Pampa Animal Shelter selling holiday goods

The Pampa Animal Shelter has expanded its services for the holiday season. Those who have stopped in recently have seen a section of the front lobby that now has various gifts and pet items available for sale.

PAWS volunteer Lynn Ledford mentioned that the shelter sells PAWS hoodies, T-shirts and license plate frames year-round, but for the holidays, they have expanded the products offered. There is a table set out with an assortment of goodies

for both pets and owners, including books, blankets, treats, magnets, collars, toys and other items as well.

The items have been provided by donations and vendors throughout town.

Ledford said that so far, the shelter has experienced some success with selling the goods, and the proceeds from the gift items sold go toward helping out the animals. This includes vaccinations, spaying/neuter-

ing the animals, vet bills for sick and injured animals, medications, bedding, food, treats, bones, etc. She added that if the success continues, they may keep the expansion of goods for sale after the first of the year.

There is also a basket set out accepting toy donations for the animals. Ledford said that they encourage hard rubber toys for the dogs because they are not allowed to have stuffed toys in the kennels. She added that toilet paper cylinders work well for the cats since they are disposable and they love to play with them.

The shelter is always accepting donations of bedding, food and treats for the animals as well.

DPS Trooper seizes more than 53 Pounds in marijuana near Amarillo

AMARILLO - The Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) conducted a traffic stop Sunday on Interstate 40, yielding more than 53 pounds of marijuana valued at more than \$24,000.



At approximately 3:30 p.m., a DPS trooper conducted a traffic stop on a 2013 Chrysler 300 traveling eastbound on I-40, for a traffic violation, near Amarillo in Potter County.

The driver of the 300 was identified as Fredrick C.

Grundy, 36, of Phoenix. During the traffic stop, the trooper discovered five bundles of marijuana in the trunk.

Grundy was placed under arrest for possession and delivery of marijuana more than 50 pounds but less than 2000 pounds, a first-degree felony, and booked into the Potter County Jail. The illegal drugs were allegedly being transported from Phoenix to Columbus, Ohio.

City of Pampa holiday hours

The City of Pampa will be operating under special hours this week. All City offices, including the landfill, will be closed Dec. 24 and Dec. 25. All offices will be re-opening on Friday with normal business hours. The land fill will be a

As statewide smoking ban stalls, cities go it alone

A decision by the Paris City Council in March to ban smoking in public places, including restaurants, angered Brent McKee. A restaurant owner, McKee was thinking about the customers who enjoyed a cigarette or two while nursing their morning coffee.

"I built this with my blood and sweat, and then they come in and they tell me what I can and cannot do? That upset me," he said of the ban.

Now, McKee reluctantly acknowledges a change of heart.

"I'm glad it happened, I guess," he said last week. "Everybody says it smells so much better. It hurts the business in the morning time with the coffee and the smokers, but the rest of the day, everybody who wouldn't come in here will

come in here now."

Next year, Texas lawmakers will again consider a statewide ban on smoking in public places. It will be the fifth legislative session in a row in which such a measure has been proposed. More than 100 Texas cities - encompassing nearly half

"I think eventually Texas is going to pass smoke-free laws," said Cam Scott, senior director of government relations with Smoke-Free Texas. "It's just a matter of when."

When Fort Worth approved a smoking ban in 2007, state Rep. Charlie Geren, a Republican, opposed it as both a legislator and as the owner of Railhead Smokehouse, a barbecue restaurant. Like many other critics of such bans, Geren said he views the Fort Worth ordinance as an infringement on his rights as a private property owner.

"I would have been more comfortable with it if it were a true ban," Geren said.

The Texas Restaurant Association supports a statewide ban, citing the current confusion for restaurant owners dealing with a "whole hodge-podge of different laws," AS TRIBUNE IN 2011.


Jane Carnahan Bright

NEW YORK (AP) — While Hollywood continued to wrestle with the fallout of the Sony hacking scandal, the weekend box office offered the solace of a moviegoing truism: Hobbits sell.

Peter Jackson's final installment of his six J.R.R. Tolkien adventures, "The Hobbit: The Battle of the Five Armies," debuted with \$56.2 million over the weekend and \$90.6 million since opening Wednesday, according to studio estimates Sunday. For an industry reeling from the cancellation of "The Interview" and terrorist threats against moviegoers, Middle-earth provided reliable refuge.

Texas sets annual job growth record for fourth month in a row

Unemployment rate falls to 4.9 percent in November

AUSTIN – Continuing its momentum of strong job growth, Texas added 34,800 seasonally adjusted total nonfarm jobs in November, for a total of 441,200 jobs added since last year. This broke the state's previous record set in October, as the state's annual job growth expanded to a new high for a fourth month in a row.

Even more Texans were employed in November as the seasonally adjusted unemployment rate fell to 4.9 percent from 5.1 percent in October, and down from 6.1 percent a year ago.

"The Texas economy continued its record-breaking expansion, providing job opportunities across a wide range of industries," said Texas Workforce Commission (TWC) Chairman Andres Alcantar. "Texas employers set another record by adding 441,200 jobs over the year and we must continue to focus our efforts on expanding our state's skilled workforce to meet employer needs in high-demand industries.'

Seven of 11 major industries added jobs in Texas over the month, including an additional 13,500 jobs in Professional and Business Services, 7,200 jobs added in Education and Health Services and 6,000 jobs added in Leisure and Hospitality.

"Texas continued to show its economic strength with steady job growth across several industries for several years now," said TWC Commissioner Representing Labor Ronny Congleton. "We have a very strong labor market and job seekers are encouraged to take advantage of training opportunities and job-search tools available at www.WorkInTexas.com."

In November, employers added 4,500 Manufacturing jobs, marking the industry's largest monthly increase since January 2006. Construction grew by 3,600 jobs. The Information industry added 3,300 jobs in November and includes jobs in publishing, telecommunications, data processing, hosting and related services.

"Employers in the private sector continued to drive economic growth, adding 31,900 jobs in November for an impressive total of 409,700 jobs over the last 12 months," said TWC Commissioner Representing Employers Hope Andrade.



Romo, Cowboys are in after 42-7 rout of Colts

ARLINGTON (AP) — ed their first shutout loss in 21 Cowboys don't have worry about a win-and-you're-in finale this year.

They're in.

playoff drought Sunday in a dominating 42-7 victory over the Indianapolis Colts, with Romo throwing four touchdown passes and breaking Troy Aikman's franchise record for yards passing.

After three straight seasonending losses that left them at 8-8 and out of the postseason, the Cowboys (11-4) don't have to worry about winning at Washington next weekend. They are NFC East champions for the first time since 2009 a week early.

"I just don't have bad Christmases. I've been too fortunate," owner Jerry Jones said. "On the other hand, to have the promise of getting ready to compete in the playoffs, but with a team that can compete chance to do something.

The Colts (10-5) didn't have much to play for with the AFC South title secured, and looked like it while they barely avoid-

Tony Romo and the Dallas years. Falling behind 28-0 by midway through the second quarter, they lost a slim chance to earn a first-round bye.

"Yeah, it was a dismal start," Dallas ended a four-year said Andrew Luck, who threw for a season-low 109 yards with two interceptions and was pulled in the third quarter with the game out of hand. "It was bad. A lot of bad. Not much good, if any."

Coming off back surgery that kept him out of last year's season-ending loss to the Eagles, and another back injury sustained against Washington in October, the 34-year-old Romo had his fifth game with a passer rating of at least 135. He completed 18 of 20 passes for 218 yards.
