Area Men Injured in Airplane Crash Near Gail

Two area men who suffered injuries Tuesday morning, March 21, when their small plane crashed three miles of Gail were transported from Cogdell Memorial Hospital in Snyder to Lubbock's UMC.

The pilot, Cole Herring and passenger, Joel Dennis were transported to Snyder by Borden County EMS after Herring walked about a mile from the crash scene to a highway to get help. He was picked up by George Herring, an oilfield pumper, and taken to the Borden County Courthouse where emergency personnel were summoned.

One of the first on the

scene was Cole's brother Jon, a Borden County deputy sheriff. The brothers are not related to George Herring.

Roger Moore, FAA investigator from Lubbock, said the PA-18 Piper Cub, owned by the Flying D Ranch, appeared to have hit nose first, skidded some 90 feet and flipped over. The crash occurred about 10 a.m. on the O.B. Spade Ranch.

Herring is recuperating at home in Fluvanna in a body brace. Tests found fractures on the spine of both men. Dennis is still in UMC in a body brace. He also had surgery on the knee that was injured.

Wagons Ho! Trail Ride Passes through Gail

Tom Seay is the organizer and trailmaster of the 1995 American Transcontinental Trailride which arrived in Snyder Tuesday March 21, and left Thursday morning to continue its trek to the West Coast.

Some 18 riders, family members and support staff stayed in local motels and travel trailers around the Scurry County Coliseum annex while their horses

rested and, when necessary, were treated by local veterinarians.

The wagon train spent a night near the Kent Holmes farm and passed through Gail Friday afternoon, March 24 on their way to the next camp site on the Tim and Carol Wilson Ranch west of Gail.

Seay said the drive started on Jan. 2 near Savannah, Ga. They hope to finish in San Diego,

Calif. in late May.

Riders pay a fee to be included in the ride and the group is furnished three meals a day.

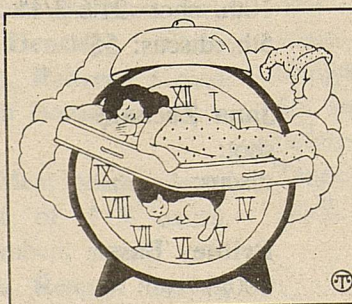
The group averages some 20 miles per day although some days are much longer, said Seay.

Pat Goodwin of Locust Grove, Va. said the coldest part of the trip so far was when the group crossed the Mississippi River from Mississippi to Louisiana.

"It was sleeting and raining," said Goodwin. "And quite a sight too, as the bridge authority stopped all vehicle travel while we went across."

The Borden County high school girls track team ran at the Grady Track Meet Saturday, March 25. The warm and windy day was perfect for track competition.

The girls raced to a third place finish with a total of 88 points. Highlight of the day was the mile relay event which the team of Jill Voss, Shelby Isaacs, Sandy Brummett and Shalina Reyes ran for the first time this year. They had a second place with a time of 4:57.38. Shelby ran a personal best time to win a second in the 100m. hurdles and first in the 300m. hurdles. Shelby's 300m. hurdle race was run mostly into the wind and she beat her competition from O'Donnell for the first time this track season.

Jill Voss placed a close second in both the 100m. and the 200m. dash. She

was not at full strength in these competitions, as she was still recovering from an illness that has plagued her for the last two weeks.

Sandy Brummett is also returning from a sickness and she was reduced to only one running event this meet, which was the mile relay.

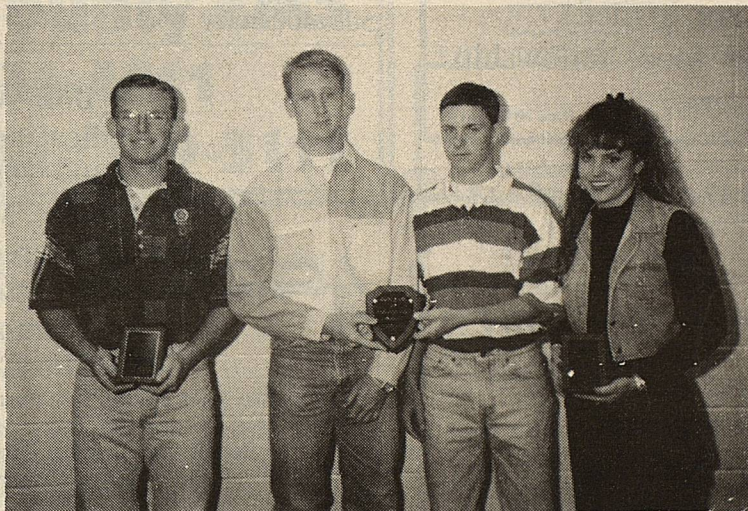

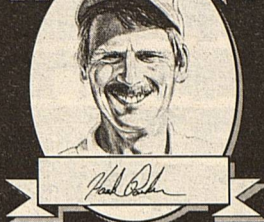

April 3-9, 1995 has been proclaimed Public Health Week in Texas and across the nation to help educate communities about available public health services and the specific health needs of each area.

Dr. David R. Smith, Texas Commissioner of Health, said, "The theme of *Public Health is You, Too* has been chosen to illustrate that each of us is responsible for choosing a healthy lifestyle. Helping you make healthy choices and protecting the health of your community is what the Texas Department of Health is striving to do in cooperation with local health care professionals. Public health helps protect you, your family and your community."

Public Health Week proclamations are expected to be signed by President Bill Clinton and Texas Governor George W. Bush. Setting aside a special week to focus on public health increases the understanding and appreciation of the role of public health in protecting and improving the health of individuals and communities as a whole. Public health professionals include many people accomplishing a diversity of jobs, including restaurant inspectors, infectious disease specialists,

health educators, primary care physicians, laboratory technicians, food and drug safety inspectors, and many more.

On any given day in Texas, you can expect to see these public health benefits around the state:
