

Citizens for a better Pampa explained

■ New citizen group working with city commissioners to better the city of Pampa.

During the fall, the city of Pampa had its fair share of controversy with proposed changes to taxes, city amendments and, most recently, city council meeting times.

Since then, several groups of citizens have formed, each with their own agenda and own concerns on how the city government is being

The Citizens for a better Pampa, spear-headed by Dale and Phillis Garner, want to use positive methods and communication to make their voices heard in the city commission.

"I think it all got started on the wrong foot (back in the fall)," Phillis said.

Dale says members of the commission told him they wanted to hear more from the public so they can be more informed on what the public wants.

"We were told by the commis-

sioners and the mayor, they don't know really what the people want if they don't speak up," Dale said. "I think that's how we finally ended up where we're at now.

Both Garners started their involvement after the tax controversy in September, but realize now that the tax controversy was a misunderstanding, not a deception.

They were invited to join the Concerned Citizens of Pampa Facebook group, but didn't feel it was the right group for them.

So they started a group of their own, the Citizens for a better Pampa, who have been working on improving the city while collaborating with the city commissioners.

"But I think a lot of people were misled with misinformation, especially on the tax deal and city government in general," Dale said. "So we seem to be finding out a lot of stuff that's not exactly the way it was perceived to be."



un-American, surely "morally treasonous and spectacularly dishonorable."

Are those the words of intelligence talking heads railing against National Security Agency leaker Edward Snowden? No, they are the thoughts of screenwriter and "Newsroom" creator Aaron Sorkin, who argued in The New York Times on Monday that news organizations should not print stories about purloined internal Sony corporate documents — replete with dirt on stars' compensation, employee medical records and top execs' emails, some with snarky racial references to President Barack Obama. The documents were extracted by a group that calls itself Guardians of Peace, which threatened to leak more Sony tidbits if the corporation goes through with its scheduled Christmas Day release of the comedy 'The Interview," about a CIA-inspired assassination plot against North Korean supreme leader Kim Jong Un.

'You're giving material aid to criminals," Sorkin scolded. And: "First, salaries were published. Not by the hackers, but by American news outlets." Sorkin directed ers. They even could more umbrage toward the "American journalists helping them" than he did toward the hackers, who reputedly are linked somehow to Pyongyang, the North Korean capital.

There is something precious about Sorkin's outrage toward the Sony leaks. Sorkin notes that the Guardians of Peace have threatened Sony families. OK, the same can be said of a spate of national security

leaks, which threaten to expose U.S. intelligence assets abroad.

It says something about this country's lack of seriousness that the Hollywood left can applaud hackers who purloin sensitive national security information but can find outrage after leaked emails reveal that Hollywood honchos as opposed to tea party activists — can be racially insensitive. CNN's Don Lemon confessed that he is "torn" about the Sony story. Lemon asked, "Do you want people gaining information that way?" How else does Lemon think this happens?

Sorry. It's hard to hit the brakes on the leak culture when it has run over so many nameless public servants in the intelligence community.

For its part, Sony reacted with Washingtonlike heavy-handedness. The entertainment giant hired David Boies, the lawyer who represented Al Gore's losing case on the 2000 Florida presidential vote recount. He shot off a letter to news outlets warning that the material is "stolen information," that Sony does not consent to publication of hacked documents and that the corporation "will have no choice but to hold (them) responsible for any damage or loss arising from such use or dissemination by (them)."

If Sony wants to win public sympathy, then its execs should be railing about the copious blood on Kim Jong Un's hands. They could vow not to buckle to blackmail, be it from the henchmen of a North Korean despot or anonymous anarchistic hacktalk about the ugliness of information theft.

Instead, Sony hired a big-shot lawyer to repeat the thought of every Hollywood biggie treated like a civilian: Don't you know who I

Museum Musings

John Robert Henry's story

John Robert Henry, born 1858 in North Carolina, came to Colorado City, Texas, in January, 1883. In the spring he rode

horseback to Wheeler County where his first job was hauling rock to build a wall around a livery stable east of Huselby Hotel. He helped build Red Deer Dam and worked on several ranches, including the Diamond F and the Z-Z.

In 1889 he bought sheep and went in business for himself near Laketon. Mary Walter Brown, daughter of

A.J. Jasper, was a widow with a small daughter, Gertrude LaNora Brown. In 1889 she came from Tarrant County to the Laketon area with her father and two brothers because she thought that the men must have someone to keep house for them.

At first Mary, a former teacher, hated the cowboys and did not hesitate to say so. A friend bet her gray

horse that Mary would marry one of the cowboys within a year. Mary won the horse but she soon married John Henry on April 9, 1890.

When Mary was asked how she happened to break down and marry John Henry, she answered, "Oh, I don't know. He was the wittiest piece of humanity I ever met. I watched his best friends and decided that no better people ever lived than the early settlers.'

After, the Henrys lived near the Laketon area for several years, they moved, house and all, to Miami where John helped to organize the First State Bank of Miami. They moved back to the Laketon area, rebuilt, and then moved to McLean before coming to Pampa in 1909.

When Gray County was organized in 1902, the Henrys were living in the Laketon area. J.R. Henry was the election judge and his home was the voting place for Precinct 1. Mary helped to organize the first Baptist church and Sunday school in the county while the Henrys lived at

Laketon.

In 1908 Henry bought part of Section 78, Block 3, I&GN Survey from the White Deer Land Company. (In 1935 he sold this land to the City of Pampa for Recreation Park). In addi tion to farming his land, Henry was a director and vice-president of the First National Bank in Pampa.

The Henrys lived in a large threestory house built on their farm. Later the city limits were extended to include the house that had the address 905 (or 911) East Beryl.

On January 20, 1942, a fire started in a bedroom on the second floor of the house, and the entire third floor, part of the second floor and the roof were destroyed before firemen could get the blaze under control. The fire did not reach the first floor, but there was water damage.

After the fire the J.R. Henrys moved to 121 North Wynne where he died on December 1, 1943, and she died on January 17, 1946.

Mrs. Henry had wanted the prop-

Gertrude LaNora Brown, daughter of Mary Henry, married Lawrence C. McMurtry (an uncle of author Larry McMurtry). Gertrude was one of Pampa's first dance teachers and owned the first studio in Pampa.

Clinton Henry, son of J.R. and Mary Henry, married Fannie Fern Pope, daughter of Dave Pope and Mary Olive White. Clinton was bookkeeper and assistant manager of the J A Ranch when T.D. Hobart was manager. Later Clinton ranched near Red Deer Creek.

Jack Henry was an orphan reared by J.R. and Mary Henry and regarded as their son.

the English bulldog may not be for you if you don't want to deal with the following:

 Tenacious stubbornness if he decides he really, really doesn't want to do something.

 Serious food possessiveness — bulldogs should not be fed around small children or other pets. This one is one that can be worked through and beaten while they're young, as I explained earlier in this column. It was proven when we recently had a puppy around at home that ate out of Humphrey's food bowl. Humphrey did not mind, and just let the pup eat before him, which made me one proud momma.

• Shedding. (I keep a lint roller on hand most of the time, as Humphrey sheds pretty profusely.)

 Snorting, snuffling, wheezing, grunting, loud snoring. (YES.)

 Slobbering and drooling. (This one only applies to Humphrey when he is panting. He generally does not slobber or drool. His lips aren't super baggy and he doesn't have as big of an under-bite as other dogs of his breed.)

• Gassiness (flatulence). (YES, awful.)

• A multitude of health problems, a short lifespan, and sky-high vet bills. (I have had no problems with Humphrey so far other than separation anxiety the first time I went away for a long weekend.)

The article closes by asking those interested in the breed to consider adopting an adult English bulldog. The only thing I would say to be careful about is the old saying "You can't teach an old dog new tricks." Breaking an adult dog of negative habits could be difficult. DWC announces insurance carrier performance based oversight results

SUBMITTED BY TEXAS DEPARTMENT OF INSURANCE

AUSTIN — The Division of Workers' Compensation (DWC) today announced the results of the fifth Insurance Carrier Performance Based Oversight (PBO) assessment.

A total of 116 insurance carriers were reviewed. Of those, 47 were deemed high performers, 68 were deemed average performers, and 1 was deemed a poor performer. Based on the PBO assessment, insurance carriers are placed into regulatory tiers: poor performers, average performers, and consistently high performers.

incentives within each tier that promote greater overall compliance and performance. Insurance carriers were assessed on the timeliness of:

· payment of initial Tempo-

rary Income Benefits (TIBs); processing of initial medical


• processing of request for reconsideration medical bills: submission of initial pay-

ment data via Electronic Data Interchange (EDI); and submission of medical bill processing data via EDI.

The DWC is required to monitor system participants' compliance with the Texas Workers' Compensation Act and DWC rules and to correct noncompliant behavior. Compliance objectives are achieved through PBO, data monitoring, complaint handling, entity audits, and when appropriate, enforcement actions. As part of the overall compliance plan, Section 402.075 of the Texas Labor Code mandates the DWC to, at least biennially, assess the performance of insurance carriers and health care providers. The results of this assessment and a listing of The DWC will focus its the assessed insurance carriers regulatory oversight on the poor are posted on the Texas Departperformers, as well as other ment of Insurance website at http://www.tdi.texas.gov/wc/ pbo/icpbo.html. Not all insurance carriers are assessed and placed into a regulatory tier. This does not imply that those insurance carriers are exempt from compliance with the Texas Labor Code and DWC rules.
