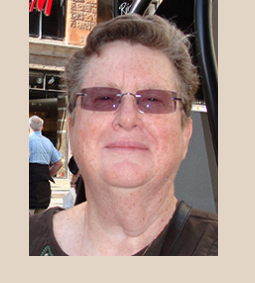

Student from Pampa heading to Sweden to present college project

Some people travel out of the country for leisure, others for work. For University of North Texas student Holly Gage, who hails from Pampa, it will be to present a concept helmet in an International competition. Gage is attending UNT majoring in mechanical energy engineering. As part of her senior design project, her and three other students designed a concept design for an airbag-embedded helmet.

The helmet will be equipped with two sensors and a gyroscope that measures how fast it's accelerating. Because of the costs to simulate airbag deployment, Gage's group mostly focused on the crash detection aspect of the design. The group submitted the project to the National Highway Traffic and Safety Administration Enhanced Safety of Vehicles Student Design Competition (NHTSA ESV Student Design Competition).

DPS trooper seizes illegal drugs and handgun

AMARILLO – The Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) conducted a traffic stop Thursday on Interstate 40, yielding 82 pounds of marijuana valued at more than \$497,000 along with four pounds of hashish valued at more than \$42,000.

At approximately 8:28 a.m., a DPS trooper conducted a traffic stop on a 2015 Hyundai Sonata traveling eastbound on I-40, for a traffic violation, near Conway in Carson County. The occupants of the Sonata were identified as Cody Allen Hill, 22, and Justin Bay Salm-

eron, 27, both of Wilmington, N.C., During the traffic stop, the trooper discovered 21 vacuum-sealed bags of marijuana, seven vacuum-sealed bags of hashish and a .25 caliber handgun Hill and Salmeron were



On the inside of the helmet there is a momentary switch which activates when someone puts it on. Power is provided to the rest of the system and it starts monitoring the motion of the helmet. When the helmet is taken off, the power system is cut which prevents the airbag from deploying if someone were carrying it and/or acciden-

tally dropped it.

The gyroscope measures the angular velocity, which will tell how fast the helmet is rotating. The accelerometer will measure the linear acceleration of the helmet.

The team submitted their concept to the NHTSA ESV Student Design Competition on Nov. 5, 2014.

On April 8, 2015, gave a presentation over Skype to NHTSA and were chosen as one of three finalists from North America to compete internationally on April 16.

The purpose of the motorcycle helmet is designed to help decrease motorcycle fatalities.

Now, Gage and her colleagues will be heading to Sweden as one of three teams from the North American region.

Along with the three from North America, there are five other teams competing in the student competition: one from Korea, one from Japan and three from Europe.

The other two North American Schools are Stanford University and University of Alaska.

The competition they are taking part in is called the Collegiate Safety Technology Design Competition (SSTDC), which gives students from Asia-Pacific, Europe and North America an opportunity to design, build and demonstrate a cost-effective conceptual scale model of a vehicle safety technology.

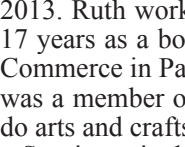

Texas' good rains benefit lake levels statewide

LUBBOCK (AP) — Restaurant owner Kelly Duncan gazes incredulously at a full Lake Lavon.

Three months ago, this lake northeast of Dallas was half-full. Good rainfalls in March and April brought big changes — the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers released water this week from the full lake to reduce flood risk.

"I forgot what it looked like when it was full," the 59-year-old owner of Big Daddy's Roadhouse BBQ said. "It's looking really good."

Statewide, estimates from the National Weather Service indicate the first four months of this year have been the fifth wettest since 1895 and the wettest since 1997. So far this year, estimates show the state has gotten 11.5 inches of precipitation, or about 160 percent of the normal 7.1 inches. March and April each provided 200 percent of the state's normal rainfall.

And the news going for-

ward is good.

A weaker-than-anticipated El Nino that brought with it rain, snow and sleet to Texas is expected to persist and intensify through next winter. This summer's temperatures may be the lowest since 2007-2008, according to state climatologist John Nielsen-Gammons, which could lead to less evaporation from lakes, weather officials said. Also, the state's wettest two months — May and June — are still ahead.

"There are a lot of positive things to look forward to, both short-term and long-term," Fort Worth NWS meteorologist Victor Murphy said.

It's been a long slog since 2011, Texas' driest year ever, and despite significant improvement, weather officials say the drought still isn't over. Nearly 16 percent of the state is in the top three driest categories, according to this week's U.S. Drought Monitor Map.

Bouncin' Around

Enjoyment brought by history

My young friend Eric recently posed this question on Facebook: Do you enjoy history, if so what part of history?

After a little thought, my answer was the dawn of the space age. In my freshman year of college, I was the only girl in an astronomy class, and when the class gave me the opportunity to view celestial objects through a high-power telescope, my love of space was born.

I remember when Alan Shepard was launched into orbit in 1961, and in 1969 I was glued to the television like so many others when Neil Armstrong walked on the moon. I'm still fascinated by what we've learned through the Hubbell space telescope. I decided to poll my family to see how they would answer Eric's question.

My husband, who has an extensive library of books on the Civil War and World War II, answered, "To me, the most influential time was

late 1943 then the end of WWII. Russia was overrunning lands the Nazis had taken, and the Allies, U.S. Britain, etc., were planning D-Day. The U.S. was planning an invasion of Japan and working toward the atom bomb."

Our daughter said she'd go with Egyptian history, specifically Cleopatra. Her husband said World War I has always interested him. The 12-year-old triplets had very different answers: Allan's answer was "when Jesus rose again." Randy loves Samurai history. Rebekah's answer was "the Vietnam War." Fifteen-year-old TJ's answer was "the space race." I've saved Eric's answer for last. My answer is:

"The Revolutionary War onward. I also like the story of William Penn because he inspired our forefathers in the writing of our constitution. He founded Philadelphia and allowed people of different faiths to move into the community. He believed in the right of each person to practice their own faith. I think it's because he had been jailed in England for his own beliefs."

What makes this question and

Eric's answer so special to me is that he is a young man who is autistic. He was home-schooled and graduated from high school last year, and owns his own business selling collectibles. He is a very intelligent and caring young man who does as much community service as he can, and advocates quite vocally for people with disabilities.

Eric also asked recently on his Facebook page if we take our right to vote seriously. What I didn't know before is that in Missouri, where he lives with his parents, many with autism are automatically given guardians. When that happens they lose all rights including the right to vote. Some states are all or nothing and Missouri is one of them. He gave his mother power of attorney for medical issues when he turned 18 so doctors will talk to her if they don't listen to him.

I hope Eric continues to ask thought-provoking questions, and I sincerely hope he is successful in changing opinions about people with autism. He has changed mine.

Ultron seeks ultimate power and immortality and the Avengers struggle to stay one step ahead in their goal to save humanity.

Gas prices climb again this week as global crude prices rise

COPPELL — Texas drivers are now paying \$2.38 for a gallon of regular unleaded fuel, according to the AAA Texas Weekend Gas Watch. That price is seven cents more than last week but \$1.11 less per gallon than last year. Of the major metropolitan areas surveyed in the Lone Star State, drivers in Dallas and Fort Worth are paying the most on average at \$2.48 per gallon while drivers in Beaumont are paying the least at \$2.28 per gallon. Texans are paying twenty cents less than the national average which now sits at \$2.58.

The recent increase in prices at the pumps has been the product of rising global crude prices, the seasonal switch to summer-blend gasoline and regional refinery issues, particularly on the West Coast. Despite inching higher both the national and statewide averages continue to reflect a significant discount compared to this same date last year.

The deadline for terminals to switch over to summer-grade gasoline is May 1. Following the transition to summer-blend gasoline and as refineries complete seasonal maintenance, analysts say the national and state averages may decline

again, though much of the forecast will depend on what happens with the cost of crude oil.

“Drivers in Texas are now paying about \$33 for a 14-gallon size fuel tank, which is almost \$16 less per tank than last year,” said AAA Texas/New Mexico Representative Doug Shupe. “Drivers can maximize fuel efficiency by keeping vehicles maintained, not driving aggressively, and removing unneeded weight from their cars and trucks.”

US consumer sentiment rises on optimism over job market

WASHINGTON (AP) — Optimism about the job market lifted U.S. consumer sentiment in April to its second-highest level since 2007.

The University of Michigan’s sentiment index rose to 95.9 from 93 in March. Only January’s reading of 98.1 has been higher since 2007, the year the Great Recession began. Over the past five months, sentiment has been, on average, at its highest level since 2004.

Richard Curtin, chief economist of the Michigan survey, attributed the April

increase to optimism over consistently low inflation and low interest rates and improving prospects for jobs and incomes.

The index found that consumers expect interest rates to rise from current historically low levels but only modestly. And they expect any economic damage from higher rates to be offset by the benefits of more jobs and incomes.

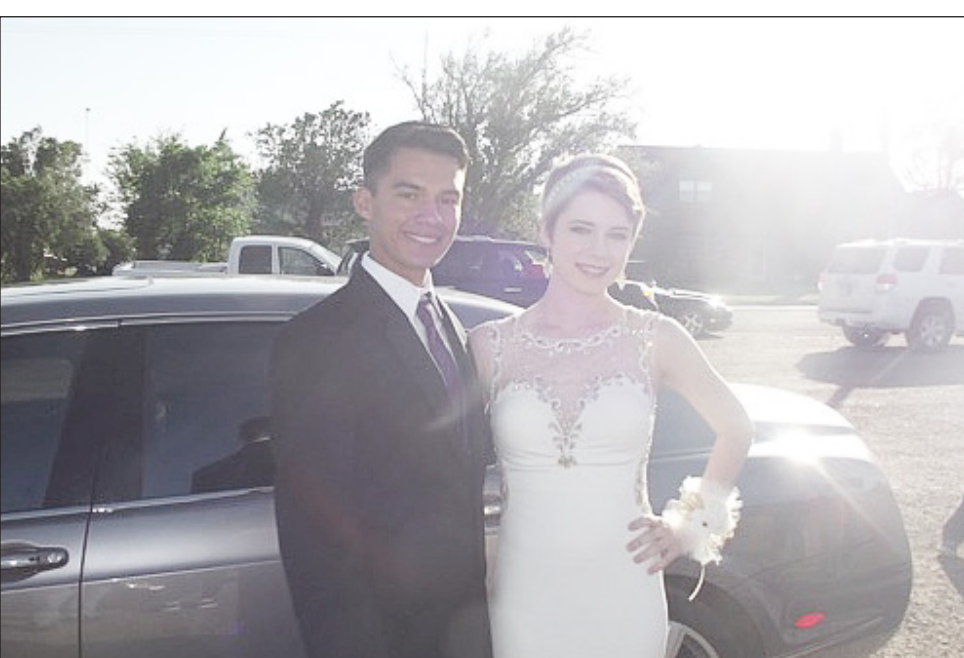

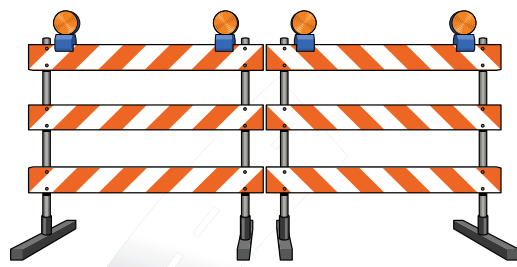

More Americans spending at least half their pay on housing

WASHINGTON (AP) — The surging cost of rental housing has squeezed a rising proportion of U.S. families since the Great Recession struck in 2007.

For more than one in four renters, housing and utilities consume at least half their family income, according to an analysis of Census data by Enterprise Community Partners, a nonprofit that helps finance affordable housing. The number of such households has jumped 26 percent to 11.25 million since 2007, a sign that the 6½-year-old recovery from the recession has given scant relief to much of the country.

The government defines housing costs in excess of 30 percent of income as burdensome.

"It means making really difficult trade-offs," said Angela Boyd, a vice president at Enterprise Community Partners. "There are daily financial dilemmas about making their rent or buying groceries."

The crisis reflects one of the shortcomings of the recovery: Wages have failed to match rising rental prices. At the same time, construction has failed to keep pace with demand from renters. The recession pushed more millennials, former homeowners who faced foreclosure and low-wage workers into rental housing.

A result is that 2.3 million more families face pressures that leave them perilously close to homelessness. It's a reality faced by Lisette Du-

arte, a 37-year-old living in a two-bedroom apartment with her family in northeast Los Angeles.

Duarte's husband lost his job as an electrician more than three years ago. With both their son and daughter on the autistic spectrum and in need of care, he chose to stay at home while she worked a job requiring a 90-minute commute each way. The lost income forced them out of a three-bedroom house and eventually into a hotel, where vouchers over the course of five months helped them save for a security deposit for an apartment.

About a year ago, the family moved into a two-bedroom apartment in the Highland Park neighborhood where Duarte had grown up. Two-bedrooms in that gentrifying community rent for an average of about \$1,600 a month, according to the online service Apartment List. The expense, along with utilities, consumes half of Duarte's paycheck.

The family relies on prepaid cellphones. They don't dine out or go on vacations. Whatever extra income they have often goes for health care.

More than 30 percent of renters in California, Florida, New Jersey and New York state devote at least half their incomes to housing and utilities, according to the analysis. Other than Alaska, South Dakota and Wyoming, at least 20 percent of renters in every state

face similarly high costs relative to income.

The analysis was developed for a "Make Room" awareness campaign sponsored by Enterprise Community Partners. As part of the campaign, pop stars such as Carly Rae Jepsen of "Call Me Maybe" fame, who sang for the Duartes,

Witch doctor gets federal prison for drug protection scheme

BEAUMONT (AP) — A Nigerian man who federal prosecutors say portrayed himself as a "witch doctor" has been sentenced to 14 years in prison for collecting hundreds of thousands of dollars from cocaine traffickers looking to get his supernatural protection from authorities.

Christopher Omigie, a naturalized U.S. citizen who had been living in Lafayette, Louisiana, was sentenced Thursday in federal court in Beau-

mont after pleading guilty last year to conspiracy to distribute cocaine.

Prosecutors say the 58-year-old provided traffickers with card readings, massages with magic ointments, razor blade cuttings and various magic powders, belts, coconuts and rocks to keep law enforcement away.

They didn't work.

His main clients were caught and have pleaded guilty to schemes involving cocaine trafficking.
