PRMC respiratory department unveils new equipment

Next time patients of Pampa Regional Medical Center's respiratory department needs to be examined, patients will be treated to a new machine, if they haven't already.

PRMC received a Vmax Encore system in September of 2013. But for patients what this means is patients will now be able to test their lung volume, inspiratory and expiratory pressures and other respiratory tests.

"It's state of the art," Chalenia Freeman, R.R.T., M.H.A., director of respiratory for

PRMC said. "We have a body box that not many places have anymore."

Freeman said that it will be cheaper on upkeep and maintenance than other devices. The machine will be able to service patients from pediatric to geriatric.

"It doesn't treat anything but what it does is tell us the lung volumes and we can use it to determine if a bronchial dilator will help or not help," Freeman said. "It can tell us if it's asthma, it can tell us if it's restrictive or obstructive lung disease."

The machine allows the doctors to receive the information they need to treat the disease and to see if the patient's conditions are improving. The machine is a box with a chair inside and the patients breathe into the device which tests the patients respiratory system.

But that's not the only machine PRMC received recently. They also received a compact echocardiogram device that will be used to monitor the heart.

"The new echo machine is a lot more compact than what we used to use," Freeman said. "It will be a lot more easier on techs. They will be able to get in and out of the rooms easier."

Janice Andreen of PRMC said the compact nature of the device isn't the only useful feature. "The clarity of the picture," Andreen said. "The penetration is probably better, it makes it easier to use on difficult patients."

The selling point to PRMC about the M9 Advanced Hand-Carried Ultrasound System was the single crystal transducer, which is the accessory used on patients during ultrasounds.

"You used to have to have to probes, a feed-off probe and now the single one is capable of doing what the other one did too," Andreen said.

It will be a lot easier for doctors to check for damaged heart muscles, regurgitation of heart valves and other cardiac diseases. The new machine will be available to use on Feb. 3 tentatively.

The respiratory department is expecting to receive four new Bi-Pap machines, which will prevent patients in respiratory distress on ventilators.

"We've been blessed," Freeman said.

Becoming a school nurse when her son was young worked well for Nurse J.J. because it allowed for her to spend more time with him.

"I got a phone call just saying 'Hey there is a position open.' School nurses don't just quit; they either die or retire. I mean you have a 187 days and you're on a teacher schedule, so it's great if you have a family," she said.

Being here, she has made friends with the teachers, students, principals, and counselors.

"Nurse J.J. is one of the most sincere and real people I know," School District social worker Suzanne Pingel said. "What you see is what you get with her. She doesn't hold anything back, and she lives life to its fullest."

She is even liked by the

students of the school and they know that they can go to her for help.

"I am going to miss her a lot next year along with other teachers in the office. I hope she stays awesome," senior Genevieve Zavala said.

According to those who know her, she has a unique personality.

"She is all sorts of craziness, but in a fun, caring way," assistant principal Secretary Ashlee Orand said.

Nurse J.J. is someone who has many layers to her, but once one gets close to the core, her true self is shown.

"She may appear tough and harsh on the outside, but she is seriously the most kind and caring person I've ever met," Pingel said. "She doesn't like too many people to know that about her, though."

million.

The illegal drugs were allegedly being transported from California to Houston.

Senate passes bill approving Keystone XL oil pipeline

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Republican-controlled Senate on Thursday approved a bipartisan bill to construct the Keystone XL oil pipeline, defying a presidential veto threat and setting up the first of many battles with the White House over energy and the environment.

The 62-36 vote advanced a top priority of the newly empowered GOP, and marked the first time the Senate passed a bill authorizing the pipeline, despite numerous attempts to force President Barack Obama's hand on the issue. Nine Democrats joined with 53 Republicans to back the measure.

Still the vote was short of the threshold needed to override a veto, and the legislation still must be reconciled with the version the House passed.

This bill "is an important accomplishment for the country," said Majority Leader Mitch McConnell of Kentucky. "We are hoping the president upon reflection will agree to sign on to a bill that the State Department said could create up to 42,000 jobs and the State Department said creates little to no impact on the environment."

Democrats framed the bill as gift to a foreign oil company that would have little benefit for the American people, because much of the oil would be exported. They tried and failed to get amendments on the bill to construct the pipeline with U.S. steel, ban exports of the oil and the products refined from it, and protect water resources.

The Senate agreed to add an energy efficiency measure, and went on the record saying climate change was not a hoax and the oil sands should be subject to a tax that helps pay for oil spill clean-ups. Oil sands are currently exempt.

"This bill is a disgrace," said Sen. Barbara Boxer, the top Democrat on the Senate environment committee. "We tried on our side to make this a better bill and they turned us away."

First proposed in 2008, the \$8 billion pipeline project has been beset by delays in Nebraska over its route and at the White House, where the president has resisted prior efforts by Congress to force him to make a decision. In 2012, Obama rejected the project after Congress attached a measure to a payroll tax cut extension that gave him a deadline to make a decision. The pipeline's developer, TransCanada Corp., then reapplied.

Obama has said he will not be forced to make a decision on the pipeline, which requires presidential approval because it crosses an international border, until the review process concludes. Federal agencies' comments on whether the project is in the national interest are due Monday.

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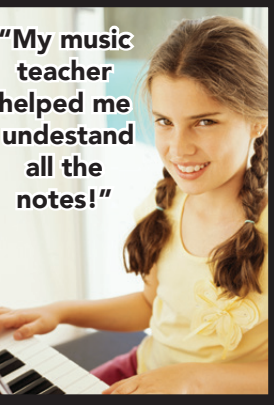
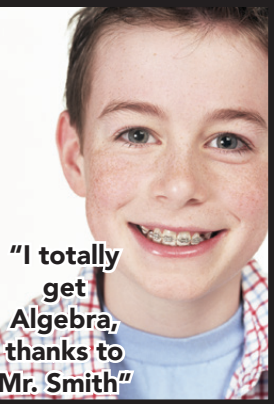

AgriLife Extension educational meetings set during Wichita Falls Ranch and Farm Expo

WICHITA FALLS — The Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service will provide two days of educational meetings during the Wichita Falls Ranch and Farm Expo March 4-5 in the J.S. Bridwell Ag Center, 111 N. Burnett St. in Wichita Falls.

Educational activities each day will provide three Texas Department of Agriculture continuing education units for private pesticide applicators, according to David Graf, AgriLife Extension agriculture and natural resources agent for Wichita County.

Registration is \$10 for the sessions that include CEUs. Three CEUs will be offered on March 4, one each in drift management, integrated pest management and general. An addition three will be offered on the range portion of the March 5 program in the areas of laws and regulations, drift management and general.

Ag-Vocating for Agriculture will be a highlight of the two-day event at a free breakfast at 7 a.m. March 4. Guest speakers will be Aaron Alejandro, Texas FFA Foundation executive director, Wichita Falls, and Dr. Chris Boleman, AgriLife Extension assistant director and 4-H youth development state leader, College Station.

The topic and speaker lineup for March 4 is:

- Why and How to Build Soil Health, Nathan Haile, U.S. Department of Agriculture Natural Resource Conservation Service agronomist, Weatherford.
- Saving Soil Moisture, Dr. Paul DeLaune, Texas A&M AgriLife Research environmental soil scientist, Vernon.

- Cotton Variety and Germplasm Performance, Dr. Randy Boman, Oklahoma State University research director/cotton Extension program leader, Altus, Oklahoma.
- Managing Glyphosate Resistant Weeds, Dr. Wayne Keeling, AgriLife Research weed scientist, Lubbock.
- Drift Management Demonstration, Ross Cantrell, Winfield Solutions retail development manager, Bellevue.

The first day will conclude at 2 p.m. with an evaluation and presentation of CEUs.

The second day will be split between a focus on cattle and ranges in concurrent sessions. The range portion of the program will gather in the meeting area on the south side and be eligible for three additional CEUs. The cattle portion will meet in the arena.

Super Bowl, Tiger make Phoenix center of sports universe

PHOENIX (AP) — Tiger Woods will tee off his season in front of 200,000 golf fans and an estimated million people will flock to a revived Phoenix downtown for NFL events.

A pair of NBA games will be played in the heart of it all. Concerts abound and there will be parties galore.

Oh yes, there's a football game, too. Although the Super Bowl is actually being played 30 minutes away in suburban Glendale.

Super Bowl week is always a spectacle. With the addition of golf's biggest name in its most raucous tournament, the scene in and around Phoenix this week should be even crazier. For a few days, what once was a desert wasteland is the center of the sports and entertainment world.

"It kind of puts us on the map," Arizona Cardinals cornerback Patrick Peterson said. "It kind of gives us that networking that we don't have like other teams — the Dallas Cowboys or the New York teams. Everybody can see what the state is all about."

The fun will stretch from Glendale to the west to Scottsdale in the east.

The epicenter is downtown Phoenix, where 12 blocks have been cordoned off for a myriad of Super Bowl activities and displays. Thanks to a temporary law change, fans can wander through with open containers of alcohol.

A few steps away is the

NFL Experience, billed as the league's interactive theme park, set up in the Phoenix Convention Center.

Walk a block or so, and there's US Airways Center, where the ever-entertaining, often-bizarre Media Day was held on Tuesday, with fans able to witness it for \$28.50 a pop. The arena swings back into its usual purpose on Wednesday night, when the Washington Wizards play the Suns. Friday night, the Chicago Bulls are in town.

Scottsdale has a party scene any weekend. Super Bowl weekend it goes over the top. Streets around the clubs will be blocked off with Maxim and Rolling Stone among those hosting gatherings.

In north Scottsdale there will be a giant party that happens to have a golf tournament running through the middle of it.

The Waste Management Phoenix Open, played on the spacious TPC Scottsdale course, has by far the biggest crowds on the PGA tour, with Saturday always the party day. Now that Woods is playing in the tournament for the first time in 14 years, it should be even more crowded, as hard as that is to imagine. Tournament officials have said more than 200,000 are expected this Saturday.

Among those performing somewhere around town will be Lil Wayne, Kid Rock, Darius Rucker, Imagine Dragons and

Kevin Hart. Rihanna has an invitation-only gig in Glendale on Saturday night.

And, of course, Katy Perry will perform at halftime on Sunday.

The Pro Bowl kicked everything off.

Usually played in Hawaii, it was moved for this one season to the site of the Super Bowl. A sellout crowd of 63,225 packed the Sunday night event.

This will be the third Super Bowl for the Phoenix area. The first was in 1996 at Sun Devil Stadium on the Arizona State University campus in Tempe. In 2008, the game was played at University of Phoenix Stadium, with the New York Giants stunning previously unbeaten New England.

At the time, downtown Phoenix was entangled in scaffolding for one project after another.

For the Super Bowl to return, it's an upgrade that was essential.

"It's really been the \$44 billion development to the downtown Phoenix area," said Devney Preuss, senior director off the Arizona Super Bowl host committee. "That created a downtown area that's primed and ready for an event like this."

Hotels and restaurants were built. The convention center was expanded. A light rail line opened from Mesa to downtown.

Now more big games are on the way.

Next January, the college football championship

game is in Glendale. The following year, it's a college football playoff semifinal game. And in spring of 2017, the stadium hosts the Final Four.

For the Phoenix area, it seems, the party's just begun.

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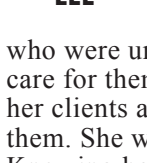
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Bereavement and Healing Organ donation

A friend of mine lies in my embalming room today. She was such a sweet soul. Our small town will surely miss her cheery smile and encouraging words. She is a young woman and her death was unexpected. In this situation, one expects her family to have difficulties adjusting to their loss.

My friend was a caregiver for those who were unable to adequately care for themselves. She loved her clients and was dedicated to them. She was honest and sincere. Knowing her brightened your life. My friend was a giving and selfless person and she carried this gift with her, even into her death. She was an organ donor. She intended to help others by leaving behind life sustaining opportunities for anyone who needed healthier organs than the ones with which they were born. In fact, my friend and her sister, who is likewise a caregiver, both chose to be organ donors.

My friend died from heart issues, so her heart was not suitable for donation. She had other core organs, however, that were sustainable and met the criteria for donation. Once my friend died, her family was asked to sign their consent for her organ donation. They were honored to do so, as they knew it had been her wish to participate in this life-saving program. Unfortunately, my friend's family did not completely understand what organ donation entailed. I speculate that my friend did not completely understand either, as her sister who registered right along with her,

was unclear and surprised at the events that followed the signing of consent.

Consent from the family gave custody and all medical rights over to the donation harvesting company. My friend's body now became a sustainable host for her organs. Her family had no influence or rights over medical actions utilized to protect the health of her organs. Although my friend had been pronounced dead, her body continued on life support until suitable organ recipients could be identified. When one deeply analyzes the concept of organ donation, the extension of life support makes complete sense. When one has suffered the loss of a beloved family member, the extension of life support through additional heart attacks, strokes, and increased body system failures, becomes unbearably agonizing.

Initially, medical staff informed my friend's family that life support would continue for up to 34 hours. These hours were excruciating on her family. As they witnessed their loved one suffer, they were informed that those 34 hours might extend up to 72 hours and that in addition to core organs, skin tissue would also be harvested; they were devastated and demoralized. They immediately requested that my friend's body not be disfigured above her shoulders, to preserve a pleasing memory at her funeral. They were informed that they had signed over all rights to their loved ones body and that medical personnel would decide what would or would not be harvested.

My friend's organ donation was extensive. Her core organs were harvested, her long bones were harvested, her joints were harvested, her eyes were harvested,

her ribs were harvested, her pelvis was harvested, her skin tissue was harvested and the list goes on.

The point is that organ donation is a wonderful gift to those suffering life-threatening illnesses. It is selfless and noble. One needs to understand what all it entails, however, before signing on their participation. They also need to ensure that their family understands the full spectrum that controls organ donation.

My friend's family knew that she wanted to donate her core organs, they were devastated when the donation extended to her entire body. The unexpected and sudden loss of a loved one is complicated to overcome. Add to this, the donation of body parts that disfigure your loved one and the loss of medical control over the extension of life support once she is pronounced dead, and you are looking at excruciating suffering for those who loved and cared for her.

Organ donation is selfless and noble, and is a gift to those suffering life-threatening illness, as well as to their families. Thank God, for people like my friend, who out of love for humanity, donated her vessel of life, so that others might live without pain and suffering.

Insurance Insight What If I Miss the Feb. 15 Deadline?

Feb. 15 is the last day of the 2015 open enrollment period to sign up for health insurance for the year. If you do not sign up by this date, it is unlikely you will be able to sign up again until Jan. 1, 2016.

That means you most likely will be subject to the individual mandate penalty and will go most, if not all, of the year without health insurance. So is there any way to get health insurance after Feb. 15? That answer is yes.

Special enrollment events designated by the Affordable Care Act were put in place to allow individuals and families to enroll in a plan outside of the open enrollment period. There are certain events that can occur that make this a possibility for some. However, there are very specific guidelines that must be followed in order to qualify. The following is a non-exhaustive list of events that could occur throughout the year. Each of these events opens up a 60 day window to enroll in health coverage. If you miss that window, you will be required to wait until October to enroll in health insurance that will start Jan 1.

- Having a baby, adopting a child, or placing a child for adoption
- Getting married
- Losing other health coverage
- Being denied Medicaid or CHIP coverage
- Moving your residence outside your insurance plan's service area
- Gaining citizenship
- Gaining status as member of a federally recognized tribe or shareholder in an Alaska Native Claims Settlement Act (ANCSA) Corporation. Members of federally recognized Indian tribes can enroll in or change plans once a month throughout the year.
- Leaving incarceration
- For people already enrolled in Marketplace coverage: Having a change in income or household status that affects eligibility for premium tax credits or

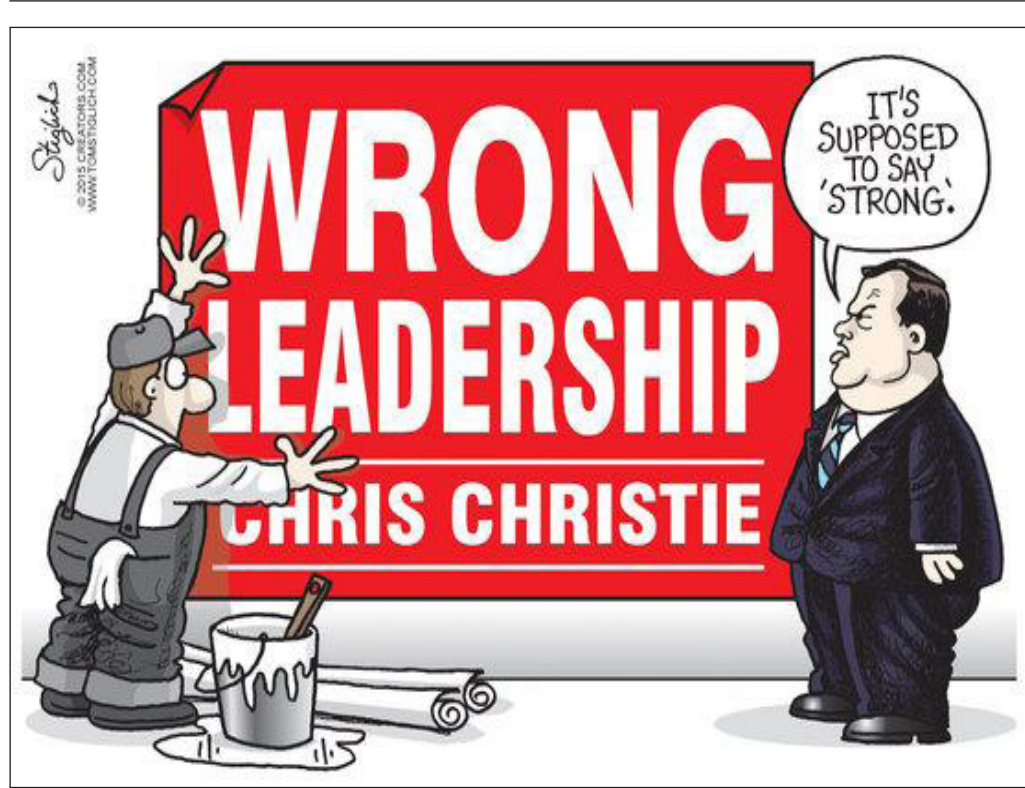
cost-sharing reductions. Now these are the most common events that could occur. However, this list is not exhaustive.

There are special rules designed to prevent insurance companies from having to assign retroactive effective dates. For example, if you get married, you and your spouse have 60 days to enroll in coverage, or the special enrollment window closes. If you get married on May 2, and you enroll in coverage May 3, your effective date would be June 1. A different example would be the birth of a baby. If you have a child on May 1st, and you enroll in coverage on May 4 after getting home from the hospital, your effective would be May 1.

There are some confusing aspects to special enrollment periods that must be noted on any application completed. As of right now, there is no parameter in place for having to prove that a special enrollment event has occurred. Ironically, the government asks us to be "of honor" when applying via a special enrollment event. That being said, an individual will certainly run the risk of having coverage rescinded and all claims being denied should an insurance company determine they would require proof of a special enrollment occurrence. I always recommend being completely honest when enrolling in health insurance. One little mistake can cost you dearly. Now, it never hurts to contact an insurance carrier if you think you might qualify. There are special situations when a special enrollment event has occurred, yet the individual is unaware.

My encouragement to individuals and families is to be diligent in regards to this type of enrollment. If you miss the open enrollment deadline of Feb. 15, you can still get health insurance throughout the year. It is best to know when that can occur.

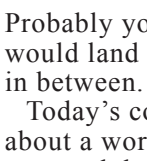
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Just a Thought Pride doesn't recognize itself in the mirror

It has caused nations to fall. Learning how to handle pride has restored families. It has changed lives. It has caused individuals to experience a higher quality of life than they have ever experienced before.

Can you think of

someone who you would say has a high degree of pride? Why do you consider him or her prideful? What other words would you use to describe this person's attributes? Does the person you are thinking of recognize that he or she has a high degree of pride? Do they care? In other words, does pride recognize itself in the mirror?

In the Old Testament of the Bible at Proverbs 16:18 the scripture tells us "Pride comes before destruction, and an arrogant spirit before a fall." Agree or disagree?

C.S. Lewis wrote "It is pride which has been the chief cause of misery in every nation and every family since the world began. Other vices may sometimes bring people together: you may find good fellowship and jokes and friendliness among drunken people or unchaste people. But

Pride always means enmity – it is enmity."

Now let's turn the mirror around. Do you have a problem with pride in your life? How has your pride impacted your life? These questions are easy to breeze by, but if you stop, focus, and truly answer them they can be very difficult and revealing to answer.

Think of a broken or stressed relationship in your world. Most likely pride plays a role in the relationship.

Do Americans have a bigger struggle with pride than other countries? Billy Graham once said, "Self-centered indulgence, pride, and a lack of shame over sin are now emblems of the American lifestyle."

So what is pride? Merriam-Webster defines pride as a noun with three definitions, the first two of which are negative: 1. a feeling that you respect yourself

and deserve to be respected by other people, 2. a feeling that you are more important or better than other people, 3. a feeling of happiness that you get when you or someone you know does something good, difficult, etc.

So there is such a thing as "good" pride. In a nutshell, it is pride that does not bring others down. Examples of good pride are if you are proud of another's actions or if you are proud to belong to a group of people. Other examples include statements such as, "I am proud to be the father of my children" or "I am proud to be an American." If you stand tall and stick your chest out for a cause or reason outside you, it is likely a good pride. I will say it is pride that results from actions or events from the outside.

Both Super Bowl quarterbacks, Russell Wilson and Tom Brady, have chance to elevate their legacy.

This Sunday the Super Bowl has the potential to be a great one. I kind of forgot what happened at last year's Super Bowl, I just know Seattle all of the sudden has a Super

Bowl to their name. But this weekend's big game will be the first time since Super Bowl XLVI in 2012 that both quarter-

backs come in with a Super Bowl ring. It's only the third time since 1979 in Super Bowl XIII when Roger Staubach and Terry Bradshaw faced off in one of the legendary Dallas Cowboys-Pittsburgh Steelers match-ups.

The other two times were in 2009 when Kurt Warner led the Arizona Cardinals to face Ben Roethlisberger and the Pittsburgh Steelers and in 2012 when Tom Brady and the New England Patriots faced Eli Manning and the New York Giants their rematch. It only happen one other time before 1979 in Super Bowl X in 1976, which was a Staubach-Bradshaw match-up.

We all know the story, Russell Wilson in only his fourth year has a Super Bowl ring and he is about to face today's legend, Tom Brady, who will be playing in his unprecedented sixth Super Bowl. He will either be 4-2 in Super Bowls or 3-3. Russell Wilson will arguably be in the discussion of Top 20 quarterbacks of all time with a victory on Sunday.

While I am not a fan of either team (Both of them have been beating up

on Denver lately). I have to say that I am pulling for Seattle because I like Russell Wilson, but I have a ton of respect for Tom Brady and if he gets a fourth ring, I wouldn't be offended.

Whichever team that was that lost last year in the Super Bowl will have that blow softened by being able to say "My team lost to the first team to repeat in Super Bowls since 2004-5."

So as I say I am not offended by either team winning, I will very quickly go through a Top 10 list of Super Bowl quarterbacks:

Joe Montana, Terry Bradshaw, John Elway, Troy Aikman, Tom Brady, Jim Kelly, Peyton Manning, Roger Staubach, Eli Manning and Ben Roethlisberger.

Joe Montana and Terry Bradshaw were very easy to put on the list for one reason, they are 4-0 in Super Bowls. I put John Elway at No. 3 not because I am a homer, but because he went to five (should have been six) different Super Bowls. He may be 2-3 in Super Bowls but he clearly carried the Denver Broncos 80s teams to the Big Dance.

I put Aikman behind Elway because he had a much better supporting cast and probably wouldn't have won those Super Bowls had it not been for Emmitt Smith and Michael Irvin.

Brady gets in because he won three in four years. He has made it to six now with a completely different team. A win Sunday puts him even above Elway in my books.

Roger Staubach is 2-2 in Super Bowls. But the two he won the Dallas Cowboys outscored their opponents 51-13. The two Super Bowl wins also started the America's Team talk.

Peyton Manning gets dropped to eighth because the blowout loss in his third Super Bowl and the strength of the opposing quarterback in the one he won (Rex Grossman with the Chicago Bears in 2006). But getting two different teams to a total of three Super Bowls means something. You also can't forget how prolific he has been in his career.

Eli Manning and Ben Roethlisberger are two quarterbacks who have two rings but don't get any respect by the mainstream media. In fact, Eli Manning is kind of picked on because of his regular season struggles. But in the playoffs he is about as clutch as it gets. In the New York Giants' last Super Bowl run, Manning threw for 1,219 yards, nine touchdowns and a lone pick. That's unbelievable.

Roethlisberger is 2-1 in Super Bowls. But he is 10-4 in the playoffs and has 1,400 yards in the two years he went to the Big Game.

The last few years the Steelers have been rebuilding, including last season, arguably Ben's best statistical season.

Honorable mentions: Brett Favre, Joe Flacco, Bob Griese and Kurt Warner.

Ex-NFL star Aaron Hernandez goes on trial on murder charges

FALL RIVER, Mass. (AP) — With his old team about to play in the Super Bowl, former New England Patriots star Aaron Hernandez went on trial on murder charges Thursday, watching from the defense table as prosecutors showed the jury security-camera footage from his own home to tie him to the crime.

Hernandez's lawyer countered by arguing that police and prosecutors "locked" in on the NFL player as a suspect from the very beginning, ignored evidence and conducted a "sloppy and unprofessional" investigation.

Hernandez, 25, is charged in the 2013 shooting death of Odin Lloyd, a 27-year-old semiprofessional football player who was dating the sister of Hernandez's may have been killed be-

cause he knew too much about that crime. But the judge has ruled that prosecutors cannot tell the jury about those slayings.

In opening statements Thursday, District Attorney Patrick Bomberg took jurors through what he said was the sequence of events that led to Lloyd's killing.

He played before-and-after footage that he said showed Lloyd getting into a car driven by Hernandez, then video taken shortly afterward at the NFL player's home, without Lloyd in the car.

The prosecutor also presented an image taken off Hernandez's video surveillance system that showed Hernandez standing outside his basement, holding what Bomberg said was a gun.

Hernandez — who had a \$40 million contract as a tight end with the Patriots but was cut by the team just hours after his 2013 arrest — could get life in prison if convicted. On Sunday, the Patriots will meet the Seattle Seahawks in the Super Bowl.

In a separate murder case that has yet to come to trial, Hernandez was charged last year in Boston with killing two men in 2012 after someone spilled a drink on him at a nightclub.

Prosecutors in this trial have suggested that Lloyd's sister of Hernandez's may have been killed be-



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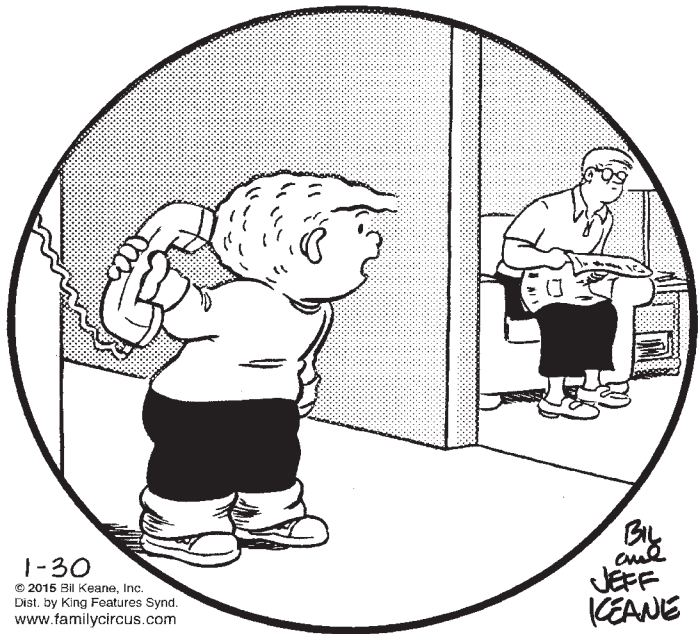
