The Coyotes were able to get their initial first down of the game a few plays later and then on a 3rd down play, Miles Valentine hit Jake Cooley for a 51 yard scoring strike to give the Coyotes a 6 to 0 lead. On the Extra point kick, a group that did a magnificent job as they were a perfect 8 for 8 on the night got their first one to make it 8 to 0

The Borden County Coy-otes took on a very tough Si-Vaqueros wasted little time in tying the contest as they scored on their first play to tie the game at 8 with 3:54 left in the quarter.


The Coyotes answered with a Cooley 66 yard run just two plays later to regain the lead at 16 to 8 with 2:59 left in the quarter. The Vaqueros managed to sustain a long drive that culminated with a short touchdown run a minute into the 2nd quarter, but they missed their extra-point and the Coyotes had a small opening.

The Coyotes had a drive look to have stalled only to get another break as a defensive holding penalty gave the Coyotes a first down and the arm of Valentine made them pay as he connected with Michael Cooley on an 18 yard strike to give the Coyotes a 24 to 14

The Coyote defense finally came thru on the next defensive series as a 4th down reverse pass did not fool the Coyotes and they took over possession deep in Vaqueros territory. After a few tough runs and overcoming a penalty that took a touchdown off the board, Michael Cooley followed some nice blocks to pay dirt and with the 4th extra-point the Coyotes had a 32 to 14 lead with 2:48 left in the half.





Poinsettia Care

poinsettias are poisonous is a misconception. The scientific evidence demonstrating the well documented. Studies conducted by Ohio State University in cooperation with the Society of American Florists concluded that no toxicity was evident at experimental ingestion levels far exceeding those likely to occur in a home environment. In fact, the POISINDEX Information Service, the primary information resource used by most poison control centers, states that a 50 pound child would have to ingest more than 500 poinsettia bracts to surpass experimental doses. Yet even at this high level, not toxicity was demonstrated.

As with all ornamental plants, poinsettias are not intended for human or animal consumption and certain individuals may experience an allergic reaction to poinsettias. However, the poinsettia has been demonstrated to be a safe plant. In fact, in 1992, the poinsettia was included on the list of houseplants most helpful in removing pollutants from indoor air. So, not only is the poinsettia a safe and beautiful addition to you holiday and winter decor, it can even help keep your indoor air clean!

Do's and Don'ts of Poinsettia Care

DO place your plant in indirect sunlight for at least six hours per day. If direct sun can't be avoided, diffuse the light with a shade or sheer curtain

<u>**DO**</u> provide room temperatures between 68-70 F. Generally speaking, if you are comfortable, so is your poinsettia

DO water your plant when the soil feels dry to the touch.

DO use a large, roomy shopping bag when transport-

The Poinsettia is NOT Poinness ing it, especially if it is windy.

DO fertilize your plant AFTER THE BLOOMING SEA-SON with a balanced, all-purpose fertilizer.

DON'T place plants near poinsettia's safety is ample and cold drafts or excessive heat sources. Avoid placing plants near appliances, fireplaces or

ventilating ducts.

DON'T overwater your plant, or allow it to sit in standing water. Always remove a plant from any decorative container before watering, and allow the water to drain com-

DÓN'T expose your plant to chilling winds when transporting it.

DON'T fertilize your plant when it is in bloom.


