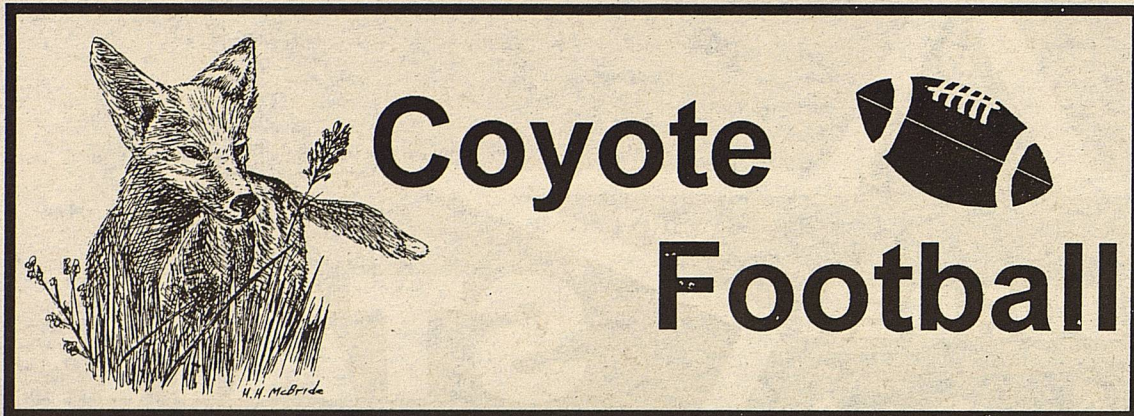

Coyotes Walloped by Cardinals 46-22

The Borden County varsity football team traveled to Hermleigh Friday, October 20, and was over-powered by the Cardinals 46-22. The loss brings the Coyotes to a 4-3 record overall and 0-2 for the District play.

The Coyotes opened the scoring by recovering a Cardinal fumble and then passing the ball to the end zone. Grant Key was the Coyote defender that fell on the loose ball. Several plays later, quarterback Colt McCook passed the ball 7 yards to Ryan Grant for the TD. The PAT was unsuccessful. The score was 6-0 with 6:15 left in the 1st period.

Hermleigh soon answered with six points of their own as a Cardinal cut loose and raced 30 yards to the end zone. The PAT failed and the score was tied 6-6 with 4:55 left in that quarter.

The Cardinals were able to break through the Coyote defense three more times before Borden County found the end zone again.

With 6:49 left in the 3rd period, Colt McCook passed the ball 28 yards to Fernando Baeza for a TD. Fernando caught the ball on the 5 yard line and made one move for some yards. He was able to cross the goal line for the TD with a Cardinal defender hanging on. John Brummett kicked the PAT good making the score 25-14 in favor of Hermleigh.

A good kick off return

helped set up the next Cardinal TD. With 6:32 left in the 3rd period, Hermleigh connected on a 22 yard pass for the touchdown. The PAT was blocked by Grant Key. The score now read 31-14.

The Cardinals would be the first to score in the 4th period from 4 yards out. They completed a one point PAT and with 8:24 left in the game, the score was 38-14.

The Coyotes found the end zone in the 4th period with a 21 yard pass from Fernando Baeza to Grant Key. John Brummett kicked the PAT good and the score was 38-22 with 6:00 left in the game.

Borden County found themselves deep in Cardinal territory on their next to last possession of the game when a misplaced hand-off hit the ground and bounced into the end zone. A Cardinal landed on the ball for the TD. The kicked PAT was good and the final score read 46-22.

The Coyote rushers were held to only 107 yards on 26 carries.

The Coyotes were forced to put the ball in the air more when they got behind so early in the game. They produced 183 yards passing and completed 17 out of 34 attempts.

Quarterback Colt McCook led the Coyote offense, completing 16 out of 30 passes for 162 yards, 2 touchdowns and one

interception. He carried the ball 6 times for 39 yards and had 2 tackles defensively.

McCook completed 6 passes to Fernando Baeza for 89 yards and 1 TD. Fernando carried the ball 8 times for 50 yards and had 14 tackles and 1 fumble recovery.

Roy Clayton caught 2 passes for 35 yards. He caught one pass mid-field and raced to the end zone for an apparent 6 points. But a penalty on the play turned the reception into a 15 yard gain. Roy had 6 tackles on defense and recovered a Cardinal fumble.

Oscar Baeza caught 4 passes for 32 yards. He carried the ball 12 times for 18 yards and had 10 tackles on defense.

Grant Key caught 4 passes for 32 yards and one TD. He recovered a Cardinal fumble and had 11 tackles on defense.

Coyote Pups Up-Ended by Cardinals 25-14

The Borden County junior high football team received its second loss of the season Thursday, October 19, when they hosted the Hermleigh Cardinals.

The Cardinals stopped the Coyote's first possession and marched the ball right on to the end zone. They ran the one point conversion over making the score 7-0.

Each team took a turn with the ball before the first quarter ended.

In the second quarter, Kevin Pinkerton hit Ramon Griffin with a pass for 25 yards and a first down. The Cardinals held this drive defensively, giving them possession of the ball.

Hermleigh then ran the ball for their second TD from 30 yards out. The PAT failed and the score was 13-0.

Kevin Pinkerton ran the ball for an impressive 42 yards on the drive before the half. But the Cardinal defense held the Coyotes again so the ball came back to them.

The Cardinals first drive of the second half was stopped by the Coyote defense on Borden County's

5 yard line. This good defensive stand by the Pups forced the ball over on downs.

Kevin Pinkerton carried the ball twice up the middle making a first down before the Pups were forced to punt. The punt was blocked by the Cardinals and they took possession from mid-field.

The Cardinals were able to find the end zone twice in the 4th period to make the score 25-0.

On the Coyote's next possession, Kevin Pinkerton put the Pups on the score board with a 50 yard run. Kevin then kicked the PAT through making the score 25-8.

It looked as if the Cardinals would score again, but Ramon Griffin stepped in front of an offensive pass and intercepted the ball. On the next play, Kevin Pinkerton went 55 yards to score a TD. The PAT failed and the score read 25-14 at the final buzzer.

The Coyote Pup offensive line consisted of Nick Flanigan at center, John Harding, Ross Aten and James Bond sharing time at guard and D.J. Smith and Ryan Sanders alternating at end position.

Coyotes Outlast Tough Hornets 22-12

The Borden County JV team traveled to Ira Thursday, October 19, to play the Highland Hornets with the hopes of raising their season record to 4-1. The Coyotes, who would play as the home team, won the toss and elected to go on offense first.

Borden County used 4 plays to score on the strength of a Jeff Dennis to Clint Scott 40 yard screen pass to pay dirt. Jason Scott and Clell

Knight paved the way, as they made a couple of excellent blocks. The PAT kick by Dennis gave the Coyotes a 8-0 lead with 6:02 left in the first period.

The Hornets took the ball on their 1st possession and marched down the field where on 4th and goal, from the Coyote 4, a hard hit led to a fumble. Jason Scott picked it up at

the seven yard line. Two plays later, behind more excellent blocking by Jason Scott, Cesar Mujica, Clint Cowart, James Nance, Clell Knight and Dennis, Clint Scott took a belly play 70 yards to the Hornet end zone. The PAT kick by Dennis, upped the lead to 16-0 with 2:01 remaining in the 1st period.

The Hornets then took the ball and drove 50 yards where a Highland runner made a nice 7 yard run to cut the gap to 16-6 with 3:33 left in the half. As neither team could do much the rest of the half, the Coyotes took a 16-6 lead into the locker room.

Borden County got on the board first in the second half as Colt Miller, playing in his first JV game, intercepted an errant Highland pass. He returned it 36 yards to the Hornet three yard line. From there, Clint Scott carried it over to give the Coyotes a 22-6 lead. This would prove to be all the offense the Coyotes would need as they only allowed the Hornets one more score. It happened on a 4th down, 3 yard run and made the score 22-12 with 5:07 left in the 3rd quarter.

For the final 13 minutes of the contest, neither the Coyotes nor the Hornets could manage much offense.

The Coyote defense of Clint O'Brien, Preston Sharp, Cesar Mujica, Jason Scott, Clint Scott, Ronnie Gutierrez, Clell Knight, Jeff Dennis and Colt Miller limited the Hornets to 152 yards of total offense. Clint Scott led the defense with 15 tackles, Colt Miller had 13 tackles and 1 interception.

Jason Scott had 12 tackles and 2 fumble recoveries. Clell Knight made 8 tackles and recovered a fumble. Cesar Mujica, 8 tackles; Jeff Dennis, 7 tackles; Preston Sharp, 3 tackles; Clint O'Brien and Clint Coward had 1 tackle each.

The defense anchored and supported the Coyote team as they upped their record to 4-1.

On offense, Clint Scott would push his season total to over 1,000 yards this year with 19 carries for 154 yards in the game. Ronnie Gutierrez had 10 yards.

Jeff Dennis had his most productive yardage game as he completed 5 of 11 passes for 72 yards and a TD. Clint Scott caught 3 of those for 66 yards, Colt Miller, 1 for 2 yards and Jason Scott, 1 for 4 yards.

Geography Contest For Students

(NAPS)—Students ages 9 through 13 can put themselves on the road to adventure, win money for college scholarships and a trip for three to Walt Disney World Resort in Orlando, Florida. 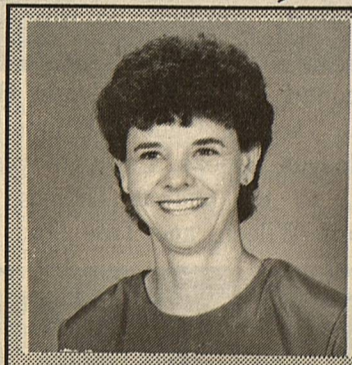

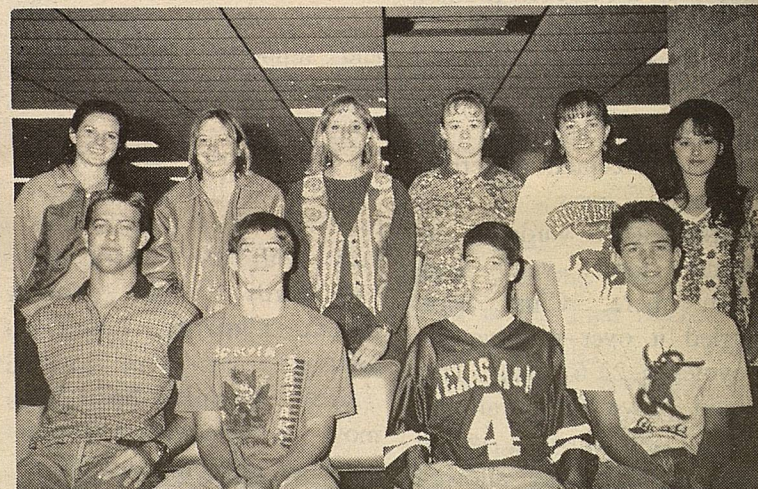

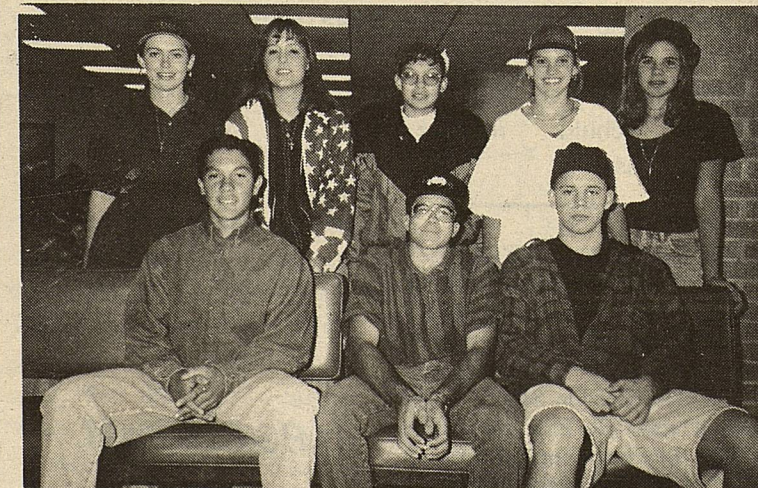

Public Notice

Vehicle title applicants required to provide social security number

The Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) will soon require additional information on title applications for motor vehicles. Beginning November 1, Texans who request title transactions in counties using the Registration and Title System (RTS) must provide their social security number. RTS is an automated system that electronically links county tax offices to TxDOT Headquarters in Austin. The Borden County Tax Office use RTS to process motor vehicle transactions.

The social security requirement is part of House Bill 1863, passed by the 74th Legislature; the bill addresses fraud prevention in public assistance programs. TxDOT is mandated to collect the social security numbers and make them accessible to other state agencies for the purpose of determining eligibility for those programs. Individuals who do not have a social security number, or are not eligible for one, must complete a statement before their title application is processed.

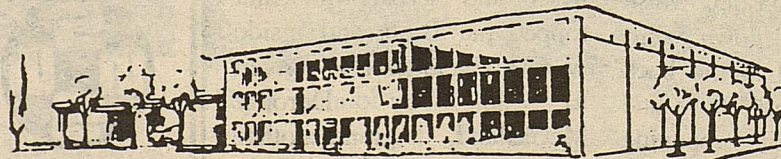

Fiddler won a trophy and a cap for his efforts. Congratulations, Frank . . . maybe we'll see you on the Senior Tour soon.



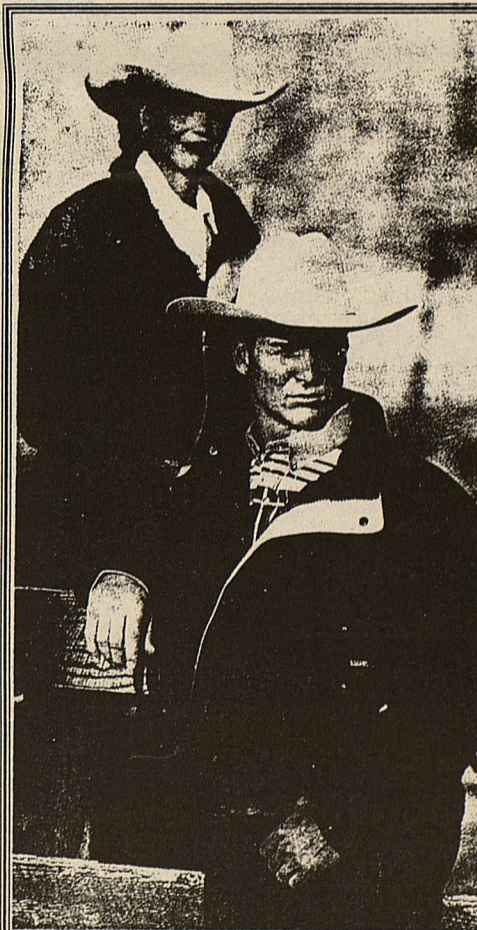

FSA COMMITTEE ELECTION

The Borden County FSA Committee elections will be conducted this year from November 17th to December 4th. Due to the reorganization from ASCS to FSA, elections will be held for all 3 committee positions. All eligible voters have the right to nominate candidates for their choice by petition. Petitions will not be mailed this year but blank petitions may be obtained at the county FSA Office during regular business hours. Eligible voters may circulate or sign nominating petition for as many candidates as they choose.

EMERGENCY GRAZING OF CRP

Borden County has been approved for an extension of Emergency Grazing of CRP acres. Previously approved participants may continue to graze their CRP through November 30, 1995 without additional reduction in annual rental rates. Please remember CRP grazing must be done in compliance with an approved grazing plan developed by NRCS (formally SCS).

As of this date there has been no word as to when the annual rental payments can be released.

NEW NAME ---- "FSA"

Once again we have changed names. Beginning October 1, 1995 we are now known as the *FARM SERVICE AGENCY* or "FSA". This is a result of the reorganization of USDA, FmHA and FCIC. For the time being, the name change is about all that you will notice. Farm programs and FCIC will still be carried out through this office and Ag loans will continue to be carried out by what is being called the FSA Ag Credit Team.

BIG CHANGE!!!!

SMALL GRAIN CERTIFICATION

Beginning this year, all small grains (wheat, oats, barley, rye, etc) must be certified by December 15, 1995. This is the date required under the crop insurance program and it has been determined that all small grains regardless of use (grain, grazing, baling, cover, etc.) must be certified by the crop insurance reporting date of 12/15/95.

CROP INSURANCE REMINDERS

1. Failed acreage must be reported and appraised prior to the destruction of the crop residue.
2. Written notice of damage to crops must be submitted to your insurance provider within 72 hours of the damaging conditions. A written notice of loss must be filed within 15 days of the loss.
3. If a loss is anticipated, then you are required to give notice at least 15 days prior to BEGINNING of harvest.
4. All producers with CAT insurance through our office must submit production records within 45 days from the date of harvest.

COOPERATING GINNERS

Dempsey Gin, the only gin physically located in Borden County, has signed the cooperating ginner's agreement. This agreement between Dempsey Gin and Commodity Credit Corporation states that Dempsey Gin agrees to use only bagging and bale ties that meet the specifications approved and published by the Joint Industry Bale Packaging Committee for the 1995 crop year. These specifications must be adhered to in order for the cotton to be eligible for Price Support Loan.
