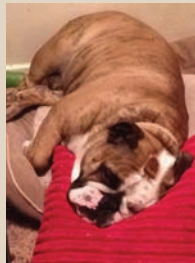

Commissioners running unopposed, city cancels general election

■ Action only cancels city's general election, not other election events held that day.

The Pampa City Commission met on Monday evening for the first meeting of the month.

There was a work session to start things off at 5 p.m. before the official start time of the meeting. Director of public works Donny Hooper spoke about "Operation Community Pride," which is the project that has been in the works for several months now to work

toward cleaning up the city.

Hooper said city employees have already begun picking up around town. Friday, crews started at around 8:45 a.m. and worked on an area of about eight by six blocks throughout the work day picking up the alleys in the area.

The plan is to hire two new employees that will pick up around town Monday through Thursday every week. This will enable the code enforcer to focus on bigger projects and code enforcement.

On Fridays, the new employ-

ees will work on scheduled pick ups within each ward in the city. These Friday trash pick ups will not take place on holidays that fall on Fridays.

Weekly pick ups will begin in the month of April, and Hooper and his staff have made each ward's pick up date easy to remember. If you live in Ward 1, it will be the first Friday of the month. Ward 2 is the second Friday of the month, and so on.

He encouraged those living in each ward to wait until a couple

days before the assigned pick up date before piling up the trash they would like to be picked up by the curb to avoid having too much clutter.

When the work session ended and the meeting time began, the mayor and commissioners heard a staff recognition from fire chief Kim Powell. Powell announced the new hire of deputy chief Mike Day, who has been with the department for more than 30 years

and is looking forward to helping out in his new position. She also announced that fire marshal Jason Roberts recently graduated from law enforcement academy at the top of his class. Roberts graduated with honors, too.

Next, the mayor and commissioners heard the annual racial profile report from police chief Kelly Rushing. He said that the report was in line with the population and added that Pampa has

a 59 percent crime clearance rate. To be considered good, a department must clear up 25 to 30 percent of crimes, so Pampa is well above that mark.

Moving on into agenda items, the mayor and commissioners approved all items unanimously. These items included:

- Approving the minutes of the Feb. 23 meeting.
- Considering all matters incident and related to the issuance and sale of "City of Pampa, Texas General Obligation Refunding Bonds, Series 2015," including the adoption of an Ordinance authorizing the issuance of such bonds and

authorizing the execution of any necessary engagement with the City's financial advisors and/or bond counsel.

Happy State Bank had the lowest bid when it came to the interest rates here, at 1.18 percent for the five-year refinancing period. This will amount to a savings of more than \$120,000 during that period as well.

- Adopting on second and final reading a resolution of the city approving a grant in the amount of \$350,000 from the Pampa Economic Development Corporation to Pampa Energy Center for improvements to County Road J.

• Authorizing SAMCO Capital Markets, Inc. to serve as the City of Pampa's Financial Advisors. These staff members will remain the same, they have just moved over to SAMCO, so there were no personnel changes in the authorization of this change.

• Canceling the May 9, 2015, general election. This was done because the commissioners running for re-election are unopposed. The Pampa ISD bond election will still be held on May 9.

The next City Commission meeting will be held at 5:30 p.m. Monday, March 23 in City Hall.

"We went to seven out of town tournaments and won two or three of them," Facio said. "Last year was a foundation year. We didn't have a lot of practice before the season started. We ended with a losing record, but I think it was a pretty good foundation year to begin with."

This year was a completely different story. Facio said the team started practicing in September and have been practicing since.

Their first tournament wasn't until February.

"We went to Midland and won the tournament. It was a good payoff for practicing that long without a game," Facio said.

Facio praised the group of boys on his team.

"We have really hard working boys. They come to practice two to three times a week for two to three hours at a time. That is after going to practice for their junior high sports," Facio said. "We ask a lot of them."

They must do well in school with their grades and represent the team as a whole.

They always look out for each other. We are constantly checking in with them at the school. I know a lot of people so I tell them that I will always find out what happens."

ment of Transportation (TxDOT), more than 30 impaired driving related fatalities have occurred during spring break in each of the past two years. Many of those crashes had drivers which were under 21, and shouldn't have been drinking to begin with. TxDOT Executive Director Lt. Gen. Joe Weber, USMC (Ret) said in a recent press release "Every deadly crash is a tragedy, but it's especially difficult when the promising future of a young person is suddenly cut short." Weber's quote goes right along with TxDOT's campaign, "DWI Hangovers Don't Go Away."

The results of a DWI related crash, or even a DWI/DUI arrest, can be forever

changing. We urge parents to talk to their kids about the deadly consequences of drinking and driving. Don't let your child become a Spring Break statistic. Our officers will be out in full force, searching for those who fail to heed this warning, Drink, Drive, Go to Jail!

To date for 2015, the Pampa Police Department has reported one fatality crash that resulted from a person under 21 drinking and driving. "That is one too many and completely unacceptable" said Det. Brian Massey, Crime Prevention Officer for the Pampa Police Department. "So please, if you drink, stay where you are or call for a sober ride home. Even if it's a call to your parents, as hard as that call could be to make, it's a lot easier than a call for bail money, or worse, a call to say someone has died."

Life is Good at The **Creek**

Modernizing 'Cinderella' with humanity and the right stars

BEVERLY HILLS, Calif. (AP) — Everyone knows the tale of Cinderella.

The story of the beautiful girl who is forced into servitude by a wicked stepfamily, transformed for a night by magic, and saved by a nameless prince has been around for centuries. But while "Cinderella" is ingrained in the world's consciousness, it's also as outdated as a fairy tale can be.

So why are audiences now getting an expensive retelling of the passé bedtime story, 65 years after Disney released its animated classic and just months after the screen version of "Into the Woods" poked fun at the idea of insincere princes and delusional princesses?

For one, Disney's live-action adaptations of its animated properties have become big business for the studio. Between "Alice in Wonderland" (2010) and "Maleficent" (2014), Disney has grossed nearly \$2 billion worldwide from mining their archives for material to update. The studio already has a live-action "Beauty and the Beast" and an "Alice" sequel in development.

And yet, despite the too-obvious business objectives, there is nothing cynical about the latest "Cinderella," which hits theaters on Friday.

"I wanted Cinderella, without being entirely a dreamer, to see life not as it is but what it could be," says director Kenneth Branagh, who was excited to get the heroine out of a "time warp."

To cast his leads, Branagh applied the same theory as he did when helping to pick Chris Hemsworth for "Thor": Choose relative unknowns. He landed on Lily James of PBS's "Downton Abbey" and Richard Madden, a vet of HBO's "Game of Thrones."

Instead of making "Cinderella" dark and gritty or dystopian, which Branagh believes have become clichéd, he and screenwriter Chris Weitz ("About a Boy") imagined a world where she's guided by a steadfast

belief in kindness. It's a message that Ella learns as a child and holds dear as things worsen under the rule of her spiteful stepmother (Cate Blanchett) and vain, doltish stepisters (Holliday Grainger and Sophie McShera).

The film succeeds because of its sincerity.

"We couldn't ever jump out of the movie and say, 'You know, this is a bit silly and we're much cooler than this, by the way.' We're daring to take this seriously," Branagh said in a joint interview.

Branagh encouraged James to read Mohandas Gandhi's works and other writings on spiritual journeys to prepare for her role, hoping that she could incorporate the idea of nonviolent resistance into the character.

"We present this world where we see the grown-up Cinderella for the first time reading a book. There's a curious mind in the house. It's legit for her to have a sophisticated response to her position," Branagh said.

"The old fashioned view of a damsel in distress who needs a man to come and save her from her life is irrelevant and not a message we should be telling children these days," added Madden.

But Cinderella isn't the only one given depth. All the characters are crafted with complexities, including the prince.

"I just wanted to make a man who was worthy of Cinderella's affections and love. She is this amazing, strong, brave woman. She doesn't need the prince," Madden said.

The leads are lively and excitable together, even after weeks of international travel and hotel-bound press sessions and the knowledge that their promotional tour is not even close to finished.

"Well Disney gives us these shots every morning..." joked Madden of his boundless energy.

On the screen, their PG-rated chemistry is undeniable. Branagh orchestrated things so that they didn't interact much before filming. He even planned out the shoot to begin with their first en-

counter.

"Ken wanted to capture the energy of two young people meeting for the first time," said James.

To make things even more uncertain, Branagh put both on horseback and had them circling one another throughout the scene, allowing them the freedom to improvise. "It added a tension which was good for the scene," said Branagh. "The audience intuits that it seems to be happening before our very eyes."

While Madden and James do seem enormously comfortable with one another, their off-screen relationship is a professional one. During a photo shoot, James was asked to pose with one hand on Madden's chest. "But doesn't this make us look like a couple?" she asked. "Like, Lily and Richard, not the Prince and Cinderella."

In addition to his leads' onscreen relationship, Branagh was especially consumed with doing justice to the ball.

Production designer Dante Ferretti ("The Aviator") transformed the 007 soundstage at London's Pinewood Studios into a grand, three-story ballroom, complete with 5,000 hand-lit oil candles and 17 custom-made chandeliers for Cinderella's big moment. And costume designer Sandy Powell ("Shakespeare in Love") labored to build a dress for the occasion.

In the end, Powell created nine different versions of the airy blue confection, each boasting over 10,000 Swarovski crystals, 270 yards of fabric and three miles of hems.

While the visuals were designed for ultimate impact, the logistics of actually dancing with the delicate garment proved unwieldy at best.

"There are three of us in this relationship: Cinderella, the prince and the dress," Madden said. "The dress tried to keep us apart."

"Basically Richard would only have to look at it and it would rip," added James.

"I have that effect on women," Madden responded with a wink.

S.C. (Sam) Gwynne is the author of four books including, Selling Money, about his years as an international banker, and The Outlaw Bank about the \$20 billion BCCI bank fraud. Outlaw Bank was named one of the Business of the Week magazine's Top Ten Books of the year. His third book Empire of the Summer Moon: Quanah Parker and the Rise and Fall of the Comanches, the Most Powerful Indian Tribe in American History spent four months on the New York Times top 10 best-seller list. His most recent title, Rebel Yell: The Violence Passion, and redemption of Stonewall Jackson provides a thrilling account of how Civil War general Thomas "Stonewall" Jackson became a great and tragic American Hero.

Gwynne joined the Dallas Morning News in 2010 as a senior writer. He has written profiles of baseball star Josh Hamilton and former Whitewater prosecutor Ken Starr, among other stories. From 2000-2010 Sam wrote mainly for Texas Monthly. His work included cover stories on White House advisor Karl Rove, NASA, Texas House Speaker Tom Craddick, and the King Ranch. Is this a scandal — or a 'scandal'?

To someone who has watched many "scandals" surrounding Hillary Rodham Clinton evaporate into the Washington mist — even when Pulitzer Prize-winning pundits predicted that she would end up in prison! — the current furor over her emails hardly seems earthshaking.

It isn't unreasonable to require public officials to conduct all public business on government email accounts, but there was no such ironclad rule when Clinton became secretary of state. In hindsight, it might have been better for her and the public if she had done so. Yet many prominent people, both in and out of government, have preferred private email, in the belief that those accounts provide stronger encryption and safeguards against hacking.

So far, the former secretary of state doesn't appear to have breached security or violated any federal record-keeping statutes, although those laws were tightened both before and after she left office. She didn't use her personal email for classified materials, according to the State Department. Certainly Clinton wasn't the first federal official or Cabinet officer to use a personal email account for both personal and official business, as most news outlets have acknowledged by now — indeed, every secretary of state who sent emails had used a personal account until John Kerry succeeded Clinton in 2013.

As for the issue of archiving Clinton's emails, which is required by federal regulations and law, the Washington Post headlined that she violated an Obama administration edict by using her own account. But that was still "permissible," according to the Post, "if all emails relating to government business were turned over and archived by the State Department."

So did Clinton — or more to the point, someone with line responsibility for such bureaucratic house-keeping — observe that rule? Last year, the State Department requested that all of the living former secretaries of state turn over relevant emails for its archives. To date, only one of them has complied: Hillary Clinton. Her aides provided more than 50,000 emails to the government — and

sent about 300 to the House Select Committee that is forever investigating Benghazi.

Angry Republicans on that committee, plainly frustrated by years of failure to find any evidence that incriminates Clinton or President Obama in the loony conspiracy theories cherished by tea party Republicans, are behind the email stories first published by The New York Times. In fact, Clinton's use of a private account has been publicly known for more than two years — but that fact didn't seem to trouble the Republicans until now, as she prepares to run for president. And today the House Government Operations Committee, chaired by Rep. Jason Chaffetz — a right-wing extremist whose own business card lists his Gmail address — is poised to take up the "investigation."

This unappetizing scenario is most reminiscent of the bad old days, when a House committee chair "investigated" the tragic suicide of White House aide Vince Foster by pumping several pistol rounds into a watermelon in his backyard. Back then, various Senate and House committees chaired by Republicans endlessly "investigated" Whitewater, the FBI files, and other putatively scandalous matters, at a cost of tens of millions of dollars, with no purpose beyond selective, salacious leaks to reporters at the top newspapers and networks. Then everybody would feign outrage for a day or two, and the latest whatever would pass into oblivion.

Someone should ask the Republicans and their media enablers what they expect to find now. Is there any evidence of actual wrongdoing by Clinton and her staff, or merely the familiar stink of insinuation? Will they seek the testimony of former Bush aide Karl Rove — who misplaced thousands of White House emails on an RNC.com address during a criminal probe — or any of the other ex-officials, like Powell, who have used private email addresses to conduct public business over the past decade or so? Or will they simply continue a partisan hunting expedition with taxpayer millions, which is what they seem to believe they were elected to do instead of governing?

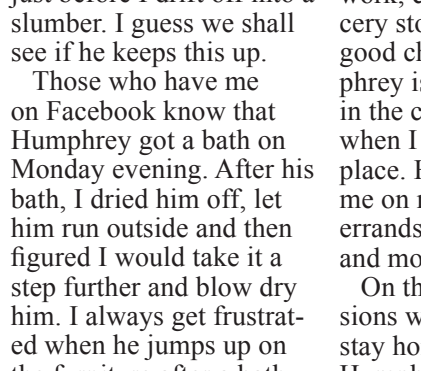

DPS trooper seizes 112 pounds of marijuana

WICHITA FALLS – The Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) conducted a traffic stop Sunday on US-287, yielding more than 112 pounds of marijuana, valued at over \$682,000.

At approximately 5:35 p.m., a DPS Trooper conducted a traffic stop on a 2013 Hyundai passenger car, traveling southbound on US-287, for a traffic violation, near Iowa Park in Wichita County.

The driver of the Hyundai was identified as Douglas Dean Carlson, 55, of Watsonville, Calif. During the traffic stop, signs of criminal activity were observed. During a search of the vehicle, the trooper discovered seven duffel type bags containing over 112 pounds of marijuana in the trunk of the vehicle.

Carlson was placed under arrest for possession of marijuana more than 50 pounds less than 2,000 pounds, a second-degree felony and booked into the Wichita County jail. The illegal drugs were allegedly being transported from California to Florida.

PAMPA Faith

Paul wasn't a blind father

As a fulltime minister for over 40 years now, I have always been amazed at how blind Christians are when it comes to their own family members, especially their kids and grandkids. Sins that are seen so clearly seem to get all foggy when someone in their own family falls into that transgression hole.

I found that same thing over the years that I coached baseball, football and basketball. Coaches who could accurately discern the abilities and talents of players

so easily, seemed to go brain-dead when it was their own child performing.

All of us need to learn a lesson from the apostle Paul. He never went blind when he checked out his spiritual children. His love for them never poisoned his ability to see their sins. The best example of this is the family of believers he fathered at Corinth on his second missionary journey. Paul had no problem spotting the sins of arrogance and pride in many of his kids who had turned into brats in his absence.

The word "boast" is found in the NT 65 times. 56 of those times it can be seen in one of Paul's epistles. And 40 of Paul's uses of "boasting" can be discovered in 1-2 Corinthians. 71% of the time when Paul mentions "boasting" it is in his words to the troubled church at Corinth.

The same is true with the Greek word translated "puffed up"; used only 7 times in the New Testament, 6 of those times are in 1 Corinthians.

Without a doubt the most "stuck up" church in the NT was the group of believers in Corinth. And as their spiritual father in the faith he not only had no problem evaluating the deterioration in their spiritual health, but he was equally up to the task of confronting them, hoping to

lead them to repentance. Boasting in the Lord would have been AOK, but they were boasting in THEMSELVES.

What about you and your family? Now if you are not a committed Christian, then you really have no responsibility to spot and confront. However, if you profess to be a faithful disciple of Jesus Christ, then you are delinquent if you sit by silently twiddling your thumbs while you watch family members wallowing in sin. Scriptures like Galatians 6:1 apply to family members too. "Brothers, if anyone is caught in any transgression, you who are spiritual should restore him in a spirit of gentleness."

Too many Christians sit by quietly watching family members heading straight toward the gates of hell. Why?

1. Not wanting to offend (so rather offend God than a family member)

Paul loved his Corinthian children and shed many tears on their behalf. But that same love which produced the tears also drove him to confront them with the reality and danger of their sinful life. Federal jury reaches \$391 million verdict against trustee for pre-need funeral contract trusts

AUSTIN — A St. Louis federal jury has awarded \$391 million, including \$35.5 million in punitive damages, against PNC Bank following a five-week jury trial.

The plaintiffs were the Special Deputy Receiver (SDR), Jo Ann Howard and Associates, appointed by the Commissioner of the Texas Department of Insurance; the National Organization of Life and Health Insurance Guaranty Associations (NOLHGA) on behalf of 28 state guaranty associations, and the state guaranty associations of Missouri, Texas, Illinois, Arkansas, Kansas, Oklahoma, and Kentucky.

The SDR, NOLHGA and the state guaranty associations joined forces to pursue breach of fiduciary duty and

negligence claims against PNC, which was the successor to Allegiant Bank and Trust Company, a St. Louis-based bank that had served as a trustee for multiple pre-need funeral trusts.

"This has been a superb team effort with the guaranty associations. We are very pleased with the jury's award," said David Mattax, the Commissioner of Insurance for the State of Texas.

Peter Gallanis, president of NOLHGA, said, "We are proud that the guaranty associations have met their obligations to ensure that the consumer losses were covered. The jury's verdict is the next step in the process."

Thousands of consumers and multiple funeral homes had entered into contracts with a company known as Na-

tional Prearranged Services (NPS), which was run by a number of individuals who were indicted and convicted of fraud. NPS sold pre-need funeral contracts initially in Missouri and used two affiliated Texas-based life insurance companies to back the pre-need funeral contracts. In 2008, NPS and the two insurance companies were placed in receivership in Austin, Texas. The SDR and state guaranty association system worked together to ensure that thousands of funerals were paid for. Since 2008, the guaranty associations have paid more than \$300 million for in excess of 50,000 funerals in 40 states. The guaranty associations will pay for all covered future funerals, which will be additional millions of dollars.

AgriLife Extension hosting sorghum meetings in Dimmitt and Levelland

Regional events set for March 26, April 6.

AMARILLO — Sorghum Education: Soil, Irrigation and Weed Management will be the focus of two regional sorghum meetings planned for March 26 and April 6 in Dimmitt and Levelland, respectively, by the Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service.

"These programs were planned to provide in-depth education towards issues identified as important to producers," said Danny Nusser, AgriLife Extension regional program leader in Amarillo. "Our speakers will provide the best, unbiased and most relevant information that is out there."

Both programs will begin with registration at 8 a.m., with Dimmitt's at the Castro County Expo, 405 S.E. 4th St., and Levelland's at Mallet Event Center and Arena, 2320 U.S. Highway 385. The event is free and lunch will be provided at both locations.

Both meetings will offer two Texas Department of Agriculture continuing education units, one integrated pest management and one general, for private pesticide applicators.

Sponsors for both programs are the High Plains

Groundwater District and the Texas Sorghum Producers Association. Preregistration for both meetings is encouraged for a lunch count. To preregister, attendees can contact their respective AgriLife Extension county office or by calling Danny Nusser at 806-677-5600 prior to the meeting.

Both programs start with presentations concerning sorghum soil and water relationships, including water utilization in cotton/sorghum rotations, crop water requirements, irrigation timing based on crop needs, irrigation decisions based on soil type, soil water holding capacity, plant

available soil water, and agronomic relationship to water use.

Speakers during this section will be AgriLife Extension specialists Dr. Dana Porter, agricultural engineer in Lubbock; Dr. Jourdan Bell, agronomist in Amarillo; and Dr. Calvin Trostle, agronomist in Lubbock.

The second segment will feature discussions on the new sorghum pest, sugarcane aphid, and its history, control measures and future considerations. AgriLife Extension entomologists Dr. Ed Bynum, Amarillo, will speak in Dimmitt, and Dr. Pat Porter, Lubbock, will speak at Levelland.

A segment on resistant weed management will cover problem weeds and biology, how to plan for success and rotational considerations. AgriLife Extension personnel Kerry Siders, integrated pest management agent in Lamb, Hockley and Cochran counties, will speak in Dimmitt, and Dr. Peter Dotray, weed scientist in Lubbock, will speak at Levelland.

The Dimmitt program will feature a concurrent session during the second segment with emphasis on sorghum's nutritional value to the cattle and dairy industries. It will be led by AgriLife Extension beef cattle specialist Dr. Ted McCollum, Amarillo, and dairy specialist Dr. Ellen

Jordan, Dallas, who will discuss the grain and forage feed value, sorghum's place in nutrition management programs, and its value for grazing and haying.

Both meetings will wrap up with a panel discussion involving all the speakers prior to the lunch.

Yates appeared in only one game last season, completing three of four passes

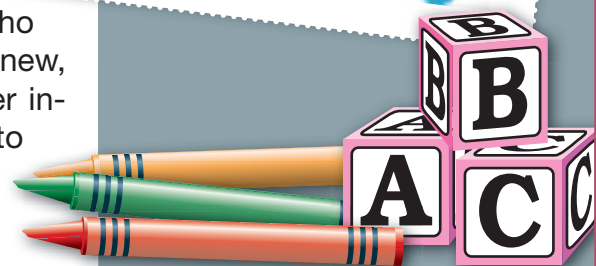
for 64 yards with one interception.
