A MAJOR VICTORY FOR TEACHERS

The Texas State Teachers Association scored a major victory for teachers this weekend when it convinced the State Board of Education to follow Attorney General Jim Mattox's advice and delay for one year the implementation of new stricter career ladder guidelines mandated by a law adopted this spring by the 71st Legislature.

Speaking to some 50 members who had traveled to Austin for the State Board meeting, TSTA President Ollie Besteiro lauded the State Board for its vote providing a one-year transition period. She said this will give teachers "a little breathing room" before imposing yet another set of new requirements to attain the highest career ladder level currently being implemented.

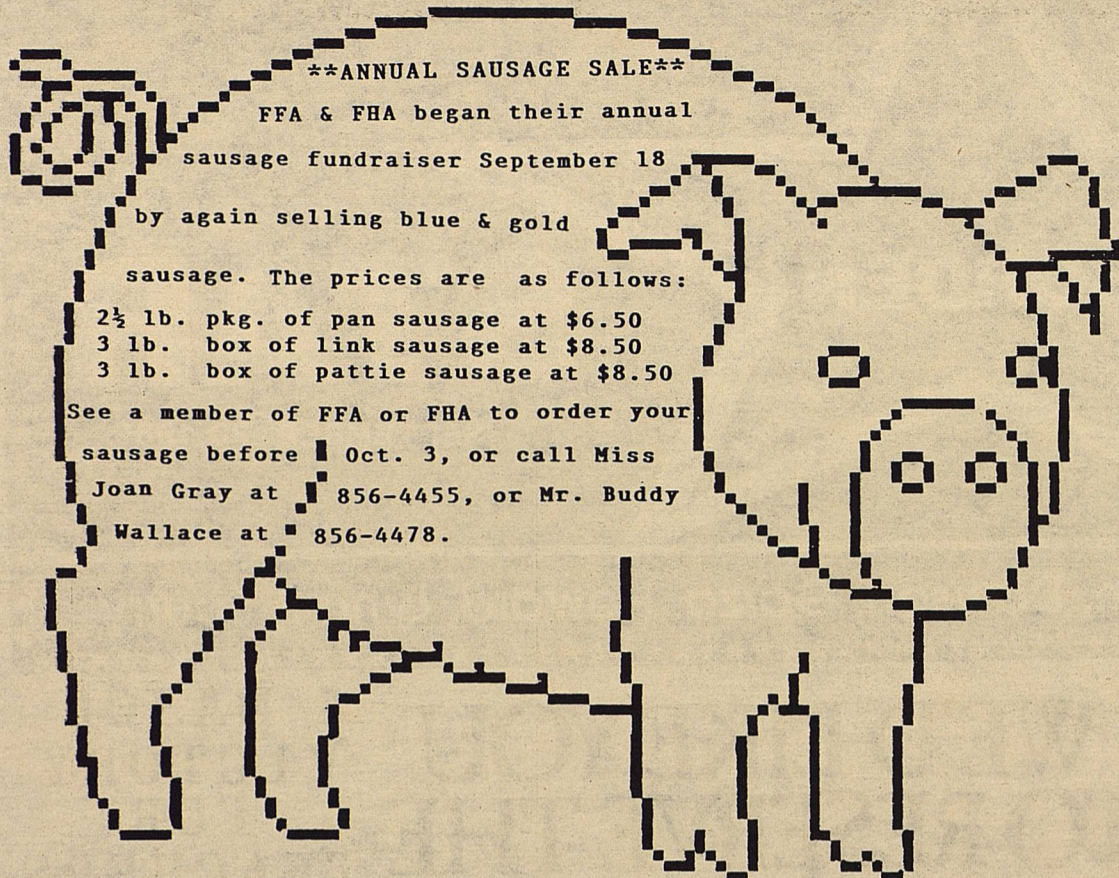
The State Board of Education voted to delay the use of the new level 3 entry and maintenance standards until 1990-91. Main-

■ Texas hunters born between Sept. 2, 1972, and Aug. 31, 1973, must carry a hunter safety certificate when hunting or be accompanied by an adult, beginning Sept. 1. The mandatory hunter education law was passed by the 1987 legislature. Texas Parks and Wildlife expects the new law's phase-in schedule will affect about 20,000 young hunters this year.

Coyotes SKIN The Wildcats 50-0

In the home opener for the Coyotes they took the opening kickoff and drove down the field for their first touchdown. From that point on the Coyotes took control of the game. Jimmy Rios, who paced the Coyotes offense with 97 yards on 11 carries, took the opening kickoff and raced 38 yards before being tackled. He capped off the drive with a 2 yard run. The Coyote defense then forced the Wellman Wildcats to punt. It only took 2 plays for Brian Bond to hit Shane Kemper with a 45 yard touchdown pass. The PAT was a pass from Brian Bond to Patrick Herridge. Trailing 13-0 the Wildcats took the Coyotes kickoff and fumbled the ball after a short gain. Marc Latimer stripped the ball and John Paul Harris recovered the ball on the Wildcat's 23 yard line. Two plays later Jimmy Rios found Marc Latimer in the endzone for another touchdown. The PAT was kicked by Brian Bond to make the first quarter 21-0. With only 10 ticks into the second quarter, Jimmy Rios took the pitch and raced 42 yards for his second touchdown of the night. The PAT was a pass from Brian to Paul Sturdivant. The Wildcats made their deepest penetration of the game. They were finally held at the 6 yard line on 4th down and goal to go. On the next play an inside fake to Jimmy opened the other side for Patrick Herridge, and he raced 74 yards for his first touchdown of the year. Brian kicked the PAT. Once again the Coyote defense held, and the Coyote offense went to work. After moving to the 13 yard line, Marc Latimer grabbed the ball in the air, and raced into the endzone for his second touchdown. The ball was about to be handed to Marc after Brian had faked a handoff to Shane Kemper, but before the exchange could be made Brian was hit. Shannon Smithie got into the scoring column, as he kicked the PAT to make the score 44-0 with 4:18 left in the second quarter. The Wildcats mounted another drive, but Jimmy Rios ended it with an interception in the endzone. The Coyotes kicked off to open the second half. The Wildcats were forced to punt. The Coyote offense sputtered and the ball was turned over to the Coyotes attempted a fake punt. The pass fell short, so the Wildcats got the ball on the Coyotes 30 yard line. The Wildcats only managed to make 5 yards on 4 downs. After some tough inside running by Patrick Herridge, Brian faked the ball to him and pitched it to Shane Kemper who raced into the endzone for a 27 yard touchdown. The game was ended

at that point because of the 45 point rule. Partick Herridge had 93 yards on 5 carries. He also had 9 assisted and 2 unassisted tackles. Shane Kemper had 27 yards on 1 carry and 1 pass reception for 45 yards. He also had 5 assisted and 5 unassisted tackles. Marc Latimer rushed for 13 yards on 1 carry and 1 pass reception for 19 yards. He had 7 assisted and 2 unassisted takcles, one of which he sacked the quarter back for a 10 yard loss. Marc also recovered a fumble on the Wildcats 18 yard line. Brian Bond was 3 of 8 for 51 yards. He had 1 punt for 36 that went out of the endzone. He also had 7 assisted

CELERY BOAT

Clean celery and fill with peanut butter (try adding coconut flakes, raisins or nuts to the peanut butter) or cream cheese mixed with raisins. To keep unfilled celery at its crispiest, store in refridgerator in a jar or plastic container with a few inches of water in the bottom.

FRUIT & VEGETABLE KABOBS

Put a variety of small pieces of fruit or vegetables on a toothpick. Use apple wedges, raisins, orange sections, pineapple, grapes and melon balls for fruit kabobs, and cherry tomatoes, carrot circles, pepper squares and turnip triangles for vegetables treats.

GRAB-A-BAG AND MUNCH

Fill a plastic bag with cut up dried fruit like apricots, banana chips, raisins, apple pieces and add favorite nuts and some carob chips and grated coconut.

tenance and entry will be based on last year's evaluations. The Board also directed local school districts

to determine level 2 placements based on last year's appraisals, as well.

The only change that will be implemented immediately affects teachers who are seeking to enter level 2 for the first time in 1989-90. With the new law leaving no room for any other interpretation, entry for these individuals will be based on appraisal scores in the coming year.

Under the new law, career ladder ob-

servations, placements and payments will occur in the same year beginning in 1990-91. Once implemented, this system will enable teachers who retire, resign or transfer to another school district to receive their career ladder stipend for that year's teaching performance, rather than lose it as they do under the current system as established by the original House Bill 72.

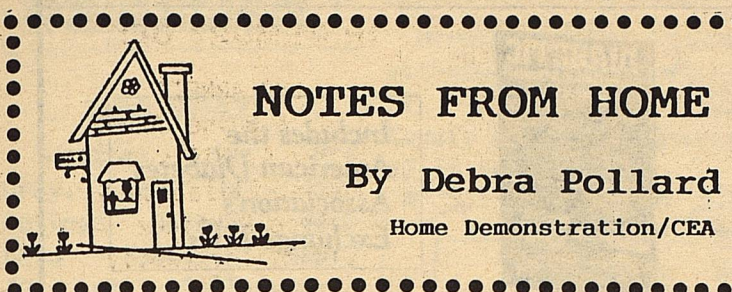

KITCHEN TIPS FOR OLDER PERSONS

Older people often every other week. need help in running a kitchen to protect them from a wide range of problems that might otherwise develop. Here are a few tips for individuals who have contact with elderly individuals:

- Be observant: Note any marked change in habits that could mean an elderly person needs more help in the kitchen.
- Watch nutrition: Make sure they're getting the four basic fruit. Pasta is a tasty, healthful, easy-to-eat food choice.
- Shopping: Shop for one week at a time, favoring single serving type purchases where feasible. Clear unused leftovers out of the refrigerator
- Cooking and Storing: Help with cooking batches of several favorite foods. Package portions like TV dinners for later use. For example, a meal tray might include servings of meatloaf, macaroni and -cheese and green beans.
- The freezer: Date packages in large letters with marking pen. Move older packages forward as you add new items.
- Drinks and snacks: If getting enough liquids is a problem, suggest using the microwave for truly "instant" coffee and tea.
- Keep a basket of fresh, soft, denture-friendly fruit handy too. Grapes, bananas

and ripe pears are good. --Using an oven timer: For someone who's getting forgetful but still likes to cook, try a bright-colored protable timer.

One puts the casserole in the oven, sets the timer for 45 minutes and takes it along to watch the noon new. When the timer sounds, the casserole's done.

--Jar and bottle opening helps: If hand strength and dexterity are a problem, you can compensate. Contact your local chapter of the Arthritis Foundation for information on gripper pads, cap poppers and other useful gadgets.

--Equipment check: Make sure the refrigerator (safe at 40 degrees F.) and freezer (safe at 0 degrees F.) are running properly. A frosted-over unit won't cool properly, so defrost every few months as necessary.

New microwave? Go over adequate thawing, cooking and reheat times with the older person who'll be using the oven. Thorough cooking is a must for bacterial (food poisoning) control.

--Lactose problems: Remember, cheese and yogurt, which don't bother most lactose-intolerant people, are good calcium stand-ins for milk. Many large stores also carry specially treated milk suitable for those with lactose digestion problems.

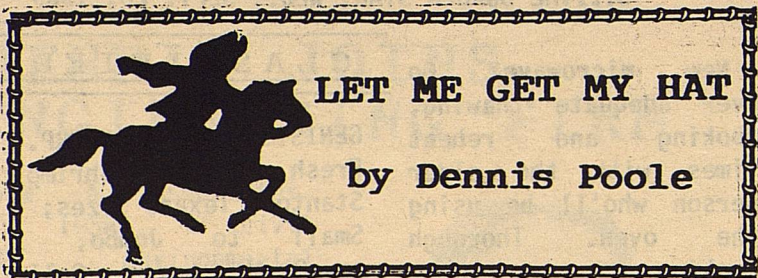

FERTILIZE FRUIT TREES NOW!

Fertilizer now will help put your landscape fruit trees in good shape for winter.

Caution and common sense are the watchwords for this process, but many trees benefit from a boost before cold weather comes.

Make sure the tree is not actively growing as added fertilizer will promote more growth resulting in severe freeze damage.

Trees under three years old should not be fertilized now as they are the most likely to begin new growth with added fertilizer.

On mature trees that are not actively growing, apply one cup of ammonium sulfate (21-0-1) around the dropline. The dropline is the edge of the tree's canopy and is usually the edge of the tree's root area.

For trees that look to be in poor health, two cups should be added.

Higher rates than those suggested could cause freeze damages but the correct amount at the right time will make the trees look healthier and bloom better next spring.

CONSERVATION RESERVE PROGRAM

The federal Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) already is showing benefits, both on and off the farm. By reducing erosion on cropland, it also is reducing sedimentation in waterways.

Across the nation, 30.6 million acres of cropland already have been contracted into the program. This will reduce erosion by nearly 610 million tons of soil a year.

In Texas, erosion has been reduced by about 132 million tons on 3.7 million acres contracted into CRP.

When conservation practices are installed on the 30.6 million acres in CRP, it is estimated that total erosion on cropland will be reduced by about a fifth. Nationwide, the average soil loss on land in the program will drop from 21.5 tons an acre to an estimated 1.6 tons an acre after permanent vegetation is established.

The goal of the CRP is to retire 40 to 45 million acres of highly erodible cropland from production.

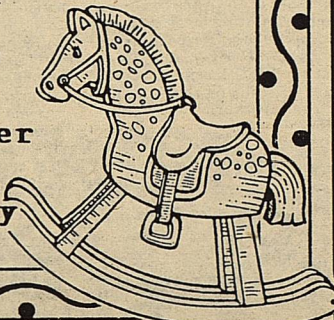
