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County court considers security upgrade at WDLM

The Gray County commissioners court met Monday morning on the second floor on the county courthouse for their first meeting of June.

The topic discussed at length was adding surveillance to the White Deer Land Museum. Curator Courtney Oxley said

there have been two attempts made to steal the donation jars at the museum. Oxley is also concerned that the sticky fingers of thieves have made their way to the smaller artifacts spread out across the museum.

Oxley said right now it's hard to tell whether or not someone pocketed any artifacts because they may not notice it's missing until three or four days after it's taken.

Oxley said the museum currently has cameras that don't function. Gary Willoughby apologized to Oxley as he thought the museum already had functioning cameras but told the rest of the commissioner's he has surveillance at his private businesses and this is a project that needs to be pursued.

When discussing how many cameras the museum will need, Jeff Haley suggested to Oxley that

she adjusts the collections accordingly to ensure the more expensive artifacts are in the rooms that have cameras.

County judge Richard Peet also suggested that a handful of professional, objective specialists come in and evaluate what the museum will need in terms of number of cameras and where they are

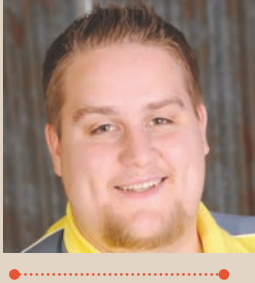

These sweet treats, along with the warm hearts and smiles of those who served them, brought comfort to American "doughboys" who

were serving their country and likely missing the care of their mother and special ladies back home.

The first National Donut Day was established as a way to commemorate the service of The Salvation Army's Donut Lassies and honor the memory of American soldiers. Gov. Greg Abbott signals he'll sign cannabis oil bill

Gov. Greg Abbott is signaling that he will sign into law a bill allowing epilepsy patients to use medicinal oils containing a therapeutic component found in marijuana.

Abbott issued a news advisory Sunday announcing a Monday bill signing ceremony with the authors of Senate Bill 339 — Sen. Kevin Eltife, R-Tyler, and Stephanie Klick, R-Fort Worth.

Under the legislation, the state would be

able to regulate and distribute the oils containing CBD, a non-euphoric component of marijuana, to patients whose symptoms have not responded to federally approved medication.

Texas is one of 16 states where marijuana is illegal for medicinal and recreational use. In recent years, 13 states have legalized CBD oil for certain medical conditions. Twenty-three other states and the District of Columbia have laws allowing broader medical

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


marijuana use. The bill requires the state to regulate the distribution

of the medication, directing the Texas Department of Public Safety to license at least three dispensing organizations by Sept. 1, 2017, provided that at least that many applicants have met the state's requirements.

Klick said on the House floor that the dispensaries would function similar to compounding pharmacies. Under the bill, only a neurologist or epileptologist would be able to prescribe CBD oil.

General Conquistador Coronado to scout: "Call me Francisco, now show me this big hole in the llano!"

My Spanish (Castilian, of course) to English translation aside, that is likely very close

to the conversation that led to the discovery by Conquistador Francisco Coronado, of Palo Duro Canyon. Actually, the scout was the first to discover the canyon, but if there is one thing unfair about history, it's the hard work that has never been acknowledged or recorded and never will be, by those not in command...

Following folks is not my A.D.D. at work, but rather a necessary diversion for the sake of this essay.

I love art, most genres for the matter. Oh, there are some types that don't ring my emotional bell or catch my eye, but when it comes to western art, particularly western art from 18th Century American artists like George Catlin, Frederick Remington and Charles Russell, I must seek my fix! With such a fix in mind, I ventured over Canyon way to the jewel called, Panhandle Plains Historical Museum.

Once there I traipsed through

George Catlin's 'American Buffalo' exhibit. Historically, George Catlin (1796-1872) is recognized as one of the earliest painters of the American West. Plying his trade in the 1830's, Catlin's art depicts the life of Plains Indian tribes showing the crucial role buffalo played in their cultures. Priceless masterpieces his works are! My fix fulfilled, I then opted to continue my road trip by taking in Palo Duro Canyon, something I have not done in what must be, close to 50 years.

Palo Duro, translated from Spanish (Castilian, of course) to English means, hard wood. I suppose when Coronado was seeking the Seven Cities of Cibola with all of their gold, his 'Hard Wood Canyon' trees could have been oaks, mesquites or bois d'arcs? I digress, as per my way, but for the sake of a much needed campfire for cooking and warmth, I can

The GOP needs a five percent growth target

First-quarter real GDP actually declined by 0.7 percent, according to revisions out this week, creating a much new talk about recession. But there is no recession. Trouble is, there continues to be virtually no recovery.

The economy has expanded about 1.5 percent over the past two quarters, 2.4 percent at an annual rate over the past two years and about 2.3 percent during this six-year, so-called recovery. That's the real problem. Not a one-quarter snowstorm or inaccurate seasonal adjustments.

Following the deepest recession since World War II, a normal recovery should have featured an outsized rebound. The Reagan years exemplified that model. But it hasn't happened. Why?

On the eve of the Republican primaries, here's the big question: What must we do to restore America's long-term economic-growth performance, which is roughly 3.4 percent per year? Answer: 5 percent growth for the next decade.

Today's economy is about \$2 trillion below that long-term trend line. And the absence of normal growth is a big part of 15 million fewer jobs and a 10.8 percent U-6 unemployment rate (marginally attached workers, part-timers who want full-time work, people who have given up).

There are federal-entitlement disincentives at play, but a normal growth path would have produced many more jobs and a higher employment-to-population rate. And while I have written on family breakup as a huge source of poverty, the absence of economic growth is surely part of the problem.

And here's a point for those who worry about federal debt and deficits. According to the CBO, a 1 percent increase in real economic growth would lower the deficit by about \$3 trillion over 10 years. In other words, growth solves a lot of problems.

And it's high time for growth.

A little history: Despite the urban legend of a booming 1950s, there were three recessions under Ike and an average growth rate of only 2.5 percent. Then, in the spring of 1960, Nelson Rockefeller sat down with presidential hopeful Richard Nixon and hammered out the so-called Fifth Avenue compact, headlined by a 5 percent growth target. And almost at the same time, Sen. John F. Kennedy entered a 5 percent growth target into his campaign. By the way, with JFK's supply-side tax cut, the 1960s registered nearly 5 percent growth.

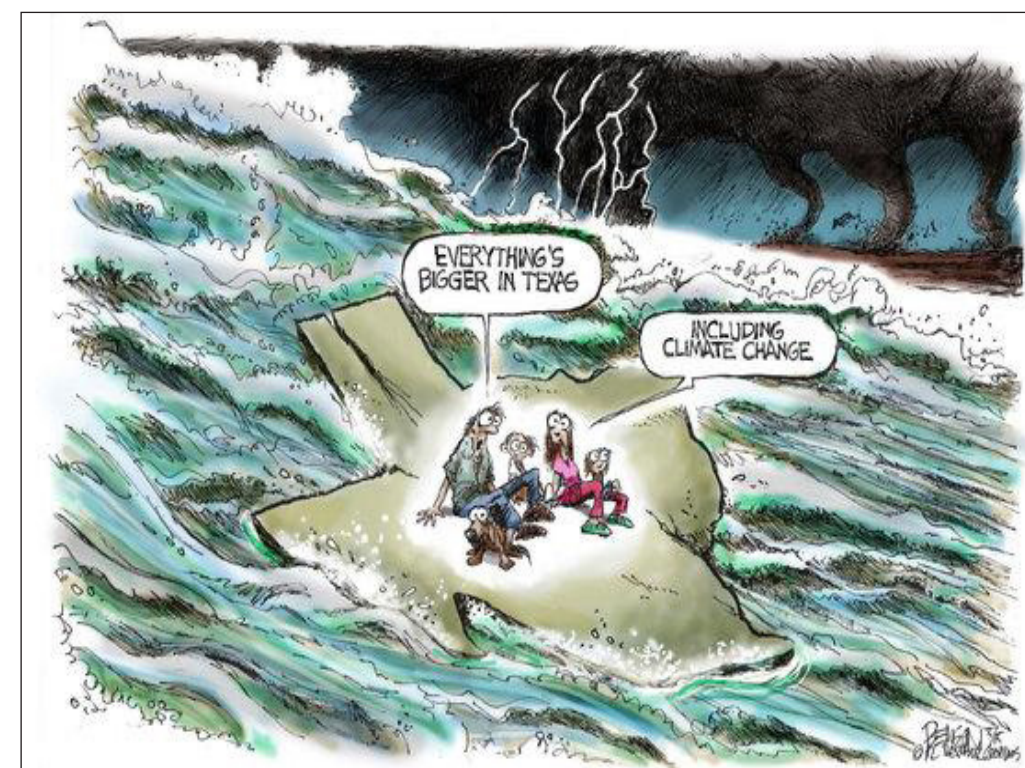
So how about some Republican leadership today, with all the candidates pushing for a 5 percent economic-growth target. It's exactly what we need to get back to America's long-term prosperity trend, which had long ensured our world leadership. We don't have that today. Unfortunately, it's just as Ronald Reagan warned: Weakness at home creates weakness abroad.

In a recent Wall Street Journal op-ed, distinguished economist Martin Feldstein made a plea for tax-cut policies that would generate much faster growth. In particular, he argued for more capital investment, which by the way, adjusted for inflation, hasn't increased in 20 years.

Here's the Feldstein prescription: Slash the corporate income tax and lower personal income-tax rates. Get rid of taxes on interest and dividends to promote saving. Get rid of deductions that shift capital to less-productive investments. Reform means-tested programs, such as disability insurance and Obamacare, which reduce benefits if people move from welfare to work.

As for my part, I understand that education reform, stable families, job training, reducing regulation and other non-tax items are crucial for growth. But if we want more risk and innovation, and more take-home pay for the middle class, we must look hard at pro-growth

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Just a Thought

Nine keys to a successful life

One reason some people aren't as successful as they'd like to be is they haven't decided what they want. There are people who live their life by default, not by design. Many people's lives are reactive, not proactive. It is as if they are flapping their arms just trying to keep their head above the water and stay afloat rather than swimming in the direction they need to be moving.

Life should not be one in which "survival is success." It should be an existence with an intentional direction. It would be sad if a person who, when breathing his final breath, looked back at his years here and claimed a successful life because he was able to tread water for the years he lived.

I recently read a newspaper article titled "Keys to Success." It was taken from a book written by co-creator of the Chicken Soup for the Soul book series, Jack Canfield. The article set out nine keys to success. After reading the article I thought there was merit to sharing with you its message along with my thoughts on Mr. Canfield's recommendations.

1. Take 100% responsibility for your life. I think this is truly a key to success and I like it

being stated first. This is a major area that many people have trouble with. You are responsible for you. I am responsible for me. Period. Regardless of the hand that life deals you, it is up to you how you play your hand.

We spend too much time pointing at others and blaming others for where we wake up today. We say things like "it's not my fault." Even if this phrase is true, so what? You have still need to get out of bed and take responsibility for your life.

If my quality of life is not as good as I would like it to be, rather than whine and point at someone or something else, I have the power to change my life experience.

Consider this formula: event plus response equals outcomes you are currently getting. You have the power to change your response to the events and have the opportunity to get the outcome you want.

2. Take action. This one is not that complex. Although action might begin in your mind, it does not become action unless you get it out of your mind and put your wheels on the ground and move forward. A decision to make something happen and no action equals nothing. You have got to take action for change to occur.

3. Develop four new success habits a year. Choose habits that you want to change. Studies have shown that 40% of

your life is lived essentially without having to think. In other words, almost half of our lives are lived on "auto pilot" following the habits you have created.

It takes about three months to change a habit. So Mr. Canfield tells us to work three months to change one habit, then choose another habit that needs changing and work on it for the next three months, and then repeat for two more habits over the next six months. This would change four habits that need changing each year.

4. Visualization. Most successful people have a visionary view of the future. Mr. Canfield challenges us to take a few minutes every day to imagine the feeling you will have when your goal is complete. It is a view looking back from the finish line to the journey traveled. By visualizing the goal completed, a person is more inclined to accomplish the goal.

5. Ask, ask, ask, and reject rejection. Most people are afraid of rejection so they don't ask. Mr. Canfield shared that his Chicken Soul for the Soul was rejected by 144 publishers before one publisher accepted it. He said that his book wouldn't be well read today if he had stopped trying after 100 rejections.

Failure is necessary to accomplish success. Give me a person who has never failed and I will give you a person

who has not tried hard enough.

6. Commit to constant and never-ending improvement. Successful people commit to learning something new every day. Mr. Canfield does daily what he calls the "hour of power." He meditates for 20 minutes, exercises 20 minutes, and then reads for 20 minutes. In one hour he grows in at least three areas. Regardless of your method, each of us has a lot to learn and we need to create opportunities to grow each day.

7. Face what isn't working. A lot of people don't face head on what is not working. It pushes people outside their comfort zone. If something is not working, identify that it is not working and bring about change. Putting your head in the sand allows the problem to continue and it will rob you of joy in your life over and over again.

8. Be a class act. People who are class acts leave places better than they find them. They add value to the lives of others they touch. They spin off positive energy. Mr. Canfield says you should maintain dignity and grace under pressure. Counteract meanness, pettiness, and vulgarity by modeling for others life worth living.

9. Find a way to serve. Research has shown that people who volunteer live longer, recover from illness faster and report being happier. Serving

tax reform. And by that I mean across-the-board tax-rate cuts, along with simplification and ending cronyst deductions.

A reformicon recently penned a piece arguing that traditional supply-siders (I guess like myself) only want to cut the top personal tax rate. Nonsense. Kemp-Roth, Reagan's '81 and '86 reforms and even George W. Bush's '03 reform were focused on across-the-board reductions in marginal tax rates. In fact, most of the time,

the tax-rate-cut percentage has been greatest for the middle class. And we all borrowed from the JFK tax cuts, which were across the board.

That's the most efficient pro-growth approach: incentive-oriented, economically neutral, tax-rate reduction. Targeted tax credits are inefficient government planning. And they won't produce growth.

Now, I would prefer a 15 and 28 percent personal tax reform that goes back to Reagan '86. This would end the 10, 25, 28 and 33 percent brackets that have plagued the middle class. It would increase

take-home pay for everyone, providing a bigger bang than child tax credits. I would also like a 20 percent corporate tax rate, along with territorial-based repatriation and cash expensing for investment, all of which would offer the greatest benefit to middle-income earners.

But a 5 percent growth target gets the ball rolling in the right direction. The Democrats won't do it. But the Republicans can.

Texas House public education chief announces his retirement

AUSTIN (AP) — Rep. Jimmie Don Aycock, the head of the powerful House Public Education Committee, is retiring.

A 68-year-old veterinarian from Killeen, Aycock led an overhaul of state academic curriculums in 2013, cutting the number of standardized tests high school students must pass to graduate from 15 to five. He also oversaw an expansion of charter schools.

This session, Aycock proposed a sweeping redesign of Texas' school finance system, even as a judge ruling declaring it unconstitutional was appealed to the Texas Supreme Court. That effort stalled in the Senate, which instead pushed school vouchers.

Aycock wept Monday while announcing, "I will not return."

That came a day after Houston Democratic Rep. Sylvester Turner also cried during a rousing floor farewell speech. First elected in 1988, Turner is running for Houston mayor.

Texas attorney general warns against flood cleanup scams

SAN MARCOS (AP) — Texas Attorney General Ken Paxton has toured some flood recovery centers and warned against price gouging and cleanup scams.

Paxton on Monday visited emergency and volunteer centers in San Marcos and Wimberley, some of the hardest-hit

areas of recent deadly flooding.

Paxton advises storm victims to ask contractors for references and be cautious of operators from outside of the affected areas.

Hays County is among 70 Texas counties under a state disaster declaration. More than 30 people were killed in Texas and Oklahoma last month by storms that dropped record rainfall, stranding people and even livestock.

A weather-related cattle drive happened Sunday in Dayton, 30 miles northeast of Houston. Several hundred cattle were herded from water-surrounded land to a railroad yard, an interim dry spot while flooding eases.

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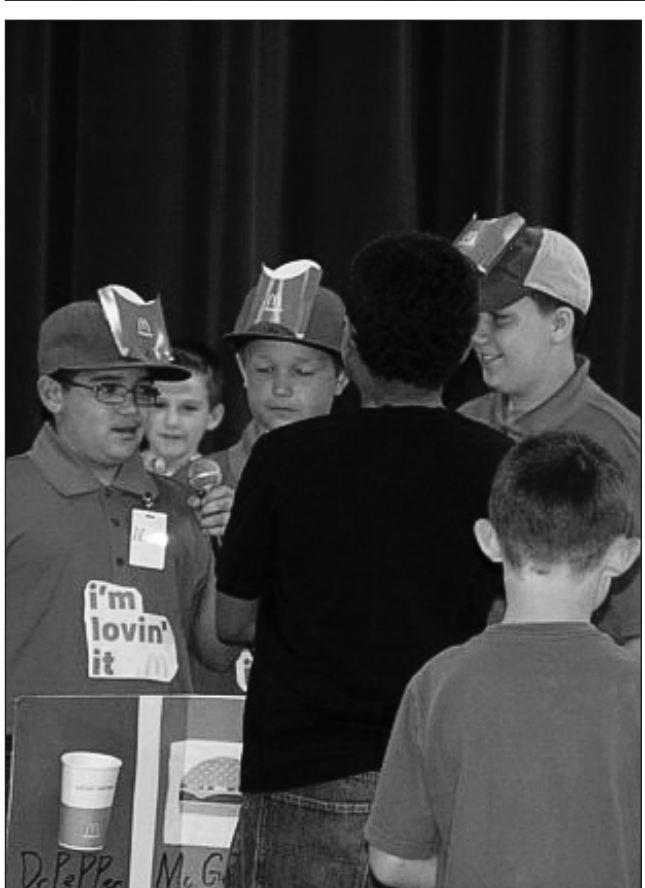
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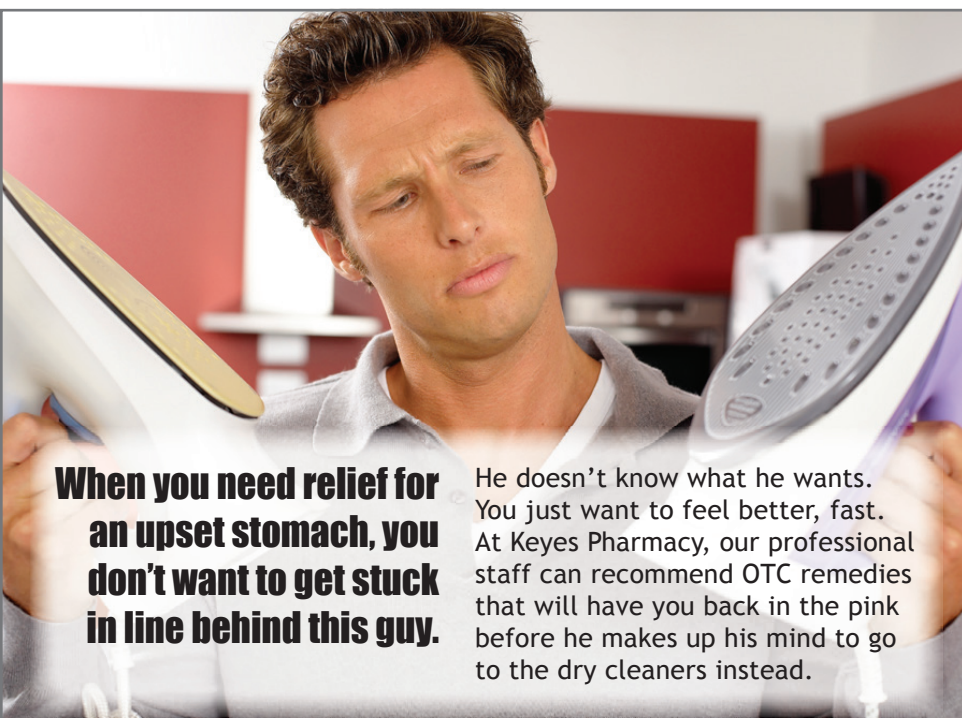
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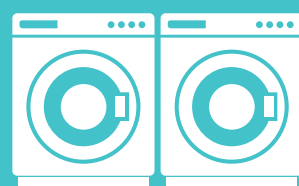
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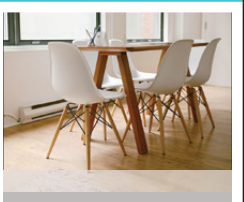
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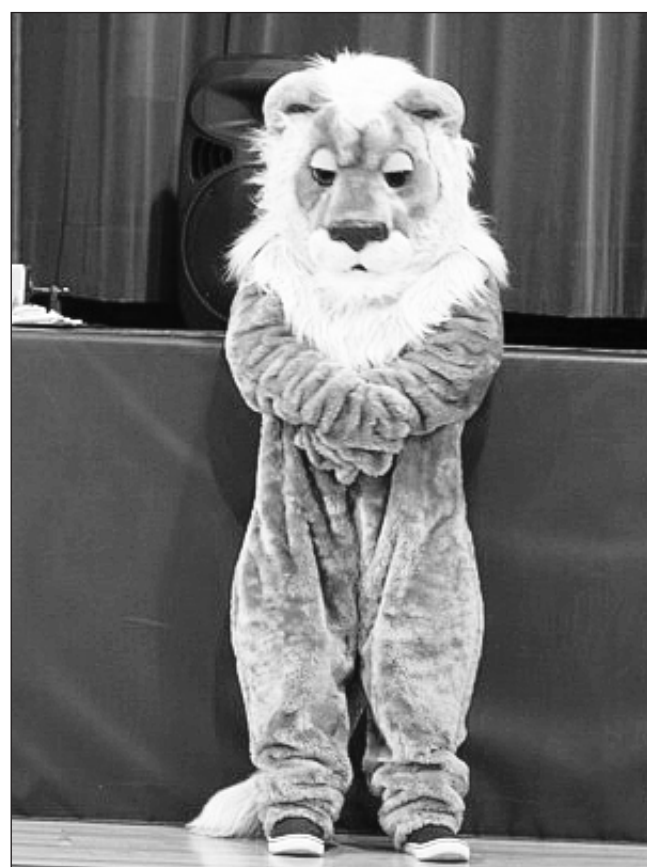
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AgriLife Extension sets Barley Crops Tour June 5 near Muleshoe

MULESHOE – The Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service offices in Parmer and Bailey counties will conduct a Barley Crops Tour on June 5 near Muleshoe.

To get to the barley trial, drive nine miles east of Muleshoe on U.S. Highway 70; then go north on Farm-to-Market Road 2910 for four miles; turn west and go 1.5 miles on County Road 40. The site will be on the north side of the road. The event is free. It will begin at noon, include a meal, and conclude by 1:30 p.m. Two Texas Department of Agriculture continuing education units will be offered.

“This is one of the best small grains trials we’ve had in our counties for quite some time,” said Curtis Preston, AgriLife Extension agent in Bailey County. “We urge anyone interested in barley production to make a point to attend this program as it’s really worth viewing.”

Preston said the speaker will be Dr. Calvin Trostle, AgriLife Extension agronomist from Lubbock.

Trostle will discuss area barley agronomics and will be comparing them to that of wheat.

“He’ll also offer optimal dates for planting barley on the High Plains,” Preston said.

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Texas lawmakers pass 'campus carry' as session winds down

AUSTIN (AP) — Guns, tax cuts and border security: new Republican Gov. Greg Abbott made those priorities his first six months on the job, and after the Texas Legislature ends Monday, he'll claim plenty of victories.

But not everyone is going home happy.

Democrats are bemoaning billions of dollars left unspent, tea party groups grumble that an overwhelming Republican majority wasn't conservative enough and frustrated university leaders resigned themselves to gun-packing students in their classrooms.

Passing any legislation on the last day requires near unanimous support, meaning activity is generally reserved for send-offs, both staid and tearful.

"I will not return," Rep. Jimmie Don Aycock, chairman of the powerful Education Committee, said Monday on the floor, announcing a surprise retirement as he choked back tears. When his colleagues surged forward to stand by his side, he grinned, tears falling: "That's going to make it

that much harder, guys." The farewell for the Killeen Republican came a day after powerful Houston Democratic Rep. Sylvester Turner, who spent more than a quarter-century in the Legislature, also formally announced his departure to run for mayor with a rousing but mournful address.

Abbott is marking the last day by publicly signing a bill that legalizes cannabis oil for epilepsy patients, which marijuana supporters consider a milestone in Texas, a state where proposals to even slightly relax pot laws have long been rebuffed.

Also on the way to Abbott's desk is a bill to legalize concealed handguns in college classrooms. It was the last major legislation approved by the House on Sunday and came over the objection of University of Texas System Chancellor William McRaven, the former Navy SEAL who directed the commando raid that killed Osama bin Laden.

"While it is not what we had hoped for, I respect

the Legislature's decision," McRaven said.

Allowing concealed handguns in college classrooms, known as "campus carry," had repeatedly stalled under Republican majorities in Texas since a student killed 32 people at Virginia Tech in 2007. But last-minute concessions that give skittish university leaders leeway to carve out "gun-free zones" finally won the support to push the bill through.

Guns brought into college classrooms must remain out of sight. But most everywhere else in Texas, openly carrying a holstered gun in public will become legal in September, another measure approved this session.

Unlike the previous 14 years under Rick Perry, meanwhile, lawmakers aren't being marched into a special summer session to duke out contentious issues such as immigration and abortion.

"You can't really leave the session with disappointment," said House Speaker Joe Straus, a San Antonio Republican.

"Thousands of bills are filed, and I'm guessing

about 20 percent of those have passed. I'm grateful for a system that isn't too loose."

Easing gun restrictions gives newcomers Abbott and Republican Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick, the powerful Senate leader who used big-money donors as a private sounding board for legislation, the bragging rights of succeeding where their predecessors failed. But it also provided extra cover with tea party voters who helped put them in office.

Republicans will leave Austin with a long list of conservative victories: the biggest Texas tax cuts in a decade, doubling spending on security at the border with Mexico and weakening the power of judges and public cor-

ruption prosecutors in liberal Travis County.

But other proposed crackdowns on immigration went nowhere, and efforts to defy the U.S. Supreme Court if gay marriage is legalized this summer fizzled. Both were craved by the most conservative bloc of Republican voters and lawmakers but drew defiance from outnumbered Democrats and business groups.

Rep. Tan Parker, chairman of the House Republican Caucus, shrugged off calls that more could have been done: "Conservative Republicans can and should be proud of this record."

Watching those hot-button issues wither was of little consolation to

Democrats, whose party was badly outnumbered in both chambers.

Health care was practically a nonissue and public schools only received a small bump in funding. When Abbott made boosting pre-K his first education initiative and dangled an extra \$130 million in front of schools — far less than what Texas cut from pre-K in 2011 while slashing the state budget to the bone — Democrats considered that figure as a starting point.

Instead, the bottom line never budged.

"Certainly the funds are there for a variety of those things," said Democratic state Rep. Chris Turner. "But the political will wasn't there."

Surveillance powers lapse as Congress debates renewal

WASHINGTON (AP) — The National Security Agency suspended its controversial collection of Americans' phone records as Congress grappled Monday with how to restore expired surveillance laws the government has used to track terrorists and spies.

No solution was likely before Tuesday at the earliest, and the Republican lawmaker who helped trigger the gridlock took credit in a message to supporters that also sought donations to his presidential campaign.

"Yesterday, I forced the expiration of the NSA's illegal spying program. Contribute \$5 now to show your support," tweeted Sen. Rand Paul of Kentucky.

While Paul sought to capitalize on his position, House-passed legislation was stalled in the Senate, where Majority Leader Mitch McConnell and other leading Republicans sought changes. In a rare Sunday session, they abandoned their opposition to the House bill in the face of

exhortations by the president and senior intelligence officials to pass it quickly. Paul undercut their leverage by blocking their attempt to extend current law.

At the Senate opened business Monday, McConnell announced that he would seek three amendments to the House bill, which would end NSA's collection phone records after a six month transition while allowing the agency to search the records held by the phone companies.

"We'll have a vote on that legislation as soon as we can," he said, without specifying a timeline.

McConnell characterized the proposed changes as modest, but a proposal to extend the transition to 12 months is bound to draw opposition.

A senior member of the House GOP leadership, Rep. Kevin McCarthy of California, said the best course would be for the Senate to approve the measure as written. But he pointedly did not rule out revisions. "I

don't know what the Senate could do. They said a lot of things," he told reporters.

The legal lapse affected not only the NSA's ability to collect domestic phone records in bulk. It also meant at least a temporary end to the FBI's authority to gather business records in terrorism and espionage investigations, and to more easily eavesdrop on a suspect who is discarding cellphones to avoid surveillance.

"We call on the Senate to ensure this irresponsible lapse in authorities is as short-lived as possible," White House spokesman Josh Earnest said in a statement issued Sunday night.

McConnell's attempts to pass a short term renewal of existing law failed late Sunday, thwarted by Paul.

"This is what we fought the Revolution over, are we going to so blithely give up our freedom? ... I'm not going to take it anymore," he said. Supporters wearing red "Stand With Rand" T-shirts packed the spectator gallery.

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Kerry's surgeon to accompany him to US for leg treatment

WASHINGTON (AP) — Secretary of State John Kerry's orthopedic surgeon will accompany him on the flight from Geneva to the United States for treatment of Kerry's broken leg, the State Department said Monday.

Spokesman John Kirby said that Dr. Dennis Burke will accompany Kerry to Boston to monitor the secretary's condition and "ensure he remains comfortable."

Kerry, 71, fractured his right femur Sunday when he struck a curb with his bicycle and fell on a regular Tour de France route southeast of Geneva. He has been receiving treatment at Geneva's main medical center, HUG.

Earlier, Kirby described Kerry as "in great spirits and active," making "a range of phone calls including with the president." He "never lost consciousness, his injury is not life-threatening and he is expected to make a full recovery," Kirby said.

Kerry's precise travel plans were not announced, but he will receive further care at Massachusetts General Hospital once he returns home. Kerry had hip

replacement surgery several years ago.

Kerry was taken by helicopter to the Geneva hospital after a paramedic and a physician who were traveling with his motorcade at the time of crash provided him with immediate attention. X-rays confirmed the extent of

his injury.

His regular government plane returned Sunday night to the United States carrying much of his staff and reporters who had accompanied him on the trip. He had hoped to leave later in the day on a plane fitted with special medical equipment.

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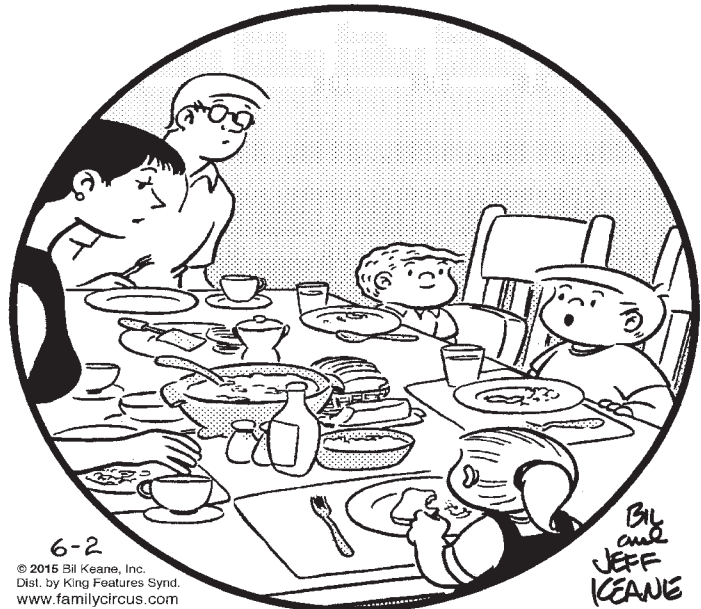

NFL star Ziggy Hood to host free football camp

AMARILLO — Jacksonville Jaguars star defensive tackle Evander "Ziggy" Hood is excited to announce that he will be hosting the Brown Buick GMC Fourth Annual Ziggy Hood Football Camp presented by Ruby Tequila's Restaurant in his hometown of Amarillo. The camp, which will be 100 percent free to all participants, will take place at Palo Duro High School from 8 a.m. to 1 p.m. on July 11.

Each year I try to use this camp to let kids know that they can be and do anything they want to do with hard work, determination and drive," Hood said. "I've been in their shoes, at a football camp, in the classroom and I'm proof that it can be done."

In order to host a 100 percent free camp, Hood has recruited several community partners such as Brown Buick GMC, Ruby Tequila's Restaurant and the Top of Texas Youth Football League. "I want to thank each one of our sponsors and volunteers that are making this event possible," said Hood. "Without their kind donations, we would not be able to bring this event to the community."

The Pampa News had the opportunity to talk with Ziggy after training camp on Monday afternoon. He was excited for the camp and is looking forward to it.

"It's a lot of hometown support for a local boy. I am trying to do so many positive things. There are lots of teachers and coaches that have helped me have this success in life," Hood said. "The thing I can do is try to come back and do something positive. There are a lot of kids doing good things in the Panhandle. I am trying to help the kids gain the upper hand."

Hood said it is hard to see any results in these players as of now since it is for middle school and elementary school aged children. He is also just in his fourth year of the camp, so some of them haven't made it to high school or college yet.

"It is kind of hard to tell until after graduation. Seeing the transition of skills and see them having fun," Hood said. "The camp makes them want to compete and have fun at the same time. They can remember everything they learned and apply it to his any sport they play."

When asked about the response the community of Amarillo and Palo Duro has had he said,

"It's been great. I have to represent my hometown school. They've done a lot for me. A lot of the values I learned came from the teachers," Hood

said. We had national teacher of the year at Palo Duro. There is a lot of stuff going on in this area of the country that a lot of people don't see. Doing something like that gets this school and community noticed. That is something I am trying to

do and bring to these kids a lot of things they do can get noticed."

Hood said the first year of the camp had under 100 kids. Then it grew to about 150-200 and this year they are expecting between 300 and 400.

"It's been great and it is

a pleasure and an honor to do something like that," Hood said. "We are trying to get them in shape and just have fun. I want to let them know I am a regular guy playing football with them."

Hood said they have to be smart and they may look at capping the camp off at about 350 participants.

"If the kids outnumber the support, it can get out of hand. You don't want to take too much attention away from the kids," Hood said. "Some will need individual work and you don't want to slow everybody up. We want a large group, but we don't want to be overwhelmed. If we could get more help that would be awesome."

Hood said the camp is mainly run by student athletes and staff from Palo Duro High School.

"I have other family members help and anybody else I can use to help these kids out,"

Hood said. "It doesn't take much to show them the drills, we just want to help them to have fun."

Hood said kids won't fully grasp skills he knows from being in the NFL right now because of their age.

"One thing I can do is show them and tell them to have fun in the game and passion for the game. If you have the right attitude you can come out on the better end of the stick," Hood said. "Football is football, but if you don't have the right attitude, it's going to be a weight on your shoulders. Something you need to do is enjoy yourself and have the passion for the game."

Does he teach them how to act professional off the field?

"They are still young. There are some high school kids out there. But kids are going to be kids. If you are thinking about doing something to hurt you, your family or your

school, then don't do it," Hood said. "There is going to be time to enjoy yourself and hang with your friends. A time when you're going to know what's right and wrong. We try to tell them what to do and what not to do and lead them on the right path."

Hood's favorite moment from the camp has been seeing the parents come out and support their little ones, even if kids and parents don't know what is going on.

"I had my family behind me and supporting me and pushing me to get everything I need when I was growing up," Hood said. "Parents there cheering their kids on is big for me. It tells me I am doing something positive and parents out there and enjoying it."

Hood said he is looking forward to the 2015 NFL season.

"I'm looking forward to playing on the best defensive line in the NFL. The Jaguars are going to have it," Hood said. "They've

done a great job getting pieces together the off-season. Training camp has helped us to come together and compete at the highest level."

■ NBA Finals preview and Major League Baseball update.

Unless you have been living under a proverbial rock in the sports world, then you know that LeBron James took his talents back to Cleveland and brought them back to the finals for the first time since being swept by the San Antonio Spurs in 2007.

The city of Cleveland has a long history of not having any championship team in any of the four major sports: (MLB, NBA, NHL (no team) and NFL).

They have the third longest championship drought in North America. Ottawa leads with 87 years since their last Stanley Cup. San Diego is second at 51 years since their last AFL title in 1963 (pre-Super Bowl).

Cleveland's drought sits at 50 years since their last AFL title in 1964.

What a homecoming that would be for Mr. James to have in his career for his hometown. If LeBron brings a championship back to his hometown in just his first season back in Cleveland, that is stuff Hollywood makes movies out of!

Golden State is the opponent for Cleveland. They are located in Oakland, Calif. That city hasn't seen a championship in 25 years since the 1989 World Series.

They are tied for the 13th longest drought in a North American city.

This championship will see a drought of a quarter century or half century come to an end for one city.

Now enough about the championship drought, let's get down to the matchup.

The series will begin in Oakland at 8 p.m., Thursday. Game two will be in Oakland at 7 p.m., Sunday. Games three and four will be in Cleveland. Game five will be in Oakland, with game six in Cleveland. If it goes to seven games, game seven will be in Oakland. All of the games can be found on your local ABC channel.

According to an article by ESPN, the teams enter with a combined 24-5 record this postseason. That is the best combined record by any two finals teams entering a finals series since 1991 when the Bulls

and Lakers were a combined 22-4.

The Warriors do not have a player on the roster with any NBA Finals experience. The last team to win a title without a player with finals experience was the 1991 Bulls. That was the first year Michael Jordan led the Bulls to the promised land.

LeBron James and Stephen Curry have met seven times, with James having the edge 5-2. James is playing in his fifth straight Finals, only the ninth player in NBA history to do that.

Curry has faced Anthony Davis, Marc Gasol and James Harden in the finals. Now he will face

LeBron James. Curry is the first player in NBA history to face every other member of the All-NBA first team in one postseason.

According to Vegas, Golden State has 5-12 odds to win the title and Cleveland has 19-10 odds. That means for everyone \$100 bet on Cleveland, with a win, that person would make an additional \$190. For Golden State, that person would make an additional \$41.67. That means Golden State is the favored team to win the series by Vegas.

How did each team get here?

Golden State swept New Orleans 4-0. Golden State beat Memphis 4-2 and Houston 4-1. Most of those games were not even close, the Warriors just plowed through opponents.

Cleveland swept Boston 4-0. Cleveland beat Chicago 4-2 and swept Atlanta 4-0. The only series that was somewhat of a battle was with the Bulls, but even then the Cavaliers breezed through teams.

What do I think will happen?

I think we will see one of the more competitive finals in recent history.

Since 1984, only six finals have gone to a game seven out of the 30 that have been played. I think we could easily see it go to game seven if both teams hold serve at home in the first four games.

It is very tough for me to pick a team as I love the sharpshooter in Curry but I also

love Cleveland since I am a Browns fan, and would love to see LeBron bring back that championship.

I think if it goes to game seven, Golden State will win because of their homecourt advantage in the game. I think if Cleveland is going to win, they will have to do it in six. Either way, because of the Golden State homecourt advantage, the Cavaliers will have to steal at least one road game to win the thing.

By the way, it is very tough to win in Oakland. Golden State went 39-2 at home this regular season. The Warriors have only lost one home game the entire postseason.

The only prediction I am making is that I think the series goes to six or seven games with all games ending in a 10 point spread or less. I will sit back and enjoy the James-Curry show.

MLB update

Baseball fans, hopefully you are still reading my column here as I promised you in the headline, I am going to give a recap of the baseball season after two months have passed.

This is the first benchmark for teams out of the long 162 game season, with the second one being the All-Star break in July.

The American League East is looking really down so far this year, with only the Yankees (26-25) and Rays (26-25) over .500. Boston is seven games under .500 and in last place in a division they have dominated in recent years. The Orioles have disappointed with a 23-26 record and the Blue Jays are in fourth just like they usually are.

The AL Central has a shocker at the top. The Minnesota Twins (30-19) are in first. Kansas City (29-19) is not a surprise in second. Detroit is right behind them at 28-24. The Indians and White Sox are bringing up the cellar again, but the shocker is the Twins aren't in the pack for last place with them.

A team that is surprising people nationwide, but not in Texas, is the Houston Astros. They are in first place in the AL West with a 31-20 record. The Angels are in second at 27-24 like they were supposed to. A team that has surprised many

is the Texas Rangers. They just got above .500 at 26-25 with Josh Hamilton's walk-off double Sunday night. The Mariners are in fourth at 24-26. The Athletics, who were penciled in before the season to repeat as division champs, are in the cellar at 20-33.

The National League East has the Washington Nationals on top at 28-22. This is where they were supposed to be, but in April they struggled. The Mets are still up there in second at 28-23 which is a minor surprise. The Braves are holding their own in third at 25-25. The Marlins and Phillies are two of the bottom three teams in MLB, which is not really a surprise.

The only surprise in the NL Central is the Reds are 22-27 and in fourth place. The Cardinals have the best record in baseball once again. The Cubs and Pirates are close behind at 26-22 and 26-24, respectively.

The NL West is really no surprise at all with the Dodgers in first at 29-20. The Giants are right there at 30-22. (You might ask why the Dodgers are in first with less wins, it is because of their winning percentage with the Giants having two more losses). The Padres are in third at 25-27. The Diamondbacks at 23-26. The Rockies bring up the rear at 22-26.

What will be interesting to watch in the next two months before the All-Star break benchmark is to see if the surprisingly successful teams will continue.

Watch the Minnesota Twins, New York Mets, Houston Astros, Texas Rangers and New York Yankees and see if they are still in the same position they are come July.

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Soccer beats baseball in game of Cuban detente

HAVANA (AP) — Two of the world's most baseball-obsessed nations declared an end to a half-century of hostility six months ago, raising hopes of warmer ties between the home of the Major Leagues and the source of some of its best talent.

But the most important act of sports diplomacy since then is taking place on a soccer field.

On Tuesday, the New

York Cosmos become the first U.S. professional team to play in Cuba since Presidents Raul Castro and Barack Obama announced that they were re-establishing diplomatic relations.

Cuban officials said the friendly match against Cuba's national team was a sign of soccer's growing popularity on the island, and an important step in the normalization of the re-

lationship between the U.S. and Cuba.

"In this new era that our two countries are living, this game is another link that will help establish the relations announced by the two presidents," said Antonio Garces, vice president of the Cuban Soccer Association.

While the two governments have yet to reopen embassies after nearly half a year of complicated negotiations, Havana has been flooded by a surge of U.S. tourists, as well as delegations of lawmakers, businesspeople and athletes.

A group of retired NBA stars held a training camp for Cuban players in April and Cuban officials have said a Major League exhibition game is planned for the near future, although Major League officials have said no plans have been made.

The Cosmos, who are leading the standings in the second-tier North American Soccer League, arrived Sunday night, and were training ahead of Tuesday afternoon's match at 30,000-seat Pedro Marrera stadium, which is to be televised nationally in Cuba.

They were accompanied by honorary president Pele, the legendary Brazilian star who played for the original Cosmos franchise as his career was ending. Asked about the bribery scandal that exploded last week in

soccer's global governing body, he declined to criticize FIFA or its head, Sepp Blatter.

"We are players and we want to provide joy to the public and people. What happens with executives doesn't interest me," he said. "He's a man who has been there 25 years. You have to respect him."

While Cuba is far from a soccer powerhouse, the sport hasn't been spared the waves of departures that have robbed the island's teams of many top-ranked athletes. Forward Maykel Galindo left in 2005 and went on to play for several U.S. teams. Midfielder Osvaldo Alonso abandoned Cuba two years later and now plays in Seattle.

Cuba's relatively weak international soccer performance hasn't stopped the sport from spreading on the island, with growing numbers watching professional games on television and playing on dusty fields and neighborhood streets.

"Soccer is a people's sport that's gained a lot of popularity in recent years, in Cuba and the United States, and without a doubt it'll help tear down barriers and open doors," Garces said.

The last professional U.S. soccer team to visit Cuba was the now-defunct Chicago Sting, which played in 1978 after President Jimmy Carter moved to warm ties with Cuba and open the interests section in Havana that both countries want to soon convert into a full embassy.

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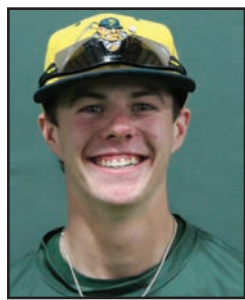

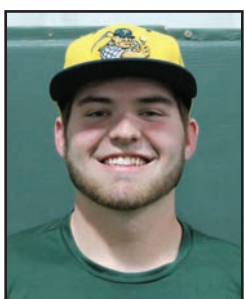

Sherman tells the newspaper that he took the high school job because he didn't want to put his family through another move.

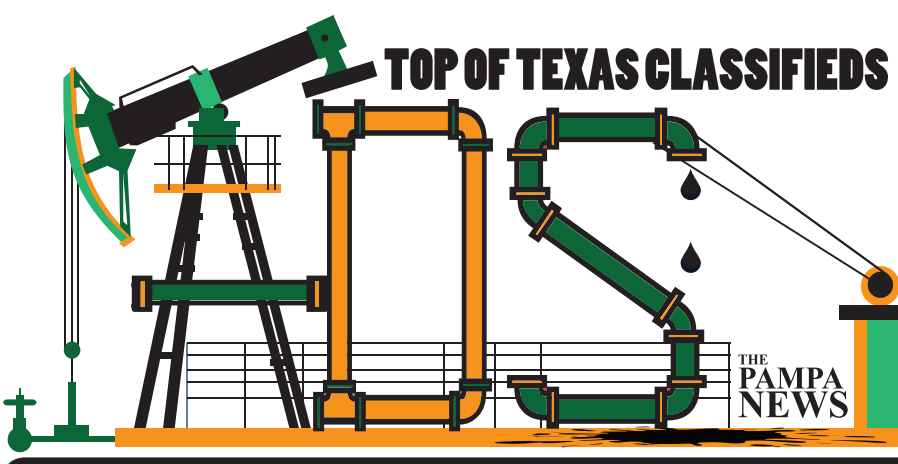
