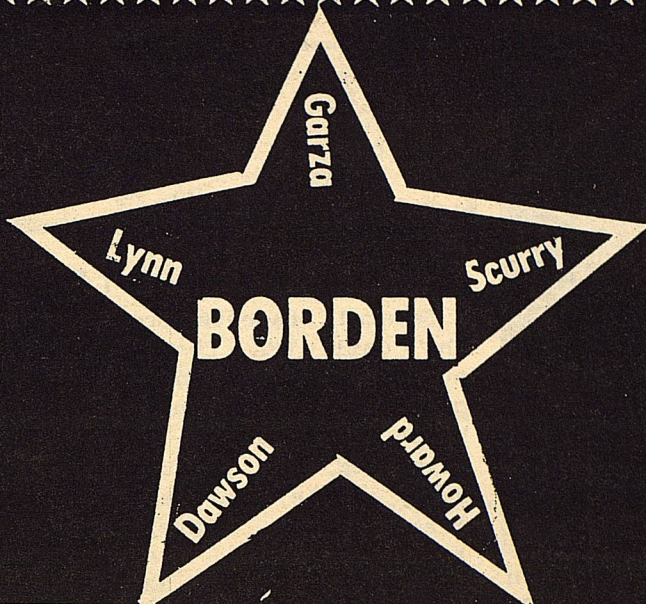

diet, regardless of age, says Powell.

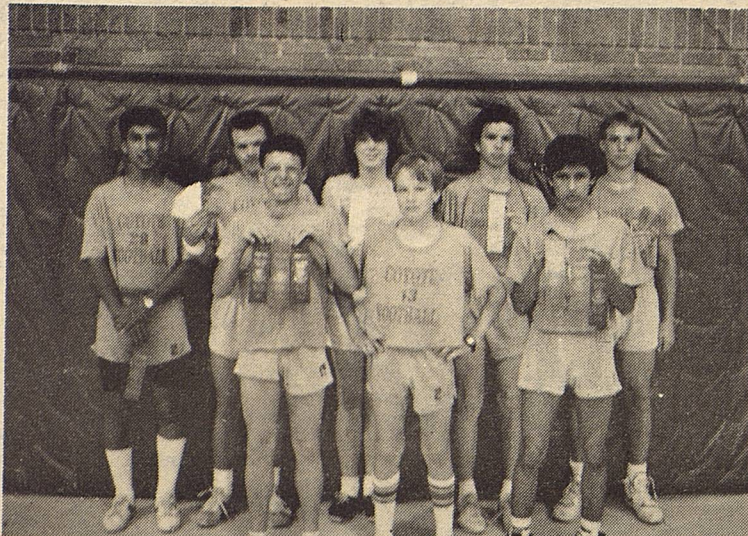

JUNIOR HIGH BOYS TRACK TAKE RUNNER-UP AT GRADY

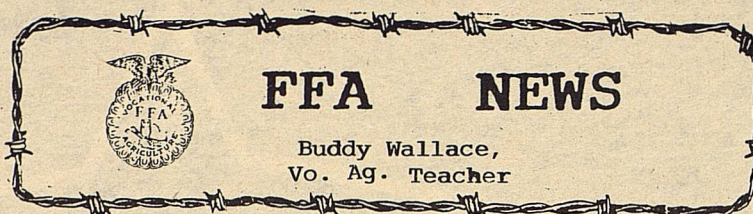
The Borden County junior High boys almost walked away with the team championship trophy at the Grady track meet, but they had to settle for the Runner-Up trophy.

The Coyotes only had seven boys representing them, but they made their mark on the meet. Only Sands scored more points than the Coyotes. With just seven team members, the Coyotes did not have any entries in the two hurdle events and the mile relay.

John Paul Harris led the Coyotes with 3 first place and a second place finish. He won the pole vault with an 8 foot vault, the 100 meter dash 12.36, the 200 meter dash 25.88, and the 400 relay team finished 2nd with John Paul as the anchor leg. The 400 relay team was in the lead going into the anchor leg, but a bad handoff caused them to drop back to second. The other members of the relay were Shannon Smithie, Armando Carrizales, and Clint Wills.

Armando Carrizales also scored big for the Coyotes. He ran on the 400 meter relay. He won both the 800 meter and 1600 meter runs. His 800 meter time was a 2:26 and his 1600 meter time was 5:31. He also long jumped 15'3/4", but he did not place.

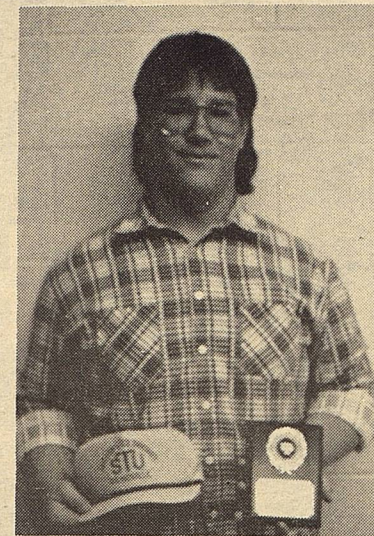
Shannon Smithie also won a first place ribbon in the shot put with a throw of 38'8". He was 5th in the discus with a throw of 89'5". He was 4th in the 100 meter dash with a 12.97 time. He tied for 3rd in the high jump with a jump of 4'8". Clay Miller was third in the 400 meter dash with a 64.2 time. He also long jumped and had a leap of 15'1/4". 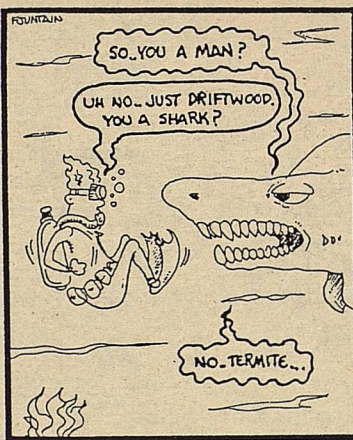
FHA REGIONAL LEADERSHIP CONFERENCE

SOUTHWESTERN BELL ANNOUNCEMENT

Texas Attorney General Jim Mattox advised Southwestern Bell telephone consumers that they are not liable for an unauthorized charges on their bills.

Mattox said the notice is a correction by Southwestern Bell of a previous notice included with bills, that stated customers were liable for any and all unauthorized charges.

Southwestern Bell's previous erroneous notice was mailed following negotiations with the Attorney General's office which

resulted in a requirement that the phone company remove a \$50 liability on consumers for unauthorized telephone charges. State regulations do not allow the phone company to hold customers liable for unauthorized charges.


Mattox said Southwestern Bell's original notice did not clearly state that customers are not liable for unauthorized charges. The original notice caused confusion by consumers.

WHERE ARE THE WILDFLOWERS?

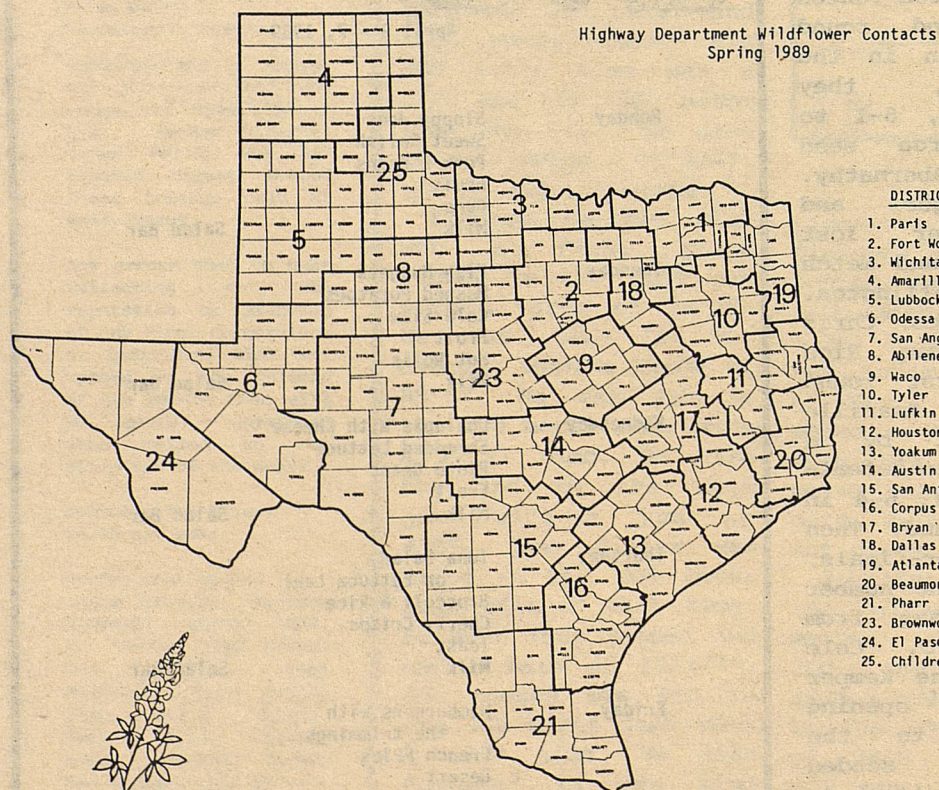
Wildflower enthusiasts will find the objects of their affections much more easily since the highway department's Wildflower Reporting Service began on March 20, the first day of spring.

Weekly, workers in all 24 highway districts note where flowers are blooming and, via computer, share the

information with other highway department offices. Wildflower seekers can call department headquarters in Austin, one of the 12 Texas tourist bureaus, or the nearest district office, and talk to a person--not a recording--about where the flowers are.

The program, now in its third year, is one way the department

tries to make driving a more pleasant experience for Texas travelers. Through vegetation management, landscaping, and propagation of native plants, highway department experts cooperate with nature to avoid erosion, minimize "highway hypnosis," and keep Texas highways some of the most beautiful around.

DON'T TAN INDOORS

In the approaching winter months, more and more Texans will turn to indoor tanning centers to keep their skin brown year round. Most people know that exposure to the sun can cause premature aging and skin cancer. Although many people don't know it, artificial tanning is dangerous, too, according to the Texas Medical Association.

Getting a tan in either the sun or a tanning salon damages your skin. But with indoor tanning, your risks are more extensive and encompass more than just your skin. Over-exposure to sun lamps can result in skin cancer, skin and eye burns, cataracts, immune system damage, blood vessel injuries, and connective tissue damage leading to premature wrinkling.

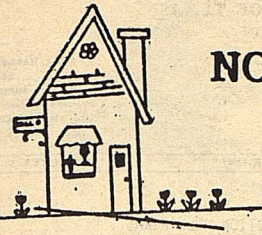
There is no such thing as a "safe" tan. Tanning beds and booths use bulbs that mimic the ultraviolet A (non-burning) rays of the sun. The machines produce mainly UVA and 1% or less of UVB (burning rays); however it takes 1,000 times more UVA radiation to produce a visible tan. Thus, the user is exposed to longer periods of radiation which penetrates more deeply into the skin. UVA rays emitted by tanning machines sent some 2,500 to 5,000 people to emergency rooms nationwide with radiation injuries last year.

You should not use sunlamps if you sunburn easily and don't tan

HOW YOU COMPLAIN

CAN MAKE A DIFFERENCE

Got a complaint? When you complain about a product or service, be sure to do it the right way.

To register a complaint:

* Describe clearly your current problem or complaint. Use facts like dates, costs and problem.

* State exactly what you want the company or agency to do to make things right.

* Print (don't write) your complaint legibly. Better yet, use a typewriter if you have one.

* Use standard paper (8 1/2 x 11), preferably white. Colored paper often does not photocopy well. Since several people or departments may be involved in handling your complaint, your letter and other documents may be photocopied several times.

* Use a pen with dark ink (blue or black) and medium point so that the letter will be legible when copied.

* Include copies (not the originals) of all related documents, purchase receipts, service receipts, past

correspondence with service agencies and the manufacturer.

* Date your letters and other documents.

* Provide your daytime telephone number.

* Reread your letter several times before sending. Put yourself in the reader's shoes. Your letter is not a place to vent your anger; only state the facts and what you would like as a resolution to the problem.

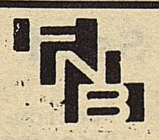
* Be polite and remain calm. Customer relations personnel with a company or agency may be instructed NOT to deal with rude or offensive customers.

Once your complaint is in process:

* Don't delay providing any additional information that is requested.

* Follow the exact directions for procedures and filling out forms.

* Let the company know immediately of any new developments, such as, the product was repaired or is working, a new problem has developed.

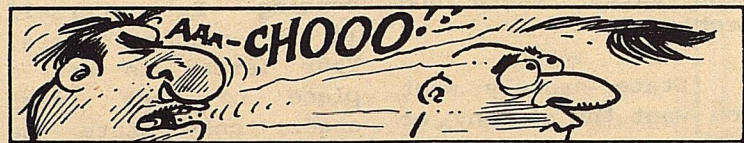

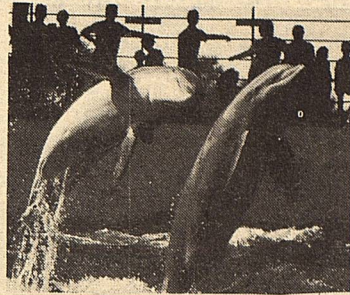

operator. The efficiency of grubbing also increase as soil moisture content increases. A large portion of the plant's root system is pulled from the soil when soil moisture is high.

So, ranchers interested in one or more of these methods of mechanical brush control will obtain better results if used in the winter while soil moisture conditions are more favorable.

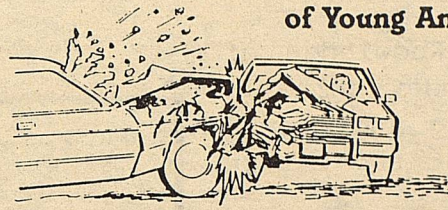

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SOIL MOISTURE IMPORTANT FOR MECHANICAL BRUSH CONTROL

Mechanical brush control methods such as rootplowing, grubbing and chaining work best when soil moisture conditions are good. Rootplowing is an effective method of controlling brush but is more efficient when soil moisture is sufficient to allow the blade to pass through the soil with reduced resistance. Seeding of forage species is often necessary and desirable following rootplowing. Because rootplowing is expensive, it should be used on sited with high production potential. Root plows with fins usually provide the best brush control but they also destroy existing turf. A thin bladed root plow without fins will minimize turf damage but may result in reduced brush control. Chaining involves dragging a heavy anchor chain over brush this uproots or breaks off brush species. Chaining of live brush species provides only temporary control because of

resprouting. However, more live plants are uprooted when soil moisture is high. Chaining can provide temporary brush control that will allow sufficient grass growth so that prescribed burning can be used as a follow-up treatment. Chaining is used effectively to retreat areas that have been treated with herbicide. For example, mesquite may be controlled effectively by chaining an area three years after spraying with a herbicide. With high soil moisture, many previously sprayed trees are uprooted. Dead or partially dead mesquite trees are easier to uproot than unsprayed live trees. Chaining is most effective on plants with a main stem diameter of 5 inches or more. Power grubbing is generally used as a maintenance practice. It is most useful with scattered plants large enough to be easily seen by the equipment

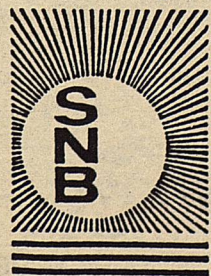
