FIVE QUALIFY FOR STATE

Borden County has qualified five students for the University Interscholastic League Academic State Meet, May 4-6 at The University of Texas at Austin. Qualifiers include Julie Harris, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Harris, third in literary criticism and third in editorial writing; Amy Lewis, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. R.D. Lewis, first in literary criticism and first in feature writing; James and Jeff Lewis, sons of Mr. and Mrs. Clinton Lewis, first in cross-ex debate; and Rachel Romero, daughter of Mrs. Irma Romero, second in feature writing.

The students earned eligibility by placing at the U.I.L. regional meet, held Friday, April 20, in Levelland. Borden County finished

one point behind Plains for the team title, 88-87.

Sponsors for the students are John Wilson and Sue Jane Mayes.

In participating at the State Meet, students qualify for Texas Interscholastic League Foundation scholarships. During 1989-90, the TILF awarded more than \$468,000 in scholarship grants to 361 college students who competed at the UIL State Academic Meet. In 1990-91, the TILF expects to award an estimated 370 new and renewed grants, valued at approximately \$489,000. The TILF funds are made possible through grants from foundations, individuals and families. The TILF has almost \$2,000,000 in endowed funds.

The Gail FFA Chapter has been vigorously involved in judging activities. All total the chapter judging teams consisted of some 25 students which comprised of 6 teams. The following is a summary of each team. The Dairy Cattle Team—James Lewis, Cody Stone, Patsy Underwood and Clint Bennett placed tenth out of 90 teams, second at district level and qualified for state contest on April 28. Poultry Team consisting of Patrick Herridge, Cody Cooley, Amanda Anderson and Kandy Belew placed 6th out of 30 teams, second at district level and also qualified for state contest. Good luck to Rachel, Amy and Amanda this Thursday April 26 at the Regional Tennis Tournament.

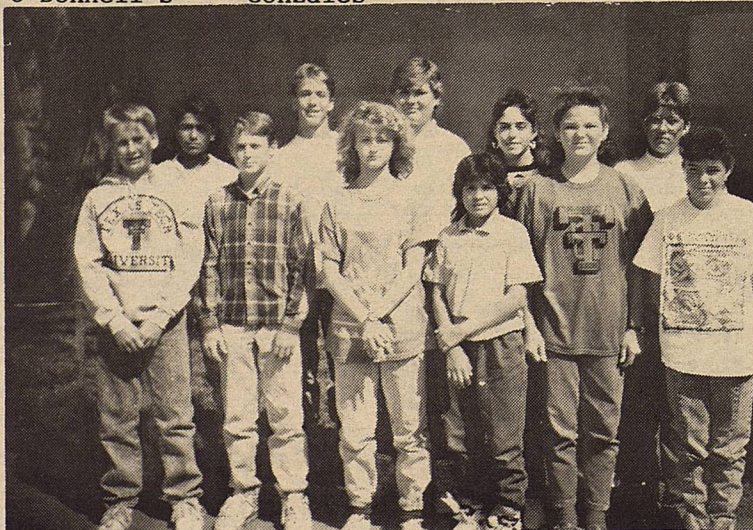
Adcock, Buchanan, and Harrison Wins Junior High Titles

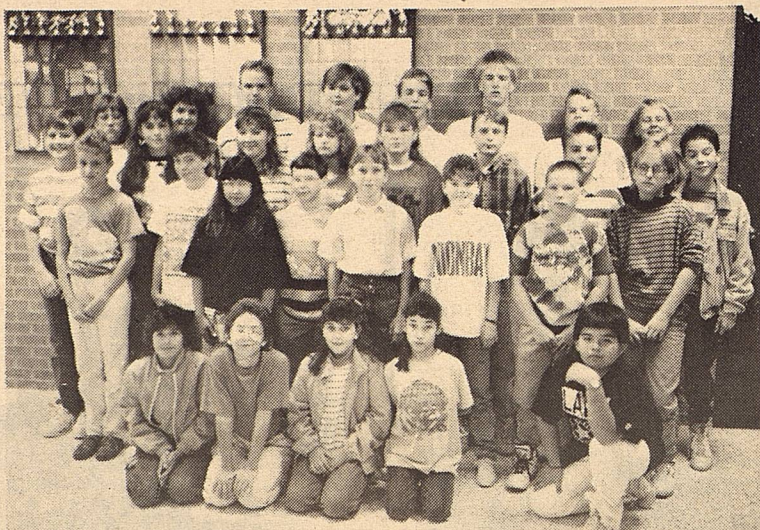

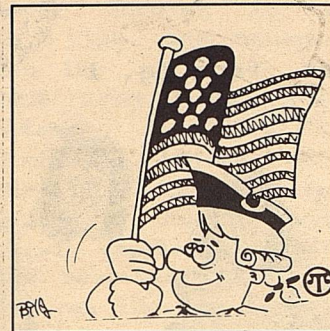

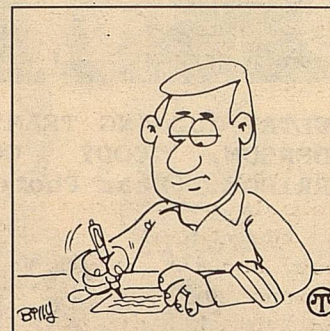

Helmets affect severity, not number of motorcycle accidents

COLLEGE STATION — Motorcycle lists are fully responsible for more than 65 percent of the accidents in which they die, reveals a study conducted at Texas A&M University.

Texas A&M researchers with the Texas Transportation Institute (TTI) found 77.5 percent of 142 selected motorcycle fatalities in Texas in 1986 were the fault of the motorcycle operators. Also, nearly half of the riders died in accidents that did not involve another vehicle.

The typical motorcycle rider involved in fatal accidents was a white male, 26-30 years old with no valid motorcycle license, the study found. He also died of a head injury, was not wearing a helmet and did not have liability insurance. The typical accident had excessive speed and alcohol as contributing factors.

"Helmets will save lives, but the accident rate will not decrease with helmets, just the severity of the accidents," says TTI research associate, Sandra Parsons said. "Nearly one-quarter of the fatalities occurred even though the motorcycle operator was wearing a safety helmet."

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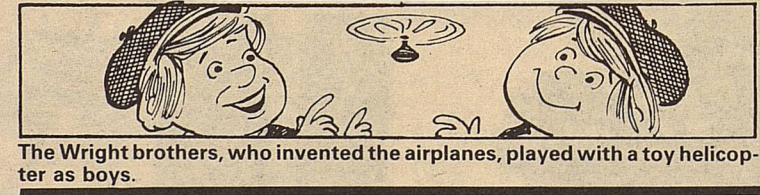

Pecan Trees Require Care In Spring

With spring already in full bloom, the time is ripe to spray newly budded pecan trees.

Spraying will combat scab, the most prevalent disease among pecan trees. The disease is hard to see, but if growers have had the problem in the past, they probably can expect it in the future. Pecan scab usually produces lesions on the leaf and black or dead shucks.

Some varieties such as Burkett, Wichita, Belmas, and Western are susceptible to pecan scab and should be treated with a fungicide. Varieties resistant to pecan scab are Choctaw, Desirable, Cheyenne, Pawnee, and Sioux, but growers should still be alert for problems with the fungus.

Spray immediately after the buds break and then two or three more times until June.

While spraying a fungicide, also spray the pecan trees with zinc. Zinc sprayed on foliage helps produce larger leaves and promotes overall tree growth and nut production.

The prime time to fertilize pecan trees is immediately after the buds break. The old rule of thumb is

to apply one pound of ammonium sulfate, 21-0-0. per inch of trunk diameter.

Fertilizer should be broadcast on the surface under the pecan tree and should extend out to the canopy. A common misconception for fertilizing is to dig a hole near the trunk and pour liquid fertilizer into the hole. Since most feeder roots are in the top 18 inches, there is no need for fertilizer to be placed beneath the depth of the soil.

Newly planted pecan trees should be cut back to one-half their height. When pecan trees are dug at nurseries, the roots are damaged. Cutting the tree back gives it a better chance of regenerating a new root system.

Mulching is also important in helping young trees get established. Some of the best mulch is leaves, hay, pine needles and straw.

Unlike most trees, young pecan trees can withstand Roundup applications that are used to kill surrounding grasses. Young trees need plenty of water and should be kept relatively free of competition with grasses, especially bermuda grass.

A workday in preparation for the annual Borden County Junior Rodeo will be held Saturday, May 19, 1990 at the county arena in Gail.

HAYING AND GRAZING ACR

The nongrains period for ACR and CU for pay began on April 1. All livestock must be removed from the acres you intend to call ACR or CU for pay for the 1990 program. Please don't get caught grazing these acres as the penalties are severe.

You may resume haying and grazing these acres September 1.

SMALL GRAINS CERTIFICATION

May 1, 1990 is the final date to report acreage planted to small grains. The report is required for any small grain (wheat, oats, barley, rye, etc.) regardless of use (grain, grazing, cover on ACR, CU for Pay, or CU for P&CP). Zero acreage reports for small grain bases are also required.

This date also applies if you wish to request to leave small grains cover standing to reseed itself and not be considered the grain crop. There is a \$10.00 inspection fee for this option.

LIVESTOCK FEED PROGRAM

The livestock feed program ended April 14, 1990. Any purchased feed on which assistance has been paid must be fed by April 25. All feed receipts must be submitted no later than 30 days after the end of the feeding period. We need your receipts by May 15.

ACR REQUIREMENTS

Eligible land for ACR

in 1990 must have been planted to a crop or designated as ACR in 2 out of the last 3 years. Plots must be at least 5 acres in size and at least 66 feet wide. Official acres can be any size. ACR in skip rows must be at least 4 idle rows. Small grains on ACR land must be destroyed by May 1 or you may pay an inspection fee to leave it standing as cover crop. May 1 is the final date to do this.

1989 COTTON LOAN

May 31 is the final date to obtain a loan on eligible 1989 cotton.

FAILED ACRES

Disaster credit applies if a crop is destroyed by conditions beyond the producers control. These conditions must cause damage so that is not feasible to harvest the crop.

Producers who have crop insurance, obtain an appraisal, and are released by the insurance company to destroy the crop, must file an ASCS-574 and report the total planted acres with the ASCS office, before physical evidence of the crop is destroyed. This also applies to producers who do not have crop insurance. The reason being a farm visit may be required to document the disaster and weather normal farming practices were carried out. You must wait to destroy the crop until ASCS approval is obtained.

This policy has been adopted by the Texas State ASCS Committee.

Texas A&M scientists may have the antidote for staying sober

COLLEGE STATION — Mice that shrug off doses of alcohol that should have them staggering and sleepy are giving medical researchers intriguing new clues to how and why alcohol makes humans drunk.

Scientists at Texas A&M University say laboratory mice treated with ganglioside, a chemical found in the brains of rodents, humans and other mammals, appear to be able to resist intoxicating effects of alcohol.

The mice's performance on test of agility and coordination improved "markedly" when they were treated with ganglioside before receiving intoxicating doses of alcohol. The rodents also slept for shorter periods of time than mice that weren't treated.

The scientists say that, at least in theory, their studies point the way toward an antidote for alcohol intoxication. But, they point out that developing a practical "sober-up pill" for human use may be difficult. In mice at least, ganglioside has to be administered — by injection — six hours before alcohol is consumed to be effective.
