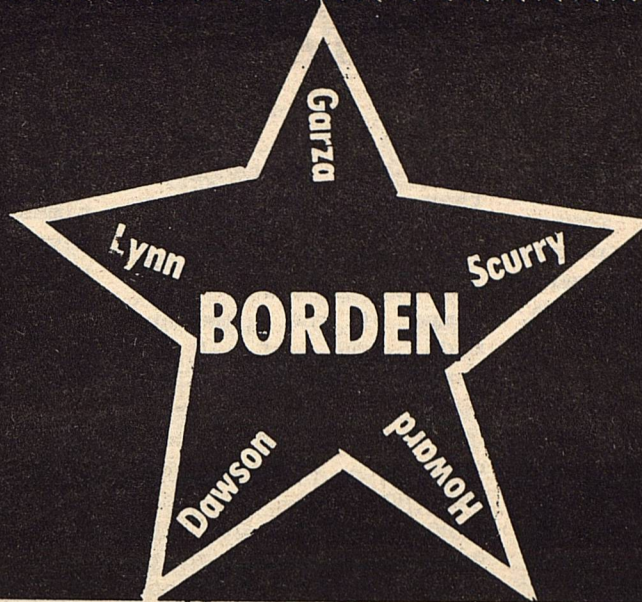

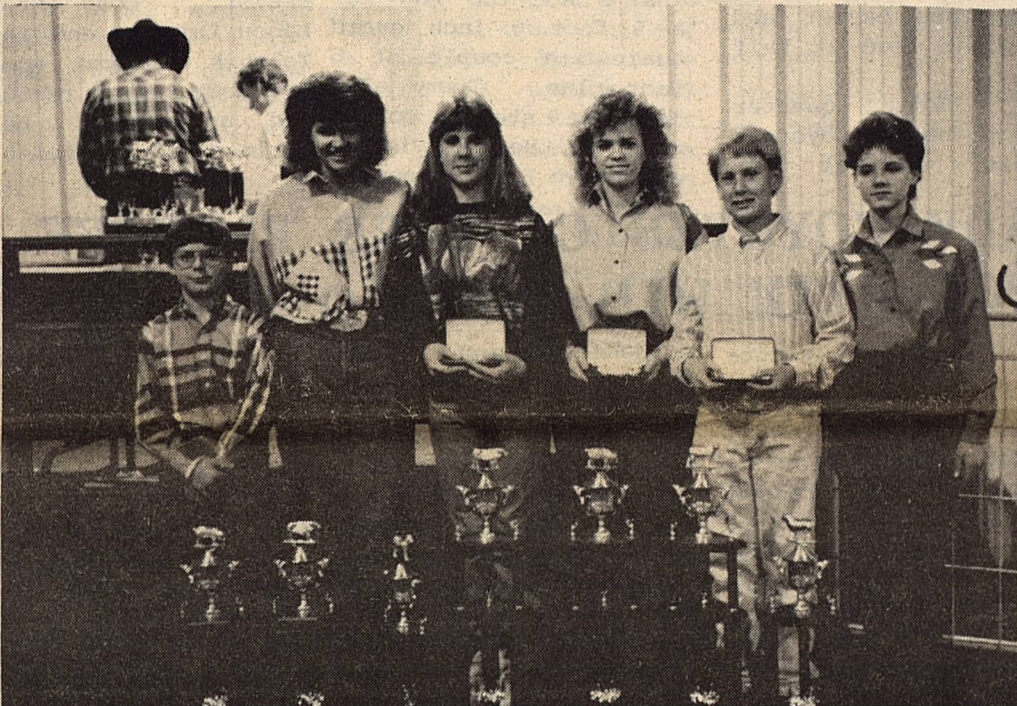

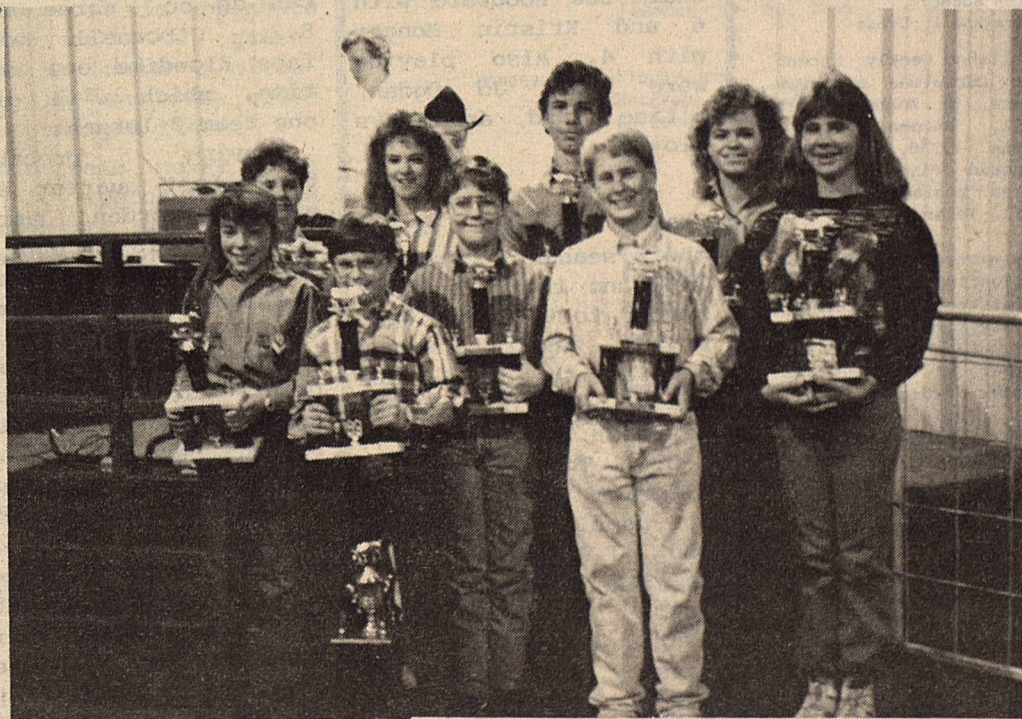
Livestock Show Thursday received the Reserve Grand Champion banner and trophy.

Basketball News

LADY COYOTES DUST SANDS

There's an old saying "Third times charm." But last Tuesday night, it just wasn't true for the Sands Lady Mustangs as Borden defeated the host school 59-43 in their third meeting this year. Like the last meeting between the two, Sands jumped out in front early in the game, holding a 12-11 lead over Gail at the end of the first period. Borden came back in the second quarter, behind Lisha Sternadel's nine points, to hold a 28-23 lead at half. Holding the Lady Mustangs to just 5 points in the third quarter, the Lady Coyotes scored 12 of their own for a 40-28 lead entering the last quarter. In the crucial third period, Elana Himes and Kristi Adcock teamed for 10 of Borden's 12 points. Then in the last quarter Vida Balaque and Kate Phinizy cut loose from long range to give Sands yet another look at a different attack, outscoring Sands 19-15.

Lisha led the balanced

scoring with 15 points followed by Vida with 12, Elana with 10, Kristi hit 9, and Kate made 8. Also scoring were Amy Lewis with 3 and Rachel Romero with 2. Rached led in field goal percentage hitting her only attempt followed by Kristi with 60%. Amy led in free throw percentage with 75%, making 3 of 4 followed by Lisha with 71%. Kate led in steals with 9 followed by Lisha with 8. Elana led in rebounds with 14 followed by Kristi with 10 and Lisha grabbed 8. Kate led in assists with 7 and Lisha had 3.

The J.V. was also victorious as they rocked Sands 43-20. Holding a slim 4-2 lead at the end of the first quarter, Borden erupted for 19 points in the second stanza and held Sands to 6 for a 23-8 half-time lead. Borden extended their lead to 34-11 entering the last quarter before holding on for the 23 point win. Shayne Hess led in scoring with 14 points followed by Amanda Anderson with 11. Kristin Kilmer hit 8 points followed by Shara Dee Woodward with 6 and Kristin Monger with 4. Also playing were Kelly Jo Ogden, A'Lise Lloyd, and M'Lys Lloyd.

The Varsity raised their season record to 21-1 and their district record to 6-0. The J.V. moved their season record to 9-3 and their record against district opponents to 3-0. The remaining district game will be at home. The Varsity and J.V. will face Klondike February 7, at Gail. The J.V. will start at 5:00 and the Varsity will follow at 6:30. The girls will not play at Dawson Friday, as Dawson has cancelled the remainder of their games.

MUSTANGS DEFEAT COYOTES 49-68

The Borden County Coyotes put a scare in the Sands Mustangs as they led the Mustangs 11-7 at the end of the first quarter. The Coyotes slowed the tempo of the game and made 5 out of 10 attempts from the field during the opening quarter. The second quarter forced the Mustangs out of their zone defense and the added pressure began to mount up on the Coyotes. The Mustangs had managed to build a slim 1 point lead until 1 second remaining in the half. They were able to run an out of bounds play under their basket to their big post man for another basket and a 3 point lead at half time.

The third quarter seems to be the Coyote's nemesis, and it was

true against the Mustangs. The Coyotes turned the ball over 9 times which led to several easy Mustang baskets. The Coyotes were outscored 26 - 9.

Again in the fourth quarter, the Coyotes played well. They only committed 3 turnovers and made 8 out of 17 field goal attempts. The only short coming for the quarter was at the freethrow line. Only 3 out of 8 attempts were made.

Jimmy Rios led the Coyotes scoring with 14 points, several of which came off offensive rebounds that he was able to put back in. That's not too bad for a 5 foot 6 inch guard against a couple of 6 foot plus. Jimmy also led the steals column with 6. He also had 4 offensive rebounds.

Cole Vestal had a big fourth quarter, as he picked up 8 of his 13 points then. He was 4 out of 6 from the field in the final 8 minutes.

Cole had a steal, 11 rebounds, and an assist. Brian Bond scored 9 points and had 2 steals, 3 rebounds and 3 assists. He was defended by Albert Franko, who did an excellent job until he fouled out. Shane Kemper scored 6 points and had a steal, 3 rebounds and an assist.

Paul Sturdivant scored 4 points and had 4 big steals and 3 rebounds. Eric Lusk scored 3 points and had 1 steal, 1 rebound, and an assist. Cody Stone, Lance Latimer and Lance Telchik did not score, but Cody had 2 rebounds and an assist. Lance Latimer had an assist.

LADY COYOTES CAPTURE PLAYOFF SPOT WITH WIN OVER O'DONNELL

Friday night's exciting 61-35 win over O'Donnell clinched Borden a playoff spot in this year's Class A playoffs. Borden raised its district record to 7-0 as O'Donnell dropped into a two way tie for 2nd with Klondike at 5-2. With only two district games remaining coupled with a forfeit win over Dawson, Borden can do no worse than 8-2. O'Donnell must face Klondike one more time, which will give one team 3 losses.

Playing probably their best quarter all season, Borden jumped out to a 18-0 lead in the first quarter before the Lady Eagles scored at the end of the period for their only points in the initial eight minutes. Borden scored seven more to hold a 25-2 lead before O'Donnell could scratch again. O'Donnell mounted a small comeback, namely at the free throw line where they hit five of eleven free throws compared to Borden's 1 of 2. Gail found itself in foul trouble by half-time as Elana Himes and Kristi Adcock each had three

personels and Kate Phinizy, Lisha Sternadel and Amy Lewis each had 2. O'Donnell had a total of four fouls. The pace increased in the third period where the Lady Coyotes outscored O'Donnell, this time 16-8 to hold a commanding 46-23 lead entering the last stanza. As the game got a little rough in the last half, Lisha Sternadel made them pay for it at the line where she hit 12 of 15 free throws to secure the victory.

Lisha led in scoring with a personal high 26 points followed by Vida Balaque with 17 points, nine coming from the three point range. Also scoring were Kate with 8, Elana with 5, Kristi and Randi Woodward with 2 each, and Amy with 1. Vida led in field goal percentage with 55% followed by Lisha with 54%. Vida also led in free throw percentage with 100%, hitting 2 of 2 followed by Lisha with 80% and Kate with 67%. As a team, Borden hit 18 of 25 for an excellent 72%. Kate and Lisha tied for honors in steals with 7 each

followed by Vida with 5. Lisha led in rebounds with 12 followed by Kristi with 10. Lisha also led in assists with 6 ahead of Kate with 4 and Vida with 3.

The J.V. girls were also victorious over O'Donnell with a lopsided 59-32 score. Behind Amanda Anderson's thirteen points in the first quarter, Borden built up a 21-6 lead and extended it to 32-12 by half-time. Shara Dee Woodward connected on two three pointers and a field goal to lead a 12-10 charge in the third quarter to extend the margin to 44-22 entering the last stanza.

Amanda led in scoring with 21 points followed closely behind by Shara Dee with 18. Kristin Kilmer was also in double figures with 11 points followed by Shayne Hess with 4, Kristin Monger with 3, and Heather Armstrong with 2. Also playing were Kelly Jo Ogden, A'Lise Lloyd, and M'Lys Lloyd. The J.V. record goes to 10-2 on the season and 4-0 against district opponents.

I would like to bring to your attention an article by Bob Ottewell, with the Colorado Inter-scholastic Activities Association, under the title give above.

Ottewell coached a team of ninth graders in a competitive basketball league in the Denver area.

His team, the Tomcats, despite a 6-16 record, had a very successful season for the following reasons:

"They showed respect for the officials and never received a technical.

"When things were going bad--as they often did--no player ever blamed a teammate.

"The team lost with dignity and never looked for excuses. They didn't blame losses on poor officiating, lack of height, or inadequate coaching.

"No player ever openly complained about lack of playing time; everyone cheered his teammates.

"Every player showed respect for his opponents during and after games. There was never a situation that was even close to becoming a fight.

"The team never gave up. It approached each quarter and each game as a new challenge.

"The players must have carried their positive attitudes home. The parents supported the team through some tough losses. (The parents no doubt had a great deal to do with the players' attitude.)

"While never becoming accustomed to losing, the players understood the basic truth that winning or losing basketball games has no correlation with someone's value as a person."

Our young people may be having a hard time in winning basketball games, but it is not because they do not want to and the coaches do not want to.

As Ottewell continued to say, "If we believe in the value of competition, we must believe that its value exists in defeat as well as in victory."

"A losing season is a test. When kids pass that test, they deserve to be praised."

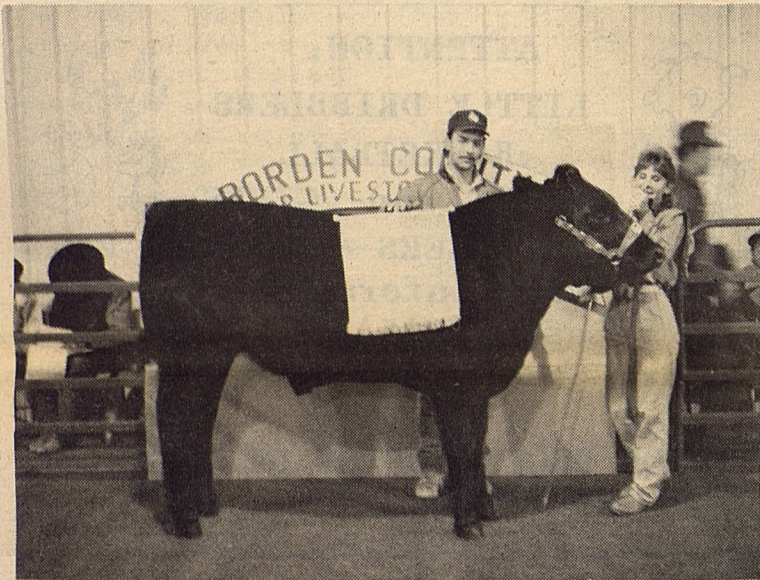

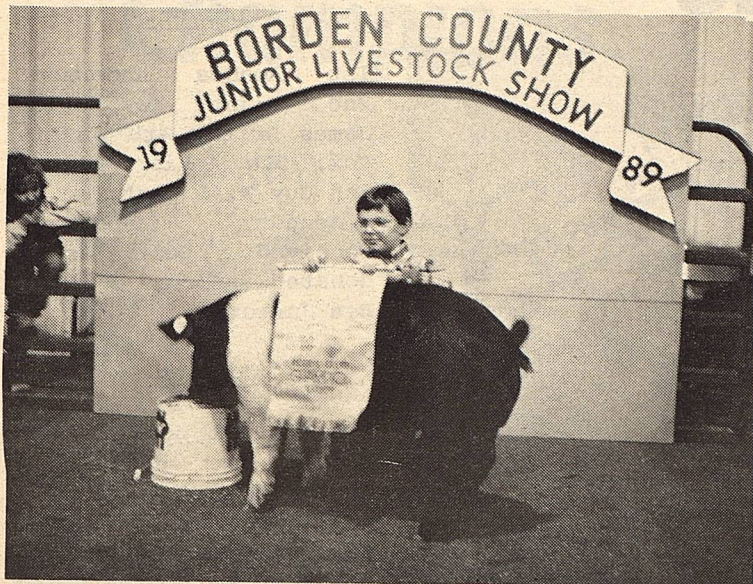

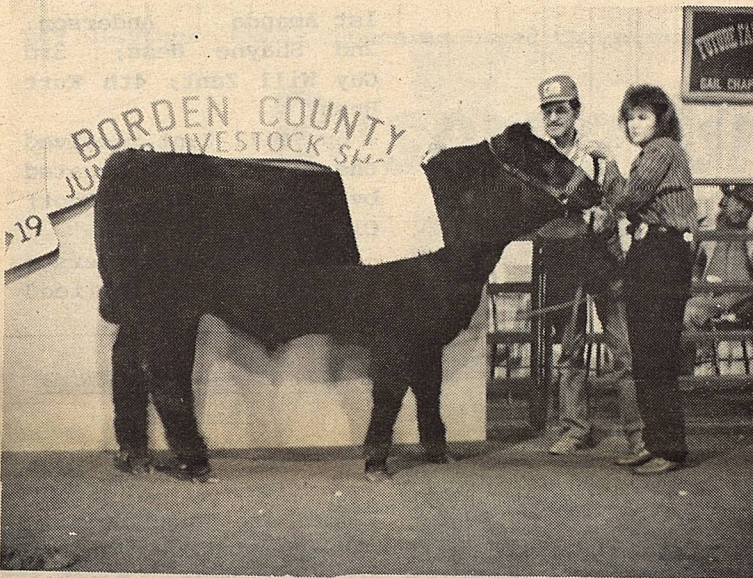

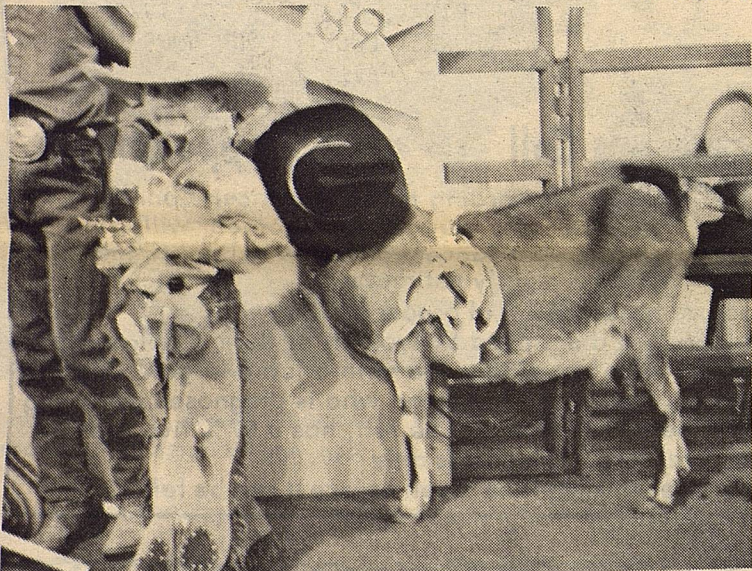

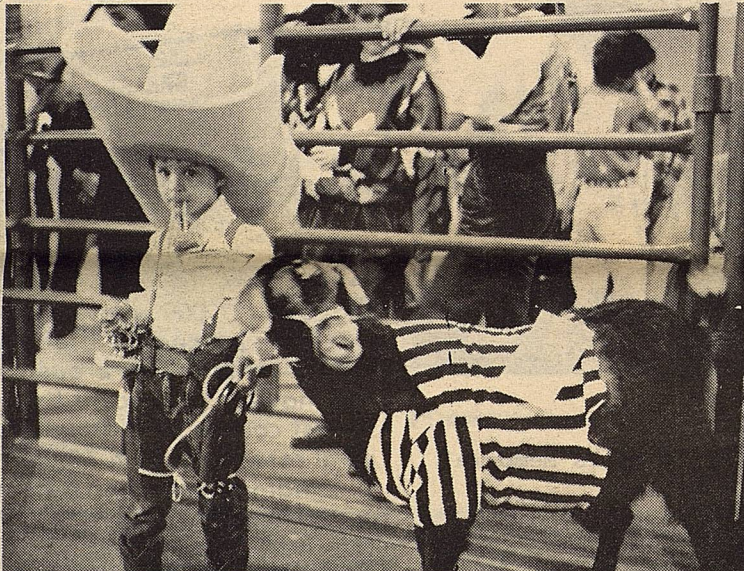

AT&T ANNOUNCES PRICE CHANGES FOR LONG DISTANCE CALLS WITHIN TEXAS

AT&T announces April 1, 1989, price changes for Long Distance Service (MTS) within Texas. AT&T's prices for long distance calling within Texas will be increased by two cents per minute for calls under 82 miles in distance and one cent per minute for calls that are 82 miles or greater in distance. AT&T's current discounts of 25% for evening calls and 40% for night and weekend calls will remain in effect. The price increases are expected to produce approximately \$22.8 million, which is nearly 2.9% of AT&T's annual revenues for Texas Long Distance Service.

This represents the first AT&T price increase for long distance calls within Texas. AT&T's long distance prices for calls within Texas have been reduced overall by about 12% since 1986.

The Long Distance Service price changes will also impact AT&T's PROSM WATS Texas offering, which offers subscribers a 10% discount on all long distance calls within Texas. These price changes are expected to produce approximately \$661,000, or about 3.5% of the annual revenues for AT&T's PROSM WATS Texas offering.

Prices for AT&T's REACH OUTSM Texas offering will also change. The price for initial hour usage will increase from \$12.55 to \$12.95; the additional hour price will increase from \$11.40 to \$12.00. These price increases are expected to produce approximately \$364,000, or about 2.1% of the annual revenues for AT&T's REACH OUTSM Texas offering.

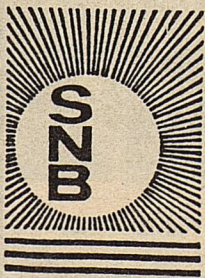
AT&T's tariffs implementing these changes will be filed with the Public Utility Commission of Texas on March 1, 1989, with an effective date of April 1, 1989. The combined price increases are expected to produce approximately \$23.9 million, which is approximately 2.4% of AT&T's annual revenues for all Texas intrastate services.
