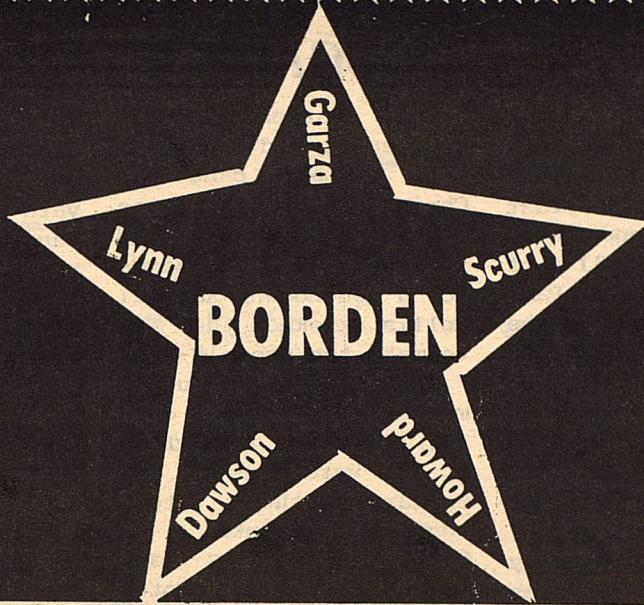

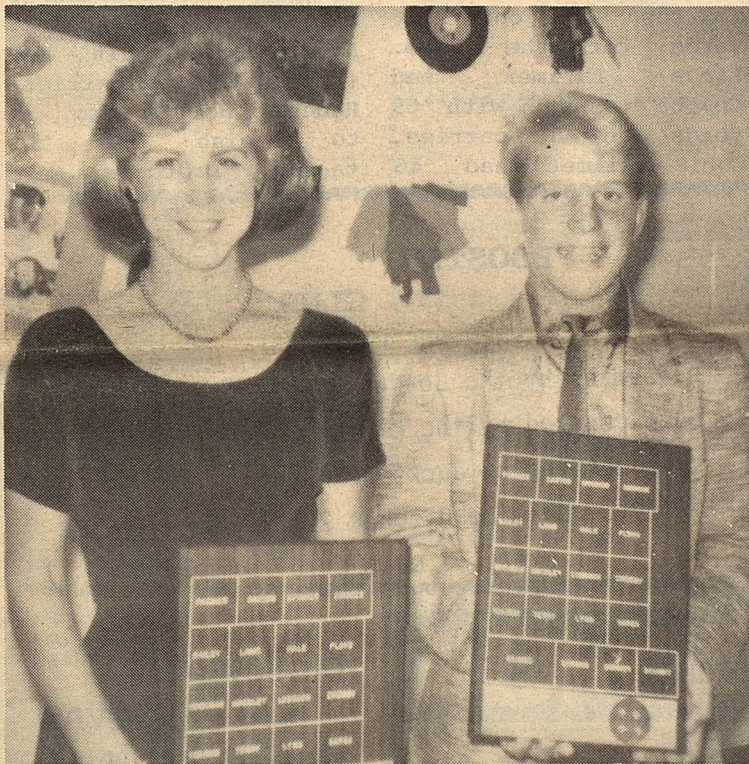

## ABSENTEE VOTING NOTICE

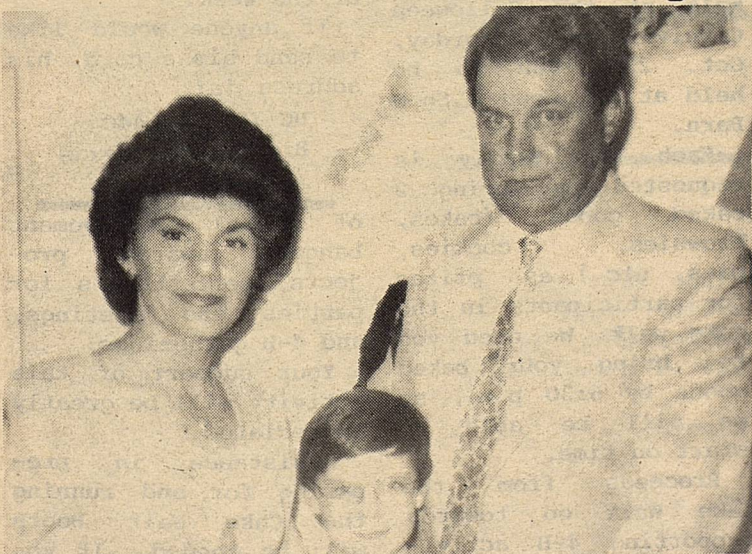
Absentee voting by personal appearance for the Nov. 8 elections begins Wednesday, October 19 at the county clerk's office in Gail.

Restrictions on absentee voting by personal appearance have been relaxed to the point that any qualified voter can cast an absentee ballot, said Dorothy Browne, County Clerk.

A voter no longer needs to be out of the county on election day or older than 65 years of age to vote absentee by personal appearance, she said.

Voting begins at 8:00 a.m. Wednesday and will continue daily from 8:00 a.m. to 5 p.m. until November 4th, except for the noon hour.

# Jr. High Coyotes Race Past Klondike

The Borden County Jr. High Coyotes defeated the Klondike Cougars 27-6. The undefeated Coyotes quickly took control of the game as John Paul Harris took the ball from Klint Kemper and raced 62 yards for his first touchdown. Klint passed to Shannon Smithie for the PAT.

The Coyote defense quickly made the Cougars aware of their presence as Klint Kemper blocked the Cougars first punt.

Brandon Adcock scored next for the Coyotes on a 25 yard run the PAT failed, and the score was now 13-0.

The defense once again stopped the Cougars as Armando Carrizales made the first of his two interceptions. The Coyotes didn't score on their next possession, but the defense did their job again as Shannon Smithie recovered a Cougar fumble.

The Coyotes scored again before half-time as John Paul Harris ran 12 yards for his second touchdown. Ross Hataway ran the PAT into the endzone to make the score 20-0 at half-time.

The second half action was also fast and furious and both teams played all of their players. John Paul Harris scored the Coyotes only touchdown in the second half. He ran 12 yards for his touchdown, and Shannon Smithie completed the action as he caught a pass from Klint Kemper.

The Cougars finally scored on the Coyotes second defensive team. Armando Carrizales intercepted his second pass in the second half.

The Borden County Coyotes opened the game with a big bang as Chris Kilmer took the opening kickoff and returned it 79 yards for a touchdown. Randell Hollis kicked the PAT to make the score 8-0.

The Klondike Cougars marched quickly down the field and scored on a 30 yard pass. The Cougars then took control thanks to Coyote turnovers and tough play. The Coyotes fumble the ball 11 times and lost 6. We also suffered 3 interceptions, one of which was returned 30 yards for a touchdown. It seemed that everytime the Coyotes started a drive, disaster struck.

The Coyotes managed to rush for only 116 yards for the game. Lance Latimer led Coyote rushers with 69 yards on 8 carries. Chris Kilmer had 46

yards on 13 carries. Jimmy Rios had 8 yards on 7 carries with a 1 yard touchdown run. Randell Hollis kicked the PAT.

Paul Sturdivant led all pass receivers with 42 yards on 3 catches. Chirs Kilmer caught 2 passes for 39 yards. Shane Kemper caught 1 for 23 yards.

The Coyotes gave up 397 yards rushing to the quicker Cougars, but several individuals had a good defensive effort. Brian Bond led all tacklers with 10 assisted and 5 unassisted tackles. He recovered 2 Cougar fumbles caused 1 fumble, blocked a PAT, and made a big hit on a fourth and 2 on our 23 yardline. After Brian hit and stopped the ballcarrier, Randell Hollis came in to finish off the tackle. Brothers Marc

and Lance Latimer had 13 tackles apiece. Lance also had a pass interception that he ran back for 30 yards. Jimmy Rios had 14 tackles and a fumble recovery. Shane Kemper made 9 tackles. Chris Kilmer and Paul Sturdivant had 8 tackles each. Randell Hollis had 4 tackles and 2 fumble recoveries. Cody Cooley had 1 tackle.

The Coyotes only gave up 30 yards through the air, but that was for a touchdown.

The Coyotes will return Lance Telchik to the lineup after setting out 2 weeks with a cracked wrist. Cole Vestal did not suit out for the Klondike game as the doctor thought that he had suffered an elbow dislocation. Another injury reported was that Marc Latimer broke his collar bone in practice Monday.

Administrators present were James McLeroy, Superintendent; Mickey McMeans, High School Principal and Ben Jarrett, Elementary Principal.

Board President Jack McPhaul called the meeting to order.

**Minutes**

The Board read the minutes of the regular meeting of September 19, 1988. A motion was made by Joel Dennis and seconded by Tom Ed Vestal to approve the minutes. The Motion Carried Unanimously.

**Visitors**

Visitor present was Steve Wolf.

**Bills**

The Board reviewed October bills. A motion was made by Steve Hess and seconded by Jon Monger to pay the bills. The Motion Carried Unanimously.

**Asbestos**

## GHOSTIES AND GHOULIES AND THINGS THAT GO BUMP...

Fright Night-All candy treats is on Halloween! Halloween! candy treats is on again! No matter what you call it, each year on October 31 millions of costumed kids in thousands of communities trick-or-treat their ways through darkened streets. The annual door-to-door search for candy treats is on again! Although the number of trick-or-treaters has been declining each year, 85% of American families still allow their kids to make the yearly neighborhood rounds. To ensure a fun and safe Halloween,

Texas Safety Association urges parents to take an active part in helping kids create their costumes and observe a few safety rules. The following safety suggestions can help keep the real fright out of Fright Night!

When making or selecting a costume:

-Use fire-resistant materials, with light colors and reflective tape.

-Avoid costumes that restrict movement. Children should not have trouble walking, bending or moving their arms.

-Use make-up instead of masks, masks can obscure their vision.

-Hats, wigs or beards should be securely fastened.

-Do not allow your children to carry sharp objects. Costume accessories should be made

of harmless materials such as soft plastic or cardboard.

-For children under age 12, attach their name, address, and phone number inside a sleeve, in case they get lost. Do not display the information openly on the costume!

-For added visibility, children should carry reflective trick-or-treat bags, flashlights, or light sticks.

When the big night arrives and the excitement has reached unbearable levels, following these steps will ensure safe and happy trick-or-treating:

-Travel in groups with an adult supervising.

-Stay in familiar neighborhoods, and follow a designated route.

-Walk on the sidewalks. If there are none, walk on the left side, facing traffic, as far

from the road as possible.

-WALK from house to house, and don't cut across lawns. There might be things to trip over hidden in the dark.

-At intersections, stop, look left, then right, then left again before crossing.

-Never cross a road from between parked cars.

-Never enter strange houses or apartments.

-Call home if there are any problems. Parents should make

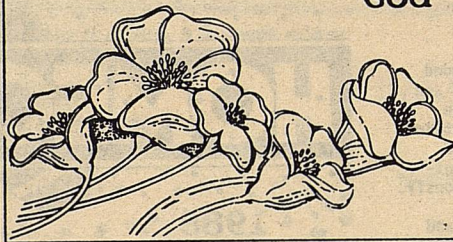

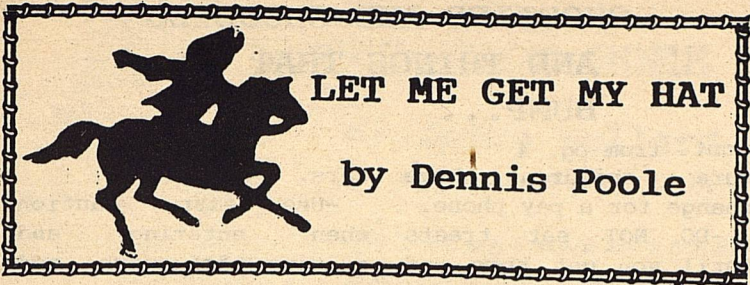

**LET ME GET MY HAT**

**Parents Influence School Success**

If your child is having trouble adjusting to school, parental attitudes may be one possible problem, the Texas Medical Association says.

Sometimes parents are afraid to let new people care for their children. Children pick up such signals and also become anxious. Parental stress about busing or other problems also can make a child feel uncomfortable.

Doubts and fears of parents and children can be eased by visiting the school and talking with the teacher. Such discussions can familiarize everyone with the child's schedule and upcoming activities. A visit also can give parents an early opportunity to inform the teacher about the child's special abilities, problems, or complicating situations, such as a recent family divorce that may have upset the child.

Another important discussion can be between parent and child. It can help

reassure the child that he or she can handle new circumstances just as in the past. Getting frequent updates about

the child's progress and attitudes can help parents keep in touch with problems.

**Federal Guidelines For Brucellosis Control**

Effective Oct. 1, all heifers moved from brucellosis quarantined herds must be branded with an "S".

The U.S. Department of Agriculture passed this federal guideline in a stepped-up effort to eradicate brucellosis. Brucellosis, commonly called "bangs" is an incurable bacterial disease contagious among cows during and shortly after calving. Infection can cause abortions or the birth of weak calves.

"S"-branded heifers may be sold through a livestock market or be issued permits for direct movement, but their only destination may be quarantined feedlots or slaughter.

About 29,000 heifers in Texas will be affected his year by the upcoming federal guidelines and state regulation.

Although sexually immature heifers have not traditionally been considered to be a factor in the brucellosis program. However, studies have revealed that heifers exposed to brucellosis can incubate the disease and not test positive until their first or even second pregnancy.

Although vaccinations have proven successful for heifers from uninfected herds, the vaccine may not protect animals already exposed to brucellosis.

The federal government is working to tighten restrictions and provide aid to prevent the spread of the disease from state to state.

As of Sept. 1, veterinarians who vaccinate heifers against brucellosis began receiving reimbursement from the state government in 211 counties. The TAHC predicts that funds may

again run short in 1989.

The Texas Animal Health Commission has budgeted \$523,000 for reimbursements to veterinarians accredited by the USDA and TAHC.

All veterinarians will receive \$1 per head for vaccinating heifers 4 to 12 months old and they may collect the outstanding balance from producers.

Strain 19, a brucella abortus vaccine which builds immunity against brucellosis, is recommended by the TAHC to vaccinate young heifers.

The 43 counties containing the highest numbers of brucellosis cases will continue to receive federal funds until at least Oct. 1.

## MEASUREMENT SERVICE

If you requested measurement service and it has not been measured at this time and you have a crop ready to harvest you need to come by the office or call first.

Remember that you can not harvest your acres unless they are certified. Be looking in the mail for a notice to certify your acres. You have 5 working days from the date on the notice to come in and certify.

## 1988 DISASTER PROGRAM

Some information concerning the 1988 Disaster Program are: The program is extended to program crops, (participating and non-participating), and non-program crops.

The signup period is going on presently and will run through March 31, 1989.

To be eligible:

The farm must have sustained at least a 35% overall loss of production in the 1988 crop year.

The producer must be in compliance with the sodbuster/swampbuster provisions.

Payment rates are various and depend on the level of loss and type of crop.

If you did not request advance deficiency payments earlier you may do so at this time.

The deadline for requesting advance payments is October 27th.

In order to draw disaster money you must carry multi-peril insurance for the proceeding crop year.

If you believe you are eligible for the disas-

ter program come on by and check with us. Just a reminder not to destroy any planted acres prior to filing an application for disaster credit in this office. If you destroy planted acres prior to properly notifying this office it will cost you history acres, and program payments.

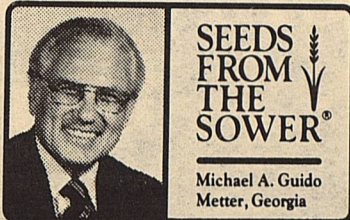

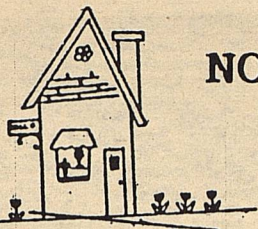

**POULTRY PRODUCTS FIT TODAY'S DIET**

Poultry products are nutritious, yet low in calories, fat and saturated fat when compared to other animal products.

Poultry fits well into today's dietary needs and the emphasis on reduced consumption of total fat, saturated fat and caloric intake. At the same time, poultry offers appropriate levels of essential nutrients. By providing high protein levels with low caloric content. Poultry products are excellent choices as nutrient dense foods.

The 1987 data from the USDA's Human Nutrition Information Service showed that poultry products provide a more desirable ratio of nutrients to fats than other animal products.

Each day the average person consumes 3,560 calories, of which animal products account for almost 36%. Poultry products provide only 3.5% of these calories. Red meat provides 15.5%; milk and milk products, 10 % eggs, 1.6 %; and fish and shellfish, 0.9 %.

At the same time, animal products provide almost 57% of the total fat in daily diets. Poultry products account for only 5% of this total, with red meat accounting for 32.8 %; milk and milk products, 20.5%; 2%; and fish and shellfish, 0.5%.

More than 75% of all saturated fatty acids consumed daily come from animal products.

Poultry products contribute only 4% of this total while red meat accounts for about 33%; milk and milk products, 20.5%; eggs, 2 %; and fish and shell fish, 5%.

Despite much publicity to the contrary, poultry products continue to provide a greater share of many of the desirable nutrients than other animal products.

According to the USDA data, poultry provided more than 11% of the 68.5 % protein provided by animal products in daily diets, with red meat providing 27.6%; mild and milk products, 20.9%; eggs, 4%; and fish and shellfish, 4.6%.

Poultry meat products account for about 25% of the total meat protein consumed per capita daily while providing only 17% of the calories, 14% of the fat and 11% of the saturated fat in animal products.

Not only are poultry products nutrient-dense dietary choices, but they are good tasting, versatile and inexpensive.
