What Do You Say to Your Children?

Children are sponges for knowledge and information. They are born a virtual blank slate. They pay attention to everything you say to them. You are the purveyor of all knowledge. Children can't distinguish between when you are serious and when you say something impulsively, without thinking. A single comment can stay with a child for the rest of his or her life. If you doubt this, I'm sure you can remember a number of statements made to you when you were younger.

Children believe what you tell them, especially with regard to their self-image. They consider you all knowing. How a child feels about himself will influence him for his entire life. Furthermore, it can affect his relationships with others as well as determining how he treats his own children.

You have a significant responsibility to your children. Your objective is to encourage and make them believe in themselves. Avoid belittling comments which will cause feelings of deficiency.

Unfortunately, many parents are not fully aware of the permanent impact they have on their children. Parents will impulsively say things out of anger or frustration they really

don't mean. But a damaging statement, once uttered, can be burned into a child's mind forever. Your child can't discern the motives behind your comments. Even if you apologize, your child still remembers what was said.

Perhaps you are carrying emotional baggage from your childhood. Your parents may have said things to you that had a big negative impact. If this is the case, you need to be all the more careful not to treat your children the same way. Something that had a deleterious impact on you will have the same effect on your children.

Until the cycle is broken, negative behavior will be passed on for generations. Raising a child is an immense responsibility; you influence the type of person they become. It's imperative to tell your children things to build their self-esteem, enhance their self-image, and enable them to recognize their unlimited potential.

I cringe when I hear an angry parent telling a child they are no good or will never amount to anything. Children will find a way to live up to your expectations. A child who

Banman began a series of 4 straight takeaways for the Coyote defense as he intercepted a Warrior pass and rumbled 19 yards to the end zone and following another Rosales kick they had a comfortable 22-0 first quarter lead.

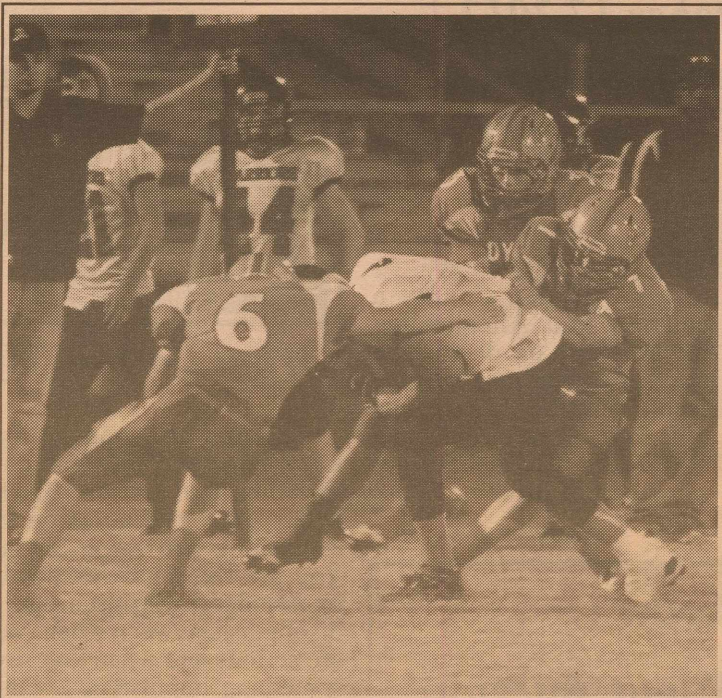
Banman continued the defensive dominance as he fell on a loose ball on the next series and moment later Jared Smith hit Matt Proulx on a short 4 yard pass play to push the lead to 28 before Rosales tackled on the 2-point kick and a 30-0 lead. Korbin Martinez intercepted a deflected pass by teammate Steven Howard and returned the ball to the Warriors 19 yard line. On the first play Smith hit Shafer on a 19 yard strike and with another Rosales a 38-0 lead to close the opening quarter. Martinez started the 2nd quarter with his second pick of the game and Basquez followed with a one yard plunge for his 3rd score to push the Borden County lead to 46-0 after the Rosales kick.

The Coyotes continued their dominant play even with the entire 14 man roster seeing the field. After another defensive stop on downs, Korbin Martinez got into the act offensively following some nice blocks by Proulx, Matt Ham, and Sean Tucker on a 30 yard run for a 52 to 0 lead. After another defensive stop, Matt Ham got a nice block by Luis Andrade, Proulx, Tucker, Martinez and Banman for a nice 24 yard touchdown run. Basquez added the extra point kick to make the final tally 60-0 with the game ending at half by the 45 point mercy rule.

Leading the way for the Coyotes was T.J. Basquez with 53 yards on 4 carries and 3 scores and a reception for 29 yards and was in on 8 tackles. Steven Howard had 6 tackles and a pass break up. Matt Ham had 4 tackles and a carry for 24 yards and a score. Frank Banman had 8 tackles an interception for a score and a fumble recovery. Sean Tucker had 2 tackles. Jordan Martinez had 4 tackles. Korbin Martinez had 3 carries for 44

yards and a score and 5 tackles and 2 interceptions. Jared Smith was 3 of 3 passing for 2 scores and 52 yards passing and 1 carry for 17 yards and 2 tackles. Tristen Benavidez had 2 tackles. Helio Rosales was 5 of 6 on extra point and in on 2 tackles. Matt Roberson was in on a tackle and Luis Andrade was in on 2 tackles.

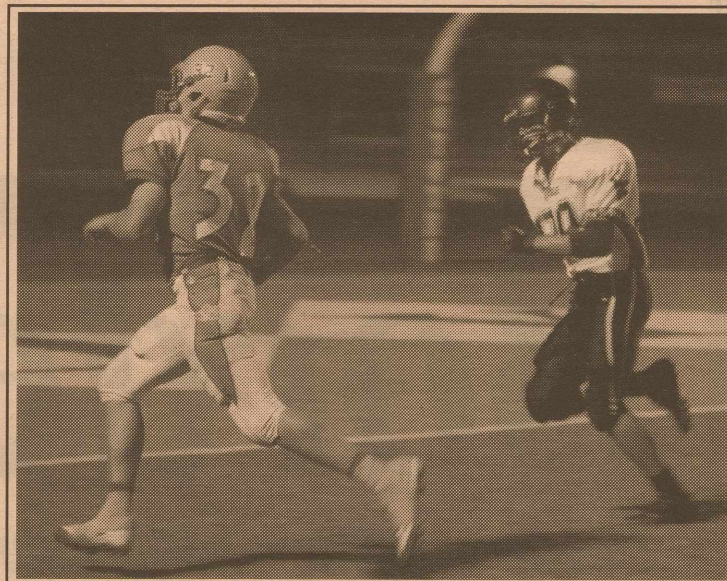

The first quarter had one score occur. It was a touchdown run by Water Valley with an PAT run-in as well that made the score 0-7 in favor of the Wildcats. The Coyotes answered right back with 4:22 to go in the second quarter on an 11 yard run by Cayden Vaughn. Riley Herridge kicked the PAT good making the score 8-7, Coyotes. The next score from Water Valley was a 22 yard run. The PAT failed making the score 13-8, Water Valley.

Water Valley kept the momentum as they also notched the next score on a 38 yard touchdown run and converted the PAT on a pass. This brought the score to 8-20, Water Valley. The Coyotes kept their poise as they answered right back on the next possession on a Riley Herridge to Thomas Harrison 11 yard pass for a touchdown with 6:37 to in the 3rd quarter. The score

The fourth quarter started with the momentum in favor of the Coyotes as they were able to take the lead on a 10 yard pass from Herridge to Vaughn for a Coyote touchdown. Herridge kicked the PAT good. Pups Pummel the Loraine Bulldogs

The Borden County Pups traveled to Loraine Thursday to put their undefeated record on the line against the home town Bulldogs. The Pups got off to a quick start as Trace Richey followed the blocks of Kale Yarbro, Kace Lott, Braxton Coor, Corbin Sumners, and Jayton Lewis on his way to a 38 yard touchdown on the Pups second play of their first series. The second team of Ryan Wilborn, Dylan Murphy, Brian Torres, Braxton Barnes, Diego Bernal and Hunter Huse paved the way for Wilborn to score the point after to push the lead to 7-0 with 5:43 left in the first. After the Borden County defense forced a quick 3 and out the Pups fumbled the ball on the first play and the hometown Bulldogs picked the ball up and rumbled to the endzone for a Bulldog touchdown. The Pups were down by one point at 7-8. After turning the ball over on downs on their next possession, the Pups defense stiffened and forced a turnover on downs.

On the next possession Hunter Jones, making his return to the Pups lineup scampered 51 yards to pay dirt and gave them a 13 to 8 lead in the second quarter. Borden County got the ball back with 1:50 left in the half and Corbin Sumners set sail on a 33 yard jaunt to push the lead to 19 to 8. Following a pass from Dylan Murphy to Hunter Huse the Pups lead 20-8. On the next defensive possession, Borden County forced another turnover on downs with about :30 seconds left in the half and on their first play, the Pups executed a perfect screen pass as Richey hit Sumners on a 37 yard pass play. Another Wilborn run for the point after made the halftime score 27 to 8.

During the halftime scrimmage with Braxton Barnes and Brian Torres joining Thad Basquez, Clayton Addison, Thomas Nix, Nick Proulx, Morgan Wilson and Kable Kleck, this group easily outscored the younger Bulldogs 3 to 0 as Torres had a 60 yard run and a 12 yard run following a nice 38 yard pass from Wilson to Basquez set it

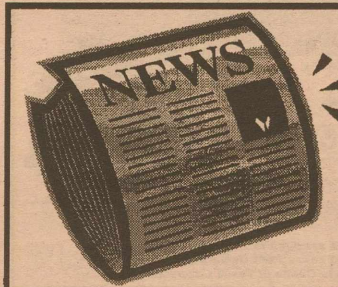
up. Nick Proulx also got in the act from 35 yards out. Clayton Addison had an interception as this same group gave up no yards or first downs in their 10 defensive plays.

Now, back to the 2nd half, the Pups defense continued to dominate holding the Bulldogs to no first downs with their top defensive group of Sumners, Yarbro, Lott, Wilborn, Lewis, Jones and Richey all game long. On the Pups first possession of the half Corbin Sumners reached the endzone again from 12 yards out and then Dylan Murphy hit Diego Bernal for the point after to push the lead to 34 to 8. On the next defensive possession the Borden County used several new players and the Bulldogs were able to take advantage and get back on the board to cut the lead to 34 to 14. Moments later however, Richey scooted 48 yards to the endzone to push the lead back up to 40 to 14. The Bulldogs returned the ensuing kick to cut the lead back to 40 to 20. The Pups answered back as Richey completed passes to Braxton Coor for 17 yards, Kace Lott for 14 yards on a diving catch and then the final yard from Richey to Lewis gave them a commanding 46 to 20 lead. After another stop by the defense which used the 2nd and 3rd team players Jayton Lewis followed the blocking of Bernal, Barnes and Huse on the line and Wilborn and Richey in the backfield to reach pay dirt from 26 yards out to ice the game at 52 to 20. This would prove to be the final score and improve the Pups to 5-0 on the season.

Leading the way for the Pups was Jayton Lewis with 63 yards on 5 carries a touchdown and 1 reception for a yard and a score and 11 tackles, Corbin Sumners had a reception for a score from 37 yards out and 2 carries for scores and 45 yards and was in on 8 tackles. Hunter Jones had 3 carries for 56 yards and a score and was in on 7 tackles. Trace Richey had 90 yards on 4 carries and two scores and was 4 of 6 passing for 69 yards and two scores and had 11 tackles. Kace Lott had a reception for 14 yards and 8 tackles. Kale Yarbro had

12 tackles, Ryan Wilborn had 14 tackles, Dylan Murphy had 2 tackles, Clayton Addison had a tackle, Brian Torres had a tackle, Diego Bernal had 3 tackles, Hunter Huse a tackle, Braxton Coor had 3 tackles, Nick Proulx had a tackle, Morgan Wilson had 3 tackles, Braxton Barnes had a tackle.

The Pups will next play host to Lubbock Kingdom Prep with the 7th grade beginning at 4:30 and following that game will play host to the Jayton Jaybirds with the 8th grade team.



Food Safety Tips for Hunters

With hunting season in full swing, Texas A&M AgriLife Extension wants to share with you a few tips to keep your harvested food safe this season.

In the field:

First, never shoot, handle or consume any wild animal that appears sick. Contamination can occur at any point during the processing of wild game. Take extra time and handle carcasses with care when field dressing. Some things to consider: wear gloves when field dressing, remove all internal organs, discard any meat that is bruised, discolored, contaminated with feces or intestinal contents, contains hair, dirt or bone fragments. Remove any bloodshot areas or meat that was in contact with the bullet. Also, avoid contact with intestines, spinal tissues, and lymph nodes of animals while you work. Do not use household knives or utensils, use knives designed for field dressing. Be sure to remove all foreign particles and loose hair.

When cleaning up in the field, be sure to properly dispose of the hide and remaining parts of the animal in an offal pit or in an approved area.

Processing and storing wild game:

Be aware of cross contamination and temperature abuse, both will cause the meat to go bad. Cool carcasses quickly,

keep them cool during transport, and keep them out of direct sunlight. Cool the carcass by propping the chest open with a clean stick and allowing air to circulate. Thoroughly clean and sanitize all equipment used in the processing of the animal. Wash your hands, knife, cutting boards often with warm soapy water. Packaging and storing meat is very important in the overall quality of the product. For immediate use, store meat in the refrigerator and use within a few days. If freezing, divide the meat into smaller portions then package. It is recommended to use moisture proof wrap such as heavy wax paper, laminated freezer wrap, heavy duty aluminum foil or freezer-weight polyethylene bags for freezing meat products. Make sure to get all the air out of the packages prior to sealing them. Be sure to label the packages with contents and date.

is repeatedly told that she is stupid will rarely do well in school. A child who is told he is inferior to his siblings or other children will be an underachiever.

Children want your attention. A child who is ignored will do anything to be noticed. If being good doesn't get them the attention they crave, they will resort to more aberrant behavior until they are noticed.

Children don't understand or comprehend adult world stresses. The concept of money, income, expenses, jobs, and responsibilities are learned only as children get older. Children are very perceptive. They know when you are angry or frustrated. Children will automatically assume that they must have done something wrong to cause your distress.

For this reason, you must never take out your frustrations on your children. Don't snap at them or put them down. Don't tell them they don't understand what you are going through. They will feel there is something wrong with them.

Tell your children you love them. Praise them often. When they do something wrong, explain what they should have done and why. Make your children feel important and part of the family. Teach by example. Think before you speak. Never act out of anger. Insulate your children from the realities of the adult world. They will be dealing with them soon enough.



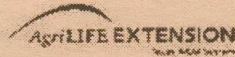

Lamb, Goat and Swine Validation

What is validation? Why do we validate? These are questions that are often asked by 4-H and FFA families.

The validation process is designed to identify ownership, assist in identification at the county and/or major stock shows, and to aid in the recover of lost or stolen animals. This process is conducted across the state of Texas so to exhibit at the Borden County Junior Livestock Show and/or Ft. Worth, San Antonio, San Angelo, Houston, or Austin, 4-H'ers and FFA members must have their animal validated.

Lamb and goat projects will be validated in the month of October. During this process, lamb and goats will be tagged, nose printed, and hair samples collected.

Swine will be validated in the month of November. Swine will be tagged, hair samples collected and ear notches documented.

There are also fees involved in the validation process. Lamb, goat, and swine validation for animals who will be exhibiting at the county and major livestock shows will require a state tag. A validation fee of \$8.00 will be charged for each animal validated with a state tag.

Those projects that will only be exhibited at the Borden County Junior Livestock show will need to pay \$5.00 per head for validation.

The deadline to order swine tags is October 26, 2012. You will need to call the Borden County Extension Office or Cody G. Hill to pre-order your validation tags if you plan on exhibiting swine at the Borden County Stock Show or at a major stock show in 2013.

All tags must be paid for when ordered. Each family needs to make sure they order enough tags to validate all of their projects. Ordering one extra tag is always a good policy!!!

2013 4-H Livestock Entries in Major Shows

Please find enclosed a schedule of activities for each major stock show in Texas for 2013. This information is compiled to assist you in making decisions as to what stock shows your family will attend.

We will take your entry for the major stock shows on Monday and Tuesday November 12 and 13, from 9 a.m. to 12 p.m. and 1 p.m. to 5 p.m. Please have a family representative present to enter your animal projects on this day.

Please include exhibitor's social security number and quality counts number on the entry form along with **parent and exhibitor** signatures, and the exhibitor information on the back of the form and bring the form with you to the meeting. Remember, fill out one (1) form for each exhibitor.

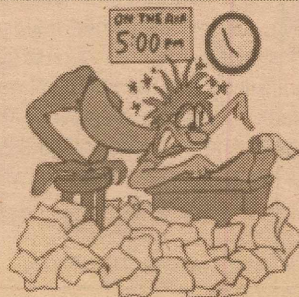
All FFA entries will need to be made through Mr. Parker. Be sure to not enter the same animal through FFA and 4-H. This constitutes what is termed a "double entry" and major stock shows will void both entries, keep your entry fee, and not allow you to show. Therefore, it is important you take extra precautions with your entries when you exhibit projects in both FFA and 4-H.

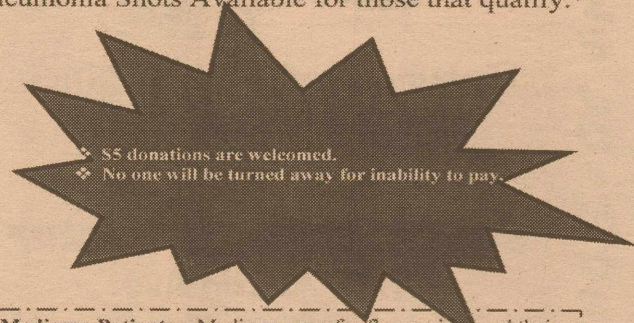

Veterans Day 2012 will be recognized with a special edition paper to recognize local and family service members.

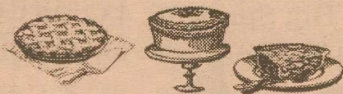

All entry fees, passes, car permits, and chute permits will need to be paid at the time of entry! Make your checks payable to **Borden 4-H**, as we must send one check with our entries to each major stock show. Please note the rule on car passes for Houston - the number we receive will be determined after all entries are made.

Once again, we are implementing an "Administrative Processing Fee". This charge will be \$7.00 PER FAMILY. Most of the major stock shows have a processing fee that Borden 4-H has been paying. It is no longer feasible for the 4-H Club to continue to pay for these fees and mailing costs. The cost of mailing these entries to the stock shows is costly due to the entries being mailed "certified". The "administrative processing fee" will cover the cost of each stock shows processing fee and mailing of the entries.
