VFW honors Martha Hadley and three sons

So what do you call a soldier who survived mustard gas and pepper spray? A seasoned veteran.
To kick off Tuesday night's celebration and honoring of the Hadley family, all in attendance were thanked for being there, and there was a special thank you to Martha's family for tolerating Debbie's phone calls, endless questions and working to get her be at the VFW for their recognition.
The members of the Panhandle Piecemakers Quilt Guild presented Martha with a birthday card in celebration of her 88th birthday.
Black then thanked all those who came in support of Martha either as friends or family members.
"It is grand to see Martha back at the Post for the night," she said. "She is a face and energy that has been missed. Miss Martha

celebrated her 88th birthday June 1."
She then shared a background about Martha that read as follows:
"There are volumes of information that many of you could share about Miss Martha. I wanted to share a little about her, so I gleaned information from her family. I now have their phone numbers on auto dial.
"Martha had an older brother Ralph, known as Junior, who has passed away and she has a younger brother, Amos, who is 85. She is mother to three sons: Bob, Larry and Ronnie. She has been GiGi to six grandchildren, two great-grandchildren and one great-great-grandchild.
"She was raised in the Sunflower State, Kan. Her mother passed away when Martha was seven years old. She and her brothers were separated and sent to different family members to help

raise them. Families then, in the mid '30s were strapped financially, so keeping the siblings together wasn't possible. Martha learned to be frugal and how to work at an early age.
"Martha graduated from High School in Ft. Lupton, Colo., located north of Denver.
She worked in Talley's Cafe in Zurich, Kan., population, fewer than 100. The story I was told, while working at Talley's, she served a cold adult beverage to a man named Don Hadley. She married Don in July 1946, when she was 19. Don was a WWII Veteran."
She went on to say that Martha has been in Pampa for 51 years. Some of the places she worked in Pampa were M.E. Moses, behind the lunch bar and Horace Mann Elementary School in the cafeteria. She would

Analysis: In voting rights, who's a person?

When most people hear the phrase "one person, one vote," they don't stop to think about who counts as a person.
The U.S. Supreme Court gets to answer that in a case — Evenwel v. Abbott — that started here in Texas. The plaintiffs contend their votes don't count as much as those of voters in other state Senate districts because the districts are designed to have the same number of humans in them, not the same number of voters.
It's a simple idea, but changing who's counted — the voters, instead of the humans — would wreck the country's political maps, particularly in states like Texas where large numbers of people are not eligible to vote.
This is not only about drawing maps and which politicians win and lose in the next elections. It does not concern who is allowed to vote, but how their votes are distributed. It's about representation — clout, if you'd rather — for the adults who are allowed to vote and for the felons and little kids and immigrants who live here but cannot.
One big problem is that there is no reliable count of eligible voters. The U.S. Census Bureau counts the population, but its numbers on eligible voters are merely estimates. At the first sign of a difference in opinion — and litigation is one of the few certainties when political maps are drawn — that federal agency would be on trial.

Changing who is counted changes who counts. If the measure is population and each district has to be about the same size, then each person theoretically has the same political power. Not all of them can vote, of course: Only adult citizens and non-felons can do that. But everyone is represented, at least on paper, and everyone who gets elected has some obligation to take care of everyone in his or her district.
You can argue that what makes sense on paper doesn't make sense in real life. Not everybody votes, for one thing, and variable turnout in each district means some people get into office with fewer votes than others. Turnout varies so much that some people got into office with fewer supporters than candidates who lost races in other districts. It takes more than 50 percent of the voters to win, no matter how many or how few there are.
Even without turnout variables, not all districts are alike. Take congressional districts, for instance, since they are required to be as close to the same size in population as possible.
The 36 congressional districts in Texas each had 698,488 people in them when they were drawn. That seeming exactitude hides big differences. The 17th Congressional District, represented by Bill Flores, R-Bryan, has the same number of people in it as the 33rd, represented by Marc Veasey, D-Fort Worth. But Flores' district has 532,324 adults — 62,868 more than Veasey's. That means there are more children in the Veasey district than in the Flores district.

But the little ones are not the only ineligible voters. Veasey's district also happens to have the smallest number of people who are allowed to vote — 305,120 — a number that excludes non-citizens as well as children. More than half of the people in his district are ineligible to vote.
On the other end of the scale, the biggest citizen voting-age population is represented by Lamar Smith, R-San Antonio; his 21st Congressional District has 489,820 such people.
Each district is the same size, but 70.1 percent of Smith's residents can vote and only 43.7 percent of Veasey's are eligible.
In a perfect election with 100 percent turnout among people eligible to vote, the voters in Veasey's district would have proportionately more power. It would take fewer of them to put someone in Congress than it would take in Smith's district. That said, each of the winners in those two districts would go to Washington, D.C., to represent the same number of people.
The plaintiffs in Evenwel v. Abbott live near Houston, in districts that are more like the areas represented by Flores and Smith. They contend in their lawsuit that lawmakers could have drawn districts with about the same populations and eligible voters at the same time, but instead packed them into districts in a manner that diluted their votes. They argued, too, that the U.S. Constitution protects voters as well as residents. A lower court of three judges — each appointed by a Republican president, George W. Bush — ruled against them.

bake cinnamon rolls and sheet cakes to sell at auctions where Larry was the auctioneer. Along with all that, she also raised three boys.

Black then asked if the boys would mind sharing a story about their mother. Each son gave a wonderful, fun story related to their mother and shared how much they love her.

Along the way, she has always keep herself very busy. She has been involved in 4-H,

Girl Scouts, her church in the Women's Ministry, the Quilt Guild here in Pampa and the VFW Ladies Auxiliary. Martha is a Charter Member of the Panhandle Piecemakers Quilt Guild here for 27 years and a member of the VFW Post 1657 Ladies Auxiliary for 40 years. She has been a driving force in making multiple Quilts of Valor for deserving military Warriors.

"I have lost count how many quilts she has donated to this cause," Black said.

She has enjoyed cooking, sewing clothing, quilting, embroidery, reading and having a spirit to serve others.

Many of Martha's friends will attest to the fact that Martha was at the head of the line when it came to a service project. She wants

to help others... always others first.

"One of the things I noticed here at the post, was during meal time. Martha, even though she had earned the respect of coming right after the veterans in the chow line, she ALWAYS insisted others go ahead of her," Black said. "I am trying to learn what she exemplifies about courtesy and keeping others first. She is probably feeling uneasy right now because the attention is focused on her, but she deserves it. She deserves an 'Atta Boy.'"

"Sometimes we don't know why people are placed into our lives," she continued. "Three years ago, I only knew the face of Martha Hadley. She is now a mentor to me, someone I admire. I don't know why I have received her blessing but I am so thankful, as I know each of you are."

At that time, Ladies Auxiliary president, Nelda Martin, awarded Martha with a 20-year pin and shirt for her participation in the Ladies Auxillary as well as a plaque.

Next, a special song "I Love You a Bushel and a Peck" was played for Martha. It's a song she has been heard singing to her grandies and friends. Her great-great-granddaughter Chloe sand her the song and promptly embraced her "GiGi" around the neck.

Black then gave an update on the last posting on the Quilts of Valor website, which showed that 118,923

quilts have been awarded since 2003 to Warriors that have been touched by war.

"Many of you already know the story of Catherine Roberts' quest to cover veteran men and women that have or are currently dealing with the affects of war," she said. "The quilts are a very small token of gratitude and a tangible way to honor our men and women who have signed on the line of commitment to honor and defend our country."

"I had mentioned earlier that Miss Martha has spent endless hours at a sewing machine, stitching away on these quilts. Three years ago, when I first introduced the idea to the Ladies, Martha was at the head of the line ready to do her part... others first, yet again. She and I had this conversation about thread. Since generally speaking the fabric used is red, white and blue, I thought that best color of thread we would be using would be a neutral or at least red, white or blue. As we would gather to sew, I would do some of the pressing while the others continued to assemble at the machines. While pressing, I noticed that some of the thread used was green! Who would dare to not use the "right" thread color? Miss Martha had used green thread in her bobbin. She told me she it was already on her machine and she wasn't going to waste it. Point made.

"Fast forward to January 2015. During a meeting, I asked Miss Martha about her sons. She told me that all of her sons served during the Vietnam Era. Bob, who was in the Navy, was stationed in California.

Larry, also in the Navy, had two tours in Vietnam, and Ronnie, who was in the Army, was stationed in Germany. All of her boys had to deal with the trials that came with being in the service during Vietnam and Post Vietnam.

"I asked Martha if she had made her boys a Quilt of Valor. She said 'Not yet.' We decided it was time. Another month passed and her foot became an issue. She had delivered several six and a half inch blocks to me that she had cut out and wondered if they could be used. I told her that I would use the pattern that she likes to make, that Suzie Edwards designed. When I laid out the pieces, there were enough blocks for three quilts, exactly. When the sewing began, I began using a 'neutral' color, then like a two by four it hit me. There MUST be green thread used in these quilts somewhere. To honor Martha, somewhere in the stitching is some green thread. I showed the finished tops to our Guild. Immediately, three women volunteered to quilt and bind them."

After speaking about Martha, Black introduced her three sons for their own recognition.

"Tonight we have been able to honor the mother of three sons," she said. "These three sons donned the uniform to serve and protect our nation," she said.

A circle was then made around the room, and each quilt for the sons was passed from one person to the next, symbolizing a unity that supports and loves the military family.

After many surgeries and learning to "live life" with a limp and other medical issues, Ruth felt a desire to be an Orthopedic Nurse. She attended Saint Anthony's School of Nursing and graduated with her degree in 1955. She worked at Highland General Hospital in Pampa, the Veterans Hospital and St. Anthony's Hospital both in Amarillo. Her two favorite places to work were Columbia Presbyterian Hospital in New York City and at High Plains Baptist Hospital in Amarillo where she worked from November 1969 until November 1994. All total, Ruth served in the nursing field for more than 40 years!

She married the love of her life, Bill Morrow, on Sept. 12, 1964, and became a Step-Mother to Randy, Patricia and Debbie. To their union, they added two more daughters: Cynthia and Angela. Bill and Ruth were married for 49 1/2 years. Bill died on June 23, 2014, and less than a year later, his Best Friend joined him. They are now together forever.

With all the adversities in her life, Ruth never complained about her medical situation or her pain and did not consider herself as a woman with a handicap. 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Tales from the Final Frontier

Will a new console save Nintendo from fading into irrelevancy.

I have often been a little hard on Nintendo. But I need to clarify that Nintendo does have their perks.

They clearly do not care what the media or, dare I say, fanboys of Xbox and PlayStation think.

There is such a loyalty to Nintendo from their supporters that they don't need support from everyone else.

I also think their target market is a little different than those of Sony and Microsoft.

While Xbox and PlayStation cater to those who love the third-party games such as Call of Duty, Assassin's Creed, Bioshock and Fallout; Nintendo uses the strength of their own games paired with the family aspect of gaming.

That is something that keeps me interested in Nintendo, even if I don't buy their products right now.

I cannot wait until the day Peyton is old enough to enjoy playing a video game with his parents the same way my family played games like Mario Party, Super Smash Bros. and Donkey Kong Country. Notice I said Nintendo titles when talking about games I played with my family.

Games like Halo are fun and all, but the direction Sony and Microsoft are heading, only allowing multi-player games online, makes it difficult for families to play video games together on one console.

Sadly, the Wii U has not lived up to the expectations that Nintendo had in mind from the get-go.

According to VGChatz.com, a business intelligence and research firm relating to worldwide gaming hardware and software sales, The Wii U has only sold 9.14 million units as of February 2015. The PlayStation 4 has sold 19.05 million and the Xbox One has sold 11.3 million. Keep in mind the Wii U came out in 2012, an entire year before the other two consoles came out.

Recognizing the failure of the Wii U, Nintendo is already tinkering with a new console.

Techradar.com reports this new

console, codenamed Nintendo NX, could run on a version of Android. They also report the Nintendo president, Satoru Iwata, is calling it "a 'new concept,'" not a "replacement" for the 3DS or the Wii U.

Techradar.com speculates that Nintendo may be trying to make a portable/console hybrid which would allow gamers to take their console on the go. The Wii U is similar to this in that you can play on the tablet part of the console, but have to remain proximate to the console.

An current-gen-level console with this concept would be great, but at what cost to the gamer?

Techradar also suggests that Nintendo NX will need better launch games to be successful. Remember when the Wii came out and Nintendo released "The Legend of Zelda: Twilight Princess" on both the Wii and the Gamecube? Nintendo needs to follow that model with whatever comes out the same time the Nintendo NX is released.

Techradar believes the new console could come in the holiday season of 2016. This would be Nintendo's best bet. If you are going to compete with Sony and Microsoft, take some of their sales around Christmas. But launch some good games with it. Not remakes!

Hillary's plans to stuff the ballot box in 2016

Hillary Clinton has laid out her game plan for winning back the White House for herself and her husband next year. Let's hope Republicans were paying attention.

She apparently decided it won't be enough to rely on the 66 million people who voted twice for Barack Obama, many of whom are disillusioned by the failure of "hope and change." Obama promised an end to wars in the Middle East, a more prosperous economy for the average American and more harmonious race relations, but all three problems have only gotten worse.

Seeing as Clinton won't have the youthful exuberance that propelled Obama to his unlikely double victory, she plans to build a whole new electorate out of people who didn't vote for Obama. That was the gist of her speech in Houston last week, which her friends at MSNBC called a "far-reaching vision for expanding access to the ballot box."

Who are the new voters to whom Clinton wants to give "access to the ballot box"? They include felons and noncitizens, along with anyone who can't prove identity, citizenship or residence within the voting precinct.

She also plans to harvest millions of new votes by expanding the dangerous practices of same-day registration and early voting, which enable Democrats to badger, berate, bribe or bamboozle reluctant low-information voters to the polls. Democratic Party and union workers can identify reluctant voters and harass them until the party worker verifies that they have actually cast their ballots.

In her new book, "Adios, America," Ann Coulter asks a relevant question: "Should Democrats be given 30 million new voters?" Answering her own question, Ann says, "There is simply no reason for Republicans to legalize 30 million people who will vote 8-2 against them."

Though Clinton gave lip service to the notion that "every citizen" should vote, her Democratic allies are in court trying to stop every reasonable means of verifying a voter's citizenship. That's no surprise because, according to a recent Rasmussen survey, the majority (53 percent) of Democrats believe that noncitizens,

including even immigrants who came here illegally, should be allowed to vote.

Clinton's commitment to voting by "every citizen" is belied by her earlier promise to "go even further" than Obama on amnesty for immigrants who came here illegally. By "go even further," she explained, she would include all 11 million-plus (not just Obama's 5 million), and she would give them full citizenship with voting rights, not just "legal status" with permission to work.

The Census Bureau estimates that 22 million noncitizen adults, both those here legally and those here illegally, are living permanently in this country. That's almost 10 percent of our population that is 18 or older, and more than half of those noncitizens are concentrated in just five states.

Arizona, which is on the front lines of illegal immigration, has been trying to require proof of citizenship as part of voter registration ever since that simple requirement was approved by Arizona's voters in 2004. The Obama administration refused to add the proof-of-citizenship requirement to the federal form that Arizona must use for "motor voter" registrations.

Clinton has assigned her top lawyer to sue Wisconsin to overturn its effective voter ID law, one of the best in the nation. But that's not all. The New York Times just reported that left-wing billionaire George Soros has agreed to pour \$5 million into a national effort to protect and expand early voting.

Federal law provides that voting in federal elections take place in even years on the Tuesday after the first Monday in November, also known as Election Day. Just as no member of a jury should vote on guilt until all the evidence has been presented at a trial, voters should not cast their ballots before political campaigns are over.

The U.S. Constitution requires that the delegates to the Electoral College cast their ballots for president on the same day. Many states also continue to adhere to the tradition of Election Day's being on one day in November, not spread out over the ridiculous 35 days that resulted in a political circus in Ohio in 2012.

The integrity of elections is just as important as the universally accepted rules for jury trials, whereby jurors are asked to keep their minds open and withhold judgment until after closing arguments. Spreading

Imperial overstretch

Toward the end of the presidency of George H.W. Bush, America stood alone at the top of the world — the sole superpower.

After five weeks of "shock and awe" and 100 hours of combat, Saddam's army had fled Kuwait back up the road to Basra and Bagdad.

Our Cold War adversary was breaking apart into 15 countries. The Berlin Wall had fallen. Germany was reunited. The captive nations of Central and Eastern Europe

were breaking free. Bush I had mended fences with Beijing after the 1989 massacre in Tiananmen Square. Mikhail Gorbachev and Boris Yeltsin were friends.

The president declared the coming of a "new world order." And neocons were chattering about a new "unipolar world" and the "benevolent global hegemony" of the United States.

Consider now the world our next president will inherit.

North Korea, now a nuclear power ruled by a 30-something megalomaniac, is fitting ballistic missiles with nuclear warheads. China has emerged as the

great power in Asia, entered claims to all seas around her, and is building naval and air forces to bring an end to a U.S. dominance of the western Pacific dating to 1945.

Vladimir Putin is modernizing Russian missiles, sending ships and planes into NATO waters and air space, and supporting secessionists in Eastern Ukraine.

The great work of Nixon and Reagan — to split China from Russia in the "Heartland" of Halford Mackinder's "World Island," then to make partners of both — has been undone. China and Russia are closer to each other and more antagonistic toward us than at any time since the Cold War. Terrorists from al-Qaida

and its offspring and the Islamic Front run wild in Libya, Syria, Iraq, Yemen, Nigeria and Somalia. Egypt is ruled by a dictatorship that came to power in a military coup.

Japan is moving to rearm to meet the menace of North Korea and China, while NATO is but a shadow of its former self. Only four of 28 member nations now invest 2 percent of their GDP in defense.

With the exception of the Soviet Union, some geostrategists contend, no nation, not defeated in war, has ever suffered so rapid a decline in relative power as the United

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
Oliver 'David' Putman

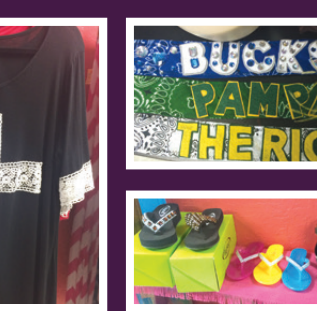
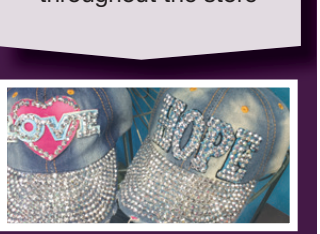

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Officer recorded in Texas pool party incident resigns

MCKINNEY (AP) — A white police officer in suburban Dallas has resigned after he was recorded on video pushing a black teenage girl to the ground outside a pool party and brandishing his gun at other teens.

Officer David Eric Casebolt's actions were "indefensible," though he was not pressured to quit, McKinney Police Chief Greg Conley said at a press conference after the officer submitted his resignation Tuesday.

A teenager at the party posted a video online showing Casebolt's interactions with the teens as officers responded last Friday to calls about the gathering at a community-owned swimming pool in McKinney. The 41-year-old former Texas state trooper and 10-year veteran of the McKinney force was put on administrative leave after the incident. His lawyer, Jane Bishkin of Dallas, confirmed Tuesday he had quit the force.

Conley said a review of the video showed that "our policies, our training and our practices do not support his actions."

Twelve officers responded to the report of fights and

a disturbance at the Craig Ranch North Community Pool in a middle-class area of McKinney, which is north of Dallas. "Eleven of them performed according to their training," Conley said. Casebolt did not, he said.

"He came into the call out of control and the video showed he was out of control during the incident," Conley said.

Casebolt's actions are under investigation and no decision has been made whether charges will be filed against him, Conley said. Charges of interfering with an officer and evading arrest against the only man arrested during Friday's incident have been dropped, Conley said. Everyone else detained was released.

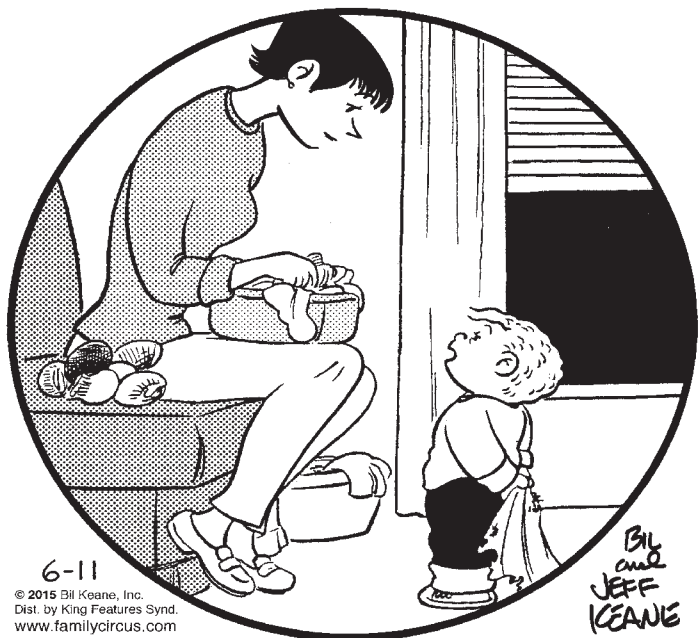
Bishkin declined to say where Casebolt is now and said the officer had received death threats. The attorney said she would release more information at a news conference Wednesday.

People who demonstrated this week at a McKinney school compared the city to Baltimore and Ferguson, Missouri, where use of force by police triggered widespread protests and violence.

DEAR ABBY: I'm a 73-year-old man. Over the years I have sometimes cried over sad, heartwarming stories in books or on TV, especially those involving children.

I have also lost several loved ones, and although I was as sad about these losses as anyone else, I was never able to shed tears over it.

Why do I cry over things that don't pertain to me or anybody in my life, but can't when someone I love passes away? Is something wrong with me? — **TEARLESS IN WICHITA**

DEAR TEARLESS: Tears can be cathartic, but people react to death in different ways. Not everyone can cry on cue, even if it would be a relief to be able to. Sometimes there's just a deep "ache," like lead in one's chest. In your case, it may be less painful or threatening to cry over a sad movie than a funeral. When tears finally come (usually over something less significant), they can be more copious than one would expect because they have been bottled up.

DEAR LIVING: If your wife prefers, out of concern for her privacy, not to talk to a therapist who's connected with her job, that is her choice. But that does not mean she shouldn't get counseling elsewhere to help her make rational decisions about her future. A support group that could also be helpful to her is the Straight Spouse Network (straightspouse.org), which has been mentioned before in my column.

As for you, my friend, you should consult a lawyer who specializes in family law and gender issues. Lambda Legal (lambdalegal.org) should be able to refer you. With help, you should be able to work out a fair and reasonable custody arrangement, should it

LeBron, Cavs survive Warriors comeback, win Game 3 96-91

CLEVELAND (AP) — LeBron James is doing more than ever. With the Cavaliers missing two All-Stars, he has no choice.

"I'm so outside the box right now," he said. And two wins from a championship — one like no other.

Pushed by a crowd howling to see Cleveland's 51-year title drought end, James scored 40 points, his new sidekick Matthew Dellavedova added 20 and the Cavaliers survived

Golden State's furious fourth-quarter comeback led by Stephen Curry for a 96-91 win over the Warriors on Tuesday night to take a 2-1 lead in the NBA Finals.

James added 12 rebounds and eight assists in 46 minutes, his third stellar performance in his fifth straight finals. The Cavs, who won Game 2 at Golden State for their first ever finals win, got their first at Quicken Loans Arena, which shook from start to finish.

They'll have a chance to take a commanding 3-1 lead in the best-of-seven series in Game 4 on Thursday night.

Through three games, James has played 142 of 154 possible minutes, scored 123 points and taken 107 shots. With Kyrie Irving and Kevin Love out with injuries, it's all on James to deliver. So far, he has.

"I'm just trying to do whatever it takes to help our team win," he said. "It's the finals,

and it's whatever it takes. This is a totally different challenge."

Cleveland nearly threw Game 3 away. The Cavs, who led 92-83 with 51 seconds left, had to withstand a scoring flurry by Curry.

The league's MVP finally found his shooting touch in the fourth quarter, scoring 17 points as the Warriors, who trailed by 20 in the third, refused to go away. Golden State got a huge lift from re-

serve David Lee, but they rode Curry, who made five 3-pointers — his last with 18.9 seconds to pull the Warriors within 94-91.

Cleveland then caught a break when referee Danny Crawford blew an inadvertent whistle with 17.5 seconds to go after Golden State appeared to force a turnover. The officials, who have come under scrutiny for several missed calls in the series, then reviewed the play and it was

clear that Klay Thompson was out of bounds when he made contact with the ball that Dellavedova was holding in his hands.

James was fouled and made two free throws with 16.8 seconds left.

On Golden State's last possession, Andre Iguodala appeared to get fouled on a 3-point attempt and the Cavs pulled down the rebound to close out a win that nearly slipped away.
