humanity across the globe. (Refer

 Still, with all of his accomplishments in his life, Harvey couldn't believe he was standing at the podium Friday.
 "I am clearly humbled, honored and surprised to be here," Harvey said.
 Harvey said he had been doing some reflecting in his life between his induction and his 50th High School Reunion.
 He asked the students two rhetorical questions: Is the world a better place now than in 1964? Will it be a better place in 2064?
 He left these questions for the jury to decide, and continued into his speech.

Gas price average falls again

 IRVING – The average for a gallon of regular unleaded fuel in Texas is now \$3.17, according to the AAA Texas Weekend Gas Watch. That price is six cents less than one week ago and 13 cents less than one year ago. Of the major metropolitan areas surveyed in the Lone Star State, drivers in El Paso are paying the most at \$3.23 per gallon while drivers in Amarillo are paying the least at \$3.08 per gallon. Drivers in Texas are paying 19 cents less per gallon than the national average of \$3.36.
 The average price at the pump typically falls dur-

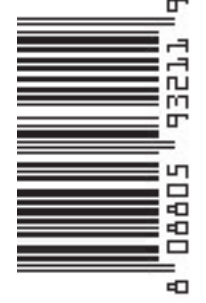

with lighter weights. Harvey was part of a group who convinced car companies to build aluminum bodies in cars, as seen on the Audi A8.

Harvey drew his inspiration for his success in the automotive field from the home.

"I had a super family," Harvey said. "They inspired me through my entire life."

In post-retirement, Harvey started noticing that many of the impoverished countries are located in Africa. He decided it was time to give back.

"I was given an amazing head start," Harvey said. "So I decided it was time for me to give back."

Harvey gave three points for the students to take away from his speech.

The first point was to recognize they are global citizens. He offered this quote from Margaret Mead to support that statement: "Never doubt that a small group of thoughtful, committed citizens can change the world; indeed, it's the

only thing that ever has." His second point was to choose the people you spend time with.

"Choose to hang out with people who inspire you and make you a better person," Harvey said.

His third and final point was to decide to be happy.

"Life is field with joys and problems, and you can deal with both," Harvey said. "But you choose which ones overcome you."

He closed with one simple message for the students: "Go get 'em."

Thomas coaches 'preparation creates luck'

Zach Thomas felt right at home standing in the same building he graduated from 22 years ago.

But this time when he took the stage he was talking to the students in attendance about how to be successful.

"Everybody has their own definition of success," Thomas said. "But it isn't about having a lot of money, or how much power you have or even winning or losing. It's about loving what you do."

This passion for Thomas was obviously football.

"That passion brought me

a long way," Thomas said. As noted in Friday's edition of The Pampa News, Thomas was on an undefeated State Championship Team for White Deer in 1988 as a freshmen and went on to have a decorated career for the Pampa Harvesters; including being named First Team All-State his senior year. The Harvesters also won district, bi-district, area and regional in a record-setting season his senior year.

But Thomas didn't talk about his accomplishments to the students, he gave them his secret to his success.

"It's very easy when a teacher or coach tells you what to do," Thomas said. "When it becomes difficult is when they aren't looking."

Thomas, who had a reputation in the NFL as being a work horse before and after practice, told the students that he got his edge before 9 a.m. and after 5 p.m.

"Preparation builds confidence," Thomas said. "It's like that with everything in life. You can win before you get out into the real world."

Thomas also told the students not to be dream-

killers, nor to hang around them.

"Live your own life," Thomas said. "Own it (one's dream) and protect it."

Using an old basketball expression, "The best guys want to take the last shot," Thomas told the students not to be afraid to fail.

In a simple piece of advice, Thomas told the student's to get rest.

"The mind comes back crisper and fresher," Thomas said.

Thomas offered several other pieces of advice. Including, work hard, don't be late, be grateful and don't listen to the haters.

"Stay hungry and keep driven," Thomas said.

Referring to the being grateful, Thomas said that the reason we have to be grateful is because of all the military personnel overseas fighting for our country.

"You are a hero, my friend," Thomas told Harvey, referring to his two years of service.

His final words of advice: "Don't do anything that your mama wouldn't be proud of," Thomas said. "Successful people do what failures don't."

ing this time of year due to decreased demand and the transition to winter-blend gasoline, which is cheaper to produce because it does not have to meet the same federal emissions reduction requirements as in the warmer summer months.

As of September 15, retailers could begin selling the winter-blend gasoline.

"Drivers usually experience savings at the pumps during the fall driving season and we are seeing that happen again this year," said AAA Texas/New Mexico Representative Doug Shupe.

"Barring any major geopolitical events, storms, or production or distribution issues, analysts say

the pump prices could fall through the end of October."

Nearly \$200M in losses for Dallas pension fund

DALLAS (AP) — Bad real estate investments, including a luxury resort and vineyard in California, have cost the retirement fund for Dallas police offi-

cers and firefighters almost \$200 million, according to a report by the fund's staffers and a consultant.

The failed investments that began in 2005 also in-

clude upscale homes in Hawaii and large tracts of land in Arizona and Idaho.

The fund's board listened to a presentation about the \$196 million in losses by its staffers and a fund consultant on Thursday. The presentation did not specify the losses, but The Dallas Morning News tallied the numbers and confirmed them with fund officials.


The fund had valued its Napa, California projects at close to \$100 million for several years, but in a recent appraisal, the properties' value was estimated at \$68 million. One of the Hawaii homes sold this year for \$12.8 million when its asking price had previously

been \$22 million.

The pension fund also lost more than \$34 million from its investment in Pima County, Arizona, closing the sale of a property for \$7.5 million earlier this week.

Nearly half of the losses were recognized on the fund's 2013 books completed this summer. Fund officials had expected an 11 percent return on its 2013 investment but received only 4.4 percent.


The 2013 records came from new appraisals on the properties. Before, the fund valued many of its real estate ventures by how much it had invested rather than relying on appraisals.

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Bouncin' Around Reminiscing a visit to Scotland

We have been following, on Facebook, the travels of our good friends the Wests from Tasmania.

They are presently in Scotland, and the pictures they have shared bring back happy memories of my time in the land of some of my ancestors. Yes, I am a mixture of different nationalities — Irish, Norwegian, German, French and Scottish. It has been more than 40 years since I was in Scotland, but I don't think things have changed a lot. Edinburgh is still a beautiful city, combining the "old city" and the newer modern city. Overlooking the city is Edinburgh Castle, situated on what is known as "Castle Rock," an extinct volcano.

The castle has been occupied since sometime in the second century (the Iron Age) and the city of Edinburgh began building out from the castle, which appears to have been carved out of the rocks and is a perfect fortress to defend. Visitors try to be within the castle grounds at 1 p.m. for the "One O'clock Gun" which is a cannon fired precisely at 1 p.m. every day except Sunday, Good Friday and Christmas.

The Royal Mile is a street that connects the castle with Holyrood

Palace, which is the official residence of the British Monarch when he or she is in residence in Scotland. The Royal Mile has one of my favorite shops, the Kilt Shop. I still have the kilt I purchased there nearly 50 years ago, and I plan to wear it next month when our church, First Presbyterian Church, celebrates the Hanging of the Tartans, a celebration of the Presbyterian Church's roots.

Near the city of Edinburgh is the Firth of Forth, which is an estuary formed by the Forth Glacier. The Forth Bridge, a cantilever bridge similar to the Golden Gate Bridge, spans the river. The hotel where I stayed was located near the shore of the estuary with a beautiful view of the bridge. As I was there in late June, the sun didn't set until nearly 11 p.m., and it was strange to be outside that late at night and still see sunlight.

At the edge of the hotel property was a tavern and it was quite the scene of hilarity and music. Unlike most taverns (or bars) in the U.S., people go to Scottish taverns not to watch sporting events, but to sing, dance and enjoy friends new and old. The tiny tavern was so crowded that people spilled out into the yard outside the tavern. I watched as a football-player-sized man wearing a kilt started singing a song in Gaelic, and soon the whole crowd was singing along. And before you ask: No, I don't

know what he wore under his kilt, and I would be sworn to secrecy anyway.

A tiny elderly lady joined the entertainment by taking a swig from a bottle of malt whisky and passing it around. She kicked up her heels and danced along to the music. The celebration (Scots don't need a reason—they celebrate just being alive) lasted until about 2 a.m. It proved to me that not all Scots are dour, serious people. I did enjoy some buttery Scottish shortbread and some delicious oatmeal with real cream, but I drew the line at eating haggis, which is a pudding made from sheep's heart, liver and lungs.

Of course, there is more to Scotland than just Edinburgh. There are many lochs (lakes) like Loch Ness, home of the elusive "Nessie." There are mountains and rivers, highland games, cultural events and, of course, golf courses. I understand from a good friend that you often have to share the golf course with local sheep.

Someday I hope to visit Scotland again for the Royal Edinburgh Military Tattoo. It has nothing to do with ink and needles, but the word comes from an old Dutch word meaning "tap toe." Hearing and seeing the massed pipes and drums would be for me, a great way to cap a visit to Scotland.

here now. "If they want to be in America," the argument goes, "they ought to return to their own countries and apply for a visa legally. America should not reward law breaking."

That sounds sensible — but what happens when the immigrant does that, goes to the U.S. embassy and says, I'd like to work in America legally?

He gets paperwork to fill out and is told to go home to wait. And wait. A Forbes investigation found that a computer programmer from India must wait, on average, 35 years. A high school graduate from Mexico must wait an average 130 years!

We tell eager workers, "Do it legally; just wait 130 years"? This makes no sense. We should make legal immigration easier, relax the rules, issue work permits. Conservatives usually understand that complex regulations make life hard for people. Immigration bureaucracy makes life harder not just for the immigrants but for the rest of us.

America needs immigrants. Immigrants co-founded most of Silicon Valley's start-ups. The Patent Office says immigrants invent things at twice the rate of native-born Americans.

Immigrants are special people, people with the ambition and guts to leave their home to pursue an American dream. We ought to let more of them in. And not just PhD's. Half of America's agricultural workers are here illegally, according to the Department of Agriculture. But without them, the government says food would cost much more. Milk would cost 61 percent more.

Some people say, well, maybe immigrants in the past were a boon to America, but now there are just too many. They make up 12 percent of the population! True. But in 1915, it was 15 percent.

Others complain that immigrants once worked hard and tried to assimilate, but today's immigrants are different: less educated, more likely to collect welfare, less likely to adopt the American work ethic.

Maybe. But I doubt it. Every new immigrant group has been derided as backward, unclean or criminal.

Sen. Henry Cabot Lodge (R, Mass.) called Slovaks "illiterate and ignorant in the extreme." He called Italians "the lowest type as to character and intelligence." Irish immigrants had such a bad reputation that in job advertisements businesses posted job notices: "No Irish need apply."

Fears about newcomers weren't totally unfounded. It took them time to assimilate and accumulate wealth. But they did. The Irish, Italians and other once-vilified groups are now leaders in America.

People say that immigrants steal "our" jobs. And yes, they do take some. But they create new jobs, too, lots. When people move to another country and encounter a different culture, they see things in new ways. Some pick the best from each culture and create useful things.

Imagine your life without Google searches, cheap Ikea furniture, YouTube, bicycles, blenders, ATM's. All came from immigrants. New Americans also gave us blow dryers, basketball, football, the first shopping mall, comfortable jeans, even the American hot dog (that came from Germany's frankfurter).

Immigration enriches our language. Jewish immigrants gave us the word "glitch." "Gee whiz" came from the Irish. The song "God Bless America" was written by an immigrant — the prolific Irving Berlin, born in Russia.

The TV network on which my weekly show is broadcast exists only because an immigrant from Australia saw the need for Fox News. And I'm only here because my parents left Germany in 1930, a year when immigration rules were still pretty lax (if you weren't Chinese, since there were racist quotas).

Today, we'd solve many problems if work permits were available and legal immigration easier. If people can come here legally, fewer sneak in. It will be easier to secure the border because police can focus on actual criminals and terrorists. As Lao-tzu said, "the greater the number of laws and enactments, the more thieves and robbers there will be."

America should say yes to immigration.

What? We don't expect to win?!

According to an NBC News/Wall Street Journal poll, just 28 percent of

Americans are "confident" that the president's plan to destroy the Islamic State will succeed. Sixty-eight percent say they aren't confident at all.

We are talking here, my friends, about Americans. What must be the reaction in the Islamic State? "I tell you, Mustafa, the Yankees will never finish this game. They will swat and swat; they will grow tired; they will withdraw while pretending not to withdraw." Would the Islamic State reaction be something like that?

Countries are like ball clubs or rock groups. They develop reputations: in the case of countries, a reputation for firmness in the face of challenge, or a reputation for climbing out of windows, ahead of the cops, to avoid unpleasantness; a reputation for promise-keeping, a reputation for reducing the firmest pledges to mere theories. Guess which reputation Americans see as operative presently in White House affairs.

The Obama administration had to be virtually dragged into the anti-ISIS campaign. Oh, how it didn't want to go! Not that it should have lusted for combat, like a gang of Japanese imperial generals, reading the reports from Pearl Harbor. What it might better have done, while watching the chaos in Syria and Iraq, is begin to design an approach — yes, a "strategy," the sort of thing President Obama became famous for saying he lacked — for putting down evil and restoring some sort of order to a disorderly neighborhood. The president seems to have seen no need for the kind of intervention that would have reversed his larger strategy for letting the world take care of itself.

Throughout six years in the White House, Barack Obama — who gives every evidence of believing he never makes mistakes or commits misjudgments — has generally adhered to the idea that the world, absent American meddling, can indeed take care of itself. With some hitches and bumps, to be sure, such as Russia's shoot-down of the Malaysian airliner. Yet, broadly speaking, what could America do? The president, rhetorically, spread wide his hands, shrugged his

shoulders. The world could muddle along without us. And should get used to the idea — fast.

As it happened, the grand indifference that became American policy in 2009 made an unlooked-for impact on the rest of the world. If a suddenly listless and unconcerned America was, most of the time, going to watch world events from its front porch, this left considerable latitude to people (e.g., Bashar Assad, Vladimir Putin) who might in the past have resisted pulling Uncle Sam's beard. America was acquiring a reputation dramatically different from the one that Barack Obama had promised to overhaul. Oh, yes, very different. Very — shall we say, problematical.

No wonder two thirds of Americans need convincing their country can knock out the Islamic State. Knocking out enemies, a onetime American specialty, seems to many a game whose outcome is less certain than before. How deeply do we believe — more specifically, how deeply does the present U.S. government believe — the present job needs doing? Time — as the irreplaceable cliché would have it — will tell.

No topic needs more airing in American politics,

and especially the presidential campaign to come, than that of America's true foreign policy interests. We know from sad experience the limitations of ambitions to remake the outside world in the image of, say, Duluth, Minnesota. Philosophical musing from the sidelines, in the Obama manner, nevertheless becomes dangerous when it turns to dithering and oh-gee-ain't-it-awful-ing.

Certain assumptions need to emerge before intelligent policy can be shaped. First, we're a better, more wholesome country than practically any other in the world: a standing rebuke to evil and despotism. Second, we're hated more for our virtues than for our alleged meddling. Third, being hated for any reason imposes the duty of staying several steps ahead of the haters, militarily speaking.

The fourth assumption follows, does it not, from all of the above? It is the assumption that you never get into a fight you don't mean to finish with a knockout.







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Divorced women and Social Security

I've been saving up some questions I've received from divorced women about potential benefits they might be due from their ex's Social Security. Here are some of them.

Q: I was married to my husband for 35 years before he divorced me and married a much newer and better-equipped model (if you get my drift). They have even had a child together! I'm 62 and my ex is 65. If all his extra physical activity (if you get my drift again) causes the bum to drop dead, are the trophy wife and little love child going to get all his Social Security — leaving me with nothing?

A: Don't worry. You'll get a full share of Mr. Wonderful's Social Security. Whenever two (and very infrequently three) women are due benefits on the same man's Social Security account, they don't offset one another. They each get whatever Social Security spousal benefits they are due.

And you might not even have to wait until he dies from exhaustion. You are possibly due divorced wife's (not widow's) benefits now already. At your age, you would be due about one third of his basic Social Security benefit —

but only to the extent that it exceeds whatever you might be due on your own Social Security account. In other words, if a third of his Social Security is more than your own retirement benefit, then you will get that benefit plus whatever extra you are due on his record to take you up to that one third level.

But if you've worked any decent amount of time, then it is very likely that your own benefit exceeds one third of his. Then you would have to wait until he keels over and you could be due much higher divorced widow's benefits.

And in case you are wondering, here is what Ms. Trophy might be due.

While he's alive, she and little Junior can't get Social Security until he files for benefits himself. At that point, Junior would get an amount equal to half of daddy's benefit rate. Ms. Trophy is potentially due benefits as a young wife caring for a child. But, due to rules that limit how much a family can get, she probably wouldn't qualify for anything. When he dies, then both Junior and Trophy could get survivor benefits. However, if Trophy

is working, her earnings would prevent her from getting any Social Security.

marry the guy the second time? I know, love can be strange!

Q: I have been a stay-at-home mom all my life. I am 63, and my husband is 62. We have been married for 20 years. He doesn't plan to take his Social Security until he is 66. But I'd like to get my wife's share of my husband's benefits now. I contacted Social Security and learned that I can't get any of his Social Security until he files for benefits. I'm sort of OK with that. But here is the catch. He was married before for more than 10 years to another woman. She never remarried. She is 63. And I just learned that she has filed for and is receiving my husband's Social Security. How in the world can that be fair?

A: This is one of those government rules that sounds ill-thought-out and whacky until you learn the reasoning behind the law. And that law does say a currently married woman can't get any of her husband's Social Security until he is getting benefits himself. But a divorced woman can get benefits from her ex as long as he is old enough for Social Security even though he might not yet be a beneficiary himself.

The reasoning behind the law has to do with the issue of dependency.

A woman qualifies for a portion of her husband's Social Security benefits because she is considered to be financially dependent on him. In other words, the law assumes that a woman (who doesn't have her own job and her own Social Security) was being supported by her husband while he was working — and therefore, should be supported by a portion of his Social Security once he retires.

So, as long as your husband is still working and not getting Social Security, the law just assumes that he is supporting you with his wages or other income. Or to put that another way, if he doesn't need his Social

Security, then you don't need his Social Security either.

But the law can't make those assumptions for a divorced woman. Your husband is very likely not supporting this woman that he divorced more than 20 years ago. So under the dependency guidelines, the rules say she has a right to claim some of his Social Security. And as I pointed out in a prior answer, anything paid to this ex-wife will not reduce what you are due when your husband finally does retire.

AMARILLO — Agriculture producers must develop better marketing skills to improve their bottom line in times of greater market price volatility, and the Master Marketer Program is the place to get that training, said a Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service economist.

The next Master Marketer Program will be held in Amarillo. It will begin Jan. 21-22

and continue Feb. 4-5, Feb. 18-19 and March 2-3. All the meetings will be held at the Texas A&M AgriLife Research and Extension Center of Amarillo, 6500 W. Amarillo Blvd.

A free futures and options leveling workshop for anyone who doesn't think they are ready for intermediate to advanced level training will be held on Jan. 20 before the program begins, said Dr. Steve Amosson, AgriLife Extension economist in Amarillo.

Amosson will be leading a group of instructors from within the agency, several universities and private industries to put on the third Master Marketer Program in Amarillo.

Master Marketer is a national award-winning risk-management educational program where participants learn how to develop marketing plans, evaluate marketing alternatives, manage produc-

tion and price risk, and execute a risk management and marketing plan, he said.

A wide range of topics is covered to enhance marketing/risk management skills, Amosson said. Case studies, group discussions and simulation exercises will be used to provide experience with real tools that can be used on individual farm and ranch operations.

The 64-hour curriculum is offered as four, two-day sessions held every two weeks. It is the most intensive marketing/risk management training provided by Extension anywhere in the U.S., Amosson said.

The final date to register is Jan. 10, but Amosson said the class has always filled up in advance when it has been in Amarillo and he has never seen interest this high, this early.

"Only 60 participants can be accepted, so those interested shouldn't wait to register," he said.

The registration fee for the program is \$340, which includes noon meals and educational materials.

Bushland Falcons put a damper on Pampa Homecoming, as Harvesters fall 49-14

The Pampa Harvesters (1-3) hosted the Bushland Falcons (2-2) Friday night for their Homecoming Game. The Harvesters fell to the Falcons in a 49-14 loss to fall to 1-3.

Bushland jumped ahead early, scoring on their first drive and then intercepting a pass from senior Tyler Hooper and returning it for a touchdown to take the 14-0 lead.

"I don't think our offense performed very well, I don't think our defense performed very well," Pampa Harvesters' head coach Greg Poynor said. "You can't blame all of that on the kids. I didn't do a good enough job getting us ready. I was disappointed. I felt like a couple of big plays early, we got behind and we just didn't respond very well. Some of that's on us, too. We gotta figure it out and fix it."

Pampa was able to bounce back on their ensuing drive as Hooper kept finding sophomore Brenden Woelfle in the flat to pick up a few yards. Junior Colton Thompson converted a couple of big fourth downs to keep the Pampa drive alive. Faced with another third and eight, Hooper found sophomore Jayson Thomas for an 11-yard hook-up, setting up another first down. On third and 10, Hooper found sophomore Bryce Parker for another 10-yard connection and a first down. The Harvesters really gained momentum when Hooper found fellow senior Zack Gates for a 24-yard pass which set the Harvesters up at the goal line. A three-yard push by the offensive line being chased by Thompson punched in the score to cut

the lead in half 14-7 Bushland.

"We got it back to 14-7 and I felt like we gained back a little of the momentum," Poynor said. "We just didn't play very well on either side of the ball."

The run capped off a 16-play scoring drive which ate up 5:29 off the clock.

The Harvesters struggled offensively and defensively following the drive, and Bushland was able to run away with the game leading 42-7 at the half.

One drive in the second quarter, the Harvesters' offense showed life after Hooper found Gates on another 20-yard play. But was unable to come away with any points. Hooper also found Thomas for a big, 18-yard play on a drive that was ended by the buzzer.

Following a Harvester three-and-out to start the second half, the Falcons did score on their drive to open the third and give them their final points of the game at 49-7.

Pampa started putting together a healthy drive as sophomore Cy Wood caught a seven-yard pass from Hooper. Senior Chance Douglas had a five-yard run, followed by a five-yard run from junior Sergio Santos.

Thompson muscled his way for 11 yards on two carries, one for a first down, followed by a 14-yard reception by Thomas. Then Woelfle had a 10-yard reception. But the drive was suddenly ended after a Pampa fumble.

Pampa's final points of the game came on a long drive that was started when senior Brycen McClendon ran for eight yards. Three more Thompson yards later Pampa had a first down. Then Woelfle and McClendon each ran for six yards

each, and the former caught a five yard pass from Hooper. McClendon and Thompson continued the rushing attack for a four-yard gain and six-yard gain respectively to set up a fresh set of downs.

Hooper kept it himself for six yards, and then found junior Jordan Green for 16 yards and a first down. McClendon tacked on nine more yards on two carries before Hooper found Wood in the end zone for Pampa's final points of the game and the final score of 49-14.

Defensively, the Harvesters were able to muster a turnover when junior Erik Vizcaino caught an interception from Bushland quarterback Kameron Mathis. They also held the Falcons to a field goal which went wide left.

Hooper went 29/35 for 198 yards, a touchdown

and an interception. McClendon led the Harvesters in rushing with 12 carries for 34 yards, while Thompson had 27 yards and a touchdown on eight carries. Thomas led the Harvesters in receiving yards with 48 yards on five catches while Wood had 17 yards and a touchdown on two catches. Gates also had 44 yards on two catches. Senior Ashjen Payne had a tackle for loss while Vizcaino had an interception.

The Harvesters take to the road again next week to Tulia at 7:30 on Friday, Sept. 26.

"I am really anxious to talk to them and see how we respond," Poynor said. "It's a tough game. I know the coaches are going to coach hard and the kids have good character so I think they (the kids) are going to be ok."

Kenny Trill has Texas A&M off to perfect start

COLLEGE STATION (AP) — Kenny Hill insists he wasn't daunted taking over for Johnny Manziel as quarterback at Texas A&M.

He did, however, ask the 2012 Heisman Trophy winner and one of the most popular college players in recent history for some advice.

"He just said: 'Go out there and be you. You don't have to go out there and do anything crazy, just go out there and ball,'" Hill recalled.

So far he's done just that, leading No. 6 Texas A&M to a perfect start with a chance to improve to 4-0 for the first time since 2006 with a win on Saturday at SMU.

The ultra-confident 19-year-old burst onto the scene by throwing for a school-record 511 yards in A&M's season-opening win at South Carolina. He woke up the next day and realized his phone was broken and couldn't be fixed, so he tracked the buzz on Twitter — suddenly he had gone from unknown backup to one of the hottest players in college football. Manziel and others were calling him Kenny Football, a sensible nod to Manziel's "Johnny Football" nickname.

Except Hill didn't like that. He wanted his own nom de plume.

He went through a list of names and decided "Kenny Trill" was his favorite. He was stunned by the media

attention his new nickname elicited.

"That was nuts," he said. "I get on Twitter and 'Kenny Trill' is trending on Twitter. I think it's just unbelievable that it took off like that."

Trill has long been used by Texas rapper Bun B, who calls himself Bun B Trill OG. Bun B tweeted about the nickname, saying he liked the idea of it but that Hill would have to do more to be "trill." Hill was floored that perhaps the most famous rapper in Texas addressed his moniker.

"I think at some point I can earn that nickname," he said, "To say that he likes the idea was pretty cool, too. Just to talk about my nickname, I think that's unreal."

Pampa couldn't come up with any points, however, and the drive ended with the halftime buzzer.

Pampa received the ball to start the next half and drove down the field. With a goal-line play, Anguiano connected with Justin Thomas for a touchdown on an impressive catch.

The following Bushland drive was disrupted as Kyle Patrick got in the backfield and sacked Bushland's quarterback.

Porter started the fourth quarter with a long run, but a Pampa fumble stopped the drive in Bushland territory.

In spite of a tackle for loss from Seth Langley, the Bushland squad was able to score a touchdown, tying the game at 14-14.

In the next Pampa drive, Anguiano connected with Baker who lateraled to Brendan Grant to set up Pampa in the red zone. Pampa turned the ball over on downs, and then forced Bushland to do the same, which set Pampa back up around the 35-yard line.

The passing play of the game could arguably been the throw from Anguiano to Darrell Fields who put Pampa near the goal line.

Which allowed for Brenden Baker to kick the

game-winning field goal.

Trailing 8-0, the Harvesters continued to feed Baker the ball, who got first downs on three straight carries. The Harvesters were unable to come up with any points and turned the ball over on downs.

The Harvesters continued to struggle defensively and took a 16-0 deficit into halftime.

The third quarter opened up with a hand-off to Jordan Baker, who took the ball from deep inside Pampa territory all the way to the house for a touchdown, cutting the lead in half at 16-8.

NFL to partner with domestic violence hotline

NEW YORK (AP) — Roger Goodell will make his first public statements in more than a week about the rash of NFL players involved in domestic violence when he holds a news conference Friday.

The NFL commissioner will address the league's personal conduct policy. The league has faced increasing criticism it has not acted quickly or emphatically enough concerning the domestic abuse cases.

His last public appearance was at a high school in North Carolina on Sept. 10.

The commissioner and some NFL teams have been heavily criticized for lenient or delayed punishment of Ray Rice, Adrian Peterson and other players involved in recent domestic violence cases. Less than three weeks into the season, five such cases have made headlines, the others involving Greg Hardy, Ray McDonald and Jonathan Dwyer.

Vikings star running back Peterson, Carolina defensive end Hardy and Arizona running back Dwyer are on a special commissioner's exemption list and are being paid while they go through the legal process. McDonald, a defensive end for San Francisco, continues to practice and play while being investigated on suspicion of domestic violence.

As these cases have come to light, such groups as the National Organization of Women and league partners and sponsors have come down hard on the NFL to be more responsive in dealing with them. Congress also is watching to see how the NFL reacts.
