Plan to stay ahead of Severe Storms

■ The best thing is to always have a plan ready.

a first aid kit, a NOAA Weather Radio or battery-operated radio,

flashlight, medication, non-perishable food items, and bottled water. Be aware of your nearest storm shelter locations, know where family will go if an evacuation is necessary, and develop an emergency plan for communicating with family and friends.

Tips on how to make a preparedness kit can be found at: www.dps.texas.gov/dem/Preparedness/emmerSupplyKits.htm.

Here are some tips the National Weather Service gives during this time.

- Check their forecasts at srh.noaa.gov/ama each day. - Get in the habit of checking every morning so that you are ready for whatever the day may bring.

- Know the difference between a watch and a warning. - A Severe Thunderstorm Watch or Tornado Watch just means to be prepared, severe weather is possible in and near the watch area. Stay informed and be ready to act should a warning be issued. A Severe Thunderstorm Warning means that severe weather is occurring or about to occur.

Today marks the last day of Severe Weather Awareness Week. This week was put on by the National Weather Service to help people prepare for severe storm season, which is right around the corner.

NWS likes to have this event while we are still in the middle of winter to help people get to thinking ahead of the storms.

Last year, the state of Texas had 1,292 reports of severe weather. Of those, 63 were confirmed tornadoes with damage. 557 were hail storms that caused damage. And 672 wind reports that caused damage came in for the state.

Texas is always susceptible to severe weather and damaging storms that threaten lives and property. During Severe Weather Awareness Week Texans are advised to assemble a "preparedness kit" of important emergency supplies including

Medical fund set up for Pampa man with Renal Cell Carcinoma

Joey began having some painful physical symptoms soon after losing his mom, just before Thanksgiving. After many tests, Renal Cell Carcinoma was diagnosed as the mass which has invaded his left kidney.

Despite of his painful condition, Joey continues to work at his job as much as he is able in order to provide for his family.

Joey and Michele have two children, ages 12 and 15, and recently have taken legal custody of three nephews, ages, six, three and 15 months. The nephews would have otherwise become wards of the state.

So far, Joey's extended family has been able to pay for doctors' visits as well as radiologists, anesthesiologists and similar professionals (also day surgery and all other tests, which have been numerous). But with the primary major surgery approaching in March, which will first attempt to remove the mass, but may require the removal of part or all of the kidney, Joey and his family's ability to pay will fall short of

what is necessary and required.

For anyone who would like to help Joey with these excessive costs, a fund has been established at Cabot Credit Union in Pampa in Joey's name. Randy and Pam Carter, Joey's cousin, will be in charge of all records and disbursements from this fund. All proceeds will be directed exclusively to medical expenses. The family will continue to help pay for travel, lodging and other incidental expenses, and of course we will also continue to help pay medical expenses as much as we are able to do so.



derstorm Warning means to take action and severe weather has been reported by spotters or indicated by radar. Get out of mobile homes that can blow over in high winds. Warnings indicate an imminent danger to life and property. Take shelter in a sturdy building. A Tornado Warning means a tornado has been sighted or indicated by radar. There is imminent danger to life and property. Move to an interior room on the lowest floor possible in a sturdy building. Avoid windows. If you are caught in a mobile home, vehicle or outdoors, move to the closest sturdy building and protect yourself from flying debris.

- Sign up for weather alerts on your phone. - Get the facts about Wireless Emergency Alerts here: www.nws.noaa.gov/com/weather-readynation/wea.html.
- What is the best safety advice to follow? - There is a FAQ from tornado experts at the Storm Prediction Center: www.spc.noaa.gov/faq/tornado/#Safety.
- Plan how to get to a safe place. - Have a plan in place for how you will find safety,



how you will get back together and how you will contact one another. Also be prepared for different situations. Make a plan today for your family so you can be ready when severe weather strikes.

- Get a NOAA Weather Radio. - Tornadoes can occur at any time of day, anywhere. This makes the night time hours particularly dangerous since most folks are asleep. The alarm can wake you up when a Tornado Warning is issued. These can be purchased online or at Walmart for under \$35. Newer radios can be programmed to only alert you for a warning in your county or the surrounding counties you select.
- Have multiple ways to be alerted. - Tornado sirens are intended to only warn people outdoors, do not treat them as such and assume you are safe if you are not hearing sirens. Many more facts to help you prepare can be found at www.ready.gov/prepare.

What are some cell phone apps that can be useful to me?

- RadarScope - This is my personal favorite app. It has a very good details in the radar. It is a one time fee of \$10, but it is worth every penny and then some. You can also purchase a "Pro" version for \$10 per year that will give you lightning strikes anywhere you are at. This app has access to 24/7 radars across the entire region. The warning boxes will also be displayed on top of where the storms are currently on radar.
- Tornado - This app is free and from the American Red Cross. They will send you all the alerts you need. There are also a lot of safety information to be found there.
- Twitter - The hashtag #phwx will be flooded with storm reports and pictures. This is a good one to watch for what is going on right now and where it is going on.

- Weather Channel, Ac-

cuWeather and WeatherBug - These are not my favorite apps, but they get the job done if you are looking for a free radar app.

- Fully Connect - This is an app that will alert you of warnings for your area. You can get it at <http://www.youracs.org/#!fully-connect/c1mnr>.

If there are any others I don't know about or failed to mention, please let me know.

If you are interested in become a storm spotter for NWS and your local county, NWS offers many storm spotter training courses throughout the summer. They host one at Pampa City Hall at 9 a.m. March 10. Another will be held at the Hoover Fire Department No. 2 at 7 p.m. March 19. The full list of area spotter training talks can be found at www.srh.noaa.gov/ama/?n=spottertalks.

Our main severe weather season begins right now and will continue until mid-June. Hopefully these tips will help keep you safe and ahead of the storms. Don't let your guard down and always be prepared.

States say Obama administration misled judge on immigration

HOUSTON (AP) — A coalition of states suing to stop President Barack Obama's executive action on immigration is alleging the U.S. government misled a judge about whether officials began implementing one part of the action prior to the judge's Feb. 16 decision to issue a temporary hold of the directives.

The allegation comes after the Justice Department said in court documents this week that federal officials had granted three-year

reprieves from deportation and work permits for 100,000 individuals under an expansion of a program that protects young immigrants from deportation if they were brought to the U.S. illegally as children.

Justice Department attorneys had previously said federal officials wouldn't accept requests under the program until Feb. 18.

The states are asking the judge for access to more information about the approved requests.

Texas unemployment rate drops to 4.4 percent in January

AUSTIN (AP) — The unemployment rate in Texas fell to 4.4 percent in January, marking the fifth straight month of declines, the Texas Workforce Commission said Friday.

The December jobless rate was 4.6 percent, according to agency figures.

The commission said the state added 20,100 seasonally adjusted non-farm jobs in January for a total increase of 392,900 jobs over the year.

"This latest labor market data indicates that our state is approaching the 12 million jobs milestone, with 11,769,600 jobs now in Texas," said Hope Andrade, a commission member who represents employers.

The greatest gains seen in January were in the industry consisting of trade, transportation and utilities. There were 10,900 jobs added in that industry.

Other major industries that made notable job gains in January included professional and business services with 4,800 positions added.

Gov. Greg Abbott said that "while the January job numbers are a testament of the strength of Texas' economy, there is more we must do to boost our job market beyond our borders and compete on the global stage."

"By diversifying investments, streamlining regulations and reducing the business franchise tax, we will cultivate an even stronger, more effective

economy where all Texans are afforded the opportunity to innovate and to prosper," he said.

The Midland area had the lowest unemployment rate in the state at 2.6 percent while the McAllen-Edinburg-Mission area had the state's highest unemployment rate, at 8.3 percent.

Bouncin' Around The arrival of the triplets

A little more than 12 years ago, I heard these words over the telephone, "There are THREE in there!" This was our daughter phoning from the doctor's office after having an ultrasound to check on the progress of her pregnancy. My husband could hear her words across the room, and we stared at each other in awe at the idea of becoming grandparents to triplets. Our only daughter, she already had a two-year-old son so our grandchildren count would quadruple.

The pregnancy progressed without much difficulty until about the 32nd week. My husband had driven our daughter to her doctor's appointment as he had every week for the past month. As he sat in the waiting room, a nurse came out and said, "Don't worry Mr. Smith, but we're going to put your daughter on bed rest over at St. Vincent Hospital. There won't be any babies today, but she'll have to stay there until they're born."

Our quiet retired life suddenly changed dramatically as our little grandson moved in with us. It's amazing how well two old folks can sleep after chasing around a two-year-old all day. The hospital obligingly supplied us with a videophone where the little guy could see and talk to Mommy every day for the month she was in the hospital. She was lucky—we potty trained him during that time. We had quite a bit of snow that February in central Indiana, and I spent a lot of time outside playing with our grandson.

Our daughter got to watch the snow pile up on the window sill of her room and she told us with great excitement one evening that a robin had started visiting her window. As the day of the birth approached, there were news crews from the Indianapolis television stations standing by to record the birth of three babies on March 3, 2003.

The doctor, however, threw a monkey wrench in the plans by saying that was his day off, and he would deliver the triplets on March 5. My husband and I left home at dawn for the hour and a half drive to the hospital that morning, and joined other family members and our pastor to await the births.

The hospital always plays "Brahms's Lullaby" over the PA system when a baby is born, and as we waited we heard it played once...twice...and three times! We could hardly wait to see the three little ones and know they were okay. There were a couple of minor problems, but all three kids were out of the NICU and home within just a few weeks. Then the fun really began! Formula had to be mixed, bottles filled, and babies fed; fortunately they weren't always hungry at the same time.

Diapering and bathing were done in a production line. Laundry soon became mountainous. In a few months, all three babies were teething at the same time. As anyone who has ever experienced a teething baby can tell you, the crying and crabbiness can be extreme, then multiply it times three. About the time we got that over with, the "terrible twos" came along. Actually, the kids weren't too bad as two-year-olds, but whatever one didn't think of, the other two did. Getting those three kids all down to nap at the same time was like trying to nail Jell-O to a wall.

There were only a couple of years when we didn't live in the same town, but for most of their lives we have been blessed to watch them grow into delightful young people who have defied all of the dire predictions of developmental problems common in multiples. All four kids are great students, talented in sports, music and dance, with wonderful imaginations. Along with their older brother, who will turn 15 soon after the triplets celebrate their 12th birthday, they form a close and loving family with their parents and with us.

We look forward to the continued progress of all four kids toward adulthood. We are happy grandparents!



Could we please spend more time in math class?

For the last few weeks, I have been visiting Pampa ISD campuses and visiting with students about their experiences in education. I truly believe that there is no better source of information in any school than its students. Over the course of these conversations, I have gotten the scoop, not only about PISD, but about the overall educational process as well. This week's interview with several Tigers from Travis Elementary School certainly did not disappoint.

At Travis, I met a group of students that seemed keenly focused on helping others. This was evidenced by their desires to become veterinarians, teachers and police officers. They repeatedly spoke of wanting to look out for those around them (human or otherwise) and protect people from any type of illness, pain or other dangerous situation.

When I asked my new friends about why they go to school, they talked to me about academic content, literacy skills, and developing good penmanship. As we continued to discuss the purpose of education, one of the students looked at me in a very matter of fact way and said, "You know – to prepare us for our future!" This was keen insight from a kindergartner. He may not have realized it, but preparing students for their future is inherent to our mission. However, it is critical that educators ensure that we are working on "their future" rather than merely "our past." I suspect that many of the jobs that will one day be held by the four students I was sitting with do not yet exist in today's marketplace.

It was on this trip to Travis that I finally received the answer that I have been waiting for throughout the course of my travels. In response to the question "what's your favorite part of the school day?" I received, not one, but two answers of "Math." It truly warmed my former math teacher heart to hear kids getting excited about the study of mathematics. In fact, one of the students shared with me her desire to become a math teacher when she grows up.

My interviewees discussed their preferred learning environment as well. They shared with me that they liked to work with a little music in the background and that they definitely like to have enough time to go back and check their work. Having clear and consistent directions for tasks was also at the top of their lists. Each of the students was extremely complimentary of their teachers when it comes to setting the tone for learning both inside their classrooms and out.

To this point in the interview, the students and I had carried on a relatively serious discussion, but I can always count on my final question to get kids' creative juices flowing. "If you could change one thing about school, what would it be?" I asked sheepishly just waiting to see what they would come up with. I am used to getting responses like "longer recess" or "better food in

the cafeteria," but I can honestly say that this week I received some answers that I have never heard before. One student talked to me about making PE a little more interesting by including jumping out of airplanes with parachutes. Note to self – look into certification requirements for skydiving instructors. Another mentioned that they would like to be able to climb onto the school's roof using only a rope. I smiled uncontrollably once again when my last two respondents banded together and requested longer mathematics class sessions.

I very much enjoyed my conversation at Travis this week. I would like to send a shout out to my newly found Tiger Buddies – Cheryl, Molly, Lexie and Cy. In an education world that often loses itself in testing and accountability, it is sometimes impossible to see the forest for the trees. However, after visiting with these students, it is clearer than ever. Thank you to each of you for helping me remain grounded in why it is that we do what we do.

Prescribed fire planned for Lake Meredith National Recreation Area

SUBMITTED BY LAKE MEREDITH NATIONAL RECREATION AREA

FRITCH – Fire managers plan to continue prescribed burns at Lake Meredith National Recreation Area beginning the week of March 8, 2015. Multiple prescribed burns are planned totaling approximately 2,850 acres. Prescribed burning will occur at the North end of the park in the areas of: North Canyon (1,610 acres), Triangle (162 acres), Spring Canyon (670 acres), the Stilling Basin (207 acres), Water Authority (125 acres), and at the South end of the park in the area of Mullinaw Crossing (80 acres).

ing into consideration such factors as weather, fuel (vegetation) moisture and availability of firefighters and equipment.

Fire managers previously treated approximately 1,632 acres in February 2015 including the South Canyon Unit (620 acres), Cedar Canyon Unit (82 acres), Sanford-Yake Unit (428 acres), Alibates Flint Quarries Unit (2 acres), and Mullinaw Crossing Unit (500 acres).

The purpose of the prescribed burns is to reduce the amount of fuel (vegetation) available to burn in the event of a wildfire, thus minimizing the risk to the public and communities surrounding the park including Fritch, Sanford, and Bugbee and also the Mullinaw area. This is important as the amount of moisture received in the

last six months has caused an above average growth of grass, resulting in several areas of concern. Prescribed burning also provides ecological benefits including the future restoration of Mixed Grass Prairie structure native to the area before European settlement.

The prescribed burns will be conducted as a cooperative effort between the National Park Service, Taos BLM, Fritch VFD, Borger FD, Stinnett VFD, Hutchinson County VFD, Amarillo FD, Potter County VFD, and Randall County VFD.

During the prescribed burn some areas of the park may be closed to the public. Travelers should proceed with caution anytime there is smoke present by reducing vehicle speed and turning on their headlights. While temporary inconveniences may occur during the prescribed burning, the result will ultimately improve safety and recreational opportunities for the public.

Gas prices will keep rising in March

COPPELL — The average for a gallon of regular unleaded gasoline in Texas is now \$2.25, according to the AAA Texas Weekend Gas Watch. That's eight cents more than last week but \$0.97 less than last year. Of the major metropolitan areas surveyed in the Lone Star State, drivers in Amarillo and Corpus Christi are paying the most on average at \$2.28 per gallon while drivers in Beaumont and Houston are paying the least at \$2.21 per gallon. The statewide average is 20 cents less than the national average of \$2.45.

Significant price jumps in West Coast markets due to refinery outages and operational issues have kept upward pressure on the national average price for regular unleaded gasoline. Gas prices historically tend to rise during this time of year as refineries nationwide conduct planned seasonal maintenance that can limit fuel production. However, unexpected refinery outages on the West Coast have exacerbated seasonal production declines, and the price at the pump has jumped significantly higher in impacted markets.

In Texas, drivers are now paying \$31 per for the typical 14-gallon size tank of fuel. That's about \$14 less per tank than last year.

"As we move closer to Spring Break and warmer temperatures on the horizon, demand for fuel is expected to rise as more people fill up to make road trips in the coming weeks," said AAA Texas/New Mexico Representative Doug Shupe. "We encourage drivers to maximize their fuel

efficiency by keeping vehicles maintained according to manufacturer's recommendations, lightening their load by removing unnecessary weight, and by not driving aggressively."

Full retirement age going up

Q: You keep saying the full retirement age is 66. But as you know, many of us have to wait longer to get full Social Security benefits. For example, I was born in 1955 and I have to be 66 and 2 months. What I want to know is this: If I want to take my Social Security early, do I have to wait until age 62 and 2 months?

A: You can start your Social Security at age 62, if you want. Although Congress increased the full retirement age, they did not change the early retirement age. It stays at age 62 no matter how old you have to be to get full retirement.

Social Security's full retirement age was 65 for about the first half century the program was in existence. Then in the 1980s, as part of a big package of Social Security reforms, Congress raised the retirement age. But they did it in gradual steps. The first people impacted were those born in 1938. They had to be age 65 and 2 months to get full benefits. People born in 1939 had to be 65 and 4 months. The full retirement age went up in 2-month increments until it leveled off at 66 for those born between 1943 and 1954. Beginning with 1955 dates of birth, we start climbing in 2-month



increments again until we reach 1960. Anyone born in 1960 or later must be 67 to get full Social Security benefits.

Q: I was told that if I bring my DD214 to the Social Security office when I apply for my Social Security, that I will get extra money added to my Social Security checks. Is this true?

A: Not really. But I need to explain. Let me first tell my readers not familiar with military forms that the DD214 is a government document given to military service members when they are discharged from active duty. It includes their dates of service.

Since 1956, members of the military have paid into Social Security. But depending on the time served — including years before 1956 — they can have extra earnings credited to their Social Security record. (No extra credits are granted for service from 2001 on.) These extra credits are almost always automatically added to a veteran's Social Security account at the time he or she files for benefits. Sometimes the Social Security Administration may need to see the DD214 in order to apply those credits, in which case, they will ask for it.

Many veterans have been misled into believing that by simply showing their DD214, they get extra money added to their Social Security checks. That's not the way it works. Instead, the military service credits they get are just extra earnings

added to their Social Security ledgers. To be honest, those additional earnings are rather small. And when factored over the 35-year time span of earnings used to compute retirement benefits, they have little if any impact on the amount of a veteran's Social Security check.

Q: I am about to turn 65. I'm still working and plan to keep working until at least age 70, if not beyond. I don't want my Social Security until then and I don't need Medicare because I am fully covered by my employer's health insurance. But someone told me that I am required to file for Medicare when I reach age 65. What's that all about?

A: There are two main parts of Medicare. First, there is hospital insurance, called Part A. Then there is medical or doctor's insurance, called Part B. Most people are eligible for Medicare when they turn 65.

If you look at your pay stub, you will see a deduction labeled "Medicare Tax." That tax is what's used to fund the Part A of Medicare. In effect, you've already paid for this part of Medicare by the time you reach age 65. Because it's "free" to you from that point on, why not apply for it? Even though you have coverage through your employer, there may be situations when Medicare hospital coverage may be needed. Also, there are some insurance companies that require you to take Part A. So just go ahead and sign up for Part A.

Part B Medicare is not paid for by payroll taxes. It is funded by monthly premiums (usually around \$100) normally withheld from your Social Security

check, or billed quarterly if you are not yet getting benefits. But the law says if you are working and covered by your employer's insurance, then you don't need Part B Medicare. So you won't have to apply for Part B until you retire. But again, take Part A now because it's free and may come in handy.

Q: My mother is 88 years old. I've just recently been getting involved in her financial affairs, including her Social Security. She is getting widow's benefits on my dad's account since he died 15 years ago. And I'm pretty sure she is being paid incorrectly. She get's \$1,870 monthly. My dad always made good money and I heard the maximum benefit is more than \$2,600. How do I get her benefit refigured?

A: You can't — unless you can prove that the Social Security Administration made mistakes when they originally figured her widow's benefit. And that's not likely. If your mom felt her widow's benefit was figured incorrectly, the time to question it would have been 15 years ago when she first started getting benefits. It is extremely likely that your mom is being paid the proper amount. (The maximum benefit you cited is for people retiring today and has nothing to do with a guy who died 15 years ago.) But if you are going to lose sleep over this, you might be lucky enough to find an SSA agent who will sit down with you and your mother and go over your dad's Social Security record and show you how her benefits were figured.


