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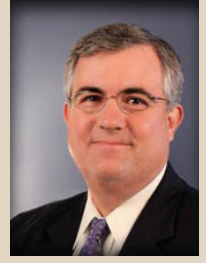
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The reasons behind the May 9 bond election

Back on Feb. 26, Pampa Independent School District's board of trustees ordered a bond election to the tune of \$30.34 million. The bond will cover the cost of a new intermediate school (\$25.68 million) and improvement to the Career and Technology Education program and facilities at Pampa High School (\$4.66 million).

Soon after the bond election was made public, parts of the community wondered why the school district felt the need to build a new intermediate school.

Some feel like the district just tore down the old Horace Mann facilities and the old Pampa Junior High, why are the building a new school?

To address those issues, the old Horace Mann facilities were condemned by the city other than a portion of it, which PISD used for storage.

The old Pampa Junior High was sold to Open Range Development because of various issues that building had.

Needless to say, neither school was even close to being fit to house students and be beneficial to their education.

The next object of discussion is the population of Pampa growing. While there is a lingering question about the state of the oil and gas industries, the population of Pampa continues to grow. Attendance in Pampa ISD continues to grow.

Pampa ISD's latest enrollment records, as of March 31, show a total of district attendance of 3,783 students.

By school it goes as follows, as of March 31: Austin 475, Lamar 642, Travis 394, Wilson 500, PJHS 811, PHS 929 and Pampa Learning Center 32.

This time last year, 2014, Pampa ISD had 3,728 students; a difference of 55 students.

Projected growth

Templeton Demographics, a firm out of Dallas, did a survey and study on Pampa ISD and the city of Pampa and presented it to the PISD

board of trustees in the Spring of last year.

Based on the 2010 Census, Pampa ISD had a population of 20,728 and the city of Pampa had a population of 18,039. Pampa ISD will appear larger because it encompasses more than just Pampa city limits. These numbers reflect the population in the boundaries of the district and city, not just who is enrolled at Pampa ISD. In 2010, the PISD student enrollment represented 16.7 percent of the district's total population.

As of the 2013/14 school year, Pampa ISD and the city of Pampa had populations 22,498 and 19,579 respectively. PISD had an enrollment of 3,750 that school year.

Templeton Demographics projected PISD to have a population of 3,840 in the Fall of 2014. PISD had 3,835 in September of 2014.

The five-year enrollment growth is 488 students with a total district enrollment of 4,238 in the year 2018/19. The 10-year growth is 775 students with a total enrollment of 4,525 in the

Severe weather roars across Panhandle Thursday

The Panhandle was hit with severe weather yesterday afternoon, evening and in the overnight hours. The National Weather Service in Amarillo will be surveying the damaged areas from where suspected tornadoes touched down this weekend. Here are some of the reports that came into NWS last night.

Multiple reports came in for a tornado touchdown seven miles east-northeast of Groom on Highway 70 south of Pampa. Another tornado touched down five miles south of Miami. The last report of a tornado was nine miles north of Allison in Hemphill County. There might have been other tornado touchdowns that were not reported. Stay tuned as by the Tuesday edition of The Pampa News we should hopefully have official reports. There were also several gustnadoes on Thursday along the leading edge of the storms, but those are brief, weak tornadoes that rarely cause damage.

Some of the hail reports were for hail of one inch in multiple areas. There was a report one mile southwest of Pampa. Another report at Perry Lefors Field, five miles north-northwest of Pampa and finally in McLean. There was also a report of 1.75" hail one mile northeast of

year 2023/24.

Ripping at the seams

In education there is maximum functionality and blended functionality. Maximum functionality is the state mandated 22 students to a classroom in kindergarten through fourth grade. Fifth grade and on there are guidelines based on room size but a suggested 30 students in a classroom.

Blended is a ratio based on the numbers. Just because you can put 22 students in a classroom, or 30 middle schoolers in a classroom, doesn't necessarily mean you should. There are certain factors to take into account when building a class roster.

So when looking at these ratios versus what each individual school's capacity is, all of the elementary schools and PJHS will

be over capacity by the 2015/16 school year.

Each of the school's blended capacity, as cited by architectural firm SHW Group, are as follows: Austin 418, Lamar 695, Travis 410, Wilson 468, PJHS 834, PLC and PHS 1,321.

The March 31, 2015, enrollment for each of the schools: Austin 475, Lamar 642, Travis 394, Wilson 500, PJHS 811 and PHS 929. Austin and Wilson are a combined 89 students above capacity.

Hypothetically speaking, if the bond election passes, and the intermediate school is built, it would have an open date of 2017/18.

At that time, PISD is projected to have an enrollment of: Austin 480, Lamar 718, Travis 488, Wilson 512 and PJHS 896.

Remember, these are projections and they fell short this year (2014/15) at Lamar and Travis, but Austin and Wilson were well over capacity.

In summary

Austin and Wilson are

over capacity by 89 students. Lamar is under by 52 students and Travis is under by 16 students.

Just at the elementary level, the district is over capacity by 21 students and continues to grow with kindergarten being the largest grade every year since the 2010/11 school year (not including 2014/15).

This 2014/15 school year, in September, kindergarten was the largest grade at Austin, with first taking the crown at Travis and Wilson (1st had 110, kindergarten had 108) and Lamar had 66 students.

The kindergarten numbers are illustrated to show that the growth of the district is happening in the youngest grades.

The sixth grade class at PJHS is the largest at 303 students.

Also, just based on the enrollment reports on March 31, not adding or removing any students, the fifth and sixth grade classes will make up 586 students. That is made by adding the

current classes of second and third graders.

In closing

It is best to remember to come out and vote on May 9. Voting is something so many people in Pampa have gone and fought for and it's the civil duty of us, the citizens to make our voices heard.

In voting, be sure to make an informed decision. Get all of the facts before deciding against, or for, anything you vote for in any election.

Remember what they say: "If you don't vote, you can't complain."

Texas man charged in Iowa lottery case contests extradition

IOWA CITY, Iowa (AP) — A Texas businessman accused of helping a lottery security official to try to claim a rigged \$14 million jackpot is out of jail while he fights extradition to Iowa.

Robert Rhodes, 46, of Sugar Land, Texas, left a county jail after posting bond April 9, three weeks after his arrest on two counts of fraud, court records show. He's expected to contest his extradition to Iowa during a May 7 hearing and is under electronic monitoring in the meantime.

Rhodes is denying charges that he worked with a friend, 52-year-old Eddie Tipton of Norwalk, Iowa, to try to claim a fixed Hot Lotto jackpot. Tipton was director of security for the Multi-State Lottery Association, an Iowa-based group that operates Powerball, Hot Lotto and other games for state lotteries.

Prosecutors theorize that Tipton in November 2010 inserted a malicious software program into a computer that ran the random number generator for Hot Lotto, allowing him to manipulate the winning combination for the jackpot. He requested numbers that would become the winners when he purchased tickets at a Des Moines area gas station the following month — using a rental car that he then drove to his home state of Texas, investigators say. The odds of winning a Hot Lotto jackpot are one in 29 million.

Tipton faces two counts of fraud but has denied the allegations and said he didn't buy the ticket.

Citing phone records, investigators said Tipton and Rhodes had "frequent, lengthy calls" and spoke for over an hour the day of the purchase. They said Rhodes, who'd employed Tipton at his now-defunct Houston information technology company from 1996 to 2003, later joined others in Houston, New York and Canada in unsuccessful attempts to obtain the payout while hiding the identity of the winner.

Investigators said Rhodes and a business associate, Houston attorney Robert Sonfield, directed two different tries to claim the prize after receiving the ticket from Tipton. Sonfield, who hasn't been charged, declined comment.

Rhodes and Sonfield eventually sought help from another associate, Canadian lawyer Phillip Johnston, investigators said. Johnston tried to claim the ticket in November 2011, telling Iowa Lottery officials the correct security code on the back. But the lottery refused to pay Johnston's claim because of discrepancies in his account of the purchase. Johnston later said he wasn't the winner but was representing an anonymous party who was.

The ticket then went to another Sonfield associate, New York attorney Crawford Shaw, who tried to claim the prize hours before the one-year deadline in December 2011. Shaw said he was representing a trust for a winner who wanted to remain anonymous. Iowa Lottery officials refused to pay after Shaw couldn't explain who bought the ticket. State agents launched a criminal investigation.

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Bouncin' Around The story of the USCDC Danmark

On the wall of our family room there is a framed print showing the Danish training ship the Danmark. Some years ago there was a special on television which chronicled a voyage of this training ship. The program introduces a number of young cadets, both boys and girls, who make a training voyage across the Atlantic on the Danmark.

The youngest cadet was a 16-year-old boy. There was one girl who was terrified of heights, but she had to learn to conquer her fears. I'm not sure even as a teen I would have been able to climb the mesh ladders and perch precariously on a mast, but this girl did it in the midst of a hurricane to keep the sails from ripping free. Another boy who was terribly seasick and not very strong was ready to leave the ship when it got to Iceland, but the Captain wisely suggested that maybe the boy could find some things



to do with a friend and see if he could continue.

By the end of the voyage, the boy had grown in strength and found he really did enjoy the sea. The crew all pulls together, including those who are working in the galley, when it is time to raise the sails. The video showed how far the ship listed in the winds of the hurricane—about 40 degrees. That would definitely not be a place for me as I got seasick just taking the boat from Los Angeles to Catalina Island. It proves that the era of large sailing ships is definitely not over. As long as there

is a desire to get an education as a seaman, sailing ships will always be here.

The Danish Government had the Danmark built in 1932. The purpose was to have a proper training ship.

Now, as then, young people who want a career at sea can have their basic training on board the Danmark. There is room for 15 crew members and 80 trainees on board the ship. She was built to train officers of the Danish merchant marine. In 1939, she visited the United States to participate in the 1939 World's Fair in New York City, but at the outbreak of hostilities in World War II she was ordered to remain in US waters to avoid capture by the Germans.

She was then based in Jacksonville, Fla., and maintained with the help of the Danish American community there. After the attack on Pearl Harbor the captain, Knud Hansen, offered the ship to the U.S. government as a training vessel. This offer was accepted, and the Danmark moved to New London, Connecticut to train cadets at the

Hillary Clinton: out of sync with the times

Presidents are inevitably shaped by the circumstances in which they campaign for — and come into — office. In 1932, Franklin Roosevelt called for “bold, persistent experimentation” and followed through

once in office. Had Roosevelt run in another year, or had there been no Great Depression, he would have campaigned and governed differently. The same can be said, to varying degrees, of the presidents who won open-seat contests since, John Kennedy, Richard Nixon, the two George Bushes and Barack Obama, and of those who unseated incumbents, Jimmy Carter, Ronald Reagan and Bill Clinton.

The Republicans who have announced their candidacies so far — Ted Cruz, Rand Paul and Marco Rubio — have similarly framed their appeals in contemporary context. That's made easier by the fact that none was in Congress when Barack Obama was first elected in 2008. We can expect something similar from other Republicans.

The lesson from history is that winning candidates and successful presidents show they are in step with the times. The rationale for their candidacies, while sometimes drawing on historical precedent, is rooted in what is contemporary.

This is obviously a problem for Hillary Clinton, just as it would have been for Eleanor Roosevelt if, somehow, she had run for president in 1952 (when she was younger than Clinton will be in 2016). She would have been defined in large part by her husband's record, which was specific to its time.

Bill Clinton was elected president in 1992 as a different kind of Democrat, more moderate on some issues than previous nominees, vastly interested in alternative public policies that he had advanced as head of the moderate Democratic Leadership Council.

His party was prepared to accept him because Democrats were uncomfortably aware that their candidates had lost five of the six previous elections and had won the other one only by a

narrow margin. Political scientists proclaimed that Republicans had a lock on the White House. Liberal Democrats were willing to break that lock — which they did.

Democrats have won four of the last six presidential elections and won a popular-vote plurality in another. Liberals no longer feel they need to compromise to win. Moreover, in the second term of a party's presidency, its wingers tend to get restless.

They take their president's achievements for granted and are full of regret at what he didn't accomplish. Thus, conservatives with complaints against George W. Bush fueled the tea party movement. The energy and enthusiasm in the Democratic Party today is clearly on the Left.

In their view Hillary Clinton's appeal is, as Robert Merry characterized it in The National Interest, “Vote for me because I will tinker with the problems facing our nation far better than anyone else possibly could.” Dovish Democrats remember she voted for the Iraq war resolution and favored military action in Syria at a time when Obama did not.

The Democrats of 1992 accepted a somewhat hawkish Clinton in order to win. The Democrats of 2015 feel no need to do so. No wonder the two-minute video announcing Clinton's candidacy didn't mention foreign policy, even though she served as secretary of state for four years.

The Clinton video was obviously designed to depict her as a candidate of the moment. Most of it consisted of showing cheerful Clinton supporters living their lives, apparently without the support of government programs that were the highlight of the 2012 Obama cartoon The Life of Julia. The video included gay couples, an attempt by Clinton to get credit with young voters for her recent (2013) endorsement of same-sex marriage.

Clinton tried to identify with liberal Democrats' concern with economic inequality. “Americans have fought their way back from tough economic times,” she said, “but the deck is still stacked in favor of those at the top.”

But the solutions she has mentioned — equal pay for women, mandatory pre-kindergarten, increased minimum wages — are either already law or would have only a de minimis redistributive effect.

She resumed her training duties the following year. In recognition of her wartime service, a bronze plaque was placed on the mainmast, and the Danmark was given the honor of leading the parade of ships at the 1964 World's Fair in New York. Experience with the Danmark led to the acquisition of the USCGC Eagle from Germany

at the end of the war as a training vessel.

The Danmark sailed behind the U.S. sailing Ship the Eagle in the 1976 Bicentennial Parade of the Tall Ships. Some day we hope to be in Copenhagen at the harbor when the Danmark returns to port after a training voyage. The sight of the billowing sails on that majestic old ship would be a memory to treasure. Meanwhile, you may see my husband somewhere in town wearing his baseball cap which bears the picture and name of the Danmark, a gift from the Danes along with our print.

ESPN suspends reporter after insult-laced video surfaces

ARLINGTON, Va. (AP) — ESPN has suspended reporter Britt McHenry after a video surfaced of her insulting a towing company clerk's intelligence, job and appearance.

ESPN spokesman Josh Krulewitz said Thursday that McHenry has been suspended for a week. McHenry tweeted an apology, saying she let her emotions get the best of her "in an intense and stressful moment."

In a Twitter exchange with ARLnow.com ear-

lier this month, McHenry says her vehicle was towed from the lot in front of the Arlington restaurant where she ate dinner.

The edited video posted this week to video sharing site LiveLeak claims to show McHenry berating the clerk on April 5. McHenry tells the woman she is "in the news" and will sue the company.

At one point a woman off-screen warns McHenry she is being recorded.

Idea from Adam Sandler film used to soothe dementia patients

NEW YORK (AP) — For 94-year-old Louise Irving, who suffers from dementia, waking up every day to a video with a familiar face and a familiar voice seems to spark a flicker of recognition.

"Good morning, merry sunshine, how did you wake so soon?" Irving's daughter, Tamara Rusoff-Hoen, sings in a video playing from a laptop wheeled to her mother's nursing home bedside.

As the five-minute video plays, with stories of happy memories and get-togethers, Irving beams a bright smile before repeating the traditional family send-off.

"Kiss, kiss ... I love you."

Such prerecorded messages from family members are part of an apparently unique pilot program at the Hebrew Home at Riverdale aimed at helping victims of Alzheimer's disease and other forms of dementia break through the morning fog of forgetfulness that can often cause them agitation and fear.

It's an idea borrowed from an unlikely place: the 2004 Adam Sandler movie "50 First Dates," in which a brain-injured woman played by Drew Barrymore loses her memory every day and a suitor played by Sandler uses videos to remind her about him.

"It was fluff, but it made me think, 'How could that translate to our residents with memory loss?'" says Charlotte Dell, director of social services at the home.

"We're looking to see if we can set a positive tone for the day" without using drugs, she says. "What better way to start the day than to see the face and hear the voice of someone you love wishing you a wonderful morning?"

As in the movie, every day is a new day, and the video becomes

part of the morning routine. Relatives who take part are urged to say good morning, use memory-triggering personal anecdotes and remind the residents that attendants will be helping them get dressed and ready for the day.

Alzheimer's disease and other dementias afflict a growing number of Americans as baby boomers age and people live longer.

The Alzheimer's Association says more than 5 million Americans have Alzheimer's.

The personal morning video appears to be a new wrinkle in dementia caretaking.

"Memory tools like videos and photos get a lot of use, but to have a couple of minutes with a loved one as a way to start out the day, I haven't heard of anything quite like that," says Ruth Drew, director of family and information services for the association.

Robert Abrams, a geriatric psychiatrist at NewYork-Presbyterian Hospital, called the program "both innovative and thoughtful."

"You've got a group of people with dementia who don't really grasp the nature and purpose of their surroundings or the circumstances that compelled them to be there," Abrams says. "Consequently, they're alone and at sea and feel frightened and even abandoned by family."

Experts caution, however, that Alzheimer's patients vary widely, and techniques that may work beautifully for one might not work for another.

The program at the Hebrew Home is limited to residents in the early and moderate stages of dementia who are likely to recognize the people in the video and understand what they say.

"Do we know for sure that they know, this is my daughter, this is my son? No," Dell says. "But they recognize them as somebody they care about and love."

The program is starting with residents who are known to staff as difficult in the morning and who refuse care, a description that Rusoff-Hoen acknowledges fits her mother.

"Some of her agitation comes from, 'Who the heck are these people? Why am I here?'" she says.

Although Rusoff-Hoen, who lives a couple of hours away in Ghent, visits her mother three days a week, she said the video program helps fill in the gaps. "I am there with my mom, loving her and wishing her a wonderful day and helping her to feel better because there's not a lot I can do for her," Rosoff-Hoen said.

The Hebrew Home plans to evaluate the program after this month and may expand it to more of the several hundred residents in its memory-care "neighborhoods." Dell says anecdotal evidence from the staff is "very positive."

Irving's son-in-law, Mihai Radulescu, also made a video for her. In it, he kides her about being "a delinquent" because she once worked for a bootlegger.

On the recording, he repeatedly reminds Irving, "I know where you are. ... I will always find you," because she has expressed a deep fear of being lost.

Other videos include a woman reminding her mother, in Spanish, to eat and take her medications, then tearing up at the end and saying, "I love you, Mom."

On another video, a man encourages his mother, saying, "You used to tell me that attitude is everything. ... You said that it's best to start off on the sunny side of the street."

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Oklahoma volunteer deputy disputes claim he lacked training

TULSA, Okla. (AP) — A 73-year-old Oklahoma volunteer deputy charged in the fatal shooting of a suspect in Tulsa went on national television Friday to counter criticisms of his qualifications.

Speaking publicly for the first time since the April 2 shooting, Robert Bates told NBC's "Today" show that characterizations of himself as a wealthy donor who paid to join the force are "unbelievably unfair."

The Tulsa County Sheriff's Office volunteer also disputed anonymously sourced comments in the Tulsa World newspaper that sheriff's office supervisors were ordered to falsify his training records. Bates previously said he received active shooter training from Arizona's Maricopa County Sheriff's Office, but a spokeswoman said Thursday the office has no record of that.

Bates said Friday that he is certified to be a reserve deputy.

"I have it in writing," Bates said.

Video released by the sheriff's office shows Eric Harris running and deputies restraining him after an undercover gun deal. Bates said he shot the 44-year-old suspect after confusing his stun gun and handgun.

"You must believe me, it can happen to anyone," Bates said.

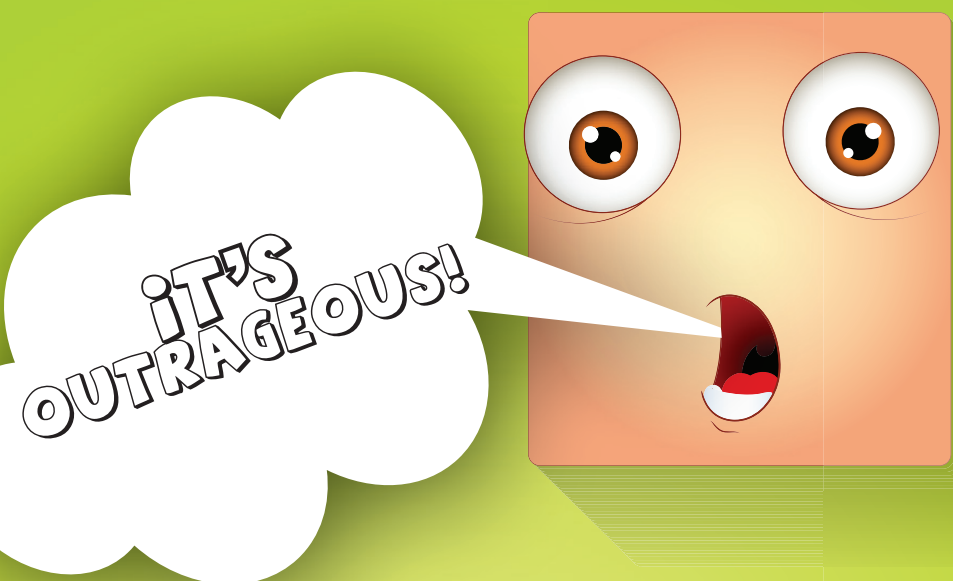
Bates said the shooting was accidental and apologized to Harris' family.

"I rate this as number one on my list of things in my life that I regret," he said.

The Tulsa district attorney has charged Bates with second-degree manslaughter.

Democratic Rep. Mike Shelton of Oklahoma City and the state chapter of the American Civil Liberties Union have called for an independent investigation of the office.

An office spokesman said Thursday it would conduct an internal review of the reserve deputy program.



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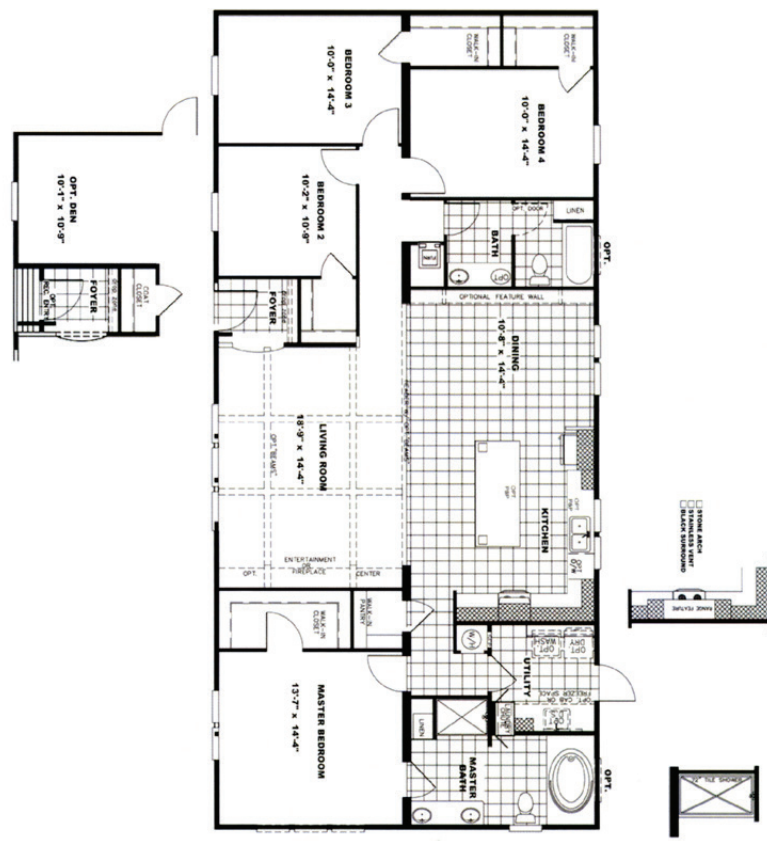

Texas unemployment rate slips to 4.2 percent during March

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — The Texas unemployment rate slipped to 4.2 percent in March, marking the seventh straight month of declines due to continuing job growth, the Texas Workforce Commission said Friday.

Statewide unemployment in February was 4.3 percent. The nationwide jobless rate was 5.5 percent in March, the commission said.

Last month's unemployment rate for Texas was the lowest since July 2007. Texas has added 327,500 jobs in the past year for an overall growth rate of 2.9 percent, outpacing the national growth rate of 2.3 percent, TWC

said, in a statement.

"While the state of Texas has achieved enormous success in creating jobs and spurring economic growth, it's time to renew our focus on promoting smarter tax policies that energize our economy and empower entrepreneurs to reinvest their capital in the Lone Star State," Gov. Greg Abbott said, in response to the latest jobless figures.

Midland had the lowest average jobless rate for Texas during March at 2.9 percent. The state's highest unemployment rate was the McAllen-Edinburg-Mission area at 7.5 percent, according to TWC figures.

The education and health services industry added 3,400 jobs in March. The financial activities industry increased by 2,400 positions. The mining and logging industry, which includes oil and gas employment, saw a decline in March with the loss of about 2,800 jobs statewide.

"Maintaining a diversity of employment opportunities has kept Texas strong for the past four years," said Andres Alcantar, TWC chairman. "We must continue to build and support partnerships that will help connect employers to a quality supply of skilled workers and equip job seekers with training that will help them succeed."

Texas man charged in Iowa lottery case contests extradition

IOWA CITY, Iowa (AP) — A Texas businessman charged with helping a lottery official try to claim a rigged \$14 million jackpot has been released from jail while he fights extradition to Iowa.

Robert Rhodes of Sugar Land, Texas was released under electronic monitoring after posting \$10,000 bond last week. An extradition hearing is set for May 7.

Rhodes is disputing charges that he worked with a friend, 52-year-old Ed-

die Tipton, to try to claim the Hot Lotto jackpot. Tipton was security director for the Multi-State Lottery Association, an Iowa-based group that operates Powerball and Hot Lotto for state lotteries.

Prosecutors say Tipton may have inserted a software program that manipulated the random number generator for Hot Lotto.

They say Tipton bought the winning ticket, and Rhodes and others later tried to claim it.

Woman charged in death of man, body at Texas recycling unit

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — A homeless woman has been charged in the slaying of another transient whose body was found on the conveyor belt of a Central Texas recycling center.

Travis County jail records show 52-year-old Leigh Bohart was being held Friday on charges

of murder and tampering with physical evidence.

Workers at an Austin-area recycling center on Tuesday discovered the body of 49-year-old Clarence Gerald Gardner Jr. The death was ruled a homicide.

Officers later located Bohart near a church

where Gardner had also been known to stay. An affidavit says blood spatters were found on some nearby trash and recycling bins.

Bond was set at \$150,000 for Bohart. Online jail records do not list a defense attorney to comment on the case.

SpaceX shipment arrives at space station: 1st espresso maker

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — The SpaceX supply ship arrived at the International Space Station on Friday, delivering the world's first espresso machine designed exclusively for astronauts.

Italian astronaut Samantha Cristoforetti captured the Dragon capsule, which arrived three days after its Florida launch, with the help of a giant robot arm. The cargo carrier holds more than 4,000 pounds of much-needed groceries, experiments and equipment.

Italy provided the espresso maker for Cristoforetti, who's been stuck

with instant coffee since her mission began in November.

"It's been just amazing," Cristoforetti said after snaring the Dragon over the Pacific. "Lots of science and even coffee's in there, so that's pretty exciting."

Within 2 1/2 hours of its capture, the Dragon was bolted securely to the space station.

The espresso machine is three months late because of the backlog created by last year's loss of a supply ship in a launch explosion. Much later and the espresso machine would have missed Cristoforetti, who re-

turns home next month. She says she can't wait to try some space espresso.

The Dragon will remain at the orbiting lab until around May 21, when it will be released full of experiments and discarded equipment for return to Earth. It's the only supply ship capable of bringing items back.

Among the newly arrived research are experiments for American astronaut Scott Kelly, who is just a few weeks into a one-year mission, which will be a record for NASA.

SpaceX, meanwhile, released a video showing its first-stage booster landing on an ocean platform shortly

after Tuesday's liftoff, then tipping over in flames. It was the California company's third attempt to fly a booster rocket to the platform stationed off Florida's northeastern coast.

SpaceX chief Elon Musk said the platform — dubbed "Just Read the Instructions" — endured just minor damage.

The next try will be in June on the next SpaceX supply run for NASA.

Musk, a billionaire entrepreneur who also runs the Tesla electric car maker, wants to reuse his rockets to bring down the cost of spaceflight.

LA Clippers' Jordan prepared if Spurs send him to line again

LOS ANGELES (AP) — After DeAndre Jordan learned the Clippers had drawn the San Antonio Spurs in the first round of the playoffs, the Los Angeles center must have thought about just going straight to the free throw line.

A first-round matchup between two NBA powers with more than 55 victories apiece has plenty of subplots, but Jordan's 39.7-percent free throw shooting could end up being one of the biggest.

Intentionally fouling Jordan is a now-common practice for Clippers opponents in close games, and the defending champion Spurs proved two months ago that they're not above such tawdry strategies. In the teams' most recent regular-season meeting Feb. 19, Spurs coach Gregg Popovich raised the practice to a high art, sending Jordan to the foul line a jaw-dropping 28 times.

"It's happened all season, and I feel like a lot of the games that they've done it, we've won," Jordan said Thursday before the Clippers' first playoff practice at their training complex. "I'm not really worried about it. When it does happen, which I know it will, I'll just go to the line and shoot the basketball. It's not something that I'm dreading, but I'm prepared for it. I'm ready."

Jordan missed 18 of those season-high 28 free throws in a game that lasted nearly three full hours, keeping San Antonio close in the fourth quarter. Yet the Clippers still won 119-115, even without Blake Griffin in their lineup.

"I hate doing it, but it's a rule," Popovich said after that game.

Jordan's stat line from that night indicates both the utility and folly of Hack-a-DJ: He went 5 for 14 at the line in the fourth quarter, but finished with a career-high 26 points and grabbed 18 rebounds.

Jordan has evolved from a raw athlete into the NBA's rebounding champion and one of the world's top defensive players, but his growth hasn't included an improvement at the foul line. He was fifth in the NBA with 471 free-throw attempts during the regular season, an average of 5.7 per game, but couldn't even crack the 40-percent mark.

After being fairly unwilling to talk about it in previous seasons, Jordan has overcome his embarrassment about his free-throw struggles, openly acknowledging his weakness as an area to be exploited by opponents.

"A lot, probably," Jordan said when asked how many free throws he'll have to shoot to eliminate the champs.

"But that's fine," he added. "I shot a lot during the season anyway, so I've got a lot of practice."

Clippers coach Doc Rivers hasn't decided how to handle the strategy late in close games against the Spurs, but he knows it will be a problem until the NBA outlaws the practice.

"They're going to do it, so we're just going to have to make the game-to-game decisions," Rivers said. "The

league this year, I've got a strong feeling next year we won't have to deal with this. And I don't even know if that's the right answer. I know it looks better for the fans, but we'll just deal with it game by game."

Jordan knows he must keep his temper in check when the Spurs begin fouling him, but emotions often run hot for the high-flying, free-flowing Clippers. While they're all aware of the importance of avoiding fourth-quarter technical fouls, the Clippers can't deny they're not the same as the cool, clinical Spurs.

"If we all just play with a straight face out there, I think a lot of people would wonder if we really cared," Paul said. "I think we just play. We've got to be who we are."

Rivers has picked up his share of technical fouls as well, but still agrees with Paul.

"I think we should stay that way, because that's who we are," Rivers said. "We're not quiet. We are an emotional team, so let's not run from who we are. That's who we are. There's a lot of ways you can win. The Spurs have perfected their way, and they've done it really well. I think every coach would love to be that way, and that's not who we are."

"There's a line, and I think we've been on it and over it and under it," Rivers added. "The key is we have to be right on it, because I think we are an emotional team, and I think we play better with that emotion."

Pope considering Cuba stop during US trip but no decision

VATICAN CITY (AP) — Pope Francis is considering adding a stop in Cuba to his U.S. trip in September but no decision has been made, the Vatican said Friday.

Francis has been credited with having helped the United States and Cuba reach their historic rapprochement by writing to the leaders of both countries and having the Vatican host their delegations for the final negotiations.

The Vatican spokesman, the Rev. Federico Lombardi, said Francis "is considering the idea of a Cuba leg" but that discussions with Cuba are at an early stage. He said

it's too early to say that a decision has been taken or that there is an operational plan underway.

The possibility of a Cuban stop was first reported by the Wall Street Journal.

Francis is scheduled to visit three U.S. cities in the last week of September. He will address Congress and meet with President Barack Obama at the White House, address the U.N. in New York and attend a church rally for families in Philadelphia.

If a Cuba stop is confirmed on either end of the U.S. trip, Francis would become the third pope to visit the island nation after the historic 1998 visit of St. John Paul II during which he said Cuba should "open itself up to

the world, and may the world open itself up to Cuba."

Emeritus Pope Benedict XVI followed up with a 2012 trip during which he voiced the Vatican's long-standing position that the U.S. embargo was unjust and only hurt the most vulnerable on the island.

Francis also has spoken out against the U.S. embargo while also condemning socialism.

Francis' personal intervention in the U.S.-Cuban thaw was one of the most tangible signs that he wants the Vatican to be a greater player in international diplomacy. A more controversial intervention was his recent declaration that the slaughter of Armenians by Ottoman Turks a century ago was "genocide."

Greek bond yields soar as debt default fears swell

LONDON (AP) — Mounting fears of a Greek debt default sent the country's borrowing costs surging Thursday and prompted one prominent U.K. bookmaker to stop taking bets on the possibility of Greece leaving the euro.

The jitters were triggered initially by a report in the Financial Times that the Greek government recently made an "informal approach" to the International Monetary Fund to have bailout repayments delayed.

Unease was also stoked by evidence that the Greek government is shuffling around resources to cover costs and by pessimistic comments over the prospect of a deal between Athens and its European creditors.

Perhaps the most dramatic sign that Greece's crisis is coming to a head was the FT report that the IMF persuaded Athens not to make a formal request to delay repayments to the Washington D.C.-based institution next month. Greece is due to pay the IMF around 1 billion euros (\$1.06 billion) in two installments.

For investors, the report, which cited unnamed officials on both sides, was unsettling as it signaled that the Greek government is still a long way from convincing its European creditors about an

economic reform plan that is needed to unlock the remaining funds in the country's bailout. Since 2010, Greece has relied on a 240 billion-euro bailout from its euro partners and the IMF.

In Washington, IMF Managing Director Christine Lagarde rejected the possibility that the IMF would grant Greece a delay in making the payments. She said no advanced economy had ever made such a request to the IMF.

Lagarde told reporters at a news conference that her hope was that the Greek government will be able to implement the reforms needed to make the Greek economy "more stable and to create jobs."

Failure to agree on a plan with creditors would cause Greece to default, a development that could force the government to put limits on money transfers and even lead the country to leave the euro.

"What is concerning is how quickly these 'informal' talks could turn into serious delays and missed payments as Greece rapidly runs out of money," said Connor Campbell, financial analyst at London-based spread betting firm Spreadex.

Investors are wary and the yield — a gauge of investor risk — on Greece's 10-year

bonds surged a whole percentage point Thursday to just below 13 percent. The 3-year yield jumped to a staggering 28 percent.

Many in the markets think that without a deal, the Greek government will struggle to make upcoming debt repayments alongside day-to-cost commitments on such things as salaries and pensions. A missed payment is an effective default.

The prospect of a breakthrough in the talks appears distant. EU spokesman Margaritis Schinas said Thursday that "we are not satisfied with the level of progress made so far."

Experts from Greece and its international creditors have been holding talks in Brussels and Athens over the reform plans.

In February, the Greek government, elected on a promise to end crippling austerity measures, was asked to come up with a series of economic reforms if it wanted the next 7.2 billion euros in bailout money. The creditors have so far found Greece's proposed reforms insufficient.

The talks on the reforms were meant to conclude before April 24, when finance ministers from the 19 euro countries meet in the Latvian capital of Riga.

Greek Finance Minister Yanis Varoufakis will try

Thursday to convince participants at the IMF's annual meeting in Washington that his government will present an acceptable plan in time.

For British bookmaker William Hill, the outlook for Greece's euro membership remains so murky that it's decided to not take any more bets on a Greek exit from the euro.

"No one is interested in backing Greece to stay in the eurozone until the end of the year, so we decided to pull the plug on the markets until either the decision to leave is taken or the crisis point passes and a plan is put in place enabling the country to remain in," said William Hill spokesman Graham Sharpe.

Even if a deal emerges, Greece will still likely require further financial assistance beyond the summer, possibly involving a third bailout.

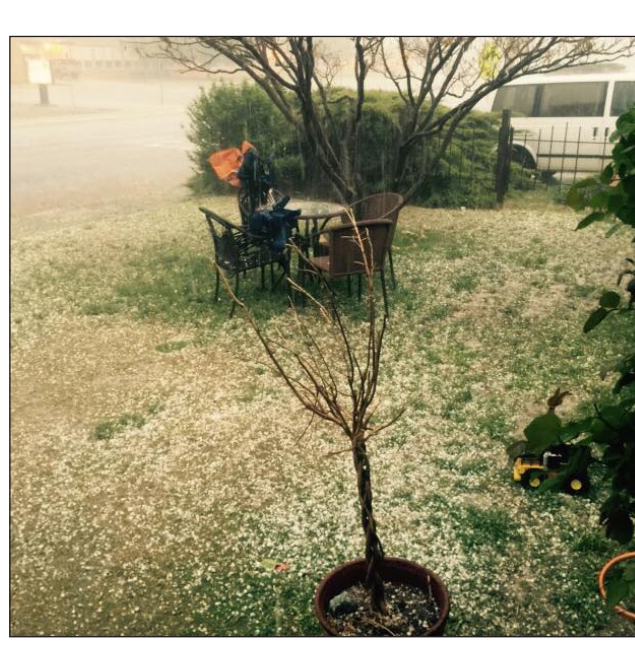

Pew Research Center new marriage data

According to a Pew Research Center analysis of data from the United States Census Bureau, four out of ten new marriages in 2013 included at least one partner who had been married before. Half of those marriages

were remarriages for both spouses.

That change is no great surprise, as the Pew analysis noted that the number of remarried adults has tripled since 1960, when there were 14 million remarried men and women

in the United States.

That figure reached 42 million in 2013.

That means that nearly 25 percent of adults who are presently married have been married before.

Pew analysts feel the rise in remarriages can be

linked to a number of factors, including the aging of the population.

As men and women are living longer, that increases the number of widows and widowers who can remarry.

While many might

think divorcees are less willing to remarry after the death of a spouse or the dissolution of a marriage for other reasons, the Census data indicates adults are just as likely to remarry in 2013 as they were in the 1960s.

Interestingly enough, the number of adults who have been married once is on the decline.

In 1960, 85 percent of adults had been married once, while that figure was just 70 percent in 2013.

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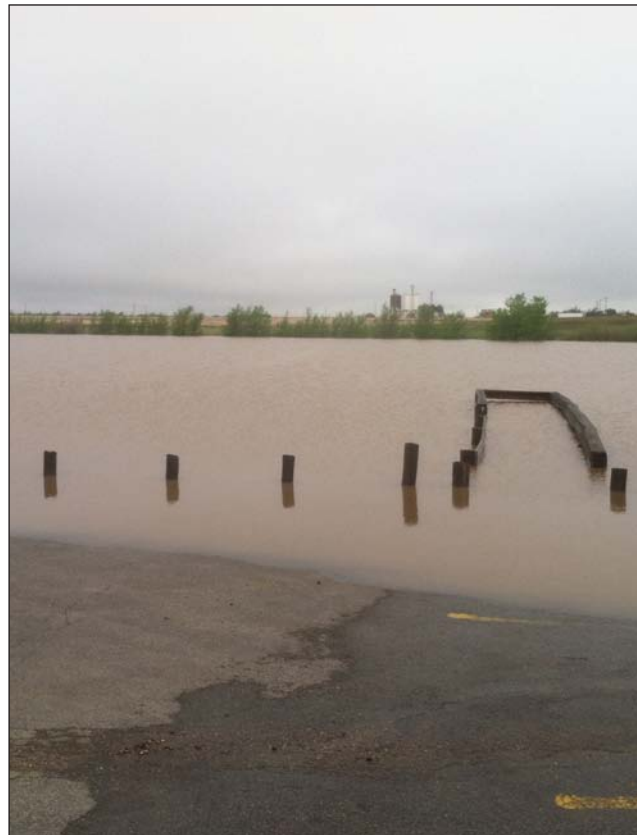

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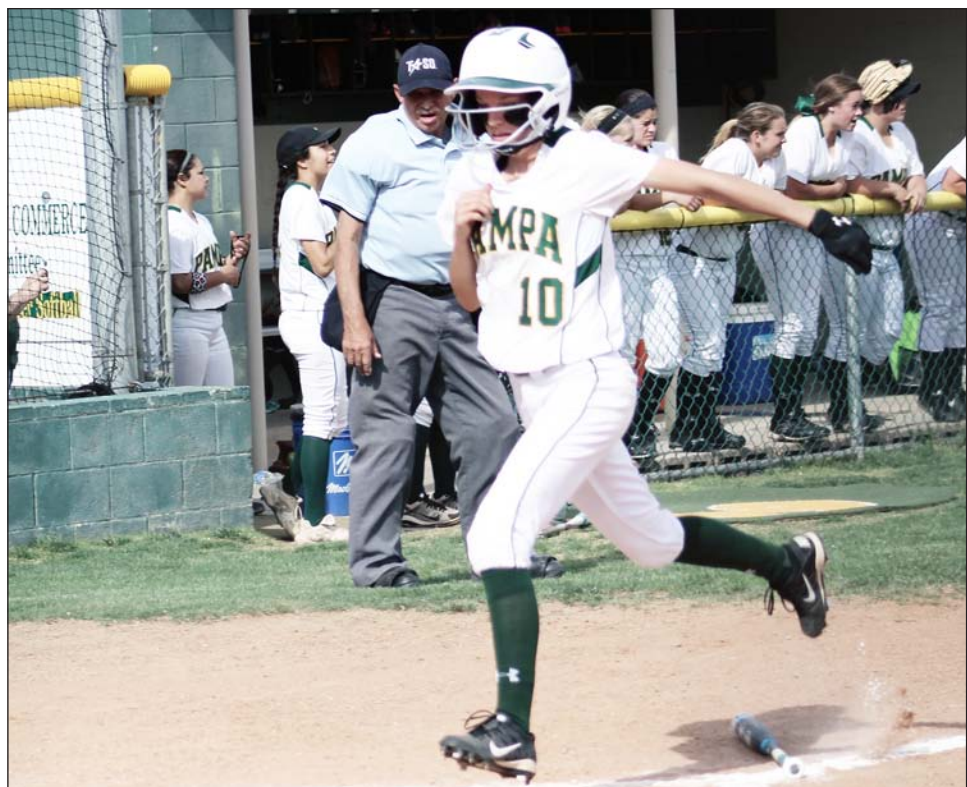

Browns quarterback Johnny Manziel says he "let down" fans

CLEVELAND (AP) — Browns quarterback Johnny Manziel has expressed remorse and asked for privacy following a 10-week stay in rehab.

In his first public comments since he entered a treatment facility on Jan. 28, Manziel apologized to the Browns and their fans and acknowledged he has a long way to go to win back people's respect.

"I owe private apologies to a lot of people that I disappointed but a very public one to the Browns organization and the fans that I let down," Manziel said in the statement released Friday by the Browns. "I take full responsibility for my actions and it's my intention to work very hard to regain everyone's trust and respect. I understand that will take time and will only happen through what I do and not what I say."

Manziel thanked doctors and staff at

Caron, a Pennsylvania facility which specializes in the treatment of drugs and alcohol. Manziel was discharged on April 11 and has not publicly disclosed what he sought treatment for.

Manziel was allowed to leave the facility during his stay and he played golf in Louisiana with his father and visited patients in a hospital as part of his program. Since leaving Caron, he has attended a Texas Rangers game followed by a visit to see the Dallas Mavericks play.

Manziel, who earned his "Johnny Football" nickname while winning the Heisman Trophy as a freshman at Texas A&M, intends to attend Cleveland's offseason practices next week. The 23-year-old knows there will be continued interest in his comeback.

"Anyone who has a friend or family member that's been through things like

this knows it's an ongoing process," Manziel said. "I'm going to continue to ask folks to try to respect my privacy as I determine to what degree I am comfortable talking about a subject which I consider very personal."

Manziel had a rough rookie season in 2014 after he was drafted with the No. 22 overall pick by the Browns. Manziel spent most of it as the team's backup before making two starts and playing poorly. He was injured in Cleveland's game at Carolina, then fined after he missed a treatment.

Following the season, Manziel acknowledged he didn't take his job as seriously as he needed to, and vowed to work harder in the offseason. He checked into rehab less than a month later.

The Browns have remained supportive during his ordeal. Owner Jimmy Haslam and coach Mike Pettine have indicated

Manziel will have a chance to win the starting job in training camp, but Manziel is not guaranteed anything. The Browns signed 11-year veteran quarterback Josh McCown as a free agent. The team also has two first-round draft picks and could position itself to take Oregon's Marcus Mariota.

Browns Pro Bowl tackle Joe Thomas said earlier this week that Manziel needs to prove to his teammates that he is willing to commit to football as the most important thing in his life.

"There was some doubt based on what he did last year if football was the most important thing," Thomas said when the Browns unveiled new uniforms this week. "It matters about showing up, practicing hard, taking the film study seriously, committing yourself to the meetings and playing on Sundays."

Top prospect Kris Bryant joins Cubs for game vs Padres

CHICAGO (AP) — Prized prospect Kris Bryant is in the majors.

The Cubs added Bryant to the roster for Friday's game against San Diego. Bryant is batting cleanup and playing third base against James Shields and the Padres.

Bryant and agent Scott Boras made it clear they were not happy that he opened the season in the minors.

He had a dominant spring

training, but by waiting to call him up, Chicago gained an extra year of control before he can hit free agency.

Friday is Day 13 of the season, which means Bryant could at most accumulate 171 days of major league service. Because 172 days count as a year, keeping him in the minors through Thursday ensured he would not be eligible for free agency until after the 2021 season.

Bryant hit .425 for the Cubs in spring training with nine homers and 15 RBIs in 40 at-bats. He was batting .321 with three homers and 10 RBIs in 28 at-bats with Triple-A Iowa.

The Cubs need a third baseman with Mike Olt sidelined by a wrist injury.

With Bryant in Chicago, the club has another piece of its heralded young core of position players in the major leagues.

Bryant joins Jorge Soler, Anthony Rizzo and Starlin Castro on the youthful Cubs, who entered Friday with a 5-3 record and tied with the St. Louis Cardinals atop the NL Central.

Selected second in the 2013 draft out of the University of San Diego, Bryant has established himself as one of baseball's top prospects.

"Today I got to tell my family that my dream is coming true," Bryant tweeted Thursday night. "Can't really put into words what that feels like. So excited for this journey!"

Mississippi State AD, Adidas apologize for vulgar jerseys

Mississippi State's athletic director and Adidas have apologized for an obscene phrase on one of the baseball team's practice jerseys.

The Bulldogs have new Adidas baseball practice jerseys that read "Viva Starkvegas" across the front. There are also small dots across the rest of the jerseys that spell different phrases, including one that is an obscene phrase referencing rival Mississippi.

Soon after pictures of the jerseys started appearing on social media, athletic director Scott Stricklin took to Twitter to apologize.

"This afternoon it came to my attention that a shirt provided to our baseball team by adidas has an inappropriate phrase written on it," Stricklin posted.

"This is completely unacceptable and does not reflect the standards and values of Mississippi State University or its athletic dept.

For anyone who was offended by this shirt, as I was, please accept our apologies and rest assured that this has been rectified."

Mississippi State spokesman Bill Martin said the school did not approve the design before its release. Michael Ehrlich, the Adidas director of public relations in the United States, apologized for the jerseys and said it was the company's mistake.

The graphic "featured old artwork that was never presented to the university," Ehrlich said by email.

"This graphic does not reflect our brand values nor those of Mississippi State.

We take full responsibility for this error and wish Mississippi State the best of luck during Super Bulldog Weekend."

Mississippi State is in Starkville, which is sometimes jokingly referred to as Starkvegas.

The Bulldogs host Florida in a three-game series this weekend at Dudy Noble Field.

BOSTON (AP) — The mother of former New England Patriots star Aaron Hernandez says she shared a special bond with the mother of the man her son was convicted of killing.

Terri Hernandez tells the Boston Herald that after the verdict was read Wednesday she smiled and nodded at Ursula Ward, the mother of Odin Lloyd.

The elder Hernandez says it wasn't the first time the two had communicated. She says at one point during the 10-week trial she told Ward: "As mother to mother, I'm very sorry. I don't know what happened but I'm very sorry for all this."

She called Ward "a great woman, nice and caring."

When told of what Terri Hernandez said, Ward replied that she said all she will say outside the courthouse, when she expressed forgiveness.

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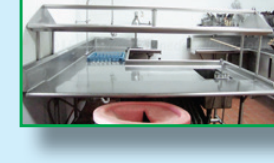
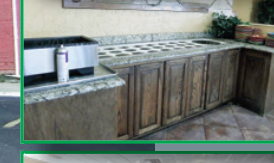


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Dear Abby...

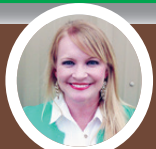
