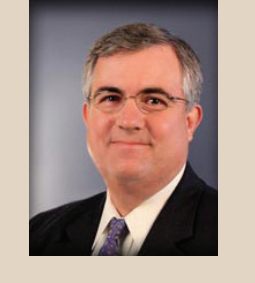

RED SCHOOL HOUSE CELEBRATES CENTENNIAL ANNIVERSARY

2015 marks the celebration of 100 years for the Red School House, north of Pampa. The school was built after Frederic Foster gave a two-acre site to Roberts County for the Wayside School District in 1914. Foster, a lawyer from New York, was part-owner of the White Deer Land Com-

pany in Pampa. He owned approximately 631,000 acres in mainly Gray, Carson and Donley counties. He often donated the ground where schools needed to be built.

The Wayside school would be built in pioneer school district number five which originated by court order in 1890 to serve the area with schools known as Tallahome,

US oil and natural gas rig count drops by 22 to 932

(AP) — Oilfield services company Baker Hughes Inc. says the number of rigs exploring for oil and natural gas in the U.S. declined by 22 this week to 932 amid depressed oil prices.

Houston-based Baker Hughes said Friday 703 rigs were seeking oil and 225 explored

for natural gas. Four were listed as miscellaneous. A year ago, 1,861 rigs were active. Among major oil and gas-producing states, Texas lost 19 rigs; North Dakota lost five; Oklahoma was down three; and Alaska, New Mexico

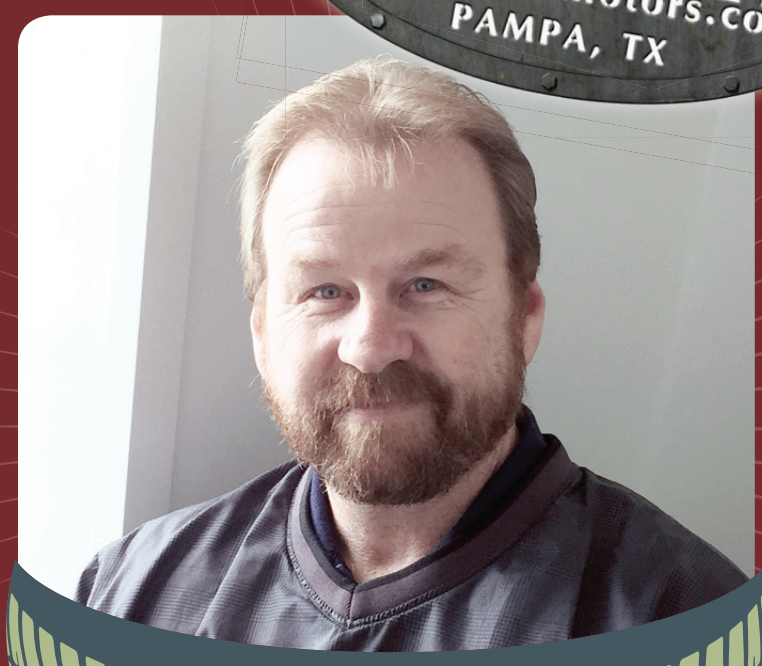

ARLINGTON (AP) — A former official in the city of Arlington says the Dallas-Fort Worth suburb misuses its perk of a free suite at AT&T Stadium.

Arlington received the suite from Cowboys owner Jerry Jones when it lured the team from Irving to a new site.

Bill Snider, also a past president of the Arlington Sports Authority, told WFAA-TV that the suite was intended to be used for encouraging business growth, particularly since the commercial areas near AT&T Stadium remain undeveloped.

But WFAA found that

the mayor, city council members and their spouses comprise about two-thirds of the guest lists at almost every event.

Snider said the suite was not meant to be "a perk for being an elected official."

The city's mayor, Robert Cluck, declined to be interviewed.

Bouncin' Around April is Parkinson's Awareness Month

April is Parkinson's Awareness Month. There is often a misconception of what this disease is.

I can tell you what it isn't: It is not an "old people's disease." More and more young people are being diagnosed with Parkinson's, even some as young as infants. It is not the same as Alzheimer's disease, so having Parkinson's does not necessarily mean an individual suffers dementia.

Though scientists do not actually know what causes Parkinson's, they are pretty sure it is not caused by a tick bite, as one individual tried to convince me. Parkinson's is a movement disorder, characterized by slowness of movement, tremors, stiffness and postural instability/balance problems.

There is currently no cure for the disease, although scientists and researchers are working hard for one. The standard treatment is medication, namely a type of dopamine (which is NOT the same as dope, as another person expressed concern.) The neurotransmitters in the brain are damaged, and dopamine is not produced adequately.

Scientists have recently discovered a protein called Lewy Bodies present in other parts of the brain; these Lewy Bodies control the sense of smell and regulate sleep. Some researchers believe that one of the first symptoms of Parkinson's is a loss of smell, years before the other symptoms surface. How do I know all this? As I wrote one year ago this month,

my husband was diagnosed with Parkinson's disease in 2002 at the age of 65. I'm sure that sense of smell idea is valid, because when we lived in Illinois and Indiana, where skunk roadkill is quite common, I could smell a skunk a mile away, and while I was gagging at the scent, Ron couldn't smell it at all.

Besides medication, another treatment for Parkinson's is surgery. Ron volunteered to be part of a study at St. Vincent Hospital in Indianapolis, and he was chosen to have deep brain stimulation surgery. They started preparing him for the surgery at about 8 a.m. on a Friday morning by first doing an MRI, and fitting him with a large metal "halo" to allow the surgeon to operate on the correct area.

Ron remembers having to write his name on a pad before the surgery, and it was not even legible. He was given only a local anesthetic on his scalp, where the surgeon made one incision on each side of his head.

Ron was awake when the surgeon said, "If you hear a buzzing or feel a vibration, that's just me drilling into your skull!" Ron's thought then was "Why am I letting him do this?"

Sometime later, after wires were inserted into the chosen areas of the brain, Ron said he felt his arm suddenly relax, where it had been rigid before. They then had him write his name again on the pad, and it was completely clear and readable. After a few more hours, a battery device was implanted under the skin on his chest, similar to a heart pacemaker.

All in all, the surgery and recovery period was about eight

hours, and he came home the next day. We had to wait another two weeks before the neurologist turned the battery on. It was amazing! There were no more tremors, no more stiffness, and my husband could walk normally. He even started playing golf again, and bowling.

That was almost nine years ago, and while it hasn't been a cure, it has given him a more normal life. Of course, all this equipment, along with a new knee in 2011 means he has to go through a manual screening at airports, and Ron complains that they never assign an attractive blonde woman to him, but usually a burly male.

The latest addition was a rechargeable battery implanted in 2010 which Ron can recharge at home twice a week and won't need to be replaced for at least another three or four years, as opposed to the two years for the original battery.

Physical and mental exercise, reading and being with people are all ways that keep this disease from progressing more quickly than it needs to. Many Parkinson's patients have been accused or suspected of being drunk because of a shuffling walk, slurred speech, or poor balance.

Please be aware that these people are struggling to have a quality of life that is difficult, and don't assume that they are mentally deficient. Our friends here in Pampa have been very kind and helpful since we moved here, and we hope you all will be just as understanding and kind to others with Parkinson's.

He still occasionally loses his footing (knee-

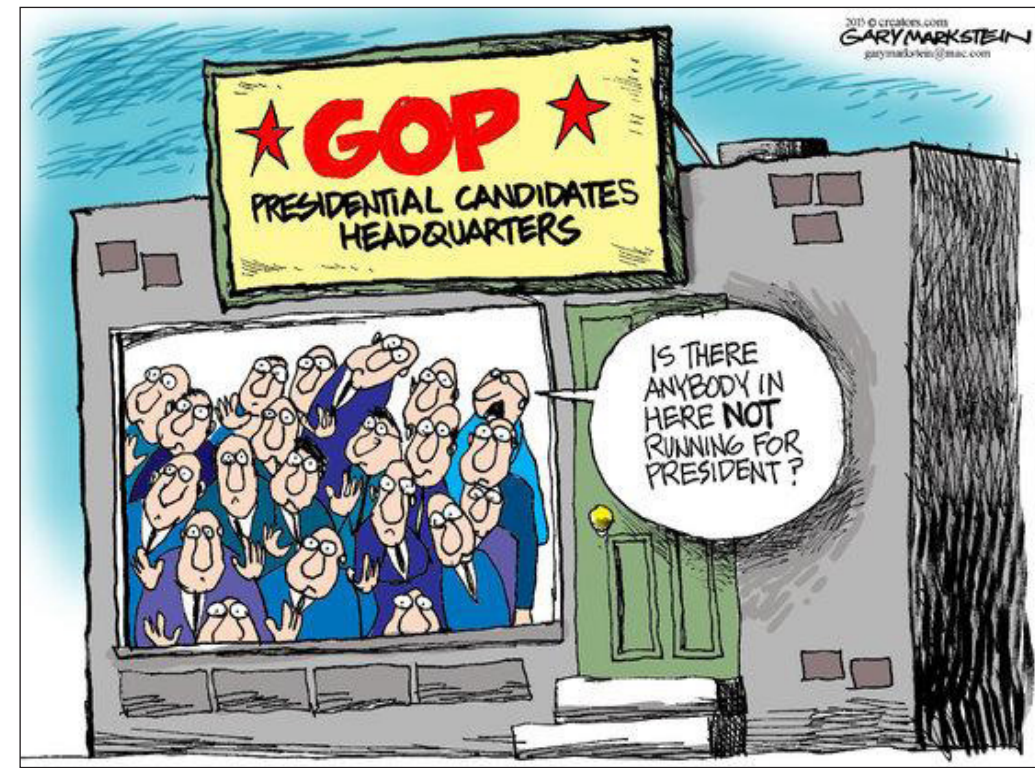
ing?) and gets a little unbalanced, but he gathers himself and continues to move.

presidential nomination trooped to Nashua, New Hampshire, last weekend hoping to impress that state's primary voters and activists. The candidates rehearsed Republican talking points about lower taxes, smaller government and a strong foreign policy, but they had nothing to say about the impending Supreme Court deci-

sion that threatens to redefine marriage and undermine the family as we have always known it.

That gap in presidential stump speeches is filled by an important brief just filed in the Supreme Court by members of the Republican Party's committee on resolutions, which writes the official platform containing the party's fundamental beliefs, goals and objectives. the only way to achieve a self-reliant, self-supporting economic unit that minimizes the need for a welfare state.

For example, recent platforms have stated that “Republicans recognize the importance of having a father and a mother in the home” (2000); “Families — not government programs — are the best way to make sure our children are properly nurtured” (1976); a loss of the traditional family produces consequences that “not only lead to more government costs, but also to more government control over the lives of its citizens in all aspects” (2012); “fracturing the family into isolated individuals (leaves) each of them dependent upon — and helpless before — government” (1992).

The first Republican platform after *Roe v. Wade*, in 1976, denounced that pro-abortion, anti-family decision. The first Republican platform after Lyndon Johnson’s Great Society, in 1968, denounced the then-new practice of providing welfare benefits to unmarried mothers because it “erodes self-respect and discourages family

unity and responsibility.”

And the very first Republican platform of all, in 1856, affirmed traditional marriage by declaring it the “duty of Congress to prohibit in the Territories those twin relics of barbarism — Polygamy, and Slavery.”

More recently, every Republican Party platform since 1996 has opposed the legal recognition of same-sex unions at any level of government, both state and federal.

The necessity of providing legal privileges for husband-wife unions was reaffirmed in the platforms of 2000, 2004, 2008 and 2012, and in 2013 by a special resolution declaring that marriage is a “relationship that only a man and a woman can form.”

The hesitance of presidential candidates to address this critical issue is puzzling, if for no other reason than that the people who write and approve the party platform are the same delegates who will nominate the candidates for president and vice president.

A presidential candidate who wants to be seen as a strong and effective leader, tough enough to defeat both Hillary Clinton and the Islamic State (or ISIS), should not avoid criticism of the prospect that five unelected judges may redefine a funda-

mental relationship that is much older than our Constitution.

Remember that the first Republican president, Abraham Lincoln, won the Republican nomination, and then the presidency, primarily on the basis of his compelling refutation of the Supreme Court’s Dred Scott decision, and on his public commitment not to enforce that sweeping decision beyond the individual parties to that tragic case. After his election, Lincoln stood by that promise.

Like Andrew Jackson before him, Lincoln insisted that Congress and the president were co-equal branches of government with the duty to interpret the Constitution within their own spheres of divided power.

Alexander Hamilton promised in the Federalist Papers (No. 78) that the judiciary was the “least dangerous” branch of the federal government because it “must ultimately depend upon the aid of the executive arm even for the efficacy of its judgments.”

In the last presidential cycle, Newt Gingrich won the pivotal South Carolina primary after declaring that he would reject a Supreme Court ruling that extended legal rights to enemy combatants held at Guantanamo. Newt had

already issued an excellent 54-page position paper titled “Bringing the Courts Back Under the Constitution.”

Unfortunately, the Republican “donor class” and the high-priced consultants who led the party down to defeat in the last two presidential elections are back again with the same losing advice to avoid what former Indiana Gov. Mitch Daniels called “the so-called social issues.”

What those big donors and strategists don’t seem to realize is that Republican fiscal policies (lower taxes and balanced budgets) can happen only if we honor the traditional family, founded on the marriage of husband and wife, as the indispensable foundation of a free society.

We’re looking for a presidential candidate to say that the way to give us the limited government, lower taxes and balanced budgets we all seek is to restore the legal system that protects traditional marriage so that families are self-supporting, not dependent on government handouts.

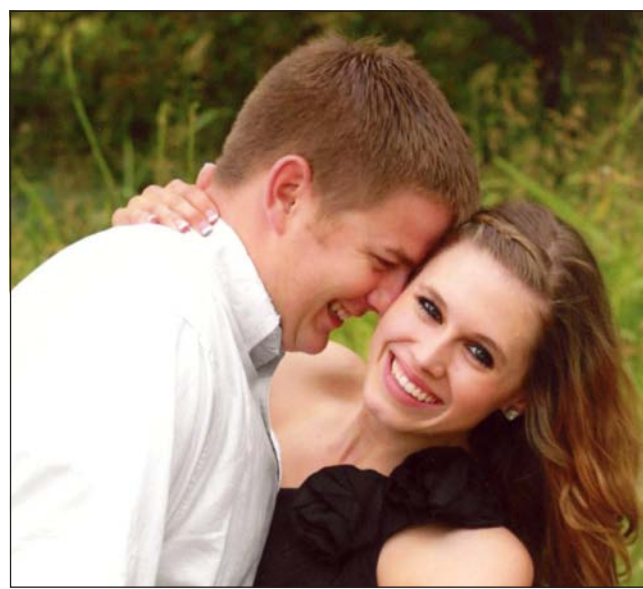

Poole and Wayside. Classes for these schools were typically held in homes prior to the school being built.

The district bought materials from the White House Lumber Yard in Pampa. Men from the community built the 28x36 foot school

house. They painted it red, and soon it became the focus for the community.

The school building hosted elections, church services and other activities. The first year children began attending the school was 1914-1915.

Despite enrollment fluctuations caused by draught, oil booms and other economic factors, Wayside prided itself on scholastic

excellence. In 1929 high school aged students were transferred to Pampa with Wayside School District paying their tuition.

All other grades continued to attend the Wayside School until the 1933-34 school year, when all students were transferred to Pampa, an agreement that was followed until 1950. That year, Wayside School District consolidated with Pampa ISD. The last teacher of the Red School House was Sis Massengale.

The White Deer Land Company, successor to the original donor Frederic Foster, then deeded the Red School House for continuing community use to trustees Paul Caylor, R.E. Montgomery and J.T. Roberts.

The community still uses the school house today.

The Wayside Home demonstration Club was started in 1919. Meetings were held in members' homes with an agent from Gray

County attending. In the early 1950's club members decided to discontinue the demonstration club. In its place the Wayside Club, a service and community club, was formed.

The Wayside Club met monthly at the Red School House. They continue to maintain the Little Red School House building and the community spirit of years ago.

The ladies have printed three cookbooks printed in the past. The three cookbooks have been combined into a new cookbook as part of the 100 year celebration. These are available, for sale, to the public. Proceeds from the sales will go to the Red School House Main-

tenance Fund. A reception/open house is also planned to celebrate 100 years.

The public is invited to the event held at the Red School House, April 26, from 2 p.m. to 4 p.m.

Unusual ice cream recalls raise questions about cause

WASHINGTON (AP) — Major recalls from two well-known ice cream companies due to the discovery of listeria

bacteria raise questions about how the pathogen could have contaminated multiple ice cream manufacturing plants — and whether the discoveries are related.

Blue Bell Creameries of Texas and Jeni's Splendid Ice Creams of Ohio — extremely popular brands in their home states — took all their products off shelves this week. Blue Bell ice cream is linked to 10 illnesses in four states, including three deaths. There are no known illnesses linked to the Jeni's recall, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

The recalls are unusual: Listeria is rarely found in ice cream because it can't grow at freezing temperatures.

"At this time, the FDA does not believe that the finding of listeria in one sample of Jeni's Splendid Ice Creams is related to the outbreak and recall associated with Blue Bell Ice Cream," said Food and Drug Administration spokesman Jeff Ventura. "We are continuing to investigate both situations and will provide updated information to consumers as we learn more."
