Coyotes howling out at Gail

Twelve-Year Losing Streak Appears To Be Broken

Thirteen isn't always an unlucky number. According to early reports from the Department of Public Safety, June 13 was the first day in more than 12 years when no one got killed in a Texas traffic accident.

"It looks as if we've achieved the 'One Deathless Day' that safety advocates all over the state have been working for," said George R. Gustafson, president of Texas Safety Association and spokesperson for the Texas Coalition for Safety Belts. "Whats more, we achieved it during the high-risk summer vacation season."

The last fatality-free day in Texas was January 5, 1977.

June 13 was a Tuesday, typically a low-risk day for traffic fatalities in Texas.

"Still, given the size of the state, and the number of miles traveled on any summer day, a deathless day is close to miraculous," Gustafson said. "Every

HOUSE BILL 850

The Department of Public Safety may not issue any license to any person under the age of 18 unless the person:

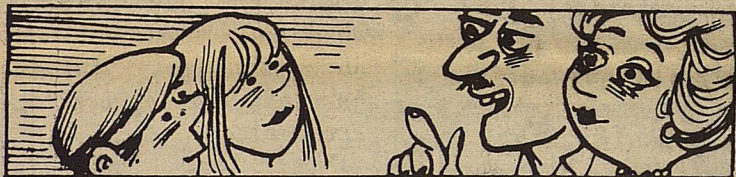
- (A) has obtained a high school diploma or its equivalent;
- (B) has been enrolled for at least 45 days, and is currently enrolled, in a program to prepare persons to pass the high school equivalency exam; or
- (C) is a student enrolled in a public or private spring semester preceding the date of application..

Pending approval and printing of the standard form; the Department of Public Safety will accept a letter on school district letterhead attesting to the same information specified in House Bill 850. This letter must be SIGNED (not stamped) by a school district employee appointed by the school principal;

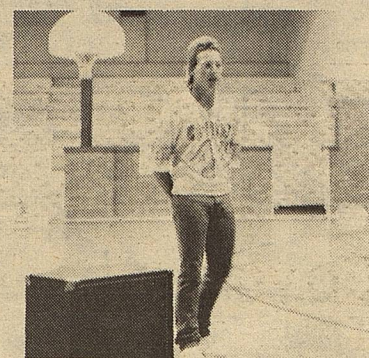

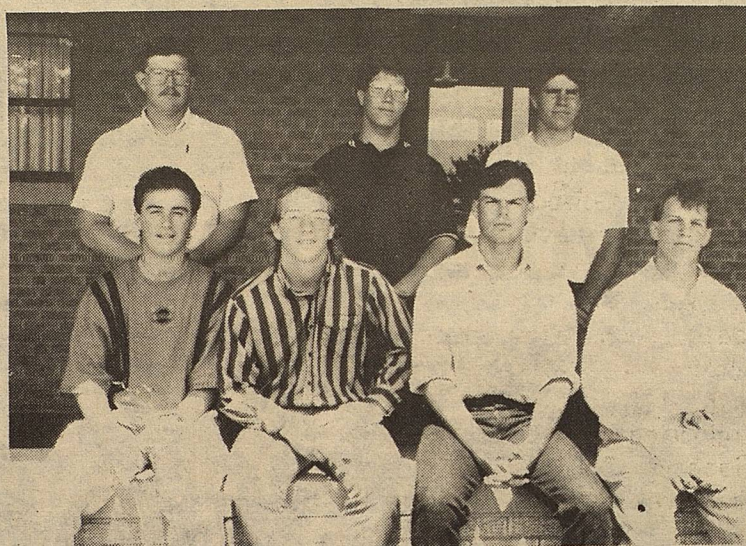

Coyotes and Leopards Tie 16-16

In a game that was shortened because of a dangerous lightning and rain storm. Just before halftime the strong winds hit, and then the lightning intensified and heavy rain began to fall just about the time the second half should have started. The officials ask each team to wait a while to see if the storm would soon blow over. After a while the rain let up, but the lightning continued flashing all around the area. It was then agreed to end the game at that point to insure the safety of players and fans.

The Coyotes started slow, but it appeared that "MO" had shifted toward the Coyotes. New Home took an early lead after the Coyotes took position of the ball on the 2 yard line following a New Home punt. On second down from the 1 yard line, the snap from center was not handled and Shane Kemper fell

on the ball in our endzone. Following the safety, the Coyotes had to kick the ball back to the Leopards. The Leopards then marched the ball down the field for a touchdown. The New Home fullback was hit hard at the line of scrimmage by Jimmy Rios and Brian Bond and the ball shot out. A couple of Coyotes had chances for the ball, but an odd bounce moved the ball away from them into the open arms of the fumbler. The extra point was good, and the Coyotes trailed 10-0 with 2:21 still in the first quarter.

It then only required 5 plays for the Coyotes to show that they could score, too. Running out of a spread formation, Jimmy Rios passed for 6 yards and then ran the ball into the endzone from 2 yards out, Brian Bond kicked the extra point to cut the lead to 10-8. New Home scored again, but

a hard rush on the extra point try pushed the try wide to bring the score to 16-8. Four plays after the New Home kickoff, Jimmy raced into the endzone from 13 yards out. Brian completed the scoring by kicking the extra point to knot the score at 16-16.

Jimmy Rios lead all rushers with 89 yards on 11 carries. He also completed 2 passes for 13 yards to Brian Bond. Patrick Herridge had 4 yards on one carry.

Jimmy Rios also was the leading tackler with 6 assisted and 1 unassisted tackles. Shane Kemper had 5 assisted and 1 unassisted tackles. Paul Sturdivant had 2 assisted and 3 unassisted tackles. Partick Herridge and Cole Vestal had 4 tackles apiece. Brian Bond, Cody Cooley, and Marc Latimer had 3 tackles apiece. Brian Bond punted 3 times for a 35.6 yard average. One punt, following the safety traveled 50 yards. Cody Stone and James Lewis also saw action on speciality teams.

This was the first game of the season for the J.V. Coyotes and they only had 8 freshmen suited up because of a couple of injuries. The Coyotes played a very good defensive game. The linebackers lead the team with tackles. Klint Kemper had 22 assisted and 1 unassisted tackles. He also caused and then recovered a fumble. J.J. Kincheloe had 17 assisted and 3 unassisted tackles. He also had an interception that he returned 12 yards. Safety John Paul Harris had 10 assisted and 3 unassisted tackles. Clint Wills had seven assisted and 2 unassisted tackles. Kirk Jones had 5 assisted tackles.

Newcomer Justin Jenkins had 2 assisted and 2 unassisted tackles before suffering a broken arm in the third quarter. Jeremy Mize had 1 assisted and 1 unassisted tackles. Clint Anderson had 1 assisted tackle.

The Coyote offense was slowed in the first half by two interceptions, but they got untracked in the second half thanks to John Paul Harris. On 5 second half carries, he had 95 yards which included a 25 yard touchdown. He had 144 yards for the game. Klint Kemper supplied the lead blocks until moving to quarterback when Justin got hurt. Also in the second half Clint Wills had 33 yards and 2 touchdowns of 3 and 5 yards. He also caught a pass for 8 yards. Clint Anderson had 2 receptions for 43 yards. Klint Kemper rushed 3 times for 4 yards. He punted twice for a 33.5 yard average.

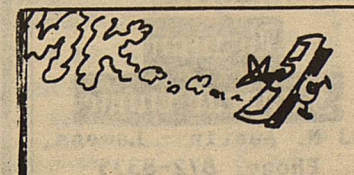

traffic law enforcement officer, community belt program provider, and safety educator in Texas deserves a big pat on the back, as do the media organizations which have assisted us by publicizing the campaign."

However, Gustafson said the coalition would wait until the end of summer before declaring the "One Deathless Day" program an unqualified success.

David Wells, public information officer for the DPS, said there is still a possibility of late fatality reports from local traffic enforcement agencies.

Texas wrecks may be investigated by

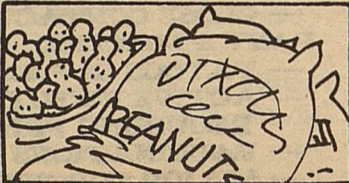
city police, county sheriff's deputies, or state highway troopers, depending on the circumstances. Reports of all serious accidents eventually find their way to the DPS, which compiles traffic statistics for the entire state. Occasionally, a report arrives several months after the event. For this reason, Wells,

said, the DPS usually doesn't issue final figures until the end of each calendar year.

Preliminary figures may change as new information is acquired. Early this summer, for example, there had been a traffic fatality reported on June 13. That death was later found to be the result of natural causes. Wells said.

"In any case," said Gustafson, "we hope that we have reversed a trend this summer. As the season draws to a close, we hope that everyone will continue to observe safe driving habits and buckle up."

He added, "We'd like to see one more deathless day before the summer's over!"

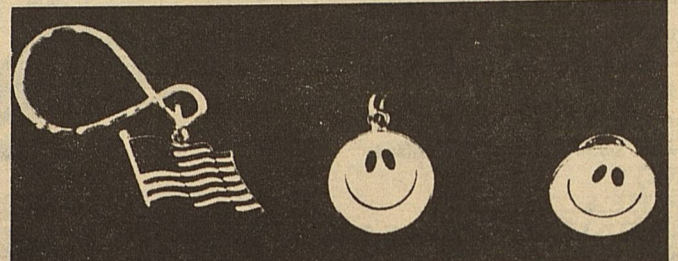
