New cardiologist comes to PRMC full time

Dr. Mohannad Bisharat comes to Pampa after spending time in several different regions of the country during his graduate school program.

He started his training in internal medicine in Newark, N.J. in 2005.

“That was a great experience with the cultural diversity in the Tri-State Area,” Dr. Bisharat said. “I was 10 minutes away from New York City, that was another aspect of the cultural experience. I met my wife there, who is a pediatrician.”

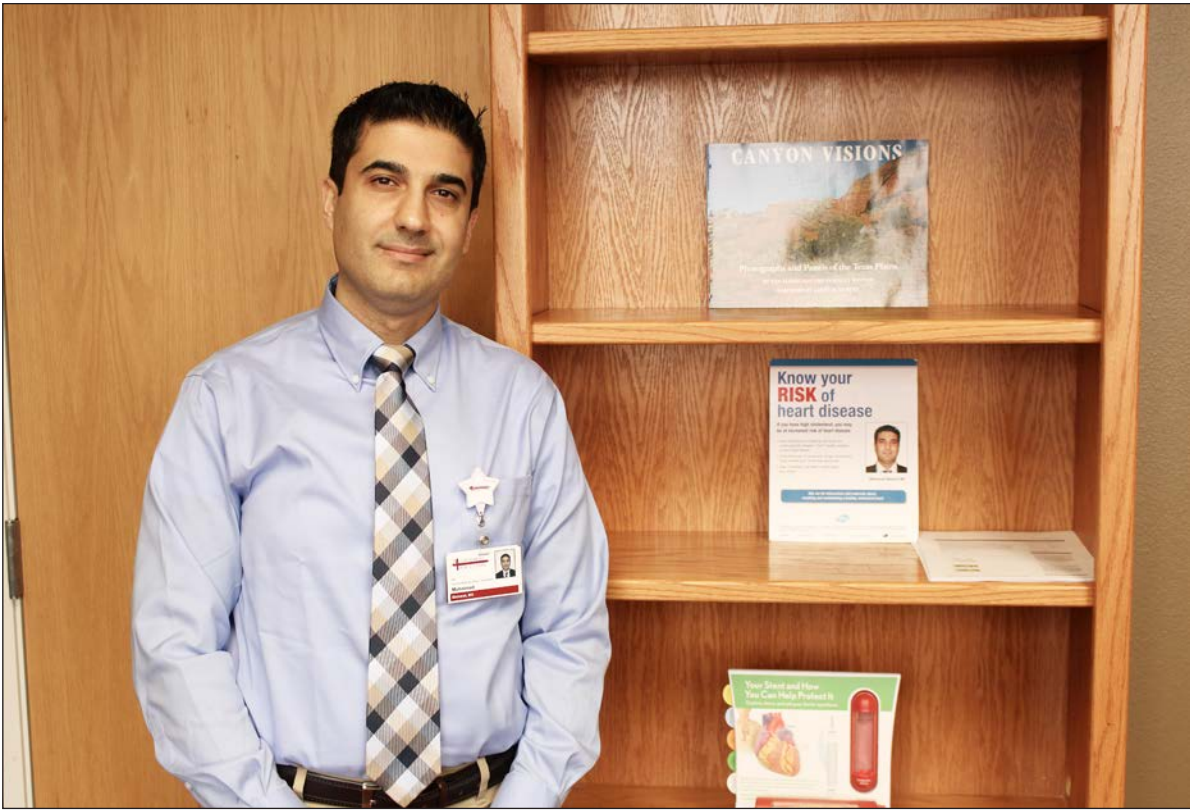
Then Dr. Bisharat and his wife traveled to New Orleans and Tulane University, where he went to pursue his cardiology degree.

Being in New Orleans created a different medical atmosphere for Dr. Bisharat.

more heart disease in the south. Science tells us it's related to diets. New Orleans is known for their food. It was a little bit different to notice the proportionately more heart disease in the south

compared to the northeast.” Being able to practice on his own, Dr. Bisharat moved to Bluefield, Va., in 2005

“It was a very successful time of my career,” Dr. Bisharat said.

“Nevertheless, the weather was a limiting factor since I was living in the ‘tallest city of Virginia’ (city nickname). The winters at

House passes bills to make EPA more transparent and accountable

WASHINGTON - U.S. Congressman Mac Thornberry (R-Clarendon) voted this week in support of two bills to rein in overly-aggressive regulations from the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) by making the agency more transparent and accountable. Both bills passed with bipartisan support in the House.

“People are sick and tired of regulations that hurt jobs and our economy, but what is more upsetting is that those regulations are often based on science and research that is never made available to the public,” said Rep. Thornberry. “These two bills seek to make the EPA more transparent and the bureaucrats who create these regulations more accountable to the American people. All of this is consistent with the transparency policy this President claims his administration operates on.”

The “Secret Science Reform Act” (H.R. 1030), which passed by a vote of 241-175 Thursday, requires the EPA to base its regulations on the best available science that is publicly available. Currently, the EPA can create regulations based on science and research that is not made publicly available.

“Many Americans are unaware that some of the EPA’s most expensive and burdensome regulations, such as its proposed ozone rules,

Lawmakers hope to steer self-driving car bills to Abbott’s desk

As self-driving cars move from futuristic concept to plausible technology, the Texas Legislature is looking to become a magnet for the fast-developing industry.

Three lawmakers have filed bills aimed at encouraging the use of the technology in Texas while allowing for some government oversight.

“It’s the kind of futuristic thinking you easily associate with California, New York,” state Sen. Rodney Ellis, D-Houston, said. “Texas ought to not be behind the curve. We ought to be ahead of the curve.”

Last week, Ellis filed Senate Bill 1167, which would create a pilot program aimed at both monitoring and encouraging autonomous vehicle testing in the state. Under the bill, the Department of Public Safety would create minimum safety requirements for autonomous vehicles. Companies building or working with self-driving cars would have to notify DPS before they could drive them on public roadways. Any such vehicles in use would need a “driver” with an “autonomous motor vehicle operation designation” on his or her driver’s license awarded

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



are based on data that not even the EPA has seen. This bill ensures that the decisions that affect every American are based on independently-verified, unbiased scientific research, instead of on secret data that is hidden behind closed doors," said House Science Committee Chairman Lamar Smith (R-TX) in a statement about the Secret Science Reform Act.

The "EPA Science Advisory Board Reform Act" (H.R. 1029), which passed by a vote of 236-181 Wednesday, would require nominees to the Science Advisory Board (SAB) to disclose financial relationships and interests -- including EPA grants, contracts or other financial assistance -- that are relevant to the board's advisory activities. The bill would also require that at least 10 percent of the board's membership come from state, local or tribal governments.

"This is a good-govern-

ment bill; it reflects the values we should uphold regardless of which side of the political aisle we are on. The bill recognizes the important role science should play in our policy debates and provides safeguards to give the public confidence in science. It restores the independent Science Advisory Board (SAB) as a defender of scientific integrity," said House Science Committee Vice-Chairman Frank Lucas (R-Okla.) in a statement about the bill.

The bill would also

bar the EPA administrator from appointing registered lobbyists to the board and members would be barred from participating in advisory activities that directly or indirectly review or evaluate their work, unless fully disclosed to the public and the work has been externally peer-reviewed. SAB was created in 1978 to provide independent expert advice to the EPA and Congress on scientific and technical information that may be used to justify federal regulations.

by DPS. The bill would also allow the Texas Department of Transportation to work with private firms to test autonomous technology for freight transport.

Two years ago, Google brought its self-driving car prototype to the Texas Transportation Forum, an annual conference organized by TxDOT in Austin. Google officials acknowledged at the time that they drove the vehicle on autopilot through other parts of Texas en route to the conference without notifying any state or local authorities. They didn't have to, because Texas law does not address self-driving technology. Only a handful of states have laws specifically permitting the testing of self-driving vehi-

cles on public roads.

Ellis said the bill is intended to make Texas a national leader in transportation while addressing a wide range of other issues including traffic congestion, public safety and climate change.

"I want to be part of helping put a blueprint in place in Texas that goes beyond my service in the Legislature," Ellis said.

Along with Ellis' bill, two House lawmakers have filed legislation dealing with self-driving vehicles. State Rep. Ryan Guillen, D-Rio Grande City, filed House Bill 933, a measure similar to Ellis' bill that would also allow DPS to explore using autonomous vehicles for border security. House Bill 3690 from state Rep. Larry Gonzales, R-Round Rock, would allow TxDOT to explore using autonomous vehicles for construction and maintenance work.

Aside from bills filed this session to encourage research in self-driving cars, TxDOT is also requesting extra funding to partner with Texas universities and study emerging transportation technology. Last year, the agency had announced plans to request \$50 million for the initiative but later reduced that to \$20 million.

House budget writers didn't fund the request but added it to a lengthy legislative wish list.

"This session, members are calling for more funding for roads to address the mobility issues plaguing our state, so that is where the Appropriations Committee prioritized funding for TxDOT," House Appropriations Chairman John Otto, R-Dayton, said. He added that the full House would have the chance to weigh in on TxDOT's request when the budget reaches the House floor for debate just before Easter.

The Senate Finance Committee, where the Senate version of the budget is being written, has not made a decision on TxDOT's \$20 million request.

In recent years, self-driving vehicles have drawn the most attention in California, where Google is developing the technology, and Detroit, where the auto industry is conducting research. Yet Texas is also seeing some early work in the area.

Both the Center for Transportation Research at the University of Texas at Austin and the Texas Transportation Institute at Texas A&M University have researched autonomous technology,

particularly the area of so-called connected vehicle networks, in which road systems wirelessly transmit information to vehicles.

"You talk to any car company that's trying to develop automation, they'll tell you when they encounter an unexpected event, that's where the challenge is," said Ed Seymour, the associate director of the Texas Transportation Institute. "They're developing the tech. We're looking at how you might use it."

Kara Kockelman, a UT-Austin engineering professor who is researching how the state highway system could be updated to pave the way for self-driving cars, said a connected vehicle network could let cars know about an accident up ahead.

"You have to let the vehicle do the driving to make good use of that information," Kockelman said. "There's a lot of synergies that come from connectivity plus autonomy."

TxDOT spokesman Bob Kaufman said the agency would find a way to continue exploring self-driving cars regardless of what the Legislature does this session.

"As technology increasingly impacts transportation, we want to be asking the right questions to be prepared for changes in how we move around our state," Kaufman said.

times were harsh and very long, so I decided I wanted to go somewhere warmer weather and a little more pleasant."

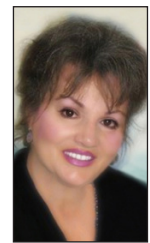

Tips, Tricks and Advice

There are lots of ways to cut utility bills, and in this economy, everyone could use a little savings. Here are some things you should consider doing to help lower your utility costs.

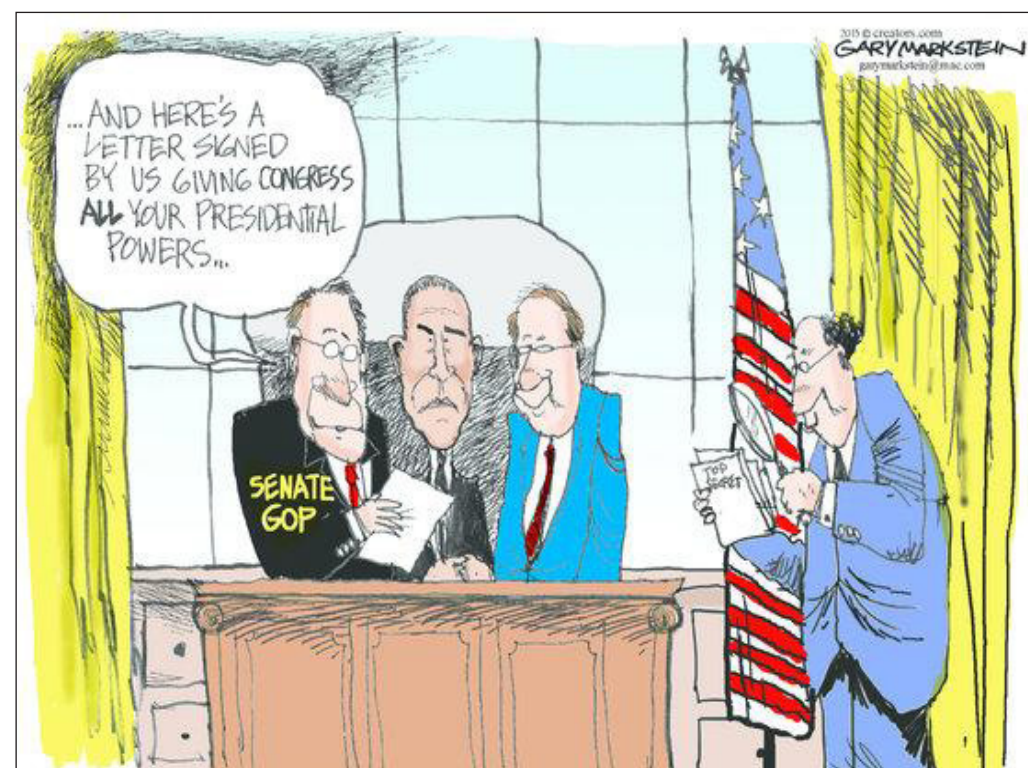
- When shopping for new appliances look for the ones that have the blue energy star stickers on them or state that they are energy star approved. Energy star indicates that the appliance has passed the energy efficient guidelines.
- Find out when the peak hours of usage are from your utility company and refrain from using appliances like dishwashers or doing laundry during this time, because it will cost more. It is also the cause of power outages due to circuit overloads during peak usage times.
- Change your faucet heads to a higher aerated-type head. The usage numbers are generally wrote on the side of the head. Most kitchens use between 2.5-4.0, but you can use as low as 1.5. Bathroom faucets use between 2.0-2.5 but can be replaced with as low as .5. These type of heads use more air and less water.
- Switching from regular light bulbs to fluorescent or CFL bulbs helps save money. They do cost more but the payoff is worth it.
- Lower water heater

temperature settings to save energy. The higher settings requires the heater to run more which in turn raises the utility bill.

- Consider investing in electrical outlet insulation. It's a small piece of material cut to go behind the plastic outlet cover and cut to go around the actual outlet. They are inexpensive and simple to install.
- Whenever possible use ceiling fans instead of a/c units.
- Clean out the lint traps and dryer vent that lead outside. This should be done every few months.
- Another thing you might consider is having your utility company replace your old meter with a smart meter. Some companies will pay for signing up for these type of meters, while others will show you your daily usage. Knowing your daily usage helps you see when you are using and how much, it also helps you to see the best times to use since rates go up and down.
- Clean your refrigerator coils. This saves energy along with improving efficiency, it is recommended to be done every six months.
- Check your refrigerator door seal by simply placing a dollar in the door as you close it. If it falls out the seal should be replace.
- Set refrigerator temperatures between 35-38 degrees while freezers should be between 0-5 degrees.

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Media's email hysteria: Why are Republicans exempt?

It is almost eerie how closely Hillary Clinton's current email scandal parallels

the beginnings of the Whitewater fiasco that ensnared her and her husband almost 20 years ago. Both began with tendentious, inaccurate stories published by The New York Times; both relied upon highly exaggerated suspicions of wrongdoing; both were seized upon by Republican partisans whose own records were altogether worse; and both resulted in shrill explosions of outrage among reporters who couldn't be bothered to learn actual facts.

Fortunately for Secretary Clinton, she won't be subjected to investigation by less-than-independent counsel like Kenneth Starr — and the likelihood that the email flap will damage her nascent presidential campaign seems very small, according to the latest polling data.

Yet the reaction of the Washington media to these allegations renews the same old questions about press fairness to the Clintons, and how the media treats them in contrast with other politicians. In this instance, the behavior of Republican officials whose use of private email accounts closely resembles what Secretary Clinton did at the State Department has been largely ignored — even though some of those officials might also seek the presidency. Jeb Bush released a large

volume of emails from the personal — i.e., non-government — email account that he used as Florida governor, and praised his own transparency with typical extravagance. The problem is that those emails represent only 10 percent of those he wrote. The rest he has withheld, without any public review under Florida open records laws. When Scott Walker served as Milwaukee county executive, before he was elected Wisconsin governor, he and his staff used a secret email system for illegal campaign work, which emerged as part of an investigation that ultimately sent one of his aides to prison (another was immunized by prosecutors). Louisiana Governor Bobby Jindal has used a personal email account for government business, as has Texas Governor Rick Perry. So have Florida Senator Marco Rubio, and various Congress members who have been heard to spout about Clinton's emails, such as Utah Rep. Jason Chaffetz.

Hypocritical as they may seem, none of those examples compare with the truly monumental email scandal of the Bush years, when millions of emails went missing from White House servers — and many more were never archived on those servers, as required since 1978 by the Presidential Records Act, because dozens of Bush White House staff were using private email accounts provided by the Republican National Committee. Notably, those RNC email clients included top Bush adviser Karl Rove, who used committee accounts for an estimated 95 percent of

his electronic messaging, and by his staff.

Among many other dubious activities, Rove aide Susan Ralston used her private RNC email to discuss Interior Department appointments with the office of crooked lobbyist Jack Abramoff, who wanted to influence the department on behalf of gambling interests. She told Abramoff's associate that “it is better not to put this stuff in their email system because it might actually limit what they can do to help us, especially since there could be lawsuits, etc. ...” While Rove was forced to surrender some emails involving his notorious exposure of CIA agent Valerie Plame, he retained the capacity to delete thousands of emails.

Various investigations and lawsuits eventually uncovered the astonishing breadth of the Bush White House email fiasco, such as the “recycling” of back-up tapes for all of its archived emails between Inauguration Day 2001 and sometime in 2003. This meant, for instance, messages pertaining to the 9/11 terrorist attack went missing of course — along with whatever Rove and his aides might have communicated on that topic, or weapons of mass destruction in Iraq, or countless other topics of public concern.

And former Secretary of State Colin Powell, whose office was also involved in both the Plame and WMD scandals, admitted recently that he used private emails in office — but that he turned over and retained none of them — zero. By contrast, Clinton has turned over tens of thousands of her emails to

the department.

Thanks to a federal lawsuit filed by two nonprofit watchdog groups, the National Security Archive at George Washington University and Citizens for Responsibility and Ethics in Washington, a small proportion of the missing Bush White House emails were eventually restored — but only when the Obama administration finally settled the case in 2009. Those strict Obama rules for preserving emails (which Clinton stands accused of ignoring) resulted directly from the new administration's determination to avoid the mess engendered by the deceptive and unlawful preservation practices of the Bush White House.

So if Hillary Clinton's use of a private email account is so shocking to the Beltway media, why did they barely notice (and care even less) when millions of emails disappeared during the Bush years?

The current hysteria may reflect the intense press prejudice against Clinton that several well-placed Washington journalists confessed during a brief moment of introspection following the disgraceful coverage of her 2008 campaign. And it should serve to warn voters that what Gene Lyons famously called “the Clinton rules” — which encouraged all varieties of inaccuracy, bias journalistic failure in the 1990s — simply never went away.

The late Rep. Morris Udall of Arizona, who finished second in the campaign for the 1976 Democratic presidential nomination, warned his fellow citizens

with the wisest of advice: “Beware of the presidential candidate who has no friends his own age and confidants who can tell him to go to hell.”

That same year, an emotionally secure President Gerald Ford more than passed the Udall test. Having

already put his presidency in mortal jeopardy by pardoning his resigned and prosecutable predecessor, Richard Nixon, Ford trailed Democrat Jimmy Carter by 33 percent in polls. After Ford's shrewd pollster, Bob Teeter, discovered in his surveys that when Ford had personally campaigned in the primaries his national numbers actually slipped, it fell to Stu Spencer, the campaign's peerless strategist, to deliver the blunt consensus of Ford's closest advisers: “Mr. President, you are a very good president. good."

According to two people who were in that small meeting, the president first scowled but then smiled. As leader of his party in the House, he had campaigned nationally for Republican candidates. But these men in the room were his friends and confidants who were telling him a bitter truth. Thus was born the Rose Garden strategy, in which Ford would surge within an eyelash of pulling off the greatest comeback in U.S. political history by being president full time.

Recent events in Washington reminded me of Mo Udall and Jerry Ford, two exceptionally admirable Americans. Whatever else we ultimately learn about the relevance or irrelevance of undeclared 2016 Democratic front-runner Hillary Clinton's emails, it's pretty clear that among her intimates, there was no Stu Spencer to say to her:

"Excuse me, but are you out of your (expletive) mind? You, as secretary of state, want to set up and use your own private email account and eventually delete thousands of messages? That is morally and politically unacceptable."

Does President Barack Obama see or talk to anyone who tells him bluntly: "Mr. President, politics, you do not seem to understand, is about a lot more than winning a national election. Politics is a relentlessly personal business. People thrive on just being called on, being asked for their help or opinions, and being recognized and appreciated for what they do."

Where is Obama's Stu Spencer to tell him about why Lyndon B. Johnson, when he was Senate majority leader with only a razor-thin majority, never lost a

single showdown vote to the toweringly popular Republican President Dwight Eisenhower? LBJ was always able somehow to persuade that one wavering colleague to come his way. Johnson once explained that all he needed to know about any senator whom he was wooing was whether that senator's mother had married up or married down — intellectually, economically or socially.

If the mother had married down, then — according to Johnson — she had transferred all her hopes and ambitions to her son. All Johnson had to do was to assure the hesitating senator that by this vote, the senator was going to make his mother proud of her son.

We use coupons when we grocery shop or dine out; we also watch our thermostats, recycle, etc. On the other hand, we have sent our children to university without loans, our mortgage is paid off, we have traveled extensively and our net worth is north of a million dollars with no debt. How do I make Tina realize that Sally's comment should not upset her so? — **THRIFTY IN TEXAS**

DEAR THRIFTY: What happened was unfortunate because the problem may be that Sally simply chose the wrong word. What she probably meant was that your wife is frugal. The difference between "frugal" and "cheap" is that being frugal is a VIRTUE. Because Sally hurt your wife's feelings, Tina needs to tell her how it made her feel so Sally can apologize to her before it causes a permanent rift.

DEAR ABBY: I'm a teenage girl who has a fantastic life, a loving family, great grades in school and a nice house. I have a problem that seems to be taking over my life: I'm very anxious.

At first, it seemed I was just a worrywart, but lately, it's been nuts. I'm terrified someone in my family is going to die and I worry obsessively over it. I try to think it's going to be all right, but my anxiety just overtakes me.

I'm terrified of death and that my parents or my siblings will die tomorrow. I don't know who to tell. My parents freak out over the slightest thing. Please help me. — **WORRYWART IN ARIZONA**

DEAR WORRYWART: Many young people harbor the same fear you have. But because you say your parents tend to "freak out" at the slightest thing, I can't help but wonder if a tendency toward high anxiety runs in your family.

Assuming that your family members are in good health, your preoccupation with the idea they might suddenly die should be discussed with a licensed psychotherapist. Ideally, you should tell your parents what's going on, but if you're afraid to talk to them and ask for help, then speak to a counselor at school so the counselor can bring it to their attention. Because this is troubling you to the extent that you have written to me, please don't procrastinate.

DEAR ABBY: How do you politely refuse to hug or shake someone's hand because of a medical

issue that lowers your resistance to infection?

I had a stem cell transplant 18 months ago because of a recurrence of Hodgkin's lymphoma. I'm now on a drug that keeps my white blood count low. If I get a fever, I could end up in the hospital. I have been in remission for over a year and look healthy.

I don't really care to get into a long conversation about my experience, but I don't want to put myself at risk. How should I handle this without appearing rude? — **HOLDING BACK IN PENNSYLVANIA**

DEAR HOLDING: Not extending your hand should send the message. However, if you are pressed, tell a short version of the truth, which would be, "I can't do that because I have a medical condition that prevents close contact."
