PRMC offers full-line labor and delivery service

This week is hospital week. As part of hospital week, The Pampa News will be running articles pertaining to health and Pampa Regional Medical Center.

When it comes to expecting an addition to the family, it's nice to have a hospital nearby to bring in your new bundle of joy.

Pampa Regional Medical Center offers labor and delivery services that are comparable to those you could find in Amarillo.

The labor and delivery floor at PRMC has

five LDRP (Labor, Delivery, Recovery and Postpartum) rooms, which is where expecting mothers go as soon as they are admitted.

"She goes into one of these rooms which is where she delivers at also," Lois Bivolcic of PRMC said. "We have anesthesia staff set 24 hours a day."

Each room is equipped with a monitoring station that can be viewed either by the front desk, or by the mobile work stations. So, nurses can access each of the five monitors

Campaign warns Texans to 'Click it or Ticket'

Law enforcement cracks down on unbuckled drivers, passengers.

AMARILLO—The simple, law-abiding habit of wearing a seat belt can protect thousands of Texans from serious injury or death. Yet, many people still refuse. For them, the Texas Department of Transportation is launching its 14th annual statewide "Click It or Ticket" campaign to augment the federal, stepped-up enforcement period, May 18 through May 31.

"It's heartbreaking to know lives are being lost on Texas roadways because people are still not buckling up," said John Barton, TxDOT deputy executive director. "These motorists have friends and families who will never get over the loss of their loved one. It's really simple. Seat belts save lives. Every single individual in a vehicle needs to be buckled up."

If the deadly consequences aren't enough to motivate seat belt use, fines and court costs can total up to \$200. In Texas, the law requires everyone in a vehicle to be buckled up, including back seat passengers.

In 2014, 2,587 motor vehicle traffic crashes oc-



younger kids. The younger group will be a little bit more generic knowledge like what the Indians did, what they wore, how they hunted, whereas the big kids will get into more specific people." As expressed earlier,

regardless of which room they are in. PRMC has two full-time OBGYNs Dr. Helio Zapata, Dr. Sean Wengroff and a female part-time OBGYN Dr. Kalamani Dharma. Dr. Wengroff is a new OBGYN that the hospital is real excited about. He has come and helped the hospital before and the patients, nurses and doctors all thought he did a great job. They also have a part-time OBGYN who does gynecological surgeries for the hospital. OBGYNs are first-come, first-serve. Bivolcic said it's a good idea for expecting mothers to register with the hospi-

tal ahead of time because it gets the paperwork part of the admitting process out of the way. PRMC has a central-fetal monitoring system, just like the hospitals in Amarillo have. "The monitors hook up to mom and baby," Bivolcic said. "They have a monitor here and they display at the nurse's station. Everything as far as vital signs and her contractions can be seen at the nurse's station." Bivolcic said the biggest time of year for them tends to be the summer. "It seems like we have a little increase in deliveries during the summer months," Bivolcic said. "We do about 15 to 20 babies a month right now." While the entertainment industry loves to play with the idea of babies switched at birth, it's not going to

happen at PRMC. "We do have a security system," Bivolcic said. "All of the babies are banded with a security band and if an alarm goes off, it locks the elevators and all of the doors surrounding LD. So you can't get off the floor." The only area where PRMC doesn't compare to larger hospitals is that they don't have a neo-natal care area. "We can't take care of the really small premature babies," Bivolcic said. "But as far as labor and delivery, we compare to the hospitals in Borger, Dumas, BSA and Northwest." PRMC also has pediatricians Dr. Jeff Kuo and Dr. Giang T. Nguyen, as well as Dr. Gretchen Adams, who is a family medicine doctor but does some pediatrics. PRMC staff is trained with the same courses that are offered at BSA or Northwest Texas Hospital.

PRMC encourages breastfeeding and has a physician who is going through advanced courses to be a lactation consultant. Lois and fellow nurse Debbie Henson have more than 25 years of experience each. Several of the other nurses on the floor have several years of experience as well. The room where they have a c-section is on the same floor as the labor and delivery. PRMC also offers childbirth education classes once a month and you can call labor and delivery for more information on that. "They are set to be starting on the first Tuesday of every month and they run for four weeks," Bivolcic said. er versus a motor vehicle. You wouldn't ride a rollercoaster without a seat belt, why would you ride in a car without one?" The "Click It or Ticket" campaign, combined with enforcement, is credited with motivating millions of motorists to always use their seat belts. Only 76 percent of Texans used seat belts when the campaign started in 2002. Today, nine out of 10 Texans buckle up. The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration estimates that since its inception, the "Click It or Ticket" campaign in Texas has resulted in 4,319 fewer traffic fatalities while preventing 72,926 serious injuries and saving more than \$16.7 billion in related economic costs. occurred in Texas in which unrestrained vehicle occupants sustained fatal or serious injuries. Wearing a seat belt helps keep occupants from being ejected in a crash and increases the chances of surviving by 45 percent. In pickup trucks, that number jumps to 60 percent, as those vehicles are twice as likely as cars to roll over in a crash. In the Amarillo metro area, a recent survey showed that 87.7 percent of motorists were buckled while driving, compared to the state average of about 95 percent of motorists. "We have a little work to do to get our local average up to where it needs to be," said Amarillo District Engineer Ron Johnston. That's why we're using the analogy of a roller coast-
