Despite rain, Culberson-Stowers remodel still on track

With the unseasonable amount of rain the Texas Panhandle has received, it wouldn't have been a shock to anyone driving down Hobart to hear that the Culberson Stowers remodel has been delayed some.

Somehow, that's not the case. "They still have the same Oct. 5 targeted move-in date," owner Richard Stowers said. "We got invaded by frogs. They had to build a bridge to get over into the construction site. Have there been issues? Yes. But we have been able to move around them."

Stowers said the rains have created a small moat around the building, which will create issues when they begin tearing down the old building.

To remedy this problem, there is going to be a temporary wall built between the two buildings.

But other issues include construction equipment getting stuck in the mud.

"They had a crane that was putting the last air conditioner compressor in and it got stuck," Stowers said.

The body shop will be torn down at the end of August and will be rebuilt north of the dealership.

Stowers added that he believes the construction will be mostly an inconvenience to service customers, but he is trying to remain focused on the big picture.

John Warner gave the program and inspired the audience by sharing stories of the people who are beneficiaries of various United Way agencies.

His first example was Josue Molina, an Optimist baseball player. Josue lives in what many may consider a rough neighborhood in Pampa and walked to practice with the Optimist Club every day.

Molina has been on Warner's baseball team for the last two years and this year led his team in hitting and runs scored. He was also the

team's closing pitcher.

In 17 innings pitched, he had 43 strikeouts.

Warner called Molina, a "class ball player."

The next story Warner shared was of a girl who grew up in a scouting family. This girl has also held various leadership positions in Boy Scouts before working her way up to the Adobe Walls district executive. This is the story of Gaylyne Manns.

The final story Warner shared was of Braley Long. A reflux sufferer as an infant, Long was being fed a bottle by his grandmother when he suddenly stopped breathing.

Long didn't have a pulse or heartbeat and his grandmother began administering artificial respiration she had learned from the American Red Cross, which was a United Way agency at the time.

Long was transported to Pampa

Police probing death in LA find 1,200 guns, 2 tons ammo

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Police investigating the death of a Los Angeles man uncovered an arsenal inside his home and garage — more than 1,200 guns and about two tons of ammunition, authorities said Monday.

Los Angeles Police Department Cmdr. Andrew Smith called the number of rifles, pistols and shotguns staggering. Many had never been fired and some were still wrapped in boxes, with price tags still attached.

"Our truck couldn't carry it all," Smith told the Los Angeles Times (<http://lat.ms/1HFAKVn>). "We had to go back and make another trip."

There were no signs of foul play. Police have found no evidence the man, who has not been identified,

was involved in criminal activity.

Police made the discovery after the man's decomposing body was found in a car down the street from his home in the Pacific Palisades neighborhood.

Detectives want to find out why he had so many guns and are examining the weapons to determine if they have been linked to any crime.

"We have a lot of work to do," Smith said. "Running the background, history and legality of these weapons is going to require a tremendous amount of time."

"It's not a crime to have a large number of weapons so long as they were legal to own and legally obtained," Smith added. "We want to make sure that's the case."

Some Special Olympics athletes forced to sleep on gym floor Tuesday

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Special Olympics competitors arriving in Southern California were greeted by a logistics mess that forced many to sleep on a gymnasium floor before they were finally shuttled to their host cities.

At least 1,500 athletes and coaches spent the night at Loyola Marymount University in Los Angeles after flights and buses arrived late on Tuesday, Special Olympics spokesman Rich Perelman said.

The Red Cross provided blankets and water. The athletes from Norway, Mexico, Venezuela, Kenya and the Cayman Islands were on their way to their host cities early Wednesday.

"Flights arrived late and buses got backed up. The process just got so elongated that the decision was made to keep them here until morning," Perelman said.

The university near Los Angeles International Air-

port is serving as a staging area where more than 7,000 athletes were to be routed to host cities where they will be housed.

Perelman said while some of those stranded were tired after long trips, the majority made the most of the circumstances, playing board games and making friends.

"Everyone was very happy when breakfast arrived at 6:30 a.m.," he said. "That was the highlight."

Competitors from more than 160 countries are coming to Los Angeles this week to take part in 25 sports at venues across the city.

Athletes ages 8 to 71 will compete in soccer, basketball, volleyball, tennis, track, roller skating and other sports over nine days.

First Lady Michelle Obama will open the event Saturday at the Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum, site of the 1932 and 1984 Summer Olympics.

Maine brewer makes beer out of live lobsters, sea salt

PORTLAND, Maine (AP) — A Maine brewer is offering a quicker way to consume two of the state's summertime staples: beer and lobster.

Oxbow Brewing is serving up beer brewed with live Maine lobsters and a dash of sea salt.

Brewmaster Tim Adams says the lobsters were placed in a mesh bag and suspended in a kettle full of boiling wort during the brewing process. He says the lobsters add a subtle brininess and sweetness that lobster fans will recognize.

The beer is a saison (say-ZAHN)-style beer brewed in collaboration with a brewery in Parma, Italy. It is 4.5 percent alcohol by volume and is available on a limited basis. The beer

became available this summer.

Adams says the lobsters that were cooked in the brewing process were later eaten.

In a month when we've started to talk about your short game and its relevance to your scorecard, Zach Johnson wins the Open Championship, despite often being 30 or 40 yards shorter off the tee than some of his playing partners. Zach Johnson is a wizard with the Wedge.

If you watched the Open Championship on TV, you must've been struck by the number of shots the players were challenged with in the 90 - 20 yard range. Sometimes they needed to fly the ball high and stop it quickly for pins tight up behind burns, bunkers and 'swales'. Other times, due to the wind and green design, the best shot to play was a lower trajectory shot with more run. Most of them, especially those at the top of the leaderboard, had the versatility to play different short Wedge shots.

I hope that encourages you to pay a little more attention to the short game articles we've published, and those we'll be writing and publishing over the next weeks. If you'd like to jump in quickly, then contact us at Pampa Country Club now to assess your short game technique and setup.
