City Commission recognizes anniversaries of employees

The Pampa City Commission met for its first meeting of the month at its new meeting day and time of 5:30 p.m. on the second and fourth Monday of each month. To start things off, the mayor and commissioners took some time to hear from citizens who had filled out cards to speak during the public comment portion of the meeting. One citizen spoke and asked about the possibility of changing the charter for an election in the future to eliminate the requirement that city commission chairs must live within the ward they represent.

City attorney Leland Waters stated that it is too late to amend the charter for the next election. Next, the mayor and commissioners took the time to recognize employees who recently celebrated mile-marker anniversaries working for city departments. "I'm privileged to honor these employees," city manager Richard Morris said. "Of course, we're proud of the employees we're not honoring tonight, too." Those recognized included all five, 10, 15, 20, 30 and even 35-year employees of various departments within the City of Pampa. Each of the 19 employees recognized were given a pin for their achievements.

"Thank you for your service and I hope that you continue for a long time," mayor Brad Pingel said. At that time, discussion on the agenda items began. After approving the minutes and absentees of the previous two December meetings (falling on the ninth and tenth), the mayor and commissioners awarded a bid for two Refuse Collection Truck cab and chassis. This item had two agenda numbers for the meeting and was discussed in two parts. First, the mayor and commissioners heard from Jil Arias and Donny Hooper, who explained that the two incoming trucks will be used to replace the two old-

est refuse collection trucks the city currently utilizes. The old trucks are a 2006 and 2007 model, and Arias said that one of these has been a frequent flier in the shop. It was then explained to the mayor and commissioners that the older of the two trucks will be sold, and the money from that sale will go back into the vehicle replacement fund. The newer of the trucks being replaced will be used as a reserve truck. After approving the bid for the replacement of the two trucks unanimously, they then awarded a bid for two 25 CY Side **CITY cont. on page 2**

Results from PPD increased holiday patrols

On several nights during the Christmas and New Years holiday's the Pampa Police Department, thanks to a grant from the Texas Department of Transportation, had extra officers patrolling the streets searching for impaired drivers. As a direct result of this, one subject was taken into custody for driving while intoxicated. Furthermore, a total of 17 traffic citations were issued, including three for no insurance. Another strong point of this enforcement period, was that there were zero traffic collisions attributed to impaired driving within the city of Pampa during this entire period. "The goal of this grant project is to deter subjects from driving under the influence of alcohol or drugs through awareness and an increased presence of officers on the streets looking for those who choose to break the law," said Detective Brian Massey, Crime Prevention Officer for the Police Department. "During this enforcement period, we feel that both sides of this goal were accomplished. While we may have only made one arrest for impaired driving, our **DWI cont. on page 2**

DPS trooper seizes \$631,000 in Marijuana

AMARILLO – The Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) conducted a traffic stop Monday on Interstate 40, yielding 175 pounds of marijuana valued at more than \$631,000. At approximately 12:26 p.m., a DPS trooper conducted a traffic stop on a 2015 Chevrolet Avalanche traveling eastbound on I-40, for a traffic violation, near Conway in Carson County. The driver of the Avalanche was identified as Sharon Lynn Bodostain, 68, of Glenhaven, Calif. During the traffic stop, the trooper discovered 118 bundles of marijuana in the vehicle. Bodostain was placed under arrest for possession and delivery of marijuana more than 50 pounds but less than 2000 pounds, a first-degree felony, and booked into the Carson County Jail. The illegal drugs were allegedly being transported from Glenhaven, Calif., to Atlanta.

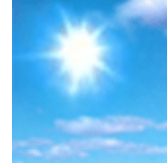
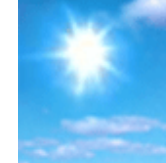

Loader Packer Bodies.

Hooper explained that this was necessary because otherwise the city would be purchasing new trucks but would be using old packer bodies with them.

The bid total came out to \$149,500 for the replacement of the trucks with side loader packer bodies.

Next, the commissioners renewed a two-year Animal Control Agreement with the cities of Clarendon, Groom, Lefors, McLean, Miami, Skellytown and White Deer.

After this agenda item, the mayor and commissioners discussed adopting a Resolution of the City of Pampa suspending Southwestern Public Service Company's proposed effective date in connection with its Statement of

Intent submitted on Dec. 8, 2014.

They voted unanimously in favor of this agenda item in hopes that the suspension, which allows an additional 90 days for a rate review study, will result in a lower rate.

The initial proposed rate, according to Morris, was said to increase their revenue by more than 12 percent, which is fairly high.

The final public agenda

item was to approve the list of disbursements, and the mayor and commissioners did so unanimously.

At that time, the mayor and commissioners broke out into executive session to discuss the city manager's performance before returning to adjourn the meeting.

The next city commission meeting will be held at 5:30 p.m. Monday, Jan. 26 at City Hall.

Officers made many contacts while working these extra hours. Out of all those contacts, they were only able to locate and apprehend one person who failed to take the warning seriously. By that, there was one poten-

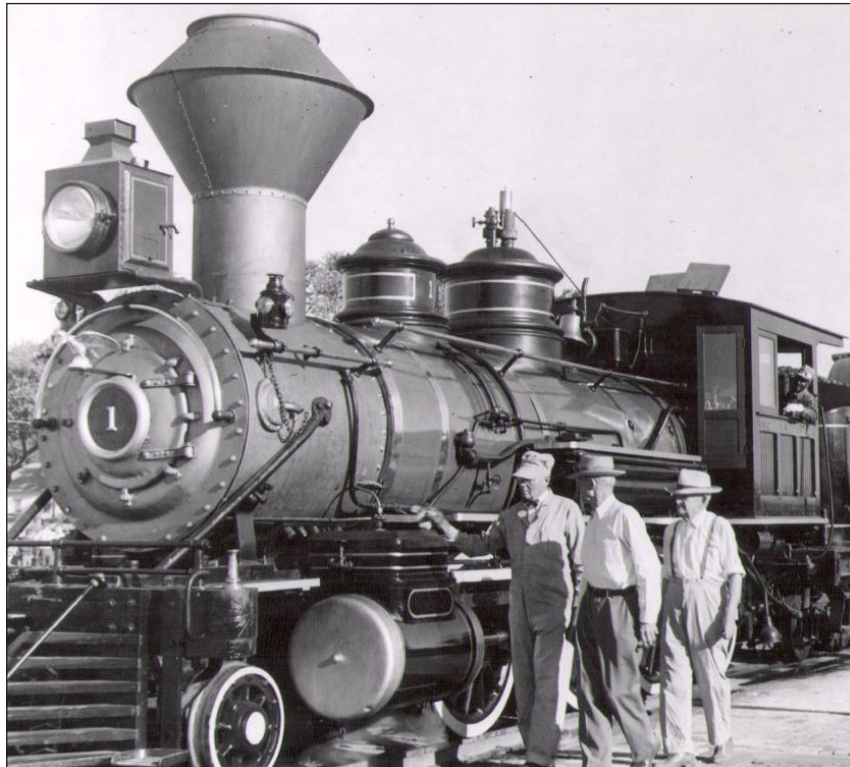

Say Islam is violent and Jihadis will kill you

Here's what I love about the French: They've long understood the dangers presented by radical Islam. French President Francois Hollande swiftly called the deadly Wednesday shooting at Paris' Charlie Hebdo magazine "an act of exceptional barbarity," without doubt a terrorist attack. There was no hedging. The Socialist leader didn't engage in the sort of blather White House spokesman Josh Earnest offered on MSNBC shortly after the shootings. Earnest called the attack a "terrible act of violence," but not necessarily terrorism.

He repeated the mantra that Islam is a "religion of peace." Given that the shooters proclaimed "Allahu akbar" (God is great) and "We have avenged the Prophet Muhammad," Earnest came across like an addict in denial. The Council on American-Islamic Relations knew better than to throw out the "religion of peace" line. In its statement, CAIR condemned the shootings as an assault on free speech. CAIR supports free speech, "even speech that mocks faiths and religious figures."

Back to Hollande, who understood how to react to the carnage. No hand-wringing about welcoming people of all faiths. No need to state the obvious — that most Muslims don't go around killing cartoonists. No hesitation to call this rampage what it was. The shootings of journalists in their office were meant to make critics hesitate before stating what they think and believe. When these masked murderers shot cartoonists and police officers, they were warning the world that you cannot criticize radical Islam without risking your very skin.

You could call one work of former Jyl-lands-Posten culture editor Flemming Rose's Denmark's version of Charlie Hebdo. In 2005, Rose ran 12 largely unflattering cartoons that lampooned the Prophet Muhammad.

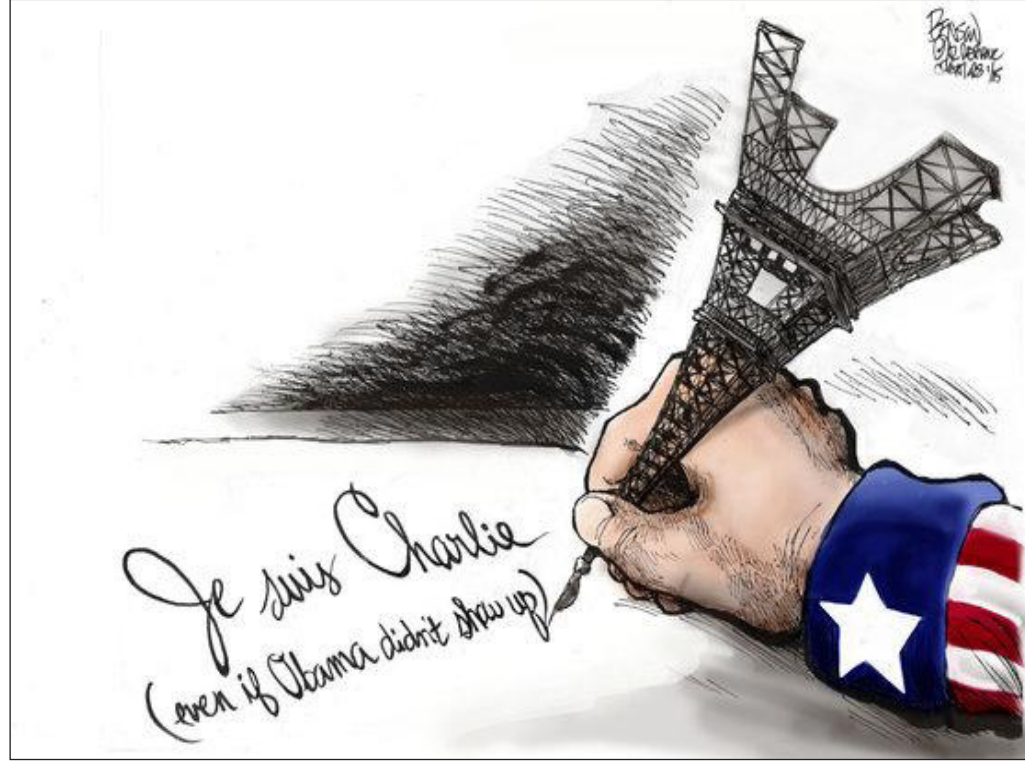
A year later, after two imams circulated the cartoons — along with others not published in the Danish paper — violence erupted in the Middle East. In 2008, Danish police arrested three men for plotting to behead a cartoonist who depicted Muhammad wearing a bomb as a turban. To show their support for free speech, 17 Danish newspapers reprinted the 2005 cartoons.

For his trouble, Rose won a reputation for being an unreasonable man of questionable judgment. As he told me in 2008, some Europeans believe "you shouldn't offend Muslims because they are so weak, they are so immature (and) they are such a different kind of minority that if you treat them like everybody else, they will go wild." Rose was astonished that Islamists had no problem with the message, "If you say we are violent, we are going to kill you."

Whatever you do, do not say that Islam is not a religion of peace.

In solidarity, media across the globe should be reproducing the work of slain cartoonists Stephane Charbonnier, Georges Wolinski, Bernard Verlhac and Jean Cabut. Rose wrote in Politico on Wednesday, "In the immediate aftermath of the Charlie Hebdo killings, news publications in the United States and around the world were publishing blurred images of the Muhammad cartoons so as not to offend." Now you know why these terrorists shot French journalists and their police protection.

Driving on the wrong side of the street

The Bible tells us, "There is a way which seemeth right unto a man, but the end thereof are the ways of death." (Proverbs 14:12).

My wife and I were in England where they drive on the left side of the street, different from the rest of Europe and America. To us they were driving on the wrong side of the street. When you rent a car you have to constantly remind yourself to stay on the left.

Here is a little history about how we starting driving on the "right" side of the road. It seems that originally, everyone who walked or rode in the past generation did so in this "different English" way. It was the expected and proper thing to do. The reasoning behind it was: When a man was walking with a woman, he saw to it that she was on the inside away from the road, for the sake of safety. But the inside had to be the left side, so the man's right hand was free to draw his sword if necessary.

When Napoleon marched through conquering Europe in his quest to rule the world, he changed the practice to the

right side of the road. His reason was to keep the left side and proper side of the road for the marching of his soldiers and cavalry. However, Napoleon never defeated the English, but rather was defeated at Waterloo by Wellington. Therefore, unlike the rest of defeated Europe who were forced to change to the "right side of the road," England never changed from the left. Europe retained its right side driving and passed it on to the United States.

Now there is a spiritual application. How many times do we think we are living on the right side of life? Often it is based on what everyone around us is doing. Sometimes the Lord has to get our attention. "You are on the wrong side of the road." He then leads us to the right side and the right direction. He reminds us not to just follow others, but to get back to our life GPS, the Bible. His way is the right way and the safe way. He told us, "I am the way..." (John 14:6).

Don't live on the wrong side of the street!

Freed Cuba dissidents praise detente, pledge push for change

HAVANA (AP) — Cuban dissidents freed as part of a historic detente with the United States said Tuesday that the warming of relations would help them keep pushing for change inside their country.

Fifty-three dissidents were freed, most in the last week, as part of a U.S.-Cuban deal that also saw both countries liberate high-profile prisoners charged with espionage and move to normalize relations after five decades of tension. The U.S.-Cuba deal divided the Cuban opposition, with some saying it will help their cause and others saying the U.S. didn't win enough concessions. That argument has been echoed by critics of the Cuban government outside the country.

"Will these 53 political prisoners be able to peacefully work in their country

for freedom and human rights — or will they be thrown into Castro's gulags once again?" U.S. Sen. Robert Menendez, one of the strongest critics of the warming of relations, said on the Senate floor Tuesday. "I believe the agreement the administration has reached with the Castro regime is one-sided and misguided."

Dissidents liberated by the deal told The Associated Press that they planned to return to activism, and said they were confident that the decrease in tensions with the U.S. would improve life in Cuba and make activism easier.

Cuba has long described domestic dissenters as agents backed by the U.S. and by expatriate critics of leaders Fidel and Raul Castro.

Angel Yunier Remon Arzuaga, a rapper known as "The Critic," told the AP

that U.S.-Cuban detente "gives me the strength to keep demanding our rights and freedoms."

Arrested in 2013 after he said state security agents painted his house with pro-government slogans, leading to a fight with police, Remon was sentenced to six years for attacking state security. Held five miles from his house in eastern Cuba, he was loaded into a car Thursday and driven outside the prison.

"Right there they gave me a release document and said 'get out,'" Remon said.

"It's a hard blow against the regime when they themselves have to let out people when they supposedly had proof that they'd committed crimes," he said. He called the U.S.-Cuba deal "a historic moment, an overwhelming event for my country, and I feel very proud."

Dear Abby...

DEAR ABBY: I'm a good person, but when I get frustrated over something, I fly off the handle. I date, have several close friends and a good job in a field I enjoy.

Stresses in life are normal. But sometimes I blow up over things. When it happens, I can see my co-workers and friends are taken aback by my behavior. I need to improve this. I'm worried my explosive temper will affect my relationships, my job and the people I see socially. I heard you have a booklet about this issue. Where can I get one, and do you have any advice for me? — HOT AND BOTHERED IN ATLANTA

DEAR HOT AND BOTHERED: Yes, I do. While anger is a normal emotion, the problem with a hair-trigger temper is that people who fly off the handle often shoot themselves in the foot. That's why it's important to develop tools to recognize, control and channel anger effectively without exploding.

A first step in doing that is to analyze what may be setting you off. Does being overtired, hungry or not feeling up

to par cause you to lash out? Feeling vulnerable has been known to make people feel angry and has negatively affected relationships. When a person's beliefs or values are questioned, they can become angry and, believe it or not, low self-esteem causes people to fly off the handle. People who suffer from feelings of inadequacy constantly try to prove themselves — which drives them to win every "battle" whether it's a discussion about sports or any other subject that arises.

Most adults learn from early childhood to manage anger. But it's equally important to learn to EXPRESS anger in ways that are constructive. In my booklet "The Anger in All of Us and How to Deal With It," I offer tools for channeling anger. (First among them is to recognize you are becoming angry before losing control.) It also contains suggestions for managing and expressing anger appropriately. It can be ordered by sending your name and mailing address, plus a check or money order for \$7 (U.S. funds) to Dear

It takes maturity to identify and verbalize negative emotions rather than lash out at others. Being able to calmly say, "When you do that (or say that) it makes me angry" will earn you the respect of others. And it's the key to defusing anger before losing control.

DEAR PROPER MISS: If the man is a gentleman, he will offer to split the cost of the airfare, hotel and meals with you. If he's not — or can't afford it — then the person footing the bills will be you and only you.

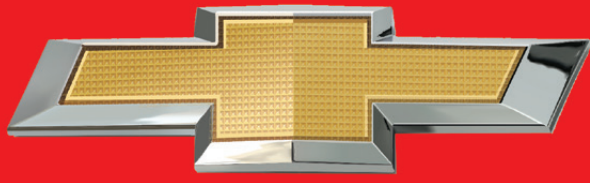

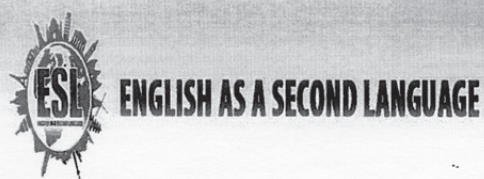
