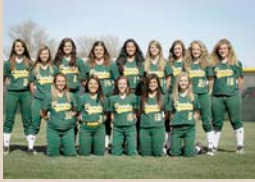

Pampa Independent School District's board of trustees hired three new principals to take over at Lamar Elementary, Pampa Junior High and Pampa High School at Monday night's meeting.

The new hires are Nathan Maxwell for Lamar Elementary, Diana Warner at Pampa Junior High and Hugh Piatt at Pampa High School. Over the next three issues, the Pampa News will introduce each of them to the community.

**Nathan Maxwell, Lamar Elementary**

Nathan Maxwell is the only one of the three new principals who really isn't "new." He may be new to his position, but the parents and staff at Lamar Elementary will not have to do much adjusting to getting to know Maxwell.

Maxwell has been at Lamar Elementary for five years already both as a teacher and an administrator. Now, he takes over as principal.

"I feel very excited," Maxwell said. "I feel like Mrs. (Jan) Cleek has given me the opportunity to be very prepared to take this job. I am so blessed to lead Lamar going forward."

Maxwell didn't grow up in Pampa, but he is a Panhandle product. Maxwell grew up in Amarillo, where he graduated from Randall High School. From there, he went to West Texas A&M University to earn his Bachelors and Masters degrees. Now, he knows that Lamar is a perfect fit for him.

"It's a great campus with great people," Maxwell said. "It has a staff that really cares about the kids there. Pampa's a great community, it has a lot of caring parents with a lot of caring kids. I just feel like it's the right spot for me."

Maxwell is excited to keep business the same as Mrs. Cleek had it, but add a little bit of his own character to the school.

"There are also things that I would like to see happen," Maxwell said.

## County approves GSCO needs, audio improvements to courtrooms

The Gray County Commissioner's Court will meet at Wednesday morning on the second floor court room of the Gray County Courthouse, located at 205 N. Russell.

The first three items on the agenda were all related to the Gray County Sheriff's office.

Gray County Sheriff Don Copeland and deputy Steven White came to the court concerning a grant they are trying to get that would allow for them to improve their intercom and security doors. The security system would allow electronic logging into the jail run more efficiently and notify the sheriff if there was something in the process not done properly. If GCSO is approved for the grant, it would cover the expenses 100 percent. The commissioners approved this item.

The next matter concerning GCSO was the termination of a contract with Correct Care Solutions. The commissioners approved this item, which led to the next item. The commissioners approved the hiring of Dr. Ron Lacy to be the care provider at GCSO. The contract is \$46,272 a year for both Dr. Ron Lacy and his staff. Copeland told the commissioners court they preferred Dr. Lacy and that he told GCSO he would always be available.

Prior to 2014, the Police Department relied primarily on press releases to area media outlets to share information with the community.

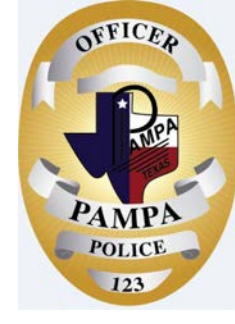
"While this is a great foundation for distributing information, we were still missing a lot of people", said Detective Brian Massey, Crime Prevention Officer for the PD. In 2014, the PD helped bridge that gap some with the introduction of their mass notification system, Nixle. Nixle offers the ability to send emails and texts to the public who have registered for an account, something they believe is especially helpful in emergency situations.

The registration process is simple as well. A quick text of your zip code to 888777, and you're done.

"Even with the addition of Nixle, we were still not connected with as many citizens as we need to be", said Massey. "With more and more people turning to social media for their news and information, we knew that is where we had to be if we wanted to fulfill our goal of involving the community in making our city safer and better informed."

The Police Department plans to use the page to post things such as crime prevention tips, scam alerts, press releases on incidents, department events and news, and even photos or videos of people involved in crimes that they need help in identifying.



well said. “I would like to develop a strong parent-school and community-school relationship. We recently switched up the bilingual models in the elementary schools, and that’s something I would like to make stronger.”

The next two items concerned the district courtroom and the acoustic work to be done.

The Texas Historical Society approved Gray County to work on the acoustics, which includes putting sound panels on the back wall of the courtroom. Perdue Acoustics decided there was no work needed done to the ceiling

and amended their estimate to \$26,552.

The second item concerning the courtroom was the upgrade to their audio-visual system in their district courtroom. The court approved Amarillo Media to upgrade the processor, amplifiers and projector, speakers and microphones in the courtroom. District judge Phil Vanderpool explained to the court that he was told most audio-visual systems last 12 to 13 years, and that the current system is at that point. The court approved this project for

\$34,996.

The court also approved the tax bids per the Tax Assessor-Collector's letter of March 24, 2015.

The next item was the addition of a 20 mph speed limit sign added to Cole Road in the Cole Addition. The commissioners approved this item.

The court approved a copier contract with Tascosa Office Supply out of Amarillo. Gray County secretary Sandra Martin told the court that while she wanted to shop local, the closest provider of a

Canon printer she could find was Tascosa Office Supply in Amarillo. The contract was approved for \$17.34 a month which will be a shared cost with the county attorneys as they also use the printer.

The next item on the agenda was the upgrading of lighting throughout the courthouse. The lighting will be switched to LED lighting which is more efficient and makes the building brighter. The upgrade costs \$9,941, but the county will get a rebate of \$3,838 from Xcel Energy

and save \$58,000 annually.

The final item discussed at the county commissioners was the selection of a bank for the depository bank for the public funds of Gray County.

The commissioners discussed this item at length, which included a long talk about how the funds will be used while in the bank such as the Insured Cash Sweep service that Happy State Bank offers. While the court did not approve whether or not to use the Insured Cash Sweep service, they did select Happy

State Bank over First Bank Southwest. County Judge Richard Peet thanked both banks for their proposals.

The court also approved the paying of bills and salaries approved by the county auditor.

The court did not take any action on anything else but did discuss other miscellaneous county topics.

The next Gray County Commissioners meeting will be on Wednesday, April 15, at 9 a.m.

## Country music, tea party 'populism,' and Ted Cruz

Nobody who knows Ted Cruz — the Texas freshman Senator who became the first official contestant for the Republican Party's presidential nomination this week — doubts that he is very, very smart. That includes Cruz himself, whose emphatic confidence in his own superior intelligence has not always endeared him to colleagues and acquaintances (whose opinions of his personality are often profanely negative).

Yet while Cruz cleverly seeks to highlight the tea party persona that appeals to many Republican primary voters, he exposes the fraudulence of his ultra-right brand of "populism."

Cruz announced his candidacy at Liberty University, a religious-right institution founded by the late Jerry Falwell. No doubt he chose the misnamed Liberty to underscore his commitment to the political attitudes — "anti-elitist" and often opposed to scientific and intellectual inquiry — that the late reverend represented. To Falwell, secular education and the Enlightenment tradition of free thought always seemed suspiciously irreligious; at Liberty, creationism is a required course, the Young Democrats are outlawed, and both students and faculty are rigorously censored.

What could someone like Ted Cruz, a vocal advocate of First Amendment rights, honestly think about a place like Liberty? Falwell's school languishes far below the standards of educational achievement — including an undergraduate degree from Princeton and a Juris Doctor degree from Harvard Law School — that have always filled Cruz with pride. Sometimes with excessive pride, like when he reportedly told Harvard Law School classmates that he intended to form a study group including only those who had attended Harvard, Yale or Princeton as undergrads.

Josh Marshall, a journalist who attended college with Cruz, noted in Talking Points Memo that this bit of academic snobbery marked the future senator as a "pompous a—hole" at Harvard Law, "an amazing accomplishment since the competition there for that description is intense [his emphasis]."

In a further attempt

to portray himself as a right-wing populist, Cruz now claims to be a country music fan — having changed preferences after 9/11, when he abandoned "classic rock" for country, which he suggested is more patriotic:

"My music tastes changed on 9/11. I actually intellectually find this very curious, but on 9/11, I didn't like how rock music responded. And country music — collectively — the way they responded, it resonated with me. And I have to say just at a gut level, I had an emotional reaction that says, 'These are my people.' And ever since 2001, I listen to country music," he told CBS News — without naming a single country artist or band.

Now every presidential candidate carefully cultivates a public personality by promoting and even adopting tastes that might resonate with desired constituencies. But there are few politicians whose image conflicts so sharply with his actual personality and real base of support.

Analyzing the Texan's financial base as he entered the presidential arena, Bloomberg News revealed "surprising weakness when it comes to small donors." Only 16 percent of Cruz donors gave less than \$200, compared with 43 percent of the donors to his fellow tea party favorite Rand Paul. The funding that propelled him into the Senate came from groups like the billionaire-backed Club for Growth and the Washington-based tea party organizations underwritten by the Koch brothers with their oil billions. Having attended the same elite schools, the people writing those big checks must feel quite comfortable with Cruz.

Need anyone be reminded of the policies favored by such interests? They oppose raising the minimum wage, or even the existence of a minimum wage. They would gut Medicare, Social Security and unemployment benefits, along with every other government program that supports the middle class. They would reduce their own taxes even more, while raising taxes on working families — all retrogressive ideas that even the average Republican rejects.

If that's populism, Ted Cruz is truly a man of the people.

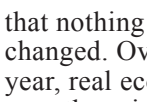

## Curb your economic pessimism

The economy has been in a tepid, soft, slow recovery for the past five-and-a-half years. It's the weakest rebound in generations. The Commerce Department's revision of fourth-quarter GDP shows

that nothing much has changed. Over the past year, real economic growth registered 2.4 percent, slightly higher than the recovery average. It ain't much.

Meanwhile, winter economic reports for retail sales, manufacturing and capital investment point to a weaker first quarter, perhaps around 1 percent. And Wall Street is talking about a possible profits recession, with expectations of a 2 or 3 percent drop in corporate earnings for the first half of 2015. So the market bears are out in full force.

Now, let's acknowledge that coming off a deep recession, the rebound should have been 4 or 5 percent, not 2 percent. By some calculations, GDP is 10 percent — or nearly \$2 trillion — below its long-term trend, and jobs may be lagging by 8 to 10 million.

Government entitlement transfers pay people not to work. Family breakdown has created a poverty trap for the

lowest economic groups. Upward mobility is lagging. And the government has attacked the high-end movers and shakers with tax hikes and overregulation.

And unfortunately, a damaging business psychology prevails. It says that success must be punished and that redistribution is the way to solve inadequate growth, inequality and unhappiness.

But ... all this said ... it's possible to be too pessimistic.

Let's start with profits, the mother's milk of the economy. The recent GDP report shows a slight profits decline in 2014, the first in years. But this is misleading.

More important, the core measure of earnings, domestic nonfinancial profits, increased 1.4 percent in the fourth quarter and 7.8 percent for 2014. On an annual basis these profits increased \$262 billion and were widespread across industries.

The big problem is not the U.S., but the rest of the world, which is mostly in recession and saw profits drop \$36 billion in the fourth quarter. At roughly 18 percent, profits from the rest of the world account for the smallest share of corporate earnings since 2006.

By the way, GDP profits from the National Income Accounts are far larger, and therefore more tell-

ing, than S&P 500 profits. Initial quarterly estimates from GDP cover about 9,000 companies. Over time, annual revisions will cover roughly 4 million companies. And GDP profits are benchmarked to IRS tax filings, with no accounting shenanigans.

Another economic positive is the rise of the consumer. Rex Nutting of MarketWatch reminds us that consumers got a big windfall from plunging energy prices. So far they've saved it, but that may change. Real incomes adjusted for taxes and inflation jumped at a 7.7 percent annual rate over the past three months. This could set the stage for a big boost in consumer spending.

The terrible winter has taken its toll in Q1. But family spending may jump come spring and summer. Along with this, the basic core of the private economy (consumption plus investment), which rose over 4 percent in the fourth quarter and 3.3 percent for 2014, will continue to advance.

Did somebody say King Dollar? It's holding down consumer prices and business costs (including energy). Even with a lousy world economy, U.S. exports increased 4.5 percent annually in the fourth quarter, while imports jumped 10.4 percent. So U.S. businesses are very competitive regarding export sales, and the rise in American imports from

overseas will bolster the international economy.

One last encouraging point: C&I business loans have increased over 15 percent annually in the last three months and about 12.5 percent in the past year. That's a good sign, especially for Main Street business activity, which has been lagging for years.

The Fed will probably raise its target rate later rather than sooner, smaller rather than larger. I'm betting on October and December for some quarter-point rate hikes. That's consistent with high dollar and low commodity prices. I doubt long-term rates will change much at all.

So moderate growth, rising core profits and a still-accommodative Fed set the stage for a better stock market as the year goes on. I'm still in the "buy the dip" camp. We're not going to get the kind of growth that America is capable of producing until we get tax and regulatory relief and a better attitude about free-market capitalism. But I wouldn't get too pessimistic.

There's no recession or inflation in sight, and America is a very resilient place.

Don't bet against it.

## Full-Court Press

**Coach Izzo's coaching style is how he gets it done time and time again.**

Sometimes in sports things shake up exactly how they are supposed to, and then sometimes there is Tom Izzo. This year's final four is made up by three No. 1 seeds, followed by a No. 7 seed.  
To some people that would come as a shocking surprise, but if you follow Tom Izzo and his coaching style you wouldn't be surprised at all.  
Coach Izzo has coached in more final fours than any other coach this century. He has three characteristics that all coaches strive for in their collegiate programs.  
They are not easy to achieve but when can get it done, the results take care of themselves.  
1. Discipline and Structure — Coach Izzo doesn't have the most talented bunch in the tournament, in fact, you could argue that the last three games they won (No. 2 seed Virginia, No. 3 seed Oklahoma and No. 4 seed Louisville) they were the inferior team talent wise. His teams buy into playing great team defense and help the helper as good as any team in the country.  
He is a very aggressive coach and does a lot of screaming and yelling, but you also see him very calm and collected at key points in the games. He was seen joking around with a player during an overtime win vs. Louisville in the

elite eight game, a tactic that will calm the players nerves and keep him focused and confident. His team is bought in to the fact that if they can hang around their discipline and effort will propel them to victory  
2. Peak at the right time — This is one of the most difficult things to accomplish as a coach.  
Things like scheduling, health and practice planning play a huge role in this. Teams like Kansas, Virginia and Villanova were playing their best basketball in early to mid-February and didn't make the strides in March that most championship teams make. Michigan State lost to Texas Southern, Nebraska and Minnesota.  
These are good programs but not teams that a final four team should be losing to. The trick is that he tweaks lineups, tries things during games, and takes costly risks during non-conference games that prepare him for conference games and eventually the tournament.  
His teams always seem to be peaking and playing at their best in late March.  
3. Recruiting — I am sure that all coaches would love their team to be filled with ESPN top 25 players, but that just isn't realistic. Duke, Kentucky, UCLA, Texas, Florida and North Carolina are just a few choices that would be easy to choose over Michigan State. East Lansing is not the most desirable destination for an 18 year old kid, a similar problem that my beloved Red Raiders

suffer from. Kids want beaches, warm weather, major cities, etc.....  
Coach Izzo does a great job of finding specific kids who will play directly into his game plan and style of play. Most of the time these are not five star kids that are being offered by the other elite schools. They aren't always the most talented players on the floor, but you can guarantee that they will do what's asked of them to the best of their ability.  
Most championship teams are loaded with future pros. Kentucky will likely send eight players off their current roster to the NBA next year (assuming they enter the draft) and Wisconsin should have at least two (Kominsky and Decker). Duke will have a minimum of two as well (Okafor and Winslow). I am not sure that Michigan State will have even one player drafted. Dawson and Valentine have a shot but Dawson plays the interior at only 6'6" and Valentine is only 6'5."  
The above mentioned players stand closer to the seven-foot mark with the exception of Winslow who is a 6'6" two guard.  
Congrats to Coach Tom Izzo on doing what he does time and time again. It's going to be a great weekend and I expect all three games to be close and packed full of excitement. ENJOY THE MADNESS!!

me to value my own son as the person he is. If his words can help some other parent, I am passing them on. — EVER GRATEFUL MOTHER, SANTA ROSA, CALIF.

**DEAR GRATEFUL MOTHER: You married a wise and compassionate man, and I want to thank you for sharing an important message for other parents of lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender and questioning children.**

DEAR ABBY: I'm an alcoholic. My husband blames it for everything that goes wrong in our lives. Not invited to a coveted party? They must have heard what an ass I made of myself four years ago.

I love my husband and don't want to leave him. However, he is blind to the similarities to his overeating and smoking. I'm at my wit's end. He refuses to see, while pointing out to our friends that I'm not supposed to drink, that I could be as nasty as he is and say things like, "You're not supposed to smoke," or, "You're overweight and shouldn't eat that."

I'm sick of being humiliated and tired of feeling like I owe him something because he "overlooks" me being an alcoholic. How can I get him to see that these things are all addictions and hard to kick, and he should quit looking down his nose at me? — HUMILIATED IN TEXAS

AS DEAR HUMILIATED: Your letter proves the truth of the saying that alcoholism is a "family disease." The more your husband draws attention to your alcohol problem, the less he is forced to confront his own addictions to food and tobacco, and it also serves as a distraction. It's comfortable for him, allows him to feel superior and benefits him because it makes him an object of sympathy. This is neither helpful nor healthy for either of you.

I have said many times that you cannot change another person. However, a licensed mental health professional may be able to help you understand why you tolerate your husband's behavior — and might even be able to give you insight into why you drink the way you do. \*\*\*\*\*

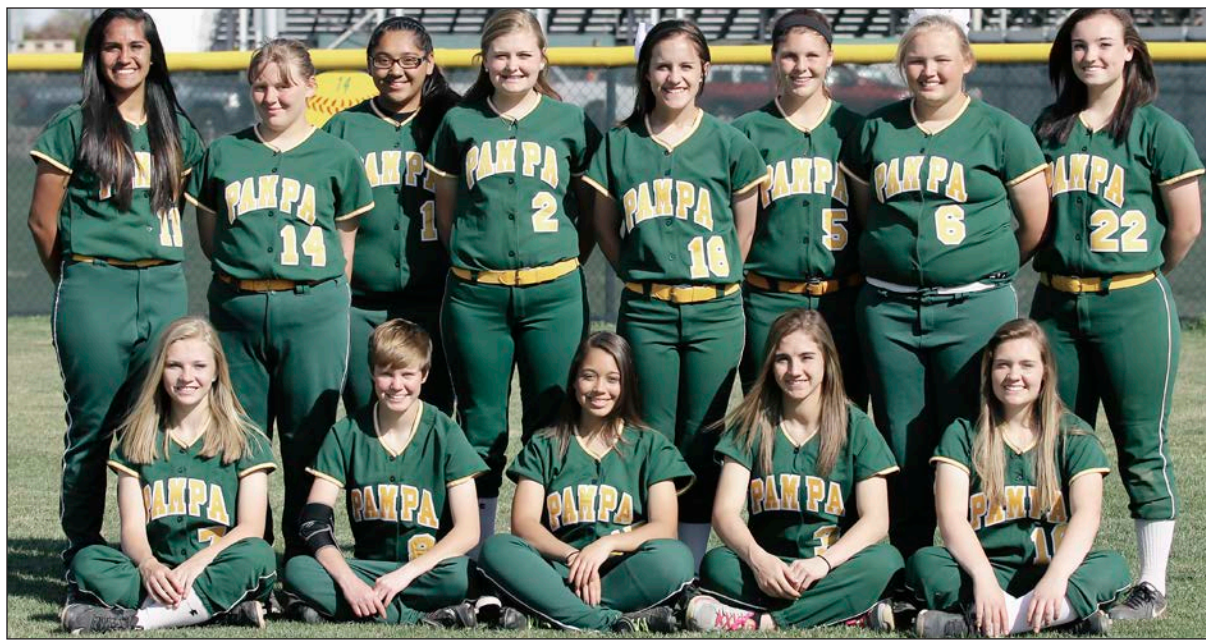

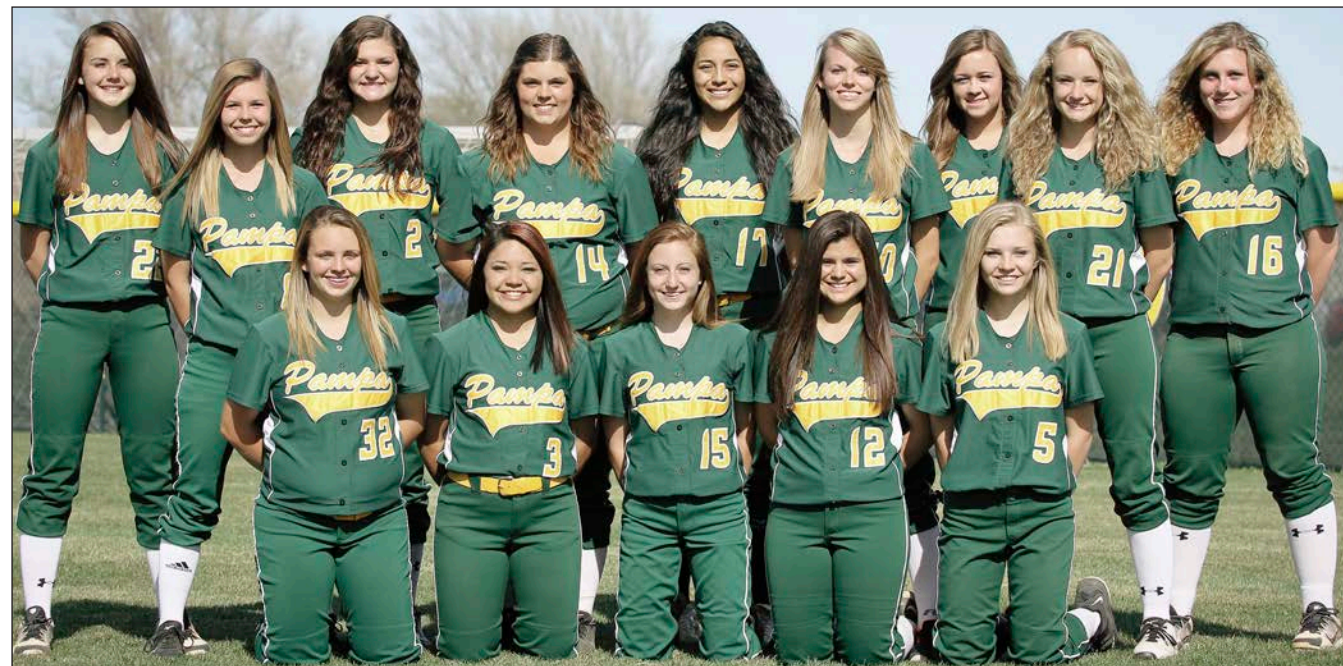
