City Contractors working in alleys

PAMPA – The installation phase of the City of Pampa water meter change out program is underway. Customers can expect to see contractors for Sensus meters in alleys changing out all (approximately 6100) residential meters. Crews will be working on this phase of the project for approximately 5 months. Customers can expect brief water outages at their

home while their meter is being replaced. The normal expectancy for outage is less than ten minutes.

The change is a result of the City's initiatives to update aging equipment, improve water conservation and provide the data required to manage water usage.

The installation technicians will be easily identified by their identification badges. They must have access to the water meter box to complete the meter exchange. Technicians will not need to enter your residence. The installation technicians will be working from 7

a.m. to 7 p.m., Monday through Saturday. The project is scheduled to be complete by May 15, 2015.

Controlled burn at City of Pampa landfill

PAMPA — The City of Pampa is conducting a controlled burn at the City of Pampa Landfill property east of town. The controlled burn will begin at 7 a.m. on Friday, Dec. 12, and will continue through Sunday Dec. 14. Citizens can expect to see large amounts of smoke in that area during the burn. The Pampa Fire Department along with landfill personnel will monitor the burn 24 hours a day until extinguished.

The burn has been approved by the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality. The goal is to rid the city landfill site of trees and limbs that were brought in following two major storms this past summer. The debris was diverted from the landfill to an approved site for collection, saving large amounts of space in the active landfill cell.

The City of Pampa would like to thank all of those who have helped with the massive cleanup effort. The landfill has taken in over 600 tons of trees and tree limbs since June of 2014.



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State sued for "Stifling the Texas Craft Beer Renaissance"

Three Texas breweries filed a lawsuit against the state on Wednesday seeking to to overturn a 2013 law they say violates the Texas Constitution by forcing them to give away their territorial distribution rights for free.

In their complaint, filed in state district court in Austin, the heads of Live Oak Brewing in Austin, Peticolas Brewing Company in Dallas and Revolver Brewing in Granbury say that were it not for Senate Bill 639, they would be expanding. Instead, their plans to bring their beer to new markets around the state have been put on hold.

In the suit, they accuse the law of "stifling the Texas craft beer renaissance."

"This law is like the government forcing authors to give the rights to their books to publishers for free," said Matt Miller, managing attorney of the Texas office of the Institute for Justice, a Virginia-based law firm representing the brewers. "It is unconstitutional for Texas to force brewers to give distributors property that they never earned and don't deserve."

The law says that brewers may not accept payment for the right to deliver beer in certain areas. Supporters said it would "protect the independence of distributors," according to an analysis of the bill by the House Research Organization.

The Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission and its leaders are the defendants in the suit. On Wednesday, a spokeswoman for the TABC declined to comment on pending litigation.

There are three "tiers" in the alcoholic beverage industry: brewers who make the beer, retailers who sell it, and distributors who pick it up from the former and bring it to the latter.

Prior to 2013, craft brewers could negotiate payment from distributors for the exclusive rights to deliver their beverages in a certain area. But the law, authored by state Sen. John Carona, R-Dallas, prohibited the sale of these territorial rights.

Carona was not immediately available for comment on Wednesday. He told the Dallas Observer in 2013: "What happens when the large manufacturers decide to require payment from a distributor for the right to distribute their brand? We could be back where we started from, with those who won't pay to play getting muscled out of the marketplace."

Distributors are not prohibited from selling territorial rights that they have acquired to another distributor. The craft brewers' complaint says, "A distributor is thus able to receive territorial rights for free and re-sell them for a profit."

This strikes the brewers at Live Oak, Peticolas and Revolver as unfair — and in violation of the state's constitution, which says that a person's property can not be taken without consent unless it is for use by the public or an entity granted the power of eminent domain. Miller said it was likely that other craft breweries will join the

These territorial rights are 'a valuable piece of property" that brewers should be able to sell in order to generate revenue for the growth and expansion of their companies, the lawsuit says.

"I'm proud to have been a part of the Texas craft beer renaissance," Chip McElroy, president of Live Oak Brewing, said in a statement. "When Texas passed this law, not only did it give away part of what my employees and I built — it took my beer off the shelves in Dallas-Fort Worth, San Antonio and other parts of Texas where Live Oak beer would otherwise be available."

According to the complaint, McElroy has existing agreements to distribute his beer in Houston.

However, he is unwilling to give away his territorial rights for free, and so has not entered into any new agreements.

He intends to self-distribute — which he can do because the company produces fewer than 125,000 barrels of beer annually — until his operation reaches a production level where that is no longer legally allowed.



ity elected in more than 60 years promised to bring new life to Congress.

But instead of offering a conservative agenda to the people who elected them, Congress is dallying with a plan to give even more power to Obama. It's called "fast track," and it's a scheme to authorize the president to negotiate with officials of foreign governments in secret and then bring their agreement to Congress for an up-or-down vote within a limited time period, practically without debate or chance for a filibuster.

Senator Elizabeth Warren (D-MA) let the cat out of the bag when she admitted in a speech this year, "They have to be secret, because if the American people knew what was actually in them, they would be opposed." So Obama and Congress are expected to cave in to heavy lobbying by Wall Street, multinationals and outsourcers, all of whom have a financial stake in a free-trade deal.

It makes no sense for the Republican Congress to turn unrestricted negotiating power over to a president who has already demonstrated that he has no regard for the rule of law, constitutional restraints or the separation of powers. The last fast-track deal, which gave us the Free Trade Agreement with South Korea, has been a total failure. We were told it would "support 70,000 jobs from increased exports alone," but U.S. exports to South Korea have actually declined, while licans. It found that imports have risen.

Obama has achieved one of his globalist goals — the end of American superiority - and maybe that will be his principal legacy. Communist China's economy just overtook the U.S. economy to become the largest in the world and, for the first time since Ulysses S. Grant was president, America is not the No. 1 power on planet

In global calculations, economic supremacy is the basis of political clout. It's a radical change in global relationships that the country with the most economic power is controlled by doctrinaire **Marxist Communists** instead of a country that respects the rule of

Republican members of Congress support fast track in the name of free trade, ignoring the polls showing they are on the unpopular side of this issue. The Pew Research Poll found that while most Americans agree that "trade is good," only 1 in 5 Americans believes that "trade creates jobs."

By more than 3 to 1, 73 percent to 23 percent, Americans say that outsourcing (which Pew defined as 'more U.S. companies setting up operations overseas") hurts our economy. In a funny but unsurprising aside, Pew Research asked members of the Council on Foreign Relations the same question and found that 73 percent of CFR members think outsourcing is good. That's the view of the globalists who want to force us to compete with the low-paid and even slave labor in other countries.

Robert E. Scott, director of research for the liberal Economic Policy Institute, explained why rosy estimates of job growth from free trade are badly flawed: they count jobs from exports but ignore job losses from imports that usually increase faster. "Unless free trade agreements reduce our too-high trade deficits, they won't have a net positive effect on U.S. employment" Scott said, adding that this view "isn't a radical stance on trade — it's textbook economics."

The Pew poll is a warning to Repubwhite working-class voters oppose free trade agreements by a 2-to-1 margin and see so-called free trade and amnesty as two sides of the same problem.

They are pressed by competition from foreigners at home through immigration and from abroad by free trade, and they don't like the squeeze. A vote for fast track

Crippling children by selling them racism

The recent "rash" of police officers killing blacks is prompting "civil rights activists" to describe

America — despite the election and reelection of a black president — as still a simmering caldron of racism. Never mind that according to the CDC, in 2012 (the most recent year with available data) 140 blacks were killed by cops -

versus 386 whites killed by cops. This dreary movie scene comes from a film about inner-city black teens called "Menace II Society." A black high school teacher speaks to two former students: "Being a black man in America isn't easy. The hunt is on, and you're the prey! All I'm saying is ... all I'm saying is — survive! Alright?" In case the identity of the alleged "hunter" is unclear, we hear a police siren in the background. Cops are out to get young black men.

Ridiculous.

But that gloomy narrative tracks inflict by convincing young black closely with Attorney General Eric Holder's assertion that America suffers from "pernicious racism." And a few weeks after the George Zimmerman/Trayvon Martin shooting happened, the Rev. Jesse Jackson said, "Blacks are under attack." Absurd.

In 1997, CNN and Time conducted a poll that asked white and black teens about "racism." Question: Is racism a major problem in America? Both black and white teens said, "yes." But when black teens were asked if racism is a "big problem," a "small problem" or "no a problem at all" — in their own lives — 89 percent called racism a "small problem" or "not a problem at all" for themselves.

In fact, 17 years ago, not only did black teens see racism as an insignificant problem in their own lives, but nearly twice as many black teens than white teens called "failure to take advantage of available opportunities" a bigger problem than racism.

What damage do "activists"

men that cops — or, for that matter, Republicans, tea party members and black conservatives — are out to get them? This emotion-based paranoia has real-world consequences. Fear and paranoia hurt potential and careers.

In the '60s, University of Pennsylvania professor Martin Seligman developed the theory of "learned helplessness" — when a person learns to believe and act helpless when, in fact, they do have control over their own negative circumstances but fail to exercise it. He then devoted most of his studies to "positive psychology" and the effect of happiness and optimism in people's lives. He produced an equation, $H=S+C+\dot{V}$, where a person's genetic capacity for happiness (S) plus their circumstances (C) and factors under their voluntary control (V) equal their happiness (H).

His extensive research discovered that a low "C" — adverse circumstances like poor health

But where is the evidence that the peoples of Transnistria, Abkhazia or South Ossetia want to return to Moldova or Georgia?

We seem to support every ethnic group that secedes from Russia, but no ethnic group that secedes from a successor state.

This is rank Russophobia masquerading as democratic principle.

What do the people of Crimea, Transnistria, Georgia, Abkhazia, South Ossetia, Luhansk or Donetsk want? Do we really

know? Do we care? And what have the Russians done to support secessionist movements to compare with our 78-day bombing of Serbia to rip away her cradle province of Kosovo, which had been Serbian land before we were a nation?

H.R. 758 charges Russia with an "invasion" of

But there was no air, land or sea invasion. The Russians were already there by treaty and the reannexation of Crimea, which had belonged to Russia since Catherine the Great, was effected with no loss of life.

Compare how Putin retrieved Crimea, with the way Lincoln retrieved the seceded states of the Confederacy — a fouryear war in which 620,000 Americans perished.

Russia is charged with using "trade barriers to apply economic and political pressure" and interfering in Ukraine's "internal af-

This is almost comical. The U.S. has imposed trade barriers and sanctions on Russia, Belarus, Iran, Cuba, Burma, Congo, Sudan, and a host of other nations

Economic sanctions are the first recourse of the American Empire.

And agencies like the National Endowment for Democracy and its subsidiaries, our NGOs and Cold War radios, RFE and Radio Liberty, exist to interfere in the internal affairs of countries whose regimes we dislike, with the end goal of "regime

change.' Was that not the State Department's Victoria Nuland, along with John McCain, prancing around Kiev, urging insurgents to overthrow the democratically elected government of Viktor Yanukovych?

Was Nuland not caught boasting about how the U.S. had invested \$5 billion in the political reorientation of Ukraine, and identifying whom we wanted as prime minister when Yanukovych was overthrown?

H.R. 578 charges Russia with backing Syria's Assad regime and providing it with weapons to use against "the Syrian people."

But Assad's principal enemies are the al-Nusra Front, an al-Qaida affiliate, and ISIS. They are not only his enemies, and Russia's enemies, but our enemies. And we ourselves have become de facto allies of Assad with our air strikes against ISIS in Syria.

And what is Russia doing for its ally in Damascus, by arming it to resist ISIS secessionists, that we are not doing for our ally in Baghdad, also under at-

tack by the Islamic State?

Have we not supported Kurdistan in its drive for autonomy? Have U.S. leaders not talked of a Kurdistan independent of Iraq?

H.R. 758 calls the President of Russia an "authoritarian" ruler of a corrupt regime that came to power through election fraud and rules by way of repression.

Is this fair, just or wise? After all, Putin has twice the approval rating in Russia as President Obama does here, not to mention the approval rating our Congress.

Damning Russian "aggression," the House demands that Russia get out of Crimea, South Ossetia, Abkhazia and Transnistria, calls on Obama to end all military cooperation with Russia, impose "visa bans, targeted asset freezes, sectoral sanctions," and send "lethal ... defense articles" to Ukraine.

This is the sort of ultimatum that led to Pearl Harbor.

Why would a moral nation arm Ukraine to fight a longer and larger war with Russia that Kiev could not win, but that could end up costing the lives of ten of thousands more Ukrainians?

Those who produced this provocative resolution do not belong in charge of U.S. foreign policy, nor of America's nuclear arsenal.

The first half continued with the back and forth runs with White Deer leading 20-18 before sophomore Montaisha Brown hit a three-pointer to give the Lady Harvesters the 21-20 lead. Senior Taylor Eubank added a layup to make the run 5-0 for Pampa. The Does went down and hit a three to tie the game at

Wall, Brown and Johnson each had buckets as Pampa went on a 6-2 run to end the half. Pampa led 29-25 at the

Wall, Eubank and Mad. Brown had four points each in the second quarter. Mon. Brown had three points in the

Pampa was held scoreless for nearly the first three minutes of the third quarter before Wall hit a layup at the 5:10 mark. Eubank added a shot to make it a 4-0 run and Pampa led 33-28 with 3:23 to go in the quarter. Eubank and the Lady Harvesters beat the press with a layup to go up 35-30. Once again Pampa beat the press and this time Wall

had a layup to go up 37-30 and force a White Deer timeout with 2:23 to go in the quarter. This timeout came after the 4-0 Pampa run. The run was 10-4 to end the quarter before the Does had a late three to make the score 43-37 at the end of the quarter.

Wall had eight points in the quarter. Eubank added six points in the quarter.

White Deer cut the lead to 43-40 early in the fourth with a three-pointer. Pampa had a couple of offensive rebounds to keep their possession alive before calling a timeout at the 6:41 mark. Mon. Brown added another three at the 4:24 mark to take the 49-41 lead. This forced another Doe timeout with 4:24 to go. Pampa called a timeout with 3:25 to go with the score 51-43. As a team, Pampa was 2-7 from the line and had three three-pointers.



As a team, White Deer was 7-16 from the line and had nine three-pointers.

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


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Texas Tech beats Fresno State 73-56

LUBBOCK (AP) — Texas Tech's halftime adjustments worked Wednesday night.

The Red Raiders used a strong second-half defense to earn a 73-56 home win against Fresno State. The Bulldogs scored 25 secondhalf points and shot 9 of 25 (36 percent) after halftime.

"We made some adjustments in our zone to keep the ball out of the middle and forced them to shoot it outside," Red Raiders coach Tubby Smith said. "The zone was very active."

Devaugntah Williams led the Red Raiders with 17 points, and Marvelle Harris produced a team-high 17

points for the Bulldogs. The Bulldogs (3-7) trailed by just three, 34-31, at halftime. A Harris jump shot with 17:20 remaining in the game trimmed their deficit to 34-33.

But then their offensive drought began. Their next point came on a free throw with 14:22 left and their second field goal of the second half didn't come until 7:42 remained in the game. The latter shot only trimmed Texas Tech's lead to 55-39.

Fresno State played just three reserves, to Texas Tech's nine.

The Red Raiders (6-1) built leads of 20 points three times over the remainder of the game, and the Bulldogs couldn't trim the deficit to less than 14 points in that

After winning their last two games by a combined three points, the Red Raiders cruised.

The first half was much more closely contested.

The Red Raiders built a 17-9 lead with 14:19 remaining in the first half, but the Bulldogs responded with five consecutive points to trim the deficit to three points, 17-14.

After Texas Tech built a nine-point lead with 4:08 left in the first half, the Bulldogs cut their deficit to two points, 29-27, with 2:03 left.

They scored four of the next nine points for the 34-31 deficit at halftime.

will depress Republican turnout among these crucial voters.

A poll by the nonpartisan Pew Research Center reveals that 50 percent of Americans recognize that jobs are destroyed by this kind of so-called free trade, which would be facilitated by giving Obama fast track authority. Nearly half — 45 percent — of Americans understand that this type of trade results in lower wages in the United States.

It is shocking that Congress would adopt a policy that destroys jobs and decreases wages when a record number of Americans

continue to be out of work. More than 92 million Americans are without jobs and have given up looking for one, and that number is 12 million people larger than when Obama took office.

But the Chamber of Commerce and wealthy donors to both parties are pushing for fast track in Congress's lame duck session. Only a relatively small group of people on Wall Street or in corporate executive offices benefit from increased free trade.

or poverty — matters very little if a person has a high "V," a positive, optimistic outlook and a belief in himself. For example, he found that an upbeat wheelchair-bound factory worker often leads a happier life than a robust, wealthy CEO.

Psychologists called this the "emotional quotient" factor, or EQ: a measurement of a person's ability to monitor his or her emotions, cope with pressures and demands, control his or her thoughts and actions, and one's ability to assess and affect situations and relationships with other people. Salesmen, for example, with "high EQ" for a strong positive out-

look outsold those with higher traditional aptitude, but with lower EQ. High EQ people engage in positive behavior, which leads to positive results.

George Foreman, the

former heavyweight boxing champion, is one of the most successful pitchmen of our generation. A spokesperson for products ranging from Meineke mufflers and Doritos to his own lowfat indoor grill, which earned him \$138 million when he sold the grill's naming rights in 1999, Foreman has an estimated net worth of \$250 million. A high school dropout, Foreman recently wrote this about the value of optimism:

"This life, this country, is about HOPE.

"My first two jobs were about selling: Four hours of putting out sale papers, on doors, cars and handed out. Then at a fruit stand. Texas watermelon season was the best. Competition was great — we had to (as boys) have a variety of melons and a lot of charm

"The ability to sell is about the best asset one can pass on to a generation to come. And the most critical and influential product anyone can deal or trade is 'Hope.'

"No matter who we lose, every young doctor is optimistic we will win this one. And many a time we do. Not a whole lot is new, just the same old Hope. ... When things go wrong in this life our sole obligation to our children is to sell them on Hope. Sure, beating our head against the wall is an option. But time

and life must proceed. Anger and disappointment bring more dark clouds. Oh, but HOPE is the sunshine that every child needs for play. ... Teach them Hope. And BELIEVE there is Hope. "It's our duty."

and Brannen Greene hit the shot that made him 5 for 5 from 3-point range, a big down-the-stretch bucket Wednesday night in the No. 10 Jayhawks' 75-70 win over Georgetown.

Greene scored 16 of his career-high 19 points in the second half, including a pair of free throws in the final minute as the Jayhawks (7-1) won their sixth in a row.

Joshua Smith scored 20 points to lead the Hoyas (5-3), whose other losses came against No. 4 Wisconsin and No. 15 Butler.

Before the Jayhawks made their basketball statement with a win over a top team in the Big East, the Hoyas' players made a bold statement of their own. Georgetown's entire roster emerged for warmups wearing black, short-sleeve T-shirts with the words "I CAN'T BREATHE" in white.

The players kept the T-shirts on during the national anthem and pregame handshakes. They became the latest notable athletes to display the message on warmups or other equipment in recent days, echoing the last words spoken by Eric Garner as police were attempting to arrest him in New York in July. A grand jury decided last week not to indict the officers involved in his death, spurring protests across the country.

"We didn't wear the shirts to say that the cops were wrong or the system was wrong, Smith said. "We just wore the shirts just to show our condolences to the family because no matter how you look at it, we don't know who was right or wrong, but they still lost somebody. And they won't get that person back."
