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Moultrie comes to Pampa to the tune of pastor

Throughout her life and her career, Pampa native Ruby Moultrie has followed the path that God has taken her on.

Moultrie came to Pampa for the first time when she was two years old and went to school here in town. But she also enjoyed being involved at her church, St. Mark church in south Pampa.

Singing through life

She knew her gift from The Lord was her ability to sing. "I wouldn't talk to people, I did not like having conversations," Moultrie said. "So I would sing and that would be my conversation."

Moultrie grew up and graduated from Pampa High School, followed by West Texas State (now West Texas A&M) and started teaching in Dimmitt for two years and then traveled on to Dallas for Southern Methodist

University. There she received two masters degrees, a masters in vocal performance from SMU and a masters in sacred music from Perkins School of Theology.

"I should have known that God was having a plan for me way back when, but I didn't know that," Moultrie said. "I still thought music would be my life."

Moultrie stayed in Dallas and taught at a school called music masters for a few years and then went to Lubbock and worked for the school district and South Plains College for 22 years. During that time she went on the Walk to Emmaus in 1995.

Answering God's call to ministry

"It's a spiritual weekend, 72 hours," Moultrie said. "You just sit in God's presence and if you listen he will guide you to your next journey."

Five years later, on a Wednesday



afternoon while working as a choir director at First United Methodist Church in Levelland, the pastor came in and told her about her next calling.

"The pastor came in and said, 'Moultrie, God is calling you into the ministry,'" Moultrie said. "I looked back at him and said, 'Jessie Hodge, who was the

pastor at the time, you better go back and listen again, I don't get that message."

This was in the spring of 2000 the following summer she was named the Reverend Ruby Moultrie.

She was appointed to her first church in Anton, Texas, in De-

Texas primary voters to get more say in 2016

Texas primary voters are about to have a bigger say in the 2016 presidential race than their parties previously planned.

In recent weeks, the Texas Democratic Party and the Republican Party of Texas have finalized plans to allocate all their national convention delegates based on the outcomes of their primaries, a departure from normal for the Democrats and a return to normal for Republicans.

It is a far bigger deal for the Democrats, who announced Tuesday that they were doing away with the "Texas Two-Step," the process by which some of their delegates are distributed on primary day then the rest in caucuses.

Last month, the national party's rules committee denied the Texas Democrats' bid to continue that longtime tradition.

"Under the new plan, individual Democratic primary voters will have more power in the selection of their nominee," Crystal Perkins, executive director of the Texas Democratic Party, said in a statement.

For the Republicans, the move is less significant but accomplishes the same thing. Last summer, the Texas GOP emerged from its convention planning to try its own two-tiered process, allocating some of its delegates on primary day then the rest at its 2016 convention.

National Republicans recently balked at that change — it

would have been the first time Texas Republicans went that route — and the state party reverted to its usual practice of distributing all delegates on primary day.

"It's a change, but the change is that there's no change," said Beth Cubriel, executive director of the Texas GOP.

The overall result is that come March 1, both parties will be putting more of their delegates at stake — all of them — than their earlier plans called for. The Democrats expect to allocate more than 250 delegates, while the Republicans will have 155. In each case, Texas will be the party's largest prize — or close to it — on March 1, when at least several other states have set primary contests.

Under the "Texas Two-Step" model, the Democrats would have distributed three-quarters of their delegates based on the results of the primary, then a quarter based on the results of a series of caucuses afterward. On Friday, the Democratic National Committee denied the state party's request for a waiver that would have made the "Texas Two-Step" possible in 2016.

The Republicans, meanwhile, had been planning to allocate 80 percent of their delegates based on the results of the primary then 20 percent based on the results of a straw poll at its state convention, which is scheduled for May in Dallas.

That plan, however, conflicted with a new RNC rule that bounds all delegates to a single statewide contest.

DPS Trooper seizes more than 18 pounds of methamphetamine

AMARILLO — The Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) conducted a traffic stop Wednesday on Interstate 40, yielding more than 18 pounds of methamphetamine valued at more than \$1.5 million.

At approximately 9:07 p.m., a DPS trooper conducted a traffic stop on a 2015 Chevrolet Suburban traveling eastbound on I-40, for a traffic violation, near Conway in Carson County.

The driver of the Suburban was identified as Miguel A. Abreu, 35, of Lawrenceville, Ga. During the traffic stop, the trooper discovered 16 bundles of methamphetamine in the rear quarter panel.

Abreu was placed under arrest for possession of a controlled substance over 400 grams, a first-degree felony, and booked into the Carson County Jail.

The illegal drugs were allegedly being transported from Pamo-






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Bald eagle illegally captured in 2012 in Texas set free

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — A bald eagle has been rehabilitated and freed after being rescued in 2012 in Texas following an alleged attempt to capture the bird for falconry. An official with the nonprofit group Last Chance Forever said Tuesday that the eagle was released into the wild in June. Executive director John Karger (KAR'-jer) declined to say where the eagle was freed. Karger says the 3-year-

old male was treated for avian pox and a broken beak, suffered during illegal attempts to capture it. San Antonio-based Last Chance Forever has a federal permit to rehabilitate injured birds. A Houston-area man was convicted of violating the Migratory Bird Treaty Act, put on probation and fined \$15,000 for disturbing the nest on his property. Prosecutors say he intended to catch and train the eaglet for falconry.

Police seek help after nut theft, post mug shot of squirrel

SHELBY TOWNSHIP, Mich. (AP) — Police in suburban Detroit are having a little fun while asking for help from the public in figuring out who swiped roughly 28,000 pounds of packaged nuts. The Shelby Township Police Department says a truck and trailer packed with 18 pallets of walnuts and other snack nuts were taken the weekend of June 27. Police say the truck and trailer were found July 1 in Detroit, but the nuts worth more than \$128,000 were gone. The department on Tuesday issued an appeal for information on its Facebook page — posting a mug shot of a squirrel along with details of the case. Police in the Macomb County community have had a few noteworthy animal encounters recently, rounding up a goat in a parking lot and capturing a stray pig.

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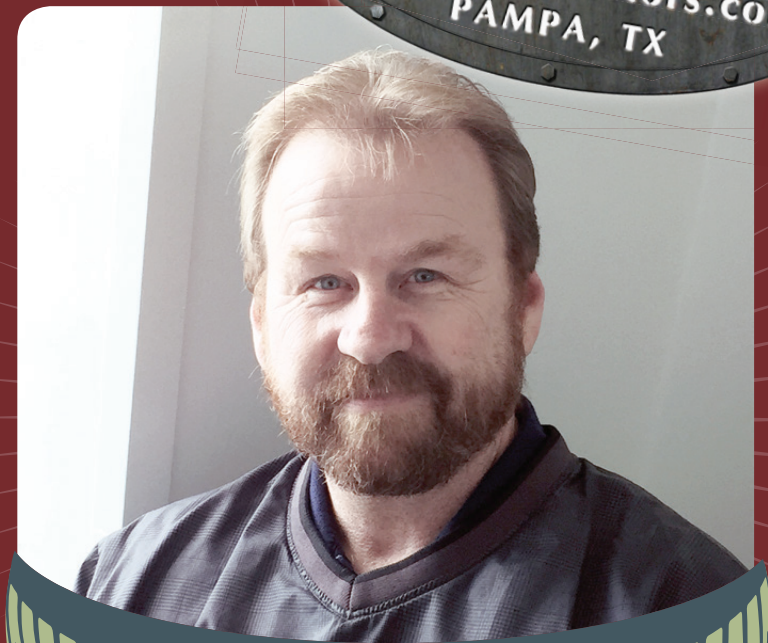
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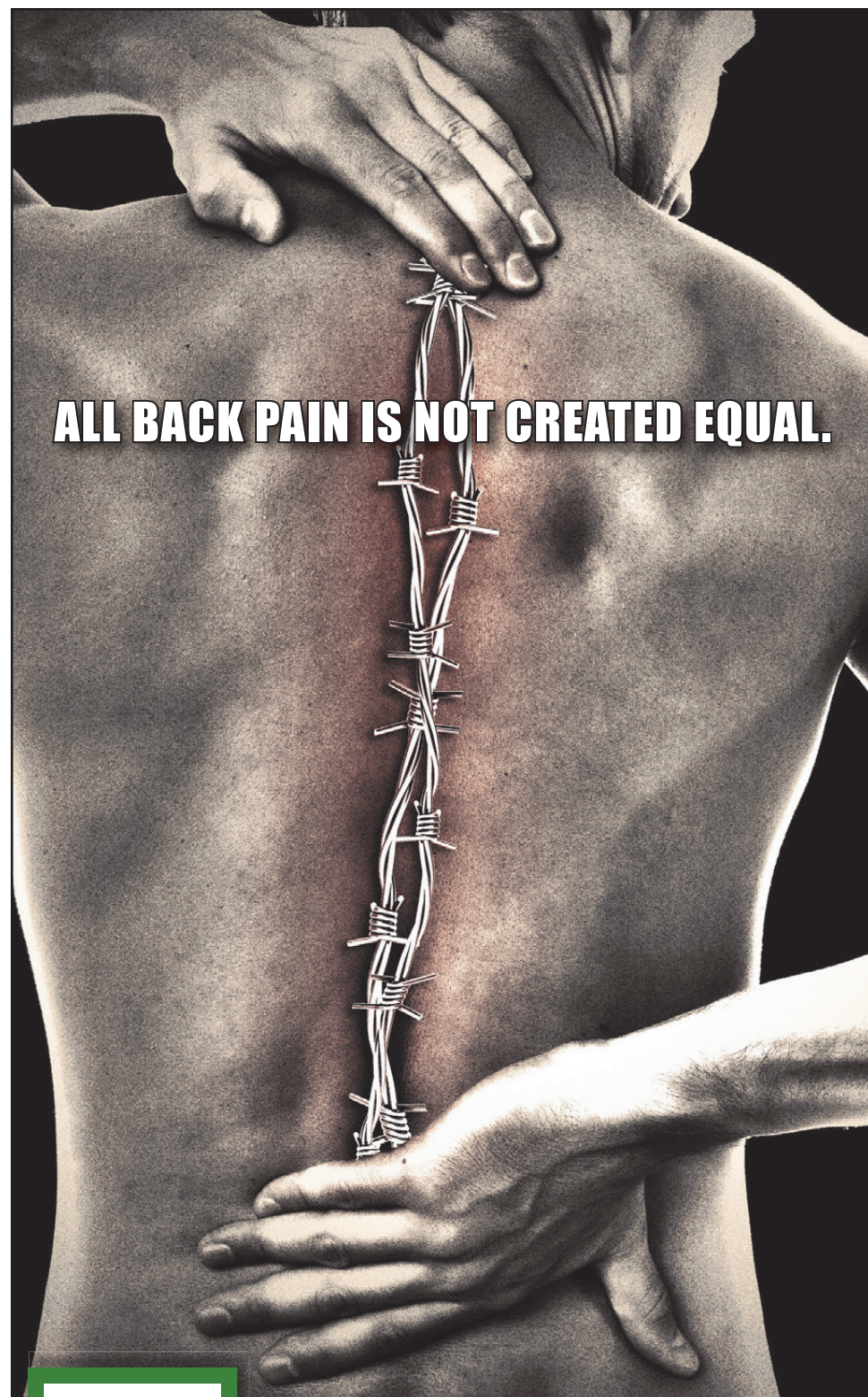

Police ID gunman, victim he shot in Austin hotel lobby

AUSTIN (AP) — Austin police have released the identity of a gunman killed by an officer in a posh downtown hotel after the man fatally shot another person in the lobby.

A police statement issued Monday says officers shot and killed 35-year-old Michael Holt at the Omni Austin Hotel after Holt pointed a gun at the officers early Sunday. Holt was suspected of opening fire in the lobby, killing 60-year-old taxicab

driver and innocent bystander Conrado Guadalupe Contreras moments before.

The Capital Factory, a startup incubator, is situated in the same building as the hotel and said Holt rented a desk in its suite. Officials with Capital Factory said they had no information suggesting the incident had to do with Holt's work there.

KVUE-TV reports Holt's father says his family is grieving for those affected by the shooting.

Mississippi joins states suing over new EPA water rule

JACKSON, Miss. (AP) — Mississippi has joined in a lawsuit challenging a rule that gives federal agencies authority to protect some streams, tributaries and wetlands under the Clean Water Act.

Attorney General Jim Hood announced the action in a news release Tuesday.

"The new rule has the potential of shifting primary regulatory responsibility over traditional state lands and waters from the states to the federal government. It gives unlawful federal power over the states, their citizens and property owners," Hood said in a statement.

Hood said the lawsuit asks a federal judge to rule that the EPA has exceeded its authority under the Clean Water Act.

The action challenges as unconstitutional the Environmental Protection Agency's redefinition of the states' streams, creeks, ponds and wetlands as the "waters of the United States."

Texas, Louisiana and Indiana also are involved in the lawsuit.

Small bodies of water have always been under state jurisdiction.

According to the EPA, the waters affected would be only those with a "direct and significant" connection to larger bodies of water downstream that are already protected. It says the aim is to protect the waters from pollution and development and to safeguard drinking water.

The rule is a response to calls from the U.S. Supreme Court and Congress for the EPA to clarify which smaller waterways are protected. It takes effect Aug. 28.

"The rule's broad definitions and complicated standards make it unrealistic to expect that the rule will be applied consistently across the nation," Hood said.

Google tests driverless cars in Austin with safety drivers

AUSTIN (AP) — Google Inc. has selected Texas as the latest testing site for its self-driving car project, the company announced Tuesday.

A modified Lexus SUV has already been seen on Austin roads, with safety drivers on board, according to the Austin American-Statesman.

The driverless car will operate a few square miles north and northeast of downtown Austin, Google said in a statement. Google did not say exactly where the driverless cars would be tested. The company is also testing several dozen self-driving cars on streets in Mountain View, California, where Google is based.

Google in 2013 announced the company had picked tech-savvy Austin for wiring homes with ultra-fast Internet connections as part of Google Fiber.

"We loved how much Austin embraces innovation," said Jennifer Haroon, head of business operations for Google's self-driving unit, told the American-Statesman. "From technology to music to food. We feel like that matches the spirit of

both Google and the self-driving car project."

All of the vehicles use special software and sensors, which can detect objects as far as two football fields away in all directions.

"It's important for us to get experience testing our software in different driving environments, traffic patterns and road conditions — so we're ready to take on Austin's pedicabs, pickup trucks and everything in between," according a Google statement. "Keep it weird for us, Austin, and visit our website to let us know how we're driving."

The testing fleet in California includes Lexus SUVs and also

prototype vehicles. All board. Google has "self-self-driving vehicles in driven" more than 1 million miles, according to have safety drivers on the company's website.

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Museum Musings KPDN radio history

KPDN radio station was located at 220 Ballard Street in Pampa from 1936-1951 and then moved to the basement of the Hughes building at 408 E Kingsmill. In December 1982, KPDN became KSZN, "Kissin Country 1340 AM" and moved to 119 N. Frost Street in Pampa. Phil Zeni, managing partner of the station, announced the call-letter change that day as the last step of a two month modernization effort at the radio station.

KPDN began operating on April 6, 1936, at 1310 on the AM dial, and was then owned by The Pampa News. The "PDN" in the old call letters originally stood for Pampa Daily News. When the newspaper was bought by the R.C. Hoiles Freedom Newspaper Group in 1952, Freedom sold the station to Warren Hasse, then city editor of the paper. Hasse owned it until 1981 when K&M Leasing of Dallas bought the station. You may remember hearing Hasse on the radio doing the high school sports broadcasting on Friday nights.

"It is the first call-letter change in the 46 year history of the station..." Zeni said in 1982. "It follows a

carefully thought-out decision, in the wake of an earlier switch to live, contemporary country music."

Major steps in the changes included changing both the way music is played and the music itself. Both listener and advertiser response to the changes were positive. Not only were advertisers buying more time on the station, but stores that never would have played the radio station before were playing it.

The change to "modern contemporary country music" reflects a change toward "mainstream American music," Zeni said.

Contemporary country music also represents more sophisticated production methods and smoother more polished sounds. Some of the music played on Kissin' County would have been artists such as Kenny Rogers, Crystal Gayle and the Oak Ridge Boys. These artists were also featured on the Top 40s and pop stations.

Other renovations at that time included an addition of twice daily reports from local oil, gas and agriculture officials, like the Gray County Extension Service, the Texas Farm Bureau and the National Oceanographic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA). The station carried some Texas State Network sports programs as well. It also

added a "professional broadcast news, weather and sports center".

Phil Zenni came to Pampa Sept. 9, 1982, to run KSZN, which they had hoped at the time would be part of a communications group of more stations. However, KSZN always remained an independent radio station, according to Mike Ehrle at KGRO/KOMX in Pampa.

The change to "Kissin' Country" was Zeni's idea, using a word that is popular in country music and country station names. After searching through many possible combinations, and cooperating with the Federal Communications Commission and the U.S. Coast Guard, Zeni settled on KSZN as the station's new call letters.

KSZN had previously been the radio call sign of a coast guard ship named the Olympic.

KSZN was on the air for many years, but went off air in 1995, according to KGRO/KOMZ Radio in Pampa.

Don't give Obama more power over schools

After spending most of June giving President Obama new authority to negotiate trade deals with low-wage countries in Asia, congressional Republicans are now poised to spend July giving Obama

new authority over education in America's public schools. This is a big disappointment for those of us who worked hard to elect a Republican Congress last November. We expected the new Congress to take power back from the president, not give him more.

For the past 50 years, the engine of federal control over local schools has been Title I of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA) of 1965. It was the first in a series of socialist laws that President Lyndon Johnson promised would lead to a "Great Society" after we won his declared "war on poverty."

Johnson's Great Society legislation was speedily enacted by a Congress in which Democrats outnumbered Republicans by more than two to one (295-140 in the House and 68-32 in the Senate). Despite the trillions of dollars spent since 1965, we're no closer to achieving a Great Society; by many measures, America's education and social welfare are much worse today than when those programs were launched 50 years ago.

Republicans had an opportunity to dismantle the failed regime of federal control when they regained control of both Houses of Congress in 1994 and then elected a president in 2000.

Unfortunately, George W. Bush campaigned on the slogan "Leave No Child Behind" as his signature domestic agenda item, and John Boehner, then chairman of the House Education Committee, produced a bill that rebranded the old ESEA under the new title "No Child Left Behind."

No Child Left Behind (NCLB) promised to bring all children (including all demographic minorities measured separately) to 100 percent proficiency by 2014. Of course, that didn't happen, and nearly everyone now recognizes NCLB as a complete failure.

With their current historic majority in both Houses, there's a new opportunity for Republicans to dismantle the 50-year

failure of money poured into local public schools with strings attached. Unfortunately, Republicans, once again, are on the verge of just rebranding the same failed programs with new and overly optimistic slogans: the "Student Success Act" (in the House) and the "Every Child Achieves Act," ECAA, (in the Senate).

Sen. Lamar Alexander, R-Tenn., has been speaking in front of a sign saying "Fix No Child Left Behind," as he touts the ECAA bill as a bipartisan "consensus about how to fix it." A former secretary of education in the Bush 41 administration, Lamar almost didn't return to the Senate this year after he won less than 50 percent of the Republican vote against an underfunded tea party challenger.

The claim that ECAA is somehow a "fix" for NCLB is laughable, and equally false is the claim that it gets rid of the hated Common Core.

While it makes a great show of disavowing the name Common Core, Lamar's bill continues and extends the standards-and-testing mandate that Common Core was designed to satisfy.

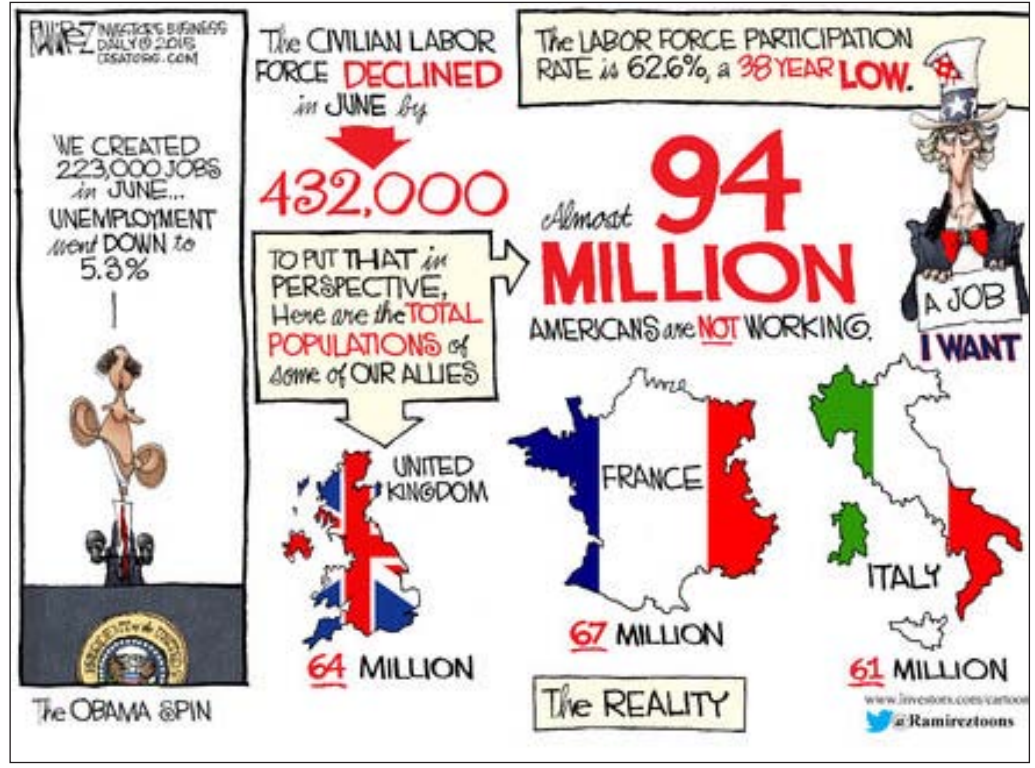
The proof that ECAA will indirectly reinforce federal control is the way it requires states to force testing on students whose parents want to opt them out of that mindless exercise, as tens of thousands already have done.

One method the schools have used against students whose parents opt them out is to force kids to sit quietly at an empty desk — forbidden to read, write or draw — while other students take the test. Parents call this form of punishment "sit and stare."

In Oldmans Township, N.J., 9-year-old Cassidy Thornton, whose parents opted her out of the mandated PARCC exam, was humiliated to tears by being excluded from the end-of-year cupcake and juice-box party with the rest of her class. Cassidy's mom called it bullying, but the school defended its decision to reward test-takers because federal rules require 95 percent of students to be tested.

Education has become a critical issue for 2016 presidential candidates. Even Donald Trump, in his speech at Trump Tower announcing his candidacy, made a point of declaring, "Common Core is a disaster. Education has to be local."

But Jeb Bush, whose **OBAMA** cont. on page 11



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Trump and the GOP Border War

What do they have in common? Both have tapped into what the bases of their respective parties believe is wrong with America.

Bernie is the Willie Nelson of national politics, a leftist voice of a working class whose jobs and factories have been exported and whose wages have stagnated as banksters and the Davos-Doha crowd amass mammoth fortunes by playing games of three-dimensional Monopoly.

The 73-year-old Sanders may have no chance of beating Hillary. But the size of his crowds testifies that he speaks for millions.

Trump's success comes from the issues he has seized upon — illegal immigration and trade deals that deindustrialized America — and brazen defiance of Republican elites and a media establishment.

"When Mexico sends its people, they're not sending their best. ... They're sending people that have lots of problems, and they're bringing those problems to us. They're bringing drugs. They're bringing crime. They're rapists. And some, I assume, are good people."

Politically incorrect? You betcha.

Yet, is Trump not raising a valid issue? Is there not truth in what he said? Is not illegal immigration, and criminals crossing our Southern border, an issue of national import, indeed, of national security?

Women and girls crossing Mexico on trains are raped by gangs. The "coyotes" leading people illegally across the U.S. border include robbers, rapists and killers, who often leave these people to die in the desert.

"State of Emergency: The Third World Invasion and Conquest of America" by this writer in 2006 cited researcher Heather Mac Gough of Manhattan Institute. She reported that two-thirds of the 17,000 outstanding fugitive felony warrants in Los Angeles were for illegal immigrants, as were 95 percent of 1,200-1,500 outstanding warrants for homicide.

Of 20,000 members of the 18th Street Gang operating across Southern California, 12,000 were illegal immigrants. One of the Beltway Snipers, who

terrorized the D.C. area, shooting 13 and killing 10, was a 17-year-old illegal immigrant from Jamaica, John Lee Malvo.

The reaction to Trump's comments has been instructive. NBC and Univision dropped his Miss USA and Miss Universe contests.

Macy's has dropped the Trump clothing line. New York Mayor Bill de Blasio is talking of terminating city contracts with Trump.

The reaction of Trump's Republican rivals has been even more instructive. Initially, it was muted. But when major media began to demand that GOP candidates either denounce Trump or come under suspicion or racism themselves, the panic and pile-on began.

As The Washington Times relates, at a July 4 parade in New Hampshire, Jeb Bush said Trump "doesn't represent the Republican Party or its values."

"I don't assume that he thinks that every Mexican crossing the border is a rapist. ... So he's doing this to inflame and to incite and to draw attention, which seems to be his organizing principle of his campaign."

Sen. Marco Rubio also found his voice. Trump's comments "were not just offensive and inaccurate, but also divisive."

Imagine that, "divisive" politics.
Ex-Gov. Rick Perry said

Trump's remarks were "offensive," as "Hispanics in America and Hispanics in Texas, from the Alamo to Afghanistan, have been extraordinary ... citizens of our country."

But most of the Hispanics at the Alamo were in the Mexican army of Santa Anna, not under Col. Travis, and hardly "extraordinary citizens of our country" as Texas did not even belong to the USA then.

Sen. Ted Cruz on NBC's "Meet the Press" took a different stance: "I salute Donald Trump for focusing on the need to address illegal immigration."

"The Washington cartel doesn't want to address that. The Washington cartel doesn't believe we need to secure the border. The Washington cartel supports amnesty, and I think amnesty's wrong."

Trump "has a colorful way of speaking," said Cruz. "It's not the way I speak. But I'm not going to engage in the media's game of throwing rocks and attacking other Republicans." Cruz might have added, "like Jeb and Rick and Marco are doing."

What Trump has done, and Cruz sees it, is to have elevated the illegal immigration issue, taken a tough line, and is now attacking GOP rivals who have dithered or done nothing to deal with it.

My Mom had a squirrel in her shed that caused us to jump every time we went in to get something. It always went out while I was in

there, but came back when I left. Wakita has had a real problem with these critters. I went out to the shed this past weekend and as I was walking up there was a dead squirrel right in front of the door. My sister said they had been everywhere around town.

Something you will see as you travel the streets of Pampa are squirrels. In fact you can be driving along a street and they will come out of nowhere to run right in front of the car. I know that instinctively I have hit the brake so I wouldn't hit one. They run on across the street and then look back as if to say – "I stopped you in your tracks."

One of the things that I don't understand is how a little one to two pound animal can figure it's any match for a car? But those little furry-tailed critters will dart out into the street and cars will swerve, slow down and even stop while they cross the street. I realize that the car is under the control of those who don't want to hurt them, so the change in direction is made and the squirrel is safe.

There have been some of them that are not as fortunate. They've started across the street and only made it half-way. It looks as though some have just stepped off the curb before they have met their demise. I've seen them run right down the middle of the street moving their young from one nest to

her feel a little safer when I was gone. Shari didn't want anything that was really loud, so a .22 seemed the best choice.



ember 2000 and started in January 2001. While in Anton she was asked to preach a revival in Brownfield, two years later she was appointed to Brownfield and stayed for seven years. “So I decided that if I am asked to preach a revival then I am appointed to that city. So my friends in Lubbock said, ‘We aren’t going to say goodbye to you, next year we will just ask you to preach a revival in Lubbock,’” Moultrie said jokingly.

Coming back to Pampa

Moultrie came back to Lubbock on June 19 and said it was fun to come back to Pampa and have the reception of excitement and acceptance.

“I really believe that was God saying, ‘I’m going to carry you. Let me love you and carry,’” Moultrie said. “I truly believe if He takes you to it He will take you through it. If God has called me to Pampa,

it’s for a reason.”

Moultrie is looking forward to bringing God’s love to not just First United Methodist Church, where her mother was a custodian during Moultrie’s childhood, but the entire Pampa area.

“I think everywhere God leads me, my job is to bring God’s love to all of His children,” Moultrie said. “Black, white, purple, green or orange it doesn’t matter who they are. It doesn’t matter their socioeconomic status. It just matters that anyone who walks through this church, you are loved.”

Moultrie’s baby sister Sharon went to Texas Tech and graduated with her degree in Education and was the first Miss Black Texas Tech.

“We set goals and Mom made sure we didn’t set our goals too low,” Moultrie said.

“She was very proud of us. She died at an early age but she died knowing that we all achieved what we had set out to do. Education was important to her and each of us.”

Moultrie said using these life experiences will help in teaching members of the congregation, “Yes, you can.”

“When you set your goals, or thank about who you are, the answer is: yes, you can,” Moultrie said.

“My job is to walk the journey with you, out of love. Mother always taught us, if you love, if you take God with you, then

you will walk that journey.”

Moultrie is a breast cancer survivor and she remembers having members of the church family and best friends who walked the journey with her.

“Everything I have gone through will lead me to help people in this church believe there is survival past cancer, someone hurting, being bullied, etc.,” Moultrie said.

“My job as pastor is to love the people that God has put in my life and the people that have become and will become my family. Yes, I have birth family, but my church is my family.”

Moultrie said she wants to take the love of God outside of the walls of the church and make the community her family as well.
