Water ruling cuts state's power in droughts

A state appeals court has sided with farmers, ranchers and other longstanding water rights holders in a Brazos River case with widespread implications for future water battles in drought-prone Texas.

Upholding a lower court's ruling, the 13th Court of Appeals in Corpus Christi on Thursday ruled that Texas cannot give special treatment to cities or power generators over more "senior" water rights holders on parched rivers – even if the state declares it necessary to protect the "public health, safety and welfare.'

As it stands, the decision would require some cities, power generators or others with more "junior" river rights to pay up or go thirsty when severe drought strikes.

The Texas Farm Bureau, which challenged a Texas Commission on Environmental Quality policy giving cities preferential WATER cont. on page 3



Hobbs is ejected from a building following an explosion and breaks his arm and leg, which pretty much lays him up for the whole movie.

There are several new characters and plot-lines introduced in the film, starting with a kidnapped hacker named Ramsey, played by Nathalie Emmanuel. She is introduced when a Mr. Nobody, played by Kurt Russell, saves Dom, played by Vin Diesel, after a run in with big brother Shaw. Mr. Nobody, who we never really end up finding much about in this film, has a ton of resources and a seemingly endless cash flow, so the crew, once again, does not need to worry about money as they attempt to complete their mission to save Ramsey and defeat Shaw and his friends, who happen to be the ones who kidnapped her.

Other aspects of the film include Letty, played by Michelle Rodriguez, struggling with the fact that she still can't remember anything and she feels like she is only giving a portion of herself to Dom, and Brian, played by the beloved Paul Walker, struggling with his new domesticated

Parental Guidance

This film is rated PG-13, and those who are familiar with the franchise already know whether they want the kids to see the films. There's a large amount of violence, as this is an action movie, and there is some bad language in the mix as well.

What do I think?

I said it as I left the theater from watching the sixth installment of this franchise, and I'll say it again: that was the perfect ending point. The whole crew was back eating dinner where it all started, and they could have ended it coming full-circle. I really didn't see the point in having a seventh film, and now it looks like we're set up to have at least two more films. I just feel like they've added in too much. I came to terms with the fact that the movies weren't going to be realistic anymore in the fifth movie, so I'm okay with that, I guess. Now that Paul Walker is gone, I'm ready for this franchise to be put to rest.

IMDB users disagree with me, yet again. They gave the movie an 8.5 out of 10 rating. It seems like the more movies they put out, the higher the ratings get. The highest rated movie in the franchise before "Furious 7" was "Fast Five" with a rating of 7.3. I tend to enjoy these movies more and more after repeated views, so I will probably end up liking this one, too, after a while.

Around the world

We recently watched the 1956 movie, "Around the World in 80 Days." It was the first time either I had ever seen the entire movie

from beginning to end, though Ron did see it in the theater. The movie is an adaptation of Jules Verne's novel in which Phileas Fogg bets £20,000 that he can travel around the world in eighty days.

The story is set in 1872, so Fogg's bet is risky at best. The part of Fogg is played by David Niven, who is aided by his newlyacquired manservant, Passerpartout, played by the Mexican comedian Cantinflas. Contrary to today's films, which are largely filmed on sound stages rather than on location, "Around the World" was shot in over one hundred different locations around the world.

Viewers in 1956 could see places they could only dream about, all in the space of a little more than two hours, and in Technicolor. Also contrary to most contemporary movies, where one or two main actors command millions for their parts in the film, this movie featured dozens of stars, many of whom only made cameo appear-

Fogg was helped, hindered, slowed, loved, and attacked by a long list of world renowned stars. Robert Morley, Ronald Squire, Finlay Currie, Basil Sydney, Noel Coward, John Gielgud, Trevor Howard, Harcourt Williams, Martine Carol, Fernandel, Charles Boyer, Evelyn Keyes, Gilbert Roland, Cesar Romero, Alan Mowbray, Cedric Hardwicke, Melville Cooper, Reginald Denny, Ronald Colman, Charles Coburn, Peter Lorre, George Raft, Red Skelton, Marlene Dietrich, John Carradine, Frank Sinatra, Buster Keaton, Tim McCoy, Joe E. Brown, Andy Devine, Edmund Lowe, Victor McLaglen, Jack Oakie, Beatrice Lillie, John Mills, Glynis Johns and Hermione Gingold all come along for this bizarre journey. The movie featured nearly

69,000 extras, and about 7,900 animals, including four ostriches, six skunks, 15 elephants, 17 fighting bulls, 512 rhesus monkeys, 800 horses, 950 burros, 2,448 American buffalo, 3,800 Rocky Mountain sheep and a sacred cow that ate flowers on cue. As the story goes, Fogg sets out on his journey from Paris by hot air balloon.

Meanwhile, suspicion grows that Fogg has stolen £55,000

(around £4.3 million today) from the Bank of England so Police Inspector Fix is sent out by Scotland Yard to trail and arrest Fogg. Hopscotching around the globe, Fogg pauses in Spain, where Passepartout engages in a comic bullfight. In India, Fogg and Passepartout rescue young widow Princess Aouda (Shirley MacLaine) from being forced into a funeral pyre with her late husband.

The threesome visit Hong Kong Japan, San Francisco and the Wild West. In case you haven't seen the movie (and I highly recommend it), I'll leave the ending of it for you. The film cost six million dollars to produce, and took only 75 days of actual filming. Box office receipts were \$42,000,000, compared to the "Lord of the Rings—The Fellowship of the Ring," which grossed \$871.5 million. It won the Academy Award for the Best Picture, though Niven was not nominated (Yul Brynner won Best Actor for his role in "The King and I."

There is a treasury of wonderful older movies just waiting to be seen, and little by little Ron and I are endeavoring to see them.





Among collegiate millennials, racism a lingering problem COLLEGE PARK, Md. (AP) — Kayla Tarrant loves

the University of Maryland. But the campus tour guide says a racist email and photo attributed to her schoolmates makes her reluctant to encourage other black students to enroll "in a place where you feel unsafe and no one cares about you.' "We're literally begging people to care about our issues," Tarrant said with tears in her eyes to applause

from about 100 students — blacks, Hispanics, Asians and a few whites — gathered to discuss the racial climate at the predominantly white, 27,000-student cam-Conversations like the one at Maryland's Nyumburu

incidents continue to pop up at colleges and universities, even though students are becoming increasingly vocal in protesting racism and administrators are taking swift, zero-tolerance action against it. This week alone, Bucknell University expelled three students for making racist comments during a March 20

Cultural Center are taking place nationwide as racist

campus radio broadcast. At Duke University, a noose was found hanging from a tree. "To whomever committed this hateful and stupid act," said Larry Moneta, vice president for student affairs at Duke, "I just want to say that if your intent was to create fear, it will have the opposite effect." Officials

have since accused a student in the incident but have declined to release the student's name or race. This is happening against a backdrop of promise when it comes to race relations, with campuses enrolling record numbers of black and Hispanic millennials. The current college generation — young people who came of age under the nation's first black president is said to have more accepting racial attitudes, but put-

ting an end to racism among them has proved elusive. The Bucknell and Duke incidents came days after spray-painted swastikas and nooses were found at dorms on the State University of New York's Purchase campus. A former University of Mississippi student was indicted on federal civil rights charges last week, accused of tying a noose on the statue of the university's first black student and draping it with an old Georgia state flag that includes a Confederate battle emblem.

Social media have stoked the issue, with top administrators at Kansas State, the University of Northern Iowa and the University of Missouri urging students to stop posting anonymous racist speech on apps.

The wide usage of sharable video has also been a factor. In February, students at the University of Oklahoma were caught on video singing a chant that included references to lynching and used a racial slur to describe how the Sigma Alpha Epsilon fraternity would never accept black members.

'We had an epidemic of racism all across our country," said University of Oklahoma President David Boren, who banned the fraternity from campus. "Ferguson, Missouri, might be the best known case, but it's all across our country every day, every week."

Even before the Oklahoma incident, a little more than half — 51 percent — of college and university presidents in an Inside Higher Ed poll conducted this year hy Gallun rated race relations on college campuses as "fair."

Tasia Harris, a senior at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, said racially charged events in society are "blatant reminders that this is something that continues to affect our lives." She is among students who are trying to get a plaque placed next to a Confederate soldier statue on her campus, explaining its his-

"White supremacy isn't just in Ferguson or isn't just in New York or isn't just Cleveland or where have you. It's also in these very privileged sites," said Omololu Babatunde, a North Carolina senior.

The Pew Research Center work has found that millennials are more likely than older generations to say society should make every possible effort to improve the position of blacks and other minorities. They are also more likely to support interracial marriage and have friends of other races. Such data also shows divides. Little more than half of white and black millennials in one Pew survey said all, most or some of their friends are black or white, respectively.

And among millennials age 18-24, a 2012 Public Religion Research Institute/Georgetown University poll found 56 percent of white millennials said the government has paid too much attention to the problems of minorities over the past few decades. About a quarter of black respondents and 37 percent of Hispanics agreed.

In 1976, nearly 10 percent of students were African-American and 4 percent were Hispanic. In 2013, nearly 15 percent were black and nearly 16 percent Hispanic. The National Center for Education Statistics projects such growth will continue.

Benjamin Reese, president of the National Association of Diversity Officers in Higher Education, said efforts to put appropriate focus on the issue of diversity has unintentionally "diluted the focus on the unfinished business regarding race."


At the University of Maryland, a student resigned from Kappa Sigma fraternity this year after being suspended after a 2014 email containing racially and sexually suggestive language about black, Indian and Asian women was made public. This followed an Instagram photo of a University of Maryland sorority member late last year with a birthday cake containing racially ex-

University administrators say they are addressing students' concerns and point to holding open forums, creating a multicultural student advisory group to advise the college president and educating Greek members about topics such as "multicultural competency."

Kumea Shorter-Gooden, the chief diversity officer at the University of Maryland, hopes the dialogue "will help us all to get to a better place, but we've got to stick

"There's no quick fix," she said.



Just 126K U.S. jobs added in March

WASHINGTON
(AP) — The weakening
U.S. economy spilled
into the job market in
March as employers
added only 126,000
jobs — the fewest
since December 2013
— snapping a streak of
12 straight months of
gains above 200,000.

The Labor Department said Friday that the unemployment rate remained at 5.5 percent.

The economy has been squeezed so far this year by harsh weather, factory slowdowns and lackluster construction. The manufacturing, building and government sectors all shed workers last month. Factories cut 1,000, snapping a 19-month hiring streak. Construction jobs also fell by 1,000, the first drop in 15 months. Hiring at restaurants plunged from February. The mining and logging sector, which includes oil drilling, lost 11,000.

In addition to reporting sluggish hiring for March, the government revised down its estimate of job gains in February and January by a combined 69,000.

Wage growth in March remained modest. Average hourly wages rose 7 cents to \$24.86 an hour. That marked a year-overyear pay increase of just 2.1 percent. But because average hours worked fell in March, Americans actually earned less on average than they did in February. Tepid pay increases have been a drag on the economy since the Great Recession ended nearly six years ago. Many Americans re-

many Americans remain out of the labor force, partly because many baby boomers are reaching retirement age. The percentage of Americans who are either working or looking for work fell in March to 62.7 percent, tying the lowest such rate since 1978.

Though job growth had been healthy for more than a year before March, along with cheaper gasoline, has yet to significantly boost consumer spending. A continued deceleration in hiring could delay the Federal Reserve from raising interest rates in mid-year.
