To be eligible for an award, employees must have completed one year of accident free driving.

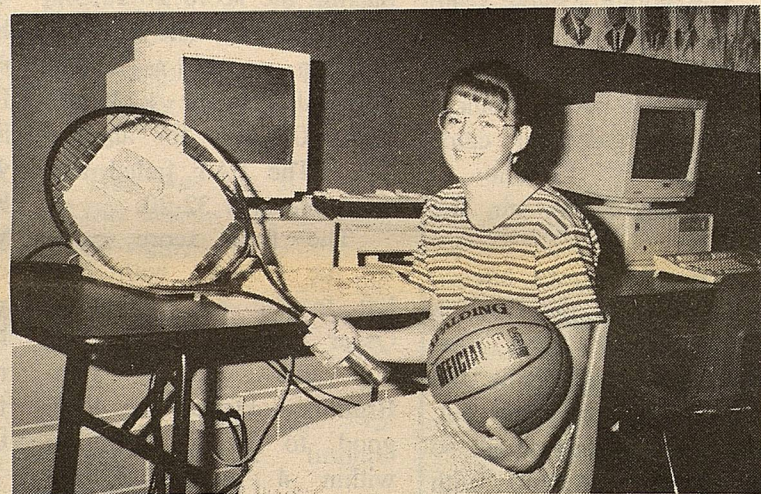
An awards banquet to recognize the district achievers was held at the

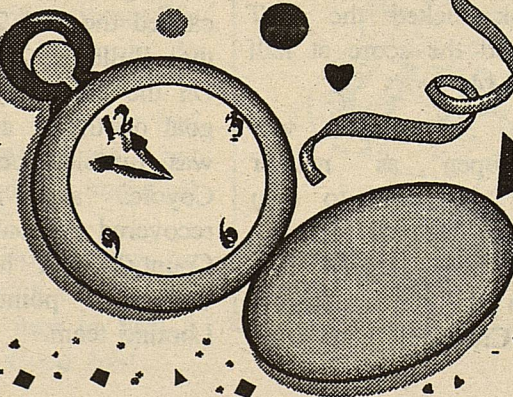

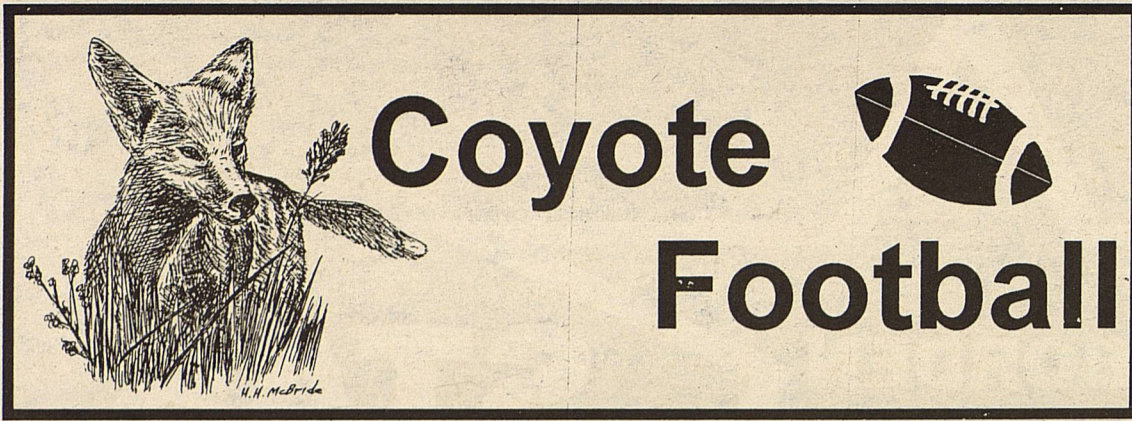

## Coyote JV Outlasts the Bulldogs 54-32

The Borden County junior varsity played host to the Loraine Bulldogs Thursday, October 12th in their second home game of the season and the fourth game overall.

This game proved to be a very fast paced and exciting one. The key to the outcome of the ballgame was the opening few minutes of the contest.

The Coyotes won their first battle of the night by winning the coin toss which gave them the ball on their own 20 yard line. It only took the Coyotes three plays and 34 seconds to grab a lead that they would never relinquish. The highlight of the drive was a nifty 47 yard run for Clint Scott. Scott finished the drive with a 6 yard run. The extra point was missed so the Coyotes led 6-0. Borden County held the visitors, in fact, they forced a fumble and Clell Knight fell on the ball at the Bulldog 30 yard line. Five plays later, the Coyotes capped the drive as quarterback Jeffrey Dennis hit end Jason Scott on a nice play action pass for a 4 yard TD pass. Dennis then threw to Knight for the extra points making it 13-0 with 4:45 left in the opening period.

The Bulldogs then changed from the conventional tight formation on offense to a more wide open spread that caused some trouble for the Coyotes. But that drive stalled at the Coyote 15 yard line. Clint Scott made several runs close to 10 yards to just move the ball up the field. This drive took approximately five minutes off the clock. They converted a tough 4 and 5 as Dennis hit Jason Scott on a nice pass. The Coyotes overcame a couple of penalties to push the ball across on a 4 yard

run by Clint Scott. The Dennis kick made the score 21-0 with 4:55 left in the 1st half.

The Bulldogs responded with their first score as they returned the ensuing kick off 75 yards and then converted a pass for the extra points to make the score 21-7.

Again, the Coyotes used their ball control offense to move up the field. Clint Scott busted loose for his 3rd score of the day on a nice 22 yard run. Opening the holes again was Clell Knight, Jason Scott, Jeff Dennis, James Nance, Clint Cowart, Preston Sharp and Cesar Mujica. Dennis again kicked the extra point to make the score 29-7 with 1:15 left in the half.

But the Bulldogs would show their explosiveness as they scored in 29 seconds late on a 55 yard run to make the score 29-13. For the remainder of the half, the Coyotes did a good job of mixing passes with the run. They also used their time-out. It only took 3 seconds to move the ball 50 yards to score on a Dennis to Jason Scott 8 yard pass to give the Coyotes a 35-13 halftime lead.

In the 2nd half, the Bulldogs got on the board first. They recovered a Coyote fumble and marched 40 yards down the field. They capped the drive with a 10 yard run to cut the score to 35-19 with 4:28 left in the 3rd.

Clint Scott and the Coyotes answered quickly as he raced 50 yards for the score with less than a minute left. The tally was now 41-19 going into the 4th.

The Coyotes got the ball back after a punt by the Bulldogs and pushed the score to their biggest

## Coyotes Drop District Opener 44-28

The Borden County Coyotes traveled to Loraine Friday, October 13th for the first district game of the '95 season. The Coyotes were defeated by the Bulldogs in a close action packed thriller that turned into a 16 point victory for Loraine.

The young Coyote team played very tough against a veteran squad. The Coyotes had their chances to win the game but came up short. Loraine is highly favored to win the district.

Fernando Baeza opened the scoring for the Coyotes as they took their first possession of the game and scored from 16 yards out. The PAT wasn't good so the score read 6-0 with 4:21 left in the first quarter.

The Bulldogs would answer with two quick first quarter scores and one TD early in the second period. Each score was run by speedster Corey Woodell with runs of 39, 60 and 19 yards. The score was now 20-6 in favor of Loraine.

With no time left in the first half, Coyote running back Fernando Baeza found the end zone from 41 yards out. Colt McCook kicked the PAT good and the score at half was 20-14.

The 3rd period was wide open as neither defense was able to stop the other team's offense. The Bulldogs scored first with a 45 yard pass to Alvin Crawford with 9:42

left in that quarter. Their PAT was blocked so the score was 26-14.

The Coyotes took their turn with the ball and found the end zone with 7:32 left in the 3rd period as Colt McCook hit Oscar Baeza for an 18 yard TD pass. The PAT was wide making the score 26-20.

It did not take Loraine long to answer as Corey Woodell ran the kick off back 60 yards for another TD. The PAT failed and the score was 32-20.

The final score came for the Coyotes with 3:35 left in the 3rd period as Oscar Baeza went in from 3 yards out. John Brummett kicked the PAT good to bring them to within 4 points of the district favorites, 32-28.

With 1:40 left in the 3rd period, Bulldog Corey Woodell again scored from 23 yards out. The PAT didn't count making the score 38-28.

The Coyotes had only 2 possessions in the 4th period and they resulted in a fumble on the Bulldog 2 yard line and an interception that 79 yards in the other direction.

Trailing 38-28 in the fourth quarter, Coyote running back Oscar Baeza carried the ball 25 yards to the Bulldog 2 yard line. On the next play, first and goal on the 2, an exchange was fumbled between two Coyotes and a Bulldog recovered the ball. Borden County could have pulled within 2 points of the Loraine team.

The Coyotes touched the ball next with 1:30 left in the game as an attempt to throw the ball to the end zone was picked off by the Bulldog speedster. He ran 79 yards to pay dirt with :35 seconds left. This made the final score 44-28.

Fernando and Oscar Baeza combined the rushing for 271 yards for Borden County. Fernando had 24 carries for 140 yards and 2 TD's. Oscar had 17 carries for 131 yards and 1 TD. He also caught two passes for 23 yards and a TD. Fernando had 9 tackles, to fumble recoveries and a caused fumble. He also caught two passes for 7 yards.

Colt McCook threw the ball 15 times, completed 8 for 103 yards and 1 TD. McCook had 4 tackles on defense.

McCook's favorite target with 4 receptions for 73 yards and he had 5 tackles on defense.

Roy Clayton led the defense with 10 tackles. Clayton recovered a fumble and caused a Bulldog fumble. He snaps the ball and blocks for the Coyote offense.

Also contributing to the game was Chris Harrison, Trini Vasquez and Colt Miller.





## Coyote Pups Give Loraine First Loss of Season, 22-2

The Borden County Coyote junior high football team hosted the Loraine Bulldog junior high team Thursday, October 12th.

The Pups scored 22 first half points and held on to win the game 22-2.

Borden County scored first with good runs by Kevin Pinkerton following block of Nick Flanigan, Ramon Griffin, Robert Stamper, John Harding and D.J. Smith. The PAT failed and the score was 6-0.

The Coyote defense forced a Bulldog fumble and quickly found themselves on the Bulldog end of the field again. D.J. really struck a Loraine player hard and the ball popped loose for Nick Flanigan to recover. Two plays later Ramon Griffin carried the ball in from 20 yards out. Kevin Pinkerton's kick was good

and the score was now 14-0.

The Pup's defense would hold the Bulldogs without a first down. The Coyote offense would prove deadly again as Kevin Pinkerton popped in between good blocks from John Harding and Robert Stamper to go 49 yards for the third Coyote TD. The PAT was kicked good by Kevin Pinkerton making the score 22-0.

The Bulldogs only points came in the 3rd period when the Coyotes opted to take a 2 point safety rather than risk a punt from their own end zone. The plan proved to be a good one as the Bulldogs took over from their own territory.

The Pups played great defense all night long. Standouts on defense were D.J. Smith, Ramon Griffin, and Kevin Pinkerton.

lead of the night, as backup running back, Ronny Gutierrez, scampered 20 yards for the first TD of his young career. Dennis ran the 3 yards for the extra point and the Coyotes lead 48-19.

Twenty seconds later, the Bulldogs had a 39 yard

TD run to cut the lead to 48-25.

The action slowed down for a few minutes as both teams traded punts. But with 2:42 minutes left, Clint Scott would get his fifth and the final Coyote TD as he raced 68 yards for the score making it 54-25. Twenty one seconds late, Loraine scored on a 50 yard run of their own to complete the wild night of scoring 54-32.

The Coyotes managed to run out the clock, but it took a nice pass from back up quarter back Clell Knight to Jeffrey Dennis, now playing an end position, for 21 yards and a 1st down to insure that the explosive Loraine would not touch the ball again.

This was the first loss of the season for Loraine junior varsity.

Clint Scott carried the ball 32 times for 417 yards and 5 TD's. He also threw 2 passes for 60 yards. Clint had 13 tackles and 2 fumble recoveries

Dennis was 5 of 6 for 51 yards and 2 TD's. He also had 4 tackles.

Jason Scott caught 5 passes for 78 yards and had 11 tackles.

Ronny Gutierrez had 1 reception and 4 carries for 26 yards and 6 tackles.

Preston Sharp had 8 tackles; Clell Knight, 5 tackles; Cesar Mujica, 4 tackles; Clint Cowart and Clint O'Brien had 1 tackle each.





# Obituary

## Mary Leontine Watson Espy

1916-1995

Leontine Espy died Sunday evening, Oct. 8, 1995, in San Angelo at the age of 78.

She was born Nov. 13, 1916, and she spent her childhood at the ranch 12 north of Van Horn. Her parents, John Tully and Madora Fowler Watson, homesteaded in Culberson County and lived there until their deaths. Leontine finished her high school career at the age of 14 and completed McMurry College in Abilene at the age of 18. She taught school in Sonora until her marriage to Howard Espy in 1937. Howard preceded her in death in 1958. Mrs. Espy continued ranching operations in Sutton and Culberson counties for many years.

She is survived by her two daughters, Tom Elaine and husband, Walter Linn "Bud" Whitehead, of Sonora and Mary John and husband, W.L. "Bill" Phinizy, of Gail. She was blessed with five grandchildren, Espy Whitehead of Sonora; Lea Whitehead Baze and husband, Arlis, of Midland; Kelly Whitehead Epperson and husband, William, of Rocksprings; William Espy Phinizy and wife, Michelle, of Dalhart and Mary Kate Phinizy of Gail.

In addition to her active interest in ranching and conservation, she generously gave her time and wise guidance to community and school activities, always being supportive of many enriching and worthwhile programs. She was a member of the St. John's Women's Auxiliary while in Sonora. After she moved to San Angelo, she

was active in the Planned Parenthood Program and served on the board of directors of the Harvard House Condominium Association for many years.

Her entire life was always deeply influenced by her love and deep appreciation of her ranching heritage. This legacy has been passed on through her family.

A memorial service was held Tuesday, October 10, at St. John's Episcopal Church in Sonora with the Rev. Monte Jones officiating. The family requests that any memorials be made to a favorite charity.
