Over the last several years, various counties and communities across the Texas Panhandle have been holding elections concerning the sale of alcohol.

While Gray County itself is a wet county, Lefors has been dry since before 1965. That could all change come

May 9 when a special election is being held to possibly allow alcohol sells.

A petition started by a resident of Lefors reads that if passed, the city would allow "the legal sale of all alcoholic beverages including mixed beverages."

"Of course if this passes they would have to get the appropriate permits through the state and the city, but they could sell alcohol," Lindy Forsyth,

Lefors city secretary said.

The petition needed 46 signatures and the resident acquired 47. If the petition passes, the city will become wet upon the order of the Lefors City Commission.

"It's been really about 50-50, at this point I wouldn't even venture a guess as to which way it's going," Forsyth

Texas governor tells State Guard to monitor Army training

AUSTIN (AP) — Texas Republican Gov. Greg Abbott on Tuesday asked the State Guard to monitor a U.S. military training exercise dubbed "Jade Helm 15" amid Internet-fueled suspicions that the war simulation is really a hostile military takeover.

The request comes a day after more than 200 people packed a meeting in rural Bastrop County and questioned a U.S. Army commander about whether the government was planning to confiscate guns or implement martial law. Bastrop County Judge Paul Pape said "conspiracy theorists" and "fear mongers" had been in a frenzy.

Pape thanked Abbott for the letter to the Texas State Guard, which he believed helped emphasize the benefit of the military training rather than further fuel theorists.

"It's a sad when people's greatest fear is their own government," Pape said. "Think about the ramification of that. If Americans go to sleep at night worrying whether their own government is going to sell them out before morning, it'd be hard to sleep."

Suspicious about Jade Helm intensified on

some conservative websites and social media after a map labeled Texas, Utah and parts of California as "hostile" for the purposes of the three-month training exercise that begins in July. Such war simulations aren't unusual, though the Army has acknowledged that the size and scope of Jade Helm makes it unique.

Texas and six other states are hosting the exercises on public and private lands. The Army says the terrain and topography in the areas selected are ideal to replicate foreign combat zones.

No other governor had so publicly addressed the training exercise.

"It is important that Texans know their safety, constitutional rights, private property rights and civil liberties will not be infringed," Abbott wrote. "By monitoring the Operation on a continual basis, the State Guard will facilitate communications between my office and the commanders of the Operation to ensure that adequate measures are in place to protect Texans."




said. "They have enough interest to get the petition validated and you hear more from the ones who are for it than the ones that are against it. I have been hearing both sides and it's pretty even." Forsyth believes the legalization of alcohol sales would be huge for the revenue of the city. "If that passes probably the

biggest thing that will affect is probably the sales tax revenue," Forsyth said. "Hopefully it would bring in more businesses, we don't have many things available to the residents here. Stores don't even open. It would be nice to have a restaurant here, and a store." Forsyth added that it's been hard for restaurants to stay open in Lefors and the legalization may help. Residents of Lefors will have an opportunity to vote on the legalization of alcohol sales by voting in the May 9 election.

Early voting is currently going on weekdays until May 5 from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. at 101 N. Court in Lefors. Saturday, May 9, is state election date. Election Day voting for Lefors is at the Community Center attached to City Hall

U.S. Army Lt. Col. Mark Lastoria told the crowd in Bastrop on Monday that the exercise will involve 1,200 soldiers and all four branches of the military, according to the Austin American-Statesman. He

said people with a "personal agenda" about the exercise had been spreading misinformation. Lastoria spoke for two hours, but some left the meeting still unconvinced. Pape told The Associated Press that some came from as far as Houston and Dallas to attend the meeting. He said the county

could reap as much as \$150,000 in economic activity from the exercise, which in Bastrop is set to include 60 soldiers, two Humvees and a helicopter. Bastrop County is home to Camp Swift, the largest base for the Texas National Guard, and Pape said most people likely won't even notice.

"There's been a lot of dust thrown in the air, a lot of haze," Pape said. "Those who wanted to raise concerns on the one hand succeeded. They've raised a lot of attention about this. But the fact is the message is clear: Jade Helm is a well-designed and a well-constructed training operation."

Multi-State operation rescues endangered children

AUSTIN — The Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) announced today the outcomes of a recent multi-state, multi-agency Crimes Against Children Patrol Operation that resulted in law enforcement officers rescuing six missing or exploited children. The patrol initiative, which was conducted April 14-16, included participants from nine states and two municipalities.

"DPS is committed to pursuing the criminals who target and exploit innocent children, and this multi-agency patrol effort to detect and rescue endangered children is the first of its kind," said DPS Director Steven McCraw. "Because of this focused patrol operation, our local and state partners were able to rescue six children from possibly dangerous and deplorable circumstances. We are extremely proud

of these efforts by our law enforcement officers to protect our most valuable and vulnerable resource — our children."

Coordinated by Texas DPS, the three-day operation focused on increasing awareness among uniformed law enforcement officers and communities in an effort to identify and rescue missing, exploited or at-risk children. In addition to rescuing six children, participating officers in the areas of operation also rescued one adult victim, made four initial arrests, launched three investigations of sex crimes against children and two of human trafficking. DPS troopers recovered one child.

Participating agencies included Texas DPS, Austin Police Department, Arizona Department of Public Safety, Arkansas State Police, Louisiana State Police, Georgia Department of Public Safety, Ohio State Highway Patrol, South

Dakota Highway Patrol, Tennessee Highway Patrol, Utah Highway Patrol and Durham (England) Constabulary. The United States Marshals Service and Federal Bureau of Investigation also provided support when needed.

The operation also coincided with International Child Abuse Prevention Month in April, observed by communities and organizations to raise awareness of child abuse, and neglect and to educate the public on prevention.

This patrol initiative is an extension of DPS' ongoing Interdiction for the Protection of Children

(IPC) program, which was created to rescue and protect children and apprehend criminal predators. Launched in 2009, the IPC program is designed to teach troopers and other law enforcement officers how to recognize indicators of missing, exploited and at-risk children who do not exhibit obvious signs of abuse. Before the creation of the DPS Interdiction

for the Protection of Children program, uniformed officers historically were not trained to recognize characteristics and indicators of an endangered or missing child.

Since 2009, the IPC program has been responsible for recovering more than 160 children and conducting more than 50 criminal investigations. IPC has also been responsible for uncovering

crimes affecting children and arresting the perpetrators in instances involving:

- Possession of child pornography;
- Sexual assault of a child;
- Human trafficking/commercial sexual exploitation of children;
- Violation of registered sex offender requirements; and
- Enticing a child.

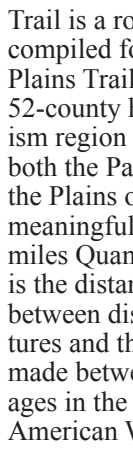

I base these games as the ones who have been extremely successful and should be considered in the Hall of Fame.

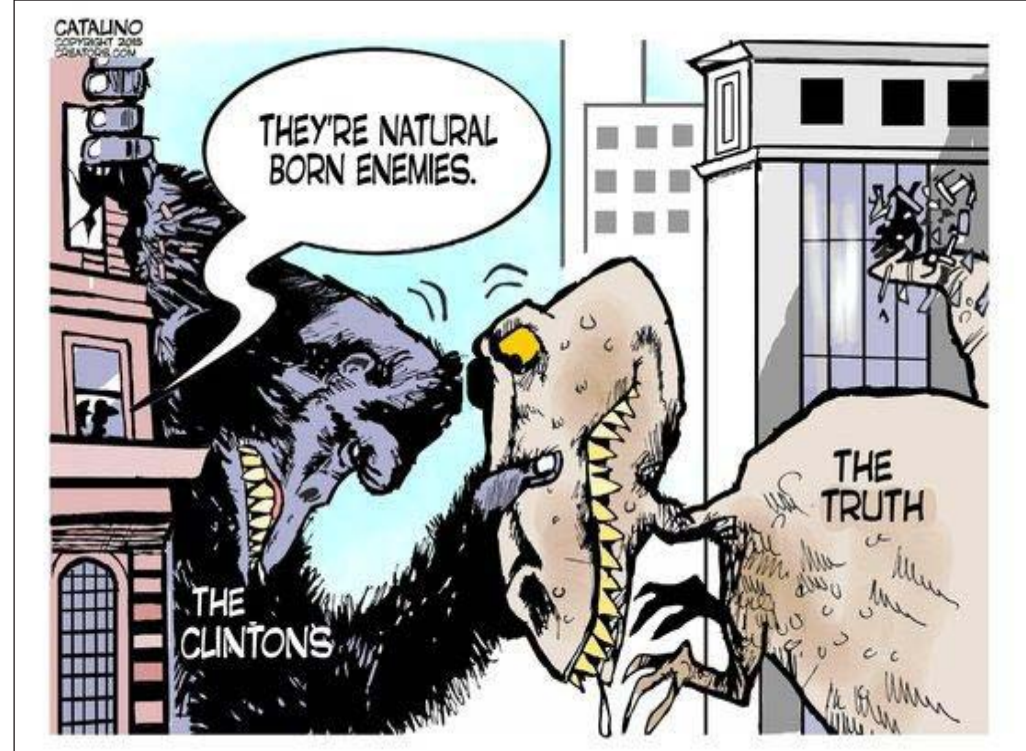
Sonic the Hedgehog, World of Warcraft, Tetris, The Legend of Zelda, Doom and The Oregon Trail.

Snarking Hillary is not the way to the White House

A number of GOP candidates are engaging in Hillary-bashing over allegations that she used her office as secretary of state to help her husband's business dealings, prop up speech-making fees and grease the path for foreign governments to donate massive amounts of money to the Clinton Foundation.

But here's a warning to my friends on the presidential campaign trail: Bashing Hillary is only going to make the Republican Party look mean-spirited and snarky. It's no road to the White House.

I would suggest laying off Hillary and instead showing us what you got in the way of economic-growth policies that will foster 4 to 5 percent growth and maybe another 12 million jobs. The GOP needs a positive growth message, along with a strong national-security message, because the party needs a positive rebranding and a positive vision. But Hillary-bashing will drown that out.

Snarking your way to the presidency is not likely to happen. And if you go that route, slamming Hillary at every turn, you're going to

lose female voters, minority voters and young voters — constituencies that the GOP desperately needs to win. It might even help Hillary.

As far as the Clintons' alleged cash-raising misdeeds — what the New York Post has dubbed "quid pro dough" — it looks like the whole rest of the world is jumping on the case. It's being covered by no less than the New York Times and Washington Post, a bunch of liberal magazines and of course the conservative Wall Street Journal. You've got Pulitzer Prize-winning New York Times reporter Jo Becker working the story daily. She's doing her own research and not relying solely on Peter Schweizer, the author of the forthcoming "Clinton Cash" book that set this latest Clinton scandal in motion.

I think Schweizer is a very good investigative reporter. We'll have to see if he has connected all the dots when his book hits shelves on May 5. But when you have the liberal media and its top reporters digging deep, there's really no need for the GOP presidential candidates to pile on.

If the charges against Hillary and Bill are true, if the evidence is there and if laws have been broken, why not let the Clintons

hang themselves? They won't need any help.

And the country already knows that Hillary Clinton lacks good judgment. Whether it's the secret email servers, or the Colombian trade agreement, or the Russian uranium deal, polls say Americans are losing confidence in her ability. Bill and Hillary have long been branded with ethical miscues and moral lapses.

So don't go there, GOP. Instead, walk the more certain path to the White House in 2016: Offer brass tacks and specifics on reinvigorating economic growth.

Watching the GOP presidential candidates at last week's New Hampshire Republican Leadership Summit, there was frankly very little discussion of growth. While several candidates have tax-reform plans, both good and bad, there were no specifics in the Granite State. Ditto for rolling back regulations, replacing Obamacare or immigration reform. I also don't recall a discussion of free trade, even though there's a big trade bill coming up in the House and Senate. And I heard no mention of a stable and sound dollar.

I did hear this idea of not wanting to go back to yesterday, contrasting the past with the future. As Newsmax founder Chris-

topher Ruddy put it, it's a clever rhetorical device, but it does not present real solutions. In fact, there are quite a few pretty good ideas from the past.

For example, Ronald Reagan slashed marginal tax rates and promoted a sound dollar. Democrat Jimmy Carter, believe it or not, started a deregulation movement that Reagan continued on his first day in office by decontrolling oil prices. John F. Kennedy cut tax rates in the 1960s and launched a huge economic boom. And if you go way back to 1776, there's Adam Smith, the man who launched free-market economics with his book "The Wealth of Nations." That was a long time ago, but that shouldn't mean we neglect his principles.

What the Republican Party needs is a clear and strong vision for getting the American economy out of the doldrums. If you want to nail Hillary, slam her issues and policies. Looks like she's going Obama Third Term: redistribution, not growth.

Go positive, GOP. Go for positive economic- and foreign-policy solutions. That's a winner.

plays video games has had a character on WoW. Some became very addicted to the games, others, like myself, were casual players.

executive actions during his stand-up comedy routine this year. Asked if he had a "bucket list," he joked: "Well, I have something that rhymes with bucket." Immigration executive action? "Bucket!" he cracked. Stricter emissions regulations? "Bucket! It's the right thing to do."

Imagine Ronald Reagan using this formulation to advance deporting people who came to this country illegally and disbanding the EPA. Not in a million years would any of them find an ounce of humor in his words.

Yet our pro-Obama media celebrated this F-bomb-tweaking shtick as one of the "funniest" jokes he made. They think it's funny because they zealously support his agenda, and care not at all about executive overreach — as long as the executives are liberal.

Obama's contempt for the Republican-controlled Congress is transparent. Liberal journalist Ezra Klein insisted Obama wasn't joking at all. When Obama cracked that Dick Cheney was the "worst president of my lifetime," Klein wrote: "It's funny, sure. But he's not kidding. ... The humor is in the shock of him actually saying it."

Obama also brought in Keegan-Michael Key of Comedy Central's "Key & Peele" show. In their usual routine, his partner Jordan Peele plays Obama, while Key plays "Luther the Anger Translator," saying the insulting things Obama would like to say, but never does.

They said this was Obama's best climate-change speech, and before the perfect audience, the media elites, because they've been "wildly underplaying the story of the century for a long, long time."

That claim really deserves a raucous laugh track.

No felony charges against Cowboys' Joseph Randle

WICHITA, Kan. (AP) — Kansas prosecutors declined Wednesday to bring felony charges against Dallas Cowboys running back Joseph Randle following a domestic disturbance at a hotel in Wichita, saying they concluded after reviewing the extensive police investigation that there is a lack of evidence to support them.

"The sufficiency of proof required in a criminal case is proof beyond a reasonable doubt," District Attorney Marc Bennett said in a news release. "We find the nature of the available evidence in this instance is insufficient to meet that burden as to felony charges."

The case may still be referred by police to the city prosecutor's office for potential misdemeanor charges. Randle's attorney, Gary Ayers, did not immediately return phone and email messages seeking comment on the development.

Ayers has long contended the allegations against his client "have no merit." The Dallas running back has denied

he threatened his former girlfriend or pulled a gun during an incident that led to his arrest on a marijuana possession charge that was later dropped.

Cowboys spokesman Rich Dalrymple said the team would have no comment.

The case stems from a Feb. 3 incident at a Wichita hotel where Randle's former girlfriend, Dalia Jacobs, had gone that day so he could see their baby.

Jacobs told police Randle brandished a gun and broke a car window during the altercation. She filed for a protective order the next day, claiming Randle pointed a gun at a vehicle with their son and Jacobs' friend inside.

Jacobs told a 911 dispatcher that Randle threatened her with a gun near their son and made another woman bleed. In the first 911 call, Jacobs urged the dispatcher to send someone quickly but not tell Randle who had called.

A different woman made the second call. In the third, Jacobs said everything was fine.

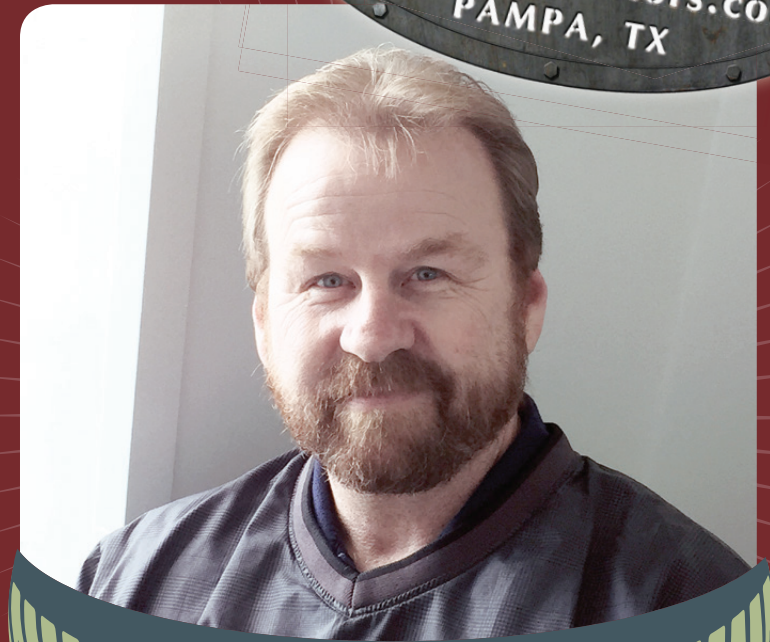

Rockets have bigger goals after advancing to second round

HOUSTON (AP) — After advancing to the second round of the NBA playoffs for the first time since 2009, the Houston Rockets shifted their focus to much bigger goals.

They're looking to become the first Houston team to win a Western Conference semifinal since 1997.

"Everybody is locked in on what our goal is and that's to win a championship," said Dwight Howard, who had 18 points and 19 rebounds to help the Rockets dominate inside in beating the Dallas Mavericks 103-94 on Tuesday night to make it past the first round.

James Harden scored 28, Terrence Jones had 10 of his 15 points in the fourth quarter, and the Rockets xorcised any bad feelings that lingered from last year's opening-round loss to Portland.

Houston took the Western Conference series 4-1 to advance to face the winner of the Clippers-Spurs series, which San Antonio leads 3-2.

"We are going to peak at the right time and

you get hot because you've only got to win 16 games and we've won four of those," Jason Terry said. "So, we are a quarter of the way home."

The Rockets bounced back from a lackluster performance in a 121-109 loss in Game 4 to head to the West semifinals for the first time since Yao Ming starred for Houston.

Harden said the key will be to not rest on what they've already done.

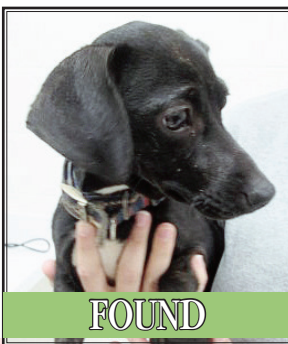
"We're going to act like we've been here before," he said. "We're going to enjoy (Tuesday) and stay humble about it ... and be ready to go and give it our all."

The victory meant a little more to Howard, who missed half of Houston's regular-season games with injuries.

"There are times when I get super emotional because I want to win," Howard said. "I don't want to be sitting at home watching somebody else holding up the trophy. Minutes, fouls, missed free throws or whatever it may be, I'm going to stay locked in on what the task is and that's to win the game."
